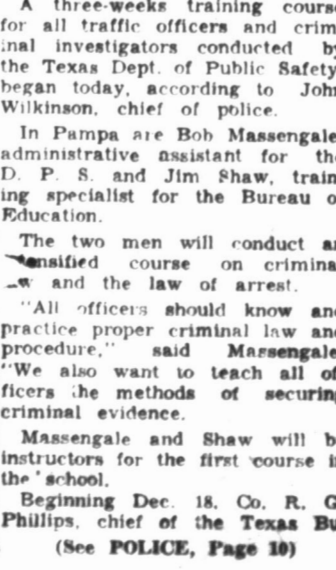

Unusual Colors, Hand Mixed Can Make Rooms Distinctive

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Have you discovered how much distinction unusual colors can give your rooms? With decorative textiles in gay colors and smart contemporary furniture in a variety of woods, such colors as shadowy blue, sun gold, and nut brown have come into favor with decorator and homemaker alike.

You can, of course, obtain many of the fashion-right shades you desire already mixed—or you can do the mixing yourself. Just be sure to mix enough to cover the entire surface to be painted. Tell your paint dealer the measurements of your room so that he can estimate the amount you will need. The colors you will use to obtain the desired hue come in tubes or small cans. If you're planning to tint an oil base paint or enamel in tinting oil base paint, add a little of your base paint to a small quantity of tinting color and mix them together thoroughly. Then combine the mixture with the paint in the large container and blend it well. After you add the final dab of color to your paint, see that all of the tinting compound is absorbed.

Then strain the whole quantity through a regular paint strainer, a wire screen or an old stocking. There are no lumps left in the bottom of the can.

To alter the color a lacquer, a casein or an emulsion paint, you usually combine two or more of the ready-mixed coatings. Your dealer can advise you and show you samples of the colors that can be obtained by such mixing.

Decorators frequently "gray" or soften paint colors by adding a little of the color's complement. Red is added to green, for example, violet to yellow, orange to blue. You can also use gray for the same purpose, or a very small quantity of black.

Remember that paint dries a different color than it appears to be in the can. For this reason, it's a good idea to brush out a large sample of your finished mixture and allow it to dry. Then study it under day light and artificial light. Also remember to keep your paint lighter in value than the finished effect you desire. The same color on a large area looks darker than it does on a small surface. Four walls of the same color reflect each other and deepen the color effect still further.

When painting a ceiling white, it's smart to add a little of the first in the interest of harmonizing blending.

Follow Simplicity In Utilizing Space In A Tiny Dinette

That cubbyhole in the apartment known as the "dinette" can be newlyweds' biggest furnishing problem. By heaving to the informal and the simple, the couple can attain a functional dining space without sacrificing appearance or spending a lot.

Furniture designed for the dinette answers that problem. But care must be taken in the wall decorations, or the colors will make the room seem even smaller. Pale tones make it appear more spacious. Or, if wallpaper is desired, one with a small pattern is preferred.

Where can the linens and dishes be stored in so small a cubicle? A space saver, easily built of Masonite hardboard, is a corner cupboard. It may be decorated to match table and chairs or be the same color as the wall. An attractive scheme is to apply a pretty wallpaper with a small figure to the inner sides of the cupboard.

As a substitute for the corner cupboard, the couple might like a small chest of drawers with separate hanging shelves overhead. These, too, can be built economically by the handiworkman.

Simple window treatment in the dinette enhances the room. Fusy draperies should be avoided.

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Texas Building Breaks Record

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas' construction industry will hammer out a billion dollars worth of business this year, The Texas Contractor has reported.

The billion-dollar total will be the first in history, according to the building trade journal's record.

November contracts totaled \$93,381,665, showing the year's cumulative total less than five million dollars short of the billion-dollar level.

Non-residential building accounted for the bulk of the week's awards at \$24,553,292. Residential work added \$4,763,765, and engineering, \$1,110,574.

Convectors Are Noted For Safety Features

Among modern heating systems for the home, steam and hot water systems using convector-radiators as the room heating units possess one of the highest factors of safety. Flames cannot spread through the small hot water and steam pipes of the distribution system as it is possible with gas-burners. There is no chance for dusty air to ignite. Additional safety is contained in the convectors themselves. They are designed without sharp edges or sharp corners to cause painful injuries in case of falls against the unit. Also, the heating element is safely concealed within the unit, away from prying fingers of children.

