Turkey Joins Atlantic Pact

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Turkey has accepted an invitation "to be associated with" Atlantic Pact defense planning in the Mediterranean area. Under the arrangement, Turkey does not, however, become a full-fledged member of the 12-nation defense alliance.

The State Department today disclosed Turkey's acceptance of the invitation by making public an exchange of notes between Secretary Acheson and the Turkish ambassador, Mustafa Kemal. Acheson acted on behalf of the foreign ministers of the 12 treaty nations who met in New York last week to plan increased defense preparations.

Gray County Given Quota of 26 Men In November Draft

Gray County has been ordered to send 26 men to the armed services Nov. 16 after a state draft call went to Texas boards today for 3,452 men to be inducted in the services. This number is nine above the 17 to be sent Oct. 19.

10,000 Believed Massacre Victims

SEUL — (AP) — A South Korean official estimated today the Communists massacred more than 10,000 Seoul residents being driven from the capital city by U. S. Marines and doughboys.

Marines to Call 13 Squadrons Before January 1

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Marines reported today they will call 13 additional reserve fighting squadrons to duty before Jan. 1 in building up to a planned strength of 18 squadrons.

Commie Demonstrators Seize Buildings in Red Zone of Austria

U.S., Illinois Officers Hunt Capone Gang

CHICAGO — (AP) — Federal and state officials joined today in attempting to round up remnants of the old Capone gang for questioning on two recent slayings and appearance before a U. S. Senate crime committee.

Two former members of the old Capone gang were held in jail overnight for questioning on the slayings of two crime investigators Sept. 25.

Three other top members of the gang ruled by the late notorious Scarface Al, who reportedly fled to Mexico to escape service of subpoenas by the crime committee, also are wanted for similar interrogation by police.

Committee Chairman Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said in Washington that he had asked the State Department for help in returning the three men to this country.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The eventualities in Korea which American officials now fear is the breakdown of the Communist army into guerrilla forces which could fight on for months or even years.

More Marching on Vienna Offices; Seek Pay Increase

VIENNA — (AP) — More than 1,000 Communist demonstrators seized the main post office and telephone exchange in Wiener Neustadt in the Russian zone of Austria today.

The seizure was reported by U. S. authorities. In Vienna about 7,000 Communist demonstrators were reported marching on the governmental center in an effort to back a general strike for pay increases.

South Koreans Push Ahead Unopposed

TOKYO — (AP) — South Koreans thrust searching spearheads deeper into Red Korea today through ominously silent country.

The republic's bone-weary and footsore third division stabbed as far as 60 miles beyond the Parallel 38 border line.

The enemy had all but vanished before the forwardmost penetration but signs of battles ahead were mounting.

At least 20,000 South Korean troops, the third and capital divisions, already were well over the border that was breached Sunday. Behind them, three more South Korean divisions were poised to cross.

A few dozen American army men were above 38 as advisers but the northern liberation campaign still was a solely South Korean show.

United Nations armies were kept south of 38 in mop-up and reserve positions — and they were growing stronger.

The arrival of the U. S. third infantry division in the Far East was announced by General MacArthur's headquarters.

There were only vague indications of what the Reds might be up to in the American ditch defenses before their Pyongyang capital area.

Northwest of Pyongyang, allied warplanes spotted—and then lost in bad weather — a Red motor convoy. It was the second sighted in two days or maybe three.

Even in the Russian zone, many factories still were operating, but Austrian government officials said this probably was because the Russians did not want to lose production.

Politicos Take up Domestic Issues As War Declines

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Domestic problems began to reclaim attention in the congressional campaign today as military victory tended to diminish the Korean war as a political issue.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio), who has been contending the Truman administration's "blunders" invited the Korean Communist attack, shifted to a denunciation of the Brannan farm plan.

In a weekly report to Ohio voters, Taft said the Brannan plan — which would provide direct government subsidies to growers of perishable crops under certain circumstances — "is a fraud on its face."

Speaker Boosts X-Ray Plan Here

Dr. Julian Kay, Gray County health officer, outlined briefly the purposes of the county X-ray program to the Jaycees at the luncheon Tuesday.

Dr. Kay stated that the primary purpose of the X-ray program is to catch tuberculosis before it gets too far advanced in the human body. He added that catching tuberculosis in its early stages aids in preventing the spread of the disease.

Showdown on Korean Peace Program Near

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — The United Nations drove towards a showdown vote on opposing Korean peace plans today.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky takes the floor in the assembly's 60-nation political committee to make a final plea for acceptance of his plan.

More delegates expect a vote later in the day despite last-minute attempts by Yugoslavia and India yesterday to shunt both plans to a subcommittee for a try at compromise.

An overwhelming victory was forecast for the west's peace blueprint which Nationalist China's Dr. T. T. Tsiang hailed as promising "independence, unity and rehabilitation" to war-torn Korea.

Delegates, in private conversations, have labeled the Soviet proposal an attempt to snatch political victory from military defeat and have indicated they want no part of any such scheme.

All countries outside the Russian bloc, except Yugoslavia and India which have indicated they will abstain — will most likely vote for the eight-nation plan. It aims at making Korea a "pilot project" to show what the U. N. can do for underdeveloped, devastated countries.

It envisages a short military occupation of all Korea to restore order and to guarantee the end of aggression. This would be followed by free elections in all Korea, under U. N. supervision, to elect a government for a free, independent and united country.

