armed aggression may take place in other areas.

The president said the increases in the size of the armed services and the extra supplies they need will require additional appropriations. Hence in the next few days he will transmit to the Congress specific requests for appropriations in the amount of approximately \$10,000,000,000.

At home, Mr. Truman said, there must be "substantial reduction of economic resources" to insure that defense needs will be met without bringing on inflation and its resulting hardship for every family.

Accordingly, the president proposed:

1. That Congress pass legislation now authorizing priorities and allocations toward the production of national security, to limit use of materials for non-essential purposes, to prevent hoarding, and to requisition or seize materials required for defense.
2. That all government agencies review their programs with an eye to lessening the demand for services and supplies vital to defense.
3. That taxes be boosted more sharply than he has recommended before in order to combat inflationary pressure.

He said that at an appropriate time, as soon as necessary studies are finished he will present Congress a tax program based on the principles that (a) the nation must try to pay for the greatest amount of needed goods and services; and (b) the tax system must be balanced to distribute its burden fairly.

Mr. Truman herebefore has urged upon higher taxes on corporations and on upper bracket incomes.

Today he told Congress that higher taxes will lessen the need for general economic controls and that a balanced tax program would help check inflation.

That there be further restraint on credit expansion, and that long lines of credit be directed yesterday for federally assisted housing.

The president told the Federal Housing Administration and the Veterans Administration to de-fer higher down payments and to cut down on building programs in order to provide more building materials for defense purposes.

He also recommended that Congress authorize more controls to curb the expansion of private business real estate credit.

5. That Congress authorize the first land-use operation conducted by the U. S. Marine Corps on the island of New Providence in the Bahamas during the Revolutionary War.

...and the U. S. answer is to meet the aggression which he charges the Russian regime committed in attacking South Korea.

said the Communists had made "minor infiltrations and movements beyond contact of our forces" around Taejon. It reported South Korean troops standing firm along Communist invasion routes.

Allied aircraft struck hard at Red tank and troop concentrations in the vicinity of Nonsan, 25 miles southwest of Taejon and left Nonsan in flames. Other allied airmen smashed at Communist lines as the Reds feverishly tried to restore supply route bridges blasted by air attacks. The Reds

needed the supply lines to resume at full pace the offensive brought to a halt by stout U. S. resistance.

The defense department announced U. S. Navy and Air Force planes destroyed or damaged 45 Red Korean aircraft yesterday. The arrival of the new American troops, committed to the battle zone on ten days notice, raised hope that the time of American retreat was past. More delaying action was predicted, but the buildup for the counter-offensive was getting under way.

The first cavalry is commanded by Maj. Gen. Hobart R. Gay. It landed unopposed at a pier in the little fishing town of Po-

observers are still in the field and its headquarters are still in Athens.

Zachariades' article berated Greece as one end of the "Athens-Belgrade axis." Belgrade is the capital of Yugoslavia.

Previous fears of aggression in the Balkans have centered mostly on a possible Russian-sponsored move against Premier Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia. The communist has blasted Tito since June, 1948, for too great independence from the Kremlin.

Rumors have been rife that Bulgaria and Hungary have massed troops on their frontier with Yugoslavia. Tito and his chief lieutenants have exhibited no unusual public concern, though events in Korea have roused unusual speculation among the Yugoslav public concerning the reported troop movements close to home.

Greece's military strong man, Field Marshal Pavlos Papagos, last Saturday said he was not worried by the reports of Red military movements in the Balkans. He termed them only part of a war of nerves.

ordered. Government officials predicted the action will take considerable steam out of the record-smashing housing boom by making it harder for buyers to acquire, for builders to finance, and sellers to dispose of homes.

The National Association of Home Builders, with 17,000 private builders listed as members, agreed, but promised cooperation toward achieving the president's aim of "substantial curtailment."

The savings in materials and manpower that might be diverted to the defense effort obviously would be sizeable.

Housing units have been produced at a rate approaching 1.5 million a year. Fifty percent more were started under construction in the first half of 1950 than in the first half of 1949.