High Property Maintained Through Repairs to Home

New government home-building regulations, which reduce the number of new homes to be built, place a higher valuation on existing homes. The home-owner's property is worth more; prudent care will maintain its high level of value. The sooner small home repairs are made, the less the cost, for neglected defects and damages soon grow larger. A repair guide follows, as suggested by the Construction Research Bureau, national clearing house for building information:

REPLACE DAMAGED BOARDS: Drill holes with brace and bit 1/2 inches beyond damaged part; insert key-hole saw in holes and cut across. Pry out damaged piece and insert new piece of flooring.

PLUMBING: Clogged trap in kitchen sink: Place bucket underneath removable clean-out plug in lower side of bend in trap. Unscrew plug with wrench. After water drains out, insert bent wire into trap opening to remove accumulated grease and dirt. Frozen water - supply pipes: Thaw out by electrical resistance direct flame or applications of hot water. Always start at lower end and work upward. Keep faucet open to indicate flow start. Electrical resistance method: Connect welding generator to water pipes clamped to span frozen section. When sections thaw out, move

conductors to another section. Direct flame method: Apply to frozen pipe a with gasoline blowtorch gradually to spread heat evenly. Hot applications: Wrap pipe with cloth and saturate with boiling water. Or pour boiling water directly over pipe. Place receptacle below pipe to catch water.

HEATING SYSTEM: Furnace: Keep ashpit damper and door and feed doors tightly fitted. Plug any holes or perforations in smoke-pipe caused by corrosive action of gases. Clean inside of furnace with wire brush and scraper. Spray lubricating oil on fire side of heating surfaces of steel boilers to prevent rust. Coat all machine parts with oil or grease. Replace broken or defective parts.

To retain house heat and raise efficiency of heating system, install mineral wool insulation. U.S. Bureau of Mines states that up to 35 percent in fuel savings can be obtained if full-thickness mineral wool insulation is placed between top-floor ceiling and roof, and if hollow spaces in exposed walls are filled with this material. Blow-nudulated or loose - fill mineral wool insulation by pneumatic hose into hollow spaces in exterior walls, and between floor or ceiling joists.

ROOF: Leak in wood shingle. Put new wood shingle in place or use piece of galvanized or copper sheet metal size of shingle. Nail through shingle with galvanized copper shingle nails. Cover nail head with roofing cement. Corroded flashing: Loosen ends of flashing by digging mortar out of joints with small cold chisel. Put in new flashing, using mortar or roofing cement, applied with trowel. Fill small holes in tin flashing with plastic roofing cement.

Chimney cracks: Remove all loose mortar in joints. Brush out dust in joints; dampen surface before filling with fresh mortar. Pack mortar in tightly, smooth with trowel.

Storm Doors, Windows Are Useful Here

Long considered a necessity in the north and east, the use of storm windows and storm doors is becoming more and more prevalent in this section. Every prolonged cold spell sees a larger number of Pampa homes equipped with storm sash, according to local building material dealers.

With insulated and weather-stripped houses, the problem of water condensation on glass surfaces cooled by the outside air becomes more acute. Window cooling is caused by the warm moist air coming into contact with the cooled glass and condensing.

This condition, in time, will rot windows, ruin paint and wall paper as well as temper of the housewife. Before the day of sealed and insulated walls and weatherstripped windows and doors, there were enough cold drafts to keep the window glass cold on the inside as well as outside, but better building practices have eliminated these conditions in the home of today.

Vented heating systems, better air circulation throughout the house, and storm windows and doors all go together to make winter living much more pleasant than in the "good old days" of the open fireplace, and the cold air drafts under the doors and across the floor.

Cabbages Fit In Family Menu

For good food for little money, gather up some of those cabbages and apples in your local shops. Both of them packed with vitamins, they offer a lucky break for the family budget.

Look for heads of cabbage that are firm and heavy for their size. Notice the stem end. It should be closely trimmed, that is, the stem should be cut close to the head, and all except 3 or 4 of the outer or wrapper leaves should be removed.

These leaves should be green and fresh looking. Avoid heads of cabbage which have yellow leaves, or are otherwise discolored. They may be past their prime, or may be affected by some other form of injury.

Panned Corned Beef and Cabbage

Four tablespoons fat, 1 quart shredded cabbage, 2 cups chopped cooked corned beef, salt, pepper, vinegar.

Melt fat in a fry pan. Add the cabbage and corned beef. Cover tightly. Cook until cabbage is tender — 5 to 10 minutes — stirring occasionally to prevent sticking. Season to taste with salt, pepper, and vinegar.

