Compact Being Set In Santa Fe Today

The first phases of a water compact, dividing the waters of the Canadian River and its tributaries, were being reduced to writing this morning in Santa Fe, N.M., between Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. The final compact, that is expected to clear the way for Senate approval of the \$85,000,000 project near Sanford, will have to be approved by Compact Commissioners Col. E. V. Spence, Texas; John Bliss, New Mexico and Clarence Burch, Oklahoma. Chairman of the commission is Berkeley Johnson, appointed by President Truman. The three commissioners were appointed by the governors of the three states.

Commission Gets Breather

Unless some matter needing immediate attention by the City Commission comes up within the next 24 hours there will be no session of the commission Tuesday afternoon. Should anything "important come up" between this morning and Tuesday noon the other three commissioners would be called for a meeting, Pepin said.

United Nations Awaiting End Of Meeting

NEW YORK — (AP) — Faced with a constantly deteriorating military situation in Korea, United Nations diplomats waited anxiously today to learn the results of a secret conference between India's Sir Benegal N. Rau and Communist China's Wu Hsiu-Chuan. The two met for several hours last night in what Sir Benegal said was an attempt to find a peaceful solution to the crisis caused by Red Chinese intervention in Korea.

The conference between the two Asian diplomats came as the United States alerted the UN General Assembly to be ready for action on the Chinese problem. American government officials held a series of top level conferences here and in Washington. Rau maintained a discreet silence on the locked-door talks because, he said, "negotiations have entered an extremely difficult stage."

It is highly unlikely that the nature of the discussions will be made public until indicated with their respective governments and given them a chance to ponder the views expressed. 1. Five China Armies Move Up for Fight

TOKYO — (AP) — United Nations forces threw up a rear-guard shield 10 miles north of Pyongyang today to protect their bitter retreat south through that tense former Red Korean capital. Little fighting was reported in that northwest sector. But Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, U.S. Eighth Army commander, said the Red Chinese had rolled five armies of 15 divisions—up to 150,000 men—south of the Chongchon River within striking distance of Pyongyang. These were the shock troops of more than 1,000,000 Chinese that General MacArthur said were either in Korea or heading for the battle fronts from Manchuria and Central China.

In the bitterly cold northeast, reinforced Chinese mounted a critical and more immediate threat to the U.S. Marines and four other UN divisions.

The Reds were driving on the twin east coast industrial cities of Hamhung and Hungnam. They threatened to isolate the entire 10th Corps. Its five divisions are widely scattered over the rugged northeast Korea icebox. Marines and doughboys battled desperately to break out of deep Red traps in the Changjin Reservoir area. WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Pentagon has been advised that the Chinese Communists used some captured American-made arms in turning back Gen. Douglas MacArthur's offensive in North Korea. This was reported today by responsible military authorities who said the newest model 3.5 inch tank-buster bazookas were included among the identified arms of the Communists.

Those turned against the UN forces in recent days presumably were captured last summer when the UN was defending the Pusan bridge-head. Reports on other arms are incomplete but officials said the Chinese are relying heavily on weapons which were made in the U. S., as well as in Russia, China and Japan.

The matter was the result of a battle to consolidate as well as efforts to 'divide the force,' were overcome. "By blocking counterattacks and coordinated fire and movement, the Marines hurled back the enemy, inflicting heavy losses." The Marines are elements of the First Marine Division, the soldiers members of the U. S. Seventh Infantry Division.

Views Sought for Wage-Price Curbs

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Congress called for the administration's views today on the possibility of wage-price curbs. The matter was booked for discussion before the Senate Banking Committee (10 a. m. EST) as the Senate itself made ready to open debate on a related home front issue a temporary extension of the federal rent control law. Backers and foes of the rent bill predicted Senate passage. The bill would continue the federal program for 60 days, or through Feb. 28. Under the present law, controls expire at the end of this month except in commodities which vote to continue them through June 30. On the wage-price control issue the Senate banking group arranged to hear Alan Valentine, director of the Economic Stabilization, whose appointment to that job is subject to Senate confirmation. Committee members said in advance the public hearing would be no routine session on a nomination, but instead an attempt to find out what the administration intends to do about rising prices and the related wage problem. "We want to know," said Senator Capehart (R-Ind.), "whether there is any plan to invoke wage-price controls within the next 60 days if there is no break in this inflationary situation, and there isn't much chance there will be." Chairman Maybank (D - SC) said Valentine should be able to give the committee a pretty good picture of the outlook because he has been serving as stabilization

Attlee Here; Says Talks Aimed at Averting War

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Prime Minister Attlee arrived here today for talks with President Truman aimed at finding a common policy in the world crisis and averting the threat of a global war.

