Drastic Change Underway in Europe Policy

WASHINGTON—(AP)—United States policies toward Europe are undergoing a drastic change of direction. The new policy line calls for deeper and more permanent involvement of this country in European affairs.

That is the central fact which stands out of Secretary Acheson's reports and actions here last week following his return from the cold war strategy talks with western foreign ministers at London.

It is also the fact which seems likely here on to be a major influence in the shaping of foreign policy debates in Congress and the country at large.

Two steps of the utmost importance are now snapping up for action by the administration and almost certainly for eventual debate in Congress.

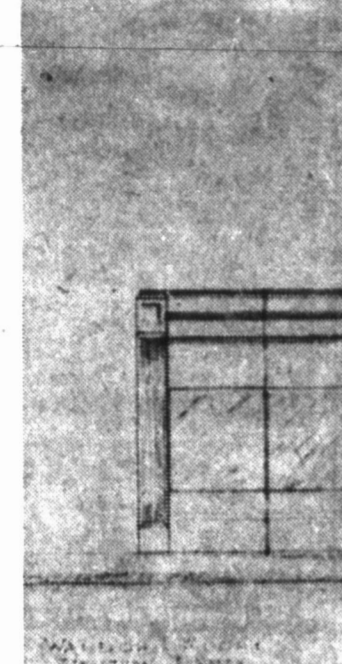
1. The U.S. government is preparing to take the lead in pooling the armed forces of the West into what Secretary Acheson has now called "balanced collective forces."

President, Acheson Accused of Telling Conflicting Stories

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator Wherry (R-Iowa) yesterday accused President Truman, and Secretary of State Acheson of conflicting statements which confuse people about the dangers of war.

Wherry, the Republican floor leader, told reporters that a statement by the president Thursday that the world is nearer peace than it has been anytime in the last five years doesn't square with a statement of Acheson that more, not less, money will be needed in the future to ward off western Europe against Communist threats.

The president and the secretary of state ought to get together on their statements, Wherry said. "Who are we going to listen to, the president or Acheson?"

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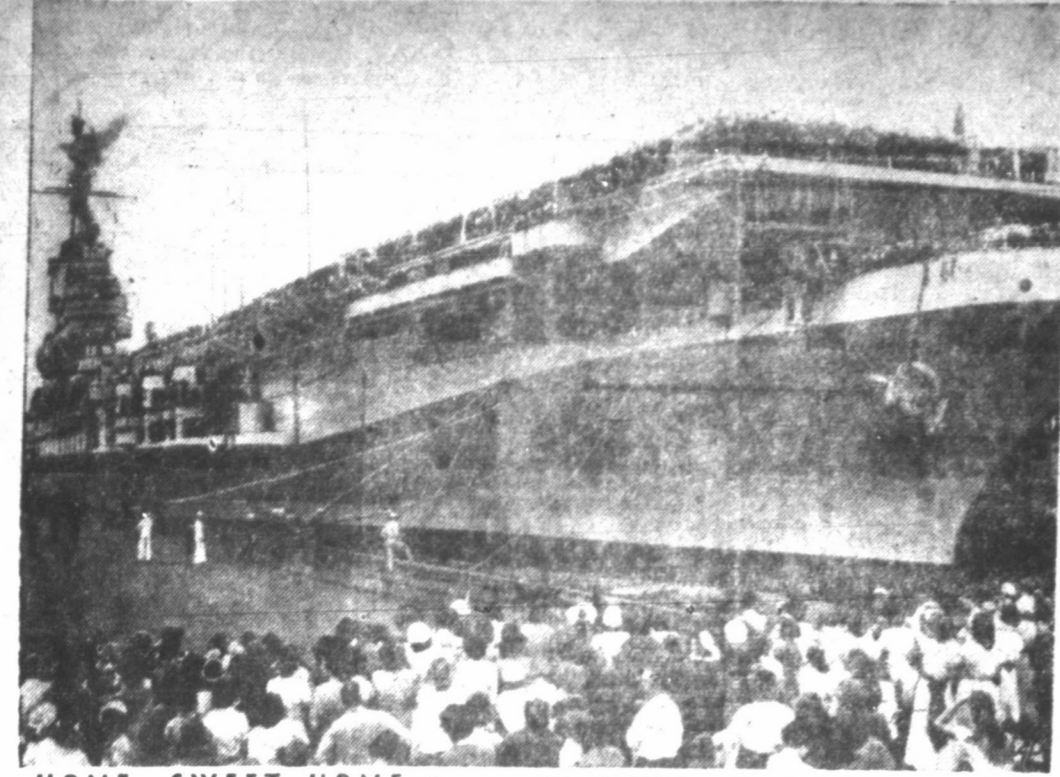

A little noticed section of Acheson's report to Congress Monday discloses that the government is planning a sweeping change in its economic relationships with Western Europe. It is hoping to accomplish this in such a manner that it can maintain close economic cooperation even with the so-called "neutral" countries like Switzerland and Sweden. Acheson said the United States intends to establish, by invitation, a new relationship with the 18-member Organization for European Economic Cooperation in Paris. Yesterday the council of the OEEC, exactly as Acheson had predicted, voted to ask the United States and Canada to establish this new association. There are a number of nations in the OEEC—not only the "neutrals" but also the remote cold war allies like Greece and Turkey—with which the United States feels it must maintain close coordination after the Marshall Plan ends in 1952. By working through the OEEC the United States can help develop a common line of cooperation designed to increase trade and prosperity throughout the Mediterranean, Western European and Northern European areas. Officials said the U.S. could not accomplish this through the Atlantic Council alone. Nor could it hope to do so, they said, if the OEEC was permitted to disintegrate after the Marshall Plan ended and the United States discarded the close contacts with the non-Communist nations of Europe which the Marshall Plan has generated. There is a third field of deep commitments on the part of the United States in which the OEEC has already been agreed on but the consequences of which are not yet entirely clear. That is the field of expansion of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The treaty began largely as an American guarantee to Western Europe against Russian aggression and as a basis for arms aid to Europe.

If you were to buy all new material for your racing car, you soon would find yourself over the cost limit. Look around and use a little ingenuity. You are bound to find plenty for less. If you shop around your neighborhood. Remember, too, that wheels and axles and the various parts of the steering system do not count in the 66 cost limit. You need not include freight, express or postage charges on parts sent to you, or taxes.

(Continued from Page 1) the small taro-patch communities still may be trapped. The taro root is widely raised for food. Mauna Loa broke loose Thursday night, blowing three major vents in its southwest flank high up its slope. There is no eruption from the crater. Geysers of lava still spouted from the vents. A fourth big flow that had threatened other ranches and plantations solidified. Eye witnesses said lava here was piled 24 feet high and was about a quarter of a mile wide. The main streams stretched for 2 1/2 miles or more to the sea and are as much as a mile wide. The lava covers hundreds of acres of fertile Kona coast. Mauna Loa last erupted on Jan. 7, 1949. But that was a mild one compared to the present upheaval. Volcanologist Ruy Finch said the eruption was the most violent on record for the amount of lava hurled out in the first 12 hours.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE "Hard Luck Joe" Fails to Try Finesses in Diamonds

"Why don't you take off those rose-colored glasses?" demanded Hard Luck Joe. "You hid that hand as though you really had something."
"You're right," North admitted sadly. "I should have remembered that you'd maneuver the hand like a dummy's foot. I always ought to bid a trick or two less than a hand is worth when you have to play it."
North was right in his analysis. He should have made the contract.
At the play actually went, of Joe's method of playing the

dummy, discarded a diamond on dummy's extra top spade, and finessed the jack of diamonds. West won with the king of diamonds, cashed his high trump, and used a club for a safe exit.

