Marshall Bill Due for Fast Congress Okay

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate jumped ahead of the House today in the rush to clear the way for Gen. George C. Marshall to re-enter the cabinet as secretary of defense.

There was a chance the Senate would pass today and the House tomorrow, but it is in this case it is all right for a military man to take over a post reserved by law for a civilian.

Senate Democratic Leader Lucas of Illinois, predicting easy passage, looked for a spot in the program to bring the bill up today.

Yet some rumblings of opposition rolled up. They were directed not against Marshall as an individual, nor against his qualifications, but against making an exception even for him.

Some lawmakers said, too, it is strange that among 180,000,000 Americans there isn't somebody else with enough stature for the job, without drafting a man who already has served as soldier and statesman and earned the right to retire.

These complaints came mostly from Republicans. But there was no organized opposition. And it was obvious that what there was didn't pack enough punch to stop President Truman's new Marshall either in the Senate or House.

For the most part, congressmen were in wide agreement this time with retiring Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson, who in resigning called Marshall "a man of such stature that the very act of naming him will promote national and international unity."

Johnson quit Tuesday under the fire of many enemies who said he weakened national defense in the name of economy. He favored Marshall as his successor.

President Truman swiftly accepted both the resignation and the suggestion. The 69-year-old Marshall, who was Army chief of staff in World War II and secretary of state, had agreed to serve his country once more.

Congress started taking short cuts to make it possible. Action is needed to get around a provision in the 1947 armed services authorization law that nobody can hold a cabinet post who has been active duty as a commissioned officer in the past 10 years.

The president sent Congress a bill yesterday and with it word he believes that "in view of the present critical circumstances and of General Marshall's unusual qualifications," it would serve the national interest to make an exception in this instance.

Without any hearings, the Senate's armed services committee okayed the bill immediately, even before it was introduced in the Senate.

The companion House committee put off a decision until Friday. But Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) told reporters that nobody would be approved then and he would bring it up on the floor later in the day.

Chairman Tydings (D-Md) of the Senate committee told the Senate in a formal report that the committee feels an exemption is "fully justified" for Marshall. But he said it wanted "emphatically to reaffirm" the principle that military establishments ordinarily must stay in civilian hands.

The committee vote was 10 to 2. Senators Knowland (R-Calif.) and Cain (R-Wash.), both World (See MARSHALL, Page 2)

Profits Levy Bill Faces Crucial Test

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House faced a crucial vote today on whether a multi-billion-dollar excess profits levy on corporations will be shoved into the \$4,508,000,000 general tax boosting bill.

No one could say for sure what the outcome would be, but some of the possibilities were:

1. Supporters of a super tax on big profits may fail to get it into the present tax bill but they may force a declaration by the House that Congress should stay in session until it acts upon a separate bill for the same purpose.

2. If they succeed in getting the profits tax into the present bill, final action on the general tax measure might be delayed while the profits levy is being studied, with the result that the increased rates on individual incomes could not become effective Oct. 1 as planned.

3. In any event it appeared certain there will be an excess profits tax, later if not now. If enacted later it may be made retroactive to cover a part of 1950 corporation income.

The profits tax idea gathered powerful backing in the House, among both Democrats and Republicans.

Thirty-two House Republicans issued a statement declaring that they will oppose any adjournment of Congress until it acts on such a tax.

"It is intolerable," they said, "to send American youths into battle, or even to freeze wages and prices, without at the same time removing the excess profits resulting from war."

The battle today is not on whether there shall be such a levy, but whether it shall be made part of the present bill.

Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) of the House ways and means committee said he is as strong for an excess profits tax as anybody, but he pleaded for time to study several means of applying it before Congress acts.

President Truman has asked for an excess profits tax but has advised that Congress consider this after the November election.