Attlee's big four-engined British airliner "Cathay" rolled up on the National Airport apron where President Truman, Secretary of State Acheson, Defense Secretary Marshall and other officials were waiting at about 8:45.

After the greetings, Attlee made a statement for the newsmen there. He said his aim in the talks with Mr. Truman—which are to get underway tomorrow—is to align our policies in the new and troubled situation in the world and to find the means of upholding what we both know to be right.

He accused the Communist bloc of trying to "drive a wedge between our two peoples."

A harsh, cold wind, driving low wet clouds swept over the port as the British and American leaders talked for a minute or so before the President returned to his waiting automobile. In the meantime the British leader had greeted all the American officials he knew, such as Acheson, Marshall and W. Averell Harriman, the President's foreign affairs adviser, and also Ambassador Sir Oliver Franks and other diplomats from the British commonwealth countries. Attlee looked jaunty, carrying his black homburg in his left hand and with a spray of white heather in the buttonhole of his black overcoat, when he stepped briskly down the stairs from the plane with hand outstretched to Mr. Truman.

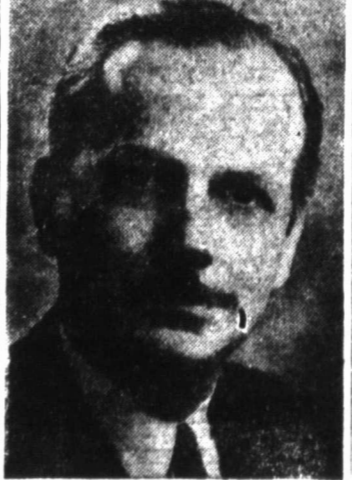
From the airport, President Truman returned to his office where he had an engagement to see Senate Democratic Leader J. B. Connelley of Illinois and other party leaders. Mr. Truman's schedule for the day also included an early afternoon conference with Secretary Acheson. They customarily meet on Mondays to review weekend developments. Attlee and his party of advisers went to the British embassy.

The President prepared himself for the talks in the executive mansion on Saturday night. These began Saturday night, continued through Sunday and were resumed today (See ATLEE HERE, Page 10)

Temperatures Due to Skid

(By The Associated Press) A severe cold wave is due to hit the Panhandle tonight and push through Texas by Tuesday night.

The Weather Bureau warned that livestock, exposed pipes, and automobiles should be protected. Temperatures are expected to drop to 10 to 20 degrees in the Panhandle, 15-25 in the South Plains and 25-35 in the Pecos Valley eastward Tuesday. In East Texas, the northwest portion may expect 20-32 degrees Tuesday, with the cold wave spreading to the coast by Tuesday.

The weather forecast made no mention of rain being expected in dry West Texas from the new northern moving in. However, scattered showers were forecast for East Texas tomorrow.

Week-end rains included 1.34 inches at Beaumont, Lufkin 1.76, Houston 1.7 inch, Galveston .09 and Texarkana a trace. The state warmed up Sunday after the cool front passed on. High temperature yesterday was 72 degrees at Corpus Christi, while the lowest maximum was 53 degrees at Texarkana and 2 points reported freezing temperatures this morning, Lufkin with 29 degrees and Junction with 32.

Chop Some Cuts in the End and Keep in Water

Inspect All Lights Before Placing Them on the Tree

All Gauzy Costumes and Dresses Should Be Dipped in a Flame-Resistant Solution

Take these basic precautions with your Christmas decorations and insure a SAFE and merry Christmas.

Make This a Safe, Merry Christmas

Christmas is the gayest season of the year. But, failure to take proper precautions may make you an unfortunate victim of one of the thousands of fires that happen during the holiday season.

Begin with your tree. Although the evergreen is a symbol of the winter spirit, it is also the chief source of holiday fires. It is filled with pitch and resin and, as it dries out, it becomes tinder. Actual tests have shown that an average Christmas tree will burn up in less than two minutes. This means that you have a roaring blaze before it is possible to call the local fire department. A fire extinguisher may not be a Christmas decoration, but if close at hand, it may be a holiday saver.

