DALLAS—(AP)—Latest returns from the Texas Election Bureau show Walter Rogers of Pampa has edged into the run-off spot in the 18th congressional district race.

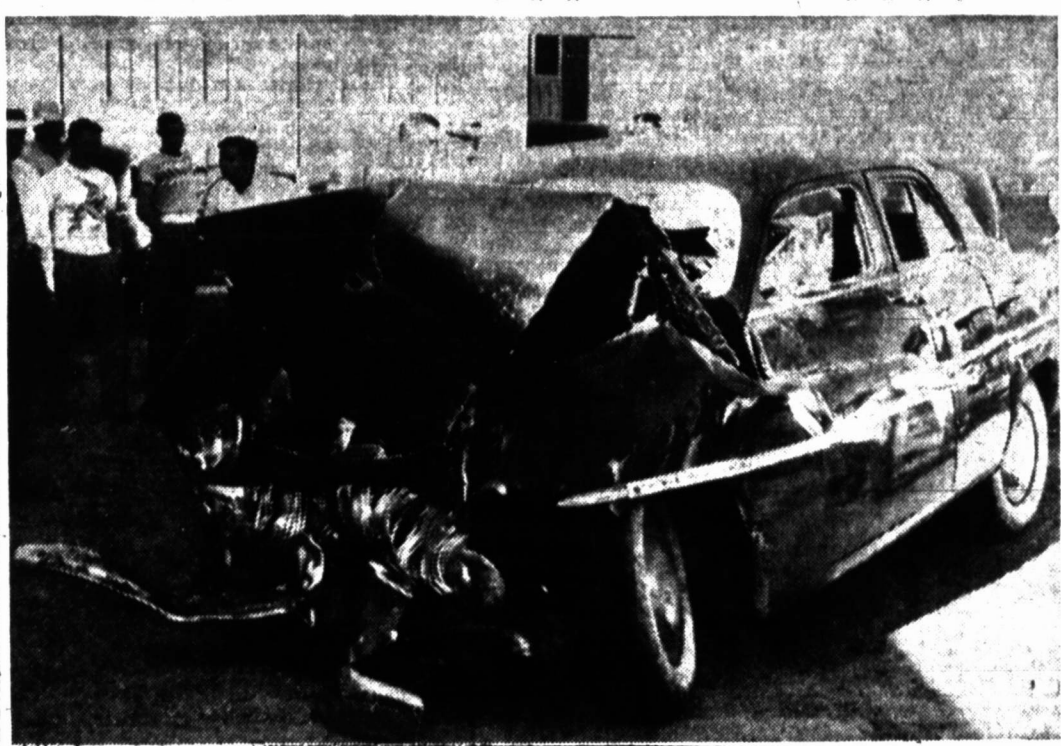
Preparedness Hearing Starts

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Congress members called on top military leaders today for an appraisal of the nation's preparedness and an accounting of the billions spent on defense since 1947.

Winner of the run-off will face Ben Guill of Pampa, Texas' only Republican congressman, in the November general election.

I've spent considerable time around a hospital lately — as a visitor, not a patient. And I now feel qualified to offer a few hints for those wishing to "cheer up" unfortunate friends and relatives going through a hospital stay.

Resist the impulse to greet the friend or relative laid low by illness with: "So you decided you need a vacation. Pretty soft!" The last three out of four persons to pop their heads through the hospital door have probably already hit upon that particular "light approach."

And speaking of the light approach, which seems to be the only accepted one there is today for greeting those in misery: DON'T OVER-DO IT. The person whose world is temporarily bordered by his own aches and pains, finds it hard to rally to the too light touch.

Plain old-fashioned sympathy may seem corny, but it is sure to be appreciated by the suffering patient who has had nothing but kidding from well-intentioned friends and relatives trying to cheer him up.

Bring no troubles of your own with you. There's just one thing wrong with the world so far as the sick person is concerned and that is whatever has gotten him down. So concentrate on that with him — if you want him to feel you really sympathize.

