### Chief Deputy Will Seek Sheriff Post

### Acheson Grim As Talks Near

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of State Acheson set out for Europe yesterday with a grim warning that the non-Communist world faces "increasingly crucial tests in the years immediately ahead."

He said that because of the threat of international communism, the free nations of the world must speed up the mobilization of their "moral and material strength" and must do so "with utmost vigor."

That, he emphasized, will be his own major purpose in talking with foreign ministers Bevin of Britain and Schuman of France in Paris and London this week, and in meeting with the North Atlantic Treaty Council the week following.

What he hopes to get, he said, is "a new sense of community in the North Atlantic area."

He said he was encouraged by the bi-partisan cooperation from Republican and Democratic leaders of Congress.

President Truman arranged to see Acheson off at the airport. Mr. Truman told his chief diplomatic official:

"I know very well you are going to have successful meetings in Europe which will make a contribution to the peace of the world."

Diplomatic representatives from the Atlantic Pact nations also were on hand.

Behind Acheson's general words on the urgency lay two concrete facts:

An estimate by state and defense experts that Russia will be dangerously armed by 1954 and the West can only keep pace by throwing all its resources into a common effort; and

That the United States, Britain and France have only about 18 months to work out the end of the occupation of Germany.

**Nicaraguan Leader Dies**

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — The president of Nicaragua, Dr. Victor Roman Y Reyes, died here last night. He was 77 years of age, and suffered from cancer. Death occurred at 8:25 p.m., CST.

President Roman came to Hahnemann Hospital where he had served his internship a half century ago — to undergo treatment for a cancerous ulcer of the stomach. He was operated on April 3.

Pneumonitis developed April 10 at the base of the right lung and corrective surgery was done by his son, Dr. D. A. Roman.

Doctor Roman y Reyes was elected president by a constituent assembly August 15, 1947. He had previously been foreign minister for a year.

**Highway 60 Delegation Leaves Today**

Delegates from Pampa will leave at 10 a.m. today to attend the U. S. Highway 60 Convention at Ponca City, Okla. The group includes George Newberry and Howard Buckingham, members of the Chamber of Commerce Highway 60 Committee, G. S. "Pinky" Winesard, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and E. O. Wedgeworth, manager.

From all reports the convention looks to be one of the hottest and best ever, due primarily to a controversy over a proposed alternate routing of Highway 60 through Shattuck, Woodward, and Gage, Okla. They are opposed by Arnett, Vici, and Fairview, Okla., through which the present route goes. Both sides are reported to be hot in pursuit of support.

Wedgeworth said that local delegates are going unopposed, and will feel the situation out before making up their minds on what actions they will take.

A total of \$140,560.25, has been set aside for repair work on 8 miles of Highway 60 beginning five miles east of Arnett. The work will include grading, work on the drainage system, and a paving program.

Walter Pittman of Riverside, Calif., came through Pampa yesterday morning with a delegation enroute to Ponca City to attend the convention. Pittman is immediate past president of the U. S. Highway 60 Association.

No sooner did the slam-bang special congressional pre-election excitement die down yesterday than the seeds of new interest were sown by the resignation of Chief Deputy Sheriff Rufe Jordan with the avowed intention to run for sheriff against his now former superior, Sheriff G. H. "Skinner" Kyle.

This puts three in the race, two officially, and the third, Jordan, a sure "bet" as a candidate.

Jordan was emphatic yesterday that there were no bad feelings between Kyle and himself. He said:

"I had made up my mind long ago that I would run for the office this year. The sheriff and I had a long chat Friday night and I handed him my letter of resignation asking to be relieved of the duties, effective immediately. I will run a clear race and can promise no mud-slinging in any way."

Jordan added that he would announce and file for a place on the July 22 Democratic primary ballot within the next few days. The busy ex-chief deputy said he would devote the next two months entirely to running his campaign and would have his program and platform ready by the time he officially announced as a candidate.

Jordan was appointed chief deputy on Oct. 1, 1947 following the discharge of then Chief Deputy Sheriff Jeff Guthrie and Deputy Sheriff Carl Tucker, the latter now a candidate for justice of the peace. Jordan has served in the chief deputy capacity since that time. Prior to that he served as jailer under the late Sheriff Cal Rose and was also chief of plant protection for Danciger Oil Refinery during the war.

Jordan has been the subject of wide speculation for several months as to whether he would run for sheriff. In February he was believed to be the successor to Chief of Police John Wilkinson when the latter was offered the Lubbock post of police chief. But that too died down when Wilkinson elected to remain in Pampa.

Both Jordan and Kyle reiterated each other's claims that the conversation was kept strictly on a friendly basis.

Kyle had little comment to make on Jordan's resignation, but said:

"Rufe and I always got along all right and I hate to see him leave the department. So far as I am concerned there are no hard feelings. His decision to leave surprises me as much as it does you."

This will be the second sheriff's race to pit Kyle against Jordan. The first was in 1946 when the big ex-deputy ran for the office in a race that wound up in a runoff between Jesse Hatcher and Kyle.

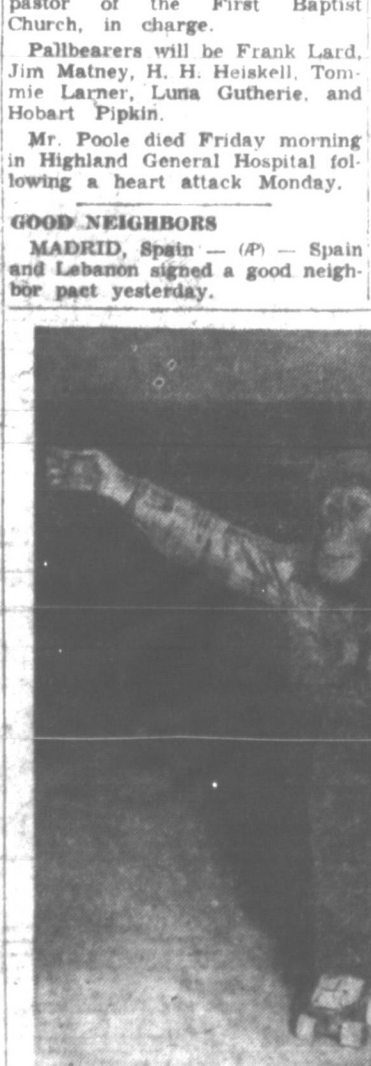

### Union Backing Ten-Shot Broadside Fired at President

AUSTIN — (AP) — A big segment of Texas organized labor yesterday hit at administration-backed new taxes and endorsed Casa March for governor.

State AFL leaders attacked the taxes voted by the 51st Legislature in February as predominantly a sales tax program.

"The tendency to sock the consumer for state services must be stopped," William J. Harris of Dallas and Paul C. Sparks of Austin said.

Harris and Sparks are president and executive director, respectively, of the Texas State Labor League for Political Education which met here to discuss objectives and endorse a slate of candidates for this summer's Democratic primaries. The league is the political branch of the State Federation of Labor.

March and Roger G. Evans of Denison both got league endorsement in their races for governor and lieutenant governor, respectively.

**Air Breakfast Slated Today**

All private pilots within a radius of 250 miles of Pampa have been extended invitations to attend a pilot's breakfast at the Country Club at 9 a. m. today. This is one of a series of meetings held in the Top O' Texas area each spring and summer.

The statement added the following charges, in the form of questions which it said were "gravely troubling" American voters, and dared the president to answer them:

Mr. Truman ordered Democratic leaders in Congress "to block the sensible amendments to the Taft-Hartley Act, as favored by Republicans, when he couldn't find the votes" for repeal.

He refuses the people further income tax cuts although "the ordinary workman must labor one day a week to pay his federal taxes."

The record shows "a reckless \$9,000,000,000 increase in the cost of government since 1948, of which \$6,000,000,000 had nothing to do with national defense, veteran benefits or European financial aid."

Although "farm prices have fallen sharply since 1948, when we had a Republican Congress, the only Truman solution is the Brannan plan 'under which prices would drop still further, and farmers would be subjected to bureaucratic regimentation.'"

### Pampa Republican's Margin Near 2,000; Rogers Fourth

With the battle-cry "down with the administration," Republican Ben H. Guill, 40, Pampa businessman, yesterday swept into office as the Panhandle's representative over a field of 10 Democrats.

Guill, who based his campaign on the theme that he is against the Fair Deal, was well out ahead of his nearest opponent, Mrs. Altavene Clark, Amarillo.

He will be the first Republican to sit in the U.S. Congress from Texas since 1929 when Frank M. Wurzbach of San Antonio left the office.

Amarillo's pro-labor J. Blake Timmons was in third place, followed by Pampa's ex-district attorney, Walter E. Rogers.

As the unofficial returns came in from the 28 counties, nine of them complete, Guill led the field with a staggering 8,181; Mrs. Clark came in second with 6,264; J. Blake Timmons with 5,698 and Walter Rogers' total of 5,163.

Of the district's 79,662 voting potential only 35,499 voters went to the polls.

Guill will run again in November against the victor of the Democratic primaries if he is to capture the full two-year term seat. This election carried him only to Jan. 3—the remainder of Rep. Eugene Worley's unexpired term.

