It was a personal and emphatic follow-up to his apology of yesterday for his earlier "unfortunate" words about the fighting corps. The League gave him a standing ovation and applauded furiously when he said, with a grin: "You succeeded in enticing me over here."



The U.S. bought Alaska from Russia in 1867 for \$7,200,000 but didn't allow it to become a territory until 1912.

The U.S. annexed Hawaii, then a republic, in 1898 and made it a territory in 1900.

Alaska is twice the size of
Texas, which has 585,000 square

Texas, which has 385,000 square miles. It has a population of 100,000 people, more than many of the present states had when they were admitted to the union. Hawaii has a population of \$50,000. About \$6 percent of those people are American citizens. Hawaii, made up of seven islands, has an area of \$6,400 square miles.

miles. Alaska's chief industries are fishing, furs, mining, lumber. Hawaii's are sugar, pineapples, cattle, dairy products, truck crops, fish and coffee.

In both territories the people have voted for statehood. Congressional committees have made trips to the territories and investigated the problem of giving them statehood And statehood for both was promised by the Democrats and

Republicans. First real action came in 1947 when the House voted to admit Hawaii. The Senate never has

The House this year voted again for Hawaii and, for the first time, for Alaska, too. So far the Senate still hasn't acted. Some of the congressmen op

posed to statehood argue this Alaska and Hawaii, if admitted. would have two senators each since every state has two sen-ators. And, because of its 540,000 population, Hawaii would be en-titled to two representatives in the house. Alaska, because it has only 100,000 population, would have one representative in the

In their local elections about 100,000 of the 540,000 Hawaiians vote and about 20,000 of Alaska's 100,000 population vote.

This would give Alaska two enators representing only 20,000 voters. Whereas states with mil-

Today their cabins are buried in pumice and ash, only the roofs are visible from a plane. The eruption had clouded the entire peninsula, depositing foot-deep layers of ash on ships at sea, smothering birds and wildlife and creating the famous Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes. Recent trips to the valley found fumaroles no longer steaming and breaches in the surrounding cones are now dormant. But other peaks in the area are acting

up once again. Although they believe the eruptions of Alaska's volcanic pressure belt looms in the near future, the experts see no cause for alarm.

Following his survey, Collins said, "The Katmai area is the finest single place in the world for academic research. There is tremendous variety of activity. But there is no special danger in allowing the public to see a volcano at work. In fact this year the monument area has been opened to the public for the

Attention is now focused on Pavlof. Twice before it has signaled eruptions. Since then like many dozens of peaks in the belt, it has been quiescent. Occasional rings of smoke and steam rise the snowy slopes.

But this month experts are watching the mysterious peaks with renewed interest — wondering which will break from its murmuring crater with a new eruption. Instead of rushing away, as in Hawaii and more populus places adjacent to large volcanoes, the field crews in Alas-ka hope they can rush toward the eruption in time to record its activity. Although Katmai was the world's greatest blast, they recall, not a single person wit-nessed the eruption.







#### The American Way

HANDS OFF OUR RAILROADS By George Peck

If the worst should happen and we are plunged into World War

III, it is to be hoped that the Fed. eral Government will keep its

paralyzing hands off our American railroads.
Those of us who are old enough can remember the performance of our railroads in two wars. In World railroads. War I the Government operated the railroads and what a sorry

mess it made of the job. During World War II, Government apparently had learned its lesson and exercised the good judgment of leaving the railroads under private operation and con-trol. What a contrast there was between their orderly and efficient performance in World War II as compared with the haphazard and

inefficient mis-performance in World War I. In fact, during World War II the railroads did themselves proud -they more than justified the vote of confidence reposed in them
—they not only handled the war
load, but also saved the Government a heap of money while doing it. In World War I, during the 3 years 1918-20, the Government collected from the railroad companies 146 million dollars in Federal Inrome Taxes, but during those same years there was a deficit in excess of \$1,641,000,000 resulting from

Government operation to be paid out of the Federal Treasury. In World War II, during the \$ years and 8 months between Pearl Harbor and the capitulation of Japan, the railroad companies paid in Federal taxes more than \$4,-270,000,000, in addition to payroll taxes of \$770,000,000-and there was no deficit on account of Federal operation to be met by us poor taxpayers. And, my fellowtaxpavers, there was a net gain for us of \$5,800,000,000 over World War I-and that amount of money "ain't hay."

And while the railroads were saving us this vast amount of money they literally performed miracles. They handled 97 per cent of all organized troop movements and more than 90 per cent of all war freight. During World War II the total freight load on the railroads doubled, the passenger load multiplied 4 times.

Nor was this done by jacking up freight rates and passenger fares. During the first world war and the period immediately thereafter, it was found necessary to increase freight rates by an average of approximately 60 per cent. At the close of World War II freight rates were no higher than when the war began, despite large wartime increases in wages, taxes and the price of supplies; while the level of passenger fares was lower than it was even before the first world war.

Thus the railroads thoroughly proved the superiority of private ownership and control. That clamoring for nationalization of Seven shiploads of children, still our railroads, but it is too much to hope that it will. And what about impending

World War III? In July the member roads of the Association of American Railroads held a special meeting at Chicago. A definite rail transportation program to meet the needs of commerce and the demands of defense was unanimously adopted. Space does not permit going into

the details of this program. However, it was drawn up by experi-enced railroad men, pledged to put it into effect. After the splendid job these men did in World War II certainly they can be trusted to handle efficiently transportation of troops and war freight in the unhappy event we become involved in a third world war-that is, provided the Federal Government, as was the case in World War II, again exercises the good common sense of leaving the operation of our railroads to railroad men.