For panned ham and cabbage use 2 cups chopped cooked ham instead of corned beef.

Apple Salad, Country Style

Eight slices bacon, 3 sweet red apples, unpared; 1-2 to 1 cup sliced celery, 1-4 to 1-2 cup seedless raisins, 1-4 cup mayonnaise, lettuce, salad greens for garnish.

Cut bacon into 1-inch pieces and fry until crisp. Drain on absorbent paper and cool. Wash, core and dice apples. Combine bacon, apples, celery, raisins and mayonnaise.

Combine 2 or 3 crisp lettuce leaves to form a cup and arrange on each salad plate. Fill lettuce cups with apple mixture. Garnish with crisp salad greens. Four servings.

Important: When soft raisins are desired pour 1 cup boiling water over raisins and let stand about 1 minute. Drain and cool.

Clay Boots Field Goal as Giants Clip Eagles, 9-7

NEW YORK (AP)—Snowstorms, mud, fist-swinging and referee-chasing climaxed one of the National Football League's most hectic campaigns as the regular season ended yesterday with unprecedented ties in both conferences.

The New York Giants whipped the Philadelphia Eagles 9-7 to finish the American Conference race in a tie with the Cleveland Browns, who drubbed Washington, 45-21. The Chicago Bears edged Detroit 6-3 to deadlock with the Los Angeles Rams in the National Conference.

Sunday the Giants and Browns battle at Cleveland and the Bears and the Rams at Los Angeles in playoff games to determine the conference titles.

If either game ends in a tie there will be a sudden-death overtime—the first team scoring wins. The conference winners then will meet for the league title the following Sunday.

Yesterday's referee-chasing incident occurred at Shibe Park in Philadelphia, where 24,446 saw the Giants taken an early 9-0 lead over the Eagles and make it stand up in a fierce tacking fray.

In the third quarter with the Giants leading 9-7, Eagle tackle Jay MacDowell picked up a Giant fumble and ran 76 yards for an apparent touchdown. But the ball was called back and Referee Emil Heintz penalized the Eagles for clipping. After the game police had to rescue Heintz from fans who stopped him in the runway to the dressing room.

Feeling ran high throughout the game and led to several fist-throwing incidents.

The Giants points came on 15-yard field goal by Ramey Clay, former Texas U. halfback from Pampa, and a five-yard forward pass thrown by Charley Justice, all in the first period. Clay took over the kicking duties because Ray Poole, the Giants' specialist, broke an ankle on the opening kickoff and was carried off.

The Eagles got their touchdown in the second quarter on a 36-yard pass to Tommy Thompson to

Grosa Wants To Retire Joe Louis

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—John O. DeGrosa, Pennsylvania athletic commissioner, is seeking to bar Joe Louis from any more fights, "in the best interests of boxing" and of the ex-champion himself.

DeGrosa disclosed last night that he has started a move to keep Louis out of the ring in Pennsylvania and will ask the National Boxing Association to do likewise.

He asserted the aging Louis's scheduled fight with Freddie Beshore in Detroit Jan. 3 should be called for the "health, welfare and future" of the one-time Brown Bomber.

Moreover, he said, permanent retirement of Louis would also be "in the best interests of boxing."

DeGrosa cited that Pennsylvania, a member of the NBA, has barred two other boxers—former lightweight champion Lew Jenkins and Bob Montgomery—from fighting in this state "for the same reasons."

He said the three-man Pennsylvania Athletic Commission will review the matter today and probably send a petition to NBA Commissioner Abe Greene.

From his New Jersey home Greene commented: "I would not want to be a party to barring Joe Louis from boxing. He has meant too much to the sport and has made a magnificent contribution both in and out of the ring. The furthest I would want to go would be perhaps to call on Joe personally to keep his brilliant record and reputation as a great fighter unimpaired."

At Stony Point, Ont., where he is training for the fight with Beshore, handlers said Louis would not be accessible for comment until later.

Texas A&M Gain Most Yardage in SW Conference

DALLAS (AP)—Texas A&M, which showed its thunderous offense in smashing Georgia 40-20 Saturday in the Presidential Cup game at Washington, gained the most ground in the Southwest Conference football campaign which closed last week.

The Aggies whipped up 3667 yards rushing and passing to shade Southern Methodist by 48 yards.

