Queen has bedroom chat with prowler

LONDON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II found a prowler sitting on her bed in Buckingham Palace and chatted with him for 10 minutes to keep him calm until she could summon a footman to take him away, the Daily Express reported today

It said the 56 - year - old monarch was unharmed and "unruffled by her

· "The queen was very brave," the Express quoted an unidentified senior police detective as saying. "By being calm she did not alarm the man - or he would have panicked and it might have been a completely different story.

The report of the bizarre encounter Friday prompted calls from legislators for a government inquiry into security · for the royal family. Workmen spent the weekend stringing barbed wire atop around Buckingham Palace.

A palace spokesman appeared to confirm the Daily Express report, saying: "We cannot add any more (because) a man has been charged." Once a person is charged with an offense under British law nothing can be reported about the suspect beyond what is said in court.

Police said Michael Fagan, a 30-year-old vagrant, was charged Saturday with breaking into the palace on June 7 and stealing a half - bottle of wine. Police said he was arrested inside the palace again at about 3 a.m. Friday, apparently after his late-night encounter with the queen.

The defendant, who appeared in court Saturday barefoot and wearing a dirty T - shirt and jeans, was ordered held

without bail pending trial. Scotland Yard refused to say why Fagan was not immediately charged with the second

Other publications, including the respected London Times, picked up the Express report. The tabloid Mirror newspaper said Police Commissioner Sir David McNee was "furious" at the breakdown in palace security, which includes military units, police, servants, burglar alarms and closed-circuit television.

The Daily Express said an unidentified intruder entered the queen's second - floor bedroom and sat on her bed. The queen talked to him quietly for about 10 minutes until she gained his confidence, then summoned a footman on the pretence of getting the prowler a cigarette, and the servant hustled him away, the report said.

The queen's husband, Prince Philip, was sleeping in a separate bedroom at the time of the incident, it said.

A Conservative Party member of Parliament, Harry Greenway, said he would question Home Secretary William Whitelaw today in the House of Commons on whether security is adequate for the royal family.

"It seems utterly incredible and breathtaking that someone should be able to worm his way into Buckingham Palace and the queen's own private apartment in this way," Greenway

Scotland Yard said Police Commissioner McNee had named Assistant Commissioner John Dellow, 51, to investigate security breaches at the palace following the fifth intrusion in the past 12 months.

Congressional mood against Israel is growing

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee says he is in sympathy with a growing mood in Congress to slash U.S. aid to Israel

because of its invasion of Lebanon. In his strongest statement yet on the fighting between Israeli and Palestine Liberation Organization forces, Sen. Charles Percy said Sunday that relations between Israel and the United States are at the lowest point they've been in 25 years.

Appearing on CBS's "Face The Nation," the Illinois Republican accused Israel of breaking a pledge to the United States that there would be "no surprises" between them.

But Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin said today that, had Israel forewarned the United States, the Americans would have been

accused by the Soviet Union and its radical Arab allies of collusion.

Percy said he plans to voice "deep reservations" about sending U.S. troops to Beirut to evacuate the PLO when he and other congressional leaders meet Tuesday with Reagan and Secretary of State-designate George P.

Reagan said Sunday that he also is 'wary" about his plan announced a week ago to sent 1,000 U.S. combat troops to Beirut to evacuate the trapped PLO forces from their remaining stronghold

Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said Sunday that if U.S. forces are sent to Beirut, they would be there only for a few days.

The autopsy ordered by Hobson is being conducted by Childress pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann.

Carson County Sheriff Connie Reid said he was unaware of the circumstances surrounding the death of Lick but said, "We need to know about it." Reid referred inquiries to Hobson.

A spokesman for the Borger Police Department said, "That was worked by the sheriff's office," when that agency was contacted about the mystery death.

However, Hutchinson County Sheriff Lon Blackmon said the only thing he knew about the death was the youth died in Amarillo and Hobson ordered an autopsy. "I don't know what authority ordered it. He died in Amarillo,' Blackmon said

A spokesman for Northwest Texas Hospital said, "I can't give out that information," concerning an inquiry about Lick's death

A spokesman for the Amarillo doctor said he would be out of the office until later today.