If you're sending a card in lieu of a visit, don't fall for the so-called funny kind that treat a visit to a hospital as a huge joke. It may be delivered when the patient is wondering whether or not he's really going to make it. If so, its humor will, most certainly not be appreciated.

In fact, any note you write yourself is sure to be a safer bet than some printed message you pick out of a stack of get-well-quick cards.

**REFRIGERATE ONIONS**  
When onions begin to sprout they may be wrapped in waxed paper or aluminum foil and placed in the refrigerator. Just make sure that they are tightly wrapped so their odor won't escape and affect other foods.

**LIVER IS NUTRITIOUS**  
Beef, pork, and lamb liver are just as nutritious as calves liver and much less expensive. When there are children in the family it is wise to use liver at least once a week.

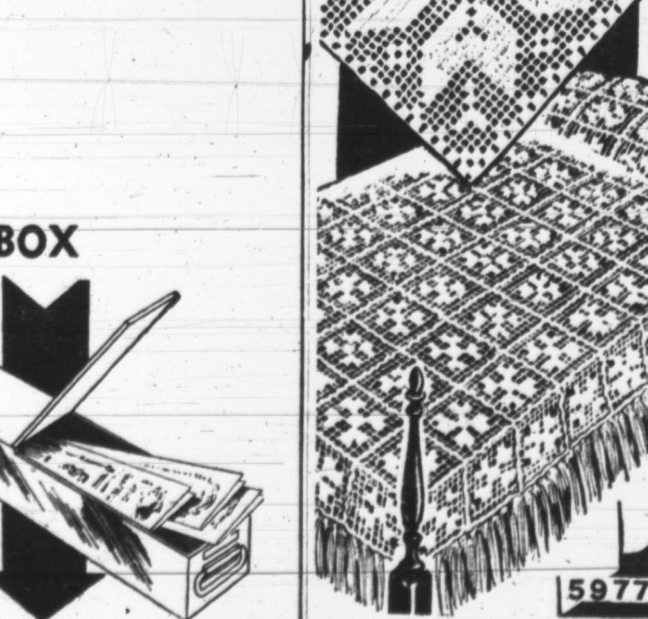

Girls in their teens, whose interests shift overnight from jeans to dancing frocks, often find themselves with fingernails which don't quite match their new glamor selves.

The years of tomboyish concern have left their mark in hangnails, wild cuticles and ridged surfaces. It takes more than a quick session with a nail file to correct this condition. But it can be done — with a bit of time and patience.

The free hours of summer vacation can be turned to golden advantage if you begin your renovation now.

General improvement is your first goal. Special problems can be dealt with in their turn. Get into the habit of real manicures. Instead of continuing the hasty scissor-trims of your old routine, try shaping your nails with an emery board.

Work it from side to center. It is harmful to saw back and forth. Never file deeply into the corners. Soreness develops, and the nails tend to break.

Extreme points, unattractive at any age, detract particularly from the charm of a young girl. A soft oval is preferable.

Smooth away the ridges of your nails with a buffer and a powder polish. Move in one direction only to prevent overheating.

The next step is cuticle care — an important one since short nails look even stubbier when an uncared-for cuticle further diminishes the apparent length.

Don't maul your cuticles in a burst of sudden disgust. Gentle, day-to-day treatment will pay the highest dividends. After every hand-washing, push your cuticles back with a towel.

In addition, press them back at manicuring time with a cotton-wrapped orange stick dipped in cuticle oil or remover. Never out-cuticles with your scissors except to trim a severe hangnail. Good results can be obtained from mass-

## Swim Team to Meet Japanese in Dual Meet

SEATTLE — (AP) — America's best swimmers and the marvelous Marshall — husky John of Australia and Yale — were due to top an ocean today as the prize for shattering a satellite of records.

Bound for Japan, the squad of 14 splashes, coach Bob Kiputh and manager John Curran were to fly out of San Francisco this afternoon and into Tokyo Wednesday night. Marshall will be along as a guest but will appear only in an exhibition race in Japan.

The team was picked last night at the close of the senior men's National A.A.U. outdoor swimming championships. It will swim in meets with Japan's best at Tokyo and Osaka.

