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Queen has bedroom chat with prowler

LONDON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II found a prowler sitting on her bed in Buckingham Palace and chatted with him for 10 minutes to keep him calm until she could summon a footman to take him away, the Daily Express reported today.

It said the 56-year-old monarch was unharmed and "unruffled by her ordeal."

"The queen was very brave," the Express quoted an unidentified senior police detective as saying. "By being calm she did not alarm the man — or he would have panicked and it might have been a completely different story."

The report of the bizarre encounter Friday prompted calls from legislators for a government inquiry into security for the royal family. Workmen spent the weekend stringing barbed wire atop

the old iron spikes on the brick wall around Buckingham Palace.

A palace spokesman appeared to confirm the Daily Express report, saying, "We cannot add any more (because) a man has been charged." Once a person is charged with an offense under British law nothing can be reported about the suspect beyond what is said in court.

Police said Michael Fagan, a 30-year-old vagrant, was charged Saturday with breaking into the palace on June 7 and stealing a half-bottle of wine. Police said he was arrested inside the palace again at about 3 a.m. Friday, apparently after his late-night encounter with the queen.

The defendant, who appeared in court Saturday barefoot and wearing a dirty T-shirt and jeans, was ordered held

without bail pending trial. Scotland Yard refused to say why Fagan was not immediately charged with the second break-in.

Other publications, including the respected London Times, picked up the Express report. The tabloid Mirror newspaper said Police Commissioner Sir David McNee was "furious" at the breakdown in palace security, which includes military units, police, servants, burglar alarms and closed-circuit television.

The Daily Express said an unidentified intruder entered the queen's second-floor bedroom and sat on her bed. The queen talked to him quietly for about 10 minutes until she gained his confidence, then summoned a footman on the pretense of getting the prowler a cigarette, and the servant hustled him away, the report said.

The queen's husband, Prince Philip, was sleeping in a separate bedroom at the time of the incident, it said.

A Conservative Party member of Parliament, Harry Greenway, said he would question Home Secretary William Whitelaw today in the House of Commons on whether security is adequate for the royal family.

"It seems utterly incredible and breathtaking that someone should be able to worm his way into Buckingham Palace and the queen's own private apartment in this way," Greenway said.

Scotland Yard said Police Commissioner McNee had named Assistant Commissioner John Dellow, 51, to investigate security breaches at the palace following the fifth intrusion in the past 12 months.

Congressional mood against Israel is growing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee says he is in sympathy with a growing mood in Congress to slash U.S. aid to Israel because of its invasion of Lebanon.

In his strongest statement yet on the fighting between Israeli and Palestine Liberation Organization forces, Sen. Charles Percy said Sunday that relations between Israel and the United

States are at the lowest point they've been in 25 years.

Appearing on CBS' "Face The Nation," the Illinois Republican accused Israel of breaking a pledge to the United States that there would be "no surprises" between them.

But Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin said today that, had Israel forewarned the United States, the Americans would have been

accused by the Soviet Union and its radical Arab allies of collusion.

Percy said he plans to voice "deep reservations" about sending U.S. troops to Beirut to evacuate the PLO when he and other congressional leaders meet Tuesday with Reagan and Secretary of State-designate George P. Shultz.

Reagan said Sunday that he also is "wary" about his plan announced a week ago to send 1,000 U.S. combat troops to Beirut to evacuate the trapped PLO forces from their remaining stronghold.

Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said Sunday that if U.S. forces are sent to Beirut, they would be there only for a few days.

Mystery surrounds death of Skellytown man

A 19-year-old Skellytown youth died early Sunday morning in Amarillo, but no one seems able to explain why.

Officials were mum today about the Sunday death of Timothy Wayne Lick.

An autopsy has been ordered in connection with his death, but the official who ordered the autopsy, Skellytown Justice of the Peace Becky Hobson, said she knew little of the mystery death today, and other

officials refused to talk about it or claimed ignorance.