Chest X-Ray Total Approaches 1,000 In Second Day

A total of 908 persons have been X-rayed at the Legion-VFW Hall since 9:30 yesterday morning and it is expected that the total will pass 1,000 by the middle of this afternoon.

Late Wednesday morning there had been 200 persons X-rayed. The total yesterday was 708.

The chest X-rays are being given to persons 15 years of age or older by the state health department as a survey to protect the public from tuberculosis.

said anything about the taxes which would be necessary to pay farmers who sold their perishables at prevailing market prices lower than fixed standards.

"Yet those taxes will have to be paid by the farmers and the consumers," Taft said. "In short, they are getting a bill from the government for the benefits they are supposed to receive and into that bill will be added the salaries of thousands of employees of the Department of Agriculture to administer the plan."

Secretary of Agriculture Bran- nan has contended that the system might well be less costly than present price supports.

Unlike many of his previous ones, Taft's weekly report didn't mention the Korean war, although he still stresses that as an issue in his re-election campaign speeches. He is opposed by Democratic State Auditor Joseph Ferguson.

Until recently, the Korean war has overshadowed all other issues in many Senate and House races and has cropped up in strictly state contests.

But the victory achieved by United Nations military forces has left some politicians undecided as to the political value of discussion of Korean issues.

Democrats generally contend that the smashing of the Communist aggressive power has wiped out the chagrined voters felt at early American reverses. Republicans argue that the voters still think the United States went into the venture militarily unprepared.

Senator Bridges (R-NH) kept up his hammering at the administration's far eastern policies yesterday, accusing Secretary of State Acheson of engineering a "grand sell-out" to the Chinese Communists.

The State Department retorted last night that if Bridges ex-

Austrian police, issued rifles and steel helmets last night for the first time since 1938, were on their alert for violence.

The Socialist-controlled Austrian Trade Union Federation said "the strike movement remains restricted to individual U. S. I. A. (Russian-operated) factories and several other plants. The general strike attempt of the Communists is broken."

"The Communists are putting their hopes in demonstrations scheduled this afternoon. Workers, if you do not take part in the demonstration, the collapse of the Communists will be full."