The best-guested Marshall swam to new records at nearly every recognized distance from 400 yards to a mile in Colman Pool.

Yesterday he knocked over the American 800-yard standard. In four days he wrecked the world marks in the half-mile and mile and American records in the mile and quarter mile and assorted odd distances. He anchored the winning 800-yard relay team to another U.S. record.

John led the New Haven Swim Club to the meet championship and wound up as an individual high point man.

Even so, it was far from a one-man show. Richard Cleveland of the University of Hawaii earned a surprise triumph in the 110-yard freestyle yesterday, beating the American record. James P. Thomas, University of North Carolina, star, twice bettered the American standard for the 350-yard individual medley.

Thomas swam a preliminary heat in 3:56.1 and topped that with a 3:55.1 performance in the finals. Adolph Kiefer was the recognized champion, credited with a 1940 time of 3:58.6.

Cleveland was a couple of seconds off the record when he won his qualifying heat but ran away from the field in the title clash. His time of 3:52.7 was the record 58.4 set by Otto Jaretz of Chicago in 1940.

Purged — as he had been all through the meet — by little Ford Konno of Hawaii, Marshall chopped 1.1 seconds off the 800 free-style record and Konno followed in subsequent time. Marshall swam it in 9:37.5, Konno in 9:51.1 and the record, set by Bill Smith of Hawaii in 1942 was 9:54.8.

The chunky twirler scattered five Gasser safeties, allowing none to go for extra bases, despite the fact that he and his teammates committed six errors afield. But the sloppy fielding was offset by an eleven-hit attack that staggered Berger hurler Eddie Carnett, although the Gasser tosser weathered the storm and went the route.

It gave the Oilers a clean sweep of the short series.

They open tonight at 8:30 in a "ladies night" performance against the lowly Clovis Pioneers, sending George Payte to the mound.

Last night's tilt opened with both Parker and Carnett settling down to business. The twosome had little trouble through the first four innings and the Oiler laborer was particularly effective, permitting only two Gasser safeties through the fifth inning.

But the Oilers, after being blanked on three hits during the first three frames, teed off in the fourth. Jimmy Littlejohn gave the tie to Johnny Jeandron when he dropped his fly ball, and the blunder seemed to start the Pampa machine. After Joe Fortin fouled out to Clavitter, Virgil Richardson singled to left field. Don Ricketson then steamed a ground rule double to left that scored Jeandron and sent Richardson to third. Ricketson hit bunched through a hole in left field fence and was ruled a two-baser by the officials.

Ox Engel drove both Ricketson and Richardson home a few seconds later with a line drive single over second. Carnett then whiffed Martin and got Parker on a grounder from short to first to end the inning.

The hosts added another marker in the bottom of the fifth when Deck Woldt powered a double to centerfield, and Jeandron followed with a single. The Oiler shortstop advanced to second on the throw in and pitched third, but was left stranded when Fortie went out, short to first, and Richardson struck out.

In the top of the sixth, the Oiler infield really began to disintegrate, and before it could be halted the Gassers used the Pampa mistakes to the best advantage. They knotted the count at 4-4 in two hits, a walk and three Oiler blunders. Woldt bobbled Eddie Carnett's ground ball to start things. Littlejohn and Leonard singled in succession, but both safeties dropped short and the sacks were loaded with none away. Earl Perry grounded sharply to Jeandron on a potential double-play ball, but the Pampa shortstop booted the ball in to left field and two runs scored. Leonard moving to third and Perry to second, Parker then advanced to his own woes by throwing wild, permitting both runners to advance, and narrow his advantage to only 4-3. He whiffed Fred Parker before Ted Clavitter received credit for the only Gasser run-batted-in of the evening by scoring Perry on a high fly to left. Nim Free walked and Ernie Catone pushed a slow-roller back to the mound. The Oiler chucker came off the hill, fielded the ball cleanly, and proceeded to throw into right field, moving Free to third and Catone to second. Burnett popped out to end the damaging frame with the count tied at 4-4.

It wasn't long, however, until the Oilers retaliated with a three run uprising. Dick Dawson led off in the home-half of the seventh with a double, and Woldt singled him home with the lead run.