What is known is that the young man's heart and breathing were stopped when he was brought by private car to North Plains Hospital in Borger about 11:15 p.m. Saturday.

A hospital spokeswoman said the youth was "resuscitated" at the Borger hospital and later transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Potter County Justice of the Peace Roy Byrd of Amarillo said he was called to the hospital about 2:30 a.m. Sunday in connection with the death.

Byrd said he was called to the hospital by Amarillo doctor Charles Rimmer. Byrd said Rimmer treated the youth in Amarillo, but the doctor declined to list a cause of death, according to the JP.

Hobson said Byrd contacted her about the death about 3:30 a.m. Sunday, and she said she ordered an autopsy. However, she said today she "knows little" about the death of the lifelong Skellytown resident. "At this time, I don't know anything to tell you, except he expired last night," Hobson said.

The autopsy ordered by Hobson is being conducted by Childress pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann.

Carson County Sheriff Connie Reid said he was unaware of the circumstances surrounding the death of Lick but said, "We need to know about it." Reid referred inquiries to Hobson.

A spokesman for the Borger Police Department said, "That was worked by the sheriff's office," when that agency was contacted about the mystery death.

However, Hutchinson County Sheriff Lon Blackmon said the only thing he knew about the death was the youth died in Amarillo and Hobson ordered an autopsy. "I don't know what authority

she was acting on, but I guess she ordered it. He died in Amarillo," Blackmon said.

A spokesman for Northwest Texas Hospital said, "I can't give out that information," concerning an inquiry about Lick's death.

A spokesman for the Amarillo doctor said he would be out of the office until later today.

The funeral director in charge of the youth's services said he did not know how the youth died.

A spokeswoman for North Plains Hospital confirmed the youth was first treated there late Saturday night, prior to his death early Sunday morning.

Mrs. Rebecca King said, "He came in by private car about 11:15 p.m. with cardiac and respiratory arrest. We are not positive about the reason why," she said today.

Services for Lick are pending with Carmichael - Whately Funeral Directors.

He was a lifelong resident of Skellytown and was a member of First Assembly of God Church.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Lick; one brother, Eddie Ray, all of Skellytown; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Lick, of Skellytown; and Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Green of Ft. Worth.

Mexican train derails, drops into deep ravine

TEPIC, Mexico (AP) — A passenger express train known as The Bullet jumped the rails near this Pacific coast city and plunged into a deep ravine, killing as many as 35 people, authorities said today.

The train was bound Sunday from Nogales, across the border from Arizona, to Guadalajara, 332 miles northwest of the Mexican capital, an office of the federal district attorney's office here said.

Robert Downes, U.S. consul at Mazatlan, 173 miles north of Tepic, said he had no information on whether there were Americans on board. He said Americans living in border areas often take the express train to travel to Pacific coast points in Mexico. The Mazatlan consulate covers the Tepic area.

Bertha Felap, an employee at the U.S. Consulate in Guadalajara, said the consulate there also did not know if the train was carrying Americans. "We've worked all afternoon Sunday and all night, and rescue squads are

still trying to pry the wreckage loose. We have no firm figure, but I believe there may be as many as 35 people killed," Red Cross spokesman Manuel Morales said in a telephone interview.

"We also don't know about the number of injured, but they run into the dozens," Morales said.

Mexican television said in unconfirmed reports that the death toll could be as high as 50.

District attorney spokesman Alfredo Ruben said the train crashed sometime between 1 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. Sunday near Station Corte, 19 miles north of Tepic.

Tepic is 476 miles northwest of Mexico City.

"Frankly, we do not have any precise information on the number of victims, but we have people checking the hospitals and other aid stations," Ruben said.

The attorney general's office is in charge of investigating accidents involving federal property. The train from Nogales to Guadalajara belongs to the state-owned Pacific Railway.