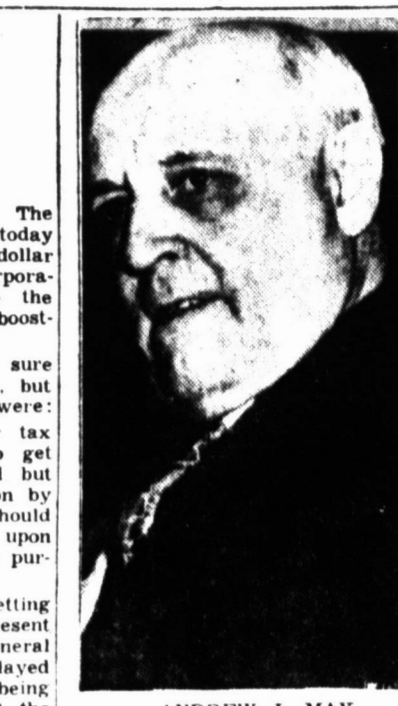
The excess profits battle was headed off in the Senate two weeks ago when language was inserted in the tax measure calling on Congress to write such a levy next year and make it retroactive to Oct. 1, 1950, or July 1, 1950.

Some supporters of the profits tax argue, however, that the present Congress cannot instruct the next Congress what to do.

Rep. Eberhardt (D-Pa.) and several other members have inserted in the tax measure a provision that would raise the total tax increase to more than \$10,000,000,000.

Former Solon Given Parole

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Former Rep. Andrew Jackson May (D-Ky.), convicted of accepting a bribe and joining in a conspiracy in connection with World War II munitions contracts, has been granted a parole.

George G. Killinger, chairman of the federal parole board, told reporters the 78-year-old former lawmaker will be released Monday from the Ashland, Ky., federal correctional institution.

Killinger said May's age and poor health, plus "an outstanding institutional record" were major factors in the board's decision to free him.

May plans to return to law practice at his home in Prestonburg, Ky.

The board voted to grant the parole on condition that May leave announced until today in order to notify officials of the Ashland institution.

May, wartime chairman of the House military affairs committee, received a sentence of from eight to 24 months.

He became eligible for parole August 4 when he had served 8 months.

At that time the parole board turned down his application, but it remained on file subject to action at any time.

The Garsony and Garson brothers — Henry and Murray — were convicted with May in July, 1947, after a long trial that was a Washington sensation. The Garsons were accused of paying May \$5,000 to use his influence to get them war contracts. They received sentences identical to May's.

May began serving his sentence last December after a series of unsuccessful appeals. He waged unsuccessful appeals and began serving (See FORMER SOLON, Page 2)

North Korean Sinking Claim Flatly Denied

TOKYO, Friday — (AP) — Heavy attacks by allied warships and carrier planes on Korea's west coast — an apparent prelude to the promised big push — prompted the Reds last night to claim four U.S. landing craft and three destroyers were sunk.

The U.S. Navy in Washington said it had no report of any landing-type vessels being involved in the heaviest surface bombardment of the war by British and American ships in the vicinity of Inchon, west coast port for the Red-held capital city of Seoul.

The Navy said the Reds did inflict "superficial damage" on three U.S. destroyers during the Inchon bombardment yesterday.

With ground action relatively scanty and American commanders predicting future offensive operations against the North Koreans, allied sources in Tokyo said it sounded as if the Reds were trying to manufacture a "victory" by implying that a landing effort had been repulsed.

Far East naval headquarters said earlier that Task Force 77 wrought damage along a 210-mile western stretch of the main blows being at Inchon.

The attacks against troops, gun emplacements and airstrips were disclosed by the Navy Thursday.

Allied ground forces either held firm or gained on the beachhead perimeter 100 miles to the southeast.

Particularly active was the northern flank of the northwestern corner before Taegu, 100 miles north of the Taegu-Kyongju highway eastward. The U.S. first cavalry division seized three heights north of Taegu. Comparatively small-scale fighting flared on the southern front.

But the Navy was in the spotlight.

On the east coast, an American battleship cruised up and down the Sea of Japan off Pohang port. One of its three escorting destroyers whipped into the Red-held harbor and exchanged fire with shore batteries.

The battleship didn't fire a shot.

Attention was focused on the west coast by the two-day naval assault, however. Islands flanking Inchon have been seized by South Korean commandos — both for harassing the Reds' seaborne supply and to prepare for a possible offensive.