Jeandron followed suit when he slashed a triple to right field, scoring Woldt, and when Freer Parker threw into the Oiler dugout trying to cut the run off, he stroled home with the final run, unharmed.

The contest, although ragged in spots, was fast moving. The first four and one-half innings were completed in a little more than 30 minutes, before the Oiler scoring started.

Deck Woldt led the Oiler attack with three hits in four trips. The contest marked nine straight attempts in which Joe Fortin has gone hitless, one of the longest slumps in the W-T-NM loop slugger's career. His average still hangs above the .400 mark, however.

## Arkansas' Censure Deemed Unjust by Referee of TCU Tilt

TEMPLE — (AP) — The referee of the controversial Arkansas-Texas Christian football game last Saturday, which came Southwest Conference censure of Arkansas for rough play, said today the action was unjust.

# Construction Awards Stay High in State

AT LYN — (AP) — Texas construction awards remained at a high level this week, non-residential lettings accounting for more than one-half of the \$25,241,971 total.

Non-residential contracts totaled \$15,024,180. The Texas Contractor Building Trade Union announced. This included \$5,150,826 for schools, \$4,852,230 for business buildings, \$1,435,904 for hospitals and hotels, \$845,101 for churches and theaters, and \$740,119 for public buildings.

Residential awards amounted to \$7,024,354. Lettings on 652 low-cost homes totaled \$4,453,200; 78 residences costing more than \$7,000 each, \$1,847,000; apartments providing 80 one-family units, \$480,955; 21 duplexes, \$143,354.

Engineering contracts added \$5,193,282.

The 1950 accumulative total rose to \$532,254,510.

## School Transfer Applications Due by August 1

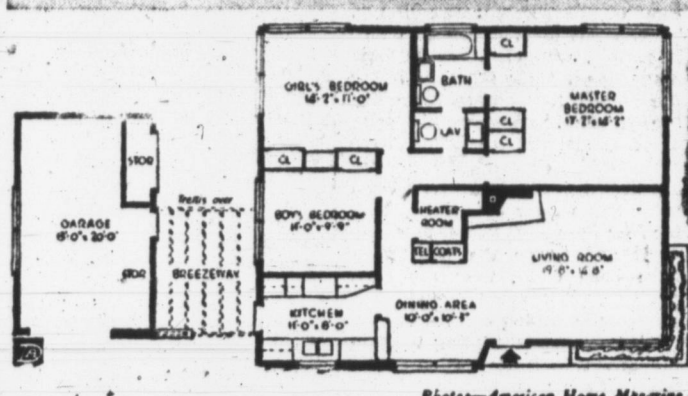

## Texas Yellow Pine Orders Increase, Association Says

HOUSTON — Orders booked for Texas yellow pine during the week ended July 8 totaled 87 percent more than at the same period in 1949. However, orders booked during the week were off 5.3 percent under the previous week ended July 1, according to a weekly report based on sampling comparisons from 23 identical Texas lumber mills.

"Actual production sagged again after a sudden increase during the week ended July 1, which proceeded a week of hampered mill operations due to rain," said T. B. Edens, president of the Texas Lumber Manufacturers Association.

Shipments of Texas yellow pine for the week ended July 8 were down 17.4 percent from the previous week, but showed an 18.3 percent gain over the comparable period of last year.

Orders on hand at the end of the week of July 8 were up 4.2 percent over the week ended July 1, and up 77 percent over the same period of 1949.

Stocks on hand for the week ending July 8 dwindled 1.3 percent from the previous week; and 38.1 percent under the week of July 8, 1949.

## Manufacturers Are Asked to Supply Bureau With Data

The manufacturing and development committee of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce has received word from the Texas Bureau of Business Research stating that seven local businessmen have not, as yet, filled out questionnaires for information to be included in the 1950 edition of the directory of Texas manufacturers.

The committee points out that it is very important at this particular time, that all local manufacturing concerns be included in the directory and that they should fill out their questionnaires and mail them to the bureau in Austin.