Reagan is optimistic about Lebanon, wary about troops

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, conceding that he is wary about sending U.S. troops into Beirut, says there are "reasons for some optimism" for a settlement to the crisis in Lebanon.

Speaking to reporters aboard Air Force One as he flew back to Washington after an 11-day vacation in California, Reagan said the situation between Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization is "still just iffy and too touchy."

"I think there are reasons for some optimism," he said. But he added, "We've been disappointed before."

Asked if he believed Americans were wary of his plan to dispatch 1,000 U.S.

combat forces to evacuate the PLO from its remaining stronghold, Reagan told reporters, "I would expect them to be."

"I'm wary myself," the president said. "That's why we want to impose certain conditions."

U.S. special envoy Philip Habib is attempting to mediate an end to the fighting between the Israelis, who have surrounded west Beirut, and trapped PLO guerrillas. Artillery and rocket dueling between the two sides delayed negotiations Sunday, until a new U.S.-arranged cease-fire went into effect late in the day.

Wind shear alerts given minutes before takeoff

KENNER, La. (AP) — Cockpit recordings from a Pan Am jet may show whether the crew heard control tower reports of potentially dangerous wind currents before the plane took off in a thunderstorm and crashed minutes later, investigators say.

The National Transportation Safety Board said two wind shear alerts were issued about a minute apart, 7½ minutes before Flight 759 crashed after takeoff Friday just outside New Orleans, killing all 145 people aboard and eight on the ground.

But the National Transportation Safety Board refused Sunday to speculate whether wind shear — swirling, unpredictable winds that disrupt normal air currents — caused the nation's second-worst plane crash.

Jefferson Parish Coroner Dr. Charles Odom said the identification of the dead should be nearly finished today, and the bodies released to relatives.

The victims, laid out in refrigerator trucks in a huge Delta Air Lines hangar at Moisant Airport, were examined by a team of pathologists, medical experts and the FBI's identification unit.

"There probably will be some that will be almost impossible to identify, but once the fingerprints are in, indications are 90 percent will be identified," Odom said.

The flight of the Boeing 727 originated in Miami and was headed for Las Vegas, Nev., and San Diego.

NTSB spokeswoman Barbara Dixon said it was possible the crew never heard the wind shear alerts. The pilot

could have switched radio frequencies from ground control, which governs taxiing planes, to local control, which instructs takeoffs and landings, she said.

But the presence of wind shear alone does not warrant cancellation of a flight, said NTSB vice chairwoman Patricia Goldman. Investigators will learn more when the "black box" cockpit voice recording is processed by an FBI lab, she said.

The recorder's container was damaged by fire after the crash. The tape was not affected, but it contains background noise, such as sounds of the plane's windshield wipers, and the quality is poor, Mrs. Goldman said.

Investigators plan to use sophisticated recording equipment to try to eliminate the background noise.

In the Morningside subdivision, where the plane devastated 11 houses along a quarter-mile strip, the process of demolition continued.

City housing inspectors condemned structures, and bulldozers Sunday scraped up a block of former houses into a pile of rubble up to 15 feet high. The wreckage is to be trucked to the city dump.

Searchers found \$35,000 in cash and checks on one of the bodies, and smaller amounts on two others, deputies said. Many of the victims had been bound for the gambling mecca of Las Vegas.

Archbishop Phillip Hannan of New Orleans held a funeral mass Sunday at Our Lady of Perpetual Help, the parish church for the people on the ground who died.

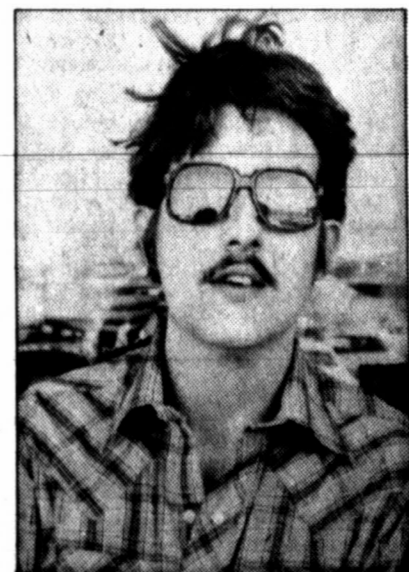
CAROLYN NEWCOMBE, teacher, Canadian:

Price wars driving grocers out of business

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — For every pound of sugar Norman Pentecost sells, he loses 25 cents. He says he has no other choice, trapped in a grocery store price war that has driven one chain here out of business and another into bankruptcy.