A P'yongyang broadcast of the North Korean war communiqué had this to say about the allied naval action:

"On Sept. 13, the people's army, navy and coastal patrol units subjected United States naval craft invading the waters in the neighborhood of Inchon to gunfire and sank three small destroyers and four landing craft and damaged three other landing craft."

The U.S. Navy said American and British cruisers and destroyers blasted two whole days at Inchon, port for Seoul, which is 22 miles inland.

Carrier planes went after airstrips, troops and gun emplacements there and along a 210-mile western coastal strip.

The strikes were disclosed an allied ground force, more than 150 miles to the southeast, either held or punched out gains on the beachhead perimeter.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman showed himself off last night as one of the sights of the capital.

So, he added, he dropped over to "let you see me as one of the sights of Washington."

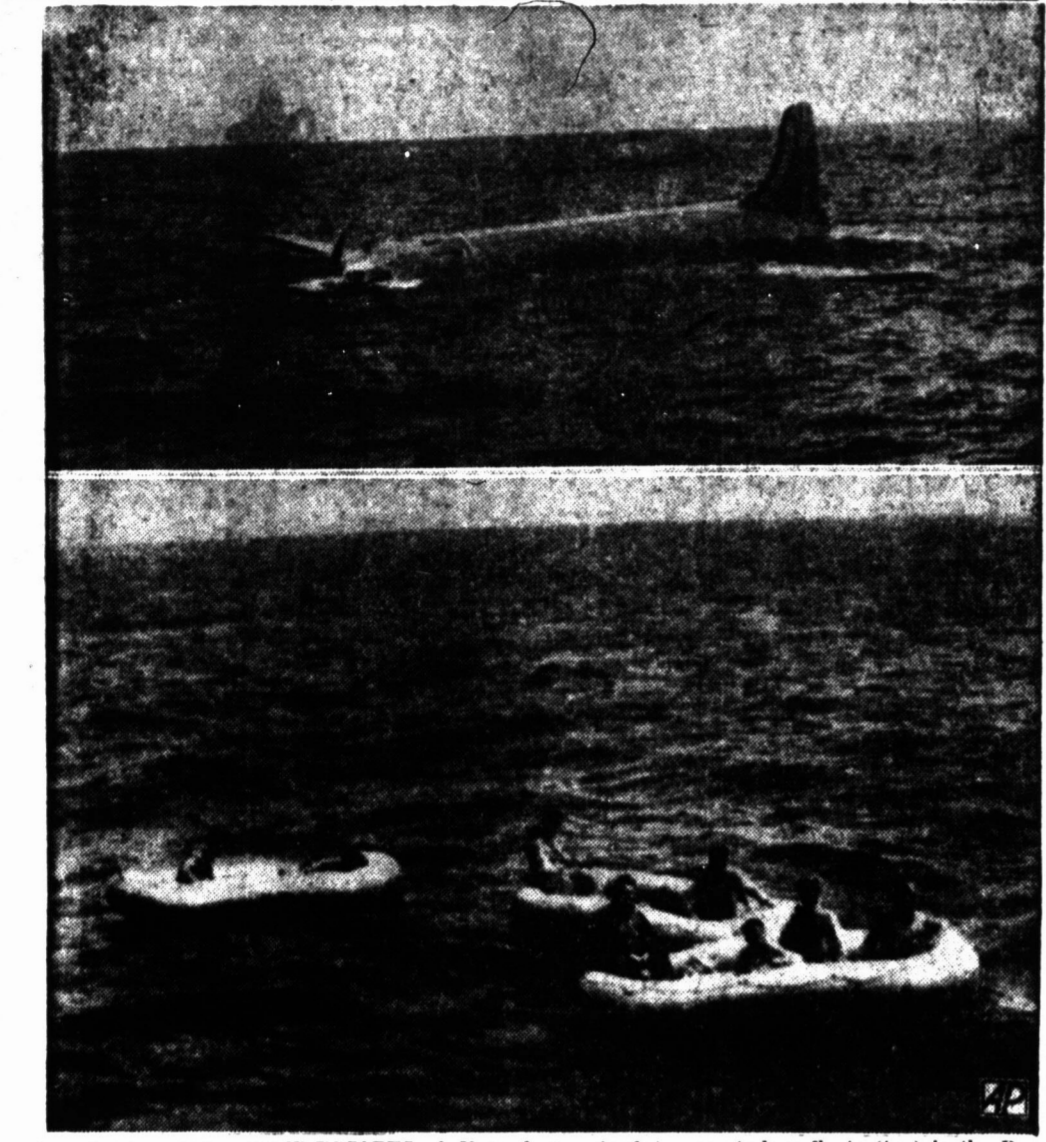
In an unannounced appearance at the association's banquet at the Statler Hotel, the president again criticized persons whom he accused of throwing bricks at government employees.

