Tibet Target Of Red Force

TOKYO — (AP) — Radio Peiping broadcast today that Chinese Reds are moving on Tibet, mid-Asian country seldom seen by white men.

The Red radio said the purpose of the Chinese Communist advance was "to free 3,000,000 Tibetans from imperialist oppression."

Soviets' Plan For Germany Turned Down

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of State Acheson turned down today a Soviet bloc proposal for a new big-power effort to establish a single German government.

The proposal was made Saturday following a two-day conference at Prague of Russian Deputy Premier V. M. Molotov and foreign ministers of seven satellite nations.

Acheson in a statement blamed Germany's plight on Russia's post-war actions.

Russia, he declared, could make the postwar Potsdam agreement "one hundred percent complete in Germany by taking the required steps in the Soviet zone."

The time has long since passed when the world can be stirred to hope by general phrases from the Soviet Union about disarmament and peace and German unity," Acheson said.

Red Master Plan For Overthrowing Philippines Bared

MANILA — (AP) — The National Defense Department says it has discovered a secret Communist master plan to overthrow the Philippines government.

The plan, it said, called for an army of 116,000 men to begin the revolution next year.

Bigger Force Seen For Atlantic Pact

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The 12 North Atlantic nations, banded together for defense against Communist armed might, may be able to create a bigger force and do it faster than their military planners have hoped.

This prospect, cheered by a nervous western world, developed today out of the opening session Tuesday of the military committee of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

It resulted, essentially, from three things: 1. The urgent plea by American Gen. Omar Bradley to the committee for action now to bring into being an integrated land, sea and air force to resist any new military thrusts by Russia or her Communist satellites.

UN Considers Lie Question

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — The United States and Russia meet at 11 a. m. EST on the security council battlefield again today to fight out the question of keeping Trygve Lie as United Nations secretary general.

The closed-door session will follow a last-minute Big Five conference earlier this morning to try for agreement.

The U. S. reportedly is determined that Lie shall remain because of his whole-hearted support of the Korean war; Russia wants to throw him out for the same reason.

An American source said: "We are 150 percent behind Mr. Lie. We shall not knuckle under to the Russians. To replace Mr. Lie would be a tacit admission that United Nations action in Korea was illegal and we will never agree to that implication."

Asked if the U. S. would cast its first veto to prevent the election of anyone else, the source said he did not think such an action would be necessary since he doubted if anyone else could get the seven affirmative votes needed.

Communist Forces Fleeing In Front of Mop-Up Thrusts

SEOUL — (AP) — South Korean troops thrust within 32 miles of the Manchurian border tonight in the drive to end the war.

The Air Force said in Washington that anti-aircraft fire from the Chinese Communist side of the Korean-Manchurian border hit an American F-51 Mustang fighter plane Tuesday. The plane was forced to land at sea.

U.S. Fighter Is Shot Down

Two U. S. Marine planes earlier were reported fired upon Monday but a Marine spokesman said they were not hit.

Washington — (AP) — The Air Force said today an American F-51 fighter plane was hit Tuesday by anti-aircraft fire from the Chinese side of the Korean-Manchurian border.

A spokesman said the pilot of the plane out to sea but had to put down there. He was picked up by United Nations naval craft.

He said the American plane was three miles south of the border when fired on from the Chinese side.

That was the second report of anti-aircraft fire from across the Chinese border.

Dispatches from Korea said two U. S. Marine planes were fired on Monday. Neither was hit.

The Far East Air Forces reported a cluster of miscellaneous vehicles was strafed and rocketed by fighter planes Tuesday.

That was Mupyeong, 20 miles southwest of Kanggye, near the Manchurian border about midway across the Korean peninsula.

The Red Korean communiqué, as broadcast by Moscow radio, spoke of "heavy defensive battles" in the captured Communist capital of Pyongyang.

The Philippines combat team, one of the United Nations forces arriving belatedly in Korea, was mentioned officially in Tokyo for the first time.

Texas Voters Get Small Size Ballot

Voting in the November general election this year will be done on a small size in Texas.

The size of the official ballot has been reduced from the miniature bed-sheet size in 1948 to a mere 21 inches in length by 10 1/2 inches wide.

But the wasted space, caused by the antique scratch-out method of voting with a separate column for each party, is still present.

The 1948 general election (presidential election year) ballot was 22 inches long by 16 inches wide.

However, the length of the ballot in 1948 was caused by more offices being affected and eight constitutional amendments to be acted on by the electorate.

Three offices, outside of president and vice president of the United States, on the 1948 ballot are not being acted on this year.

Profits Tax Losses Favor As Regular Levy Hike Expected

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Flanders (R-Vt.) said today he has turned against an excess profits tax and now favors another boost in regular corporate levies to help pay for spiraling defense costs.

He added he believes other legislators may have had a similar change of heart since Congress adjourned last month.

There was strong congressional sentiment then for an excess profits tax, and Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the Senate Finance Committee said Tuesday that it will be one part of a multi-billion dollar increase which he said lies ahead.

