## SENATE ORDERS LIQUOR VOTE AUG. 24

### Father Coughlin Calls Hugh Johnson 'Cracked Gramophone Record'

### HOUSE SHOWS BIG SENTIMENT FOR CENTENNIAL APPROPRIATION

#### ALLRED ASKS LEGISLATURE TO VOTE FUND

#### TEST BALLOT SHOWS MOVEMENT FOR MONEY

AUSTIN, March 12. (AP)—Overwhelming sentiment in favor of a state appropriation for the Texas Centennial was shown by the Texas house today when it voted 96 to 36 to table an amendment to strike out the enabling clause of a bill to appropriate \$3,000,000 to aid in financing Texas' 100th birthday party.

Centennial sponsors regarded the vote as a test on merits of the proposition. Previously the house had refused 84 to 54, to postpone action until revenue raising bills had been passed.

The amendment to kill the bill was offered by Representatives Albert Walker of Vernon and Alf Roark of Saratoga, who said the people of their districts were opposed to appropriations pending business and with prospects of extended debate.

Governor James V. Allred asked the legislature to make adequate provision, including a reasonable appropriation for the Texas Centennial in 1936.

The governor's special message was delivered as the house of representatives debated a bill by Representative Jeff Stinson of Dallas appropriating \$3,000,000 for the historic celebration.

On November 8, 1932, by vote of the people, a constitutional amendment was adopted authorizing a Texas Centennial commemorating the centennial of the state's history and celebrating a century of our independence and progress.

In September, 1934, the legislature created the Centennial commission, a public board charged with carrying out the mandates of

#### 'PIOUS FLUBDUB,' SAYS FORMER HEAD OF NRA

DETROIT, March 12. (AP)—Picturing Hugh S. Johnson as a "chocolate soldier" playing the role of "Man Friday" to Bernard Baruch, the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin replied last night to the former NRA administrator's "Pied Piper" speech.

The money changers whom the priest of priests drove out of the temple of Jerusalem, said Father Coughlin, "have marshaled their forces behind the leadership of a chocolate soldier for the purpose of driving a priest out of public affairs."

Father Coughlin's reply was made in a 45-minute radio speech over the same network Johnson used at New York last week to call him and Senator Huey Long "two mad pied pipers" appealing to "the lunatic fringe of the people."

After hearing the speech in Washington, Johnson replied that it was all "pious flubdub."

Father Coughlin expanded his rebuttal to take in Baruch, the "Warburgs, the Morgans, the Kuhn-Loeb and the rest of that wrecking crew of internationalists whose god is gold and whose emblem is the red seal of exploitation."

He declared he would "oppose these men until my dying days."

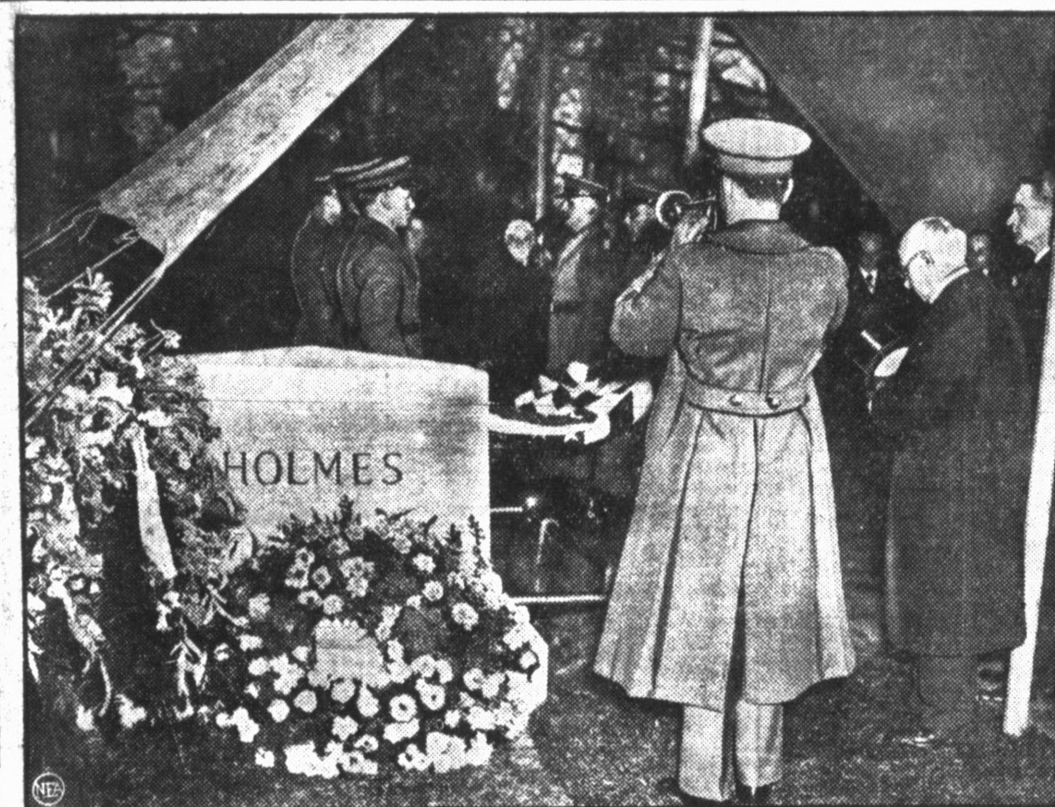

#### Taps Sound Over Grave of Beloved Justice



A few words of tribute spoken, the flag-draped coffin of Oliver Wendell Holmes was lowered slowly into the grave, six shots of the army service cracked sharply, and the final honor of a sorrowing nation was paid as a bugler softly blew taps over the body when it was placed at rest in a sloping hillside in Arlington cemetery. This was the scene as last services were held for the former supreme court justice, who ranked as the nation's greatest jurist since John Marshall.

The fire department answered the alarm and soon extinguished the fire with water from a hoist tank.

#### SMALL URGES A NEW LIQUOR CONTROL PLAN

#### PANHANDLE SENATOR FLAYS RANGER FORCE

AUSTIN, March 12. (AP)—A resolution to submit to a vote next August 24 a constitutional amendment repealing Texas' 16-year-old liquor prohibition was engrossed today by the Texas senate, 26 to 0.

A final vote necessary to send it to the house, where the question also was pending, was delayed until after 2 p. m.

Senator Joe Hill of Henderson, ardent advocate of a state monopoly dispensary system, voted present while four were absent.

In the amended form, approved 18 to 8, the proposed constitutional amendment would prohibit sale of hard liquor in broken packages or consumption on premises. A state monopoly was permissible but not mandatory.

An apparent stalemate, over the form of liquor control to place in a constitutional amendment submitted today, was broken by adoption of the plan advanced by Senator Clint Small of Amarillo as a compromise.

It would leave to legislative act regulation of traffic in beer and wine and further control of hard liquor traffic built around the ban against broken package sale and consumption on premises. It contained optional authority for the legislature to establish a state monopoly.

The wet and dry status of counties as of the date of prohibition 16 years ago and on 3.2 beer since its legalization in 1933 would not be changed until counties voted otherwise.

#### Engineer Will Suggest Plans For North Road

The situation with respect to the proposed road north from this area across the Canadian river is now in the control of W. J. Van London, district engineer, who will make his recommendation to the highway commission.

Mr. Van London went over the recently surveyed route Saturday, but he has not made known his conclusions. It is considered possible that he will point out alternative routes to the state body.
