

However, the primitive masses of Asia, who are treading the paths their ancestors trod turies ago, don't know what the Red ism really means. They only know what Bolshevist agents tell them: that communism is the savior of downtrodden manity, that it will take lands from the rich and give to the poor, that it will help their tables with plenty.

These specious promises ar fascinating to unrerprivileged folk. I've spent a lot of time in the Orient and can tell you that there are in that part of the world untold millions of peasants who never know anything but hunger.

Naturally they think with their bellies. And broadly speaking it is on this basis that the ideo logical approach must be made to them. They want to know what democracy will do to umprove their lowly lives.

Let's take a specific example China, which currently is under control of a Communist government, and previously was ruled by Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist regime. And here let it be pointed out that regimentation doesn't mean popular support. The fact that the people formerly obeyed the Nationalist government, and now obey the Red regime, doesn't necessarily mean that they approve of either.

China with its 500,000,000 people has offered communism a great field. Most of this huge population lives by farming, and the number of people is too big in relation to the land available. Some of the war loads have been taking as high as 75 percent of the peasant's livelihood, in cash or in crops.

Communism has met this situation by promising a redistribu-tion of the land rule by the proletariat; and national soveregnty. Those are fine phrases and are likely to catch on, until the common man finds out that he has been bilked - when it may be too late for him to effect a change.
So democracy must back its

ideological campaign in Asia with concrete programs for a new world. And nautrally this will mean continuation of the material help which the western world already is giving the Orient.





omething has gone out of Amer-

ican life. All the moral leadership we used to have is gone, too. A presumptuous set of people told us our form of government was good enough for Jefferson's day, but not good enough for ours. So they gave us, in the name of "welfare," new versions of the old old absolutism of Europe. We have been listening for so long to these people in our midst that we have forgotten we once had a

tried and true American foreign

policy.

When we were a nation of only five million or so, we defied the British, we talked up to Napoleon, we routed the Barbary pirates when no other nation dared to do it. Later, we told Spain she could not reconquer South America, we told Russia to get out of our Pacific coast lands, and we ordered Napoleon III not to set up a satellite state in Mexico. This was not truculence. It was the opposite. We held that no nation ought ever to conquer any other nation. The policy was great and successful because it was morally right.

It is sheer nonsense to say we were protected by the ocean. The British controlled the seas. They stirred up the Indians all around us. They burned Washington, but we didn't scare easily. The Spanish had their frontier in Florida. the Russians in Oregon. Our strength was moral, not material, and moral strength makes no effective enemies. We want nothing to do with

exercising Power over other nations. And we kept such Power in leash : home. We divided political power at home into many small pieces. We separated it into Federal, State and local, and separated it again into legislative, executive and judicial. As a result no one group could get enough Power in this country to set up in America a government like those in Europe. There, a few people were always in control and could hurl whole nations at each other in war.

The Europeans did not trust the Russians, the French, the Germans, the English, but they trusted us for 150 years. We had all the friends we needed. They do fore likely to be politically corrupt and infiltrated by strange foreign elements.

They have witnessed what we cannot vet believe about ourselves. Our Government not only abandoned Poland but actually participated in delivering Poland to Russia. It shamefully abandoned Hungary, it divided Austria with a lawless arbitrary nation of kidnapping conquerors. The whole world witnessed our deception of and possibly final destruction of our greatest friend in the world, China with its 400,000,000 people, who had every right to count upon our loyalty.

Europe understood years ago, what our own people are barely beginning to preceive, that when America threw off the Constitutional restraints on power at home, at that moment we abandoned our basis for moral leadership in world affairs. We had one great contribution to make to the world-a demonstration that freedom is workable in the modern world. When we ceased to make our Liberty work we ceased to have any lasting contribution to give the rest of the world.

When we recover our own liberties from our own power-mad governing men, the other nations may trust us again. When we again lift up our eyes to the vision of Liberty by which we lived, they may seek Liberty for themselves as'a workable principle. One of my colleagues, Frank

Fellows of Maine, made a speech in the House on Memorial Day: "Because of his strength, speed and grace of motion, and lack of fear-which enables him to cruise the airways freely-the eagle is the symbol of our country," he said, "Powerful wings life him to the heights which neither man nor eagle may reach without freedom . . .

"If promised food will be his without hunting . . . he will become like a parrot, confined in a care, perhaps chained to a perch; he is saved all worry as to suste-nance, but that freedom to coast on the wind, and flaunt his speed and strength, he has exchanged for the certainty of applause when he jeers the family cat, and a cracker when he whistles."