Costs of construction materials have been mounting with demand, especially in recent weeks. Diminished civilian demand — if not counteracted by expanded military requirements — could check that.

The president's orders were binding only on government agencies, which handle somewhat less than half of all mortgage loans, but private mortgage lending was expected to be tightened too.

Private terms in general already were stricter than government terms. Government officials said private first mortgages usually are held to 80 percent of the appraised value of the property.

The president issued his orders with an expression of regret, remarking that "continuance of high level home construction would be entirely desirable were it not for recent international developments."

They listed her previous husbands, all Texans, as Clay Reynolds, Band Johnson, Yachum, Nichols and Jones.

The widow, through her attorney, denied she had been married before.

Reuther Urges U.S. Spend Trillion for Peace Program

DETROIT (AP)—Walter Reuther proposed today that the United States invest more than a trillion dollars in a 100-year fight to rid the world of communism.

Reuther, president of the CIO United Auto Workers Union and long-time foe of communism, made the proposal to President Truman.

In a letter to the president, the union chieftan advocated a global "total peace offensive" under America's leadership as a "compelling necessity" for "democratic survival."

Reuther proposed a vast nine-point worldwide program under United Nations sponsorship.

The total final investment after 100 years, would be \$1,300,000,000,000—or, as Reuther said, the cost of the last war to the U.S.

(One trillion dollars is a billion dollars multiplied 1,000 times.)

Reuther's communication to Mr. Truman was of a dramatic character.

In his draft of a worldwide program he concluded with the statement:

"We are at the place in world history where we must recognize that the best hope of saving freedom and achieving a just and lasting peace is in action so challenging, so vast in

Know Your Baby Sitter

After taking care of Junior these hot days almost all of us jump at the chance to get out of the house for an evening that is, if we can get a baby sitter.

To the mother of young children, says Dr. Alice Sowers, professor of family life education at the University of Oklahoma, the baby sitter is her passport to the outside world. Since the sitters role, then, is really that of substitute parent, she needs the kind of knowledge that will enable her to play that important role both with confidence and skill.

Writing in National Parent-Teacher Magazine, Dr. Sowers says that despite the fact parents do everything they can to keep their children healthy and safe, invariably they will bring into their homes girl baby sitters about whom they know practically nothing about their health, their backgrounds, what they do to keep children quiet, what threats and bribes they will use to control them. In short, they know little about their baby sitters except that they are willing to stay at the house for so much an hour.

Yet, what are parents to do? "In our present manner of living," she says, "a sitter is usually a necessity. Only a comparatively few homes have the blessing of a relative or servant who can be counted on to stay with the children and who knows the family and the way parents handle problems arising in the home."

Usually there are two types of baby sitters: the person who sits in the house when children are in bed and the one who stays with the children during their waking hours.

"Any responsible person of good health and character can do the evening kind of sitting satisfactorily," believes Dr. Sowers.

The parents who go off for the evening, she says, should leave all the information the sitter will need — telephone numbers of the family doctor, the fire department,

the police, and the place where the parents themselves can be reached. If the parents will not be near a telephone they should leave the name of the person who can be called in an emergency. They should take care to answer the sitters' inevitable questions in advance by telling her about the night habits of children, such as sleeping with toys and going to the bathroom; what to do if the child awakens; what to do if the child is restless; at what hour the parents expect to return; and what use the sitter may make of the telephone for personal calls. A young sitter may want to entertain a friend, if so, tell her the rules about this and likewise what, if any food in the refrigerator may be eaten.

But finding the proper sitter for a child's waking hours is another story, she says. When children are labeled "brats" by sitters, a mother may find it increasingly difficult to find a sitter available when she needs one. Children must respect the authority of the sitter. Otherwise it is unsafe to leave them with her, no matter how fine she is.

Parents, says Dr. Sowers, should by all means know the sitters personally. Says she: "How else can they find out what the children are learning from her in the way of stories, fears, ideals, and superstitions? What radio programs are tuned in when she is in the house? What methods of discipline does she use? Do the children impose on her, take advantage of her position as an outsider? What does the girl say and do during the parent's absence? Who comes into the house when the parents are gone?"