Use a "fresh" tree, not one that is dry and tindry. Keep it outdoors until you use it, and set it up only the day that it is to be decorated. To help keep the tree alive, chop some cuts in the butt end and stand it in a pail of water. If possible place the tree in the coolest part of the house, where it will not block any means of exit and turn off the radiator nearest it.

There are many so-called methods of flameproofing Christmas trees. However, none has ever proved successful enough to receive the approval of National Board of Fire Underwriters. Sheets of aluminum foil spread around the base provide decorative floor protection and it will lessen fire danger too.

Check and replace frayed electric cords and sockets used to string lights on tree. Provide a switch some distance away from the tree to turn the lights on and off. Also watch the house circuits for overloading. Never put a larger fuse in to carry the extra load of Christmas lights.

When no one is in the room with the tree, turn off the Christmas lights. If the needles near the lights start to turn brown, change the location of the lights. When the needles start to

Preserving Baby Shoes Increasing

The sentimental custom of preserving baby shoes has gained such popularity that nearly half a hundred companies do the work exclusively. Many different systems are used, but in all of them, special lacquers constitute the basic finishing material used.

In one process, the shoe is first sprayed with a lacquer which contains a metallic powder, then subjected to an electrolytic bath. In another, plaster is put into the shoe after it has been stiffened by lacquer.

Finally the shoe is sprayed with metallic lacquer and a clear top coating. All of these coatings are specially formulated as ordinary finishes are unsuitable. Leather shoes that are not finished begin to deteriorate after ten years or so. Shoes made of fabric decompose much sooner.

fall, it's time to take the tree down and discard it.

Incidentally, use only approved exterior type lights on outdoor trees. Where window lights are used, hold the curtains away from them with tiebacks.

Although electric trains look nice around the base of a tree, they are a potential source of fire because of sparks. It's much safer to set them up at a distance from the tree.

If you plan to use paper decorations, be sure to use the new flameproof paper, available from most large stationery and decorating supply houses.

When there is doubt about the flameproofness of old paper decorations, make a solution from one pound of ammonium chloride in a gallon of water and spray it on. While it will not make the decorations fireproof, it will reduce the fire hazard by making most types of paper slow burning. Also, once presents are unwrapped, throw out the paper wrappings immediately.

Christmas is the time for children's plays with their flimsy gauze costumes. To make these costumes and dresses flame-resistant, dip them in a solution of nine ounces of borax, four ounces of boric acid and a gallon of water. Saturate the fabric, wring it out by hand, and allow to dry. If the costume is ever washed, it must be re-treated.

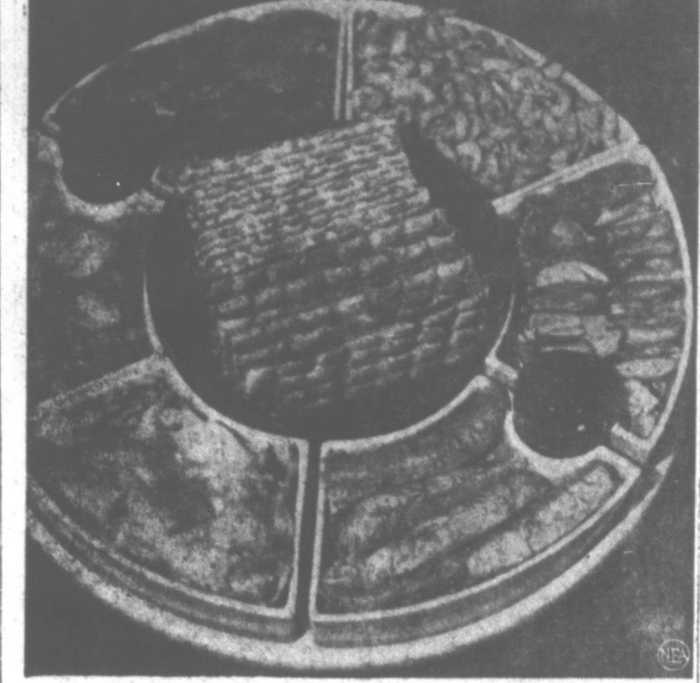

Navy Determined to Soften Grid Schedule Despite Win

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Navy accepted college football accolades today for its stunning 14-2 conquest of mighty Army but remained firm in its determination to soften future schedules.

