Allied Force Threatened by Red Trap

World's Reaction On Korea Serious

LONDON —(P)— Prime Minister Attlee and his cabinet met in emergency session for an hour and 45 minutes this morning to discuss the China-Korea crisis.

The government ministers were called together on short notice after Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin had talked last night with Julius Holmes, minister of the U.S. embassy.

Cabinet members were grave-faced as they entered No. 10 Downing Street, Attlee's official residence.

All declined any comment to waiting reporters. It was assumed that Bevin would make a statement on the British view at the start of a two-day foreign affairs debate in Commons this afternoon.

Newspapers here and on the continent voiced serious forebodings.

Informed sources reported that Attlee and Bevin saw Holmes together and handed him a written questionnaire which called for specific answers on a number of questions relating to the Korean crisis.

The informants refused to disclose details of the British questionnaire.

Attlee and Bevin reportedly called for a quick reply, presumably so that they could be in a position to convey information to Parliament today.

Holmes, the sources said, produced the answers after consulting with Washington, for (See REACTION, Page 2)

Cost-of-Living Increased to All-Time High

WASHINGTON — (P)— The government's cost of living index today rose to a new all-time high. Nearly a million workers whose wage contracts are tied to the rise and fall of the index will receive a pay hike of two to three cents an hour.

The new index, covering prices as of Oct. 15, was 174.8 percent of the 1935-39 base period, an increase of 0.6 percent since Sept. 15.

It was 0.2 percent higher than the previous peak of 174.5 in August and September, 1948.

General Motors Corp., first of the major auto manufacturers to adopt the cost of living formula for its workers, announced immediately 357,000 hourly-rated workers will receive an additional three cents an hour. The boost will be effective with the first pay period beginning after Dec. 1.

BLS reported that the main groups of commodities going into the family budget of moderate income families were higher on the average during October.

The largest increases were reported for house furnishings, which rose 2.3 percent and apparel which rose 1.5 percent. The increase of 0.2 percent in food prices was restrained, the BLS said, by a seasonal decline in the average prices of meats.

On Oct. 15 the food index was 209.0 percent of the 1935-39 average, 4.2 percent higher than a year earlier and 2.2 percent above mid-June, 1950. The food index still was 3.8 percent below the record high of 218.8 for July 1948.

Alaska Facing Senate Battle

WASHINGTON — (P)— Southern Democrats, with strong Republican backing, waged an all-out fight in the Senate today to block the bill to grant statehood to Alaska.

President Truman has asked the short session of Congress to pass the bill and a companion Hawaiian measure, both passed by the House.

One Southerner, asking not to be named, told a reporter the dispute might end a nigger Mr. Truman's entire program for the session. The President has asked for rent control legislation and big defense appropriations, among other things, before this Congress expires Jan. 3.

Senator Lucas (D-III), Democratic floor leader, called the fight a filibustering effort to talk the Alaska statehood bill to (See ALASKA, Page 2)

Water Tanks Get Painting

Pampa's three overhead water tanks are in for a facelift inside and out.

The City Commission Tuesday afternoon awarded the cleaning and repainting contract to the Catholic Service Co., Oklahoma City, at a cost of \$3,975.

The work will include cleaning, scraping and repainting of the tanks; the city to negotiate with the successful bidder on the cost of additional repairs needed when the tanks are drained and examined.

Other bidders and their bids were: Water Tank Service Co., Dallas, \$4,080, and Texarkana Tank and Bridge Co., Texarkana, \$5,969.

During the short session the commission passed Ordinance 184 on its first reading, changing Plot 164, suburbs of Pampa, from residential to semi-commercial with added restrictions. The location is on Duncan across from Central Park and will be developed by Dick Hughes into a community shopping center with service stations and public garages excluded.

A short discussion, but with no action taken, was held on whether to install a six inch (See WATER, Page 2)

Building Begins on KPAT Radio Studio

Work will begin Thursday on the construction of studios for radio station KPAT, owned by J. C. Daniels. Permission for the new station in Pampa was given by the Federal Communications Commission last week.

The new station in Pampa was a frequency of 1230 kc.

The studios will be located on the Daniels estate north of town, on the new Perryton highway. Daniels said this morning that he expects to be in operation within 90 days.

The other radio outlet in Pampa, KPDN, is owned and operated by the Pampa News.

