## JACOBY ON CANASTA

### Some Signals Are Ethical

In my last article I answered what I am sure was a tongue-in-cheek letter from a Cincinnati reader about a special convention adopted by her husband and male partner against her and her partner.

However, I have had any number of serious letters about conventions and signals in canasta. Any play that is meant to convey a definite message to your partner is a convention or signal. It is perfectly proper to use any convention or signal you think good provided that your opponents are informed in advance and provided that it is based on the actual play made, not on the manner of making the play.

In the last article husband A melded a joker and two eights from his hand. He put down the joker first to tell his partner that he had two more eights left in his hand. With one eight left in his hand he would have put the joker down second, while if he held no more eights, the joker would have hit the table last.

This convention would not be permissible even if the opponents were informed in advance, since it depended on the manner in which the play was made, not on the play itself.

Here is an example of a convention that is somewhat similar to the above, but is perfectly proper if it has been announced to the opponents in advance.

You need 120 and meld it from your hand. Your meld is a pair of aces, a lower pair, a joker and a deuce. When a canasta player makes this particular meld the joker is played with the aces almost automatically and the deuce lands with the low pair. Suppose you want to give your partner some special information when you meld 120 this way. You can do so by giving a conventional meaning to the meld of the joker with the low pair, rather than with the aces.

Of course, one weakness of such a convention would be that the information given to the opponents would help them more than it would help your partner. However, you might want to be

able to tell your partner that you could go out provided he could give you a base for a canasta. You could use this convention for that purpose.

Incidentally, I give that as an example of a convention I would never recommend. For one thing, the situation would happen so seldom that the player who was making the meld would forget about it or his partner would overlook it. Even if both partners remembered it, the convention in most instances would help the opponents more than the melding side.

## Government Moving on Two Fronts to Get Hold of Metal

NEW YORK — (AP) — The government is moving on two fronts to try to get enough metal to equip the bigger army it is raising.

One is to cut back the amount of strategic metals that can be used in the making of civilian goods — the long line of gadgets from autos and television sets to lamps and toys.

The other is to move in on the grey market and seek to stop the flow of metal, often at fantastic prices, in other than the regular chain of trade from mine to refiner to fabricator to customer — a chain which the government can regulate, as it can not control the grey market. That is what is meant by the government's announcement it would ban "conversion deals" in copper.

But while the aims may be above reproach, the practical workings have the metals trade over a barrel at the moment. And a wild scramble for metal is going on before the two government orders go into effect, January 1.

At that time, the cutback on civilian use of metals will mean:

1. An official cut of 15 percent in the use of copper for civilian goods from the amount used in the first half of this year — but an actual slash of 50 to 60 percent for most copper fabricators, from the amount they are currently using in trying to satisfy the huge consumer demand.

2. An official cut of 20 percent in use of aluminum for civilian goods from the same base period — but an actual slash of from 30 to 45 percent from the present high production rates.

3. An official cut of 20 percent in the non-military production of zinc — but an actual cut of around 25 percent from present rate of consumption.

Metalworkers say that military orders so far received won't take up that slack for some time. The metal freed by such cuts will go into government stockpiles, until military orders do take up the slack.

That is all right for defense purposes. But metalworking firms say they may have to lay off

workmen meanwhile, and fear that the aircraft and other industries will grab the skilled labor before the metal mills can call them back. Already, many mills have reduced production because they were unable to find enough metal to meet their needs.

And that is where the government stepped in with its new "normal channel" order on the refining of copper and brass scrap.

The ban on conversion deals in copper is aimed at easing the present tight supply situation in scrap copper, and seeing that copper refined from scrap goes through government-regulated channels to government-approved uses.

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### Pakistan Purchases River Craft Flotilla

KARACHI, Pakistan — (AP) — The first of a flotilla of river craft purchased by the East Pakistan government from the Philippines is now in operation in the Chittagong area of this province.

The entire flotilla will consist of 41 barges, nine tugs, three pushers, a 30-ton floating crane, a fully-equipped floating workshop and a few other miscellaneous dispatching boats. It is being manned by Pakistan nationals but officered by Americans, Filipinos and Danes.

