

Frustration with area TV led to plans for Pampa's 1st station

Staff Writer

What may be Pampa's first televison station will offer community, school, local sports, local news and church oriented" programming, according to the hopeful station owner, Pampa dentist Dr. Roy Braswell.

But he said, "my most optimistic opening date is 18 to 24 months in the future. Braswell issued a news release about his proposed Pampa

TV station Thursday afternoon, and it included slaps at Pampa's cable company and Amarillo's three television

"Last fall, I wanted to advertise about a road race, but could not afford the Amarillo TV station fees. They offer nore coverage (Hereford, Dumas, etc.) than local events warrant expenditure. I saw the need for local TV program origination," Braswell said.

'I negotiated with Sammons Corporation of Dallas for three months before they finally slammed the door on a local cable studio. They were reserving their vacant channel for the Playboy pay channel. Sammons Corporation is bigger than Texas itself and could care less about local needs. Their only response is to the dollar - HBO and Escapade are financially rewarding." Braswell said.

Braswell has asked the city for a special — use permit to build a 100 - foot broadcast tower at 17th and Duncan. A public hearing on the zoning request will be held at the regular city commission meeting June 22.

Braswell and his associates have three applications pending for a low - power FCC broadcast license. "We now

have three 1000 - watt applications pending. We will accept the first to receive FCC approval," he said.

'Our station would cover most of Gray County, and additional coverage east is being evaluated by Phil Grove, of

Utelus, who is our local engineer," Braswell said. Braswell's station would be a "secondary non interference" station and would transmit on UHF (ultra high frequency). Amarillo's stations broadcast on VHF (very high frequency).

A small antenna would bring in a Pampa low - power

The station would transmit its signal to about a 15 - mile radius from the broadcast tower.

In addition to local programs, Braswell said his Pampa station will carry "syndicated programming, including weather service and children's programs."

"Our concept is to offer an alternative to national production, which centers around Panhandle people and events. We plan a very small studio, and 90 percent of all local production will take place where people live, work, study, and worship. All cameras will be portable to take the viewer into the community," Braswell said.

"The Pampa schools and Clarendon College will be offered studio facilities, and our production director will be available to help set up curriculum," he added.

Braswell's operation will be broadcasting for bucks. "Our projected fee for advertising will be about one - third of Amarillo stations' rates. This will make television more available to our merchants." he said

High Plains planner to build African school

W. Cecil Steward, Dean of the School of Architecture at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln who started his education in Pampa, has been designated as Project Director for the construction of the new State

University of Imo, Nigeria. Imo is a coastal state one - third the size of Nebraska, but with a population of about seven million. Imo has a \$200 million construction budget and may eventually employ 3,000 to 4,000 people, including 1500 faculty members.

Steward said, "Over ten years, the contract could be worth \$20 million to the University of Nebraska The University of Nebraska was selected because the officials were looking for ap American university which is an agriculturally oriented land grant university with more than one campus.

Steward was chosen as project director because architecture is a big part of the establishment of the university. Long - range plans call for five campuses organized by discipline

and located at five separate villages within 18 miles of Owerri, the state capital. Students will pay no tuition, although those who can afford it will pay some room and board expenses.

In commenting on the people, Steward observed, "They are a proud, purposeful and intelligent people. Over the past 30 years education has been one of their principal interests. In 1948 there were only 38 secondary schools in the eastern region (an area now sub divided by four states including Inio); in 1980 Imo reported that 390 secondary schools had an enrollment of over one million students.'

He praised the quality of their education.

"In recent years the students from Imo have achieved the highest scores on the West African College Entrance Exams. Yet until now, Imo was the only state in Nigeria without a university within its boundaries."

Steward, a 1952 graduate of Pampa High School, received his Bachelor of Architecture degree from Texas A&M University in 1957 and his MS in **Architecture from Columbia University**

He has been widely recognized for his architectural abilities. While a student at Texas A&M, he received the J. Rodney Tabor Award for design in 1956. That same year he won a fellowship to study at École des Beaux Arts in France.

Significant buildings he designed include two prominent homes in Bryan, Texas; Citizens State Bank, Somerville, Texas; New City Junior High School in New York City; and the Quinnipiac Elementary School in New Haven, Connecticut. He is especially proud of the latter, which was described in "Progressive Architecture". The plans for this building were also displayed at the

AASA convention. Steward believes architecture goes far beyond designing the physical structure of buildings.

"You cannot take architecture out of the context of the users. It has to satisfy human needs, not just physical but economic and social. Designing for users applies to nearly aspect of architecture, from the lumber that goes

into a house to downtown redevelopment projects." He is agressive on the subject of

downtown redevelopment.


"The revitalization of our downtown areas is essential to the future of American life. The cost of energy makes it very expensive to drive to and from work some 25 miles a day, and cities are not providing public transportation. We aren't looking very carefully at the future. But the role of the architect ought to be to help city planners see the overall design.

Too often, he said, downtown developers attempt to make projects attractive to investors while negecting the users.

"If you don't design to attract the people who will use and support it, it won't work. You can't just tear something down and put up something else and expect people to come to it. It must fit in and be a good neighbor.'

Steward called the Renaissance Center in Detroit a poorly planned downtown development.

Pampa broker is bullish on gas, oil, and predicts rise in prices

A Pampa investment expert told a petroleum group this week that oil and gas prices are going to go up.

Tom Byrd, area representative for the brokerage firm of Edward D. Jones and Company, told the regular monthly meeting of the Desk and Derrick Club of Pampa that the oil glut is about over. and the public as well as investors can expect higher oil and gas prices this

Byrd delineated the various types of oil investments available, and was

bullish on the outlook "I bought a car the other day, and it didn't burn gold or diamonds ... it burned gas," he told the group of women employed locally in petroleum related businesses

One program Byrd suggested as a good way to invest in the petroleum industry was the "limited partnership" such as the Petro - Lewis program his firm is handling.

"If you had bought \$10,000 worth of Petro - Lewis in 1970." he said. "vou would have been paid regular dividends of around 12 percent, and your partnership would be worth roughly \$44,000 today

Byrd told the group that limited partnerships were easy to buy into, and

"They (Petro - Lewis) have had



Tom Byrd 17,000 investors," he said, "and no one has lost any money yet.