## INSIDE YOUR It's Your Money .... John Beck

HIGH FLYING DOLLARS MYSTERIOUS DISCS: Cartoons are meant to be funny, but sometimes they hit so close to the truth that they are grimly seri-

ous. Such was the one done recently by H. J. Carlisle of Des 200 Moines Register and Tribune on the subject of flying saucers. Carlisle depicts

the saucers as dollars, your dollars and mine! High speed inflated dollars. Taxpayers' dollars being scattered to the four corners of the earth. From the dome of the capitol in Washington, congress, in caricature, is throwing our money to the four winds. In the air there are dollars, endless flights of them soaring off in all directions, moderately small dollar-discs and big dollar-discs. It is a great cartoon. Our first

impulse is to laugh heartily; but on second glance we can see the reality behind Carlisle's humor and it is not funny. These small to large discs that congress is tossing out with such mad glee really are our various sized dollars. We can analyze: Today there are many kinds of dollars. Econimically, there is the building dollar, the wholesale dollar, the softgoods dollar, the hard-goods dollar, and many others. They all have different values.

POLITICAL ASPECT: Then there is the consumer price index doll-ar, a fictional thing, a huge average of estimated aggregates published by the Bureau of Labor, which conceals the detailed realities of an inharmonious market. And we have the dollars that are in various stages of inflation with respect to political boondoggling, currency and credit manipulation by the Federal Reserve Board and the Treasury.

Also affected by political action is the book-value dollar of old corporations with respect to new corporations. Upon this hinges the market value of the stock dollar in comparison with the current plant-value replacement dollar. In a like manner the dividend dollar can be related to the current price of stocks, or to the book value of old corporations, or to the replacement value of such corporations; and again, it can be related to new investment. In each instance we get a different relationship, a different worth.

But all these various dollars are represented by a single unit, the dollar that we carry in our pockets. Obviously, it is not a dollar in any real sense, for it has no standard value in the market. It is not a measuring stick with respect to good. It is not a true

SUBVERSIVE ACTION: The elastic property of the current subversive. It was dedollar signed to do precisely what it is doing, to benefit politics per se. It can never benefit the people It can only rob them of their earnings and depreciate the buying power of their savings. Our orthodox accounting system cannot cope with it, and government will not permit a change that will expose to shame its dishonest

monetary setup. It is unjust and morally corrupt to deplete the fixed assets of a people through currency inflation. And it is nothing short of confiscation to collect taxes that are figured upon an investment which has been depreciated by the very act of the inflationary process Yet by this means and many others, governments, to include our own, are robbing their citizens today. They are collecting taxes in many, if not all, instances on real losses instead of profits.

Our dollars are leaving us rapidly. They are vanishing into thin air. Comparatively few realize the magnitude of the damage that has already been done, for such is the treachery of inflation. So, while the satire of the Carlisle cartoon on flying saucers is at first glance amusing, it is also economically accurate and it portrays our basic trouble-dishonest money. in the cartoon remind us of the early stages of our easy money Hopkins-Brain Trust dollars of the thirties that have not vet aborbed all the inflation that exists today. They will grow with time. The larger ones are strictly Truman-Keyserling types, but they follow the old pattern. And the bigger they grow the worse will be the eventual crackup. No one can say exactly when

the end-point will be reached in this mad political-economic scramble, but it is not important to know the exact time. What is important is to realize that we are moving toward disaster and moving fast, and that the end comes ever closer. It is much safer to test our brakes on a level, enduring road than to try them for hairbreadth efficiency at the edge of a cliff.

Bad money and big government are inseparable companions. One never exists without the other. And when they exist big government gets bigger and bad money gets worse. So says history, and that is the way it is stacking up now.

Little men with little minds are pushing us into socialism. The maneuver must be blocked, not compromised. The need for big men, for little government and for honest money, is paramount. That must be our goal if we wish to salvage freedom and enterprise.

(Continued from Page 14) from organized religion to the Communists, while parents may protest in vain about their children being taught-things considered immoral, yet forced to send them to these "free compulsory education" hotbeds or go to jail. Catholic citizéns, forced to pay for public schools whether they use them or not (which is payment for NO SERVICE in return) naturally try to salvage a small portion of what they are paying for, so you have torrid fights breaking out in Congress over school transportation issues and the like, with pro and cons like. Along with the power to force training in c dlectivism, the school oligarchy has another fearful