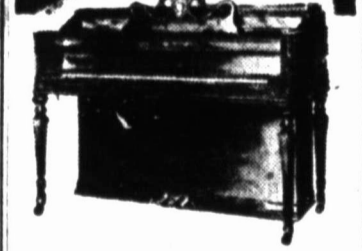
The machines will shave the ice and blowers will spread it over the ground.

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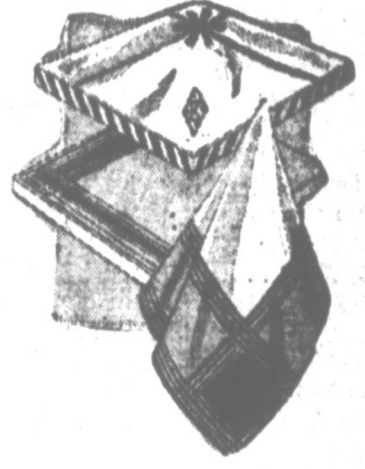

Lefors Gridders Shine for Coach Kimbrough's Buffs

CANYON — (Special) — Two rugged gridsters from Lefors will be in West Texas State's lineup when the Buffs meet Cincinnati University in the Sun Bowl on New Year's Day.

C. H. Keeton, rugged 200-pound junior end, has been a standout for Coach Frank Kimbrough this year. Especially has Keeton turned in remarkable defensive performances. However, the #1 Buff proved that he is an offensive threat by snagging two touchdown passes in the Buff's Homecoming victory.

Fast-footed Joe Ogden was injured during the latter part of the regular season but showed up extremely well in early season play. Weighing 190 pounds and standing 6'3, Ogden will be around for another year of play next season. Ogden specializes in pass receiving but can carry the ball from his wingback slot.

Sophomore Tom Jinks, another Lefors product on the Buff team, is considered one of the best line prospects in several years. Jinks operated from a guard slot on the offense and a linebacker's post on defense. Ike Doom, fiery Lefors guard on the frosh team, is expected to push for a starting berth next season and there is a great possibility that both starting guards will be from Lefors.

West Texas, champions of the Border Conference, will take a 9-1 record into the Sun Bowl game. The Buffs flattened Arizona State, Arizona University, McMurry, Texas Tech, New Mexico, Sam Houston, Texas Western, Hardin-Simmons and Corpus Christi in their victorious march. Trinity University of San Antonio upset the Herd 27-20 for

the Buffs only defeat of the season.

Fourteen seniors will graduate this year but a fine crop of 27 freshmen is expected to aid in the 1951 team.

Casters, Writers Disagree on Platoon System

NEW YORK — (AP) — The only thing that can be said for certain about the two-platoon football system is that it has produced two rabid schools of thought among the nation's most vocal and outspoken fans — the sports writers and radlomen who "love" the games.

Approximately half of them think it is the greatest invention since money. Their opposite numbers consider the two-platoon an unmitigated evil which threatens to ruin the game. Very few of the hundreds who responded to the Associated Press' annual year-end poll were neutral about it.

The question put to them was "do you think that two-platoon football is dividing the teams into 'haves' and 'have-nots'?" Many answered merely yes or no, but a majority expressed themselves at some length. Following is a cross-section of their remarks:

"Yes, it over-matches the haves, and if continued it will break up many traditional series."

"No, it is the best innovation in recent years. Two platoons are a must."

"Yes, it is playing hell. Schools such as St. Mary's and Santa Clara on the West Coast, TCU in Texas and many others which don't have unlimited manpower already are feeling the strain."

"It is wonderful for the player. A player may have certain talents but lack ability to play offensively. This is especially noticeable among high school youngsters."

Six Texas Golfers Listed in Top 25 Money Winners

CHICAGO — (AP) — Six Texans are among the 25 leading money winners of golf for one year, the PGA announced today.

Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W.Va., led with \$35,758.83.

Lloyd Mangrum of Dallas was third with \$22,667.50. Henry Ramsey of Dallas was fourth with \$18,855.03. Jack Burke, Jr. of Houston was fifth with \$18,291.50. Jimmy Demaret of Houston was seventh with \$16,268.16. Ben Hogan of Fort Worth was sixteenth with \$8,165.00 and Fred Hawkins of El Paso was twenty-fourth with \$5,238.63.