"This victory, pleasant as it was, will have no effect on our title de-emphasis program," said Capt. Howard Caldwell, athletic director of the Annapolis Academy.

"We simply can't go on playing such a back-breaking schedule year-in and year-out. It's suicidal."

Navy already has cancelled its 1962-63 home-and-home agreement with Ohio State. It will play Rice next year in Houston and has asked the Southwest school to drop the 1962 game at Baltimore.

"This thing of playing Southern California one week, then Penn and then a team like Tulane — why, the boys never get a chance to heal their bruises between knocks," said Caldwell.

"We would like to keep some of the tough teams — like Duke, Dame, certainly, and possibly Penn and Princeton. But we'd like to mix in a few softer spots here and there."

Navy officials feel that the Middies, who won only three of their nine games, might have had an excellent season if they hadn't bitten off more schedule than they could chew.

"I think one of the big reasons that we beat Army is that we had two full weeks to get ready," said Eddie E. Red, 12, moon-faced, 36-year-old coach of the future admirals.

(By The Associated Press) Seven unbeaten teams and one that came back from defeat are in the quarter-finals of the Class A high school football race.

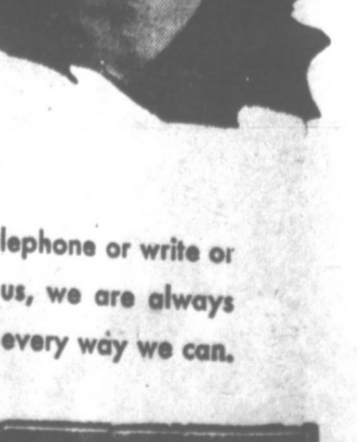

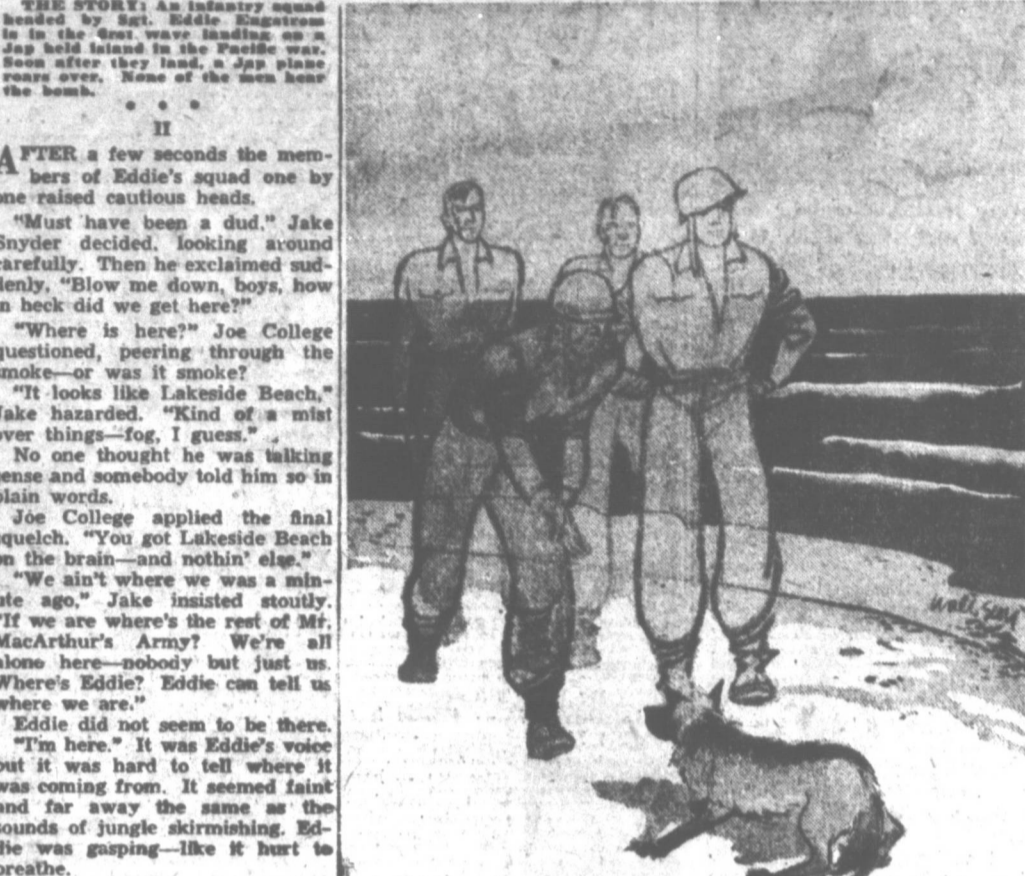

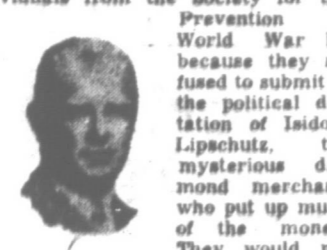

Before the Dishes Are Done

FOOD FRUSTRATED KIDS! The television manufacturers have not solicited my personal opinion of their current advertising campaign. But since their efforts are directed at parents, and since I am one of those parents, they are going to get it free, and it won't be flattering.

Very frankly, I consider their current advertising efforts to be highly nauseating and stupid. I think they win a prize for cheap and shameful propaganda. For weeks now practically every hour on the hour, millions of reasonably normal homes like my own have been the target for a barrage of advice from "child-guidance experts" like the renowned Anglo Patri. In the suave and patronizing tones which only "experts" can achieve, they have been presuming to tell American parents that all children "need home television for their morals as much as they need fresh air and sunshine for their health."

Pardon me please, but I beg to differ. In fact - I rebel! And I will continue to rebel just as long as they hire supposedly-frustrated child voices to sob into microphones: "I don't know what the principal had to say about the gang's talking about any more," or "nobody wants to come to my house 'cause we don't have a television." Not that such children do not exist. Indeed, I know some adults who whine the same whines, but in my opinion, they are not suffering for lack of television, but for lack of an common sense of self-reliance.