12 Arrested in British Government Lottery Raid To Take Over Steel

MIAMI, Fla. — (AP) — A dozen men were under arrest today in what the FBI described as an attempted \$2,000,000 international lottery ring.

They were picked up in a series of quick raids throughout the country following a tip from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Edmund Mason, special agent in charge of the Miami FBI office, said the tip came when the Mounties picked up a taxi driver carrying lottery tickets across the Canadian-American border.

The FBI office at Buffalo, N.Y., traced the tickets to Miami, Mason said, and agents here traced them to the Franklin Press, a commercial printing concern.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, who announced the arrests in Washington, said the men would be charged with conspiracy to violate the federal law against interstate transportation of lottery tickets. The maximum penalty is (See 12 ARRESTED, Page 2)

War Plants Given Hiring Priority in U.S. State Offices

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A national manpower program being shaped up today as war plants were given top priority in hiring at the 1,800 federal-state employment offices.

The Labor Department, in a special labor market survey and in an address by its director of employment security, reported:

1. Expansion of the labor force can take care of President Truman's doubled goals — a \$30,000,000,000 annual rate of defense spending and 3,000,000 men under arms.

2. But, if a call for full mobilization were to bring 12,500,000 men again under arms, strictly civilian industry would have to give up one-fourth of its labor supply. It would lose 6,600,000 workers.

Hoiles Newspapers Lauded For Policy on Columnists

A recent full-page advertisement in the Santa Ana Register, a sister publication of the Pampa Daily News, concerning the newspaper's policy in regard to the columnists appearing in the paper, prompted special notice in the Westbrook Pegler column printed on today's editorial page.

The advertisement pointed out that the Register or none of its sister papers will permit any columnist to advocate a moral or economic viewpoint unless the columnist can fully answer questions on what he is advocating.

In the column, Pegler reports that R. C. Hoiles, founder and co-publisher of the Hoiles news paper group, is "an upstream thinker and his editorials are distinguished by firm, though often unpopular, position, clearly expressed."

"He rejects the superstitious and, in many cases, dishonest assumptions that our unions are fundamentally good and only superficially bad and supports his attitude with arguments that go much deeper than the nasty conduct of union bosses," Pegler wrote of Hoiles.

The ad also said that the Register's readers were not "empty pitchers" but they were "thinking individuals." And that for this reason the Register would not run columnists who did not know enough about their subject to be able to define their terms and answer questions. To run this kind of columnist confuses the readers and does not really serve them.

The publisher also received a letter from Congressman Ralph W. Gwinn, who writes a column once a week in the Hoiles newspapers, which stated:

"The advertisement in your paper — Southern California's most consistent newspaper — is something that our unions are

Big Three Accord Seen on German Defense Measures

NEW YORK — (AP) — The big three foreign ministers drove to Berlin today to discuss German political and security problems today, with apparently good prospects of agreement on these points:

1. The United States, Britain and France should take practical measures as rapidly as possible to end the state of war which still exists between them and the West German government.

2. Germany should be given a larger, more mobile and better equipped police force to meet the Communist challenge of internal subversion and sabotage.

3. West German security against outright Red aggression continues to be primarily a responsibility of the three occupation powers but at some future time provision must be made for the Germans to share this responsibility.

On the specific proposal that German military units should be formed as part of a unified western defense force, some diplomats believe no firm decision may be made for the time being.

French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman, for whom this action now, in advance of the actual formation of European defense forces under the North Atlantic treaty.