Have you seen Joe's mistake? Or would you also be guilty of bungling a hand that could have been made. Decide for yourself, before reading on, how you would play it.
It was quite all right for Joe to ruff the second round of clubs and lay down three top trumps. But it was not all right for him to play the spades and diamonds as he did.
A single diamond discard obviously does South no good. The right play is to overtake the king of spades with dummy's ace in order to take the first diamond finesse. West would win the king of diamonds, cash his high trump, and get out with a club. Now, however, South would lead his low spade to dummy's queen and lead the nine of diamonds for a second finesse. This would succeed, and South would easily make the rest.
The important point is that declarer needed two finesses in diamonds far more than he needed a single diamond discard.

Bus Smashes House; 6 Hurt

CHICAGO — (AP) — A Chicago Transit Authority bus early yesterday smashed into a frame house, plowed into a bedroom and injured a youth who was asleep. Five other persons, including three passengers on the bus, also were injured.
The bus, eastbound on 74th Street, went out of control after it collided with a taxicab at Loomis Street and rammed into Dominic Quinn's one and a half story house.
Police charged the bus driver, Chester Jones, 38, with driving through a traffic signal.
Quinn's son, Robert, 19, was thrown from his bed by the crash. He suffered cuts on his arms and legs.

Volcanic Eruptions Still Puzzling to U.S. Scientists

PASADENA, Calif. — (AP) — When you read about Mauna Loa volcano erupting in Hawaii, do you wonder what makes a volcano erupt?
Well, you're in good company. It puzzles scientists, too, says Dr. Harry O. Wood, 71, retired seismologist of the California Institute of Technology, who spent five years in Hawaii studying earthquakes and volcanic eruptions prior to 1920.
Mauna Loa is 13,680 feet high but it is not truly cone-shaped.

Its broad flanks slope gently and the summit crater is three miles across in one direction and nearly two miles in the other.
There are other volcanoes in the world that are more like true cones and sometimes their peaks blow apart in a tremendous blast, compared with the slower, less violent eruption well down the slope of Mauna Loa.
Dr. Wood said there are two kinds of activity at Mauna Loa: summit crater eruptions nearly always confined to the summit without flowing down the sides, and eruptions like the present one breaking out in the fissure belt on the slopes and sending a river of lava downward perhaps to the sea.
The last previous "flank" or slope flow was in 1942 and went far enough down the northeast slope to alarm residents of Hilo, some 40 miles from the summit. There was summit activity 18 months ago.
There have been "millions" of flows or eruptions through the centuries, he said, but in modern historical times they have occurred once in eight to 10 years. There appears to be some connection, but not too definite, Dr. Wood said, between earthquakes and volcanic eruptions. There was no appreciable earthquake activity with Mauna Loa's summit eruption 18 months ago, he said, but there was a moderate earthquake recorded last Monday preceding this slope eruption. The same pattern occurred in 1914 and 1916.

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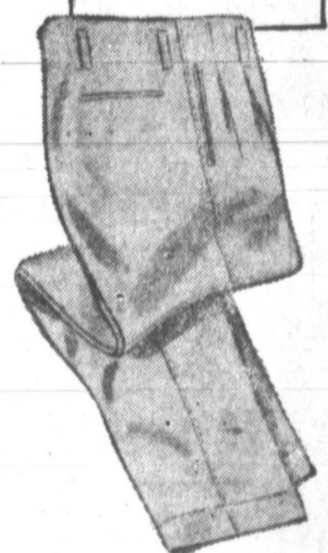

Old-Fashioned Magic Lantern Is Used as Criminal Detector

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — The old-fashioned magic lantern has been converted into a sharp-eyed criminal detector which, although not yet on the market, has won its first case in court.

Called the "identiscat," the device actually is a mechanical portrait painter and can "paint" a picture of a face from a verbal description with amazing speed and accuracy.

Its inventor, Lieut. Hugh McDonald of the Los Angeles County sheriff's office, believes it will be a major aid in tracing criminals.

It did all right in tracking down Charles Hubler, 29, convicted Friday of kidnaping, assault with intent to murder, and robbery.

A pretty secretary, Marilyn Danson, 23, was accosted on a dark street in nearby South Gate March 4, dragged into a vacant lot by a man and shot in the head.

In the first test of the identiscat, Miss Danson watched while several front view outlines of heads were flashed on a small screen. She selected one resembling that of her assailant.

Then, while the head outline remained on the screen, types of haircuts were superimposed over the scalp-line. Next came the ears — there are 20 variations of them. Then eyebrows, eyes, noses, mouths and chin lines were added.

In each case Miss Danson chose the feature resembling that of her attacker. When she had finished she asked that the nose be moved up a bit and one eye moved down slightly.

"That's him," she said.

Delightfully New Cooking Method Slightly Sickening

REDONDO BEACH, Calif. — (AP) — Mrs. Thelma Haith, 43, fixed the veal cutlets in a tastefully different way.

She, husband James, 58, and son Bobby, 16, all remarked at supper how good they tasted.

A few hours later, all became violently sick.

Moscow Wheat Trade Offer Arouses Suspicion in West

By SIGRID ARNE AP Foreign Analyst (For DEWITT MACKENZIE) All the post-war years the Western European nations have worried over some means to re-create their old trade with Middle Europe. Russia wrote the sort of post-war trade treaties with its satellites in Middle Europe that siphoned off large portions of their goods for Russia. There was little or nothing left for the West. This raised important hothouse in Europe had always supplied much food and raw materials for the factories and workers of Western Europe. Now, for no announced reason, Moscow is willing to consider shipping Russian grains to Western Europe again — in return for commodities as yet unnamed. The offer scarcely raises a cheer among Washington trade experts. There are several conjectures about Russian motives. This shift in Russian trade strategy arose after the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (ECE), headed by Gunnar Myrdal of Sweden, put out a feeler last November on possible greater trade between non-Communist and Communist halves of Europe. Moscow has just replied that the feeler is "favorably received" insofar as a possible grain swap might be concluded. Between the issuance of the ECE feeler last November, and the favorable Moscow reply, Myrdal made a visit to Moscow. Now, on the surface, it appears that Moscow is moved to shove the iron curtain aside a little. But government wheat experts here point out there is a much reduced need now for Russian or Middle European grain, much as it was needed in the grueling years of 1946 and 1947. Europe's basic needs on wheat are cared for. It's possible, however, that Russia might offer coarse grains and that Europe might need them enough to get a new East-West trade channel open. And of course it is possible

that the Russians may try to undersell the world market so that the international wheat agreement would be strained. The gloomier of the trade prophets in Washington have always said that it was in Russia's pattern of aggression eventually to use surpluses to break world prices. What could have motivated the Russian move? No one in the U.S. Commerce or Agriculture departments in Washington, or at Marshall Plan headquarters, believes that the move is based on normal trade thinking as the West knows it. Many guesses are that the Russians have had more trouble than they foresaw either in manufacturing or buying the kind of machinery they want. U.S. trade experts say the Russians have never bid for consumer's goods for the people or for machines to turn them out. Rather they want the sort of heavy machinery that could be turned to war use. This they are not likely to get, even on this new bid to reopen old trade channels. The United States has a long secret list of articles that may not be sold to the Soviets or the satellites, things that might be used to make war goods. There is the possibility that the Russians are selling wheat stocks they had built up in case of war. Government experts admit the possibility exists, but they have no proof.

Yesterday the league contracted with a rival group of umpires, the Colegio-de-Arbitros, to call the plays.