Local Man Jailed On Theft Charge

The fighting in Korea came a big step closer to Pampa and the Texas Panhandle today upon the receipt of the above picture, sent to the Pampa Daily News by the U. S. Air Force.

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Desperate Lawmakers Call For Quick Showdown by UN

WASHINGTON —(P)— Desperately worried lawmakers called today for a quick United Nations showdown on the critical Korean war situation.

Without much prospect they can act effectively themselves, senators asked Secretary of Defense Marshall—or some top aide, if he can't come—to tell the armed services committee (10:30 a.m. EST) about the military outlook as a result of Chinese Communist pressure.

Threats that four American divisions might be overwhelmed provoked a flood of proposals for dealing with the situation. Some suggested use of the atomic bomb.

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) told the Senate Tuesday the United States should serve Russia with an ultimatum to get Chinese Communist troops out of Korea. He said the Chinese Reds were the "agents" of Russian masters and failure to issue an ultimatum would condemn this country for lack of courage.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said on a broadcast last night that the danger of a new world war is greater now than it was two weeks ago but he still is hopeful it can be avoided.

Taft said the policies of President Truman and Secretary of State Acheson have "got us into a mess" and he doesn't think they know what to do about it. He added that he can't tell

them. He said he does not think the point has been reached where the atomic bomb should be used.

Another Republican, Senator Hendrickson of New Jersey, said in a statement that it is time for the nation to "stop fiddling around and get prepared to face an all-out mobilization."

Chairman Connally (D - Tex.) called for "appropriate action" by the UN Security Council.

Senators Brewster (R-Me.) and Bridges (R-NH) suggested that Gen. Douglas MacArthur be given authority to use the atomic bomb if he sees fit. Use of the bomb was proposed by Rep. Cole (R-NY) and Rivers (D-SC).

Senator Cain (R-Wash.) told the Senate it ought to demand that MacArthur be given authority to send troops and some rates, ranging up to 45 percent. Any profits above that

Washington — (P) — A key portion of the administration's \$4,000,000,000 excess profits tax proposal faced the threat today of a House Ways and Means Committee veto.

Split 12 to 12 on a test vote Tuesday, the committee sought agreement today on a definition of what "excess" profits are.

The administration proposes to define excess profits as any earnings which exceed 75 percent of the average of the best three years out of the four from 1946 through 1949. 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American Divisions Slip Through Gap

SEOUL —(P)— Two American divisions escaped south across the icy Chongchon River in northwest Korea today but Chinese Reds swarming through a wide gap threatened to trap a big allied force.

The Chinese offensive mass of more than 200,000 men was reported using tanks for the first time.

A spokesman at advanced U.S. Eighth Army headquarters said one Communist column had cut within 30 miles of the former Red Korean capital of Pyongyang.

He said the Red force was near Sinchang northeast of the old capital but did not disclose its size.

At least three other Red Chinese columns were reported rolling down through the Tokchon gap in wide sweeps against the allies' exposed right flank.

This was where Communist attacks earlier had crumpled three South Korean divisions.

Another Chinese force was reported attacking for the first time on the extreme left flank, but the spokesman did not give the location.

A Chinese breakthrough in force to the Yellow Sea would seal off large elements of the 110,000-man force fighting for its life in the northwest.

The Chinese Red attack was mounted by 200,000 or more troops with more pouring in steadily from Manchuria.

The spokesman said six Chinese armies now have been identified in Korea. Elements of one Chinese army known to have been in central China a week ago, he said, were attacking the Eighth Army's northern front.

The first observed Chinese Red tanks were reported across the Chongchon, rumbling from the west on Kunu, eastern anchor of the shrunken allied line.

Kunu was the escape gate through which U. S. 25th and Second Division troops poured after crossing the Chongchon. The Reds were attacking from three sides. Kunu's fate was in doubt.

The U. S. 24th Division last was reported in the Pakchon area north of the Chongchon, guarding a key route over the Anju River bridge on the far west or left side of the allied line.

But the Eighth Army spokesman said no enemy contact was made Wednesday in the 24th Division sector.

This seemed to indicate that the "large enemy forces" reported hitting the extreme left flank might already be across the Chongchon somewhere near the Yellow Sea.

The spokesman described the situation as "very serious" (See RED TRAP, Page 2)

Mac Can Hold Say Officials

WASHINGTON — (P) — High U.S. defense officials believe that Gen. Douglas MacArthur has enough machines and firepower to prevent a military disaster in Korea.