What can be done to safeguard both sitters and families as this big business continues to become sitters' most important part of home and family life? Dr. Sowers says that in some schools and colleges, there are courses in baby sitting which outline rates of pay and rules and provide a form of training. The schools also maintain an employment agency where calls are received and sitters supplied.

Prospective and active sitters learn something about children and child development at different ages. They discuss their relationship with the family and their responsibility to the parents. They develop a code regarding their personal behavior and their job.

CALICO PEACH CUP SALAD Crisp cabbage - apple salad heaped in a luscious fresh or canned peach half is a vegetable and fruit combination that will mean happy eating for all the family. Leave the red skin on the apples and garnish the top with thin apple slices. This salad is unusually attractive looking.

MATCHSTICK SALAD Place a small mound of cottage cheese on a bed of shredded lettuce. Dip one end of crisp, cold celery and carrot sticks in a bit of paprika and insert them in the cottage cheese ball, "flame" end up. Or heap the "matchsticks" loosely on shredded lettuce.

STUFFED PEAR SALAD Fill fresh or canned pear halves with a mixture of equal parts of finely grated raw carrot and grated American cheese moistened with French dressing. Serve on lettuce cups arranged on a platter.

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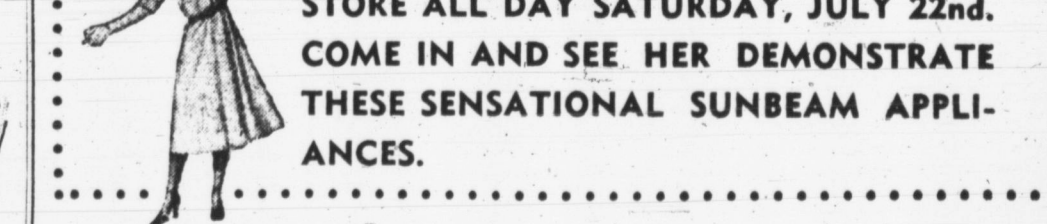

But hormone upsets, x-rays, irritating chemicals, or many other things might cause the change, he added.

