Answering a minister's Attempted Defense of A Welfare State

(Continued) In the last issue I was discuss-

ing a sermon made by Dr. Alfred W. Swan at the First Congregational Church at Madison, Wisconsin in February, 1950. This sermon has been reproduced by the First Congregational Church under the heading of "How Social Is Christianity?" In the last issue I quoted from the sermon where the doctor said: "Well, what if it is a welfare state we are building?" He implied that the welfare state is Christian. Then I pointed out how the doctor didn't see the difference between a man being his brother's keeper and a man being his brother's helper. Here is the first paragraph of Rev. Swan's sermon. I quote:

"The great question troubling our world today is: How socialshall we be? From Moscow to Muscoda, from old London to new Lexington, from Mobile to Madi-son, across the miles and the years, the concepts and the cultures, people are rightly asking: How much can we share one an other's burdens, and how much must each man bear his own?" Notice the doctor uses the word

"we", when he talks about how much can we share one another's burdens. And judging from his secmon, "we" means the state by way of force. He doesn't use the word "I". He doesn't say "how much can I share another's burdens, "but he is mighty interested in how much "we" or someone else can bear another's burdens. He believes in initiating force to make one person bear another's burdens. which is the very antithesis of Christian doctrines. Then the doc-

"The real question for us here should be: How social was Jesus, and how social was Paul? And how social, therefore, must WE be who aspire to follow in their

train?" The caps are mine. The only way to tell how social Jesus was is to read what He is accredited as saying and then determine what is meant by social. Then the doctor observes:

"That the church is sometimes under attack for the position it has tried unselfishly to take may give point without too much pain to our inquiry in this place.' This is practically admitting

## Cake-Baking **Gaining Favor**

By SAM DAWSON NEW YORK-(P)-In Ottum Iowa, they're baking a cake. It's a birthday cake for president Tru-man who will be there Monday, when he's 66. It's a chocolate cake, because that's his favorite. In homes throughout the land, they're baking cakes, too. And the milling industry believes there may be twice as much home cake baking now as before the war. They claim this in spite of an admitted per capita decline in the consumption of flour and cereal products in general as America's diet has changed over

the last 50 years.
Millers don't pretend to know
the exact number of cakes baked at home, but they have ways of guessing at it. One is the rising sales curve of pre-mixed and special cake flour. This has coin-cided with the growing percentage of working wives.

And in recent months has been another factor. bakeries are complaining about business being slow, and the Na-

ports that evening dining out is declining. People apparently are esting at home more and buying a little less at the bakeries. Meanwhile, sales of all-purpe flour are down from their post-war peak. The Bureau of Census gives the 1949 output of flour as 235.7 billion pounds, compared with 279 billion in 1948 and 305 1-2 billion in 1947. The drop in domestic usage was only one per cent — the big drop came as the export market shrivelled. The milling industry took it on the chin for a while, but most trade sources believe it is back in healthy balance now, al-though at the lower level.