The directory will provide all wholesalers and retailers with a reliable source of information about manufacturers in Texas. The directory will also be made available to the Defense Department to be used in connection with the war effort.

If no questionnaire was received, the committee requests that manufacturing concerns send the name, address, home office, type of organization, name and title of the principal officers, date of establishment, territory covered, number of employees, and the products manufactured to the bureau. Such information will be listed for each manufacturer in the state.

## Home Paint Sprayer Easy to Use if Simple Rules Heeded

Application of all types of protective and decorative coating by means of a spray gun has developed so that its advantages now can be realized by the home handyman.

For most home painting jobs, use a small capacity unit usually powered with one-quarter H. P. motor and spraying at approximately 30 pounds pressure.

Before starting, prepare the surface in the same manner you would for brush painting — sanding and dusting wood and thoroughly cleaning metal.

To mix the coating material, add thinner according to the directions on the label. In most cases, these mixing directions will be the same as for brushing. Check by testing the mixture in the gun. If too thick, it will splatter. If too thin, it covers poorly and will run. Properly proportioned, it forms an even coating.

After the material is properly mixed, it should be strained through a piece of common screen wire or regular paint strainer. This will remove any dirt or lumps from the material.

To obtain the proper gun nozzle adjustment for the type work to be done, make a test pattern by holding the nozzle six inches away from a sheet of paper, pull the trigger and then quickly release it. A round pattern should appear and will run. Properly proportioned, it forms an even coating.

## Anyone Can Garden in Home-Made Window Box

Everyone can garden the window box way, whether he lives in a suburb or a tall apartment dwelling. And now is the time to be thinking of it, for boxes can be constructed during the winter weeks so they will be ready for the earliest start in the spring.

The illustration shows the dimensions for a single window. If made of cypress, it will last well, and cost little to build. Where large or multiple windows demand great length, the other dimensions may be larger in proportion, or boxes for each window made.

Remember that window boxes are a decoration for the house. They should harmonize with it, and improve its appearance. The boxes should usually be painted to match the dominant color of the house, or of its trim. The flowers will look best if they make a contrasting note, providing an accent of color.

Perhaps the finest of all window box flowers are petunias, because they blossom constantly throughout the summer, and provide so interesting a variety of color, form and habit. The balcony type petunias, which produce trailing vine-like stems, make graceful festoons which drape from the boxes.

Tall nasturtiums, particularly the new doubles, including Golden Gleam, and its hybrids, give the same effect as the balcony type petunias; and they are excellent window box subjects. Fragrant flowers, such as mignonette, ten-weeks' stocks, and dwarf nasturtiums, are doubly attractive.