But they said today the United Nations must decide whether the supreme commander in the Far East will be given sufficient men and the broadened orders he must have to destroy the Chinese Reds south of the Yalu River in the way he shattered their North Korean comrades south of Seoul.

There was no attempt in the Pentagon to disguise the disappointment that MacArthur's end-of-war offensive had first been stalled and then turned into a retreat before the massive Chinese assault.

U. S. military officials commented to a reporter, however, that the Red breakthrough was achieved by force of manpower and that it apparently is not backed up with much artillery or armor.

They fully expect MacArthur to be able to reform his divisions along lines running roughly east and northeast of the North Korean capital of Pyongyang, where the allied superiority in artillery and tanks can hold the Chinese while UN superiority in the air pounds the invaders to the north.

New Pampa Airport In Limelight Again

A modern airport for Pampa is only leased, has sod runway. The land there would have to be purchased at approximately \$1,500 an acre.

The new flurry activity came to a head Tuesday afternoon when Ed Myatt, county clerk of the CAP, showed a full-color sound film to members of the CAP, City Commission, County Commissioners Court, the C of C's Aviation Committee, representatives of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and members of the local pilots association in the Pampa city hall.

The 35-minute reel depicted a small town whose dream for a local airport virtually snowballed into reality in less than a year.

But, it was the warning by Hugh Burdette, chairman of the rejuvenated committee that "we must do something about it" if we expect to get federal aid.

He was backed up by Ed Myatt who told the group that with the current world situation the 83rd Congress may withdraw all local airport funds and place them only in government airport funds.

Both these notes of warning were sounded with the same idea — to get the two schools of thought on location together, then work for the passage of a bond issue to make up the local share of the airport's cost.

Myatt also pointed out that the present lease on the Pampa Municipal Airport on W. Brownling expires in 19 months.

The big dividing line is the location. One faction wants the present airport improved, and enlarged if possible; the other wants the airport located on the old Pampa Auxiliary Air Force Base northwest of the city. This site is now owned by the county and equipped with three asphalt runways. Pampa Municipal Airport

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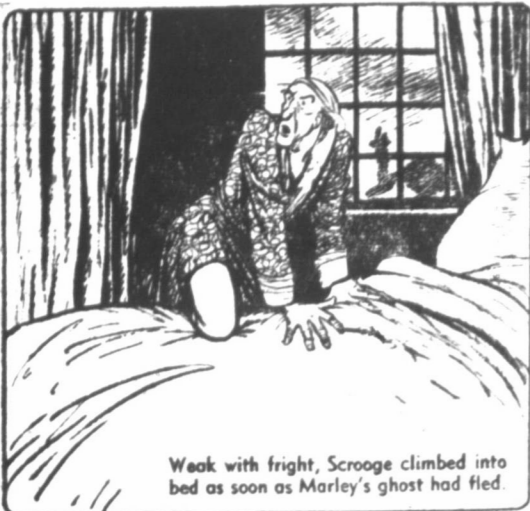

Commentator Appears Here

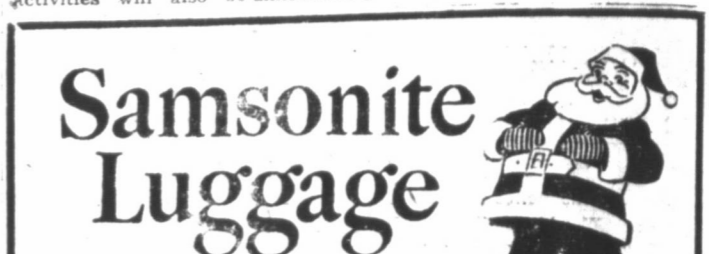

### Apples Brighten Food Horizon



MACINTOSH APPLE is a delicious treat for this healthy American boy. An even bigger treat is the old-fashioned apple pie.

We rode on a truck through a New Jersey apple orchard. It was a fragrant and wonderful experience.

We came home with these two recipes, both good for health and the Thanksgiving season.

**OLD-FASHIONED NEW JERSEY APPLE PIE**

One recipe plain pastry, 6 large McIntosh apples, 3-4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-2 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons milk, if desired.

Line 9-inch pie pan with plain pastry dough according to your favorite recipe, or use pie crust mix. Press crust edges together. Brush crust with milk, if desired. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 10 minutes; reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and bake for 45 to 50 minutes.