The conference went into its third day with Schuman, Secretary of State Dean Acheson and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin scheduled to get together for another six hours or so of roundtable negotiating.

This was originally supposed to be the last day of the three-power talks. But so many problems, including all those of the Middle East and Far East, had had to be pushed back in the (See BIG THREE, Page 2)

Rotarian Traces Russian Nationality

Establishment of the Russian people through the shifting of people since 3,500 B. C. was traced briefly Wednesday for the Rotary Club by Travis Lively during the weekly noon luncheon in the Palm Room, city hall.

Lively told the group that what is known as Western civilization got its start around the small area bordering on the Mediterranean Sea. The Russian people today, and their ancestors, are not of the Eurasian type but are of a Mongoloid type, he added.

Touching the highlights, the speaker showed how one civilization would be overrun by another race which would set up an empire, decay and fall; the cycle repeated down through the centuries until the present day. He emphasized, however, that all civilizations based upon "decency, culture and good" would always bounce back, throwing the hordes of destroyers into oblivion.

During the meeting the club unanimously agreed to add one dollar a month to their meal bills, donating that dollar to Boys Ranch for a building fund. Club officers estimated this would net the ranch approximately \$75 a month.

 a great encouragement. Maybe the small town, county and city newspapers will be our salvation yet.

"The big city newspapers sink us into overwhelming despair with their double talk and with the fact that they stand for no policy. They are just like the administration or possibly a better comparison would be like a store. They seem to put merchandise into a window and sell whatever will bring a price; back of the display there is no consistent observation of principles by which the store itself can remain free to function on its own responsibility.

"I am very proud to be included in the list of those who have a 'single standard of right' with Mr. R. C. Hollis," said John W. Beck of the Daily Oklahoman, who also writes a column once a week, wrote of the policy.

It is encouraging in these times to know that at least one paper, in all our land, has set its standards high and is following a principle coincident with its responsibility. I know of no other paper, large or small, although there may be some that has set any standard at all for its writers, or that follows a consistent policy. The result is confusion to the reader, and confusion throughout the land.

Pegler's column, admired by millions, probably reaches more homes than any other single columnist in America. One of the highest paid columnists in the country, Pegler's contract with King Features Syndicate calls for a minimum salary of \$100,000 a year.

 speech at Wayne University, Detroit, said that manpower "may again become a major problem."

He estimated that the country's total labor force - at home and in uniform - can be expanded to meet the needs of the next nine months and could be boosted by 5,600,000 in a war emergency.

But he said manpower nevertheless will set the ultimate ceiling on war production.

The 5,600,000 figure does not include an estimated 2,000,000 or 3,000,000 who might be drawn from the ranks of the unemployed, because they are already counted in the labor force.

The Labor Department said the 5,600,000 represents women, youth, retired workers and others who can be lured into jobs.

- 1 small green apple, diced
- 2 small onions, chopped
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup poultry seasoning
- 2 tablespoons hot water
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 teaspoon summer savory
- 1/2 cup white wine

Ask your butcher to clean, dress but not cut up the chicken. Now crumble bread up fine in a large bowl, mix in the apple, onion, salt, seasoning, hot water and butter or margarine. Stuff the bird with this mixture but don't pack it in tightly because stuffing expands. Sew it up, tie legs together and tie wings close to body. Heat shortening in a Dutch Oven or any heavy pot that has a tight cover. Brown chicken on all sides. Add garlic, savory, and wine. Cover tightly and cook very slowly for 1 1/2 hours or until bird is tender when tested with a fork. Serves 4.

DALLAS — (AP) — Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray, Jr., said yesterday he was unable to determine "at the moment" the size of the 1951 national service life insurance dividend to be paid next spring.

"At the moment I do not know how large the dividend will be. Before it can be paid the VA will have to audit insurance accounts to determine the amount of surplus to be available for the dividend," he said.

Mexico Given Battle Flags

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — The United States today formally returned to Mexico 99 battle flags to mark, President Truman said, "the spirit of friendship and peace" between the two countries.

