An overwhelming victory was forecast for the west's peace blueprint which Nationalist China's Dr. T. F. Tsiang hailed as prom-"independence, unity rehabilitation" to war-torn Korea, Russia probably will not be able to line up any votes her plan - which calls for an immediate ceasefire, withdrawal of foreign troops, and later elections which the Soviet Union and Communist China would help supervise — except from her sat-

Delegates, in private conversaions, have labelled the Soviet proposal an attempt to snatch political victory from military defeat and have indicated they want no part of any such scheme, countries outside the Russian bloc — except Yugoslavia and India which have indicated they will abstain — will most likely vote for the eight-nation plan. It aims at making Korea "pilot project" to show what U. N. can do for underdeveloped, devastated countries.

It envisages a short military, occupation of all Korea to restore order and to guarantee the end of aggression. This would be followed by free elections in all Korea, under U. N. supervision, to elect a government for a free, independent and united country The plan also calls for economic aid to the battered land and would establish a strong U. N. commission to see that the proposals are carried out. Its sponsors are Britain, Australia, The Philippines, Pakistan, Cuba, Brazil, The Netherlands and Norway.

Long Johns and Bismarcks are two members of the popular dough-nut family. They're exceptionally fluffy and tender because they are made from a sweet yeast dough.

Doughnuts are one of the best breads invented to go with hot fragrant coffee, rich cocoa, or just plain chilled milk. Both cake and yeast-type doughnuts are available in variety from the bakers, but they are fun to make at home now and then. Doughnuts are appropriate for informal parties at which they are guaranteed to disappear by the dozens.

A bit of nutmeg is added for spice to the sweet yeast dough used for yeast doughnuts, Long Johns and Bismarcks. Today's recipe tells how to use the one dough for plain doughnuts with the hole, twists, Bismarcks, and Long Johns. When cool, roll plain doughnuts and twists in granulated sugar, or cinnamon and sugar. Sprinkle Bismarcks with powdered sugar and frost Long Johns with confectioners'

sugar icing.

To check the temperature of the fat used for frying doughnuts without a thermometer, drop a one-inch cube of bread into the hot fat. If it browns in 60 seconds, the temperature is right for frying

YEAST DOUGHNUTS


2 packages yeast, compressed or dry 1/4 cup lukewarm water t cup milk 1/4 cup sugar 2 teaspoons salt

2 eggs, beaten 8 teaspoon grated lemon rind (if desired) 1/4 cup melted shortening. 5 cups sifted enriched flour (about) 1/4 teaspoon autmeg

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour and nutmeg. Mix well. Add softened yeast, eggs, and lemon rind. Beat well. Add shortlemon rind. Beat well. Add more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until satiny. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled. Punch down. Let rest 10 minutes. Roll out to ½ inch

thickness and cut with doughnut cutter for plain doughnuts. For twists, roll small portions of dough under the hand and twist the dough back on itself. For Bismarcks, roll the dough 1/2 inch thick and cut into pieces 1 inch wide and 3 inches long or cut with a biscuit cutter. Let rise until doubled, and fry in deep fat until double (375° F.). Makes about 3 dozen doughnuts.





THUMAN VERSUS MATTHEWS AND ANDERSON Late in August, President Truman disavowed a speech by Secretary of the Navy Francis P.

Matthews, and suspended Major General Orvil A Anderson from his position as Commandant of the Air /College Montgomery A.a. Both were penalized because they advocated a showdown with Russia

Secretary Matthews holds that, if war with Russia is the only way to establish world peace, we should accept that solution. General Anderson believes that, given authority, he could "break up Russia's five A-Bomb nests in a week" and thus save civilization. And he is an experienced air commander whose judgment is very highly respected by those who know him best, But President Truman's avowed plan is to arm to the teeth and prevent Russian expansion, meanwhile avoiding any overt act likely to bring on an immediate conflict with that nation. So far as treatment is concerned, either serum taken from a victim of the disease who is convalescing, or a goat serum which has been produced, seems to shorten the course of human psittacosis. Quite likely some antibiotic similar to penicillin will still further improve treatment.

If psittacosis had not been attacked promptly by preventive measures and if the custom of keeping love birds, parrots and the like on the home were more general than it is, the problem would have been much worse. Even now, there is always the danger that the virus of psittacosis will become established in some bird or animal more closely and more commonly associated with human beings than parrots and love birds. Some night, without warning, her planes and submarines will launch a devastating atomic attack against our principal airfields, manufacturing and shipping centers, and the city of Washington. If the attack is well planned and executed, most of our Federal officials and legislators will be dead, and our factory and transportation system will be paralyzed. A large proportion of those persons who were scheduled to care for the survivors of the catastrophe will themselves have passed to the Great Beyond. The whole situation will seem hopeless, and resistance will appear useless. As General Anderson suggests,, this may, indeed, be the end of civilization.

Since no one can forsee the future, it may, of course, happen that none of the dire results listed above will ever come to pass. But the likelihood that some or all of them will occur is so great as to make it worthwhile to examine with care the only alternative course of action which seems at all promising. What would be the result if, instead of cutting off the tentacles of the octupus one by one, we were to strike at its heart? In other words, suppose that, within five days, the Russian Government:

1. Accept the Baruch plan in full and allow inspectors to enter Russia at once with power to impound all atomic weapons and to stop the production of the same. 2. Stop aiding, abetting or

encouraging attacks on the United States by Russia's satelites. If we did this and if Russia re-

fused to comply, what would be the outcome? The answer would seem to depend upon the adequacy of our supply of atomic bombs and the ability of our air force to drop these bombs on vital targets in Russia. Presumably, at present, we have at least ten times as many atomic bombs as the Russians possess. Dropped in the proper places they would probably so disorganize Russia as to make # impossible for that nation to proceed with a major offensive cam-

paign. But it is possible for our plans to travel far behind the Iron Curtain, destroy Moscow and other Russia's A-bomb plants? Apparently, General Anderson and Secretary Matthews believe that this is feasible. If they are right, such Action would probably save the lives of hundreds of thousands of our brave young soldiers, to say. nothing of the protection afforded civilians.

But, suppose that they are wrong. In that event, it is likely that the Russians will soon stop plotting against us? Will postponing, say until 1953, the dread day when Russia, after having increased her stock of atomic bombs many fold, launches her surprise attack, probably reduce or increase our losses? In brief, does the Truman plan or the Matthews-Anderson plan offer the more promising way of escape from the present unfortunate situation?

This is the problem which the American people face today. Which course of action offers the more promising solution?




