individual INDEPENDENCE. I gave that as one reason why I can agree with a noted col-

umnist who wants the death penalty for all communists and FEL-LOW TRAVELERS because, if carried to its logical source, it would include a large percentage of our own citizenry who have, unthinkingly, been following and voting a bolshevik course. A second reason why I cannot

agree with such death-sentence appeals is that I subscribe to an ideal laid down in France by Thomas Paine. The French Revolution, which Paine aided, was fought to destroy a wicked, inhuman system of monarchy which denied civil liberty and individual independence - the RIGHTS of man. But Paine fought to destroy this wrong idea by countering it with its exact opposite - LIB-ERTY for all, which is what our people are going to have to be educated to if they are going to have any CAUSE in fighting totalitarian communism, or collectivism. At the same time, Paine was not a bloodthirsty monster, taking out on personalities his hatred for the system. In contending for great principles and ideals people, of course, are killed when matters come to a head and military action ensues. Still, though, there is no sense in wantonly taking human lives through mere blind, unreasoning hatred. after the CAUSE has been won. That was why Paine objected to the French Revolutionists sending the king and nobles to the guillotine. He stated, "Kill the king but not the man.' For the same reason, wouldn't

it be better for Americans-the minority of us who believe in in-dependence, at least to reason, "Kill communism but not the communists"? And more especially since so many of us, ourselves, have been practicing a limited form of bolshevism. Here. as in Paine's case, we have the opportunity to kill a bad ideology with a good one-by becoming the EXACT OPPOSITE of any kind of COLLECTIVISM. That means a return to the Declaration and hauling away the debris we have filled our house with, from income taxes and forcible support of public "education" (?) to farm subsidies compulsory vice and government by directive, not to mention removing government from competition with private business. In other words, clean out the whole collective mess, restoring individual initiative and liberty, with every citizen free to run his own life in his own way without let, license 'or hindrance, as long as he does not harm or overlap the rights of others. Why, come to think of it, that would be a REVOLUTION, wouldn't it? It would be a complete about-face from our present set-up.

Well, then, let's have that kind of real American Revolution in the minds and hearts of our pople, which is accomplished by education and reasoning, and THEN we HAVE killed communism at home, a large percentage of the communists themselves having thrown it over when their idea was conquered by a BETTER one. Besides, how could we reconcile our alleged ideals of freedom of speech, press and assembly, with trying to forcibly remove bolshevism by killing anyone who thought, spoke or wrote in favor of it? 

### Air War in Korea Likely to Be Stepped Up In Tempo With Dispatching of B-29 Groups that George would eventually make only one spade trick. It is plain to see that George bad to se By JAMES J. STEBIG WASHINGTON — (P)— Indications are that the air war in strbases seldom were more than scope and intensity soon. The tip-off was the dispatch of two more medium bomber (prob-

ably B-29) groups to the Far East this week. They supplement sev eral units of B-29's ordered out nearly a month ago. Air officers concede that means strategic bombing of a substantial nature instead of the flashes of activity in North Korea thus far.

A full strategic air war is not in prospect, however, because the ultimate source of North Korean arms lies outside its territory. Arrival of Marine air units, skilled in close ground support tactics, will help on the United Nations' shortened battlefront.

Those developments will put the Korean air war in better perspective. A rounding out of aerial operations has been evident for more than a week in the improved ground support due to establishment of full-scale ground communications for direct ing fighter-bomber attacks. This permits more effective and coor-dinated use of available Air Force, Navy and Australian warplanes.

An equally important factor is stabilization of battle lines. It has become possible to plan air responding like fire trucks to emergency calls.

There has been widespread criticism of air power results in Korea because the North Koreans, virtually without any airplanes of their own, have been able to surge forward steadily on the

The Communist advance has raised questions in some people's minds as to whether great numerical superiority on the ground may not counterbalance air strength. Critics say that the Air Force is now shown to have been over-confident in what it could achieve in actual fighting.

However, reports from battlefront observers have been generally full of praise for both equipment and results.

Some critics have not given

weight to the circumstances under which the fighting began, the bad weather and to the need of hasty mobilization against an en-emy that was numerically six to eight times stronger, far better equipped on the ground and fighting in familiar territory.

Air Force people say that without air support there would be no Americans fighting in Korea today. Without the hastily organized air defense the United Nations forces would have been exposed to whatever North Koreans wished to do with Russian-

built warplanes. United States Air Force planes are credited with 111 of the 204 Red tanks assessed as positively destroyed in the first 34 days of fighting. The credit for tanks damaged runs to a still higher

percentage.
Why hasn't the Air Force done more to stop the onrushing Red ground forces? The answer in aviation circles is: too little of everything on hand. It goes back to 1947, when the United States began withdrawing military pow-

er from the Far East.