Burke finished third, Mangrum fourth and Ramsey fifth in competition for the Vardon Trophy. All made the Ryder Cup team, composed of the ten top players.

Culmone Shoots For Miller's All-Time Mark

TIME is fast running out on jockey Joe Culmone in his bid to eclipse Walter Miller's all-time record of riding 388 winners in a single season, set in 1906.

Little Joe went winnerless in five attempts at Tropical Park yesterday for the first time in his eight days of competition at the Florida track. With 366 victories, he is 22 short of Miller's mark and has only 16 more riding days to go.

Willis Shoemaker, making what seems to be a hopeless chase after Culmone for 1950 riding honors, rode one winner at Hollywood Park, giving him a season total of 352, or 14 less than Culmone.

123 BALKS CALLED

NEW YORK — (AP) — The pitcher's balk, which died out just as suddenly as it cropped up in the majors last spring, was called 123 times. There were 76 balks called by National League umpires as against 47 in the American League.

In the only other game Rice downed Southwestern Louisiana Institute 63-59, and evened the Owl season's record at two wins and two losses.

Baylor now has a four win, no loss record; TCU four wins and a loss. Southern Methodist, with one win and three losses, tries to improve that record against Centenary's Gentlemen at Dallas tonight.

Tomorrow Baylor meets North Texas State, Arkansas takes on Oklahoma A&M; TCU meets Missouri, Texas plays Casius, and the Texas Aggies entertain Southwest Texas State.

Kentucky, Kansas Undefeated Cagers Score Victories

NEW YORK — (AP) — Kentucky and Kansas moved ahead with perfect records today toward their important clash Saturday in Lexington, Ky., where pupil will match wits with former master.

Both of these leading contenders for national college basketball honors hurled big barriers last night.

Kentucky had to rally to turn back Xavier of Cincinnati, 67-56, at Cincinnati.

Kansas won its fourth in a row over St. John's of Brooklyn in New York's Madison Square Garden, 61-50.

Now Phog Allen takes his Kansans to Lexington to play Adolph Rupp's Wildcats in Kentucky's new \$4,000,000 coliseum. Allen taught Rupp much of the basketball he knows while the Kentucky tutor was at Kansas.

Indiana, a leading contender for Big Ten honors, won its third straight, defeating Texas Christian, 67-66. Michigan finally broke into the win column after two losing starts, downing Marquette, 40-37.

Western Kentucky, generally one of the best of the college crop, won its third game in four outings by whipping West Texas State, 79-44.

This is not the first time county maintainers have been used as targets by either vandals or careless and sloppy hunters who shoot first and aim later.