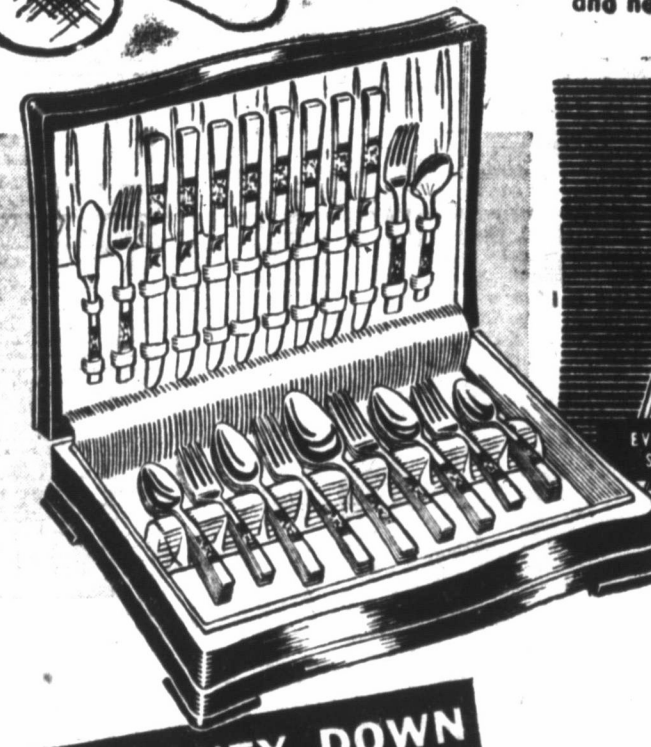

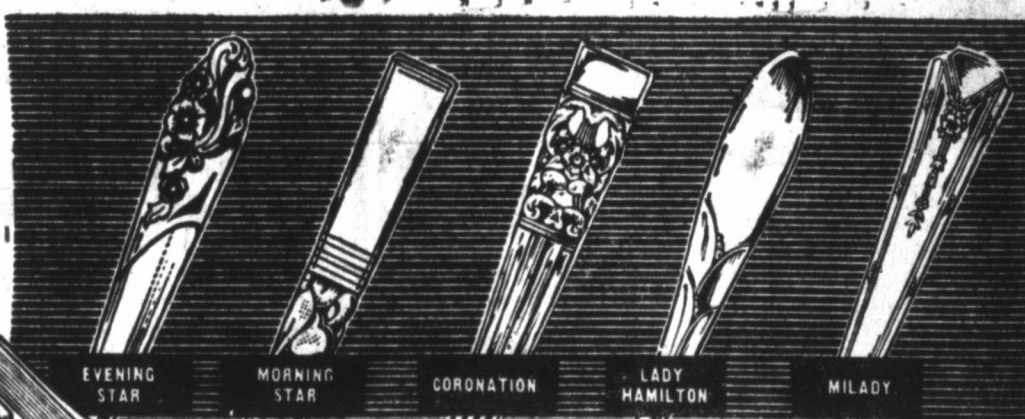

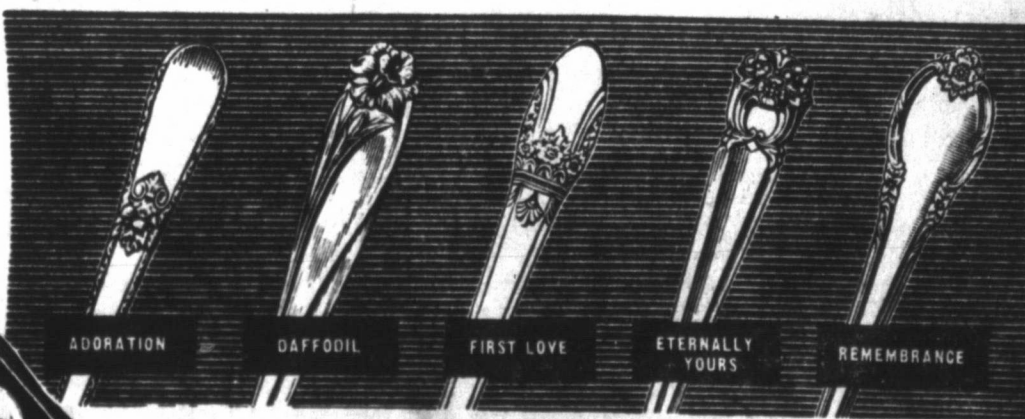

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Lou Finds A Card At the Right Time

When South led his third top club, Lou did a little fast thinking. It was evident that South had started the hand with five clubs and four spades. His eagerness to get rid of a diamond from dummy made it clear that he had three diamonds in his own hand as well as in the

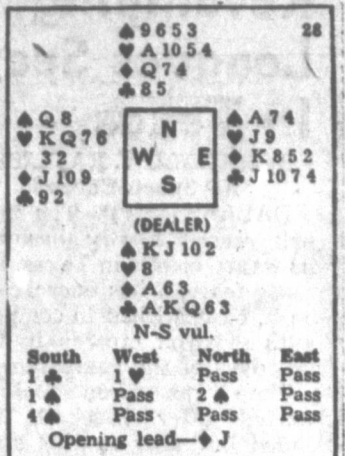
“Don't you know enough to take your tricks when they're offered to you,” declarer asked disgustedly.

“Sorry,” said Larceny Lou abruptly. “My cards were stuck, and I couldn't find that queen of spades to save my life.”

Of course the cards became unstuck very quickly a few moments later when Larceny Lou really needed that queen of spades.

Lou, holding the West cards, opened the jack of diamonds. Declarer put up dummy's queen, East covered with the king, and South won with the ace.

Now declarer was in some difficulty. He realized that he might have to lose two trump tricks and therefore could not afford to lose two diamonds. Instead of relying completely on a successful finesse for the queen of trumps, South decided to lead out his three top clubs in the hope of discarding a diamond from dummy. This plan would work if each opponent had three clubs and it would cost nothing important if the spade finesse should succeed.



dummy. Therefore South could have only one heart.

Lou could see that his side could win nothing in hearts or clubs and therefore needed four tricks in spades and diamonds combined. If he trumped with the queen, dummy would surely discard a diamond. The defense would then be able to take only one diamond, and East could hardly be expected to take two trump tricks in addition to Lou's queen.

Lou therefore ruffed with the eight of spades instead of with the queen!

Dummy over-ruffed with the nine, and now declarer was back where he had started. He still had to lose two diamond tricks and had to play the trumps so as to lose only one trump trick. He led a small trump from dummy, East played low, and South misguessed, by finessing the jack.

Lou pounced on this trick with the queen of spades and cashed his two diamonds. Later on, of course, East took the ace of spades for the setting trick.

PHILADELPHIA — (P) — Jim Konstanty, rubber-armed Phillies relief hero, is Manager Eddie Sawyer's stunning choice to open against the New York Yankees' Vic Raschi today in the most daring gamble since the 1929 world series.

Not since Connie Mack started his own players by calling on obscure Howard Ehmke to pitch and win the opener for the A's against Chicago 21 years ago has a pennant-winning manager taken such a chance.

A sell-out crowd of 33,167 will see bespectacled Jim try to "pull up Ehmke." Game time was 1:00 p.m. (EST), with a promise of cloudy and cooler weather. Millions more were to watch and listen at home on television and radio.

They were betting 9 to 5 that Konstanty and the Phils wouldn't win the opener. And the Phil Whiz Kids were 13 to 5 underdogs in the best-of-seven series. Sawyer skipped Robin Roberts, his 20-game winning flag clincher, to give him more rest, and settled on Konstanty, his faithful bullpen savior. Enjoying his best season at the age of 33, Big Jim pitched in a record-breaking 74 games. Yet he didn't start once, and hasn't started a game since 1948 at Toronto. He hasn't been a big league starter since he was with the Boston Braves in 1946.

"I thought Jim had the best chance against this type of freewheeling club," Sawyer explained. The skipper reached his decision 15 minutes before yesterday's workout after a meeting with his coaching staff, scouts, Konstanty and Roberts.

Never much of a success until he started working for a mild-tempered Sawyer, Konstanty is essentially a control pitcher with good breaking stuff. A few curves and an occasional fast ball break a steady diet of sliders and palm-balls coming out of an exaggerated overhand motion.

The selection of Konstanty was no sentimental gesture to a faithful worker. Sawyer picked Konstanty because he remembered the way he baffled the American League slugger in the all-star game, how he pulled the Phils out of trouble day after day. This was the man Sawyer said made the "big difference" in the Philadelphia success story, although he had been hit hard in his last few trials.