Newspaper reports investigators check 2 Japanese drug firms

DETROIT (AP) - Federal investigators are probing allegations that two Japanese drug companies tried to buy information on cancer research from employees of U.S. pharmaceutical firms. The Detroit News has reported.

The investigation began this month after authorities received unconfirmed reports that Japanese businessmen offered "substantial payments" to employees of several U.S. drug firms, according to an unidentified Justice Department source quoted by the newspaper in its Sunday editions.

The Japanese businessmen allegedly wanted trade secrets on recent research to produce interferon, a cancer-fighting drug, by genetic engineering, the Justice Department source told the News.

One of the two Japanese firms was identified as Midori Juuji, or Green Cross Corp., makes blood products and is Japan's major developer of interferen, according to an anonymous U.S. trade official cited by the newspaper. Green Cross, based in Osaka, Japan,

today denied it had tried to steal technology. A spokesman for the Osaka-based company said in Japan its officials were "quite surprised" by the News report, calling it groundless and 'absolutely false.

The other firm was not identified by the U.S. trade source, the News said.

The American drug company employees reported the offers to their employers, who relayed them to federal investigators, the newspaper said. The Justice Department source told the

newspaper a sum of money "well into five figures" was involved.

A Green Cross spokesman said his company and Collaborative Research Inc. in Massachusetts set up a research agreement in February 1981 to develop a process to produce interferon from yeast fungi, and there was no need to steal technology from other companies.

The report comes in the wake of federal allegations that two Japanese : electronics companies tried to steal computer technology from International Business Machines Corp.

The two Japanese firms allegedly wanted to obtain American research material on a technique allowing drug companies to produce large amounts of pure interferon relatively cheaply, the newspaper reported.

Prayers, hopes offered new archbishop

CHICAGO (AP) - Roman Catholics have responded in prayer and with praise to the appointment of a new archbishop for the nation's largest archdiocese, shaken in the past year by allegations of financial improprieties and the death of its leader.

Archbishop Joseph L. Bernardin was welcomed during the homily at two masses Sunday in Holy Name Cathedral and was mentioned in prayers at other churches throughout

Bernardin, 54, named to the post Saturday by Pope John Paul II. remained in Cincinnati, where he has served as archbishop since 1972.

His predecessor, Cardinal John P. Cody, died April 25 at 74 and had been the focus of published reports last year that suggested he had diverted up to \$1 million in church funds to a step-cousin and lifelong friend, Helen Dolan Wilson

Mrs. Wilson and Cody denied any wrongdoing, and last week the U.S. attorney's office announced it had ended, without indictment, an investigation into the allegations

Bernardin is the 11th man to head the Chicago archdiocese. The last four were named cardinal after being appointed.

Returning to Cincinnati from Rome late Saturday. Bernardin told reporters that he planned the same kind of administration in Chicago as in the

Cincinnati archdiocese, about one-fifth the size of its Chicago counterpart.

"In the final analysis, it's not going to be that much different," he said. "I will try to be as personable as I can be. It will be difficult at such a large diocese.

"I will simply be myself," he said. He is not expected to formally assume control of the 2.4-million member Chicas to archdiocese for three to six weeks.

But already, Bernardin was being widely praised in the Catholic community. He was portrayed as a consensus-seeker, an approachable man who listens well, and some hoped this would help him heal rifts caused by the controversy over archdiocesan

Fierce fighting halted by cease-fire

U.S.-mediated cease-fire halted the fiercest Israeli-Palestinian fighting vet around Beirut, a rocket and artillery duel that left scores of dead in the shell-shattered streets of the Lebanese capital.

The thunderous day-long bombardment Sunday came as Israeli officials said time was running out for a political settlement and accused the Palestine Liberation Organization of stalling.

Shelling was so intense that it halted peace talks with U.S. presidential envoy Philip C. Habib.

Lebanese Prime Minister Shafik Wazzan was prevented from delivering to Habib an 11-point peace proposal by PLO chief Yasser Arafat - a plan that

reportedly falls short of meeting Israel's demands for a full PLO pullout from Lebanon.