ARILENE — (AP) — A rural telephone co-operative, the first of its kind in Central West Texas, has been organized. The co-op, organized at a meeting at Mexel of representatives of 30 rural communities, has applied for a \$500,000 REA blanket loan to furnish rural telephone service to a six-county area served by the Taylor Electric Co-operative. The loan, if approved, will bring telephone service eventually to 3,000 consumers in Taylor, Jones, Callahan, Eastland, Nolan and Shackelford counties. About 850 applications for service have been turned into the Taylor co-op's board of directors. Read The News Classified Ads

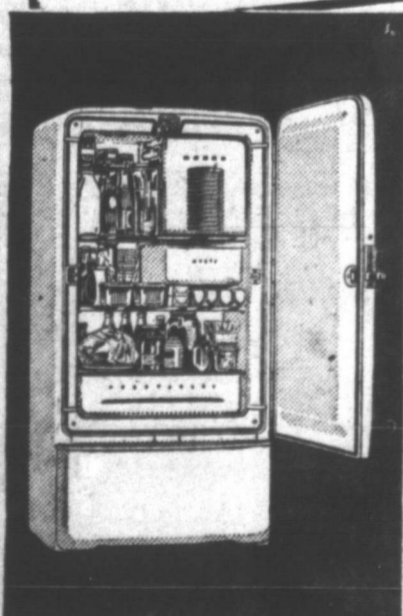

Build Up Grips to Bolster Hands;
Correct Grip Prevents Blisters

By GENE SARAZEN
Winner of Them All
Having small hands, I had to
find a way of making them
good hands.
I strengthened my hands
through exercise and built up
the grips on the shafts of my
clubs to bolster them, like arch
supports.
The point of big grips is that
they help keep your grip station-
ary. The Australians called mine
broom handles.
Today many instead of build-
ing up their grips, go after that
all-essential stationariness by
wearing a glove on the left
hand.
The glove has nothing to do
with blister prevention.
When the club is held prop-
erly you don't get blisters.
As a young man with a de-
fective grip, my hands were per-
petually blistered.
In 1931, with the aid of the
remainder grip, a feature of a
certain make of clubs, and a
heavy training club, I corrected
my grip. I haven't had a blister
since.
The average person's fingers
are not strong enough to prop-
erly grip and swing a club.
The training club is a muscle
builder that strengthens the
hands and fingers and toughens
the skin of the hands.
It is a reducer, too.
This driver has a specially-built
steel shaft and a larger head
than the ordinary club, weighs
24 ounces, and is built so that
it is perfectly balanced. This
ordinary club, of course, weighs
about 14 ounces.
While on my farm at German-
town, N.Y., there is little time

for me to play between tourna-
ments. So every morning I swing
the club at least five minutes.
A player should swing it 24 or
25 times daily until he is in
a perfect groove.

the year round.
It is customary to date modern
golf from 1919, a chronological

Frozen Pack Shuts Out Foes

By OSWALD JACOBY
Written for NEA Service

"I have only just begun to play Canasta," writes a Milwaukee correspondent, "and perhaps for that reason I have difficulty in understanding the reason for freezing the pack.

"When you discard a deuce or a joker, you are parting with a very valuable card. It strikes me that you never get back anything of comparable value.

"If you eventually get the frozen pack, it is true you get your wild card back, but you have not had the use of it in the meantime. This is like putting money in the bank and getting it back after a while without interest.

"If the opponents get the frozen pack, they get your wild card with it too. This is like putting your money in a bank that fails.

"I suppose, since there is so much talk about freezing the pack, that there must be some advantage in doing it. Would you be good enough to explain what this advantage is?"

The reason you sometimes discard a deuce or a joker is that you want to prevent the opponents from getting the discard pile. Since the whole game is essentially a struggle for the discard pile, it is highly advantageous to shut the opponents out.

This does not mean, however, that it is a good idea to freeze the pack at any old time. It is foolish to discard one of your wild cards if the opponents have an excellent chance to win the frozen pack. To use my correspondent's comparison, it's a good idea to invest your wild cards in a reliable bank because you will get back lots of interest; but you must make sure that your bank is reliable.

To carry this comparison a little farther, you don't invest every single cent that you own in the bank. You keep a little in your pocket for operating expenses. Similarly, you don't invest your only wild card to freeze the pack of you need that wild card for other purposes. For example, you might need it to make your first canasta or to meld out.

Freezing the pack is a tremendously important subject, and I shall have more to say about it next week.

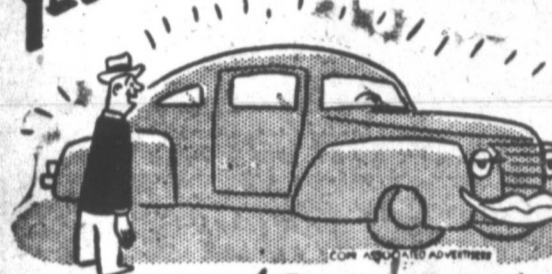

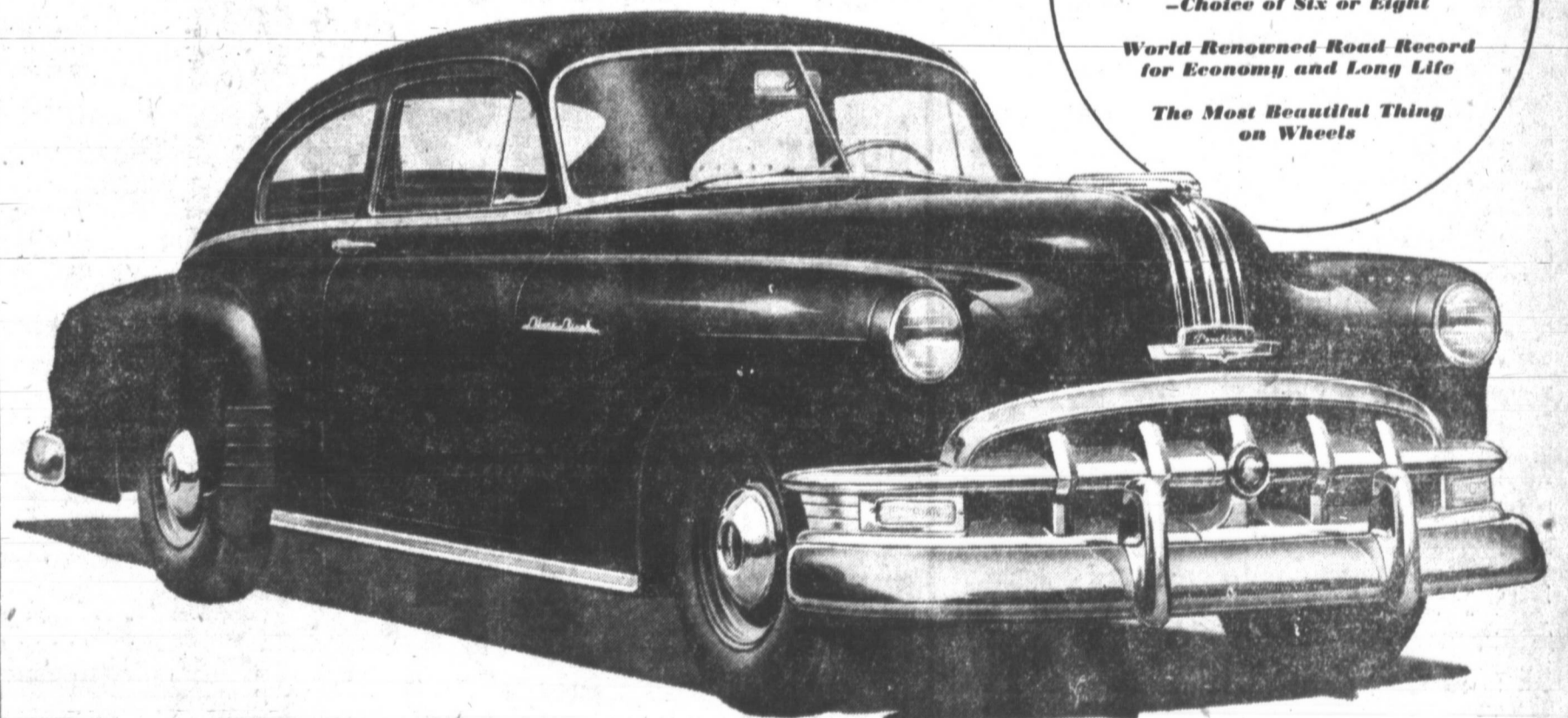

Jury Charges Manipulation Of Documents

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Through manipulation of papers held by bondsmen, gamblers involved in 90 of 118 cases were able to select the judge before whom they wished to appear for trial, the May grand jury says.