Pentecost, president of the San Antonio Retail Grocers Association, operates a small store on the northwest side of the city.

The price war began in 1980 when Kroger opened the first of nine grocery stores in the San Antonio area, invading the traditional turf of H.E.B. Food Stores, a large South Texas chain owned by H.E. Butts Co.

"We knew that H.E.B. was not going to stand for a national chain to come in and take over the market," Pentecost said.

Since that time, San Antonio consumers have enjoyed a dramatic drop in prices.

Milk that was selling two years ago for \$2.39 a gallon dropped to \$1.69. Until the last few weeks, bread that cost a retailer 50 cents a loaf was selling three for \$1. A pound of sugar that costs \$1.50 wholesale goes for \$1.29.

Pentecost, who said he recently conducted a computer simulation of the costs of the average grocery store, estimated that Kroger is losing between \$7 million and \$10 million a year in its San Antonio stores.

H.E.B. is losing less because its volume is higher. Pentecost said, estimating H.E.B. revenues are down about 10 percent since the price war began.

Handy Andy Supermarkets, which operates 23 of its 27 stores in San Antonio, filed for bankruptcy last fall and then lodged a \$42 million antitrust suit against H.E.B.

Officials of Handy Andy claim the "predatory

price" policy" of H.E.B. cost their company \$14 million.

H.E.B. has not responded to the lawsuit, court records show.

The Deluxe Stores, a smaller chain, had filed a \$6 million antitrust suit against both H.E.B. and Kroger. But the chain went out of business and was forced to drop the suit in April 1981 because of lack of funds.

The San Antonio Retail Grocers Association filed a similar antitrust complaint against H.E.B. last fall with the Federal Trade Commission. That complaint and the Handy Andy suit are still pending, Pentecost said.

The smaller grocers say that H.E.B. and Kroger are making up their losses in San Antonio by charging higher prices elsewhere.

Man develops addiction to prescription drugs

HOUSTON (AP) — David Patrick calls himself a "legal" drug abuser.

For years, Patrick said, his doctors prescribed all the drugs he needed and his insurance picked up the tab.

"It's so damned easy to get the stuff," said Patrick, a 26-year-old dental technician.

"People spend more time on you when you're cashing a check than most doctors do giving you a prescription. The doctors can't get the police to arrest me because they're calling in the prescriptions for me."

Three years ago, Patrick asked doctors for a prescription to ease the pain caused by a chronic disease and a string of medical ailments.

He said he managed to obtain prescriptions with incredible ease from more than 50 Houston doctors —

many who never examined him.

The clean-cut, bespectacled Patrick is suffering from Crohn's Disease, an ailment that forces him to use prescription medication to quiet his small intestine. He is hooked on Lomotil, a synthetic drug similar to a narcotic that in large amounts would dangerously block the bowels of a healthy person.

Patrick said his dependency on Lomotil slowly developed from his temporary addiction to painkillers he received to reduce the discomfort from other unrelated medical problems.

Patrick said he has undergone surgery for appendicitis, kidney stones and urethral strictures.

"After a while, even if I just got depressed or something

got me down, I'd go call a doctor. I knew I could do it. I knew how easy it was," he said.

"I wanted to float about the room, read my book and forget about the pain. I was absolutely not going to hurt anymore."

After each illness he withdrew from the medication, only to be hit with a new ailment, he said.