Although Guill whipped Altavene Clark in Potter county, he lost it to Timmons, who carried it with a vote of 2,147 to Guill's 2,108. Mrs. Clark polled only 1,729.

Guill jumped into an early lead throughout the district and never relinquished it by the time the last votes were tabulated.

Most of the unreported boxes were too small to swing the election away from the young Republican candidate.

The GOP victory brought statements from Guill and Miss Ruthelle Bacon, Amarillo Republican leader.

Said Guill:

"I feel wonderful.

"Today the people of the Panhandle voted their Declaration of Independence. They showed they would no longer stand being kicked in the teeth by socialists who have stolen the Democratic party away from the people. I shall never blindly follow the dictates of a party leader. I shall always vote straight Panhandle according to my own conscience because I know that will be to the best interest of every single citizen of the Panhandle regardless of party labels."

Mrs. Altavene Clark, decked out in an orchid, told the Associated Press she would remain in the race and go through the Democratic primary race declaring the real Democrats would carry her through.

J. Blake Timmons also declared he would stay in the race, saying:

"I definitely will be a candidate in the Democratic primary. Eighty percent of the district's voters are still Democratic and are not going to take this lying down."

Walter Rogers said he would stay in the race.

LeRoy "Pete" LaMaster, considered one of the leading contenders, indicated he would also remain in the race. However, the remaining candidates fared so badly at the polls it was doubtful if they continue through the primary race. Their totals were:

LaMaster, 3,777; E. T. Burk, 2,426; Ronald Davis, 2,551; Talmie Smith, 1,044; Bill Pickett, 434; Woodrow Montgomery, 371; H. J. Bice, 115. Although none of these made any statements last night it was doubtful if they would remain in the race.

Guill will be sworn into office as soon as the secretary of state of Texas transmits an election certificate to the United States Congress, Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn said in a telegram to The News yesterday afternoon.

Miss Bacon told the Associated Press:

"Primarily I feel that the people of this district have awakened to the fact that something must be done about the goings-on in Washington. I am particularly impressed by the attitude of those who have visited Europe during the last year. Without exception they return determined to roll up their sleeves and go to work to defeat the socialistic trend that has taken over our country and their knowledge of what Europe has suffered and is suffering has made them realize that our socialistic state can lead us only to economic destruction."

In the farm and cotton area the following votes were given the four top contenders: Deaf Smith — Guill, 425; Clark, 357; Rogers, 136; and Timmons, 131. Castro — Clark, 158; Rogers, 132; Guill, 130; and Timmons, 46. Childress — Rogers, 257; Clark, 123; Timmons 131; Rogers, 106; and Guill, 75. Hall — Davis, 399; Rogers, 326; Guill, 118; Clark, 115; and Timmons, 49.

Elsewhere the returns were scattered, but the general trend gave Guill the edge all the way. He showed surprising strength in the home counties of each of the candidates except LaMaster who took Ochiltree County at over 80 to 1.

The total vote over the district was just about as expected and predicted—about one-half of the total potential of the district. However, early voting here led some observers to believe an almost complete voting list would turn out, but the pace dropped off during the afternoon hours.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — (AP) — Calm and beautiful as a fairy princess, Elizabeth Taylor recited wedding vows with hotel heir Conrad Hilton, Jr., Saturday.

While 800 movie fans milled outside the Catholic Church of the Good Shepherd, the dark-tressed actress declared: "I will."

The wedding went off on time in a steady but restrained voice, and without a hitch.

At precisely 5 p. m. the church organ began intoning. At 5:10 the wedding march began and Barron, the best man, stepped young Hilton and his brother, before the altar.

The six bridesmaids walked slowly down the yellow satin carpet. Miss Taylor followed holding on the arm of her father.

Miss Taylor and Hilton stood before the rail in front of the golden altar and listened as Rt. Rev. Magr. Patrick J. Concanan asked them to be "loyal and true to the end."

The reception in the bridegroom's slipper room was a diamond-studded platinum ring on the bride's finger. She gave him a plain gold band. After the priest pronounced them husband and wife and congratulated them, Hilton grasped his bride and delivered a kiss.

The bride is 18 and generally termed the screen's most beautiful girl. The bridegroom, a tall, handsome Texan of 23 years, is the son of Conrad Hilton whose hotel holdings are reportedly worth \$125,000,000.

Seven hundred guests were invited to the ceremonies, including dozens of Hollywood's famous.

The reception was also set up on a large scale. Three dining rooms of the fashionable Bel Air Country Club were taken over to accommodate the 700 guests. Each room featured a symbolic statue carved from huge blocks of ice depicting two kissing doves, the wedding church and a Horn of Plenty.

Except for songstress Jane Powell, one of the bridesmaids, the wedding party was not familiar to the general movie public. Miss Westmore, longtime friend of the bride, was chosen as maid of honor, and Hilton's brother, Barron, best man.

Hilton met the raven-haired actress at a studio lunch last October. After a movie date, the pair began going steady. Shortly after she graduated from high school in January, they announced their engagement.

Previously, she had two other highly-publicized romances — with muscular halfback Glenn Davis and handsome Bill Pawley, but to a Florida fortune.

### 'All-Out War' Set on FEPC

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Southern filibusters set up for a marathon filibuster said yesterday they would wage "all-out war" against the administration's FEPC bill in the Senate next week.

Senator Johnston (D-SC) a leader of the Dixie group, served notice of a showdown battle in a communique for his colleagues, saying:

"We are thoroughly convinced that passage of this monstrous bill will mean a 'Pearl Harbor for the South.'"

Democratic Leader Lucas (Ill.) has called for debate Monday on the bill to create a Fair Employment Practices Commission. This agency would have powers to combat discrimination in employment because of race, color or creed.

The FEPC is favored in the political platforms of both the Democratic and Republican parties, but southern senators always have succeeded in killing it through prolonged debate.

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## Former Bank Officials Post Bonds in Case

WEATHERFORD, Texas—(AP)—Three former officials of the First National Bank of Weatherford have posted \$5,000 bond each on charges of making fraudulent statements.

Two other persons have been released on \$5,000 bonds each on charges in connection with the case.

The ex-bank executives are George Fant, 67, former president of the bank; his wife, Mrs. Elena Bedford Fant, former vice president; and James Edward Whitsett, 46, a former vice president.

The three were arrested in Weatherford after being named in a secret indictment returned by a Dallas federal grand jury.

The indictment charges that the statements were made to the RFC for the purpose of obtaining approval of a \$48,000 participation loan for a company which was indebted to the bank.

Binnie Hawthorne Hatchett, former cashier of the bank, posted a \$5,000 bond in Fort Worth after his arrest in San Antonio. He is charged with embezzlement.

In Abilene, Claude Hatchett was arrested and charged in connection with the case. He posted \$5,000 bond.

The indictment charges that in September, 1947, officials of the bank stated that the Abilene Sand and Gravel Company applicant for the RFC loan, did not owe the bank anything. The indictment says that it was learned later that the company owed the bank \$28,000.

The RFC approved the loan in 1948 and guaranteed 75 percent of the total loan of \$38,000. The Abilene concern repaid the \$28,000 to the bank and used the remaining \$10,000 to meet other debts and expenses. Then the company became bankrupt.

The bank demanded that the RFC repay the \$38,000 guaranteed in the loan, which the RFC did.

The indictment said that after an RFC investigation, the bank officials repaid the RFC the full amount of the loan and were forced to resign by bank examination in October, 1949.

