



O. said that an impending steel shortage threatens to throw a lot of his auto workers out of jobs. The scarcity of this material, he argues, is caused by "the monopoly control of steel." And he adds: "The steel manufacturers say there is too much steel capacity but that they would build more plants if they could amortize the cost over a five year period." Mr. Reuther's specialty is autos

In fact, the Swiss gold holding per capita is more than three times as great as in the United States. How has it been possible for

Switzerland, completely surroundby countries which have had recurrent wars, to remain neutral whereas the United States which is m. 2 than three thousands miles away has been involved in two European wars and is now well on its way to being very seriously involved in another one?

Maybe part of the answer is that Switzerland has defied every rule which the American internationalists say must be followed by a modern state in order to maintain peace and promote pros-

Switzerland is not a member of the United Nations. Out of courtesy to this country it joined the Marshall plan but it never took a dime of American money. It did not become a partner in the European payments plan set up by the recipient nations under the Marshall plan. It did not become a member of the Council of Europe. It did not join the Bretton Woods world bank or monetary fund. It is not a party to the North Atlantic military alliance or of the mut-