In a presentment returned to Common Pleas Judge Joseph L. Kun, the jury said the gamblers frequently escaped prison sentences with payment of fines.

The grand jury said the 118 gambling cases listed in the prison court during the 16 months ending last May 5 involved 212 indictments and 215 defendants.

The presentment said the gamblers apparently manipulated their bail papers because of their knowledge that judges vary among themselves as to proper punishment in any type of criminal case.

"Particularly is this true of gambling offenses. The gambling fraternity are an acute group, living by their wits and preying, particularly in lottery cases, on the poor and ignorant. They are fully aware of the predilections of judges through their knowledge of sentences in prior cases.

"They utilize this knowledge to their own advantage and by manipulation have their cases brought before those judges who invariably impose light sentences.

Heart Surgery Method Uses Index Finger

LONDON — (AP) — Three British surgeons have announced a technique of heart surgery, using the doctor's index finger mainly, which they claim may cure a common form of heart disease. The trio said the operation had been performed successfully seven times in repairing damage to the heart's mitral valve, which permits the flow of blood between the two halves of the heart.

Damage to the mitral valve, called mitral stenosis, often follows rheumatic fever, the British Medical Association's journal said in reporting the new technique.

The journal said a group of American doctors in Philadelphia

had reported success with operations in similar cases but that the new technique developed here was the more revolutionary because it used only the doctor's index finger in repairing the heart damage.

As performed by Dr. R. C. Brock, the operation consisted of exposure of the heart, insertion of the index finger into the stricken valve, and stretching of the passage between the two halves of the heart to restore normal circulation.

The medical journal said the new operating technique was a "stride ahead" in heart surgery. The magazine reported seven patients had made satisfactory progress after the treatment. Two others died after the operation.

Expiration Date For Insurance May Be Asked

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Congress may be asked by the Veterans Administration to let World War II GI term insurance start expiring in 1953.

In that year, veterans who took out their policies in 1949 will have used up the 13-year term covered by the original congressional action plus two extensions voted since 1945. For vets who were first insured in 1945 the terminal date is in 1958.

VA Insurance Chief Harold W. Breining has told a House expenditures subcommittee that congressional failure to enact a third extension "would be a very desirable thing, both from the standpoint of the veterans and of the government."

The second extension voted by Congress raised the premium on the term insurance, and it would be raised still further if extended again.

The alternative to letting the policy lapse at the end of 13 years would be to convert it to one of six permanent forms of insurance. The premium would be higher, but it would remain at the same level for the life of the policy.

More than 3,000,000 veterans still hold the unconverted National Service Life Insurance, while about 2,000,000 have converted it to some other form.

Reduced Government Deficit Is Predicted in Washington

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The federal government may wind up the 1950 fiscal year some \$1,400,000,000 less in the red than the administration had forecast only six weeks ago.

There is even an outside chance that the treasury will find itself better off by close to \$2,000,000,000.

The budget deficit for the 12-month period ending the 30th of this month appears likely now to stay well below \$4,000,000,000 — a startling 26 percent improvement over the \$5,400,000,000 deficit predicted by the Budget Bureau on April 20.

This change in the outlook was indicated by the trend of official figures and confirmed by officials who cannot be named but who have excellent information on the situation.

They ascribed the new development to the fact that government spending is lagging far behind estimates while tax revenues are running moderately above April expectations.

As of May 31 — with only one month left of this fiscal year — there were signs that the 12-month spending figure alone might fall a whopping \$1,400,000,000 below the April 20 estimate of \$42,000,000,000. That total was itself a sharp cut from President Truman's January prediction that \$43,300,000,000 would be spent this year.

Officials said the April spending guess is virtually certain to prove an overestimate of at least \$1,000,000,000.

On the revenue side, the trend was toward a year-end mark nearly \$700,000,000 above the April estimate of \$36,600,000,000, but officials said the excess is more likely to be about \$400,000,000 to \$500,000,000.

The April receipts estimate itself reflected a \$1,200,000,000 cut from President Truman's January revenue prediction. It appeared that estimators had trimmed too deeply under the pessimistic influence of disappointing March tax collections.

Since March, there has been some pickup in the flow of revenue, partly the result of an improvement in business, along with an increase in employment and personal income.

The sudden change in the 1950 deficit outlook could indicate a better picture for the coming fiscal year as well.

Continued strength in revenue collections and a further drag in the spending pace would inevitably point to a budget condition in fiscal 1951, beginning July 1, much closer to a balance than the \$5,100,000,000 in-the-red figure foreseen by the Budget Bureau in April.

Federal Aid Checks Mailed to Hospitals

AUSTIN — (AP) — Federal aid checks of \$106,200 and \$82,705 were mailed to the Floss Memorial Hospital at Denton and Providence Hospital at Waco, respectively, yesterday by the state health officer.

The payments were second installments on construction work authorized under the federal hospital survey and construction act, Dr. George W. Cox said.

Other hospitals participating in the program will receive checks in the near future.

Former Boston Chief To Seek Post Again

NEW YORK — (AP) — Former Mayor James M. Curley of Boston returned yesterday from a European trip and announced he would seek a fifth term as Boston's chief executive next year.

Looking hale and hearty, the 75-year-old Massachusetts politician said "I'm at least 25 years younger than when I left for the trip."

As he sailed from here on April 14, President Truman pardoned him for a mail fraud conviction. He had served five months of a six to 18 months federal prison term for the offense.

Improvement Seen In Winter Wheat

CHICAGO — (AP) — An improvement in southwestern winter wheat prospects and a serious delay in seeding spring wheat in the Northwest was noted yesterday by C. M. Galvin, crop expert of James E. Bennett and Company, commission firm.

The Galvin survey, based on reports from grain dealers, country elevators and milling firms, placed winter wheat production at 719,988,000 bushels. This compared with an Agriculture Department forecast of 689,095,000 bushels as of May 1.

"Production prospects generally improved in May over the entire winter wheat area," Galvin said, "particularly in Kansas and Nebraska as well as portions of Oklahoma as a result of moisture and relatively favorable temperatures."

But in the spring wheat area, Galvin said, "it is apparent to us that seedings will fall materially short of the 19,727,000 acres that producers indicated would be sown in their March report."

Camp for Diabetic Children Slated to Open June 12 at Sweeney Foundation, Gainesville

Sweeney Diabetic Foundation
GAINESVILLE — A must on calendars is Monday, June 12, in some widely separated homes of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico and Louisiana.

On that day the Sweeney Diabetic Foundation, which heads up at Gainesville, Texas, will begin the operation of its Camp Sweeney, the Southwest's first group treatment and institutional center for diabetic children in the age range from 6 to 15, including those of indigent parents. These will be taken in without any fee payment.