A portion of limited - partnership investments are a tax write - off, he Petro-Lewis buys only producing

fields that yield a minimum 12 percent return, and do no exploratory drilling. Oil drilling investments, on the other hand, have a 100 percent write - off, but also hold a potential of a greater return on the investment, he said. He added that there is more risk, as well, with exploratory drilling.

A \$10,000 investment can bring you \$50,000," he said, "or nothing. It's a gamble. But it's only for those who can Byrd stressed that oil drilling

In a paper presented at the 1979 dedication of the Design Center, Universidad Autonoma de Guadalajara in Mexico, Steward called the John Portman - designed Renaissance Center "a cleaner, better, brighter and violence - free environment inside the glass fortress," then said such "glass downtowns" can drain the streets of trade and people, leaving them more deserted and dangerous than before."

The need for architects is growing.

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - Government information on a pesticide that three farmworkers claimed poisoned them must be turned over to their attorney, a federal judge has

U.S. District Judge Filemon Vela, acting on a 1978 federal law, Friday told the Environmental Protection Agency to turn over the material to a lawyer representing the farmworkers in a damage

Vela's action was the first time such information has been ordered by the law, said Robin Alexander, an attorney for Texas Rural Legal Aid who represents the three

The farmworkers claimed in a state court suit that on April 14, 1980, they entered a corn field near Weslaco that had been sprayed three days earlier with carbofuran, a pesticide manufactured by FMC Inc.

The workers became ill with symptoms of pesticide poisoning and were taken to the emergency room of a local hospital, the suit claims. Although the immediate toxic effects of vomiting, rashes and dizziness subsided, the lawyer said the plaintiffs continue to suffer from the acute poisoning.

Ms. Alexander said she filed a request under the federal Freedom of Information Act for all health and safety files kept by EPA

The homebuying bailout

The slump in housing construction extends from the timber lands of Oregon to the real - estate offices outside Boston, and isn't showing signs of improvement. As a result, we're seeing some political hysteria that threatens to divert us from important discoveries about our changing times

A homebuying bailout is the talk of Washington, with industry officials pushing for congressional relief by June 1.

A wide variety of legislation has been introduced in response, most all of it to use the taxing and or borrowing capacity of the government to subsidize home buyers, sellers and builders. Some of the same Republican senators who claim to be intent on balancing the budget are behind one of these budget - busting bills, for \$5 billion in mortgage subsidies. Some old - time Democratic politicians like Rep. Henry Gonzalez of Texas have another scheme, to pump \$22.9 billion into some HUD programs that historically have helped a relative few at great expense to the rest of us. In between those two plans are some other quickie remedies, including one offered by our own Jerry Patterson.

What these bills typically do is introduce complex formulae for determining which types of people and homes, or parts of the country, get the gravy. Underlying the intense lobbying for a bailout is concern over which branch of the housing industry approved: the real estate agents, the builders or the lenders.

Loans guaranteed or sponsored by the government have been the fastest - growing component of federal borrowing that has crowded most of us out of the lending market over the past five years. These loans, of which mortgages have been a major part, have been more a factor in the rise of interest rates than has the federal budget. Treasury statistics would indicate. These

credit obligations, you see, are called 'off - budget items" and aren't even figured into that \$100 billion deficit figure you hear so much talk about in Washington these days. But they are burdens just the same, and a primary reason why, according to recent Office of Management and Budget figures, federally related borrowing will eat up 90 percent of the country's savings pool during the current fiscal year.

Such considerations led The Wall Street Journal to observe last November that the time had come to reconsider the widespread expectation of home ownership that it said had been instilled by the mortgage programs of the New Deal. It occurs to us that, lowered inflation and rising interest rates having Providence popped real estate's balloon, a reevaluation is in order of the types and amounts of housing our capital the Pampa News, you rightly lauded markets can support. Economic everyone involved in the civil defense constraints may be forcing us into warning the high - density living that many other civilizations have grown acccustomed to, but which local zoning authorities in this country chance the tornados stayed aloft, as resist. It may be the case that either those restrictions change or we're going to be faced with a choice of no housing or no money available for the rest of the economy.

In the midst of this larger crisis. the Reagan administration is thankfully resisting most of the housing bailout schemes. It has stated a preference for relaxing regulations that hamper the housing industry. Included in its proposals however, is some expansion of the loans that are part of our current problem.

The instrument best able to respond to changing economic and social conditions is the free marketplace. Given an opportunity, it will eventually find the desired amount of housing, relative to other scarce goods. Perpetuating past subsidy mistakes will only delay that

Private programs don't milk public

The myth that government programs are necessary to deal with the risks inherent in various important activities is fast crumbling, though programs and agencies tend to linger on long after the myths have been shattered. One encouraging recent development is a preliminary proposal to partially privatize the milk price - support program from the dairy industry

The problem dairy farmers face is that they are dealing with a perishable commodity in an uncertain environment. Bad weather, seasonal fluctuations in demand and other uncontrollable factors can affect the supply and the price. In addition, most farmers operate with a lot of credit, and a year of falling prices can bring on

bankruptcy The "solution" to these problems is embodied in the federal milk price support program, whereby the government buys "surplus" dairy products to keep the prices up. The program is continually under fire because it creates artificially high prices and costs taxpayers (directly) about \$2 billion per year. It also contains temptation for abuse and corruption, creating regular

P.L. Robinson, the late president of Diarymen Inc., the nation's third largest milk - producer cooperative. last November proposed that the private dairy cooperatives assume part of the function government has been performing. He suggested that dairy farmers assess themselves something like 50 cents per hundred weight to create a fund for the co-op to buy up surpluses and stabilize prices. Another 5 cents a hundredweight would be used to promote increased consumption of dairy products.

Robinson's idea does not envision a completely private program, but it could be a step in that direction. Money to buy up surpluses would come from the farmers rather than the taxpayers. The result might be higher prices for consumers than would prevail in the absence of such an assessment, but the payoff would be a mechanism to stabilize farm income over good and bad years and presumably keep producers producing.