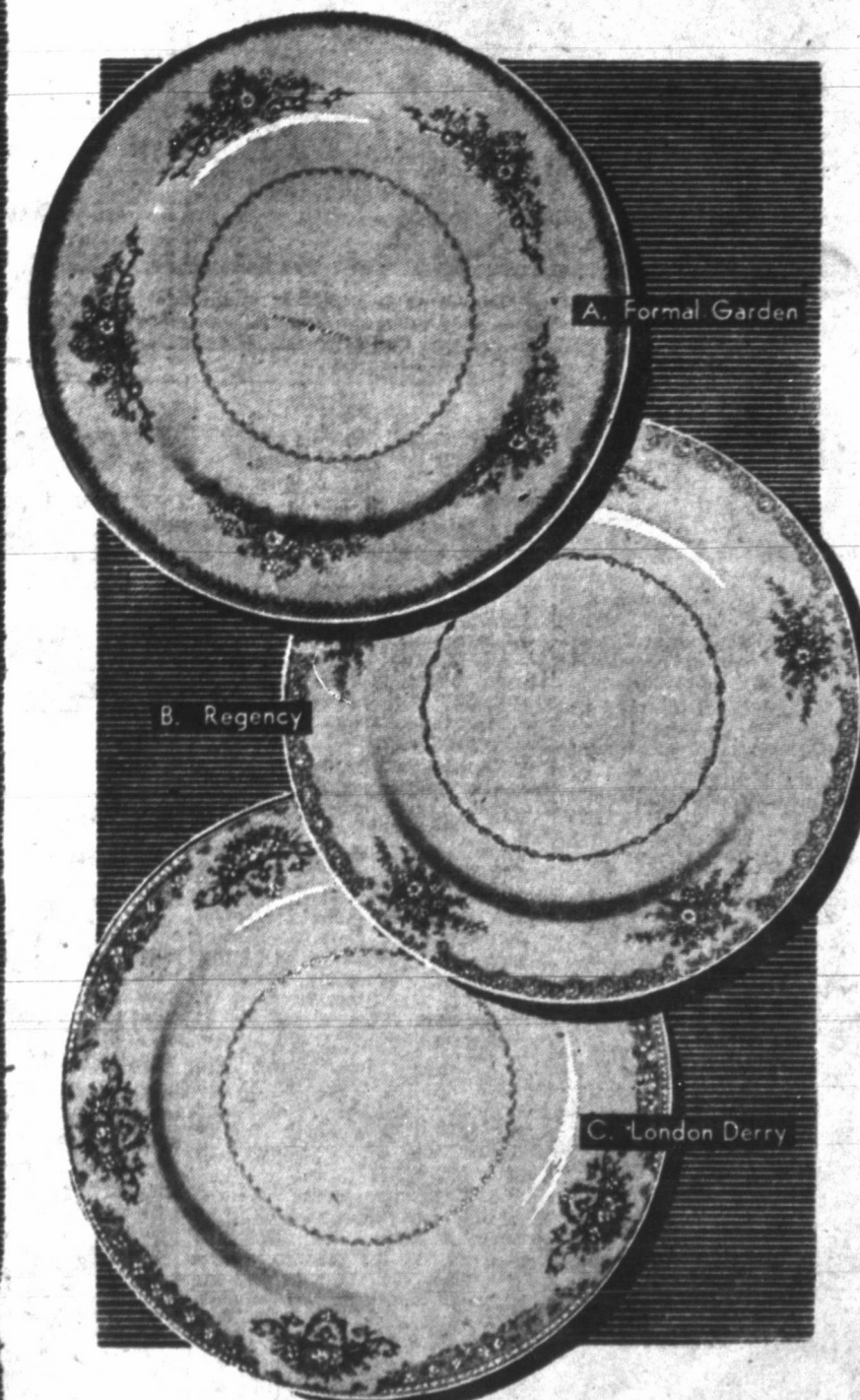

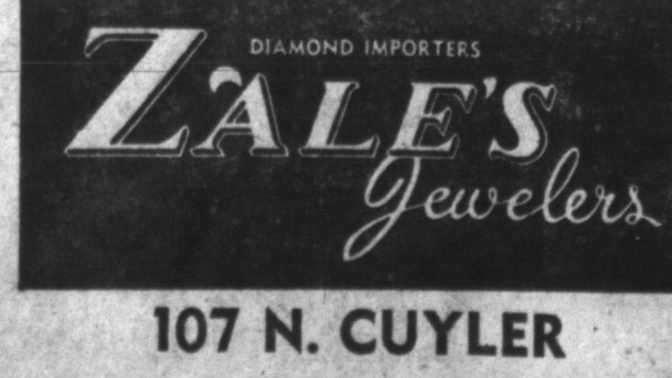

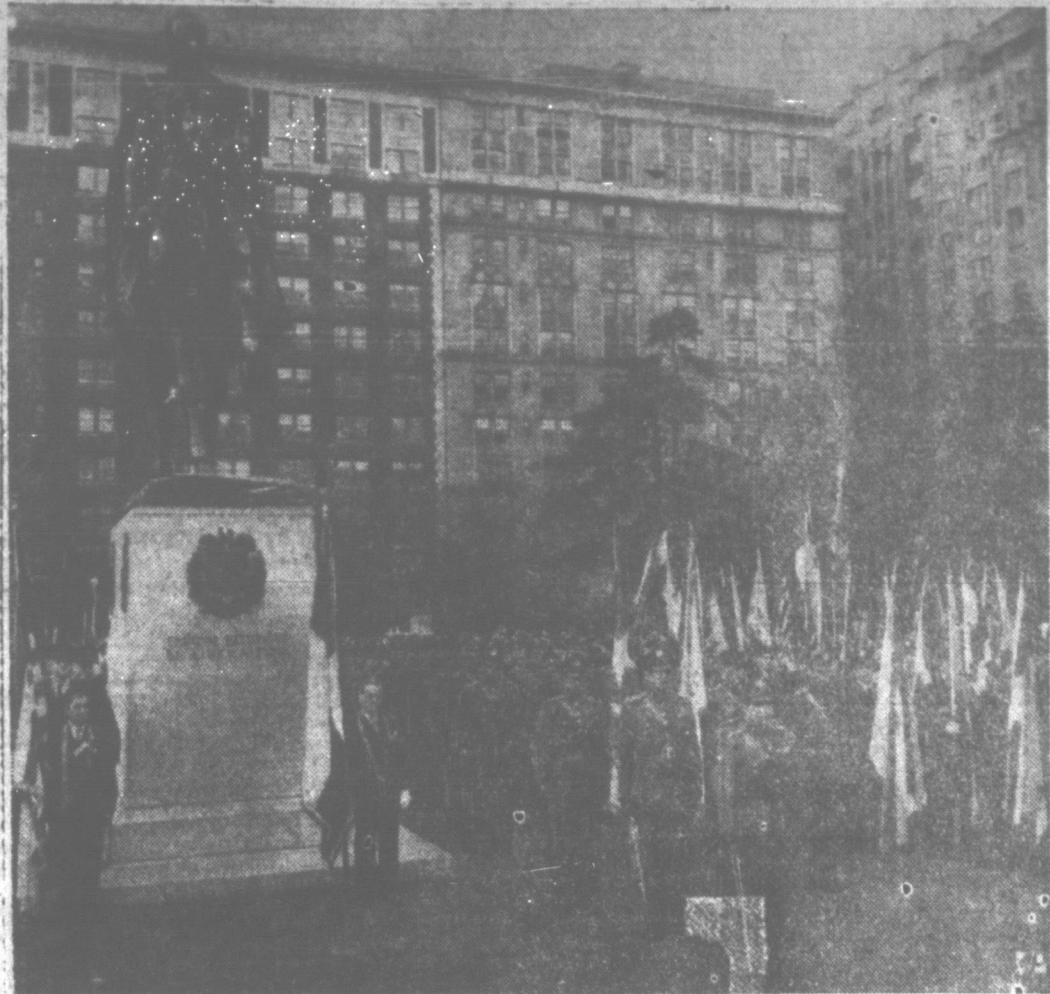

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Remember the old time "Get Out of Town"? Barton MacLane suggests film stars could solve their personal problems by adopting it as a theme song.

MacLane is the tough-looking guy who usually plays mobsters or sadistic cops in the movies. You'd hardly suspect that he is a respectable rancher of Madera, Calif., near Fresno.

The actor is in town to mail Jimmy Cagney in "Kiss Tomorrow Goodbye." As soon as he finishes the chore, he'll journey back to his cattle ranch and wait for his agent to snag him another assignment. He finds the system is ideal for film actors.

"The trouble with movie acting," he said, "is that there isn't enough physical labor to it. An actor doesn't work hard enough or often enough to keep himself active and happy."

So he invested in the cattle ranch. "It's a wholesome life," he said. "You feel as though you are accomplishing something." It pays off, too. With an annual yield of 100 heifers which can bring \$200 each, he can gross \$20,000 per year. And the tax set-up permits him to save more of his film earnings, too.

## Once Rip-Roaring Town Now Protected by Blind Bartender

VIRGINIA CITY, Mont. — (AP) — Justice isn't blind any more in this one-time rip-roaring mining camp, but the justice of the peace is.

He is "Blind Bob" Gohn, who also operates a tavern and general store here and believes he is the only sightless bartender in the West.

"I never heard of any others," he said, deftly mixing a highball. "I lost my eyes here in the mines back in 1920. I got blasted."

"Blind Bob," a pleasant voiced man of 50, is full of the lore of Montana's most famous gold mining camp.

They took 300 to 500 million dollars out of Adler Gulch here; nobody knows just how much," he said. "And there's still plenty of gold here." Lately however, the gulch probably hasn't produced as much gold as the pockets of visiting tourists.

Virginia City, once boisterous with 10,000 to 20,000 miners, was quietly rotting into just another ghost town of a fabulous past until a wealthy rancher, Charles Sovey, decided to restore its vanished flavor.

Sovey has been gradually rebuilding the town into a show case of the Old West, combing

the area for authentic historical relics.

"Last year we had about 100,000 tourists," said Blind Bob. He is the grandson of George Gohn, who came here a few days after gold was first discovered in 1863. His pioneer grandfather was a member of the original committee of vigilantes who brought law and order into Montana Territory at the end of a rope.

Some fourteen murdering road agents who were hanged by the vigilantes back in 1864 still lie on nearby Cemetery Hill.

"It's much quieter around here now," said Blind Bob. "About all I have to deal with as justice of the peace are fish and game violations and highway traffic cases."

There are only about 315 permanent residents left and Bob can tell them all by their voices and many by the sound of their footsteps.