The 403-acre campsite is located nine miles northeast of Gainesville. The track is beautifully endowed by nature with dense woodland and shallow valleys, and on its southern margin a 25-acre springfed lake has been completed.

There, in two semester periods of June 12 through July 21 and July 22 through September 2, around 80 boys and girls who are expected to enroll — 40 per semester is capacity — will be shown the blessed truth that their malady is controllable and can be kept so if they themselves will learn and faithfully follow the routine (as taught them) of insulin injections, diet and proper physical exercise.

Their instruction will come from a trained staff headed by Dr. J. Shirley Sweeney of Gainesville as chief medical officer, Dr. Sweeney, father of both the foundation and camp bearing his name, is one of the nation's top specialists in diabetes and allied metabolic and glandular disorders.

Assisting Dr. Sweeney will be a resident physician who will be on duty at the camp constantly; three registered nurses; two graduate dieticians; two cooks; two experts in horsemanship; counsellors, one for each five enrollees; the camp director and assistant, James V. Campbell, the director, is assistant athletic coach at Gainesville High

School. The counsellors are college graduates experienced as teachers of children.

Life at Camp Sweeney will follow an expertly guided pattern. There will not be a dull moment. Under counsellor supervision the children will be permitted to select the activities in which they most desire to participate. They will have a wide range of choice including horseback riding, riflery, swimming, surfing, archery, tennis, badminton, hiking, and fishing, both fly and casting. The 23-acre lake has been stocked with bass. Classes will be formed in music, art, drama and crafts such as leather, wood and metal.

Horsemanship will be taught by two Gainesville men, Portis Sims and Verne Brewer. They are widely known as trainers of the famed Gainesville Community Circus shetlands. Some of these ponies will be quartered at the camp.

Enrollees' afternoons will be devoted to games tending to develop group spirit. Spread into evening programming will be campfire gatherings and story hours. Throughout every day and night the children will be in touch with camp headquarters — a public address system will be in constant operation.

But play will not be all. The medical treatment under direction of Dr. Sweeney, the resident physician and nurses will include instruction of each diabetic child enrollee in giving himself or herself the indispensable insulin injections, and learning the diet routine. Short lectures on diabetes will be given by the medical director.

Also, as a special feature, one of the counsellors who holds a master's degree in child guidance will tutor enrollees who have fallen behind in their school work; if they ask for this type of instruction.

In founder Sweeney's words: "Since the discovery of insulin in 1921, the medical profession has been able to keep alive children suffering with diabetes. But this is not enough. Our problem, which cannot be over-stressed, is to teach them to live normally, happily, with serene knowledge that by learning to help themselves they can round out their lives' expectancy — and beyond — and throughout childhood enjoy its blessings."

The doctor added: "The Foundation which has

built and will operate this summer camp is in all respects a charitable, non-profit institution. If parents of our enrollees are able they will pay the modest camp fee. If not, it will make no difference. No diabetic child within the prescribed ages, 6 to 15 inclusive, applying for admission will be denied.

"We believe that this camp will in large measure lift the mental and physical condition of many diabetic children who enroll with us. Here they will engage in the activities of normally healthy children, under the same insulin and dietary requirements as prescribed for them at home as given to us through their physicians. The result we believe will make them look forward to their 1951 camp experience as eagerly as for Christmas."

Famed Cellist To Play Again

PARIS — (AP) — Pablo Casals, acclaimed as the world's greatest living cellist, will end his five-year musical boycott tonight to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the death of composer Johann Sebastian Bach.

Five years ago Casals announced he never again would play in public as a protest against

what he called British and American failure to oppose the regime of Generalissimo Francisco Franco in Spain. He retired to the little French town of Prades, in the Pyrenees 15 miles from the border of his native Spain.

The 73-year-old Spanish cellist agreed to play once more on the urging of musical friends who said a Bach memorial service would be incomplete without Casals' artistry. The Bach festival is being held in Prades where Casals will play in seven of the 12 concerts.

Bradley To Speak At Aggie Ceremony

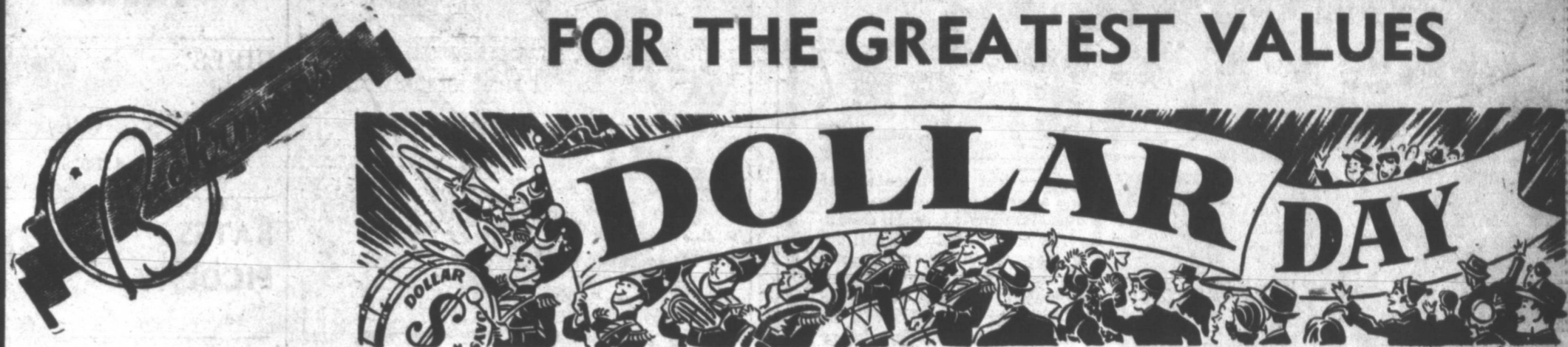



Letter Gives Views of Capital

(Editor's Note: The following is a copy of a letter written to several friends in Pampa by Mrs. Lillian Kelley, a member of the staff of Rep. Ben Guill in Washington. The letter outlines her first impressions of the nation's capital.)

This is a carbon-copy letter to all of you, but believe me if I wrote everything I would like to do all of you, I'd have writer's cramp till 1962.

When Ben told me over the phone that this was an amazing place, it was a masterpiece of understatement. I don't think I

could ever find words in Webster's to describe the complete beauty and elegance and interest of the place. No colored picture I have ever seen has completely captured the awe-inspiring beauty of the Capitol building and the grounds.

I was a little disappointed when I went inside the Capitol proper — that is where the Hall of Fame is with statues of famous men, famous paintings, etc. I, who am such a history and government student, expected to find Harry S. right under the dome and after all these years I find

his office is in connection with the White House. The Capitol faces east and west and on the south is the House of Representatives and on the north is the Senate. There are all sorts of offices in the building — one is a huge office called The Door Keeper. I'm not sure just what kind of door he keeps, but he really has a swank office for doing it. There are restaurants in the House building where the employees of the representatives eat and another one where the representatives themselves eat. A public relations man took me all through the building the first day I was here and we sat in a

but I decided no one but the man speaking for the moment knew or cared what she was going on. Reminded me of a grade school recess — but I guess you have to be smart to keep on the move and still know what's going on on the floor.

The Washington Monument is west — directly behind the Capitol building and there are the most beautiful lawns and parks between. I'm telling you, every direction you look there is something new and exciting.

The monument seems to change every time I look at it. The first morning I arrived it was foggy and it seemed to have a huge veil around it — the next day it rained and the spear was very far away — but today it is bright and the sun is shining and it seems close enough to reach out and touch. Behind the monument — on further west — is the Reflection Pool and you can even see the reflection of the Capitol in the clear waters, then across from that is the most inspiring thing I have ever seen — Lincoln Memorial. I had been told that Lincoln looks as if he were breathing — more than that, when you read his Gettysburg address on the wall and his second inaugural speech, you can almost hear him speak. Surely nothing so beautiful has ever been captured in marble before.