Consumers also could benefit from private price support programs. There are several milk cooperatives in the country and a few maverick, dairy farmers who haven't joined cooperatives. Without federally mandated minimum prices, these co ops would face more competitive pressures than they do now. They would try, of course, to keep milk prices as high as possible, but would face other co - ops who might shave a little off the price to increase their share of the market. It is possible that a master monopoly co - op could emerge. but unlikely if it lacks the

sanction of law to control prices. It may be unlikely that dairy farmers will be willing to give up their place at the federal udder unless political pressure forces the dismantling of the milk price support program. But Robinson's proposal indicates that some people in the business are aware that the stabilizing effects of such a program can be achieved through private cooperative efforts, at much less cost to consumers and taxpayers.

Whatever, it is also certain that the French advantage is likely to be of brief duration. The other major arms producers - including Britain - can be counted upon to duplicate such an obvious winner for their own arsenals and for the lucrative export market.

Competition in that market is cutthroat. It is a business war that has been going on a lot longer than the one over the Falklands.

With a little bit of luck, and a lot of good sense on the part of the combatants now that both have been sobered by the shedding of blood in quantity, the Falklands war may soon

It may well be that with the passage of time it will turn out to have been most significant not for determining the ownership of some real estate but for its impact upon the shape of naval warfare.

And for the impetus given another war that goes on apparently indefinitely.

Farmer Hero of Puxico

The most productive workers in America, instead of being rewarded, are being punished.

High interest, high production costs,

low produce prices. America's farmers are on the ropes; many are going broke or giving up and

Across breadbasket states, grain elevators are in bankruptcy.

And the law says that when a storage

facility goes bust, the grain stored therein is impounded — subsequently to be sold to satisfy creditors. The grain stored therein does not

belong to the elevator; it belongs to the farmer who stored it hoping for a better price later.

But the federal bankruptcy law says impound the grain. One Missouri farmer refused to accept that. Farmer Wayne Cryts of

Puxico drove his truck down to the

elevator and stole his own beans.

And went to jail for it. And became a hero.

Farmer Cryts was desperate. Thirty five and father of two, he was counting on the sale of his soybean crop to repay borrowed money. The only alternative was to sell off the family farm.

That land has been in the Cryts family for six generations; he refused to give it up without asserting his rightful claim to his own beans.

When word got out that he intended to 'steal his own beans," farmers converged by the thousands. FBI agents and federal marshals - stepped

Farmer Cryts got his grain back but he went to jail.

From a distance, one can understand the reason assets are impounded once bankruptcy proceedings begin; otherwise every creditor would converge and stripe the place.

Changing parish

The Rev. F.J. Hynes, C.M., parish priest at St. Vincent de Paul Church, is leaving Pampa June 15 for a new assignment at the St. Vincent order's parish in Merkel, Texas, and is looking back with fondness at his six - year stay in this city. Hynes said he "came to like the Panhandle very much,

and especially the people. He is originally from Chicago, and said Panhandle

residents are more friendly than people from his native

If you say hello to people on the street in the Midwest, he said, "they're ready to send for the men in the white coats." Hynes first came to Pampa in 1968, before the parish church moved completely from the Holy Souls Church to its present building at 810 West 23rd St., at the corner of 23rd and Perryton Parkway.

The church was completed in 1970 in an area just behind the more recent Gibson's Discount Store. When the church was built, the building was surrounded by empty lots, Hynes said, but Pampa has grown since then.

'People thought we were crazy for building there." he said. "Now we're in the center of things.

Hynes left for Saint Phillips Neri parish in Houston in 1974, but gladly returned to Pampa in 1977.

During his more recent stay, he oversaw plans for expansion of the church,including next year's new parish center, a facility for parish society offices, and recreation and reception centers

He saw the parish grow from 400 to 650 families, and watched the expansion of the church's school to include prekindergarten teaching and day — care services.

The parish also has tentative plans for a nursing home that may include apartment facilities on the church's 14 - acre

But Hynes said his most important task in Pampa has been his work with the community outside his own congregation. He said his main goal in Pampa has been "making awareness in the church of the total family community in Pampa, and making them aware that we were interested in

Before Hynes' efforts, he said, there was an attitude in the community that "these Catholics are kind of stand - offish" and some of them were, he said.

Now, he said, the church is "getting good feedback from community groups," and many community organizations, including hospitals, nursing homes and service groups, have been coming to him for help.

"One of the great losses in leaving Pampa is that feeling of being received - from the Sheriff's department and police down to the social workers," he said

Hynes worked to communicate to Pampa that the Catholic faith is based on both social and spiritual values. "The spiritual is always built on the natural," he said.

To achieve this, Hynes worked with various social groups and civic leaders in Pampa.

"People here have been very receptive, very open, very friendly," he said.

This is true, Hynes believes, despite some occasional prejudice against the Catholic religion among Panhandle

We call this, actually, the 'Bible belt,' " he said. He said the dominant religions in the area earned this nickname because they are "based on the Bible alone, unlike the Catholic church, which is based on the Bible and tradition."

Hynes said years ago false information about the Catholic faith was spread in the area through such books as "Thirty Years in Hell," a book written by a priest who later recounted the claims in it.

"Many of these stories are still in circulation," Hynes said, but not among the majority here.

One of the biggest changes in Hynes' parish in recent years has been the influx of Mexican - Americans into the community and the church, he said.

'Mexican - Americans have taken over a good bit of the time and effort" of the church recently, Hynes said. The church's Hispanic population has grown from 30 to 160 families since Hynes' arrival here.

Church workers have counseled the new people and represented them when they had difficulties with their new environment, Hynes said.

He said recently he has overseen expansion of the church's ministry to these people, "even working with them on their visas, language problems, and preparations for school. "There have been great improvements (in dealing with)


their language difficulties," Hynes said. The church has also instituted classes in domestic

sciences, including education in handling American food and housekeeping. These services are provided by nuns of the Carmelite order, a Mexico City - based order with its American base in Houston.

But recent immigrations are not the only changes that Hynes and his church have had to adjust to. Hynes said the church congregation is an example that Pampa is, "in general, a changing population," because of both industrial expansion and lavoffs

"Very few parishoners have been here a long time," he said

Hynes is accustomed to change, however, for his career in the ministry has led him to various parts of the country over the years



Hynes was born Sept. 24, 1917 in Chicago. He attended St. Vincent's College in Cape Girardeau, Mo., then did seminary work at St. Mary's Seminary at Perryville, Mo. and completed graduate school work at St. Louis University.