Land Sales Rise For Home Building  
NEW YORK — (AP) — The new 30-year mortgage for veterans, authorized by the federal housing law of 1950, has started a boom within a boom in home building. By broadening the market through bringing monthly payments down, it has started a rush to buy land for low-cost housing development.

In New York's suburban Long Island area, farmers are getting near fabulous prices for acreage to be divided into building lots. One real estate broker tells of a potato farm that sold for \$500 an acre in 1945 and now has been resold to home builders for \$4,500 an acre.

Cultivated fields fronting on one of the main highways of Long Island's north shore are being offered for commercial sites at \$200 per front foot.

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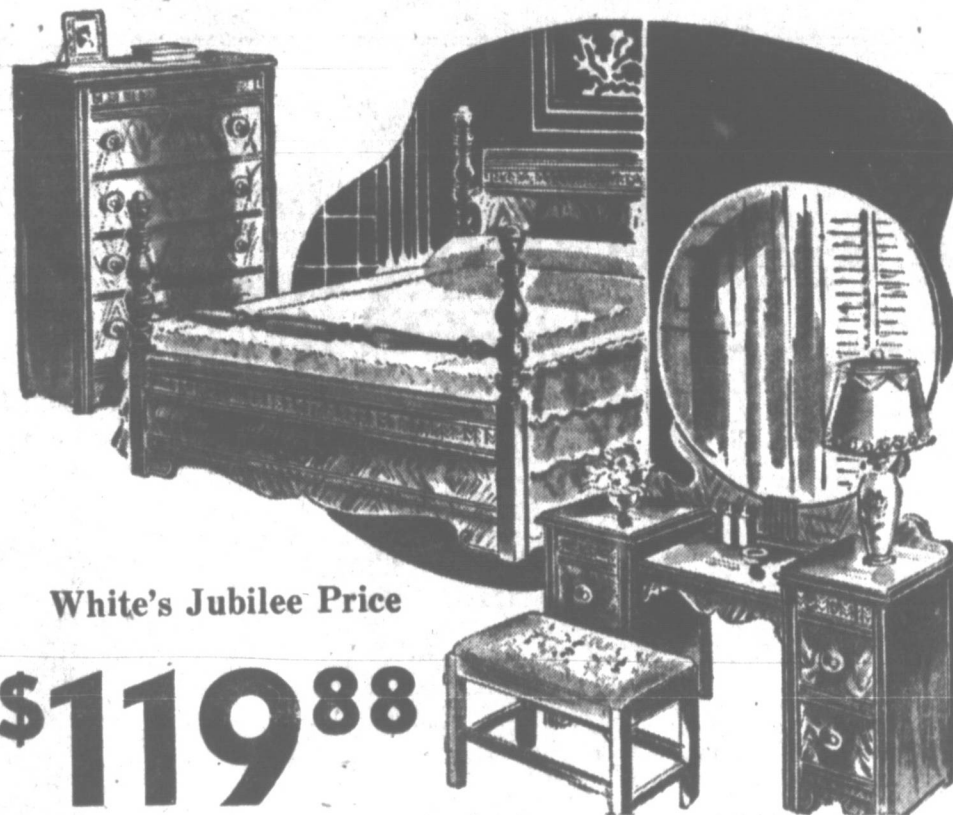
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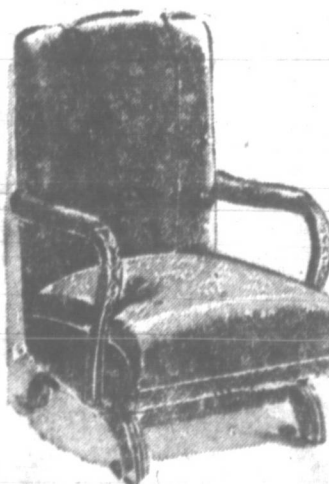

## Texas '49 Cotton Crop Valued at \$923,000,000

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Texas produced 6,949,000 bales of cotton worth \$923,450,000 in 1949, the Agriculture Department said in its final report for that year.

The Lone Star State, as usual, led all other cotton states in production, and grew more than one-third of the nation's total crop of 18,127,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight.

Texas harvested 10,900,000 of 10,988,000 acres planted, with an average crop of 286 pounds per acre. The total value of the crop included both the lint and cottonseed.

## British Believe Cold Cure Found

LONDON — (AP) — A group of British chemists say they have discovered a drug which may cure the common cold overnight. And six researchers who tried the compound said it stopped their sniffles.

Despite personal tests by its developers, the drug — called CP9 — still must be proved clinically before the public gets it. Announcement of the discovery was made in the House of Commons by Conservative member F. J. Erroll, who said the drug "may prove more important than penicillin." The compound was developed during a three-year search for a new cancer treatment. CP9 may possibly be used, said the scientists, in treating such virus diseases as influenza, measles, scarlet fever, smallpox and infantile paralysis.

## Panama Makes Bid For Foreign Funds

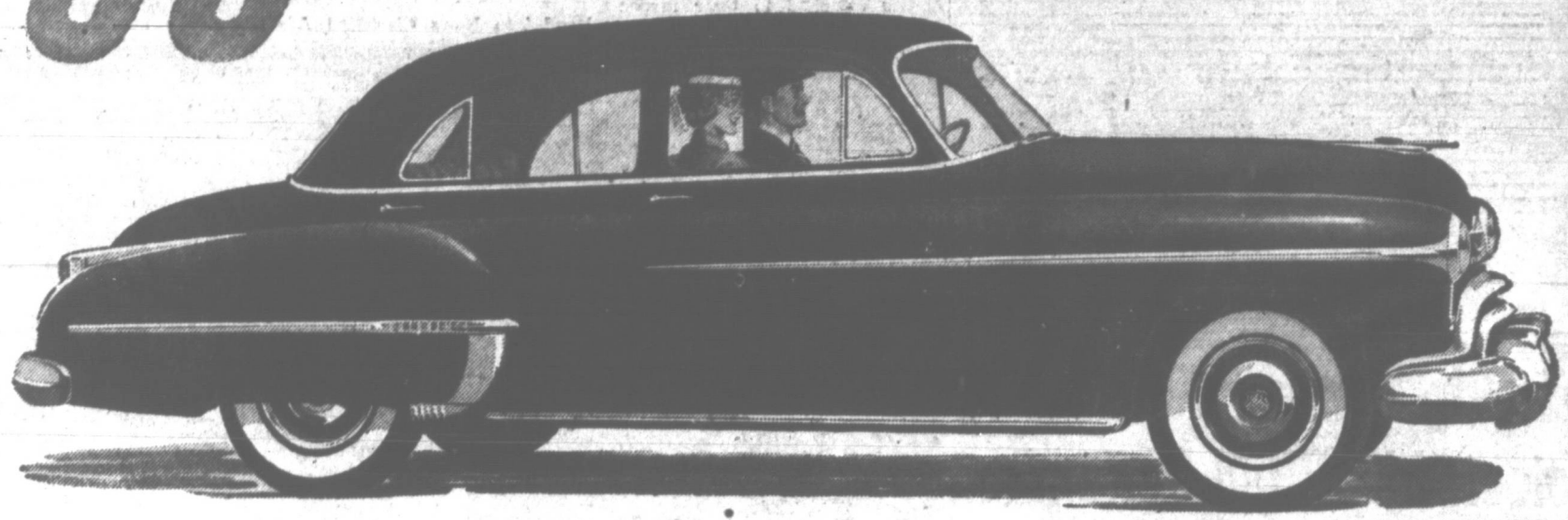
PANAMA CITY, Panama — (AP) — Panama has offered foreign capital a 25-year tax exemption and other concessions on money invested here. An executive decree by President Arnulfo Arias said the exemptions would apply to funds invested previously or in the future.

Such capital, the decree added, would be exempted from import duties on machinery and raw materials and from taxes on income earned outside of Panama.



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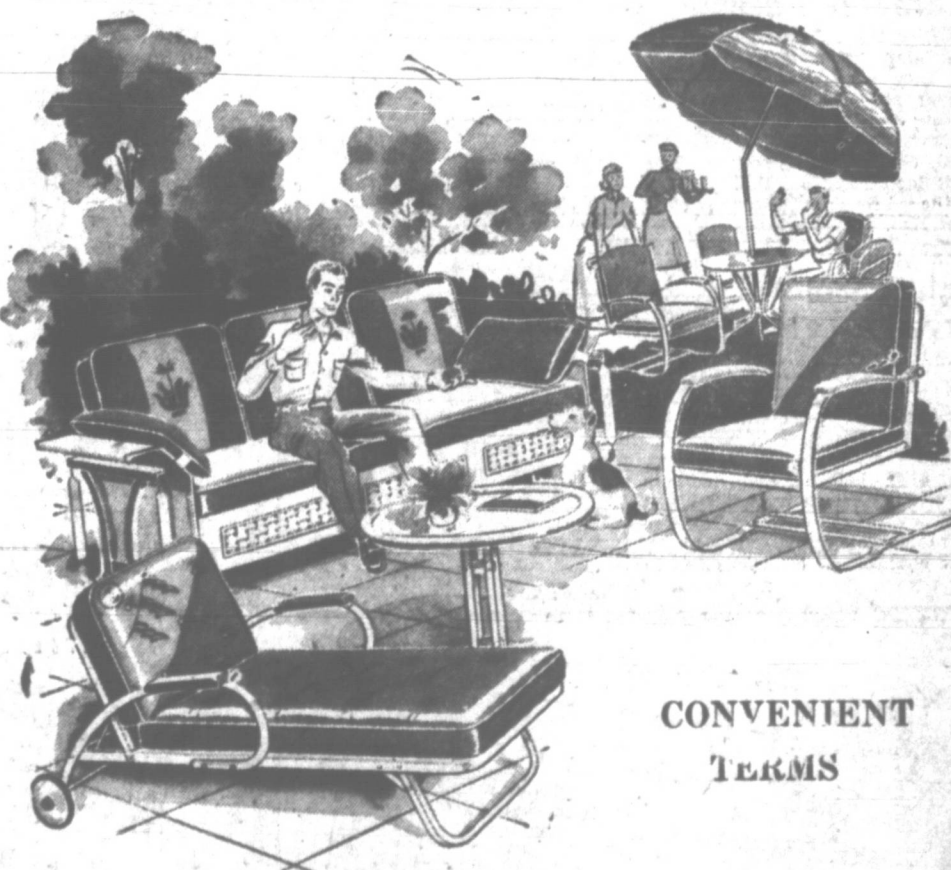