In 1980, Crohn's Disease began to act up and his doctor

prescribed a daily dose of three to five Lomotil.

Patrick admits he used many "tricks" to get the prescriptions, bypassing the loopholes designed by the medical community to prevent drug misuse.

He said he learned that doctors on call for others are unfamiliar with the patients and medical records of their colleagues and often are careless when writing prescriptions. Many also failed to fill in the number of refills allowed, so Patrick said he did it for them.

Patrick said he once threw an empty prescription bottle into his backyard and let his puppy play with it so he could take the mangled bottle to the pharmacist and get it refilled.

"I took it into a pharmacy and said, 'You're not going to believe this.' He refilled it," Patrick said.

James Randall Bryant, 19, of Ashland, Ala., and Douglas Roy Beightol, a Miami, Fla., man believed to be 18 or 19, have been charged with kidnapping in warrants issued

in Amarillo, Texas, said Richard Goss, FBI supervisory agent.

Beightol was arrested after authorities received an anonymous tip that the two men were at the farmhouse. Bryant was captured at the home of a cousin near Garnett after his girlfriend told authorities he planned to visit there, Hermreck said.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas" reopened Sunday night, but only on the screen.

The \$25 million musical is based on Larry King's hit play about the demise of the "Chicken Ranch."

The premiere of the film, most of which was shot in and near Austin, was a benefit for the Paramount Theater, an ornate, restored movie house.

Organizers said the event raised \$160,000, although Universal studio's cost for staging the premiere was reported to be more than twice that figure.

Gov. Bill Clements gave Reynolds and Miss Parton plaques making them honorary "Texas stars," and

Reynolds delighted the crowd by mugging during Clements' speech touting the attributes of Texas as a filmmaking capital.

Miss Parton, meanwhile, delighted Austin Mayor Carole McClellan by telling her, "We look like twins!"

"I was a little worried about not being a Texan and playing this part," said Reynolds, "but you've made me feel like a Texan and I'm very proud."

The premiere festivities were being taped for a special television broadcast.

The movie recanted the events surrounding the 1975 closing of the "Chicken Ranch," a plainly illegal establishment long tolerated by state and local officials.

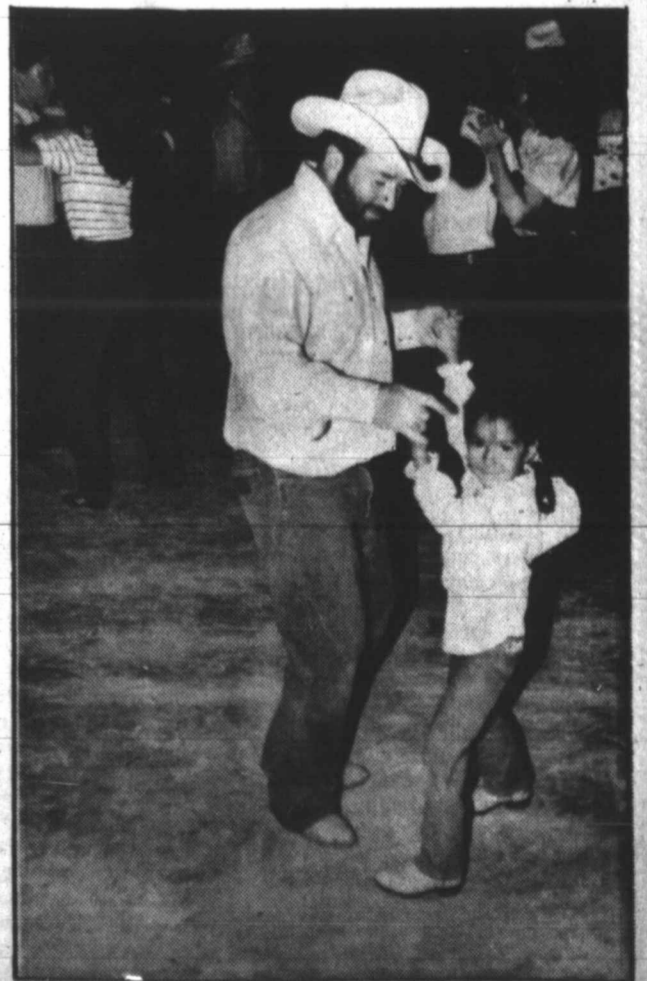
Miss Parton portrays Miss Mona, the madam. Reynolds the local sheriff finally forced to close the bordello down.