Showing how useless the statistics often are in indicating team strength, however, was the fact that champion Texas wound up sixth in a seven-team field in offense, gaining 2971 yards. Defensively, however, Texas was tops. The Longhorns gave up only 2405 yards in 10 games—118.1 average per game rushing and 122.4 passing. Baylor was second, holding its foes to 256.8 per contest.

Bob Smith of Texas A&M was the leading ball-carrier with 1302 yards in 199 runs, Fred Benners of Southern Methodist led the passers with 108 completions in 192 throws for 1361 yards. Larry Isbell of Baylor topped the punters with an average of 41.1 yards on 86 kicks. Johnny Curtis of Baylor led the punt returners with an average of 24.3 yards on 12 runs and Harold Riley of Texas led the pass-receivers with 35 catches for 539 yards.

Byron Townsend, Texas fullback, was the only Longhorn to rank high offensively. He was second in ball-carrying with 841 yards on 228 tries. Bobby Dillon of Texas was third in punt returns with an average of 22.2 on 15 runs, Ben Procter of Texas was fourth in pass-receiving, catching 24 for 483 yards and Ben Tompkins of Texas was fourth in passing with 65 completions in 118 throws for 856 yards.

Arizin Sparks Warrior Team

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Paul Arizin is proving just as adept at scoring with the pros as he was during his basketball days with Villanova College. He appears to be the outstanding rookie in the National Basketball Association.

In one three-game period he tallied 76 points for the Philadelphia Warriors and is one of the big reasons why Coach Eddie Gottlieb's team heads the Eastern Division.

Arizin, a member of The Associated Press All-America quintet last spring, never played high school basketball. Even as a freshman at Villanova he failed to turn out for the sport.

24 PUNTS ON ONE GAME

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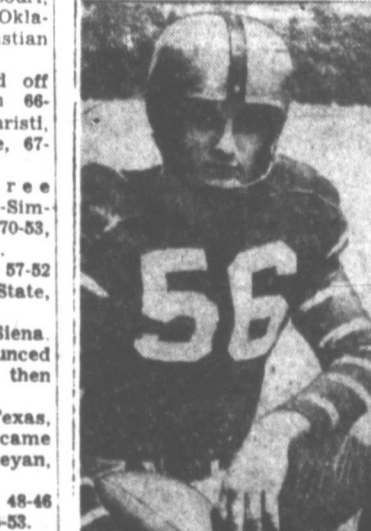

Each of the four remaining teams boast terrific offenses. And they have equally stout defenses.

New Braunfels, a finalist in 1948, has rolled up 509 points to 64 points for 13 opponents. Kermit has scored 343 points to 68; Arlington 396 to 124 and Wharton 397 to 117.

Last week New Braunfels beat Lavea, 18-0; Arlington downed Mt. Vernon, 21-0; Wharton beat Pearsall, 48-20, and Kermit licked Levelland, 33-0.

Kermit's offense is sparked by the fabulous Rick Spinks, touted as a combination Doak Walker-Lavea. He's got two touchdown threats in Jack Marshall and Rusty Gunn, while both Wharton and New Braunfels are loaded with high class backs.

Red Sox Bolsters Hurling Staff With Deal Sunday

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Once again, as in the past three seasons, the fence-busting Boston Red Sox rule a strong favorite to win the American League pennant—and with good reason.

Already strengthened by the acquisition of Lou Boudreau, the once peerless shortstop, the Red Sox yesterday struck fear into the hearts of their rivals by the completion of a \$500,000 five-year trade with Chicago that helped where it was needed most—pitching.

The important deal, first to be consummated at the winter baseball meetings here, brings to Boston a pair of front line hurlers and righthander Ray Scarborough in exchange for rightfielder Allen Zarilla and pitchers Joe Dobson and Dick Littlefield.

All except the rookie Littlefield are veterans of many campaigns. Littlefield, 24-year-old southpaw, came to the Red Sox from Birmingham last August and finished with a 2-2 record. Both sides insist no money figured in the deal.

Wright, 28, won 10 and lost 16 for the second division White Sox last season. Scarborough, who came to the Sox in a six-man trade with Washington last May, wound up with a 13-18 record. The latter, known as a Red Sox killer over the years, is 32. He has been credited with knocking out the Sox out of two pennants. He beat them in decisive last ditch games in 1948 and '49. Boston was beaten for the flag by one game each season.