The news surprised Konstanty as much as the "experts," it never was discussed, although Sawyer said he wrestled with the idea during the first month of the season. Konstanty, arriving early for the workout, was called in to a corner by Sawyer who asked, "do you think you could pitch the opener?" Jim jumped at the chance.

"Jim is experienced and the boys have confidence in him," Sawyer said. "I'd rather go with him than try somebody else who might only last four or five innings. This way I have Roberts ready and rested for the second game."

Although Konstanty (16-7) did not start all year he did pitch nine innings against Pittsburgh Aug. 25 and to relief innings in a 19-inning night game against Cincinnati Sept. 15. In the minors he started regularly.

The Konstanty story created such a stir that changes in the eligible player list were almost overlooked. The Phils were given permission by the Yanks to use outfielder Jack Mayo and left-handed pitcher Jocko Thompson in place of the ailing Bill Nicholson and Carl Simmons, the 17-game winner now in the army. Simmons will attend the game on a 10-day furlough. The \$55,000 bonus pitcher may even work batting practice, but Sawyer said he would not ask Commissioner A. B. Chandler to restore him to the active list.

In return for letting Mayo and Thompson play, the Yanks can use Johnny Hopp, acquired after the Sept. 1 deadline. To make Hopp eligible, Manager Casey Stengel took Tommy Henrich, hobnobbed with a bad knee, off the list.

Stengel said it was an "awful hard thing to do." Still he had to strengthen his club with a first baseman - outfielder like

## Sports Round-Up

PHILADELPHIA — (P) — The big question before the opening pitch of the 1950 world series was: "Who's going to relieve the reliever?"

But that may be an injustice to Jim Konstanty, the surprise selection of Manager Eddie Sawyer of the Phillies, as Casey Stengel expressively stated: "Now we gotta see if we can hit that stuff he throws." Stengel may have been reading a surprise himself in nominating Hank Bauer for an outfield spot in the Yanks lineup. "I dunno," said Casey as he tried to make up his mind. "I put him in there a couple of weeks ago and got a couple of good hits. When he's hitting, he can hit both right and left handed." Stengel, incidentally, hasn't seen the Phillies perform this season. When the Yanks gave them a trimming during spring training, Casey wasn't feeling well and stayed in camp.

The choice of Konstanty, revived an old story of the celebrated 1929 series in which Connie Mack sprang Howard Ehmke on the Cubs. Al Simmons saw Ehmke warming up and asked the veteran manager: "You aren't going to start him, are you, Mr. Mack?" Connie just gave him a benevolent look and answered: "Why, yes, Al, if you approve." If that answer didn't leave Simmons speechless, Ehmke's pitching did.

Pie Traynor, who seemed more interested in touting Ezzard Charles as "one of the greatest fighters who ever lived" hazarded the opinion that having an outside business interest in ball playing is "a man can't pay attention to two things at once," says Pie. "His nerves can't stand it. Especially if he's worn down physically." The Chicago White Sox organization will meet soon after the series to decide on the 1950 manager and settle other problems. But Billy Evans, who thinks the Tigers may have done a bit better than could have been expected this year doesn't look for any immediate changes at Detroit. "Red Rolfe has a swell camp up in New Hampshire and probably will stay there for a couple of months," says Evans.

Obviously there is going to be a revamping of the entire program. There were too many leagues and too many clubs last year. As the final note regarding the 1950 baseball season, we beg to report that Earl Phillips, the official scorer at Bryan before that club dropped out of the East Texas League, was paid for making out the schedule.

President J. Walter Morris of the East Texas League "fined" Phillips \$37.50 — the amount owed him by the league for drawing up the schedule — for making remarks over the loud speaker concerning the umpires. The league had promised him \$75.00 for the work but he had received only half of it to that time.

Phillips appealed to George Trautman, president of the minor leagues. He got his check a few days ago.

The Bryan sports writer said, in the first place, he hadn't made the derogatory remarks about the umpires attributed to him. He said, in the second place, he wasn't a player or umpire and the league had no jurisdiction over what he might say over the loud speaker.

It is an interesting question: is an official scorer subject to being fined like the ball players and umpires? Apparently Trautman didn't think so.

## Henrich Puts Family Above Manager's Job

PHILADELPHIA — (P) — Because his passion for his family is far greater than his love for baseball, Tommy Henrich was prepared today to sacrifice a chance to become manager of the New York Yankees.

The veteran outfielder-first baseman, in a surprise disclosure, declared he had no managerial ambition whatsoever. One of the brainiest and most popular players ever to wear a Yankee uniform, Henrich generally is regarded as Casey Stengel's successor.

"I have no managerial aspirations," Tommy stated flatly last night on the eve of the world series. "I have no aspirations to become manager of the Yankees and I most certainly don't want to manage in the minor leagues. I've struggled through years in the minors. I'll never go back, no matter what."

"Neither the Yankees nor anybody else has offered me any kind of a managerial job," he said. "I wouldn't accept one if it were offered."

"This is the way I look at it," he said, "I've been playing baseball for 17 years. I'm not getting any younger. It's time I began to think of my happiness and the happiness of my family."

Henrich said he'd welcome a job in baseball. "But not one that will keep me away from my family. Being a manager means staying away from home. I don't want that. I've spent seven months out of every year away from my family. That's much too much."

"My children don't see enough of me and I don't see enough of them. Other kids cry when their father gets ready to leave for any length of time. Mine have come to accept it as a matter of course. They've been schooled that way. That's not fair to me. It's not fair to them."