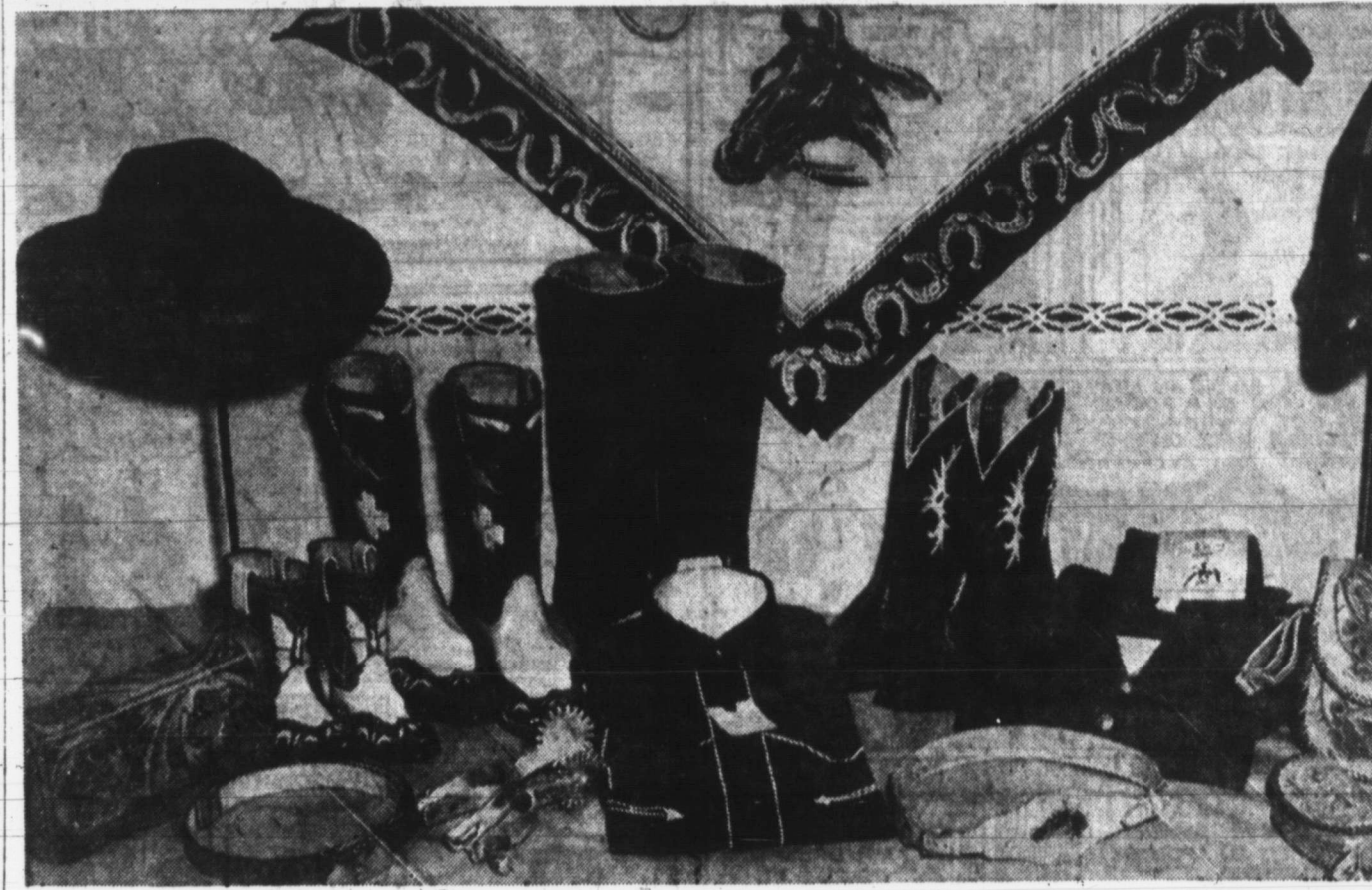

**Bach Is Welcomed To Communist Side**

BERLIN — (AP) — Composer Johann Sebastian Bach, died 200 years ago but Russian and German Communists say he set their doctrines to music.

The Soviet control commission's official newspaper, Taegliche Rundschau, welcomed Bach into the Communist fold.

An editorial in the paper said he put into music "thoughts of world development which were later put in legal form by Marx and Engels and now instituted in the Soviet Union and the people's democracies."

The Russian-occupied city of Leipzig, where Bach lived much of his life and died, yesterday began an eight-day festival celebrating the 200th anniversary of his death of July 29, Moscow sent two delegations, headed by leading Soviet Composer Dmitri Shostakovich, to the festival.

**German Reds Said Forming Air Force**

BERLIN — (AP) — American intelligence officers today investigated reports that East Germany's Communist government is organizing an air force, in addition to army and naval units already in training.

"They said they were inclined to believe the reports, which were published in the U.S. high commission's German newspaper, Neue Zeitung.

The paper said the Communists were camouflaging the air force under the name "air police," the same tactic they used in forming their land "people's police" and naval "sea police."

The western allies already have denounced the people's police as an illegal army.

**Michigan Village Street Confused**

COOPERSVILLE, Mich. — (AP) — When you're on the main street in this Western Michigan village, municipal officials claim you're on River Street.

But heads of Ottawa County, where Coopersville is located, insist the street is 60th Avenue. And there are others in town who call it Eastmanville Street, Ottawa Street and Pine Street.

