In January of last year there resigned one from the Supreme Court of the United States who was to his generation what John Marshall was to his-the chief interpreter of the Constitution; for since Marshall impressed upon the people its implied powers and bound the states to the national government, none has so forcibly moulded its fabric to meet changing social and economic needs as has Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes.

Marshall transformed uncertain words into bristling age have become again and again majority opinions of tween the states and the federal government. Since then, industrial expansion has largely transformed the court into a judgment-seat where the Constitution has become virtually a matter of business, and the court has become a tribunal where economic practices are determined. Today the court's docket is top-heavy with cases involving the states' experiments with social and economic laws.

Justice Holmes who sat on the bench for 29 years, hurled the sharp steel of his human philosophy against every tendency of vested interests to make the court the economic dictator. . . of the United States. Since Benjamin Franklin at Philadelphia in 1787 hailed the Constitution as a "rising sun," our government he might have done, he said "I has been a series of experiments in laws. Justice Holmes never failed to remember that our Constitution is or is not a living force of justice because of nine black-robed men at the national capital-the supreme court. That wrinkled parchment has been exactly what successive generations of supreme court justices have held and in-THE NEWFANGLES (Mom'n Pop) terpreted it to be. Justice Holmes refused to read into it the power that deprived a state of the right to regulate its own social interest and human rights. . . His theory that government necessarily means experimentation has gradually seeped into the substance of our legal thought. The truths which he proclaimed from the bench have become a mass of principles which must inevitably govern the law of the future. To apply a phrase to Justice Holmes which he once used in describing the Thinker, "a hundred years after he is dead and forgotten men who have never heard of him will be moving to the measure of his thought.'

The son of that famous poet whose name he bears, Justice Holmes learned amid the clash of arms what it means to cherish and almost die for our Constitution. The battlefields of the Civil War were the traininggrounds for his courage and wisdom. A bullet that grazed his heart at the battle of Ball's Bluff, a bullet that slashed through his neck at Anitetam, and a ball that shattered his foot at Fredericksburg burned paths of wisdom that enabled him to say later, "to repose on any formula is to invite death," and "the common law is not a brooding omnipresence in the sky but the articulate voice of some sovereign that can be identified." . . The Constitution is not outworn. . . It has met the strain of expansion, wars and depressions, and still prevails as the world's symbol of democracy. Let us walk with Justice Holmes, nourishing the flame of patriotism in our hearts, and lift the Constitution above vested interests, predatory powers . . . Let us jealously protect it and esteem it as the sole repository of our natural rights, and we will forever free our country from the fate of dictators and the curse of depressions.



The last Republican to serve in the Texas House was Reno Eicken-roght of Seguin in the 41st legisla-No negro has served since the early 90's. It was recalled that when John N. Garner was elected vice presi-dent and left a vacancy in the old 15th Texas congressional district a scramble occurred in the legislature to guard against the election of a republican successor. The situation prevailing in Dallas existed to a much smaller extent in Garner's old district. There were erveral democratic candidates for he post and one republican. To prevent a spread of the democratic ote between the candidates and the vice president being succeeded by a nember of the G. O. P. the legisla ure enacted a law to provide for a primary election to determine the lemocratic candidate. Milton West Brownsville won and then won he election easily. Such a law could be enacted with reference to elections to fill vacan-cies in the state legislature. Where more than two democratic candi-dates announced the procedure would follow that of a general elec-tion year in which first and second dates primaries are held. The two high men, if none received a majority, would enter a run-off with the win-ner to challenge any other party andidate in a special election. Under existing law a special elec-tion to fill a legislative vacancy comes under the classification of a general election in which any person holding a legal poll tax is qual-ified to vote. With the democratic vote devided between more than hree-score candidates it is conceivable that a small, tightly welded group of republicans or negroes could elect a candidate.