**APPLE PIE WITH MINCEMEAT**

Six Stayman apples, 4 tablespoons raisins, 1-2 cup 1 1/2 m l packed brown sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1-2 cup mincemeat, 4 tablespoons butter or margarine, plain pastry dough (enough for two-crust 9-inch pie).

Line 9-inch pie plate with one-half of pastry dough; peel, core and slice apples and put into pie shell, leaving space in center of pie. Sprinkle apples with raisins, sugar and lemon juice. Blend mincemeat with cider or apple juice, and fill center of pie with mixture. Dot with butter.

Moisten edge of pie crust, cover with top crust and press firmly together. Brush crust with milk. Bake pie in hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 10 minutes; continue baking at moderate temperature (350 degrees F.) for 45 to 50 minutes.

## TEEN TALK

It's that first date that gives a girl the jim-jams. Judging by questions asked by members of the Teen Estate, a girl on her first date either is a bundle of nerves, a haughty skeptic or coy, overbearing and possessive.

Most girls anticipate the first date either as a battle of wits or a chance to grab a man. Very few girls apparently actually act their age or try to be themselves when out on that first big romantic assignment.

Questions such as "What should I do if he wants to get into the car?" "Should I kiss him?" "Should I hold his hand?" "Should I tell him I love him?" "Should I tell him I'm a virgin?" are uppermost in the first date's mind.

Is there any reason why a girl can't be honest on her first date? If she doesn't approve of the boy's advances, why not let him know? If she is not a petter (and why should she be?) tell him so. Fewer than half of the housewives interviewed in a recent poll conducted by the American Institute of Public Opinion claimed they received "a lot of pleasure and satisfaction out of housework."

Before the men try to make something disgraceful out of that fact, here are a few points for them to keep in mind.

Both men and women look to marriage and family life as the "natural" way to live. But in order to have a husband, a family and a home, a woman has to take on the job of housekeeping

— whether it be full or part time. No matter how much she dislikes housework or how little talent she has for it, it's her job for life.

Now just suppose for a minute, men, that in order to have a wife and home and children every man who married had to take on a certain job. Single men could work at any job that interested them, but married men all had to be bricklayers or plumbers or whatever it may be. HOW WOULD THE MEN ANSWER?

Do you suppose you'd find anywhere near half of these men, assigned to a job whether it appealed to them or not, but simply because they were married men, proclaiming that they got a lot of satisfaction out of their work?

If that sounds like a far-fetched supposition remember that today women are trained for many different kinds of work and that they hold many different kinds of jobs before marriage.

But marriage makes housewives of them all. Housework becomes the job they have to do as the price of being married.

With that in mind it isn't surprising that fewer than half of the housewives interviewed on the question answered that they got a lot of satisfaction out of housework. The surprising fact is that only 17 percent admitted that they got "very little" pleasure and satisfaction out of a job they assumed when they married.

