

in children even convulsions, are sometimes present. Lessened urine and a dark, cloudy or bloody tinge to it is frequent. The diagnosis requires careful study by the physician of the urine, blood pressure, chemistry of the blood and physical condition.

If the nephritis is in the acute stage, bed rest is necessary. The diet has to be carefully adjusted to the ability of the kidneys to care for the food eaten. "

The disease often comes from infection with germs called streptococci. Most streptococci yield to the sulfa drugs or to penicillin. For this reason, it may be possible to stop some streptococcus infections before they have had a chance to injure the kidneys and

cause Bright's disease. There have been some suggestions that one of the adrenal cortical hormones might help but it is too soon to know yet and this is in the emperimental stage.

In chronic nephritis, the symptoms tend to be less severe than in the acute variety. The accumulation of dropsical fluid, or edema, is more or less typical, but there may not be much at first. When severe the swollen legs and discomfort in walking may