The U. S. chief of state told President Miguel Aleman the people of the United States are determined that "friendship, understanding, respect and peace" shall be "permanent foundations of their relations with the people of Mexico."

Ambassador Walter Thurston read the president's letter to Aleman at a brilliant ceremony in historic Chapultepec Park at which a U. S. military escort solemnly handed over the flags, captured 103 years ago.

The flags were formally presented near the monument to six Mexican cadets, who leaped to their death rather than surrender to the U. S. invaders in 1847.

Lt. Gen. Wade H. Haislip handed the first banner to President Aleman after a short speech praising the heroism of the Mexican cadets. Then West Point cadets, Annapolis midshipmen and Randolph Field air cadets handed the remaining flags to cadets of the Mexican military academy. These then paraded the flags within the hemicycle where the ceremony took place.

Afterward Aleman, Haislip and Thurston laid wreaths at the monument of the boy heroes and the flags were taken to Mexico's national historical museum.

Representatives of the American Legion, which sponsored the flag return, likewise placed a wreath at the monument.

10-Story Fall Doesn't Bother 4-Year-Old

NEW YORK — (AP) — Nine days after she fell out of a 10-story window, four-year-old Karen Weiler walked out of the hospital, smiling and hugging a new doll.

The little girl plunged out of a small ventilating window in the big Stuyvesant Town housing project, landing on the grass.

Next day at the hospital she wanted to go home.

The doctors, who could find nothing wrong with her, kept her the rest of the time for observation.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — (AP) — The wives and children of the nation's finest come home this way. Often, late at night, the great planes of Operation Raven stop briefly before the last leg of the long trip to the U. S. A. The North Pacific run isn't a vacation tour anymore and the evacuees arriving daily at Elmendorf Air Force Base are not the laughing, prosperous international travelers of a few weeks ago. They are families uprooted by war.

Some are shaken by their experience, but there are no tears. Volunteers who meet the planes with food and toys for the children are quick to note the women with a strained and detached look that sets them apart. They are the quiet widows of men who have died in the Korean hills.

Reluctantly they give up their infants to volunteers who feed and care for them during the stop. Some received first notification of their loss in Tokyo casualty lists; a few received suddenly terrible bundles of clothing. The health officer, the immigration man's questions, the customs examination, all are a little unreal for the women who only 20 hours before boarded planes in Japan. The reception program at Elmendorf does everything possible to comfort and care for the evacuees. First planes, after the Korean war started, were met by officers who found themselves unequipped to deal with tired mothers and fussy babies. Then volunteers from the officers' wives and NCO wives' clubs took over. The fame of their welcome has spread to Tokyo.

The operation was named after the sombre raven when it became apparent that dependents in Japan would have to return to stateside homes after husbands became casualties or as new troops required their quarters. But not all the returning dependents are bereaved by the war. Many are optimistic and it is their cheer that means much to the widows on the long Pacific flight.

Japanese-Americans Will Compete in Airplane Race

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Japanese-American aviators will race cross-country to Chicago late this month in the first such contest of its kind.

Henry Ohye, automobile dealer and sponsor of the trophy race, made the announcement today. He said five pilots of small planes are entered in the event.

"We hope to show that Japanese-Americans can fly," he said, "and overcome some of the prejudice which kept them out of the Air Force in the last war."

All the fliers, he said, were members of the much-decorated 442nd regimental combat team.

Ohye himself will fly with the group as sponsor. Trophies will be awarded for the best time and gas consumption figured according to each plane's passenger load.

Stops will be made at Yuma and Tucson, Ariz., El Paso, Big Spring and Wichita Falls, Texas, Tulsa, Okla., Columbia, Mo., Peoria and Chicago, Ill. The race starts at noon Sept. 24 and the flight is expected to reach Chicago Sept. 28, just ahead of the Japanese-American Citizens' League convention, which opens at the Stevens Hotel Sept. 28.

Florida Citrus Growers See Record Output

HOUSTON — (AP) — A record 1950 citrus crop was predicted by Florida growers at the eighth annual convention of the Texas Citrus and Vegetables Growers and Shippers Association.

Texas and California growers reported their states were making strong comebacks from last year's bad freeze.