Lebanese police said at least 52 people were killed and 135 were wounded in the Beirut shelling. PLO spokesman Bassam Abu Sharif claimed more than 300 civilians were killed or wounded, but said PLO casualties were

The military command in Tel Aviv said 28 Israeli soldiers were wounded in the fighting. The PLO claimed 70 Israelis were killed or wounded, but it gave no source for its account.

A series of Israeli artillery barrages pounded the PLO nerve center in the slums of Moslem-held west Beirut. while Israeli gunboats offshore shelled the Palestinian Bourj el-Barajneh camp near Beirut's paralyzed airport.

Correspondents saw Palestinian-fired rockets crash into the pine forest surrounding U.S. Ambassador Robert Dillon's residence in Yarze, and another volley of Katyusha rockets and artillery shells slammed into the glass-and-stone presidential palace in suburban

Shells also hit the foreign press center at the Hotel Alexandre and other areas of Christian-held east Beirut for the first time since Israeii troops laid siege to the PLO stronghold four weeks ago. Israeli officers said the shells came from Palestinian positions, but the PLO denied firing on east Beirut.

The bombardment stopped about 9:30 p.m. (3:30 p.m. EDT). Lebanese state radio said Habib's negotiating team arranged the cease-fire after Wazzan pleaded for intervention to "stop this mad bombardment.'

The renewed fighting underscored the Israeli Cabinet's increasing impatience with the siege of west Beirut, which began after Israel invaded Lebanon on June 6 to crush the PLO guerrilla army and drive it from

"The negotiations are going on, but time is not unlimited," Cabinet Secretary Dan Meridor said in Jerusalem after the regular Sunday meeting of Prime Minister Menachem Begin and his ministers.

Meridor said "nothing yet has been decided" on a deadline for departure of the estimated 8,000 PLO guerrillas trapped in west Beirut. The Israeli media reported Habib had set Aug. 1 as "an informal target date" for reaching a settlement on an evacuation.

Israel Radio said several ministers told Begin they thought Habib's negotiations were going too slowly and expressed doubt they would succeed. Price wars driving grocers out of business

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - For every pound of sugar Norman Pentecost sells, he loses 25 cents. He says he has no other choice, trapped in a grocery store price war that has driven one chain here out of business and another into bankruptcy...

Pentecost, president of the San Antonio Retail Grocers Association, operates a small store on the northwest side of the city.

The price war began in 1980 when Kroger opened the first of nine grocery stores in the San Antonio area, invading the traditional turf of H.E.B. Food Stores, a large South Texas chain owned by H.E.

"We knew that H.E.B. was not going to stand for a national chain to come in and take over the market," Pentecost said.

Since that time, San Antonio consumers have enjoyed a dramatic drop in prices.

Milk that was selling two years ago for \$2.39 a price policy of H.E.B. cost their company \$14 gallon dropped to \$1.69. Until the last few weeks, bread that cost a retailer 50 cents a loaf was selling three for \$1. A pound of sugar that costs \$1.50 wholesale goes for \$1.29

Pentecost, who said he recently conducted a computer simulation of the costs of the average grocery store, esimated that Kroger is losing between \$7 million and \$10 million a year in its San Antonio stores.

H.E.B. is losing less because its volume is higher, Pentecost said, estimating H.E.B. revenues are down about 10 percent since the price war began.

Handy Andy Supermarkets, which operates 23 of its 27 stores in San Antonio, filed for bankruptcy last fall and then lodged a \$42 million antitrust suit against H.E.B

Officials of Handy Andy claim the "predatory

H.E.B. has not responded to the lawsuit, court records show.

The Deluxe Stores, a smaller chain, had filed a \$6 million antitrust suit against both H.E.B. and Kroger. But the chain went out of business and was forced to drop the suit in April 1981 because of lack

The San Antonio Retail Grocers Association filed a similar antitrust complaint against H.E.B. last fall with the Federal Trade Commission. That complaint and the Handy Andy suit are still pending, Pentecost said.

The smaller grocers say that H.E.B. and Kroger are making up their losses in San Antonio by charging higher prices elsewhere.

Man develops addiction to prescription drugs

Patrick calls himself a

'legal'' drug abuser. For years, Patrick said, his doctors prescribed all the drugs he needed and his insurance picked up the tab.