I am quite willing to confess that we went through a slight siege of televisionitis with our own youngsters when the first set appeared in our Massachusetts neighborhood a flock of us so glibly ate any new and intriguing invention, the kids all flew to it like bees to honey, and for a while, television was the exclusive topic of juvenile conversation, and the unchallenged satisfier of their immortal souls. In my eyes, it also became a deadly menace, as more and more beautiful sunny afternoons were ingored in favor of sitting soggy-eyed and motionless in a stuffy, crowded living-room.

That's why this particular parent soon began to offer some competition to the new knock-out drops at our neighbor's house. In the midst of lunch, I would casually say: "How would you all like to drive down to the beach this afternoon for a swim and a cook-out?" Or: "Would any of you like to take a nice adventure hike through the woods?" Come fall I tried: "Let's rake up all the leaves and build a big bonfire," and come winter: "How about going skating over to the lake?"

It will be difficult, if not impossible, for Messrs. Green and Murray to accept this advice, thus admitting that they have pursued inept political strategy. But the Lewis warning has taken root among workers and the heads of local unions. The result on November 7 demonstrated in scores of contests and in alignment of the 82nd Congress.

EXAMPLE - Mr. Lewis cites Senator Taft's reelection triumph in Ohio as a spectacular example of Green-Murray ineptitude and "Democratic double-crossing." The UMW president maintains that the Democrats' national and state organizations actually wanted and worked for Mr. Taft's reelection.

He notes that Governor Frank Lausche virtually endorsed the Senator, and suggests that there was a political deal between the White House and the Ohio Governor on the nomination of a strong senatorial opponent, but accepted such an ineffective and unqualified man as State Auditor "Jumping Joe" Ferguson.

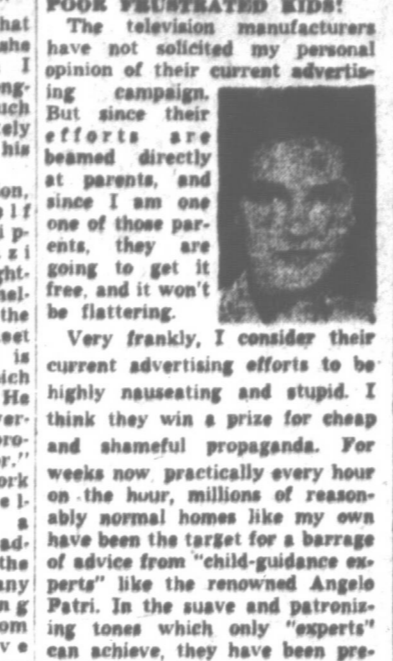

By RAY TUCKER WASHINGTON - Those irrefragable Lewis brothers - John and A. J. (Dennis) - have been having a rollicking time since election by blaming labor's setback and election of a hostile Congress on fellow-unionists William Green and Philip Murray's unquestioning allegiance to the Truman administration.