He taught in several seminaries, work that is emphasized by St. Vincent's order, for 25 years, including St. John's in Kansas City, St. Thomas Seminary in Denver, and finally spending 18 years in Houston's St. Mary's Seminary.

He became associate priest of the Pampa church in 1968, then became the church's leader in 1970, replacing the Rev. William Brennan

The period between his first and second terms in Pampa

was perhaps his most difficult. The St. Phillips Neri parish in Houston, where he was asked to minister, was going through

"It was becoming a black parish," he said, "which resulted in the Great White Flight.

The Houston parish was in debt for \$300,000 because of the lowering income levels of its new population, but "due to the

ingenuity of those who remained - and the operation of bingo - we saved the parish," Hynes said.

At one point, Hynes had to represent the parish when it was indicted for selling lottery tickets. The parish was cleared of the charge.

"It was a different life than life in Pampa," Hynes said. "We were told by police to protect ourselves there.

He said he was even held up by a thief in the church once, because "the only place I didn't wear a gun was in church." Now Hynes is moving on to the Sweetwater area of the San Angelo diocese, a relatively isolated area of the state. The diocese is considered a "mission territory" by the church,

and Hynes said it will be a "real challenge. "The biggest challenge there is the distances between places," Hynes said. He said the terrain is drier and more rugged than the Panhandle's, and "the closest planes out are 100 miles away in Lubbock."

Hynes is a familiar and much - beloved figure in Pampa, and those who know him say his absence will mean yet another change in a changing ministry here.





British report capture of Argentine soldiers

British paratroopers captured 900 Argentine soldiers when they overran Goose Green, but their commander was killed in the assault, the British Defense Ministry announced Saturday.

British commandos fought to within 25 miles of the Falkland Islands capital of Stanley on Saturday after taking Darwin and Goose Green Friday, British press reports said. Argentina said it was still fighting at Goose Green, but claimed U.S. support for Britain had turned the fighting into an 'unequal battle.

The Defense Ministry said in its statement: "We understand that when the Argentines surrendered. about 900 prisoners were taken by the battalion. We do not have information yet about the extent of British or Argentine casualties. ... We very much regret to announce that the commanding officer of the 2nd Battalion, the Parachute Regiment, Lt. Col. H. Jones, was killed in the action to take Goose Green.

The British press reports said it was believed 2,100 British marines had taken key Argentine positions at

about 25 miles west of Stanley and 25 miles east of San Carlos Bay, the beachhead the British established May 21 and stormed out of Thursday.

There was no official confirmation, but British sources, who declined to be identified, said the marines probably would next try to seize the high ground around Stanley, using that as a vantage point for shelling the estimated 7,000 Argentine troops defending the capital.

They also said the British might make another landing close to Darwin with 3,000 troops from the requisitioned liner Queen Elizabeth 2 to form a pincers movement against the Argentines at Stanley, which is about 40 miles east of the

Darwin-Goose Green area. The only reporters allowed to cover the undeclared war are from Argentina's official news agency and British correspondents with the estimated 100-ship armada around the Falklands, a remote South Atlantic archipelago.

The sources said Darwin and the airstrip at Goose Green were taken Friday by "Red Devil" British paratroopers who broke out of the beachhead with the Douglas and Teal Inlet - marines and split into two

groups - one heading down Falkland Sound in assault boats and the other helicoptering 15 miles south to heights overlooking Darwin.

They said the paratroopers began their assault on

Darwin by sweeping down under a mortar barrage from a 150-foot-tall ridge called Bodie Peak, while the group in assault boats moved in from the south under cover of

cuom Harrier jet fighters. The sources said the estimated 1,000 Argentine defenders put up fierce resistance in hand-to-hap fighting with the approximately 700 British paratroopers but finally were overwhelmed.

Proof of insurance

AUSTIN - Ever since the Legislature passed a law last session requiring motorists to carry proof of insurance coverage; there has been a lot of confusion about exactly what proof is required. We could have been more specific in the bill, but instead we gave the Department of Public Safety the authority to make rules that we thought would clarify this requirement

Although the DPS did make rules, many people still are confused. In an effort to cut through this confusion, the bill's author, Representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo, asked the Attorney General for opinions to clarify the matter. One of the duties of the Attorney General is to issue legal opinions to help interpret laws.

The Attorney General issued an opion on the subject of what proof of coverage motorists must show police officers on the officer's request.

"This evidence should include the name of the insured; and the minimum amounts of financal responsibility required by statute, which may be a statement that the 'policy coverage meets the minimum amounts of financial responsibility required by statue. or the actual policy limits,' the opinion states.

The minimum amount of coverage required by the statute is \$10,000 for bodily injury for one persons; \$20,000 for the whole accident, and \$5,000 for property damage. This is liability insurance, which means it covers losses to the other person if the policy owner causes the accident. It does not cover the policy owner or his property.

The opinion goes on to indicate what sort of document could fulfill these requireents: "(1) insurance policy

(2) an instrument issued by the insurance company to be carried in the vehicle that confirms coverage:

(3) - (5) (bonds, certificates of self insurance or Railroad Commission cab (6) copies of the aforementioned

documents: and (7) other evidence such as an insurancebinder which confirms to the satisfaction of the officer that the owner and - or driver is in compliance with the Safety Responsibility

Extension Agent PRODUCERS INVITED TO INSECT SCOUTING WORKSHOP

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Gray County are receiving a special invitation this year to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of of their pest management programs.

The workshop will be held Tuesday and Wednesday at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview. The center is on US 87 Business Route, south of the city.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension. In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop forcuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield and hold down production costs.

The Tuesday session opens at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. Pat Morrison outlining the scope of the workshop and explaining pest management concepts. Also on the morning program are Dr. Dale Pennington, extension soil chemist; Dr. James Supak, extension cotton agronomist; Dr. Robert Berry, extension plant pathologist; and Dr. Jim Lesedr, cotton extension entomologist.

The afternoon program will include Dr. Kirby W. Hubbman, extension agronomist; Dr. Pat Morrison, extension entomologist; and Allen E. Knutson, Castro County extension agent - entomology, who will discuss corn and sorghum pests.

The Wednesday session, beginning at 9 a.m., will focus on scouting procedures and reports. Instructors will be county extension agents - entomology Greg Cronholm of Hale County

During the afternoon, participants will receive practical training on insect identification and scouting procedures during a field session.