It almost gives you the weeps just to look at him, he looks so kind and understanding and alive. The power of his elegance leaves you without words to describe it. One of the girls here in the office took me on this sight-seeing tour yesterday afternoon. She is a wonderful person — she just doesn't want you to miss a thing, and believe me, the things your eyes can see and your heart can feel in so short a time makes me wonder if six months would be long enough to feast.

If everyone in the world could take a walk through Arlington Cemetery, I'm sure there'd never be another firearm made. In the short time we had yesterday, I didn't begin to see all the graves, but there must be miles and miles of those little white headstones with nothing to distinguish one man from the other, except a name, all that is left of thousands of men that meant tomorrow's sunshine to someone.

Above Arlington Cemetery is General Lee's home, which was closed by the time we got around to it, so we didn't get to go all the way up and go through, but it overlooks the Potomac and looks like a playhouse that has been set plunk down in the center of a hillside forest. You can see a part of the huge front porch with its big white pillars. I can hardly wait to go out sometime and go through. They say that it is the most beautiful thing on the inside of anything that anyone has ever seen. We took a long drive down

point is the airport and we were out there just at dusk and the lights had just come on a bit, though I know I've worn this word out, it was beautiful. The girls showed me where the big airliner crashed. You don't see any bare spots in Washington, all along this point was like one continuous park. The grass looks like pure velvet and the trees are simply thick. By the time we left the point it was dark and the moon was shining and down the river a ways you could see the lights from this big white boat — believe me I'm going to take a moonlight cruise down that river while I'm here if I have to borrow Mortimer Snerd. I saw the Pentagon building and I have no words left. It is a city in one huge building so until I go through it, corridor for corridor, I won't try. But now we come to the interesting part, right close by is the Navy Yard.

I saw the famous cherry trees and even though they were not in bloom I can imagine the sight it would be. I have been by all the embassies, — the Atomic Energy building, Blair House, which by the way, looks like a tourist court in comparison to the other things in this town. Harry (pardon me — but you know we're old friends) is living there now while the White House is being repaired. It isn't open to visitors now, but will be when the repairs are complete.

There are so many things I've seen in this short time that I wish I could remember and I'm able to tell you about, but I'd have to be a poet to do it justice. However, after I've had time to go over each thing with a fine tooth comb I'll write again. I'm

Denison Dam Outflow Gains

TULSA — (AP) — Outflow from the Denison Dam on the Red River was 17,000 cubic feet per second on June 1, the U. S. Engineers district office reported. This was about 10,000 cubic feet more than was being released May 17. The engineers gave this report on regulation of outflow since May 13 — a few days after some tributaries of the river were flooded upstream from the dam. May 13 — inflow in Denison Dam reservoir 120,000 cubic feet per second; outflow 7,000. As a result a 23 1/2 foot river stage at Fulton, Ark., about three and one half feet below flood stage. Without the reservoir's regulation, the stage would have been 29.1 feet, the engineers said. On the same day the stage at Shreveport was 22.8 feet. Without the reservoir it would have been 26.5 feet, not high enough to flood, but high enough to cause caving of banks. Outflow of the dam was gradually increased until May 24, when the lake was discharging 26,500 cubic feet per second, only enough to make the stream a third of bankfull below the dam. Four days later the heaviest discharge reached Fulton. Seven days later it reached Shreveport. The Fulton river stage then was 27 feet, between one third and one half bankfull. On May 27 the release was reduced to 7,000 cubic feet, then gradually increased to 17,000 feet per second, when the lake's inflow was 18,000.

FBI to Check 313 Claims in Texas City

HOUSTON — (AP) — FBI agents are to begin detailed checks of individual damage claims made against the federal government after the Texas City waterfront disaster. Arthur F. Lorton, Jr., agent in charge of the FBI Houston office, said a number of agents will be brought into the Texas City-Galveston area. He said the work probably will require several months. Federal District Judge T. M. Kennerly two months ago held the federal government liable for damages suffered in the disaster. Over 500 people were killed in the 1947 explosions and 313 damage suits involving some \$200,000,000 were filed against the government. Asst. U.S. Atty. Joseph W. Cash, has filed an appeal for each of the 313 suits. The agents will operate out of Galveston. Lorton said a previous FBI probe of the disaster was confined to factors contributing to the disaster itself and that no attention was given to damage claims. "The men now are to obtain facts requested by government attorneys handling the case, giving detailed attention to each damage claim," he said. He said the government apparently is collecting data for use in event Kennerly's ruling becomes final. Under Kennerly's ruling, separate trials are to be held to determine damages in each suit. Each suit involves from one to over 1,000 plaintiffs. Property damage claims range from repayment for a broken window to a \$50,000,000 claim made by the Monsanto Chemical Company. Death and personal injury claims range from a few hundred dollars to \$150,000.

Sales Gain Led By Fort Worth

DALLAS — (AP) — Fort Worth jumped way ahead of other big Texas cities in boosting department store sales last week over the similar 1949 week. The weekly Federal Reserve Bank report showed Fort Worth sales last week were 57 percent over those for 1949. Dallas sales were up 9 percent, San Antonio's 8 percent and Houston's 3 percent. For the four-week period ending May 27, compared with the similar 1949 period, Fort Worth sales were up 15 percent, San Antonio's were up 11 percent, Dallas up 9 percent, and Houston sales were off 1 percent.

17 Women Doctors Given Navy Duties

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Navy announced it has ordered 17 women doctors to duty at installations in this country. The new doctors, first women to complete training under the Navy civilian intern training program, hold reserve commissions as lieutenants, junior grade. They will join two regular Navy and three reserve women doctors already on active duty.

Engineers Head Won't Run Again

CLEVELAND — (AP) — Alvanley Johnston, grand chief engineer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, does not intend to run again for his office at the union's coming convention, a brotherhood spokesman has reported. George B. Hooper, the brotherhood's chief clerk, said Johnston a year ago notified the 80,000 members of the union to that effect in a circular letter. He has not changed his mind, said Hooper. The brotherhood's triennial convention opens here Monday and the election of officers will come near the end.

Attorneys E. E. Townes and Edgar E. Townes, Jr., filed the appeal to the fifth circuit court after Federal Judge T. M. Kennerly denied the new hearing motion. Last month Kennerly held the Jaybird Association is a political party and subject to Texas election laws. Negroes, he held, should be permitted to vote if they hold poll tax receipts. Two days after the ruling, Negroes voted in the Fort Bend Jaybird primary the first time in the 61 year history of the association.

Business Failures Increase in Week

NEW YORK — (AP) — Business failures rose to 214 in the week ended May 25, compared with 199 the week previous, Dun and Bradstreet reported. Figure compared with 206 casualties a year ago but it was 30 percent below the total of 305 in the comparable pre-war week of 1939.