The United Mine Workers head, who opposed Truman candidates in at least two major contests (Peoria in New York City and Tydings in Maryland) charged that organization Democrats "double-crossed" their labor allies, especially in Ohio. He warns Messrs. Green and Murray that they have lost all real influence at Washington because of the irrefragable support of the White House.

REVEALING - Justice Black, who has turned out to have both a keen legal mind and a zeal for law, plans to make a heroic fight for his side. He is said to be slightly disappointed in Mr. Truman's failure to build up his group. He will strive even harder to write his social and economic views into law as interpreted by the final authorities.

Incidentally, a friendly biographer has recently written a revealing book on Mr. Black. Obviously on the basis of personal interviews, she says that he deliberately permits his personal views to influence his opinions. She adds that he seeks to improve the lot of the poor and to check aggressive wealth by his decisions.

She points out that every jurist is influenced, albeit unconsciously, by something in his own heredity and a national background, but that this is the first time a Supreme Court Justice has boldly admitted it. If she is correct, Chief Justice Vinson will have a hard time in keeping order in the court.

Elderly people have more ailments than the young, but teenagers too can have their problems. All of today's youngsters are questioning their parents with difficulties during the adolescent period.

Q-I am a girl 16 years old, five feet four inches tall, and I weigh 140 pounds. I am embarrassed by being so fat. Is there any medicine I can take?

A-With the rarest of exceptions being overweight is simply a matter of eating too much. Almost without exception those who are too fat claim that they eat little, but when their diets are studied from a calorie standpoint, they are found to eat with an exact number of calories a day should bring you to a normal weight in a few months.

Q-I am 15 years old and am only five feet one inch tall. All the boys make fun of me and call me "Shorty." Can anything be done to make me grow faster?

Q-I have a infection of the lower bronchial tubes curable? If so, how long, with expert care, would it take a 13-year-old boy to get well?

INSIDE YOUR CONGRESS

THE ELECTION IN RETROSPECT An increasing number of Americans are obviously worried. A few are mad enough to raise hell, without any very definite organization to do it. A majority are still on strike and refuse to vote. They feel that they have had no clear-cut party issue to vote on.

Many who did vote, voted against communist infiltration, muddling into the Korean war, managed prices and especially the outrageous food prices. A great beef-and-pork-eating people shelled against too much chicken and rice. Individual Congressmen did campaign squarely on the issue of liberalism against Communism and won with few exceptions.

But the people as a whole did not vote on whether the American Constitution and individualism are to be restored or the communizing and socializing of the American economy from Washington is to continue. They have had no chance to vote on this issue since 1932. Astonishing as it may seem, at that time they elected a Democratic administration, guaranteeing the American Constitution, a reduction in taxes and greater freedom of the individual.

That is what the voters wanted eighteen years ago. That is what they want now. They are going to stay on strike or remain indifferent or lack confidence in politics until they get an honest statement of such issues.

Q-I have a 12-year-old boy who stutters. In a column that subject not long ago you mentioned schools which might help. How could I get in touch with them?

A-I believe that you could obtain a list of schools or speech teachers by writing the secretary-treasurer of the American Speech and Hearing Association, Wayne University, Detroit, Mich. You might also be interested in a booklet on stuttering prepared for parents and others interested in the problem, published and distributed by the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, 11 South La Salle Street, Chicago 3, Illinois. The cost of this booklet has been listed as 35 cents.

Q-My 14-year-old daughter has just been discovered to have a heart murmur. Does this mean she will have to be very quiet, and should we worry about it?

A-A heart murmur is not always terribly serious. It is not enough just to know that a heart murmur is present. Examinations must be made to find out what caused the murmur, how seriously the heart is damaged, and whether or not the cause (usually rheumatic fever) is active or not. It is only when these additional facts are available that one can tell whether your youngster's activities will have to be restricted.