"The eight of hearts was the opening lead, and they took the first two tricks in that suit. Then

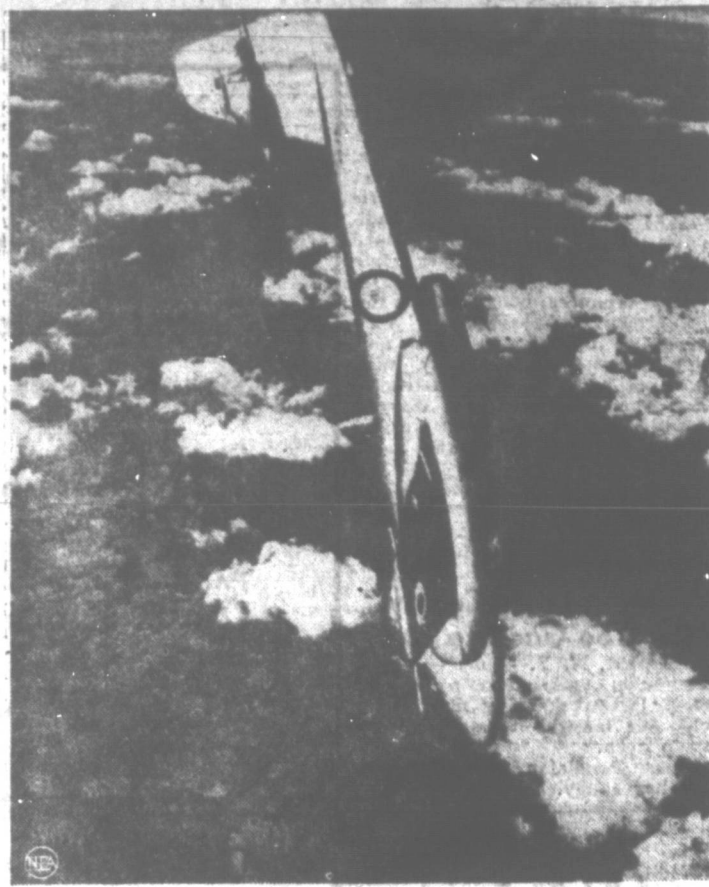
they gave me the third round of hearts.

## Robot Equipment for Jet Interceptor Will Track Down Bomber, Destroy It, Return

By MAX BOYD  
 WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Air Force is equipping late model jet fighters with new automatic devices which will track enemy bombers through night skies or bad weather, shoot them down, then bring the pilot home for a landing.  
 Officials said this whole family of robots is being installed in its new interceptors to meet problems posed by the development of high-speed bombers and atomic weapons.  
 The growing speed of the bombers gives defending fighters less time to climb to meet them, and the enormous destructive power of the A-bomb makes it more important than ever to destroy the bombers before they reach the target.  
 Radar to help fighter pilots find attacking planes at night was incorporated in piston-engine interceptors used during World War II. But the Air Force says these planes do not have the performance needed today while faster turbojet fighters do not yet possess the radar essential to all-weather operations.  
 In the new models, it says, are going provisions for automatic flight, automatic tracking of the enemy, automatic firing, and automatic approach to a landing after the battle.  
 After taking off the pilot will be guarded by a ground radar network to the area where his plane's radar can pick up the enemy. There the automatic devices will take over, putting the interceptor on the correct course to close with the bomber and firing its weapons at the right moment.  
 In case the robots fail, or things happen that they aren't prepared to meet, the pilot will lend a hand. He will have plenty of work to do also in the last stage of the landing approach.  
 In addition to robots, increased armament is going into the new models to increase their chances of destroying bombers once contact is made.  
 Only one type of "interim" jet interceptor developed from an older jet fighter, is now in service in Air Force units. It is the F-94, a modification of the Lockheed F-80 Shooting Star. The Air Force ordered 110 of these planes in 1949, and \$120,000,000 is being spent for more of them this year.  
 The F-94 is equipped with

radar and has an after-burner designed to give it bursts of extra power for quick climbing. The after-burner consists of a device to introduce fuel into the exhaust pipe and ignite it there, thus developing greater thrust.  
 Another "interim" interceptor developed from an older jet fighter, the North American F-86 Sabre, is being built with radar and an after-burner.  
 During the year ending this June 30 the Air Force is spending \$130,900,000 on this plane (called the F-95) an outlay exceeded only by its expenditures for B-36 intercontinental bombers and for 600-mile-an-hour B-47 jet bombers.  
 No F-95s are yet in operational units.  
 The Air Force has only one jet fighter that was designed from the ground up to be an interceptor: the Republic XF-91. The experimental model is undergoing flight tests and no production orders have yet been placed.  
 Presumably, the XF-91 incorporates all the robots that the Air Force says is going into new models. An additional feature is four rocket engines built into the tail. These rocket engines are designed to permit the interceptor to climb swiftly and — if any rocket fuel is left after that — to attain super-jet speeds when needed.  
 A Navy jet fighter designed from the ground up as an all-weather interceptor has already passed its tests. It is the two-place Douglas Skyknight, which has carried its heavy load of electronic equipment past 40,000 feet.

## Auto Makers Still Behind U.S. Demand

 DETROIT — (AP) — The auto industry is in the midst of its biggest production and sales era but it has worries.  
 Right now most carmakers are concerned about the lack of adequate field stocks. Manufacturers of popular makes are reporting production at close to capacity. But the demand is absorbing just about all the cars they can build.  
 Few dealers have more cars than they want; most of them can't get enough. Chrysler dealers probably won't have all the cars they want for months.  
 Chevrolet's recent report that its output topped 8,000 units a day on nine different occasions last month illustrates the industry's production pace right now. The current rate at Chevrolet is the highest in the history of that largest of all car makers.  
 Its passenger car output for the year to date passed the half

million unit point this week. In addition to cars it has built more than 160,000 trucks.  
 On April 1 stocks of unsold new cars in dealers' hands or in transit numbered about 464,000 according to automotive surveys. More recent figures are not yet available, but the sales reports of various volume producers indicate the number has declined further during the last five weeks.  
 The factories will break a lot of production records in the next two months; between now and the end of June they may turn out 1,600,000 cars and trucks. But the merchandising division expects to sell at least that many vehicles during the same period.  
 So, unlike normal times in the industry, dealers generally are not going to have immediate delivery inventories at mid-year.

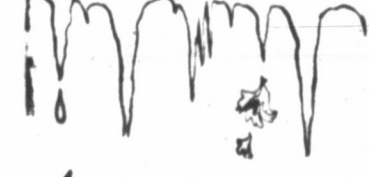

## South Africa Takes Action To Bar Reds

CAPE TOWN, South Africa — South Africa's government has asked Parliament for power to outlaw communism and to question, fine or deport suspected subversives.

A bill introduced by Justice Minister C. R. Swart would per-

mit drastic restrictions on the activities of suspected violators. Practices which would be banned by the bill ranged from profession of communism to propagation of foreign ideologies. "Undesirable" aliens could be deported without a trial.

Under the proposed legislation the Justice Ministry would compile a list of suspected persons. These would be subject to ministry orders.

Outlawed newspaper or organizations would have three months to bring court action against the government's decrees.

## VENEZUELAN MILITARY UNREST IS REPORTED

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — Refugees from Venezuela say the county's armed forces are split by unrest against the ruling military junta and that some 3,000 persons have been arrested.

These reports from exiled members of the former Accion Democratica Party who were ousted by the junta in 1948, coincided with official reports from Caracas, capital of Venezuela, of an unsuccessful armed attack on the government's air base at Maracay, 125 miles west of the government seat.

The Venezuelan army commu-

nicque said one attacker was killed and 34 were wounded in an attempt to sabotage planes and flying equipment on the field. Two government men were reported wounded. Reliable sources identified the leader of the attack as a former official in the old Accion Democratica regime.