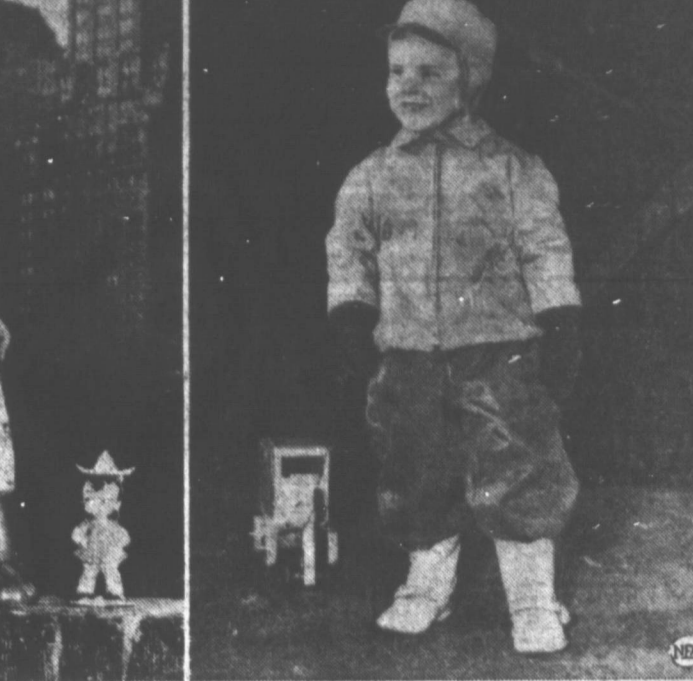

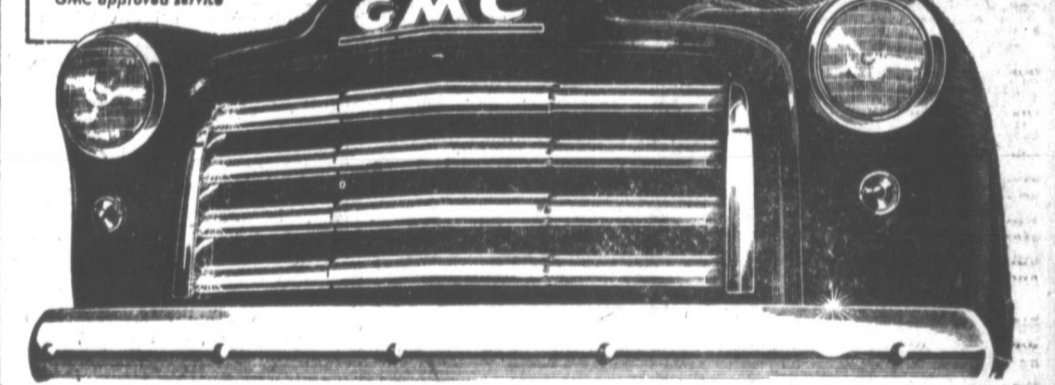

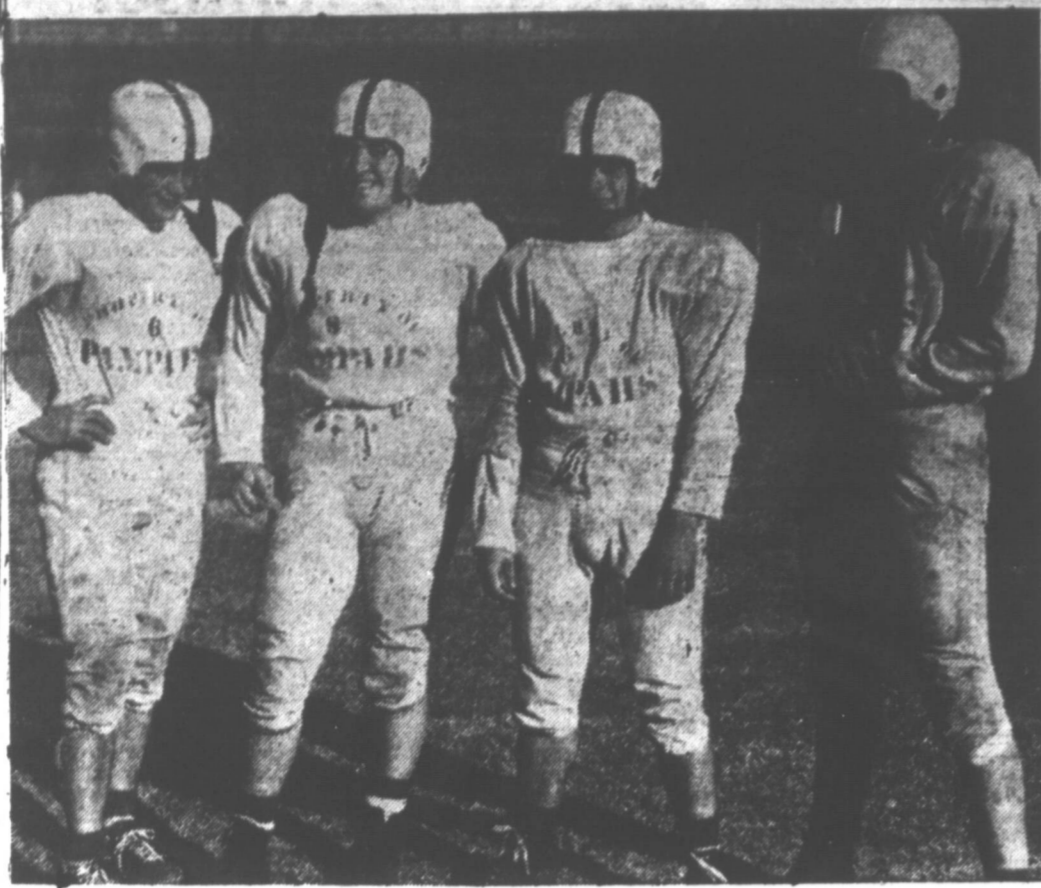

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Q. Why isn't the National Guard allowed to come home and visit more than they are? Since the men from our town were taken in active service they haven't been home once.