Speakers yesterday gave these 1950 crop estimates:

Florida — 105,000,000 boxes, tangerines. Such a crop would send the state over the 10,000,000 the first time in history.

California — 47,000,000 boxes, 7 percent of normal, including grapefruit.

Texas — 15,800,000 boxes, 85 percent of normal. The new estimate includes 11,000,000 boxes of grapefruit and 4,800,000 oranges. Last year's crop was only 3,300,000 boxes.

1. Enough steel must be allotted to makers of oil field pipe and other equipment to allow needed expansion in oil exploration and development.
2. Tubular goods and other oil field equipment should be distributed on a fair basis to the petroleum industry only for current use.
3. Fair distribution to small operators should be provided. Legitimate needs of operators should be recognized without the need for established customer relationship. Distribution should be flexible enough to provide for unforeseen drilling activities.
4. Stockpiling or unneeded in-

Joe or Bill Often Just Too Tired To Write Letters

MASAN FRONT, Korea — (AP) — This problem isn't a correspondent's business. But so many of the soldiers fighting this war are worried about it that I'm going to put in a word to their wives and mothers:

Don't write Joe or Bill and ask him why he isn't sending you more letters.

He wants to. He tries to. But much of the time he just can't. Red Cross men up front are getting dozens of letters from you, asking why your man hasn't written.

Probably even Joe himself has had a letter from you beeping because he hasn't written. Not an angry letter, of course. A little hurt.

And there is always that terrible tension — the waiting. They're always with him up there in the foxhole, with mines and wire around and pretty safe. But he doesn't want to write home that sudden death is around the corner.

Or maybe, Joe or Bill is back in a regimental command post, or an ordnance or service outfit. He's working. Hard. And then falling exhausted on his bed roll under a pup tent.

He loves you, but he'll sleep till somebody shakes him awake. Then he'll go to work again. Actually, he's probably written

more letters than you got. He gives them to a guy going back to battalion headquarters, and maybe they get to the mail orderly. Maybe they don't. A lot of letters get lost in a war.

Above all, don't get petulant and stop writing to him. Letters are wonderful to get.

Just remember that Joe or Bill hasn't changed. Don't trouble him by making him wonder if you have changed, by worrying him about mail.

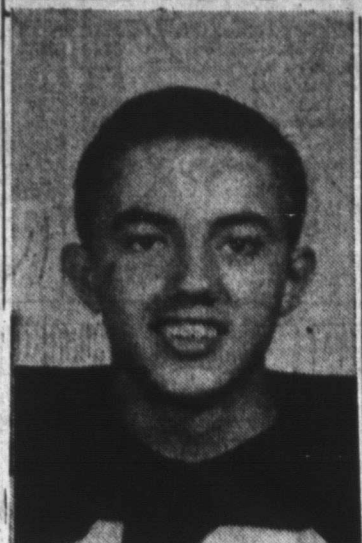
The Tigers and Yankees lock horns today in Detroit in the opener of a three-game series.