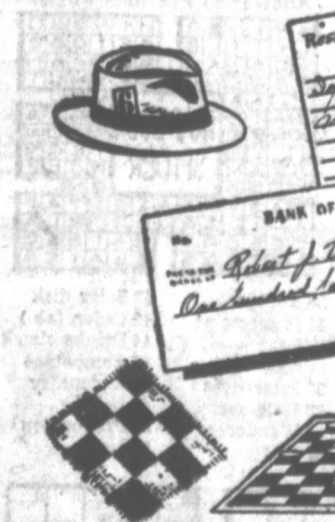

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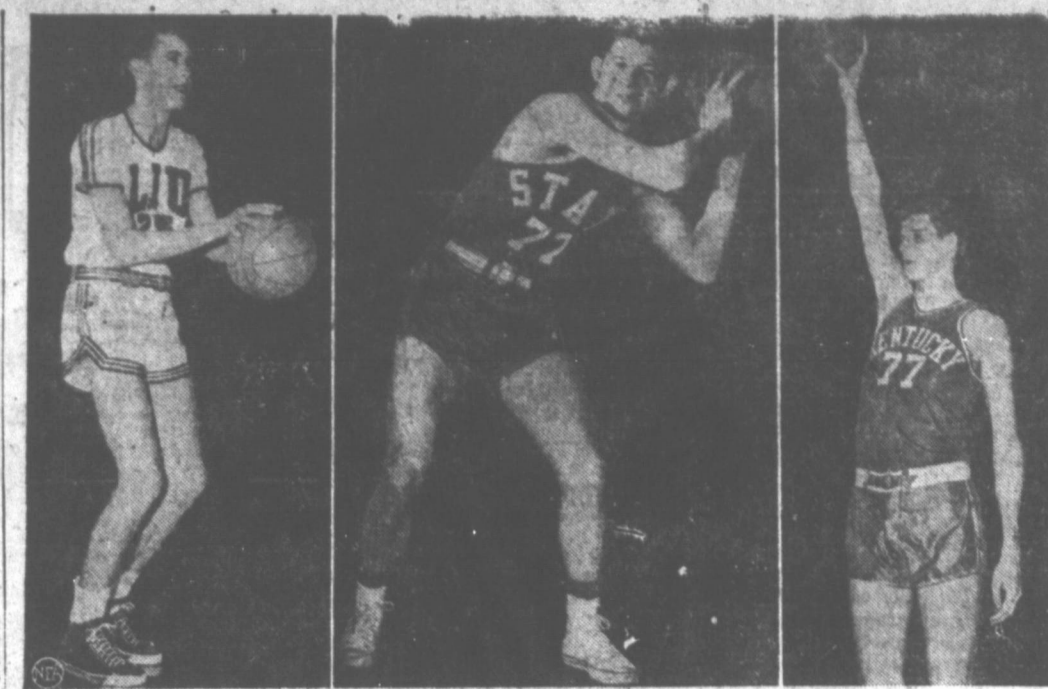

Only 12,245 Fans Watch Cup Bowl

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP)—The first annual Presidential Cup football game was a huge success in every way but one. Fiscally, it flopped.

Only 12,245 customers showed up Saturday to watch the Texas Aggies roll over Georgia, 40-20, in a game that was a thriller literally from the opening second.

Yet despite the fact that the crowd rattled around in the University of Maryland's 45,000-seat stadium, the District of Columbia American Legion Post which sponsored the game announced that it isn't downhearted.

For one thing, radio and television rights had been peddled for a sum said to be large enough to pay the guarantees given the teams. For another, it always takes time to get a game like this established.

The official legion verdict: "Well pleased." And except for the Georgia fans in the crowd, that was the verdict, too, of those who sat in on the dizzy proceedings.

The excitement started right at the beginning. The Aggies' fancy fullback Bob Smith, fumbled the opening kickoff, then picked it up on the goal and streaked 100 yards down the sidelines for a touchdown.

Thanks to a Georgia fumble, the Aggies had another big lead in two minutes. And shortly before the quarter ended, Smith took off on another touchdown run, this one for 81 yards.

Zippy Morocco, 168-pound Georgia back, chipped in with two touchdowns including a 60-yard punt return.

Cherry Sees Even Game With Vols

AUSTIN — (AP) — Coach Blair Cherry of Texas sees an even game featuring the defense—something strange to the Southwest—when his team meets Tennessee in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas Jan. 1.

Relaxing as his Longhorns took a week off at the end of a long season, Cherry talked at length about the Volunteers, whom he saw the day they played Kentucky.