Long Johns and Bismarcks are two members of the popular doughnut family. They're exceptionally fluffy and tender because they are made from a sweet yeast dough.

Doughnuts are one of the best breads invented to go with hot fragrant coffee, rich cocoa, or just plain chilled milk. Both cake and yeast-type doughnuts are available in variety from the bakers, but they are fun to make at home now and then. Doughnuts are appropriate for informal parties at which they are guaranteed to disappear by the dozens.

A bit of nutmeg is added for spice to the sweet yeast dough used for yeast doughnuts, Long Johns and Bismarcks. Today's recipe tells how to use the one dough for plain doughnuts with the hole, twists, Bismarcks, and Long Johns. When cool, roll plain doughnuts and twists in granulated sugar, or cinnamon and sugar. Sprinkle Bismarcks with powdered sugar and frost Long Johns with confectioners' sugar icing.

To check the temperature of the fat used for frying doughnuts without a thermometer, drop a one-inch cube of bread into the hot fat. If it browns in 60 seconds, the temperature is right for frying doughnuts.

**YEAST DOUGHNUTS**

- 2 packages yeast, compressed or dry
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind (if desired)
- 1/2 cup melted shortening
- 1 cup sifted enriched flour (about)
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Fat for frying

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour and nutmeg. Mix well. Add softened yeast, eggs, and lemon rind. Beat well. Add shortening. Mix well. Add more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until satiny. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled. Punch down. Let rest 10 minutes. Roll out to 1/2 inch thickness and cut with doughnut cutter for plain doughnuts. For twists, roll small portions of dough under the hand and twist the dough back on itself. For Bismarcks, roll the dough 1/2 inch thick and cut into pieces 1 inch wide and 3 inches long or cut with a biscuit cutter. Let rise until doubled, and fry in deep fat (375° F.). Makes about 3 dozen doughnuts.

**Nobody Loves The Man Who Does The Home Building**

He'll both no fun — nor has even a woman scorned — which can compare with that of a new home-owner. All of it is directed towards his builder.

A little guy built most of the homes in my neighborhood. We bought our house from the family which contracted to have the house built so I had always blamed leaks, bad planning, lack of closet space and such on the previous owner. Therefore, for the first year or so of my home-ownership, I never did see horns and tail on this quiet fellow.

I have discovered, however, that high feeling about builders is not a local phenomenon, but one encountered wherever there are people hiring builders to build houses for them. At some point — usually immediately after the contract is signed — the buyer of a custom built house decides he has signed away his life savings to a crook, thief and highway robber.

The strange and strained relationship of builder to pigeon-hole owner — seems to follow a pretty well-defined course. First, as a prospective home-owner or sucker, there are visits to something known as a "model house." At this point the builder seems like a trustworthy, charming, serious fellow whose only interest is to woo into the neighborhood a family as charming as that of the interested party, as the prospective home-owner is then known.

The builder's honesty seems as unassailable as Abe Lincoln's and the model home appears to contain every known comfort and beauty. Then contracts are signed.

Almost immediately small rifts start. In the first place, the home-owner starts studying up on such subjects as brass plumbing, mitted corners and outside water outlets. Naturally, he finds he has not contracted for those. Then it suddenly dawns on him that this great-hearted jovial pillar of society, the builder, is in business to make money.

From that point in — with the home-owner getting smarter all the time because he's not only studying but is getting coached by bitter friends — there's nothing but discord. The builder's reputation gets a real fancy kicking around. The usual complaints concern corners which have been cut, inferior concrete poorly poured, insufficient drainage, inadequate chimney flashings and cheap grade of grass seed.

I know one home-owner whose rude awakening came when he asked the friendly builder to install roughly twice the number of electric plugs called for in the contract. The contractor said sure, but it would set the chent back a century or so. The war was on. Another home-owner of my acquaintance places squarely on his builder's shoulders responsibility for a plug in the oilburner line and the death of a large elm tree towering over his front lawn. A whole New Jersey community is seized with hate-builder fever and has posted bitter little signs on front lawns reading "This is a VERY unsatisfactory house."

There's not much of a moral in this, except that home building is a good business to keep out of if you want to make friends.

Sometimes ago I read an article about some women who collected clothing and made soap for needy families in Europe.

I am sure that the women who received the soap appreciated it as soap is still a luxury in Europe, Asia and Africa. Imagine trying to do the family laundry without soap or a detergent!

What I desire is a good recipe for laundry soap.

I should like a recipe for toilet soap also as I have some olive oil I am anxious to use.

I'll be most appreciative if you will help me out with a recipe as I imagine it would be quite an economy.

Dear Mrs. W. The best soap recipe that I have found follows:

Add 1 can of Red Seal lye and one tablespoon of borax to three pints of cold water.

When mixture has cooled somewhat but is still warm add four pounds of fat (2 1/2 lb. coffee cans full) and stir for 10 minutes. Continue to stir at intervals.

Mold your soap as you wish and

put away for at least six months to ripen or age.

Use your olive oil in place of the grease but use a rounded tablespoon of borax. If you wish to perfume it add perfume or cologne.

# Hank Speaks Thoughts of Most Americans Regarding Russia

By what must be considered a miracle Hank was born with a pair of striped pants on, and a five-thousand dollar contribution to the Democratic party in my hand.

That made me a statesman right off.