SWARMING TERMITES ABOUND IN SPRING Perhaps nothing is more alarming than for homeowners to suddenly find hundreds or thousands of small winged insects flying around outdoors, particularly around night lights. What is worse is to find these termite swarmers indoors, almost always indicating an infestation somewhere in the house

Swarming is a naturally occurring phenomena for termites; it's the way well - established colonies extend and perpetuate their own kind. Termites swarm outdoors regularly in the spring, with swarms coming from dead trees, fallen logs, fences and outbuildings

When swarmers are found indoors, homeowners should take a calm, reasonable apaproach to solving the problem.

First, make sure the winged insects are termites, since ants

commonly swarm at about the same time. After making sure you have termites, call a professional, a commercial pest control operator who offers a termit service.

TICK INFESTATIONS We have had reports of tick infestations in different areas of Gray County. One of these tick bites has reportedly caused Rocky Mountain Spotted fever in a youngster that lives in the Borger area. However, the bite occurred in the McLean

Ticks can transmit diseases by infecting hosts with microorganizms carried on their mouthparts or in salivary fluids. American dog ticks are carriers of Rocky Mountain spotted fever and tularemia (rabbit fever) and can cause tick paralysis. American dog ticks have previously been identified in our general area of the Panhandle.

Because tick movements and bites are seldom felt, careful and frequent examination for ticks on the body and clothing is imperative. Early removal is important since many disease organisms are not transferred until the tick has fed 2 to 8 hours. Always remove the tick with its mouthparts intact. Hasty removal of an attached tick can break off the mouothparts.

Mouthparts left in the skin can transmit the disease organisms or cause secondary infections. To relax tick mouthparts for easy removal, touch the tick with a hot needle or a few drops of camphor, alcohol, turpentine, kerosene or chloroform. Sometimes the best method is to grasp the tick firmly with tweezers or fingers and remove it with a slow,

steady pull. Always treat the wound with a germicidal agent. If a tick infestation occurs, treat the home, yard and pets at the same time. Examine dogs and cats frequently for ticks. Control light infestations on dogs and cats more than 4 weeks old with weekly applications of dusts containing 5 percent carbaryl (Sevin). Rub the dust to the skin and apply to the animal's sleeping quarters. Continue treatments for as long as needed. Heavy infestations on pets should be handled by a

Light infestations in buildings usally can be controlled with household spray containing 0.5 percent diazinon. Also, a spray containing 0.5 percent cholorpyrifos (Dursban) is registered for controlling brown dog ticks. Apply the insecticides only as light, spot treatments to areas where ticks are found or suspected to be hiding. Do not use these chemical for treating

Treatment around baseboards, window and door casings, wall cracks and in pet sleeping quarters is usually necessary. To control severe infestations in the home, remove the pet from the house and make repeated applications of insecticides at 2 to 4 week intervals. Other insecticides besides those listed are approved for tick control in buildings. Select a spray that does not have an objectionable odor and will not stain paints, wallpaper, tile or rugs.

Tick control in home lawns and other vegetated areas usually can be obtained with sprays or dusts containing diasinon or carbaryl. Use 5 percent carbaryl dust at the rate of 2.5 to 5 pounds per 5,000 square feet of area. If a spray is iused, mix 1 quart of 25 percent diazinon emulsifiable concentrate in 96 gallons of water (2 tablespoons per 3 gallons) and apply 24 gallons of spray per 1,000 square feet of area. Give particular attention to spray applications around building foundations and along roadsides, animal trails and paths used by people.

Some degree of protection against ticks can be obtained by keeping clothing buttoned, shirt tails inside trousers and trouser legs inside tops of socks. Do not sit on the ground or on

Persons who must be in areas suspected of supporting

infestations should examine their clothing, body and hair at least twice daily so that ticks can be removed promptly. Brush along trails should be cleaned or burned and weeds and grass in recreation areas, closely cut and well - kept lawns help control both ticks and their small rodent hosts.

Mario Andretti, one of the principals in last year's ruling that nearly cost Bobby Unser his third Indy victory. will be on the inside of the second row, qualifying at 203.172 Wildcat-Cosworth.

Next, at 201.884, will be teammate Gordon Johncock. the winner of the 1973 race, in which Swede Savage was killed. That was the last driver death before Smiley.

Bill Whittington, the middle member of the first brother trio ever to start the same Indy race, qualified for the outside of the second row at 201.658 in a March. He crashed during practice last Sunday, but a frantic crew effort got the car rebuilt.

Sneva and Don Whittington. the eldest brother, took the inside and middle spots on the third row at 201.172 and 200.725, respectively, in two more Marches. On the outside of that row will be Danny Ongais, still wearing a legbrace as a reminder of his horrifying crash in last year's March at 199.148.

Chip Ganassi, the fastest of the rookies at 197.704 in a Wildcat, took the middle spot on the fourth. The only other former winner in the field. three-time champ Al Unser -Bobby's younger brother put a Longhorn-Cosworth on the inside of the sixth row at 195.567.

Al Unser in 1970-71 was the last driver to win consecutive races, and that will remain the same for at least a year. Brother Bobby passed, the first time a defending champ has sat out since 1958, when Sam Hanks retired. Bobby Unser said he will concentrate on his new job as team manager for 1981 Indy rookie of the year Josele Garza, who starts this year in the 33rd and last position.

Bobby Unser beat Andretti across the finish line by 5.2 seconds a year ago but was stripped of his victory when the official finish was posted the next morning. Stewards penalized Unser a lap for illegally passing cars while returning to the track after a pit stop under a caution flag. Andretti was declared the

winner. A special U.S. Auto Club panel, months later, reversed that decision, saying Unser broke the rule but the penalty was improper because of the long delay in assessing it.

Hite maintains lead at Corning

CORNING, N.Y. (AP) -Driving under pressure in her favorite tournament, Kathy Hite withstood challenges by a half-dozen pursuers Saturday to maintain her lead after three rounds of the \$125,000 Corning Classic.

Hite, whose only victory in eight years on the Ladies **Professional Golf Association** tour was at Corning last year, shot a 1-under-par 71 for a 54-hole tour of 208.

