"Isolationist" remained a term of high approbation until some years before the first World war, when England allied herself with France and Russia. Then, with the change in English policy, the word became one of reproach in England. Its use or misuse by Anglophiles in two costly and largely futile wars.
The word has no proper place in the American vocabularly not only because of its curious history but also because it is a smear word.