So, being a statesman, this seems to be the time to give my views on what we should do with Korea.

Chop 'em up. Move as far north as there still exists an enemy to this country. If it becomes necessary, go on into China. If that involves fighting Russia, fight Russia.

This country has been nice long enough. It has proved to any decent thinking person that what it wants is peace and decency among men. It has even done more than that; it has taken deliberately rude actions by a country in the hope that by turning the other cheek men and women could live in peace in the world.

Our country, from the president to the humblest citizen, knows that Russia is an indentured servant. Not the Russian people, because they are just the same sort of people we are. But the men who are running Russia have no regard for human beings.

So let's become realistic in this country. Let's announce some time that we loathe Russia, and that we have come to the end of trying to bring Russia into the family of nations.

Hundreds of thousands of people in Russia have been told and they believe that Russia was the sole conqueror of Germany. The same hundreds of thousands of people think that Russia whipped Japan. Our country knows this and still we let Mr. Malik be the president of the Security Council of an organization built for world peace.

The time has come for realism in this country. Solid realism. What this country is doing now is half-turning its cheek toward a murderer. It just doesn't seem any sense to spend billions on the Atlantic Pact and still let Russia have a seat in the United Nations.

Mr. Malik and Mr. Vishinsky should be thrown out the window nearest to where they're sitting. Russia should be told that it is very, very apparent that it has come to a showdown between two nations — one representing decency, the other representing complete indecency in every single form — and the sooner the two come to grips and determine whether decency or indecency is going to run this world, the better. It's obvious to most Americans, even if it's not obvious to those in high places, that the difference between us and Russia is right and wrong. Yet this country, day in and day out, tries to seek friendliness with wrong. If a man did that, they'd call him a coward and a quitter. And here's a whole country doing it. The only foreign policy we have, as I see it, is foreign to righteous thinking.

No one can seem to make up his mind whether or not we're going to cross the 38th parallel and take all Korea. As I look at it, we must have seen the pictures of the American soldiers killed with their hands tied behind their backs. I've seen pictures of our prisoner of war camps where the North Koreans are treated as well as any soldier who's guarding them. Whip 'em? Beat 'em to death, if we're on Communist China, let's infringe. If China wants to send her armies against us, let us accept it. If Russia wants to fall in behind China, let us tell both China and Russia that we'll fight them to see whether or not rightness reigns over wrong.

If rightness loses, we Americans can say we have done our best. Mothers don't like to lose sons, wives don't like to lose husbands, sweethearts don't like to lose lovers, and the whole thought of war is terrible. But I hope it can never be said that an American mother wouldn't rather have her son killed fighting for right, than an American wife wouldn't rather have her husband killed in the cause of decency, or that the American sweetheart wouldn't rather have her lover die for the things that are eternal than to live in a world dominated by a country that does not recognize human dignity.

If I'm not right when I say this, America has no reason to exist. But I'm quite sure that I speak for most of the men and women of this country when I say let's tell Russia to put up or shut up.

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## Court Okays Debtor Law

BENNINGTON, Vt. — (AP) — The constitutionality of a 142-year-old Vermont law permitting the jailing of debtors under certain circumstances has been upheld by the state supreme court.

The opinion was written yesterday by Associate Justice Walter E. Cleary in the case of Walter Hollis of Bennington.

As a result, Hollis will be confined to jail until he pays a \$275 judgment awarded Francis R. Dempsey of North Adams, Mass., in an automobile accident suit.

Under the law, defendants in certain cases may be jailed indefinitely for failure to pay a civil court judgment after being found guilty of "a willful or malicious act, or neglect."

Hollis contended that the old law violated Vermont's constitution.

Justice Cleary said the right of imprisonment was a method of remedy for the plaintiff and punitive action against the defendant for wanton and malicious action.