The communique made no mention of a small U. S. army mission which is maintained at the Maracay base.

The Venezuelan refugees here said those in prison included hundreds of army officers and men, eight Caracas society women including former members of Congress, and newspapermen.

Three lieutenant colonels have been governing Venezuela by decree since they wrested the government from the leftist Accion Democratica regime of President Romulo Gallegos. Gallegos is reported to be in exile in Cuba.

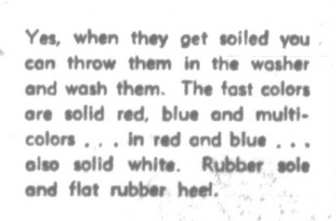

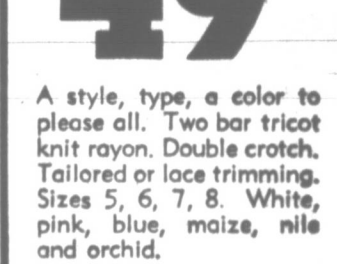

## Oklahoma City Traffic Plan Selected National Winner

CHICAGO — (AP) — Top honors in the National Safety Council's 1949 traffic safety contest are shared by Oklahoma City, Lansing, Mich., and the State of Connecticut.

The Safety Council announced that Oklahoma City and Lansing tied for the grand award among cities, and Connecticut led the 48 states in traffic accident prevention during 1949.

Coincident with the announcement of the awards, Thomas H. MacDonald, chairman of the judges, said the nation's traffic toll was the lowest since the war (31,500) although automobile travel hit an all-time peak.

Seven other states and 24 other cities won divisional honors in the contest, and 594 municipalities with populations between 5,000 and 10,000 were cited in the honor roll section for their record of no traffic fatalities last year.

## Millers Believe Cake-Baking Gaining Favor

NEW YORK — (AP) — In Ottumwa, Iowa, they're baking cake. It's a birthday cake for president Truman who will be there Monday, when he's 66. It's a chocolate cake, because that's his favorite.

In homes throughout the land, they're baking cakes, too. And the milling industry believes there may be twice as much home cake baking now as before the war. They claim this in spite of an admitted per capita decline in the consumption of flour and cereal products in general as America's diet has changed over the last 50 years.

Millers don't pretend to know the exact number of cakes baked at home, but they have ways of guessing at it. One is the rising sales curve of pre-mixed and special cake flour. This has coincided with the growing percentage of working wives.

And in recent months there has been another factor. Some bakeries are complaining about business being slow, and the National Restaurant Association reports that evening dining out is declining. People apparently are eating at home more and buying a little less at the bakeries.

Meanwhile, sales of all-purpose flour are down from their post-war peak. The Bureau of Census gives the 1949 output of flour as 233.7 billion pounds, compared with 279 billion in 1948 and 305.1 billion in 1947. The drop in domestic usage was only one percent — the big drop came as the export market shriveled.

The milling industry took it on the chin for a while, but most trade sources believe it is back in healthy balance now, although at the lower level.

## Gallant Policeman Unjustly Rewarded

CHICAGO — (AP) — A gallant police lieutenant helped an elderly woman walk down a wet stairway and then fell down, suffering a sprained back.

L. Thomas McCann, 52, stopped his squad car when he saw the woman hesitate about walking down the wet stairway at a Southside Illinois Central Railroad Station. With McCann's aid, the unidentified woman reached the sidewalk safely.

McCann slipped on the bottom step and fell backward. He was taken to a doctor's office in the squad car and treated for a sprained back.

## Judge Scolds Clubwomen

The women protested Judge McKay's decision in depriving Mrs. Florence H. Walton of the custody of her three sons and awarding a divorce to her husband, Dely T. Walton, a lawyer. Testimony disclosed that detectives found Mrs. Walton nude in a

bedroom, with Tom Keene, 52, former screen actor, in an adjoining bathroom.

Judge McKay vacated his original decision, expunged all the records and a new trial was set for July 10 on the basis of new evidence submitted to the court by Mrs. Walton.

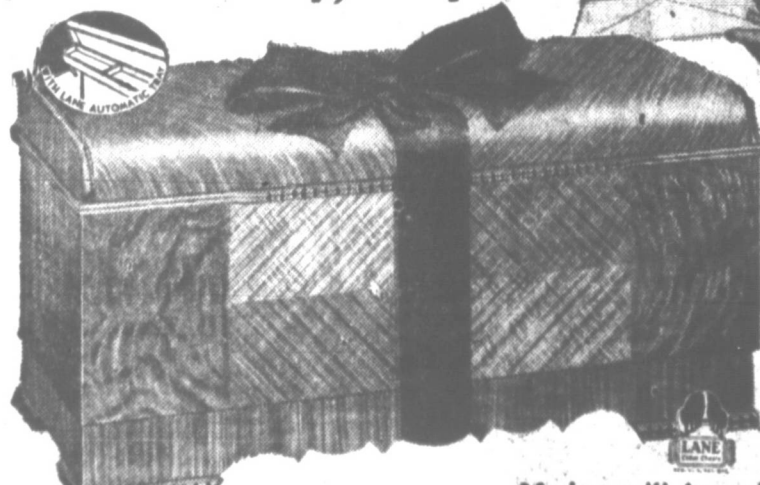

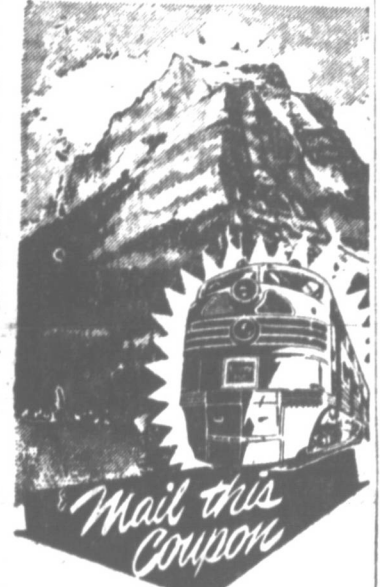
### Methodist Men At Lefors Meet

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# One of Seven Natural Wonders of World, Famed Natural Bridge Is Pride of Virginia

**NATURAL BRIDGE** Va. — Perhaps the most famous patch of sky in the world exists over Rockbridge County, Virginia, a long U. S. High 11, says the Virginia Travel Council.

Though seen by hundreds of thousands annually, this sky view is rarely observed for itself, however, for it is framed by one of the seven natural wonders of the world, famed Natural Bridge. From the moment the visitor stops at the luxurious Natural Bridge Hotel, the newly completed motor lodge, or at the Gate House, there is a tingle of anticipation. And that feeling increases after passing through the Gate House and walking down the dogwood-lined path beside a chuckling stream and past gnarled, twisted arbor vitae trees estimated to have been growing a thousand years before the discovery of America.

But no matter how great the anticipation, it is exceeded by the sweeping emotion that accompanies the first glimpse of the towering bridge. Though painted, photographed and written about many times, Natural Bridge can only be done justice by actually seeing it. Except for the ceaseless chatter of Cedar Creek which flows under the massive stone arch, a hush of incredulity falls on the groups of visitors when first viewing this handwork of God and nature.

Once owned by Thomas Jefferson, who paid 20 shillings, or less than five dollars, for a 157 acre plot which surrounds this wonder, Natural Bridge is a true

American landmark. George Washington surveyed it, leaving his still legible initials on the limestone sides of the arch as well as on a recently unearthed stone which also bears his bench mark. Many other famous Americans have visited Natural Bridge from time to time, coming away with words of highest praise.

Legend says Natural Bridge was discovered by Indians, who found it in answer to their prayers for an escape route over the sheer walls of the canyon which it spans. Indian women and children were supposed to have tested the strength of the bridge first by crossing before the non-expendable Indian braves would try, which is in humorous contrast to the present day stream of enormous trucks as well as passenger cars which travel across the bridge on the highway it supports. This massive structure is estimated to weigh over 36,000 tons, is over forty feet thick, 215 feet high, some 55 feet higher than Niagara Falls, and averages over 80 feet wide.

Natural Bridge is open the year around and may be seen at night as well as by day. At night it is spectacularly lighted by concealed beacons while a recorded voice intones the seven days of creation from the Bible, accompanied by choral and organ music of some of the world's finest compositions.

Here also is found one of the shortest, yet one of the most welcome bus lines in America. Shutting to and fro from the Gate House to the Bridge, stubby, lit-

tle busses transport the old, invalids and the weary along a short winding road, paralleling the beautiful walkway along a cascading mountain stream.

Through the giant stone arch and back along a path that parallels Cedar Creek, the visitor will see Salt Peter Cave, the mysterious Lost-River whose source and destination has never been found, and finally beautiful Lace Falls formed where the creek flows into the gorge.

In the immediate area of the wonder is the large, modern Natural Bridge Hotel, the newly constructed Natural Bridge Motor Lodge, the Gate House which serves food and displays souvenirs, a post office and a few other buildings. Just completed is a large auditorium and convention hall where dances, meetings, and parties are held during the year. Each year thousands of tourists stay for days and weeks at Natural Bridge as it is conveniently located for visiting other natural and historic attractions which are found in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley.