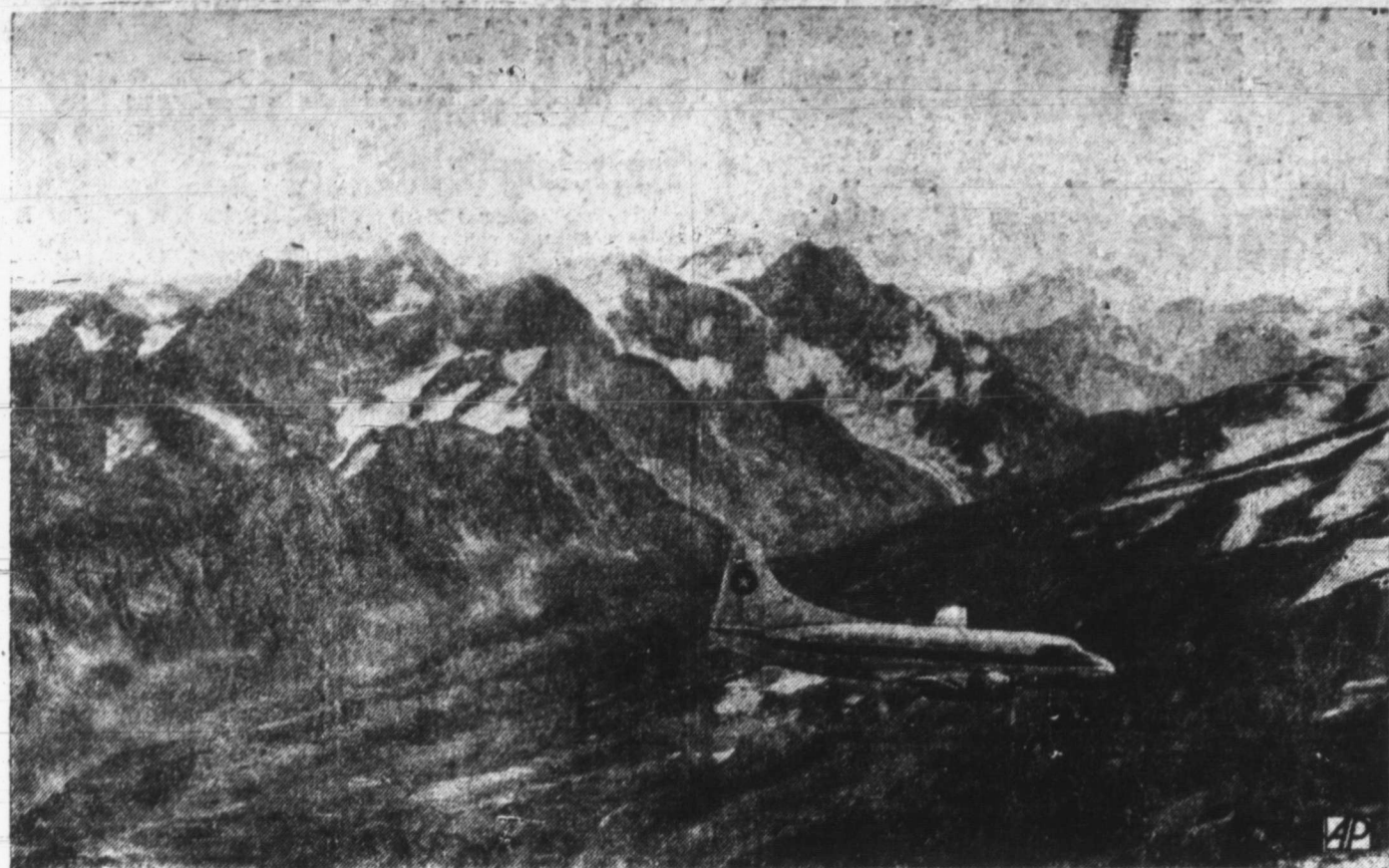
Machette-Wielder Kills Three Women

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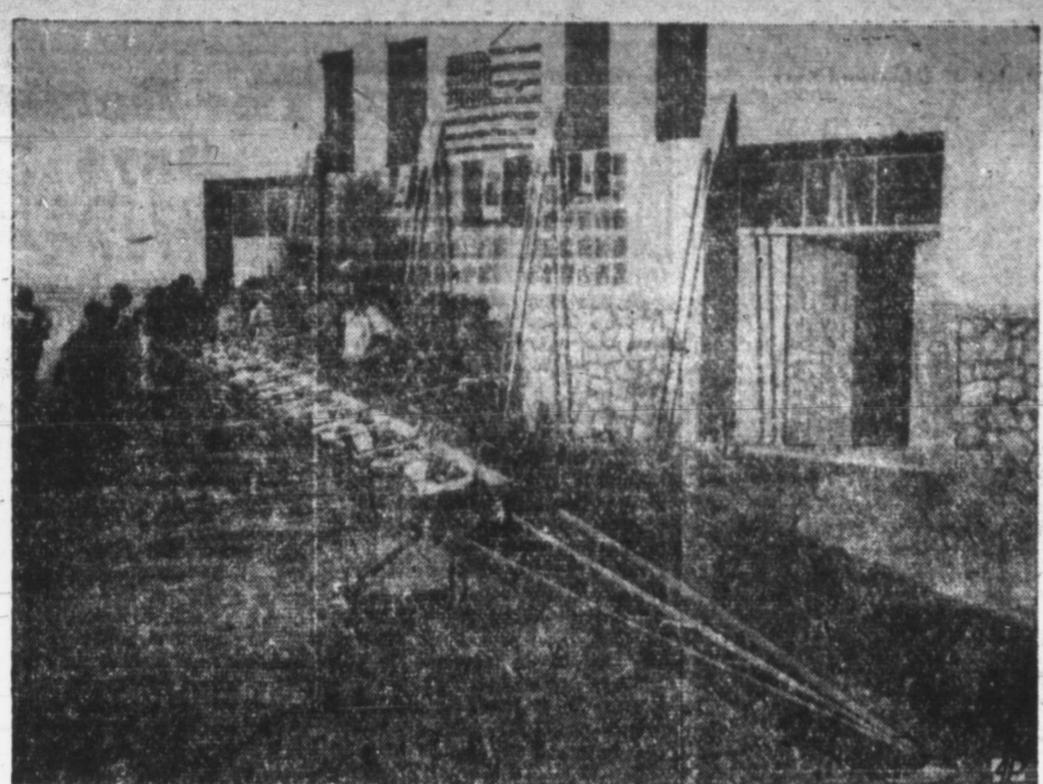
\$90,000 Suit Filed For Boy Injured By Pinball Machine

