









# GREEK REBELS IN REVOLUTION MAY BE SHOT

## MORE THAN 300 MAY FACE A FIRING SQUAD

ATHENS March 13.—The possibility of death before a firing squad faced more than 300 Greek rebels today as the government instituted wholesale court-martial for those implicated in the 11-day revolt.

The belief that a mass execution would make the final chapter of the uprising was widely held in Athens, where it was recalled that a similar fate befell the leaders of Greece's last revolution.

Premier Panagoti Tsaldaris gave cheering crowds before his home a hint of the stern measures the government might invoke to climax its triumph.

"The people of Greece," he said, "must be certain the law will be executed in such a way the present generation will never again witness the spectacle of these last days."

While his followers waited to learn the penalty for disloyalty to the government, Eleutherios Venizelos, leader of the rebellion, found a Napoleonic fate on the little Italian island of Rhodes, 75 miles from Cassos from which it was understood the Italian government would not permit him to be extradited.

To the haven of Cassos yesterday and to Rhodes today, the 71-year-old former premier, the architect of modern Greece and once potent dictator of the republic, fled on the rebel "flagship" Averoff with his native English wife and a group of his insurance associates.

Americans here are asking "will Venizelos like Napoleon from Elba, be able to stage a comeback, or will he die as Napoleon did on a little island, deprived of glory and honor?"

Most foreign observers regard the career of the former idol of a section of the Greek population as definitely closed.

Others believe the man who led the Grecian government during the world war and collaborated closely with Woodrow Wilson in framing the Versailles treaty will await a more favorable opportunity to retrieve his lost power.

Jubilant crowds, dancing and parading in the streets of the Grecian capital this morning, cheered when there appeared on bulletin boards a statement attributed to Venizelos that he has "definitely retired from Greek politics forever."

While Athens continued its celebrations, the government set its losses in the insurrection as 11 killed and 28 wounded.

trict, as do other teachers in the system. In order to take piano lessons from Mrs. Carr, it will be necessary for pupils to enroll at the business manager's office in the court house. A charge of \$6 per month will be made to all students, which must be paid in advance.

Mrs. Carr's present pupils can continue their studies with her by following the enrollment procedure. In addition to teaching piano, Mrs. Carr will assist in all musical activities of the school, such as glee clubs, choral clubs of all kinds, musical programs, operettas.

To Offer Credit. With the employment of the new

music teacher, it will be possible for the high school to offer activity credits in music. A list of requirements will be compiled and when these are met, pupils of other piano teachers of the town will be awarded the same credits.

It was the attitude of the school board that the employment of a piano instructor would greatly increase the cultural prestige of the school, and fill a need that has been felt in the past. It was stated that creating the position would round out the program of the school.

In recent years, the dramatic department has been greatly strengthened. The athletic program does not by any means dominate the school activities. "Teams" representing the commercial, debating, and band students have been outstanding in recent years. It was

opined that the musical work in the school was weakest, and the school board sought to correct the situation by creating a piano department. Creation of the position will also encourage love of music and musical activities in the school, it is believed.

Not in Competition. Mrs. Carr, it was emphasized, will not be in competition with any piano teachers or music teachers of any kind in the district. Rather, she will cooperate with them in all their activities, if asked. She was elected to the position because of unique qualifications she possesses which seem to fit her for the post, it was said.

Mrs. Carr came to Pampa in 1930 from Salina, Kans., where she was organist at the First Presbyterian church and where she taught music.

She had taught piano successfully for a number of years before she came here. She established the May P. Carr School of Music on North Cuyler and has operated it continuously. Mrs. Carr has been a leader in musical activities since she moved here. She sponsored and promoted the first music week held as such in Pampa. She has sponsored and directed piano ensembles, furnished music for plays, schools, churches, clubs, directed musical comedies for the Philharmonic club.