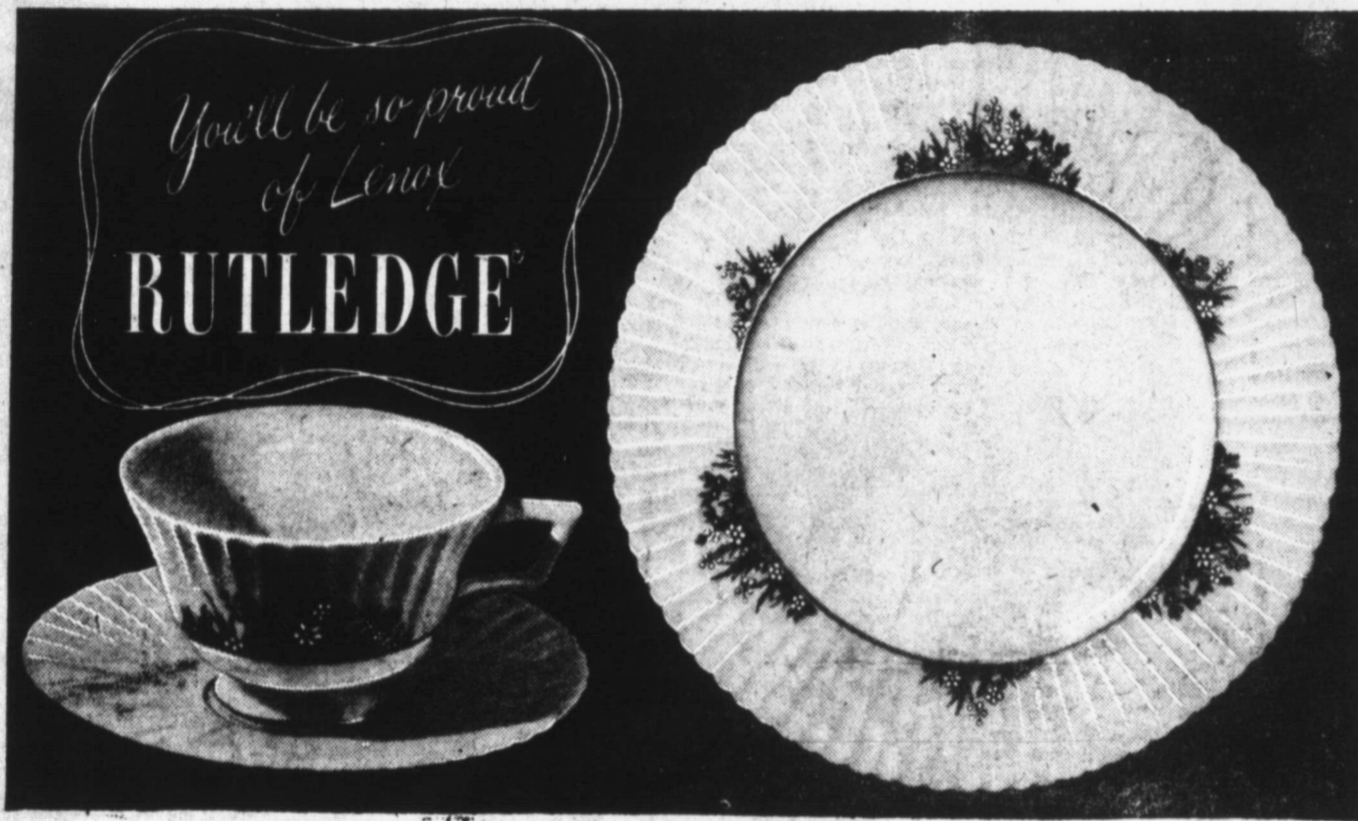

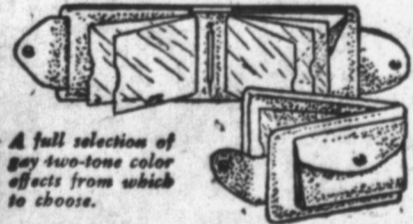

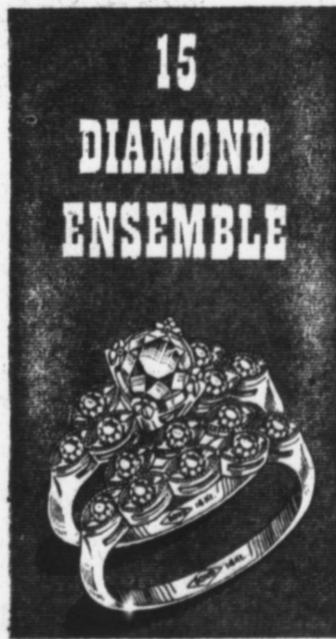

He thinks of all the money he has spent, and all the bright dreams he has dreamed of a secure future, and he is so sad and angry. Thus he becomes a "reexaminist," but unlike Secretary Acheson's farmer, he does not go out and "pull up his crops to see how they've done."

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Wanted for the Same Old Sound

WASHINGTON — The dramatic contrast between the allied states of World War II and the present situation is strikingly exemplified in the recent meetings of President Harry S. Truman and British Prime Minister Clement A. Attlee for discussion of a solution of the Korean and general world problems.

It is doubtful if modern history records such a remarkable change in the philosophies, personalities and backgrounds of the principals of the world drama as has occurred since Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill used to blueprint defeat of the Axis amidst roars of laughter and the tinkling of highballs.

GLOBAL — As F.D.R.'s currently published letters reveal, he and the "Prime" had many "jolly good times" in the depth of seeming disaster to themselves and to their beleaguered peoples.