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"It's so damned easy to get the stuff," said Patrick, a 26-year-old dental technician. "People spend more time on you when you're cashing a check than most doctors do giving you a prescription. The doctors can't get the police to arrest me because they're calling in the prescriptions

Three years ago, Patrick asked doctors for a prescription to ease the pain caused by a chronic disease and a string of medical ailments.

He said he managed to obtain prescriptions with incredible ease from more than 50 Houston doctors -

many who never examined

The clean-cut, bespectacled Patrick is suffering from Chrohn's Disease, an ailment that forces him to use prescription medication to quiet his small intestine. He is hooked on Lomotil, a synthetic drug similar to a narcotic that in large amounts would dangerously block the bowels of a healthy

dependancy on Lomotil slowly developed from his temporary addiction to painkillers he received to reduce the discomfort from other unrelated medical problems.

Patrick said he has undergone surgery for appendicitis, kidney stones and urethral strictures.

"After a while, even if I just got depressed or something doctor. I knew I could do it. I three to five Lomotil. knew how easy it was." he said. "I wanted to float about the room, read my book and

anymore After each illness he withdrew from the medication, only to be hit with a new ailment, he said. In 1980, Chrohn's Disease

began to act up and his doctor

Patrick admits he used many "tricks" to get the prescriptions, bypassing the loopholes designed by the medical commmunity to prevent drug misuse.

He said he learned that doctors on call for others are unfamiliar with the patients and medical records of their colleagues and often are careless when writing prescriptions. Many also failed to fill in the number of refills allowed, so Patrick said he did it for them.

Patrick said he once threw an empty prescription bottle into his backyard and let his puppy play with it so he could take the mangled bottle to the pharmacist and get it refilled.

"I took it into a pharmamcy and said, 'You're not going to believe this.' He refilled it," Patrick said.






New man offers stability at state

It is difficult to reach a conclusion about Alexander Haig's stewardship as secretary of state.

He came to the post well qualified by experience in foreign affairs. He s a man of great talent and

decisiveness As secretary of state, Haig talked tough but acted with moderation. He had no great triumphs. Neither was he responsible for any great foul -

So the announcement of his resignation was suprising.

But his record has been marred by in - fighting with other members of the Reagan administration. He occasionally seemed overbearing in manner, and his policies have not always come across clearly.

There has been much speculation on the reason for his resignation, but no official explanation other than the general one he gave that in recent months the administration's foreign policy had been shifting from the 'Careful course' which he thought had been laid out at the outset.

Haig may have objected to a White House decision seeking to prohibit West Germany and France from furnishing equipment, manufactured under U. S. licenses, to the Soviet Union for the construction of a natural gas pipeline to Europe. If Haig did object, and the White House action backfires. Haig would be proven right. After all, our European department.

alliance is the strongest pillar of our entire policy of confrontation with the Soviets.

Haig's reaction to the Israeli invastion of Lebanon seemed fumbling and uncertain. Stronger leadership is needed in this area of our foreign policy. Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger was more outspoken in criticizing the Israeli action then Haig or U. N. Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick. It my be that George P. Shultz, named to succeed Haig as secretary of state, will be more inclined to side with Weinberger on the Middle East. After all, Shultz and Weinberger have both been executives with the Bechtel Corp., an international engineering firm with many contracts in Saudi Arabia.

The Haig mission to negotiate peace in the Falkland Islands was a failure, but it was a gallant attempt. He cannot be faulted for trying, although some would have preferred more straightforward condemnation of the Argentine aggression from the start.

The presidency is weakened by such a high - level defection. But Shultz is a heavy hitter with the stature and experience to fill Haig's shoes in a competent manner. That's good, because U. S. foreign policy needs strong leadership in the State

The restoration of Troy

city. By the middle of the 19th century, Troy was an industrial giant. The Burden Iron Works produced 51 million horseshoes in one year. The metal plates for the federal warship the Monitor were fashioned in the mills of Troy. It was the capital of the collar and cuff industry, with more than 20 collar manufacturers based in the city.

Troy's reversal of fortune was abrupt, however. Early in the 20th century, Troy lost its competitive edge. There were severe labor troubles. New

energy sources replaced the water power of the Wynantskill and Poestenkill streams. Industries moved closer to the raw materials that they had been transporting here for processing in Troy.