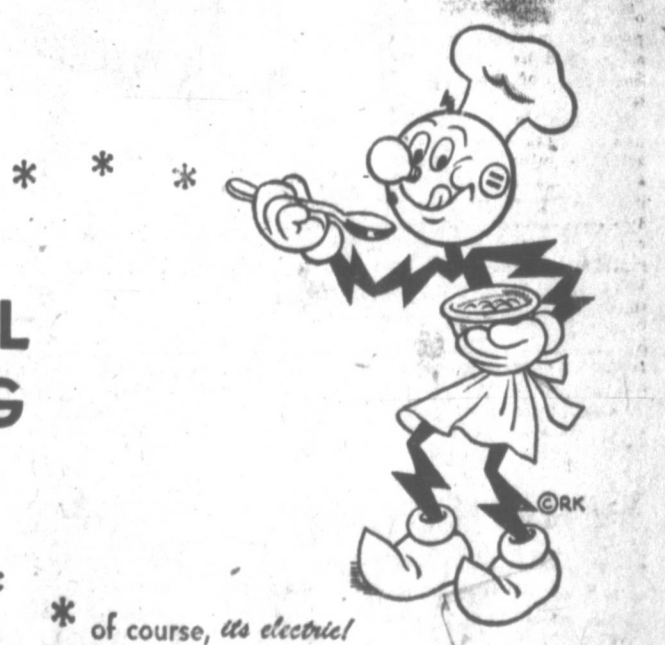

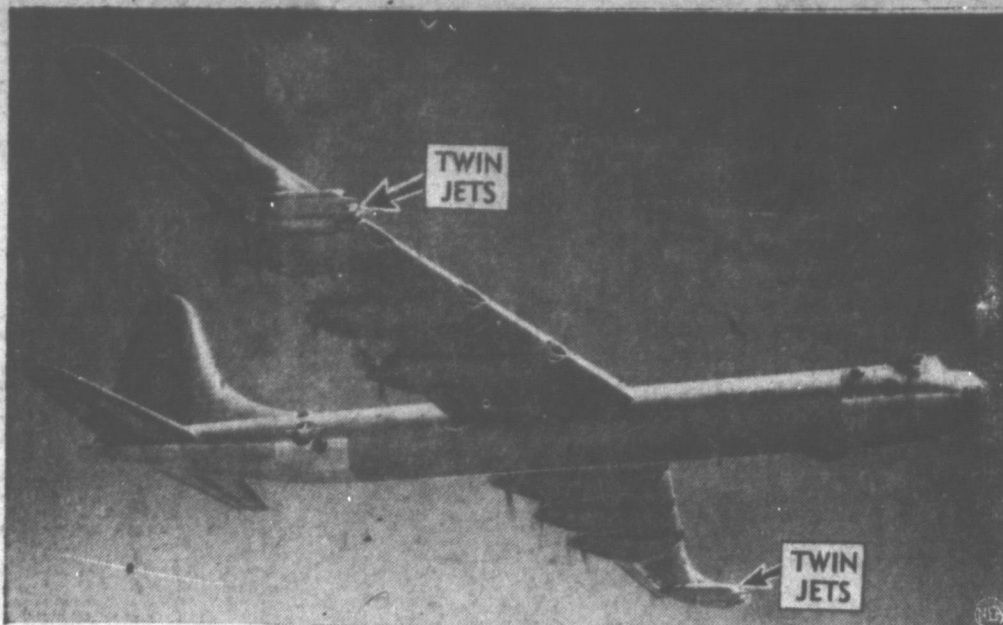

# Defense Production Pattern Beginning to Assume Shape

NEW YORK — (AP) — The defense production pattern is beginning to take shape. Production goals are set in the steel, oil, rubber and aluminum industries. Military orders will be given priority in all industries. Allocations are drafted for at least one industry, synthetic rubber. Final touches are being put to rules to curb housing credit. The steel industry moves to forestall any entry of the government into the business by increasing its previous plant expansion plans by 50 percent—all to be built by the companies themselves without the government having a hand in it. Some of the expansion of steel mill capacity will be in the traditional steel centers — Pittsburgh, Chicago, Cleveland, Birmingham. But important new mills are going up on the East Coast, and the West Coast—at Morrisville, Pa., on the Delaware; at Pomona, Calif. Expansion has been underway on the Texas Gulf Coast. Steel capacity is now just above 100 million tons a year. The industry had planned to bring that to 106.3 million tons by the end of 1952. But at the request of the government, plans were overhauled and a new goal of 107 million tons capacity by the end of next year and just under 110 million tons by the end of 1952.

and her satellites is only 30 million tons a year. Aluminum production, which is now four times as big as it was 10 years ago, is expected to top its 1948 peacetime record of 1.2 billion pounds. The wartime record was 1.8 billion pounds in 1942. Production could be pushed, if expense is no deterrent, to equal the wartime pace. Synthetic rubber is to be allocated among the rubber companies. This is the second step in this industry to assure plenty of rubber for military needs. The first was to limit the amount of all new rubber, both natural and synthetic, which can be used. The oil industry is moving into gear. A defense petroleum administration has been set up. High octane gas is to be reserved for military planes. A goal of 1951 oil production 4.4 percent higher than this year has been set. The National Petroleum Council has informed the Interior Department it will need about 19 percent more steel next year than this. It wants the steel so it can drill more wells, build more railroad oil tank cars, and lay more oil pipe lines. One of the new jobs the National Production Authority will have to work out under the priority system will be the division of the already short supply of steel among the oil companies, the railroad freight car makers, the motor industry and the host of others that are clamoring for it.

## JACOBY ON CANASTA

Introducing Minnie the Melder

Minnie the Melder plays canasta every afternoon and most evenings. She has good card sense and ought to be a very successful player. Instead Minnie loses consistently at the game. She does not lose much but she does lose.  
As you may gather from her nickname Minnie's trouble lies in the fact that she is always in too much of a hurry about melding.  
She plays every hand for a quick out. In order to go out she first must have a canasta. In order to have a canasta she first must have a base, and in order to have a base she first must meld. So Minnie melds.  
The discard pile means little or nothing to Minnie. If she gets a chance to take it, she will do so. Particularly if it gives her a couple of new melds. But, as for deliberately playing for it: Heaven forbid!  
Minnie will never discard from three or four of a kind; that would be breaking up a meld. Occasionally she will go so far as to split a pair. That is, when she doesn't have a singleton in her hand.  
Minnie's idea of a perfect result is to go out before the opponents have melded. As a result she makes lots of small profits but never scores a really big hand.  
Hold-up Harry plays just about as often as Minnie, and just a little more unsuccessfully. The reason is that Harry practically never melds at all.  
It is just unthinkable for Hold-up Harry to make the initial meld from his own hand. He does not want to reduce the number of cards in his hand. Harry waits until he can get the discard pile. If he never gets the discard pile he will still be waiting.  
When Harry does get the pile he is in seventh heaven. He melds as little as he can and starts to play for a big hand with plenty of natural canastas. Incidentally, this particular line of play is fine, but unfortunately Harry carries it to an extreme.  
There is no need for him to meld if the opponents are not going out. But Harry continues to hold up even after it would be obvious to a chimpanzee that the other side was ready to go out and leave him holding the bag.  
Therefore, although Harry occasionally makes an enormous score, he loses because he is continually being caught with lots of unmelded cards and unmade canastas.