"Kicking and defense are the major attributes of Tennessee," he said. "It is a team strong on fundamentals. Its offense is not flashy and is on the methodical side. This means there may not be a wide open game in the Cotton Bowl such as we had with Southern Methodist. But it will be a good game with enough action."

Cherry said that defensively he thought Texas would stack up with Tennessee. The Vol line does not appear as big as Texas but the backs are bigger, he added.

Texas closed out the season Saturday with a 21-6 victory over Louisiana state. It added to the stature of the Longhorns as the leading defensive team of the Southwest. Texas has held 10 foes to an average of 240.5 yards per game, being very tough indeed against a running game. Texas opponents have averaged only 118.1 yards rushing.

Showing how close to the chest Texas played its games was the fact that the Longhorns averaged 287.1 yards offensively—just 46.6 yards more per game than the opposition. But the Longhorns won nine of ten games and lost that one by a single point—14-13 to No. 1 Oklahoma.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Notre Dame's broken-elevator dive from the national championship to bottom drawer mediocrity provided college football's big "flop" of 1950.

Sports writers and broadcasters, participating in the post-season Associated Press poll, voted overwhelmingly for the Fighting Irish as the team that was supposed to succeed—but didn't.

Notre Dame began the campaign with modern football's longest unbeaten streak—38 games—and heavily favored to repeat as No. 1 team in the nation.

The Irish squeaked past North Carolina for their 39th straight without a setback, 14-7, and then boom! Purdue shattered the Notre Dame dynasty, 28-14.

Frank Leahy's stalwarts never recovered and went on to record one of their most dismal seasons, winning only four games, losing four and tying one.

By strange coincidence, Purdue joined Notre Dame as one of the disappointments of the campaign.

The Boilermakers finished third in the "flop" balloting just behind Bernie Bierman's once-mighty Minnesota Gophers, who were able to win only one game and tie another.

Purdue lost their next six games after beating Notre Dame before finishing with a 13-0 conquest of Indiana.

Another ranking disappointment was Southern Methodist, which lost four of its last five games after being rated the top team in the nation.