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. — (AP) — A suit for \$90,000 damages has been filed on behalf of a 12-year-old boy who contends he lost the sight of one eye while playing a pinball machine. The suit was filed yesterday by attorneys for Ralph J. Linsman, Jr., of Kingston, Pa. The action named as defendants Francis L. Ambrose, operator of a restaurant at Harvey's Lake, Pa., and Max Roth of Wilkes-Barre, identified as owner of the machine. The boy's attorneys said he was injured June 18 while playing the machine — a device that hurls tiny metal "baseballs" toward a mechanical figure actuated by a trigger at the front. One of the balls, Attorney Thomas Moore said, struck the machine's glass top and sent a glass splinter into young Linsman's left eye. As a result, Moore said, the boy lost the "useful vision" of his left eye and sustained the possible loss of his right eye by "sympathetic reaction."

Truck Explosion Endangers Chiang

TAIPEI, Formosa — (AP) — An explosives-laden Nationalist Army truck exploded today within 500 yards of Chiang Kai-shek's downtown office. The blast killed three persons and seriously injured 12. (This dispatch did not say whether Chiang was in his office.) A refreshment stand was blown to bits.

Other than the driver, most of the dead were believed to be rickshaw coolies. All were Chinese. The explosion, set off when the truck hit another vehicle, started uneasy Taipei. It sounded like a big bomb.

No Hoarding Say Food Customers

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Food prices are climbing as this city's customers are putting a "war scare" buying run on coffee, pepper, sugar, shortening and other things that were in short supply during World War II. But nobody wants to call it hoarding. Retailers say the buying wave is the biggest since rationing ended, but it has this difference: hoarders are not taking away huge loads of goods at a time; they're buying twice as often and buying the same things. Said one grocery chain executive: "Our customers tell us they're buying the stuff before the hoarders get it."

Deadline Is Set In Racial Case

HOUSTON — (AP) — Sept. 4 has been set as the deadline for attorneys to file briefs in an injunction suit in which four Negroes seek the right to use Houston's three municipal golf courses. Federal Judge T. M. Kennerly yesterday heard the suit and set the deadline. The plaintiffs are seeking an injunction against the city and a declaratory judgment as to their rights.

Document Copies Rushed in Detroit

DETROIT — (AP) — Playing it safe, Wayne (Detroit) County has ordered as speed-up in its microfilming of public documents. A place that's protected from bombing or sabotage will be sought for storage. Papers showing property ownership, along with marriage, death and naturalization records, are being given top priority.

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Sane Buying Is Better Living

The way hysteria has again brought forth a bunch of those to heck with anyone else - I'm looking out for myself folks. We mean the group that tries to start a buying panic by claiming that rationing is going to start or that it already has. It may be true that dealers in certain lines of goods aren't able to obtain as much of the merchandise as they would like. But those are only along lines that contain steel, a vital commodity in keeping this country a free one.

6 Trillion Dollars!

James A. Farley, who was once Postmaster General under the late President Roosevelt, recently said that the cost of government must be reduced "even if some people get hurt in the process. We have got to have men in Congress who look to the need for a sound national economy with a balanced budget, and a little less concern for what certain communities and particular departments are demanding."

