



Date-Nut Pudding in Casserole



A pudding chewy with dates and nuts gets a topping of orangy sauce to please the family that likes its desserts on the sweet side.

There is a pudding to suit every taste, and one that should please just about everybody is a rather rich date-nut topped with either an orange or lemon sauce.

This pudding will please the one who makes it, too, for it's easy to put together. Cutting up the nuts and dates takes the most time, and that isn't much. 



People are often somewhat discouraged when convalescence seems to drag on for a long time. Yet convalescence from a disease or an operation is an important part of the picture frrom nothing and industry rid-dled with fellow-travellers and and requires understanding and good medical care.

An unusual amount of rest is almost always necessary. At first, rest in bed is generally required. The person who gets up too soon or stays up too long may suffer a relapse which delays the return of perfect health. The motto of convalescence should be, "Do everything gradually." At first a short period out of

bed in a chair is in order. The periods out of bed can be gradually extended to other rooms, other floors, and the outside world. The amount of fatigue shown after the periods of being up is a good sign as to whether they have been too long or just right. In addition to gradually in-

creasing the activity, plenty of sleep and soft, but substantial foods are desirable. Most convalescents require frequent small meals rather than a few large ones.

DON'T BE IMPATIENT Of course the inclusion of special foods at this time depends on the disease or operation experienced and must be individually prescribed. The principle of small frequent feedings of easily digestible food is almost always the same, however, regardless of the type of illness suffered. Relaxation and realization of

Missing Facts in Socialized Medicine

An interesting editorial on certain phases of socialized medicine recently appeared in the Christian Science Monitor, which said, "The increase in reported sickness during Great Britain's first full year of socialized medicine has its signifance for the United States. Much of the British program is embraced in the posal of government medical care insurance which the Truman administration is promoting. . .

Sickness among adult Britons rose eight percent and workdays lost through illness 22 percent Officials credit the growth of reported illness mainly to economic reason - people no-w getting medical service who precould not afford

'But there are additional reasons. In the experience of European countries with compulsory sickness insurance it has long been observed that when work ers are taxed for medical care they often claim in unnecessarily. That is the only way that many figure they can get something back for their money. . .

"It is also a standard part of the government insurance system to give weekly cash payments to claimants. The chance to stay at home and live for a while with the aid of state funds frequently militates against a speedy return to work.

'These and other disadvantages of a national system of government insurance for medical care are getting no publicity from the Truman administration. British experience, however, is bringing out some of the missing

In other words, these medical schemes make malingerers out of the people — even as they regiment medicine, overwork the doctors to the breaking point and, seriously reduce the standards of medical care.

Inflation, is a scare word, and well it should be, but price rises, per se, do not necessarily spell inflation. Far from it. Rising prices, without an inflationary background, are a normal result of unusual consumer demand and will reverse their trend as soon as that unusual demand relaxes. And the demand will relax for not everyone is inclined to buy on a rising market.

Nor does the economy as whole suffer from this type of buying. Private incomes are limited and what is spent today cannot be spent tomorrow; so on the long pull a person would find it very difficult to "accumulate" more than his share.

BAD LABELS: War-hysteria and scare-buying were labels liberally used to describe this temporary demand: both of them terms this writer has come to loathe. Not much thought is required to figure out just what did happen, and neither war-hysteria don't even approach a descrip- truth. -Mark 5:33.

Drygoods and hard goods took the brunt of demand, and since this buying tapered off quickly it lends evidence that it was chiefly delayed fulfillment of needs, not hoarding, that was prompting the run.

PRICES MOVE BACK: As soon as the buying dropped off prices began to readjust. Not many had been affected, anyway. The futures markets for commodities were the most active on the rise. and this was largely speculation. But unless the speculator is guessing right, such prices seldom affect the consumers' market.

Grains were very active, on futures, but the cash market barely responded and even this response was due more to normal market news than to buyer pressure. For instance, cotton advanced sharply on news of the shortest crop in 65 years. There is no hoarding of raw cotton except by the government through its price support plan and buying agencies.

Nevertheless, harmless as all this flurry was, it made good political hokum and the administration jumped at the opportunity to spread its usual line of propaganda. Congress has been stampeded into plans for all-out controls, and a bill to punish these terrible a real sense even though they wanted to-has been passed by the

house of representatives. SNEAK ATTACK: Real inflation is the unseen enemy. Experience with it, the world over, proves it is a monstrous thing that sneaks in to destroy economies and wreck nations. When prices go up under the power of inflaion they do not come down.