There was no intention, so far as the military was concerned, to fight in Korea as little as 24 hours before the order to give air support to the South Korean army. There were no troops, planes or air bases closer than

Japan.
Just three years before the order to fight, in mid-1947, the United States Air Force had 2,600 warplanes in the Far East. That was cut to 2,100 in mid-1948 and it was down to around 600 planes

when the order came.

Air offensives, like ground and sea offensives, take time in preparation. Before World War II, American aircraft manufacturers began expanding in 1938 with orders from France and England. When the Japanese hit Pearl Harbor the United States was building more than 4,000 planes a month. (It's average monthly output today is 215 planes.) output today is 215 planes.)
With all that time to build up an Air Force, sea and ground units before Pearl Harbor, it took another year to get ready to land in Africa. Still another year (1943) passed before American bombers made any sizeable raids

on Germany.







But it was up in Northern Italy, on the shores of famed Lake Como, that my sister, Dot, and I spent what was probably the strangest afternoon of our lives. We were the only Americans at the Hotel, and as such, received some "extra attentions", no doubt on the theory that we must be rich, a sadly-mistaken idea. (And incidentally, it is an idea which is much too prevalent aboard, and which seriously embarrasses tourists like us-who spent most of our evenings desperately counting our remaining liras or francs!) At any rate, I remember that when we entered the dining-room on the first evening, the orchestra abruptly ended what it was playing, and boomed forth with "Roll Out the Barrel" in our honor. (This particular monstrosity had died from natural causes over here at least a year earlier, but was just reaching Italy.)

After dinner, all the guests assembled in the salon, and it was soon apparent that there was to be dancing. Not knowing what else to do, we ordered some coffee, and decided to observe. Not knowing a soul, and not speaking Italian, we were somewhat surprised to see a blue-eyed, blond gentleman approaching us. In perfect English, he explained that "he went with the Hotel", and we son gathered that it was his lady guests. Alternately, we helpasked if he might introduce us to some other guests. Receiving our approval, he bowed away and soon returned with a tiny German gentleman, and an enormous Irishman. Instantly we discovered that the German spoke only German, while the Irishman spoke

But our Italian "friend" seemed to understand and speak everything, so with him as interpreter, we managed to get along pretty all, Dancing with the tiny German was positively frightening. for we both towered over him, and he simply loved those rapid and free-wheeling Vienese , waltzes! The Irishman merely walked around in slow-motion, but he was a lot safer.

Toward the end of the evening the German suddenly said something to the Italian, and he relayed the message to us. It was a cordial invitation to spend the following afternoon on his sailboat on the lake, and we all accepted

When the time arrived, we discovered that our Italian friend and only interpreter, was unable to make it, although he sent sandwiches and Chianti wine along from the hotel for our enjoyment Somehow the whole idea now seemed a bit dubious, and Dot and I wondered how in the world we could all communicate with each other for the next several hours. Nevertheless, we climbed aboard, and for a while, it was a case of sign language and soliloquies.

### Chinese Red Attack on Tibet Is Seen

HONG KONG - (AP) - Plans for a Chinese Red invasion of ancient Tibet, lofty land of the amas, were reported yesterday by pro-Communist newspaper.

The Chinese language Wen Wei Pao printed what it said was a report by one-eyed Gen. Liu Po-cheng that Communist forces soon "will march into Tibet." Liu, commander of the Chinese Communist second field army, was quoted in a report to the Communist southwest military and administrative committee, which ended a five-day-meeting in Chungking July 31.

He said such a move would be aimed at driving out the "aggressive influence of American im-perialism" and "to consolidate the western line of national defense,' the newspaper reported.

In parade the band performs their nationally known "cowstep." a zig-zag step which was originated by the organization. To execute, the right foot is placed across and in front of the left. The left is then moved across and in front of the right in a criss-cross manner. As each member executes the movement, zig-zag or "drunk cowboy" effect is created. After three fast paces forward, all remove their hats and wave them wildly as they spip around in a pivotal motion as they maintain their lines of march. A loud rebel yell ac-companies the whirl.



The saddle is then eased on and the cinches and stirrups unhooked.

The next step, cinching, can be tricky if the right tools aren't around. It is pretty risky reach under an unbroken brone cinch. This applies, too, to an unpredictable horse that has already been broken. At any rate, a piece of wire with a hook on one end or a tree limb broken off to