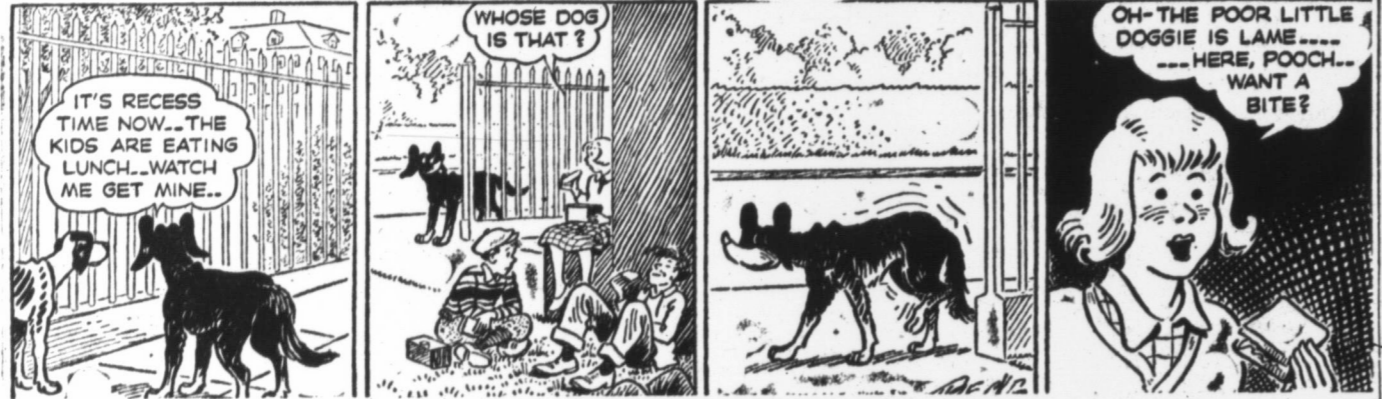

Training Eagles Is a Trick Tamer Keeps to Himself

FRANKFURT — Some people keep dogs, some keep cats but Frank Wedde keeps an eagle. "Such an eagle is the most wonderful thing in the world," the 61-year-old professional tamer says.

The eagle is not as fond of Frank as Frank is of the eagle. He has bitten Frank almost daily and once removed the middle finger of his right hand in a fit of rage.

Thirteen-year-old "Yank" sits quietly on Frank's shoulders when the story of his life is told. German mountain troopers caught him in the rugged Tatra mountains in Czechoslovakia during the war. Late in 1944 they brought him to Heidelberg. The city authorities asked Frank, who already had tamed some 30 other eagles and falcons, to care for this one too.

"Yank is the most beautiful of them all," Frank says. "He put the eagle on a regular diet of two pounds of meat a day. There has to be some variety in the food — sometimes I choose dog, sometimes hare, sometimes cat. But one month before the war ended there was not too much choice left. I usually had to take stray cats." Now Yank weighs about 12 pounds and has a wingspan of six feet and nine inches.

When American troops set up their headquarters at Frankfurt, authorities of nearby Heidelberg presented the eagle to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, then commanding the U.S. Forces in Europe.

But the general left the eagle with Frank. "I took him up to the Zugspitze, Germany's highest mountain, trained him to fly — and to come back." How he did it is a professional secret.

Although Yank has made more than 280 flights, Frank says.

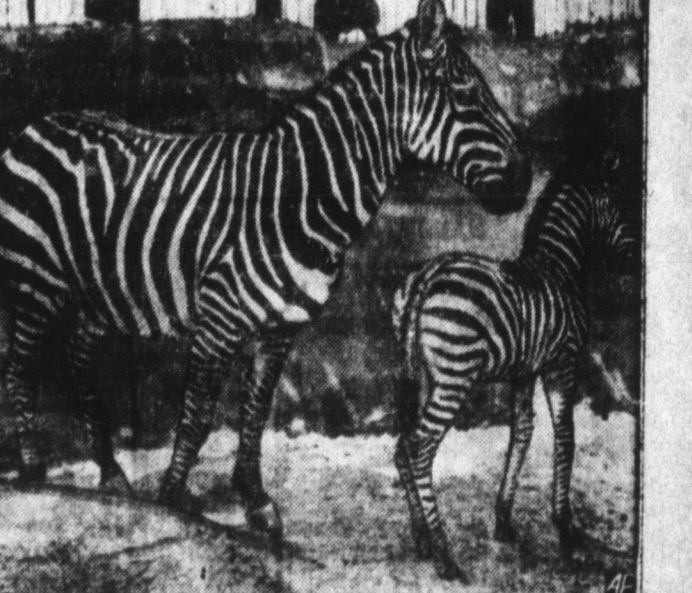
Former Solon Given Parole

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Steed of Oklahoma doesn't think anyone else from Oklahoma should be drafted until the state receives credit for men already taken into military service.

Steed said national selective service officials that Oklahoma has been asked to "provide approximately eight times as many men on a per capita basis as the national average."

He bases his statement on figures showing the mobilization of National Guard units, the call to active duty of reservists and acceptance of volunteers.

Steed said that unless Oklahoma's draft quotas are frozen, it will mean that the state will be "providing men to the extent of about 14,000 over and beyond its fair share."