Amy Alcott made up three of the five strokes by which she trailed Hite with a sparkling round of 68. Her round was good for a tie with Sandra Haynie at 6-under 210. The tournament is

scheduled to wind up today on the 6,286-yard Corning Country Club layout. After the front nine, Haynie held a 1-shot lead over Hite,

Lopez, Sandra Spuzich and Patty Sheehan were fourth at 211 - three shots back. Spuzich and Lopez each fired 70 to gain one shot on Hite during the day, while Sheehan sank three birdies in the last seven holes to record

Cathy Morse and Washam were within striking distance

at 4-under 212 with Jan Stephenson alone at 213. The course had dried after heavy rain Friday, and scores reflected the improved

M.J. Smith tied the course record held by five other women with a 66 after shooting 78 the day before. Current money-leader Sally Little pulled within hailing distance of Hite with a 67,

which left her at 215. Hite, who ranks 38th on the money list, appeared close to cracking under the pressure when she bogeyed No. 9 while Haynie was recording a par to drop 8-under and take a 1-shot lead

On the previous hole, Haynie made a birdie 3, while Hite struggled to make par. However, Haynie bogeyed two of the next three holes to give Hite the lead for good.

Philadelphia plans to beat Lakers at their own fast-breaking game

AP Sports Writer PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Philadelphia 76ers. burned by the trapping defense and fastbreak offense of Los Angeles in the opener of the National Basketball Association championship series, hope to beat the Lakers at their own game today.

"Running is our game, too," said 76ers Coach Billy Cunningham. "It could have been us with a 41-point third quarter Thursday if we had gone to the boards.'

The Lakers' aggressive defense in Game 1 Thursday night triggered a fast break that turned a 15-point deficit into a 16-point lead in a span of 101/2 minutes of the second half as Los Angeles took a 1-0 lead in the best-of-seven

series with a 124-117 victory. "The results of what they were succeeding with made us less aggressive offensively," said 76ers forward Julius Erving. "We got entirely into a defensive

like front-runners, which we were, we played like we were trying to hold them off."

The Lakers, who turned over the ball 15 times in the first half when they fell behind 61-50 at intermission, forced 12 Philadelphia turnovers in the second half with their half-court trapping defense.

"Hopefully, we'll be a little bit smarter against their press next time," said 76ers forward Bobby Jones.

Los Angeles has dominated the playoffs this season as no NBA team ever has, winning nine straight games,

including sweeps of Phoenix and San Antonio besides the victory over Philadelphia.

The only other team in NBA history to win nine consecutive postseason games was the Minneapolis Lakers. But Minneapolis did it over two seasons, 1949 and

A victory in Game 2, which will be nationally televised by CBS starting at 1 p.m. EDT Sunday, also would be the Lakers' eighth straight road playoff victory, dating to the final game of the 1980

championship series won by Los Angeles in six games.

"It's starting to get planted in the players' minds that they have accomplished something significant," said Lakers Coach Pat Riley. "But the important thing is just to win the series."


'The impact of a loss on Philly today would be tremendous in a negative way. They have to play like it's a seventh game," he said.

"That's the way we'll be playing it. We know what a tremendous advantage it would be to go back to Los Angeles with a 2-0 lead."





Golfer's husband says threats led her to file for annulment

FORT WORTH (AP) - The husband of golfer Jan Stephenson has filed court documents that claim his wife was forced against her will into trying to annul their marriage.

Larry Kolb obtained a temporary restraining order Friday that freezes his wife's assets except for "reasonable and necessary sums for the ordinary course of living and the ordinary course of

She was ordered to appear in Tarrant County District Court June 4 to show why the order should not become an injunction. Attorneys said a jury trial could begin as early

Stephenson left Kolb April 3

and petitioned April 19 to declare her marriage void because she still was married to Fort Worth businessman Eddie Vossler. She said that when she

married Kolb in Phoenix March 5, she didn't know she still was married to Vossler. Her petition said her

marriage to Vossler was "on or about October 1979 and has not been dissolved.' But in documents filed late

Friday, Kolb said his wife never was married to anyone else and denied all of her allegations, including those that he used fraud and duress to induce Stephenson into marriage.

Kolb also asked the court to appoint an independent third party as guardian of Stephenson's estate, an action he says is necessary to protect her.

Kolb, the golfer's manager who was a partner of Vossler's until January, said Stephenson's actions "are directly controlled by Mr. Vossler against the will and best interest" of his wife.

But Stephenson, reached by telephone in Corning, N.Y., where she is playing in a tournament, denied the charges, saying Vossler never had done anything to hurt her.



Lifestyles Children's games gain "class"

By MARILYN POWERS This is known as the age of computers, the electronic age. And the games people play are keeping pace with the changing times. Batteries, power cords and computers enable players to shoot down enemy spacecraft or chase colored blobs

through a maze,

accompanied by appropriate light and sound effects. Everyone, it seems, is getting into the act. The widespread distribution of game machines makes it possible to play Pac - Man at the pizza parlor, Centipede in a convenience store, Battle Zone in a bar, or Space Duel at the supermarket. Or choose from a wide selection of games in an amusement gallery full of machines. When it's time to go home, the game can be continued on a nome video game system that

hooks up to a television set. It all began about five years ago with the invention of Space Invaders, the first of the video games. More games followed, with the majority developed around a space battle theme and others pertaining to a particular

Pampa video game gallery manager Milton "Cap'n" Kelley said his most popular games now are Pac - Man. Ms. Pac - Man and Alpine Ski. Other current favorites include Donkey Kong. Star Gate and Centipede.

"For some people, shooting down a bad guy is very appealing. But the fun types of games that are less obviously aggressive are becoming more appealing."

Kelley said. A game may enjoy peak popularity for two to four months, although some games may be popular for onger periods. Pac - Man has been a favorite since its development in 1980.

"I will get in a new game and as soon as they learn how to play it, if it's not a challenge, it will lose its popularity," Kelley said.

Who plays video games? Just about everyone, it seems. "My customers are ages 6 to 70. The age range varies with the time of day,' said Kelley

The cost of this type of entertainment depends on the skill of the player. Most games are 25 cents each, and if a player scores high enough, he can win extended time on the game

"A good arcade player may have to spend only \$1 per night. Just for an evening of enjoyment, the average player may spend \$5 to \$10.