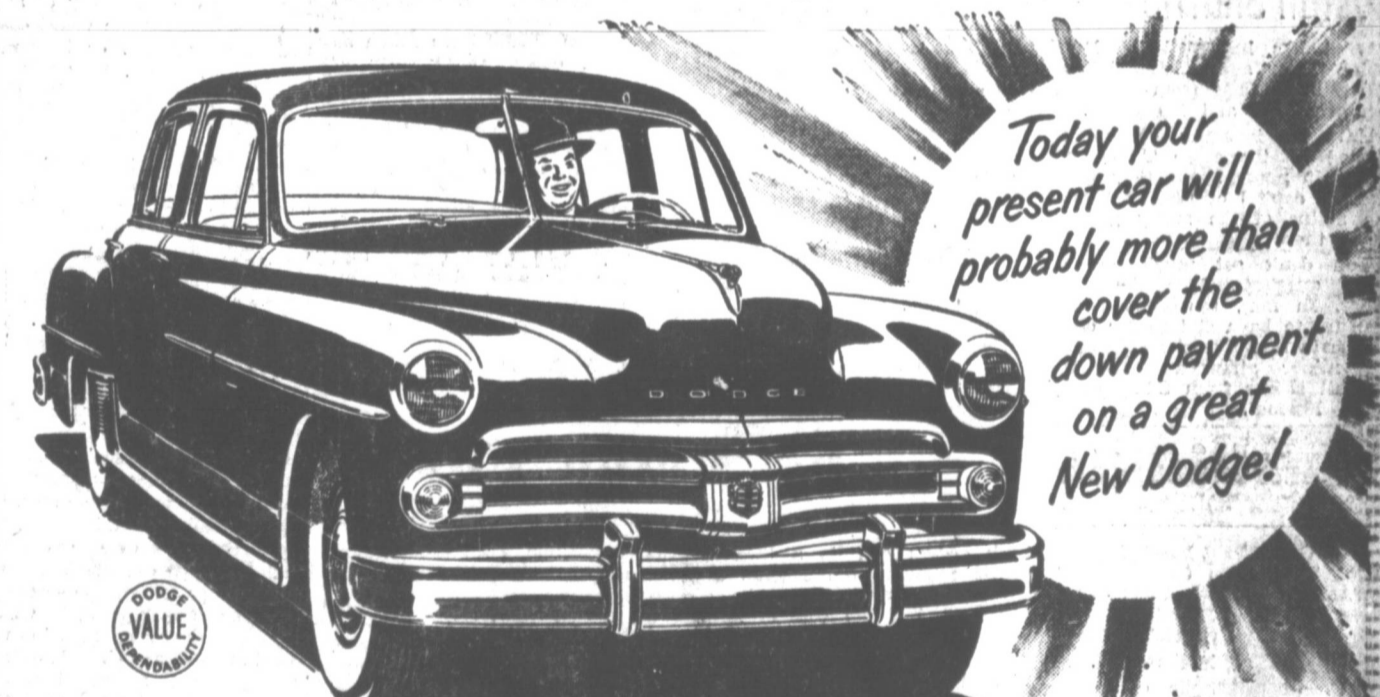

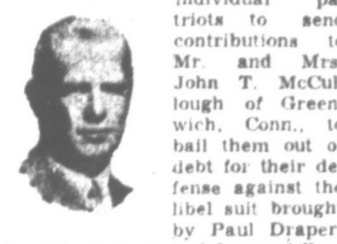

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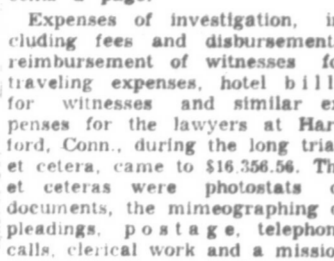

For one thing, I have been discussing the one-world idea in this series of columns candidly enough to satisfy even an Irishman who seems to be as bullheaded as I am. Murphy says the global boys and girls want to guarantee such security by: (1) Prohibiting by law the right of nations to use force or the threat of force in international affairs.

Obviously all of the proposed laws mentioned above could only be enforced by the whole world becoming one huge nation, with the United States as one state. Some of these laws would undoubtedly be humanitarian—if the proposed global nation were to be composed of a citizenry of independent individuals (which would be a contradiction in itself, since you cannot have a world collective and independent individuals at the same time).

While this decision gives a small break to today's taxpayers, the alternative of borrowing from the banks or individual investors for yearly deficits is almost as gloomy for tomorrow's stockholders in the United States government.

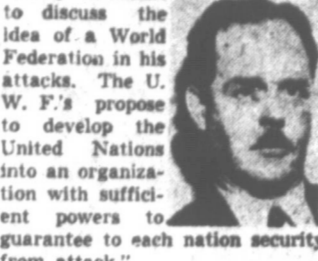

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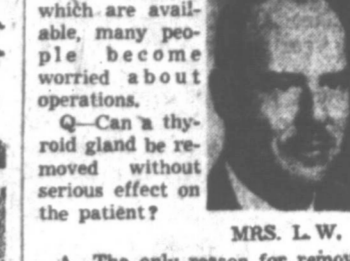
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The Doctor Says

Today with the fine anesthetics, new methods of surgery, new drugs and improved care after surgery which are available, many people become worried about operations.



Q—Please tell me if the new vitamin B-12 will help the growth of a person 25 years old. T.B. A—There have been some experimental studies which indicate that this vitamin might possibly help to increase the stature if given during the growing period. At the age of 25 it almost certainly would not do any good.

Q—Please let me know what foods should be eaten by a person suffering from anemia. A.J.E. A—The important thing in the presence of an anemia is to find out what is causing it. There are several different kinds, and they do not all require the same treatment. It would be most unwise to try to treat an anemia by diet alone until the cause had been identified.

Q—Do you recommend that every male baby should be circumcised? A—There are some medical reasons why circumcision is desirable in some cases, but it is not always necessary. Q—I have what I believe is called a pica. I have eaten about 500 grains of baking soda daily for about 10 years. Is this apt to result in physical damage of any kind? MRS. R.W. A—This is certainly a lot of baking soda, but since you have been parentally unharmed, it seems that this answers the question about physical damage. It is indeed amazing why people with abnormal appetites (pica) do not suffer more!

Q—What causes slightly swollen glands in the upper part of the neck? It seems to be chronic. A.L.M. A—Swollen glands are most likely to be a sign of some infection. They may be enlarged also in some blood diseases. If they stay enlarged for a considerable period of time, an effort should be made to find the exact cause.

Q—What can one do other than the taking of thyroid extract to remedy a below normal metabolism rate of minus 26? M.H. A—I do not know of any other method than taking thyroid extract. I am at a loss however to understand why you want another method since thyroid extract is easy to take, and not expensive.