ROOSEVELT knew the name and importance of every atoll in the Pacific. Churchill could recite him with tales of how victories had been won at Benben and elsewhere by democratic peoples against dictators as shrouded in the midst of history as Kubla Khan.

LAUGHED — Indeed, "Winnie" could quote Coleridge's splendid, unfinished poem on the "Kubla's" ghostly palace, while Roosevelt, "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere" or "Old Ironsides."

They laughed until the tears streamed down their furrowed faces as they recalled how, at the time, they could not decide, from day to day, whether he was the reincarnation of Charlemagne, Joan of Arc or Napoleon. Finally, they agreed that it was "just a naggy Frenchman."

CRUSADE — As a naval student, F.D.R. could name almost every capital ship in the fleet and his commanders. The navy was his "baby." The "former naval officer" to use his code identification in Washington — London cables and despatches, could recall the days of Nelson at Trafalgar to Beattie at Jutland.

GENERATION — President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee do not look, act, talk or think like their predecessors. They belong to another school, if not to another generation. Theatrically it is foreign to them. Neither would attract a second glance in a Christmas shopping crowd.

PROFESSORIAL — Mr. Attlee is the bookish, professorial type, extremely learned. Economic sciences rather than factory experiences led him into the labor movement. He has the stoop and the short-sightedness of the scholar.

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INSIDE YOUR CONGRESS

EXCESS POLITICS T. Little Caesar is at it again. What the people think doesn't bother him any more. His rubber stamps have given him absolute control over us. Congress is helpless unless it repeals his controls.

Time was when we had a Constitution with its limitations on the power of Presidents. It is now merely an exhibit in the Library of Congress. Imitating our late "Napoleon," our Little Caesar has long considered that the Nation's foreign affairs are his personal affairs.

He urged that income-tax rates on higher-bracket incomes in that country be advanced sharply, even though the rates are now so heavy that they take the bulk of the incomes of the more prosperous German citizens. Manifestly this one of our representatives is unaware of the fact that German industry, crushed by war, inflation, and regimentation, is in dire need of capital to rehabilitate its plants, and that, everywhere, venture capitalists come mainly from the savings of the prosperous members of society.

CHALLENGE — Instead of two swashbucklers straight out of Dumas, gambling daringly but winning the great game of war, last week's conference at Washington were two tired bookkeepers, trying to save their firm from insolvency.

However, their attitude symbolizes the peoples they represent. Under our democratic system, and England's parliamentary form, it takes all kinds of men to make a government, and our leaders, like Lincoln, have usually grown in stature as their difficulties and responsibilities grew.

Moreover, it is expected that, in their own way, the heroic Truman and Attlee — like the kids in Korea and the nations they will face up to the challenge of today's crisis.

So, the man in charge of the whole E. C. A. — the man who is spending your dollars to uplift the world — apparently sees no connection between wage rates and productivity — thinks that it is possible to make Europe prosperous by working less! Is this a case of the blind leading the blind? Perhaps, and perhaps not. Maybe some of the led are able to see a bit.

### Plum Pudding Tops the Dinner

In the rolling foothills of the Berkshires, there's an inn where Christmas dinner before the log fire ends in a flaming plum pudding, dark and rich.

Dark and rich like fruit cake—that's how Rosamond Chapin makes it. She and her husband have turned the 18th century New Boston Inn into a haven for hungry travelers.

"New some people prefer other ways of treating the Christmas pudding. But we drench it with rum, set the rum afire and bring it in glorious with flame and pungent odors," she reports.

"Then there is our sauce—a foamy, wonderful business made with eggs valiantly spiked with light and rum and brandy."

For other plum pudding tastes, the hospitable Chapins have another recipe. It's a little lighter and is served with a hard sauce milder in disposition.

Plum Pudding  
(24 to 16 servings)

Two cups sifted enriched flour, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 2-2 teaspoon cloves, 2-3 cup unsulphured molasses, 2 eggs, beaten, 1-4 cup shortening, melted, 1-4 cup milk, 1 cup chopped nuts, 2 cups mixed diced candied fruit, 2 cups raisins or currants.