"I have guys who can play for hours on a quarter. A good player can get half an hour out of one game. An average

player can make one game last 5 minutes. The games are set up and engineered for the occasional player, A game can be over in 1 to 11/2 minutes unless the player's pretty good. Eyesight and hand coordination is a must for playing," Kelley said.

The games can be habit forming, with teens choosing to spend their money, on Pac -Man instead of candy or soft drinks. The temptation to substitute Star Gate for science class can be so great that a truancy policy is enforced in Kelley's gallery. No students are allowed on the premises during school hours, and the manager retains the right to check I.D.s during class time.

"I have whole families that come in. The games are very addictive. I had one guy who was kicking and pounding on the games and swearing. I told him he couldn't come back for two weeks. Four days later he was back. apologizing and asking to play, and I haven't had any more trouble with him. Kelley said.

"This type of business is expanding, not hurting. People will skimp on food to pay for their recreation," he

The games' addictive qualities may be one good reason why businesses like Kelley's can keep their doors

'One misconception I run into a lot is that people ask me how to start an arcade (thinking that with the high volume of customers, profits are high). I have to have a high volume of business all the time to stay in business because each game costs only 25 cents," he said.

One game represents a considerable investment, especially since costs rose 6 to 8 percent at the beginning of this year. Average price per game is \$2500 to \$3000. and some units are as expensive as \$4000. Those who buy the games must also buy a license for \$200, plus \$15 tax per machine. For 10 or more machines the licensing fee is upped to \$500. Laws that may raise taxes and limit the number of games owned are consideration. And if repairs are needed, the owner may have to ship the machine back to the company he bought it from.

'I have problems with static electricity. People build up a charge, and it affects the games. I have all my games grounded, and wire woven into the carpet, and I still have problems." Kelley said.

Home video games have developed right along with

their commercial - sized counterparts. These home systems consist of a base unit which attaches to a television set, control levers, and game cartridges. Major home game manufacturers include Activision (which makes Atari), Magnavox (Odyssey), Mattel Electronics (Intellivision) and Radio Shack. Price of the base units, usually with one complimentary game cartridge, range from \$160 to \$250. Additional game cartridges average about \$30 each, and some cartridges that have extra features are

\$50 each. Add to this any extra paraphernalia such as different control levers, or 'joysticks," needed to play certain games on some models, and a home video system can quickly turn into a sizable investment, putting a higher price tag on home entertainment than ever before. Over 40 different games are

currently available for home enjoyment. Some cartridges may have more than one game, or different degrees of difficulty within the same game. Like the game machines in amusement galleries, many of the cartridges are based on an outer space theme. Most sports are represented also, along with popular games such as tic - tac - toe. checkers, chess, backgammon, pachinko and

Outer space and traditional games are just the tip of the iceberg, however. When these become old hat, a video game owner can go out and choose among cartridges with a gambling, automobile driving, or standard war theme. Still bored? Try the world of finance, or solve a maze. If the future in outer space isn't quite the thin'g. step back into the past with games based on a medieval or Wild West theme

This is all well and good for entertainment, but, one may ask, can't the home systems be used for something more constructive and beneficial,

The answer is yes. Educational cartridges are also available to improve spelling, concentration, reasoning, memory and mathematical skills, and some cartridges teach the player how to program their game system like a computer

"We have some kids who play the games; and I don't know if they're even in school yet," said Pampa store clerk Mary Maggard.

One benefit common to most of both home and gallery - size games is the

resulting development of the player's eye - hand coordination. At Mission Valley Elementary School in Fremont, Calif., selected home video games are used to develop this coordination in students with learning disabilities.

Despite what some may consider as too big a price tag, home video games are selling.

"We sold between 85 and 100 Odyssey systems at Christmas. For every video game we sell, we may sell six to 20 cartridges," Ms. Maggard said.

The games got off to a relatively slow start in the marketplace because many people were afraid of them, said Pampa store manager Art Owen. Some were afraid the games would damage their television sets, but sales picked up as customers learned more about the systems.

Sales are steadily growing. A lot of our tomers are people who see the games in someone else's home and like them," Owen

Home computer systems enable players to take things


a step farther. The computers, with an average price tag of about \$400 plus \$30 for each game cartridge, enable a Texas gamester to play chess with someone in Oregon. To do this, the unit is hooked up to a network system called Compuserve. which the player can call up and use for \$10 to \$12 per hour. An individual code identifies each user, with bills for the service sent out periodically. Computers have the added advantage of performing many other functions in addition to entertainment.

Besides the games themselves, manufacturers are also cashing in on the video game craze through sales of products with a video game theme. A Pac - Man player can get a Pac - Man T shirt or greeting card, and an Atari owner can buy an Atari jacket. How - to booklets and paperbacks on the video games can be found on most book racks. There's even a recording on the market entitled, "Pac - Man Fever."

"Cap'n" Kelley may have summed up the situation very well: "I don't really know where it all will end.

AMY STEWART

Little girl from Lefors does big things in business

For Amy Stewart, 1975 was a lean year. The newly divorced 30 - year - old found herself saddled with two small boys, a \$40,000 debt and a shaky business venture.

"I was ready to commit hara - kiri," recalls the attractive brunett. "I had no idea what I was getting myself into.

How did Amy Stewart get herself into such straits? First of all, she was raised in the small West Texas town of Lefors (about 12 miles from Pampa, just north of Amarillo), where her dad worked as a plant foreman. After attending Hardin Simmons University in Abilene for a year and a half, she got married and started working as a secretary to help finish putting her husband through school.

The marriage began to fall apart and, before long, the petite Panhandler was a single parent. "I really didn't know where the money was going to come from," Stewart admits. "I just knew that if I hung in there and had faith, something would turn

Knowing primarily just secretarial skills, she took a position with an independent oil and gas consultant in Midland as secretary and office manager. Using a nearby secretarial and personnel service for her office's work overlaod, she became friends with the agency's owner. Two and a half years later, Stewart bought out Superior Office Service (the secretarial - help portion of the firm) and suddenly was in business for herself in the West

Selling her house and using the \$6,000 profit as a down payment, she approached a local bank for a \$40,000 loan — which, to her amazement, was approved. Asking no questions and grateful for the opportunity, the young mother immediately went to

work revamping the office and soliciting new business.