Confusion in names applies not only to the six-block stretch of U. S. Highway 16 that forms the village's main thoroughfare. The highway itself is labeled Arthur Street by the county and Randell Street by the village.

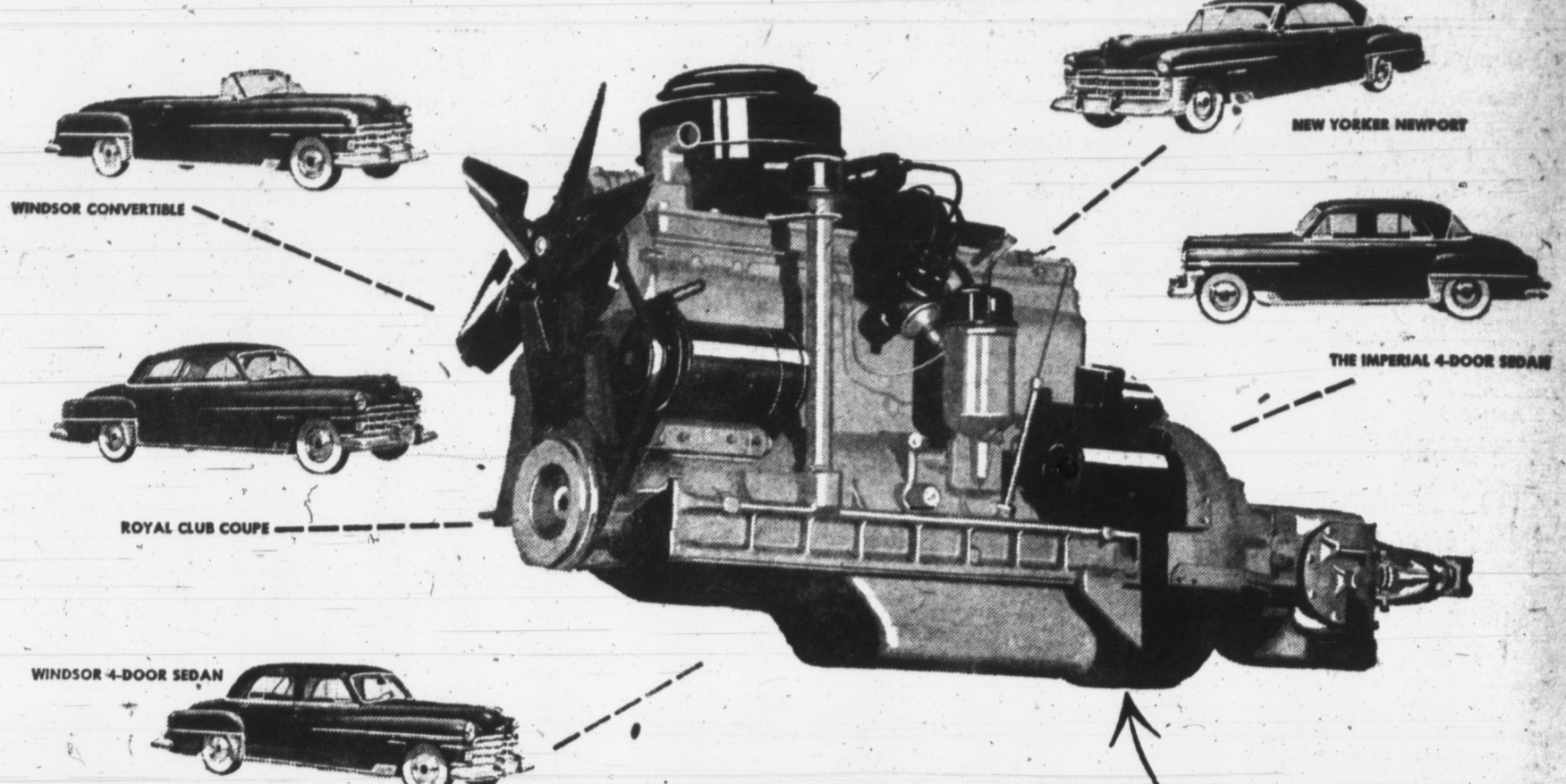