Sift together first six ingredients. Add molasses, eggs, shortening and milk; mix thoroughly. Stir in nuts and fruit. Pour mixture into two greased, 1-quart molds. Cover with tight-fitting lid or metal foil. Steam 2 1-2 hours. If desired, steam 1 1-2 hours in individual molds (custard cups or gelatin molds).

Molasses Hard Sauce  
(Yield—1 cup)

One-third cup butter or fortified margarine, 2 1-2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar, 2 tablespoons milk, 1 tablespoon unsulphured molasses, 1-2 teaspoon grated orange rind or 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream butter until fluffy. Add confectioners' sugar alternately with milk and molasses. Add orange rind or flavoring.

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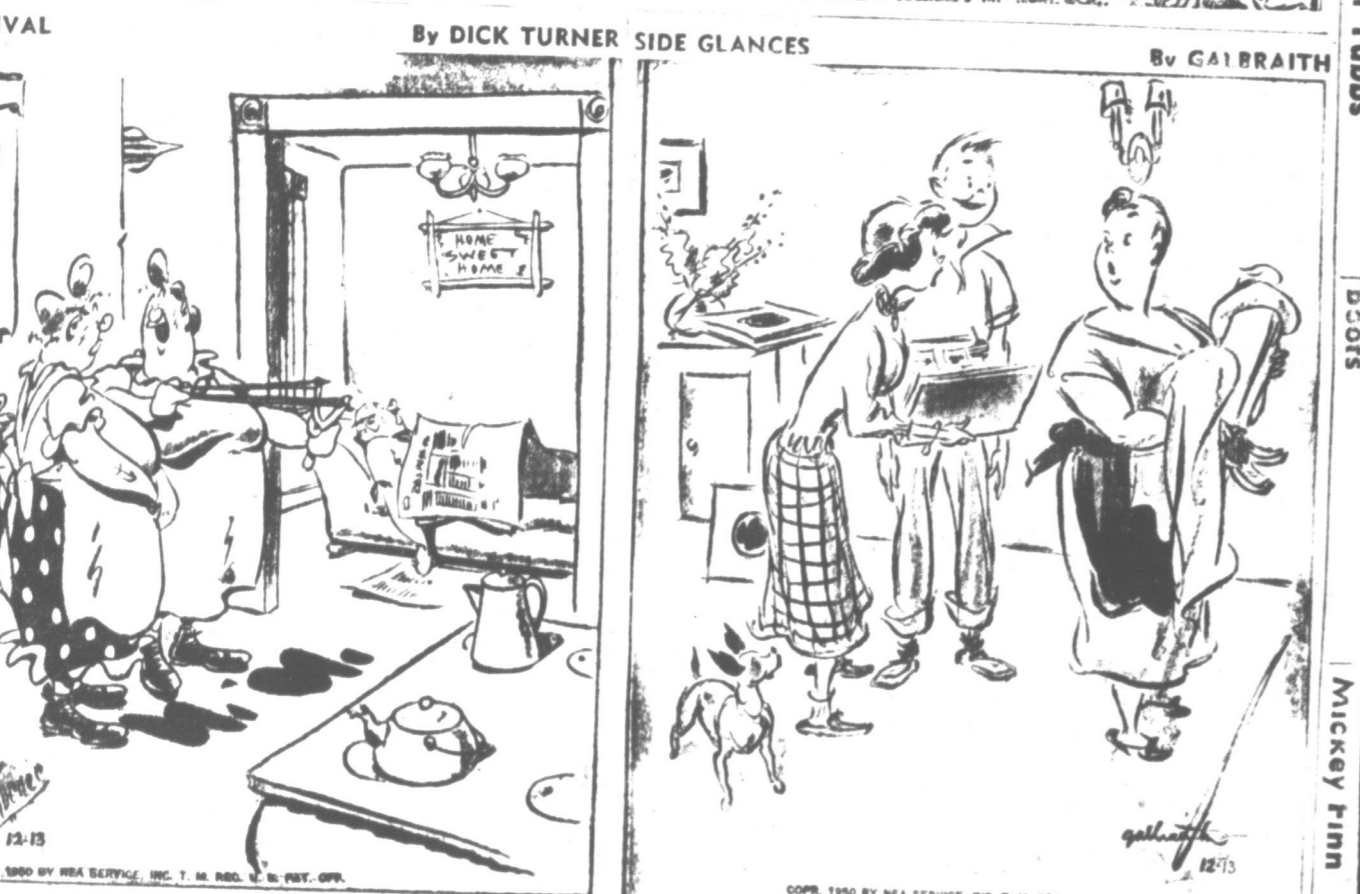