Starting with a small staff, Stewart worked day and night to make sure all the work was done well and on time. Her efforts paid off. By 1978, when the personnel agency sharing the same office suite closed, she was in the position to immediately open her new personnel agency - Energy Placement Service - in addition to her secretarial and temporary - service firms

Since that time, Stewart's businesses have grown steadily. For example, her personnel firm grossed only \$30,000 in its first year; it took in more than \$40,000 last August alone. All three companies together reaped revenues totaling almost \$1 million

Energy Plus Inc. now employs 12 full - time people plus numerous temporaries — the source of two - thirds of its income - and offers a full range of secretarial and personnel services.

The industrious executive attributes her success mainly to hard work and determination. "Possibly one of my strong points is that I can hold up when practically everyone else expects me to crack. Another thing is my good skills background which can be attributed to Mrs. Helen Lett, who insited I get it right in high school. Also, my past experiences - the struggles to start my own business - have helped make me a different person, both emotionally and professionally. I also believe in doing topnotch work. After all, it's a highly competitive world out there.'

Midland's recently booming economy has created both opportunities and problems for Stewart's business. "It has generated a strong demand for administrative and clerical services, she notes. "Firms like ours have been springing up all over. Obviously, this has been great for us, but with the increased business has come a shortage of

good, qualified personnel. So lately we've often had to turn down some spur - of - the - moment jobs

because there simply weren't enough people to perform the assignments.


Energy Plus' growth has been little shy meteoric: Its temporary - services work week has risen from 300 hours to an average of over 1,709 hours, with peak weeks exceeding 2,000 hours, "People just can't believe it when I tell them we handle about 125 people a day - that's not even including temporary and personnel service." claims Stewart. "We're literally working at 100 percent capacity eight hours or more a day.

Besides spending usually frenetic days at the office. Stewart serves on the board of directors and is a charter member of the Permian Basin Association of Personnel Consultants and is a member of the Uptown Business and Professional Women's Club in Midland. On the national level, she's a member of the National Association of Secretarial Services, the National Association of Temporary Services and the National Association of Personnel Consultants, as well as participating in the Texas Association of Personnel Consultants on the state scene.

Still, the gently freckled business - woman has more energy than ever, with big plans for the future. "I have to constantly keep myself busy with new challenges - otherwise I get bored," she admits. "But so far, this business has never boring." For example, in February of this year, she launched a new microfilming service which cover all three aspects of the process - shooting an developing, transforming into usable form and shredding the paper documents.

The best advantage to microfilming documents is that a business can save 95 percent of their storage space," she said.

Remembering those tough early years, Stewart says, "I don't really know why that bank gave m the loan to start my business. I was a nobody. guess they were trying to help promote busine and stimulate area growth." For whatever reason both Amy Stewart and Midland are glad they did.

Christopher Reeve's career is flying

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) Everybody says that Christopher Reeve does all the other things he does — his Broadway plays and his acting in films such as "Deathtrap" - because he wants to get as far away from the Superman image as he can. Well, everybody's wrong. "I don't do those things to

deny 'Superman,''' says Reeve. "I do them because I am an actor and the important thing for an actor has always been to do a variety

He says that was drummed into him when he was still very young. He was 9 or 10 then and he would hang around a rep company that played in his hometown, Princeton, N.J. He saw how the actors he idolized played different roles

And he is really proud of the "Superman" movies. He says that playing that role is

very difficult.
"People sometimes write that I do plays like 'The Fifth of July' and parts like 'Deathtrap' because they are more of an acting challenge than 'Superman,'" he says. "But it's just the opposite. When I did 'Deathtrap,' and had all those great lines to say, it was comparatively

easy.
"But playing Superman is sis is never on the dialogue but on the special effects. And wearing that costume is hard, too — it has no pockets, so there's nothing for me to put my hands into. And Superman can't stand around with his hands on his hips. That makes it a real acting challenge.

CHRISTOPHER REEVE is proud of the "Superman" movies and has no intention of quitting the role. "I think a 'Superman' every three years would be just about right," he says. Some of his New York acting buddies scoff at film. He doesn't know much

"Superman," feeling Reeve has sold out his standards by playing that super-commercial role. Another mistake. "Superman' has been absolutely great for me," he says. "It did for me exactly what I had hoped it would do. It brought me enough

notice so that now I can choose what I want to do." He has another film coming out by Christmas onsignore." And now he's about to head for England to do the third "Superman"

Sean Connery quit playing James Bond, a comparable role to Superman, but Reeve isn't thinking of quitting. He says he would do more after "Superman III" provided Superman III" - provided the scripts were good and they gave him enough time

in between to do other "I think a 'Superman' every three years would be just about right," he says. "Actu-ally, I don't want to do more

than one picture of any kind every year and a half." He has three criteria for choosing parts. An actor once told him of the three criteria, early in his career, although he doesn't remember who it was that told him. But he says he has stuck to

them religiously. "The first is to only do a part if I can't stand seeing somebody else do it," he says. "Second, only do a part if I'm going to have fun and learn something while I'm doing it. And, third, only do a part if the audience will have fun and learn something while watching it."

He says his career has sometimes zoomed when he has done parts that people advised him not to do, and vice versa.

"People advised me not to do 'Superman," he says. "They told me it would be harmful to my career. But, of course, it has been very good. And, on the other hand, I did a play called 'A Matter of Gravity' with Katharine Hepburn and peo-ple predicted that would make me a star. It didn't." But, as it turned out, it

Construction is continuing, Aguillon said, and should continue through the Dec. 31 program cutoff. But the goal no longer is 200 units.

"I doubt they'll be able to do all 200 with the limited funds available to them," Cabral said. At last count, more than \$214,000 had been spent, and Aguillon estimated the unit cost at from \$4,500 to \$5,000 for each additional bathroom to be completed before December.

Cabral said an estimate of 120 to 135 bathrooms would be close to accurate.

Still, Cabral said, "Based on what they've used and the number done, the cost is comparable to other cities using (city-hired) work crews." Cabral added that more than a dozen towns in the Rio Grande Valley are participating in similar programs.

Cabral said his audit revealed no evidence of fraud.

"There were a lot of allegations, but not enough evidence to confirm fraud or any conspiracy to defraud," he said.

Maldonado said, "The fact they're being built indicates no misappropriations. They (HUD) felt we need more attention focused on management.


