

It is always unwise to assume that a government is clothed with all powers, finances, and machinery for when he reached his two-room the length of the straight avenue the efficient reaching of a certain goal. True, there were plenty of men who, told to arrest a certain criminal, had the courage and ability to do so. Indeed, many of the "public enemies" would present themselves, in sartorial splendor, practically on demand. But they were quickly released through the efforts of shrewd and well paid lawyers.

The government began its work slowly. The only machinery effective against the "big shots" immediately was evasion of income taxes. Prosecutions were pushed. The country was surprised to hear that Al Capone was really going to prison.

Gradually the laws were tightened, new prosecutors were appointed, the U. S. attorney general was made the chief law enforcement officer, assisted by 93 district Perry, lived. Citizens, if they do their duty as jurors-which they frequently do not-are doing enough. The plea that the citizens should take matters into their own hands by signing complaints is ill founded. It smacks of Ku Kluxism and cannot fail to result in friction within any community. Under cover officers alone can get much needed evidence.

Not frequently there are matters of law enforcement which can be handled by out-of-town officers. The state Ranger force, now being re-organized, should perform such a service. Governor Allred has shown a commendable desire to re-organize the force and reduce the vicious system of special Rangers, although some of his own appointments have not been brilliant, to say the least.

Poor handling of the Ranger force has resulted in not always fully merited criticisms such as the following:

"I'm getting sick and tired of spending a lot of money for a Ranger force that isn't worth standing room in Hades."-Senator Clint Small.

Texas should organize a Ranger force on the new demand for evidence as well as arrests. This force should be placed on a civil service basis and kept adequate to assure enforcement of whatever laws the state chooses to pass. Only such a step can prevent federalization of law enforcement-a step that is not desired by most students of the problem.