Q—Can a person get a social disease by wearing clothes from someone who was infected? The clothes have been washed. MRS. D.M. A—This would be impossible. Q—When one hears a person speak of the Rubin test, what does this mean? C.R. A—This is a test by which doctors can find out whether the passages between the ovaries and the womb are open or not. It is one of the tests used in studying human fertility.

AN ENDLESS ROAD (The Wall Street Journal) Suppose a town is infested with gangs of bullies. And suppose a man of good intentions comes up on one of these gangs, just beginning to stir up trouble.

Does the man give a loud call for help and waste into this particular gang? And at the same time does he shout loudly that he intends to destroy all the bullies in the town?

In a way, we think the United States is like the man with good intentions. We have promised to combat Communism—everywhere. No one can argue with that aim. But in the implementing of what we have promised, we have implied to the world that it is ready to fight anywhere on the globe.

We have made promises and implied help on a scale that staggers the imagination. We have done this without thinking where this leads. Have we made promises we are not prepared to fulfill? Have we implied help we are not ready to give?

There should be no surprise that we are in trouble in Korea. We are in trouble because, once having gone into Korea, there was always the possibility this was only the prelude to something bigger—to war with the Chinese Communists, say.

Now that possibility has come close to reality. If we escape a full-blown war with the Chinese Reds we will be more than likely. What will happen if that war comes we dare not predict.

But what is happening in the frozen mountain passes of North Korea is only a symbol of what could happen in a dozen places the world around.

We are giving arms to Indo-China. Will that lead us into putting troops in Indo-China? We have promised great help to rearm western Europe. Can we do that and carry on a major war in Asia?

These examples are many and they all lead to this question: Have those who have made these promises thought through what the fulfillment of them might mean?

There is ample evidence that they have not. The decision to enter Korea came overnight, reversing a previous policy.

The United States is a great nation. Its industrial potential, always bigger tomorrow than yesterday, stands as the greatest threat to those who would engulf the world in Communism. But its strength is not limitless.

It is one thing to use strength properly—to combine it carefully with the strength of all like-thinking countries, to make only those commitments which we can fulfill.

It is another thing to start down an endless road—we know not where.

(Continued from Page One) gram, said that while new controls are coming the main reliance must be on steeper taxes, including higher income levies, and on what he called America's "greatest non-secret weapon" — its tremendous production capacity.

"If we really get this non-secret weapon fully unleashed, I think we will be incomparably stronger than any force that can be arrayed against us," Keyserling said.

Keyserling and the other members of Mr. Truman's Economic Advisory Council make recommendations upon which the President bases periodic economic reports to Congress. The next is due early in January.

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), who has been calling for immediate wage-price controls, said a reporter he agrees with Keyserling that such curbs alone would conceal inflation temporarily.

O'Mahoney, chairman of the Senate House Economic Committee, also agreed that huge defense production and a much bigger tax bite are "tremendously important."

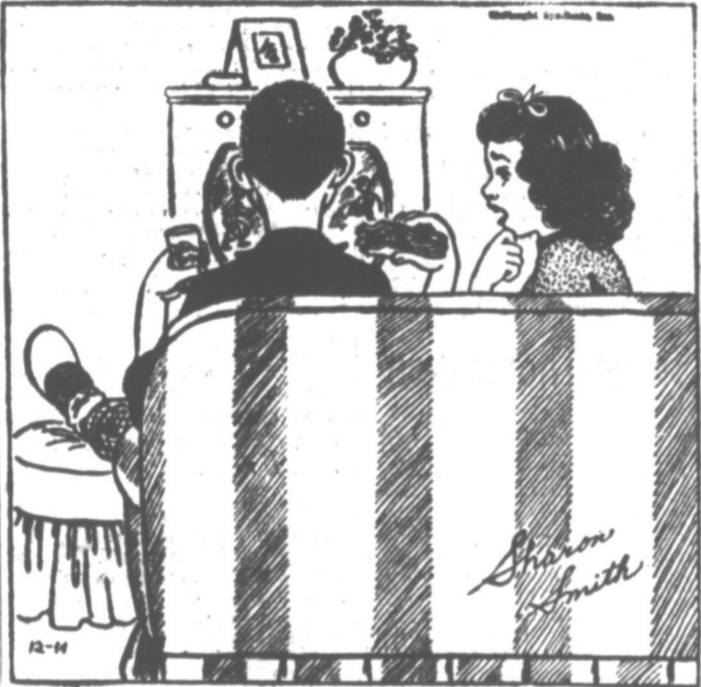