Left behind was a handsome 19th century city. A generation ago the Victorian character of the city was a severe handicap. Today, with the new focus on good architecture and the quality of life, the value of the city's buildings is truly appreciated. Troy has

a compact downtown district that contains a rich collection of fine commercial and public buildings. There's an abundant supply of good houses in and adjacent to the business district.

Downtown renewal often is a failure in America because improvements are seen only in terms of new high rise business structures and creation of urban plazas. City dwellers have departed from the suburbs and the suburban shopping malls.

Downtown Troy offers the amenities of classic city life - attractive business structures constructed on a human scale, myriad small specialty shops. and fine old residential housing in plentiful supply. Troy has a downtown revitalization program, and has been widely developed around existing assets. Therefore, Troy today offers a comfortable urban lifestyle which is attractive to a new generation.

An especially happy aspect of Troy's . life is the presence of the Renselaer Polytechnic institute, one of the nation's leading engineering centers. It has a major computer center which attracts new business such as IBM to the area. One needs to bear in mind, in looking at cities such as Troy, that residential housing is in very short supply and will be for years to come. Across America, young people are desperate to find and finance homes. The post - World War II dream of a home in the suburbs is an impossible dream for many. Land values have risen to the point where many young marrieds can't hope to own a suburban house such as their parents bought in the early 1950's. In this situation, the . new generation is turning towards the old urban neighborhoods that were dying of neglect.

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The silver lining in this economic . situation may be a revival of old cities. many of them in the Frost Belt, which social commentators of a few years ago thought would become ghost towns. Troy, with its bustling, beautified, downtown and attractive row houses, provides evidence that old cities in cold regions can meet the social needs of a new generation in an era of economic .

"Apeared" has to be the operative word there, because if the allied leaders had really understood and meant what they were saying to each other, their subsequent divergence could not have been so swift and so wide.

It is essentially a divergence between the Europeans as a group and the United States. There are several reasons for it - different reactions to the Israeli campaign in Lebanon, U.S. import penalties in European steel and continuing European unhappiness with U.S. economic policy in general.

But the most damaging is the post ummit intensification efforts to block the projected pipeline to fuel West European industry with Soviet natural gas. The Europeans see Washington's move to prevent not only reached in June.

The justification as spelled out in Washington - or that part of it that is vehemently anti - pipeline - is that the gas connection would put the Europeans in a dangerously dependent position, weakening Western capability and will to resist Soviet pressure. The worst - case scenario envisages a Persian Gulf upheaval cutting off Mideast oil and the soviets simultaneously closing the pipeline

Possibly. But the Europeans argue that Soviet gas is one way to lessen their present dependence on Mideast oil. And the Soviets also would have a large stake in keeping the gas flowing - the hard currency it would be earning. They could squeeze the Europeans for political purposes only at the short - term cost of needed revenues and the long - term prospect of losing customers. Judging from their performance as exporters of oil and gold, their market strategies are primarily motivated by their own economic needs.

Another sticky point for the Europeans is the continuing supply of American grain to the Soviets. This is, of course, the reverse of the gas situation - selling to rather than buying from the Soviets. And Washington's argument is that it is irrelevant anyway because the Soviets can buy grain elsewhere, as they demonstrated during the Carter

Still, it rankles the Europeans who read the American position on Soviet trade as being "do as we say, not as we

administration embargo.

But even accepting Washington's questionable that the economic points to be scored against the Soviets in this fashion are worth the consequent political damage to the Western alliance

That alliance has survived many strains - American preoccupation with a long war in Vietnam intensely inpopular in Europe, the quarrel with France over ledershiip, Britain's economic warfare with its major continental partners.

But not since the Suez crisis of 1956 has the United States taken such direct and forceful action against its own

The alliance did not succumb in that trial and it is very unlikely that it will in this one. But it will leave its disfiguring

The worst thing about it is that the way it has been allowd to develop, the Soviets will gain no matter how it turns out. If the pipeline goes through, as it very likely will, they'll have their profitable new gas business. Should it be bloked, there will be political compensation in European resentment of the American strong - arming.

goods' brings on a spiral of earnings and prices that ends when it erupts into an economy - shattering condition of worthless currency. Prewar Germany suffered wild

inflation, and brought the spectacle of "creditors fleeing debtors, who caught them and mercilessly paid them off with worthless Deutchmarks." In postwar Italy, shoppers carried groceries home in the bags they'd brought their money in - and had room to spare.