## Other People's Trips Aid Unusual Hobby

### U.S.-Mexico Water Rights Pact Asked

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A Florida legislator has urged in a letter to Secretary of State Acheson an early settlement with Mexico over territorial water rights "since extreme hardships are being endured by fishermen of both countries."

Senator Holland (D-Fla.) made public his letter to Acheson. His action was prompted by recent seizure of five United States shrimp boats by the Mexican government.

He said that these boats were held at Tampico, Mexico, for over a week and released only on payment, under protest, of a large fine.

"I understand," he added, "that similar incidents have occurred over the past several years and certainly this sort of thing should not be allowed to continue indefinitely."

Holland asked Acheson for a full report on the negotiations and to be kept advised of all developments.

### Golf Museum Unusual Kind Of 19th Hole

MORRISON, Va. — There's a nineteenth hole in almost every golf club but the James River Golf & Country Club here boasts of a twentieth one, the most extensive golf museum in the nation, which is open everyday in the year to any visitor who wants to see it. Relics and other treasures of the game have been assembled from the far corners of the earth, through the beneficence of Archer M. Huntington, founder of many museums. The Huntington Golf Museum is said to house the most extensive collection in the world.

A library of more than 450 volumes, some of them dating back to the 14th Century, includes not only an exhaustive collection of modern golf classics including the first known printed reference to the game, from Edinburgh, Scotland, dated 1566. It is called "The Book of The Black Arts."

The earliest club in the museum is a putter by Simon Cossair, of Leigh, Scotland. It is in the collection of the Royal and Ancient Club of St. Andrews. The oldest wooden club is a Simon Cossair long spoon, dated 1764 to 1765.

There are also five excellent examples of the famous Hugh Phillips clubs. Phillips was the first clubmaker of the Royal and Ancient Club of St. Andrews. Another of the early clubmakers, whose work is represented in the museum's collection, was the McEwan family, dating back to 1770.

A. G. Spalding Brothers donated the golf bag and complete set of seven clubs used by Harry Vardon when he won the U. S. 1900 Open championship.

A scale model of the original St. Andrews course also is on display.

The first known American golf club of which the museum has any knowledge was the South Carolina Golf Club, organized in 1786. The next earliest known club was the Savannah, Ga., Golf Club.

Results for the first three months of 1950 showed net income equal to \$4.76 a common share.

Other new marks attained included: net sales \$1,642,659,449; unit sales 865,756 passenger cars and trucks, payrolls \$404,000,000 and United States and foreign income taxes \$148,971,000.

The corporation's more than 433,000 stockholders were informed by C. E. Wilson, president, and Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., chairman, that operations now are at the capacity of GM's new and improved postwar facilities.

The officials cautioned that these "cannot be expected to continue indefinitely at the current peak rate." They pointed out that deferred demand built up during the war still is a factor in sales.

Wilson and Sloan noted also that because an important portion of costs is fixed, "in periods of good business, like the present, profits rise more sharply than sales; in years of declining business profits fall faster."

The first 1950 quarter's net income compared with \$136,763,338 or \$3.04 a common share in the similar period a year ago.

The shipment of 865,756 units produced by GM plants in the U. S. and Canada during the first quarter topped the previous record of 815,374 set in the third quarter of 1949. It exceeded by 54 percent shipments of 560,842 units in the first three months a year ago.

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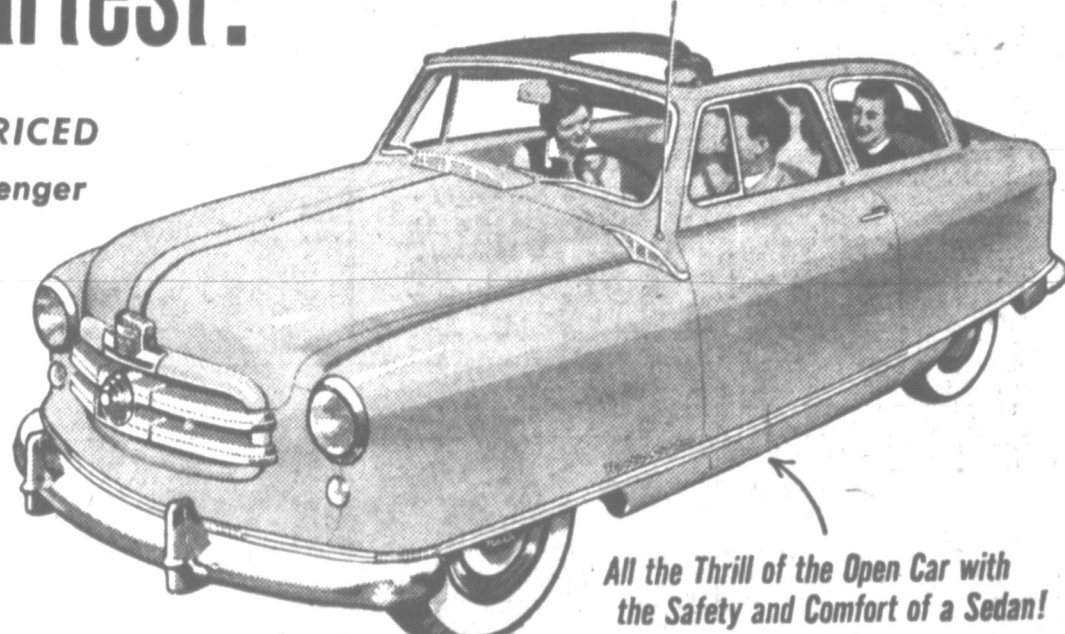

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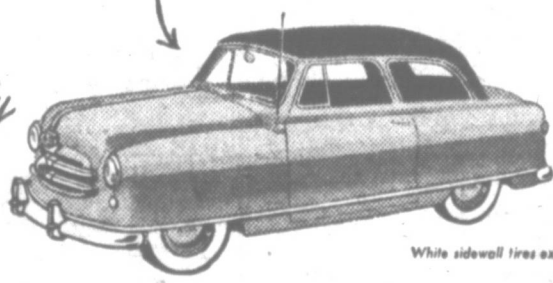

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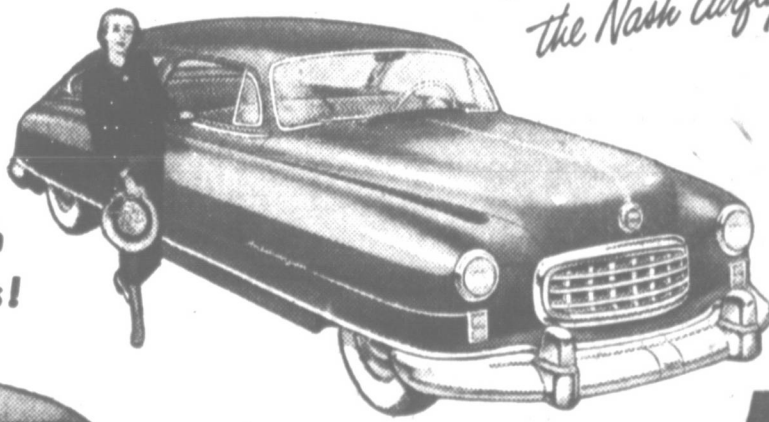
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## Once-Mighty Persian Army Being Trained by U.S. Men

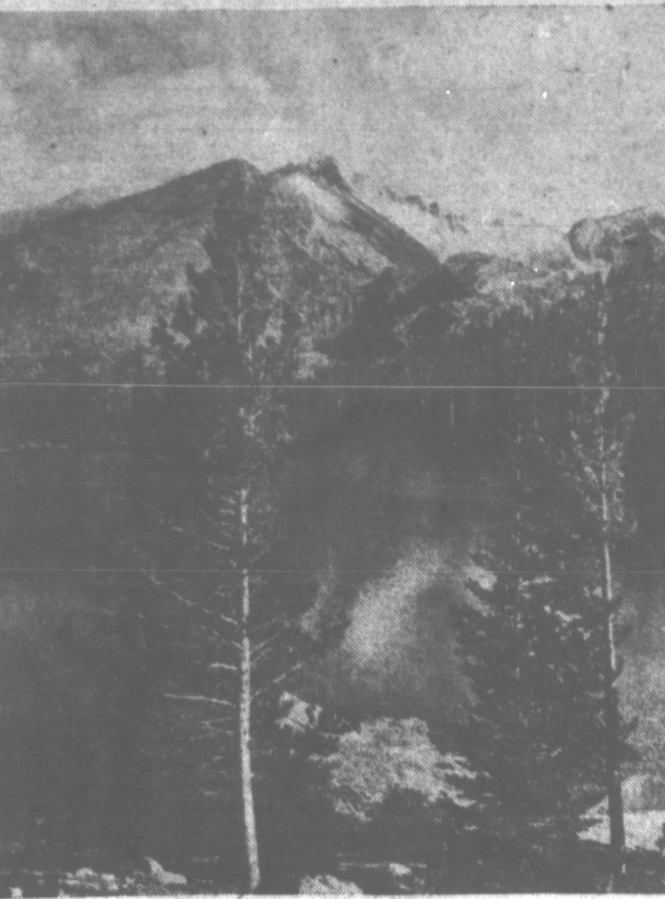

 TEHRAN, Iran — (AP)—A 77-man U. S. Mission is teaching the lessons of modern war to what was once the mightiest army on earth.  
 Five centuries before Christ, the Persian legions of Darius I ruled from India to the Danube — a domain even mighty Rome near equalled.  
 Darius' son, Xerxes, sent 800,000 men in a single campaign against Greece. Defeated, the Persian army went into a long decline.  
 Today Iran — the modern Persia — sits on a hot spot in the cold war. On her northern border is the Soviet Union, openly covetous of Iran's rich oil fields.  
 For defense Iran has an army of 150,000. Strategists concede it could not long delay the Red Army in frontal battle. But Field Marshal Ali Rastavara, shrewd and capable chief of staff, believes

Iran could make a long fight from strong points in natural defense positions with cooperation between the army and Iran's 3,000,000 tough nomadic and semi-nomadic tribesmen.  
 To learn the lessons of World War II, Iran in 1947 invited a U. S. military mission here to furnish advice.  
 Maj. Gen. Vernon Evans, one-time commander of the Indian Burma theatre, leads the mission.