# Red-Eyed Marines Come Out Slowly, Proudly From Traps

The weary, dangerous road to safety lay steep on the sharp-ribbed, snow-capped mountains. Then it unfolded leisurely along a brown, snow-dappled valley crusty with frost.

The marines came down the road slowly. Their eyes were red with fatigue. Their faces and hands were grimy. They still were under the tension of the past terrible 12 days which shall be written boldly in Marine Corps history.

These were the last marine troops to come out of the Chinese trap which the leathernecks themselves had jammed a part. They were tired, dirty and bearded, but unafraid and proud with

a pride which brought a lump in your throat.

They were not all there. Not all who drove far inland from the sea; through snow and ice and freezing cold to Changjin Reservoir, where the Chinese tried to spring a trap.

For many marines died alongside that great reservoir and on the bloody road back to safety. Their bodies will lie forever in this barren and inhospitable wilderness.

Some climbed wearily from their vehicles, many of which were guady, like gypsies' wagons, with the vivid red and yellow and white silk from parachutes which had floated food and bullets to them while they were cut off from all help except by air.

There were the tired but joyful cries of profane greetings like "hey, Red you bastard I heard they got you" — which failed completely to hide their regard for each other. And there were low-spoken reports like "Bill got it at Hagaru."

Then the marines climbed stiffly back into their vehicles. A few drivers, grinning weakly, looked their horns in response to the peanut whistle shrilling from tiny locomotives which had hauled some marines south to safety from the valley railroad.

Then the convoy rolled south into the dusk, the vehicles faintly lighted by a thin silver of moon and the evening star.

## Italy's Merchantmen Are Back to Normal

ROME — (AP) — The Italian merchant fleet reached a total of 2,722,822 tons with 1,176 ships by the end of September, it was officially disclosed.

The Italian merchant fleet was down to 300,000 tons at the war's end. Purchase of U. S. liberty ships and building of new craft under the E.R.P. program has steadily increased the tonnage of the Italian merchant marine, now almost at its pre-war peak.

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## Reds 'Explain' Elections in U.S.

VIENNA — (AP) — Know why the U.S. elections were so close a few weeks ago? Wall Street wanted the two major parties to have almost equal forces so they could be easily handled. That's the story being told behind the Iron Curtain.

Communist newspapers in Hungary and Romania are explaining to their readers that the election results don't really matter anyway, since "it is well known that there are no essential differences between the two parties, both being at the service of Wall Street's war interest."

## Nationalizing Plan Put Off in Kashmir

SRINAGAR, Kashmir — (AP) — The state government's plans for nationalizing orchards in Indian-held Kashmir have been postponed because of the financial drain involved in paying off the owners.

The government is going ahead, however, with its program of breaking up large estates and distributing sections to the tillers.

## YOU AND THE SERVICE

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Q. What alternatives does a man of draft age, physically fit, for service have other than just being drafted?

A. He can enlist in the regular Army for a minimum period of three years. The advantage of this over being drafted is a more liberal choice of careers in the Army.

He can enlist in the National Guard for a period of three years or in the Army's organized reserves for a period of three years if he does so before getting his pre-induction physical exam notice. He must drill several hours a week. There has to be a unit nearby. Chances are he will get active duty in a short time. There is also a remote chance that he will never get active duty. And he won't be drafted during this period.

If he qualifies and applies before his pre-induction physical exam notice he can join the regular Air Force or Navy or the active reserve branches of these two organizations and be exempt from the draft. If a man is over 17 he must enlist in both the naval reserve and regular Navy for four years. For the Air Force it's three years for both regular and reserve duty.

If he goes into the active reserves of the Air Force or Navy he has to give from two to five hours a week for drill and training. A small payment is made to the man for this time. The chances of active duty are excellent.