A. Once a Guard unit is federalized it comes under the same regulations on leave and furloughs as any other Army unit. After the first period of training, however, you can probably look for some leave being given to the boys from the outfit.

Q. When the son of a neighbor of mine was drafted recently he was underweight. He went to camp and started drilling and collapsed. He was in the hospital a while and sent out to less strenuous duty and collapsed again. His mother is very sick over this situation. What should she do?

A. This man should seek a discharge from the Army on grounds of physical disability. Army regulations provide for such discharges. He will be given a thorough physical examination to determine his condition.

Q. I recently received a telegram ordering me into service in the Air Force. Then I received a telegram revoking those orders. I am a reservist. What is my outlook?

A. Except for a very few highly critical specialists there are no more involuntary recalls of reservists being made by the Air Force. It is obvious that you are not in that critical specialist category because of the wire. So you can sit back and enjoy life with the chances of an involuntary call extremely slim.

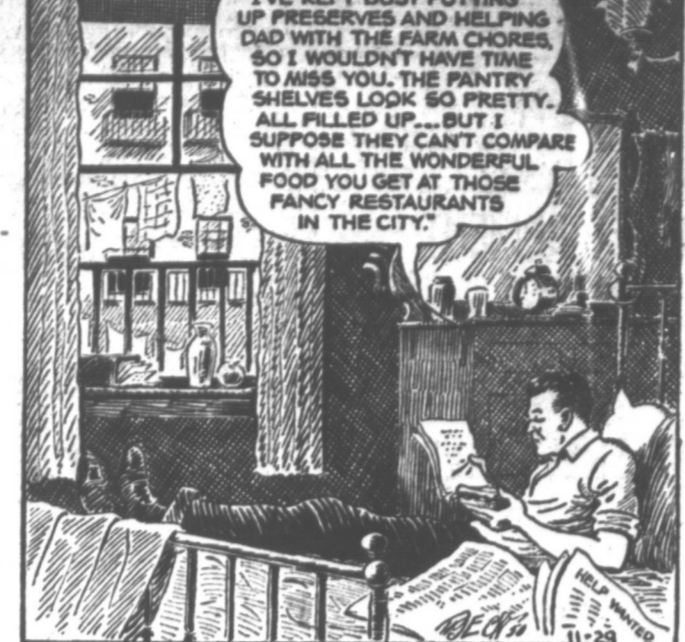
The letter said that with the large number of cars to be on the road this year, and people worried as they are, the possibility of a large traffic toll would be great.

### JACOBY ON BRIDGE

#### You Should Have Drawn Trump, Joe

I have to say this much for Hard Luck Joe: he runs into some fairly interesting hands.

The other day he worked himself into a real problem ending.

The bidding was far from inspired. North's use of the Blackwood Convention was in the worst tradition. It didn't matter how many aces and kings South had, as long as he had a sound opening bid. What did matter was how solid South's hearts were; and this was something North could never find out by asking about aces and kings.

Moreover, if South's clubs had been just enough stronger to include the king instead of the queen, he would have bid six spades over five no-trump. It might then be impossible to find a safe slam contract.

However, the bidding wound up at a good spot. Hard Luck Joe found himself playing the hand at the very reasonable contract of six hearts.

Dummy took the opening lead with the king of spades, and Joe next cashed the ace and king of diamonds. He continued by ruffing a diamond in dummy, and then led the ten of hearts for a finesse. This held the trick, West dropping the nine.

At this point Joe put his neck right on the chopping block by leading a low spade from dummy, probably with some hazy notion of setting up dummy's long suit.

East discarded the deuce of clubs, and Joe ruffed with the eight of hearts. Joe then finessed the queen of clubs, losing to East's king.

East now had a real problem ending to consider. The early play

made the location of every card absolutely clear. Should he return a club, a diamond, or a trump?

If he returned a club, dummy would win with the ace. The ace of spades would be led next, and East would have to ruff. South would over-ruff, cash the jack of clubs, ruff his last diamond in dummy, and then take the rest with high trumps.

If East returned a diamond, to make dummy ruff and thus prevent a second trump finesse, South could still make the slam. Dummy would ruff the diamond and cash the ace of clubs. Then the ace of spades would be led.