Mr. Farley then discussed federal grants to the states and said: "If this goes on, the states will gradually give up all of their responsibilities and the federal government will absorb them. The result will not be a federal system such as was set up under our constitution, but a centralized unitary government which can never fit the 48 individual requirements and special conditions of a country as broad as this one."

Fair Enough - Pegler

NEW YORK - The Korean fighting is war and the president's war powers should be invoked to place in concentration camps all known members of the Communist Party and its sympathizers and all known fellow-travelers. There is clear authority for this. The Supreme Court upheld such action in two cases arising from the deportation order and the deportation order issued by Gen. John L. Dewitt in San Francisco in 1942 whereby disloyal Japanese ancestry, actually Americans of Japanese ancestry, were first compelled to keep to their homes from 8 p. m. to 6 a. m. and later to report to assembly centers for evacuation.

Evacuation meant deportation, but our taste rejected the word deportation because of the reputation of the Kaiser and Hitler and, meanwhile by the Turks, had given it a bitter meaning. Nevertheless, without discrimination, we rounded up the actual Japanese and the American citizens of Japanese ancestry on the Pacific Coast and shipped them to concentration camps in the Arizona desert and elsewhere. The camp at Sacaton, an Indian reservation between Tucson and Phoenix, was bleak and forbidding, but the non-American Japanese and our Nisei, meaning American Japs, were adapted and resourceful. They made much more of their surroundings than the Indians had. Some of them earned wages working, camouflaging nets and one industrious family grew garden flowers and harvested the seeds.

It is impossible however to put a pleasant face on the situation in which loyal American Nisei were placed. One who had owned a clothes-dressing place in California had turned his plant over to a friendly Caucasian neighbor for a friendly neighbor had called up in the draft and the Jap did not know what would become of his property and investment. Another had left his farm machinery in the fields and submitted to deportation. His crops were abandoned, his taxes were continuing and the equipment had been sold for whatever it would bring which probably was a fair fixed price because there was a shortage of farm equipment. I do not know which of these victims were made whole by Congress after the war.

The Supreme Court freely admitted that there was absolutely no evidence that individuals swept away in this deportation were guilty of anything. Justice Black, in the majority opinion, wrote "we cannot reject as unfounded the judgment of the military authorities and of Congress that there were disloyal members of that population whose numbers and strength could not be precisely and quickly ascertained." Incidentally, Congress had made no such judgment, but the gratuitous assumption that Congress had done so relieved the court of a degree of embarrassment in upholding a flagrant act of mass racial persecution.

Incidentally, Congress had made no such judgment, but the gratuitous assumption that Congress had done so relieved the court of a degree of embarrassment in upholding a flagrant act of mass racial persecution.

country." Because Hashimuro Togo, an American schoolboy, member of the high school ball-team, the band and the debating team, looked like a lot of other persons of the same racial stock, he could be railroaded out of his native town and dumped in the desert. "We are not unmindful of the hardships imposed on a large number of American citizens," Black wrote, admitting outright that the qualification and definition which governed here was "Japanese ancestry."

It was an agonizing decision. Mr. Black and his brethren were up against a dangerous situation in which it was put to them to make a choice between the medical and surgical treatment of a patient and the stinging out of an act undoubtedly based on racial discrimination and guilt by association and resemblance, done in the name of a political party which had retained its power by practicing the same such.

The arbitrary judgment of any captain, indeed a buck private, would be sufficient. It is not good for good Americans. It is a stick to beat traitors just now. This time "guilt by association" has the sanction of the court and a court is subject to seal away for duration all those repulsive fellow-travelers who try to confuse jurors with pleas of innocent association. If the Army in time of war says a notorious fellow-traveler must go to a concentration camp he goes.

One slight technicality intervenes. We are not at "war" and this action comes under the authority of "war powers." Yet as Alf Landon and others have noted, we have twice mocked the Constitution in making war without a "constitutional" declaration of war, first against Germany and now against North Korea. This being our attitude toward the Constitution and communism being a conspiracy against the United States, the conspirator is subject to arrest and detention with treason charges in abeyance, if "the proper military authorities" apprehend "the gravest imminent danger" from these enemies at large.