If a man is in college and does well in ROTC he can avoid the draft by signing a contract to serve two years of extended active duty after graduation.

That key answer to most men's basic draft and service problems is the last one which will be answered by "You and the Service." From now on all problems connected with service and the draft will be handled as regular news stories in this paper as the news on this subject develops.

The question and answer treatment of this subject is ceasing because the questions now coming in indicate that the basic laws and regulations governing draft and service are very well understood by practically all persons concerned.

The questions which are now being asked are all on extremely technical points of law and interpretations of regulations which do not have general application and which are of no interest to anyone but the particular person involved. Also, most of the questions now being asked cannot be

answered authoritatively and positively from Washington.

Local draft boards, National Guard commanders, Naval District commanders, commanders of Army areas and local Air Force commanders have great latitude in applying general basic policy to individual cases. Thus, policy as set down by the Pentagon or the Selective Service heads, can be interpreted in many different ways by various officials and boards around the country.

Because of this situation there will be no attempt to answer questions involving local interpretations from Washington.

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## Conduct of Students Stir Up Parliament

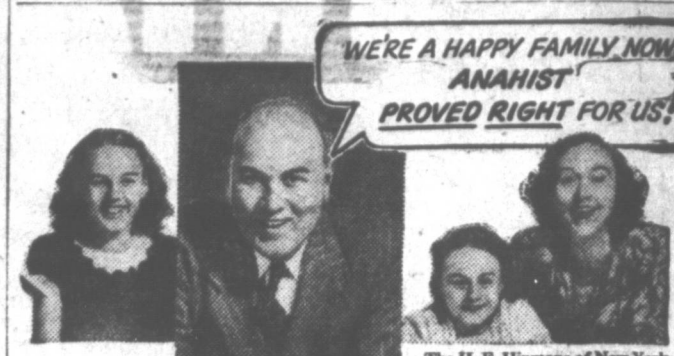

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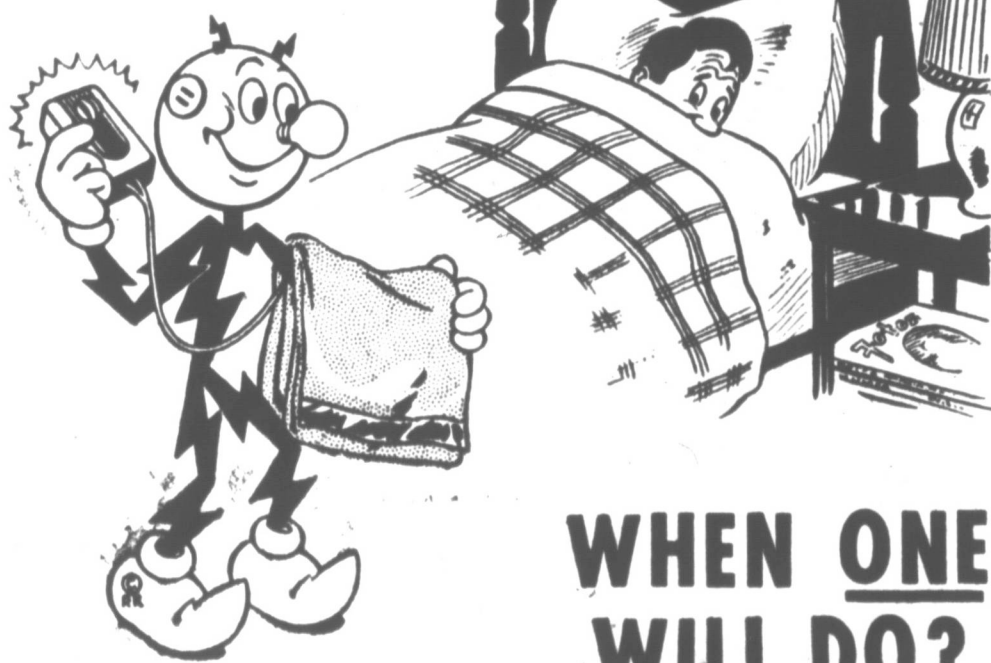