Pernicious inflation, which cannot be brought about to any marked degree in the activity of free market, is brought about the action of governments only and is the direct result of controls over money and all policies pertaining thereto. It has been defined as "a change in the volume of the circulating medium thus reducing the buying power of the money unit."

When this increase takes place faster than production expands. prices rise until an equilibrium is reached. During this action the buying power of all savings is destroved in proportion to the rise in prices. To offset this, more inflation becomes necessary to take care of the loss, and so the sixth column rolls on until its devastating effects finally result in complete collapse of the economy in

War or no war, if we do not reinstate free markets and an honest medium of exchange, collapse will be our end. It is the price a people must pay for "welfare"!

THE PHILIPPINES-AND OUR FOREIGN POLICY! From the many dispatches reaching this country from the Philippines, I am struck by the undeniable sim-

ilarity between that nation's desperate problems, and those which confronted China at the end of the war. Indeed, these problems are ty pical of all Asia. Let's look at some of them, as

reported in a New York Times dispatch on August 19th. Firstthere is the over-all economic problem, which includes near bankruptcy, under-production, wholesale poverty, terrible inflation, and an archaic tax system. These same economic problems

also faced China after long years of war and Japanese occupation, and our official American policy was to blame Chiang Kai-shek for not solving them immediately. Second-the Quirino government of the Philippines is shot through and through with graft, corruption and incompetence. There is little to show for the two

billion dollars we have poured in, and most of it had been wasted According to the N. Y. Times: "The reluctance to punish wrong doing is a recognizable national trait among the Filipinos . . . As for revenue collections, Filipinos simply are not inclined to pay their taxes. Without wholesale prosecution of tax-dodgers, there is little hope of making the people pay. And the Government has not punished tax-dodgers for political reasons.

These same problems of graft, corruption and lack of tax-revenue plagued Chiang's regime in China too, and our official American policy was simply anger, censure and disgust.

Third-the Philippine government is struggling vainly against a Communist armed rebellion, under Communist leaders with international connections. Chiang faced a similar communist rebellion in China, and our official American policy was to favor the rebellion, demand a truce and a "coalition government with the Communists". When Chiang refused this solution, we cut off all aid and let him go down!

Now I submit that the precarious situation in the Philippines today is an almost exact duplicate of the situation in China right after the war. Both nations are traditional friends of the United States, and therefore our policy should be the same toward

both. Yet-our refusal or inability to either understand or help with China's problems, led to our repudiation of the only friendly forces we had in that vast nation, and our subsequent loss of it to our most dangerous enemies. As a result-we are now finding it almost hopelessly impossible to stop Communism from taking over the whole of Asia!

What will we do now in Philippines? Will we follow the same policy which lost us a friendly China? Will we demand stability and economic reforms in the middle of a Communist-led Civil War? Will we demand pure democracy from people who have had no experience with it, and competent leadership where there is no reservoir of leaders trained in representative government? Will we damand a truce in the war, and a "coalition government with the Communists"? And if this is refused, will we let the Philippines go to our enemies by default?

Or have we learned anything at all from our disastrous China policy, and do we now have something more sensible and practical to offer our friends in the Philippines? If not, then we had better quit promising anything to anybody, and do what we can for ourselves at home.

As a matter of fact, do we have any consistent foreign-policy at all? If so, it is certainly a secret to the G. I.'s fighting in Korea, and to the American people as a whole. Even staunch Administration Democrats are now joining with Republicans in Congress to damand that we be given a clearcut statement of what our longterm objectives are, and how we plan to achieve them. No doubt these Congressmen are hearing in no uncertain terms from the homefolks that there is no sense in demanding," unity" and "more sacrifices" until our leaders can at least furnish us with the

"what", "why" and "wherefore"! It is even more senseless for the Administration to tell the American people they have no right to criticize! When have they had a better right? In the name of "security", our present Administration has spent more money than all the administrations from George Washington to Franklin Roosevelt combined,-only to present us with the most appalling "insecurity" in our entire history! In 1946, five short years ago, we were the strongest nation in the world. Today we are trembling on a tiny beach-head in South Korea, and admitting to the world t t we are unprepared to meet the Russian threat. If that isn't obvious evidence of abject and co-