## Florida Sees Big Season For Tourists

MIAMI, Fla. — Miami is on the verge of its greatest summer season. A survey by the City of Miami News Bureau points up that conclusion.  
 Railroads, air lines, hotels and travel agencies all tell the same story — more interest, more inquiries and more reservations by persons seeking economy summer vacations in the only tropical area in continental United States.  
 "Summer visitors of previous years," says Holte Arey, city publicity director, "are convincing their friends that this area's climate is as pleasant in summer as in winter."  
 Miami averages only six days a year in which the temperature reaches 90 degrees.  
 By comparison, Houston has 80 days of 90-degree or more temperatures, with a maximum of 108 degrees, according to the United States Weather Bureau offices in Washington.  
 According to Dr. E. D. Hockenberry, city physician, there has been not one reported case of heat prostration in Miami's history.  
 Surrounding water and the cooling trade winds, it is explained, act as a giant air-conditioning plant for this vacation resort.  
 Inquiries on hotel rates are reported as 60 percent higher than this time last year. Summer vacationers are able to effect a savings of a minimum of 50 percent and as much as 90 percent on hotel bills in summer.  
 Indications are that more than 475 of the 550 hotels in the area will remain open.  
 Last year \$1,826,000 was spent by air lines, railroads, hotels and municipalities to advertise and promote Miami's advantages as a summer resort. Budgets for the coming season now being completed will be higher.  
 The City of Miami will spend \$178,000, an increase over last year, on summer advertising and promotions, more than 50 percent of it to induce Latin Americans to visit here.  
 For the first time since World War II, a railroad has entered into a program to compete with air lines on excursion rates. Seaboard Air Line Railroad has started reductions of about 25 percent between Washington and Miami on round-trip tourist fares, and 40 percent savings on coach fares for groups of 15 or more.  
 Once more Eastern and National Airlines are featuring family fares, coach flights and reductions on round trips. In addition, Delta Air Line resumes its packaged week's vacation in Miami, with a sharp cut in rates.  
 Round-trip air transportation, a stay at any hotel, breakfasts daily, boat and bus sight-seeing trips and a night club visit all of which formerly cost \$184.70 now is offered at \$142.75.  
 It is predicted that vacation travel to and from good neighbor countries by way of Miami will reach its highest peak in history. Aerovias Brasil looks forward to doubling its traffic with Miami. Sailings of the SS. Florida between Miami and Havana will be increased from two to three per week during June, July and August.  
 Currency devaluations, new hotels, the international exposition in Haiti and low excursion rates are expected to send a record number of North Americans flying southward.  
 A better dollar situation in Brazil and some other countries, it is forecast, will influence more

Within a short driving distance of Abingdon are the beautiful mountains of the Jefferson National Forest which range over 5,000 feet above sea level. White Top Mountain, Virginia's Hungry Mother State Park, Backbone Rock, the Saltville salt water swimming pool, Blowing Rock, The TVA Holston dam, Bristol Caverns, and Natural Tunnel.

## Great Marks Where Americans Fought May Be Seen in Virginia

Five miles of well-preserved Confederate earthworks found in Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania County National Military Park at Fredericksburg, Virginia, establish graphic and tangible contact with a turbulent era in American history. These trench-like formations, zig-zagging across fields, are the original remains of what are among the first examples of modern field fortifications, says the Virginia Travel Council.

now about half filled, these earthworks still provide a detailed account of the formidable defensive battle that was fought here by Southern troops to stop the advance of the Northern army towards Richmond. The guide will point out the location of Marye's Heights, which looks down into the city of Fredericksburg and near which ran a famous stone wall that furnished a ready-made breastwork. Both locations were used so effectively by the Confederate soldiers that the Northern commander withdrew to winter quarters.

During the attempted storming of the stonewall, Richard Kirkland, a 19-year-old South Carolinian, braved a hail of musket fire many times to carry water to the enemy wounded who were falling in great numbers. His heroic act of mercy earned him the nickname of the "Angel of Marye's Heights."

Still standing are some of the old buildings and homes which played a vital part serving as first aid stations in this battle.

In nearby Fredericksburg, on old U. S. Highway 1, is the headquarters and Museum Building of this National Park containing an outstanding diorama of war-torn Fredericksburg. Civil War photographs, a fine gun collection, maps, models, relic and other representative articles. Information regarding all the local battlefields, of which Fredericksburg is one, is also available.

Seven miles west along Virginia Highway 3 stands a monument to General Stonewall Jackson, commemorating the mortal wounding of the Confederate soldier during the battle of Chancellorsville. Actually, Jackson being mistaken for the enemy, was shot by his own men at night and died eight days later in a little cottage still standing at Guinea Station, 18 miles south of Fredericksburg. The cottage is open to the public and houses many relics among which is the bed

on which Jackson died. Continuing west from Chancellorsville a few miles, the visitor will come to a scrubby, tangled timberland still in the same cultural state today as it was when Grant first met Lee at this point in the Battle of the Wilderness. It was here that Lee, in person, started to lead a charge on the Orange Plank Road, resulting in what is often referred to now as the "Lee to the Sea" incident as the men refused to go forward until their commander retired to a safer position.

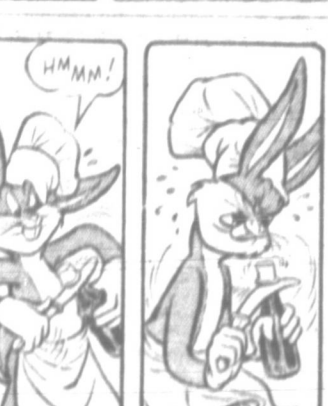

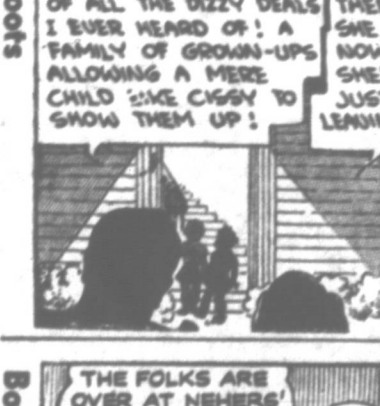

### Water Storage Gain Recorded After Rains

**AUSTIN** — (AP) — April rains brought water storage gains to some Texas reservoirs while drought left its mark on others. The State Board of Water Engineers reported that the general rains over most of the state relieved the drought considerably but were not extensive enough for statewide relief.

The Pecos area was left threatening. Storage in the Red River Bluff reservoir dropped 24,600 acre-feet during the month. General rains in Central Texas were of such a nature as to bring little flood runoff. The Guadalupe River at New Braunfels flowed at only 35 percent of April median. Comal Springs there showed the lowest April flow in 20 years. Medina Reservoir at San Antonio dropped 2,000 acre-feet during the month. The Bridgeport reservoir showed the largest gain recorded for the three reservoirs on headwaters of the Trinity tributaries. Bridgeport's gain was 25,000 acre-feet. Lake Dallas gained 7,000 acre-feet with more being recorded from new rains beginning at the end of the month. Buchanan Reservoir on the Colorado gained 10,000 acre-feet while Lake Travis downstream picked up 18,000.

## New Human Relations Group Is Given Initial Assignment

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas now has an official Human Relations Council.

Its first assignment is to foster good feeling between English-speaking and Spanish-speaking Texans.

It is intended to supplement and not duplicate or displace the Good Neighbor Commission, the governor's memorandum establishing the council said. Its work will be closely co-ordinated with the statutory commission.

The council will operate in fields where the Good Neighbor Commission is "somewhat circumscribed," the governor said. "State agencies carry out policies, rather than recommend them," his statement added. "The council's principal assignment will be to recommend policies and programs."

Chairman Neville Penrose of the Good Neighbor Commission was named as one member of the council. Another member is R. E. (Bob) Smith of Houston, who was once Good Neighbor Commission chairman; Dr. Umpirey Lee, president of Southern Methodist University; Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor University; Dr. George I. Sanchez of