## Population of U.S. Now Expected to Reach Peak During 21st Century, Instead of 20th

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Until recently, it was widely accepted that the population of the United States would reach its peak during the second half of the 20th Century and then start slowly downward.  
That conception has been jolted almost out of existence. Some experts now put the peak in the early 21st Century. Others challenge the idea that we will necessarily reach a peak at any time. All are approaching the subject with new caution and humility.  
The thing that did the jolting was the astonishing upsurge of the population during the last ten years — a decade that surely deserves to be called the fertile forties.  
"Astonishing" is not too strong a word for what happened. Since 1860 our rate of growth had been gradually dropping. We grew vastly — 31 million in 1860, 76 million in 1900, 122 million in 1930 — but the percentage of increase went down and down. Until 1930 the population had swelled by more

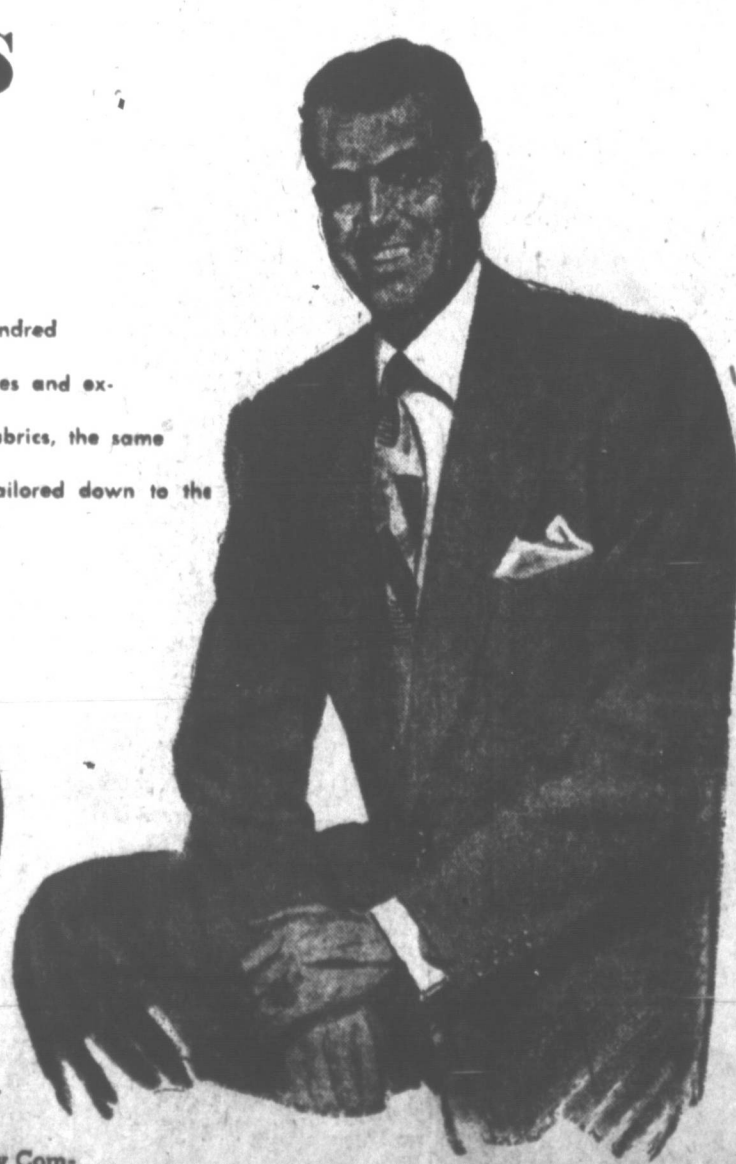

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Q. I received my orders to report for active duty. I am an Air Force reserve officer. But I asked for an extra 30 days before reporting. I haven't heard from the Air Force on this. Can I assume that I have gotten my 30-day request? Or do I have to report on the day stated in the first order?  
A. You must report on the date specified in the original order. At that time you can tell about your request for more time and it will be acted on promptly.  
Q. Is there any priority on how the Army calls up reservists?  
A. Yes. Selection will be made initially from those who are between 19 and 25 years of age.  
Q. I am going to high school under the GI bill of rights. How will that affect my being called to active duty?  
A. Chances are you'll be taken, regardless. Deferments are only being given to special classes of students.

## Oil Consumption Expected to Rise

WASHINGTON — (AP) — About 5,640,000 barrels of domestic crude oil will be used in the U. S. or shipped abroad daily during October, the Bureau of Mines estimated yesterday.  
This compares with a 5,540,000 barrels daily forecast in September. The bureau estimated a total of 59,000,000 barrels of gasoline will be needed to meet the October demand,   
The latest census bureau forecast, published Aug. 10, is extremely conservative. It runs only to 1960 and has an unusually wide range of alternatives. Like earlier forecasts, it gives three sets of figures, "high," "medium," and "low," based on different assumptions as to births, deaths, and immigration.  
For 1960, the "high" estimate of U.S. population is 180,000,000, the "medium" estimate 169,000,000, the "low" estimate 161,000,000.

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