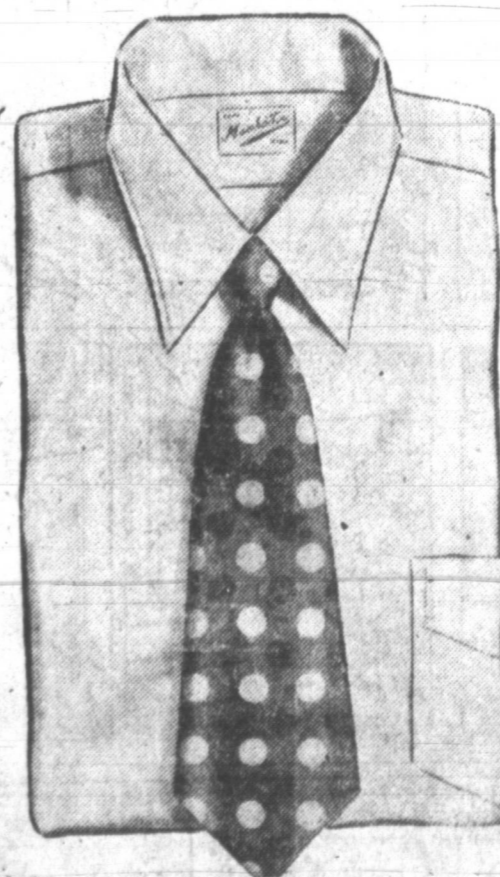

ICC Examiners Approve Railway Express Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two ICC examiners here recommended an increase of nine cents per hundred pounds on carload rail- way express shipments of fruits and vegetables from western producing areas.

The hike was proposed by the Railway Express Agency late last year and would amount to an average of \$23.40 a car.

It would apply to carload lots of fruits and vegetables, fresh,

similar nine-cent increase has already been applied to carload berries and vegetable-express shipments from Florida and Texas.

The company has indicated that if the Interstate Commerce Commission approves the Far West revision, the same increase will be made general throughout the Mississippi Valley and in the Pacific Northwest.

In recommending ICC approval, the examiner said that the increase is substantially less than increases approved by the commission for freight shipment of the same commodities. They said the express company needs a higher rate in view of major increases in wages and its employees during the last several years.

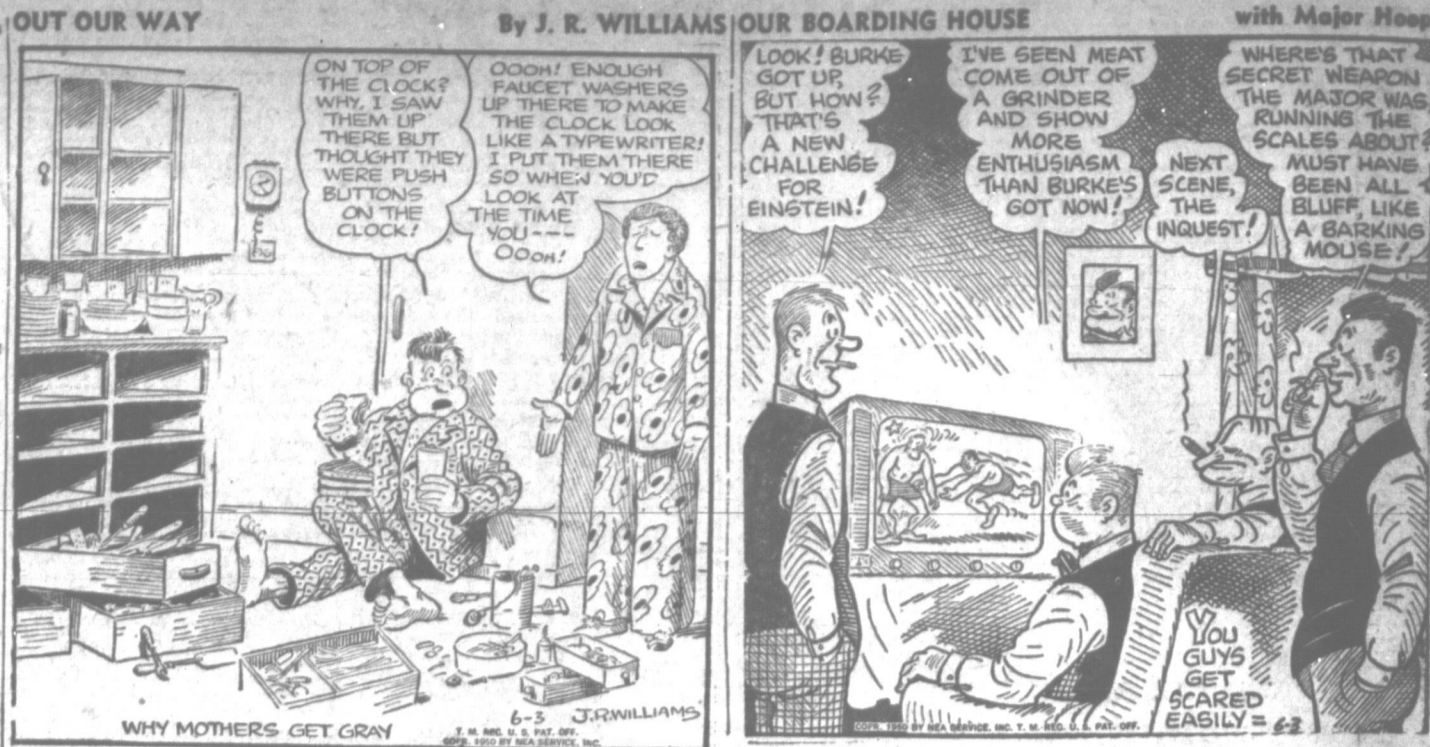
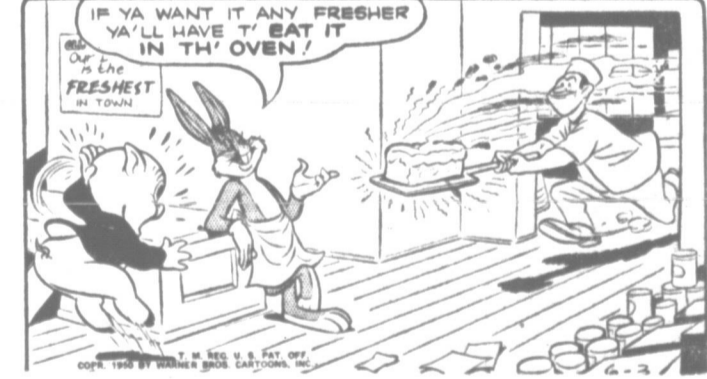
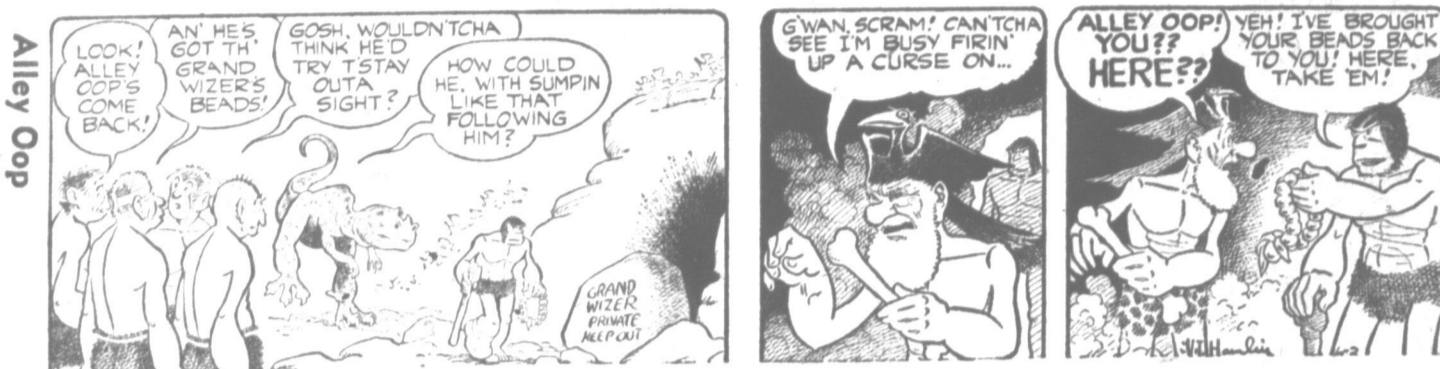

Production Rise Relieves Purses

This is a gain of about 448,000 barrels daily. When converted to cash, at a \$2.50 per barrel average, it means producers are receiving about \$1,120,000 more per day now than last July.