The healing power in "thank you"

An old cliché, honesty is the best policy, may be a good idea; but, is the result always the best? Both situations call for an honest answer. There may be more harm than good if the response is negative. The problem is that everyone around is honest except Mr. Bunker, who refuses to accept reason and popular opinion.

Whenever the crowd flows one way, most people follow along. As the pendulum swings back, crowds follow. How can we change the feeling of crowds so they will be able to accept honesty as the best policy? One important way is to be appreciative. Archie does not know the way to show appreciation and distorts certain facts, confusing Edith to believe he knows what he is talking about. Appreciation and gratitude seldom reach Archie's thinking. There is healing power in stroking. It takes very little time. The importance is in recognizing accomplishments which took personal effort. Once the task is completed, praise is like icing on the cake, tasty and satisfying, regardless of whether we give it to ourselves or to another person. Positive feedback produces healing power for our mortality. Our emotions need stroking.

Don't let the heat beat you

FORT WORTH, TX — In weather as hot as Texas can get, it is wise to know the signs of overheating and heat stroke, warns a Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine physician. Scott Taylor, D. O., clinic director at TCOM's Institute for Human Fitness, advises coming in out of the sun and getting a drink of cool water when you: get cramps in the abdomen or calves; feel flushed; seem disoriented; are nauseated. When the relative humidity is not high, the body cools most effectively by evaporation. Placing the person in a shaded area and fanning the neck and trunk will usually be sufficient. When the relative humidity is high, the body cools most effectively by conduction. Cool rags, cool water from a garden hose or ice packs to the head, neck and armpits will help conduct heat out of the body. "The problem has gone past overheating and is heading into heat stroke when the person becomes extremely disoriented or stops sweating," Dr. Taylor said. "Then it's time for a physician or an ambulance."

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — The modern truant officer is now hiding in a computer. To keep tabs on students who skip classes, high-school teachers in some districts fill out a computer "scanning" sheet which is sent to the school's central office. The sheet is entered into a scanning machine connected to a large computer system, which reports back that same day to school officials the student's name and time of absence. Parents are then asked about a child's absence. One of the first districts to install the system is the Oakland Unified School District in California where a Honeywell system covers some 24,000 junior and senior high-school students. In addition to class attendance, the computer system is used for a variety of other tasks, such as adding or deleting students from classes and making program changes.

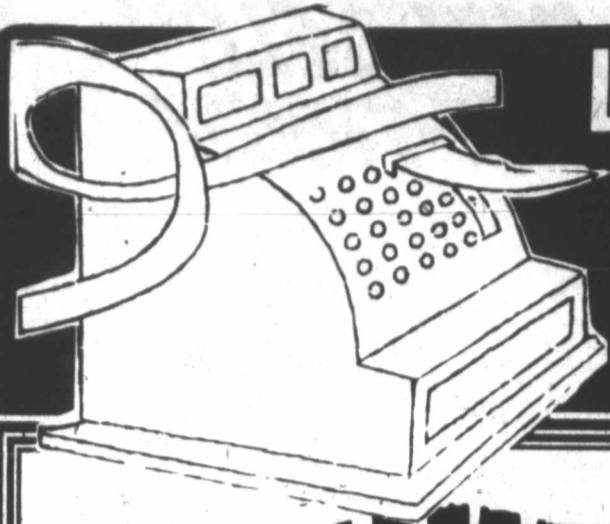