And those on pensions or doles had, in essence, no income whatever. The aged and infirm, as always, suffered most.

Yet our "experts" talk of recovery in terms of how much is spent, not how much is saved or how much is accomplished.

The self - styled economic sages also don't seem to understand any better than the rest of us the nature of "deferred debt" - such as our trillion dollar national debt. Like the man on the street, they seem to believe that if we don't have to pay it now, we don't have to pay it.

Not long ago, a Dallas banker returned from a vacation to Turkey, bringing a tale that is current there. A man visiting in Istanbul sees a sign

on the door of a fancy restaurant : "Eat all you want - no limit! Any dishes, any wines. No charge: it will be

billed to your grandchildren! Why not, the man thinks to himself. No matter that I have no money: it · won't cost me a thing. And who knows...I may never have any

grandchildren. So he goes inside, and asks the waiter

if the sign is correct. He is assured that it is. There is no charge: the meal will

Laughing to himself all the while, the man orders a fabulous meal. All the dishes he's wanted to try but could never afford, he now samples. Some he orders more of. And wines: he tries a glass of every kind the restaurant has to offer. Finally he orders and tastes a dozen rich desserts, then has espresso

and an expensive cigar. As he relaxes, sipping his coffee and puffing the cigar, the waiter and manager appear before him and ceremoniously present him with a bill - for more money than he has ever seen at one time.

"But there's some mistake," he protests. "You told me the meal would be charged to my grandchildren!' "And so it will," they assure him.

'This is your grandfather's bill plus interest.' History has yet another economic lesson worth our attention

The ancient Hebrews had a system of economic sabbatical whereby every seven years all debts were abolished. Rotating, open - ended longterm debts were impossible. When payment of a debt was arranged, the creditor took care that it would be done before the time was up. Borrowers knew better than ask for terms that went beyond the end of the sabbatical period.

Because when the time was up, there were no debts. The whole game was started over with clean ledgers. How many Americans, buried under

credit - card, revolving charge account, longterm mortgage debts, could arrange their indebtedness to be paid off in seven years? How many banks could cope if they had to do without 30 - year mortgages that bring in hundreds of percent

interest over the life of the note? And how would our national government fare if it could not dump the consequences of its spending in the laps of our grandchildren, and their

grandchildren?

We'd all have to be a lot more thoughtful, and a lot more frugal, and a lot more intelligent when we decide to spend.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - The modern truant officer is now hiding in a computer.

FIRST CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE To keep tabs on students who skip classes, high-school teachers in some districts fill out a computer "scanning" sheet which is sent to the school's central office.

The sheet is entered into a scanning machine connected to a large computer system, which reports back that same day to school officials the student's name and time of absence. Parents are then asked about a child's absence

One of the first districts to install the system is the Oakland Unified School District in California where a Honeywell system covers some 24,000 junior and senior high-school students

In addition to class attendance, the computer system is used for a variety of other tasks, such as adding or deleting students from classes and making program changes.

FORT WORTH, TX — In weather as hot as Texas' can get, it is wise to know the signs of overheating and heat stroke, warns a Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine physician.

Scott Taylor, D. O., clinic director at TCOM's Institute for Human Fitness, advises coming in out of the sun and gettin a drink of cool water when you:

get cramps in the abdomen or calves; feel flushed; seem disoriented; are nauseated.

When the relative humidity is not high, the body cools most efectively by evaporation. Placing the person in a shaded area and fanning the neck and trunk will usually be sufficient

When the relative humidity is high, the body cools most effectively by conduction. Cool rags, cool water from a garden hose or ice packs to the head, neck and armpits will help conduct heat out of the body.

"The problem has gone past overheating and is heading into heat stroke when the person becomes extremely disoriented or stops sweating," Dr. Taylor said. "Then it's time for a physician or an ambulance.