Throughout 1949's production cutback parade there was little change in exploration and development operations. Proven domestic underground reserves increased sharply.

There is much optimism over continuation of current increases in demand but independent oil men still are hammering away at foreign crude imports which they blame for bringing about the domestic demand setback.

An independent spokesman last week told a Senate Labor subcommittee in Washington excessive imports form today's "most detrimental" factor affecting the domestic oil industry.

H. B. Fell, executive president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, said oil production employment has fallen almost 15,000 and refinery employment about 8,000.

At its mid-year meeting last month in Los Angeles, the I.P.A.A. decided only Congress offered hope of bringing about oil imports reductions. Hope of aid from the importers themselves or from the Washington administration was abandoned.

The association offered three legislative solutions—limitation of imports to a certain percentage of domestic production, increasing excise duties, and balancing the quantity of imports and exports.

Fell told the subcommittee he personally favors the excise tax hike. An agreement reached a week ago between the British government and two American companies with foreign oil holdings may aid eventually in solving the imports problem.

A British ban in January against dollar oil wiped out good market source for American firms operating overseas.

Last week Britain agreed to permit the two companies, including Standard Oil Co. (New Jersey), the nation's biggest importer, to supply the British with payment 100 percent in sterling.

The British government immediately derationed gasoline. A few days later New Zealand, pointing to the Jersey Standard agreement, did likewise.

Time will tell, but modification of the British ban on dollar oil could lead to the finding of overseas markets for part of the foreign oil now being brought into the United States.

From the Bureau of Mines: Refined petroleum products moved by pipeline the first quarter of 1950 increased 13 percent over last year. Total demand for lubricants climbed 13.3 percent, and demand for aviation gasoline dropped 34.9 percent.

East Texans Wage Fight on Imports

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Imports have "resulted in serious damage to the economy of our area," said Charles K. Devall, publisher of the Kilgore News Herald. He told a Senate committee he spoke for 3,000 firms and professional men affiliated with chambers of commerce in Kilgore, Longview, Tyler, Gladewater, Henderson and Overton.

The committee is looking into complaints that large imports of oil are causing many workers in this country, particularly in the coal and oil industries, to lose their jobs.

He said the Texas Railroad Commission had cut oil production in East Texas from 20 days a month at the first of 1949 to a low point of 13 producing days in February of 1950.

"I am not here to speak for the oil producers or royalty owners, he continued, "but to represent hundreds of retail firms and service institutions, and thousands of bankers, lawyers, doctors, truck drivers and other workers."

"It is plainly evident that this large body of our citizenship has already been hurt. Bank deposits and retail sales are down, a general feeling of uncertainty exists, and a substantial number of families have moved to other areas."

Rep. Beckworth (D-Tex) placed in the record a letter he received from Amos G. Carter, president of the Fort Worth Star Telegram, concerning the oil import problem.

Disagreeing with views of the state department in sanctioning imports, Carter said: "In the agreement with Venezuela in 1939, the rate of this (import) tax was halved, but only on imports up to five percent of the total quantity of oil processed in the United States."

"This was tacit recognition that the domestic industry might be injured by oil imports in excess of five percent of domestic demand. The policy thus established by Congress of protection to the domestic industry from excessive oil imports was completely set aside only when the Mexican agreement was negotiated in 1943 and by the multilateral agreement at Geneva in 1947."

The subcommittee, headed by Senator Neely (D-WVa), is investigating the causes of "increasing unemployment" in the coal, oil, railroad, silver, lead and zinc industries.

Keefe said he favored boosting the tariff on oil from 10 to 12 cents a barrel to \$1.05, as proposed in legislation introduced by Rep. Gossett (D-Tex) and others.

Rep. Gossett testified that unless oil imports are curbed, independent domestic oil producers will be destroyed and "we will have only a few major oil companies doing business."

Gossett advocated a boost in the tariff on foreign oil. Neely (D-WVa), told Gossett he hopes to "translate into action" his bill to up the tariff on oil, saying that 10,000 coal miners in West Virginia have lost their jobs because of "cut-throat competition" from foreign oil.

Increased operations in West Texas and New Mexico caused a gain of 27 rigs in that area, with Oklahoma, the Gulf Coast and Illinois also showing important increases. It was reported to American Association of Oilwell Drilling Contractors by Hughes Tool Co.

The total of 2,225 active units for the week, compares with 2,164 a week ago, 2,098 a month ago and with 2,164 for the comparable week in 1949. This total also compares with 2,177 in the comparable week of 1948 — the peak year for drilling activity.

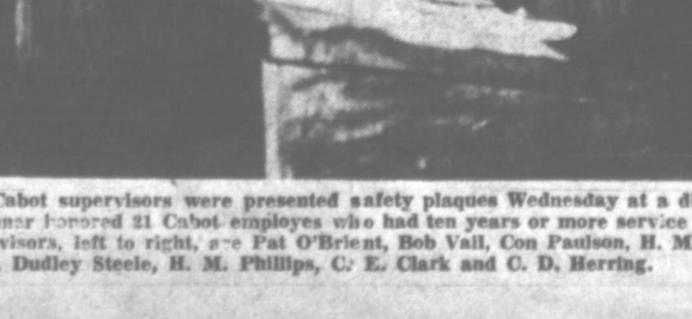

TULSA — (AP) — Another slump hit Oklahoma oil field activity last week. Completions recovered slightly from the previous report's stiff decline in 24 counties, including 67 oilers, three gasers and 32 dry holes, according to a Tulsa World survey. There were but 89 final last week.

New locations took a sharp dip. Ninety-seven starts were reported in 24 counties compared to 174 in 36 counties the previous period.

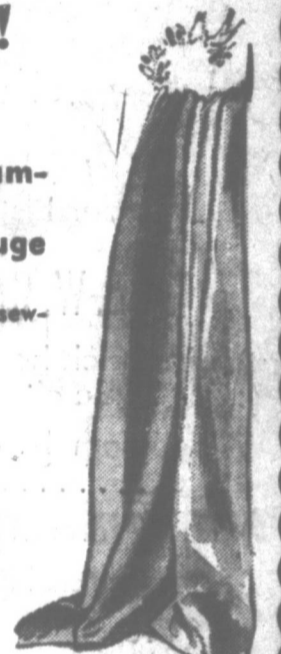

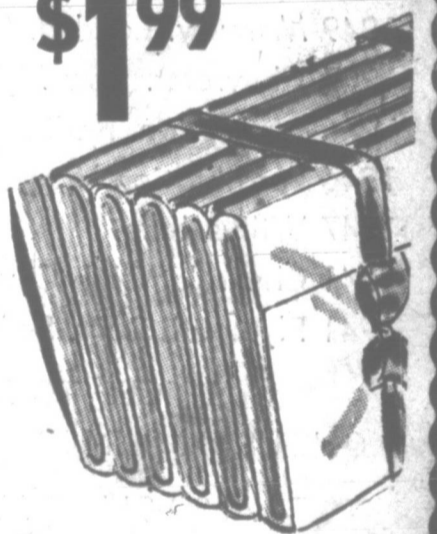

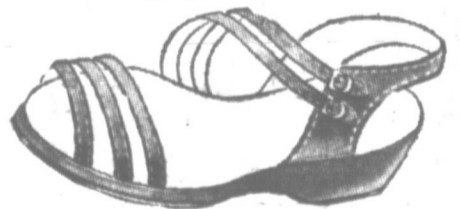