CLOSE CALL. Cliff Medley of the Pampa All-Stars slides underneath third baseman

Giants steal 8-7 win over Montreal

The San Francisco Giants don't scare you with their speed or power, though you'll never convince the Montreal Expos of that.

The Giants entered Sunday's game with the Expos ranked fifth in the National League in homers and had only 56 stolen bases in 88 games. Yet they got five of each in edging the slumping Expos 8-7 in 10 innings.

'We're not the best club speed-wise, but if you were to ask me if I thought we'd have a better chance of hitting five homers or stealing five bases, I'd say stealing five bases," noted Giants catcher Milt May. It was May, with two of the five homers, who paced the San Francisco victory.

May's solo homer with one out in the 10th provided the winning margin, handing Montreal its 15th defeat in 20 games.

Reggie Smith, May and Champ Summers hit consecutive home runs in the second inning, all off Montreal starter Scott Sanderson. Joe Morgan

homered in the third. But Montreal catcher Gary Carter, who was victimized on the stolen bases - by Smith, Jim Wohlford. Chili Davis and two by Johnnie LeMaster - had a solo homer, RBI single and a sacrifice fly

Then May won the last game for the teams before

"We weren't stealing on Gary Carter, we were

getting our steals on the pitchers," said Giants Manager Frank Robinson. "If you want to put it in terms of numbers, it's definitely our most aggressive game of the season on the basepaths. We've been trying to play that way for the last few weeks, things like taking the extra base and forcing the other teams into mistakes.'

The Expos have been making plenty of mistakes

"We don't need three days to think about this loss or any other in the last 20 days," claimed Montreal Manager Jim Fanning.

After knocking on the door for the last month, the Milwaukee Brewers have finally broken through to the top of the American League East.

"We not only made first place after being 81/2 games out, we had to climb over five clubs to get there," says Charlie Moore. "And we did it in just over a month. I think everybody has to respect us

Italy claims World Cup with win over West Germany

MADRID, Spain (AP) - World Cup champion Italy headed home to a hero's welcome after beating powerful West Germany with a goalkeeper who was supposed to be too old and a star who was supposed to be rusty from a two-year suspension.

"This is the happiest day of my life, one that I have worked towards for many years," said coach Enzo Bearzot, who was carried across the field on his players' shoulders after Italy captured its first world championship in 44 years with a 3-1 win over the West Germans on Sunday.

Paolo Rossi, Marco Tardelli and Sandro Altobelli scored second-half goals to fashion the triumph for Italy. Dino Zoff, the 40-year old goalie, played superbly and came within seven minutes of being the first to record a shutout in a World Cup final. Paul Breitner netted the lone German goal after the game was out of reach.

Rossi is Italy's newest superstar after rebounding from a two-year suspension for his alleged involvement in a game-fixing bribery scandal, become the tournament's leading scorer with six goals.

It was the first time in four years that the West Germans lost to a team from Europe. Italy, having also won the cup in 1938 and 1934, now shares Brazil's mark of three world

championships. The victory touched off delirious celebrations throughout Italy, with more than 300,000 people parading and dancing

KARL-MARX-STADT, East Germany (AP) - American men produced a mild upset, but the U.S. women ran into an East German buzzsaw in the first track and field meet between the two countries.

Sprinter Calvin Smith's blazing time in the 100 meters helped the men's team to defeat the East Germans 1201/2-1021/2 in the two-day meet that ended Saturday.

But the United States women's team was trounced 105-52, by a East German team that American women's Coach Dr. Bert Lyle called "by far the finest in the world." The women's performance helped the East Germans win the overall meet. 2071/2-1721/2

Smith's 9.91-second clocking Friday would have broken the 14-year-old world record of 9.95 by American James Hines. But there was a tail wind of 2.1 meters per second, one-tenth of a meter per second over the allowable limit. Men's Coach Sam Adams said Smith's run was

"exceptional" and added, "We are very proud to have won the men's duel against the East German team. We needed many good performances to beat them." The meet ended three weeks of competition involving United

States, East German and Soviet Union teams. Two weeks ago, the East Germans beat the Soviets, while last week the Soviets beat the Americans in both men's and women's meets. The American men won seven of 12 events Saturday to overcome a 48-47 deficit. James Butler and Terron Wright