(Continued from Page 1) not so great as in peacetime while ship-building machine tool and airplane engine parts which made big profits during the war have since gone into the red. Instead of trying to find some fair base period on which to figure excess profits, Flanders said, it would be better simply to increase the regular corporate tax rate. He said this would "tap far more profits," including those of companies "that have had a good backlog of profits to build up a reserve."

Flanders said a 50 percent rate would be a rather serious thing for the national economy, but that such a tax "would have to last as long as we have to make these extraordinary expenditures for defense."

What's more, he said, unless some means of cutting defense costs is found, "our next step will have to be another increase in personal taxes."

State Traffic Toll Claims 169 Persons

AUSTIN — (AP) — Traffic accidents killed 169 people in Texas last month. The 1950 death-on-the-highway total reached 1,623 compared with 1,340 a year ago, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported.

East German Jokes Blast 'Uncle Joe'

BERLIN — (AP) — People in Soviet-occupied Eastern Germany can't do anything against the Russians or the Communists. So at least they think up new anti-Russian jokes every day. The latest: An East Zone policeman on patrol saw a little girl standing in front of a huge cardboard portrait of Generalissimo Stalin. She was extending a handful of grass toward him. When the policeman asked the girl what she was doing, she replied: "My father says things won't get better until Stalin bites the grass." This is the German expression for biting the dust.

(Continued from Page 1) high level committee of defense ministers will act at a meeting on Saturday and which that committee, in turn, may send on to the council of foreign ministers of the treaty powers.

A formal communiqué issued last night said that in the military committee meeting "agreements were reached on several important matters to be submitted to the defense committee."

The American spokesman said this meant the military committee, among other things, agreed on (A) creation of an integrated force; (B) creation of the office of supreme commander, although Tuesday's session did not decide to recommend what nation should provide the man; (C) a supreme headquarters, probably somewhere on the pattern of the wartime SHAEF organization in Europe with a chief of staff. Apparently no decision was reached on recommending the powers granted the supreme commander.

(Continued from Page 1) omous. The Reds insist it is part of China. The mountainous country declared its independence centuries ago. China recognized its autonomy in 1914. Since Nationalist China fell last year, the Chinese Reds have clamored for inclusion of Tibet in Red China. The lofty Tibet is described as a strongly anti-Communist country in Asia. Its army is small, between 10,000 and 100,000 men. Their equipment is poor, mostly rifles and no armor.

The Peiping broadcast added: "The directive salutes the People's army units advancing toward Tibet, says that it is their glorious task to liberate the people of Tibet, complete the unification of the whole of China, prevent imperialists from invading an inch of territory of the mainland and to safeguard and build up the frontier regions of the country."

The Communists have accused Tibet of being friendly with American and British "imperialists." Both countries have been accused of wanting Tibet as a base for aggression in Asia. The Peiping broadcast continued: "The directive tells the army men that the building up of Tibet will be a long-term task, and that they must make up their minds accordingly... every effort must be made to enhance the economic and cultural development of Tibet as soon as hostilities come to an end."

For months the Chinese Red radio has plumped for "liberation" of Tibet. In August Red Gen. Liu Pocheng forecast a march on Tibet by his Chinese soldiers and said an invasion would have this double purpose: 1. "Drive out aggressive influence of American imperialism." 2. "Consolidate the west line of national defense."

The spiritual ruler of Tibet is the Dalai Lama, a 15-year-old who is under priestly regent. Two years ago he led the living Buddhas and student Lamas in three days of prayer against communism. A few days later a revolt broke out in Lhasa, the capital, but it was quelled. Many reports at that time said the revolt was Red inspired. Since then there have been recurrent reports of revolts in Tibet. The Tibetans avoided the Chinese civil war by ordering the Nationalist Chinese mission in Lhasa to leave the country. Tibetan reports later said the tiny country was looking to the United States for aid in combating any possible Communist aggression.

(Continued from Page 1) was so poorly advised that the export allocation had to be upped Monday night. Harold Coolidge, chairman, predicts allocations will have to be raised to three and a half million bales next year. "This raise will be kept secret until after the November election because the Truman Democratic administration is afraid to admit such an embarrassing and terrible error in calculation. "Why will the export allocations have to be raised? Because the government already had sixteen million six hundred thousand bales of cotton in storage and our maximum consumption next year will be ten and a half million bales. That will leave us with a surplus of over six million bales. The maximum reserve practicable for the United States is two million bales. The remaining four million bales plus must be sold abroad."

"In a telephone conversation with a lawyer, a Democratic lawyer, for the Agriculture Committee I was told 'this is just flimflam to impose selective price controls, with the cotton farmer as the sucker. Cotton is selling at some places in the world for eighty-five cents per pound. This particular Brannan plan is simply a vicious way of driving the price of cotton down because the Truman administration feels that the cotton farmers always will vote Democratic. I think it's a poor trick and I hope you beat this crooked administration from Pampa to Washington.' "That statement reflects my sentiments. "As a member of the Agriculture Committee, I will fight to achieve justice for the cotton farmers, now and from now on."

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There Shall Be Peace Nelson Tells Pampa at UN Ceremony

"We are not dedicating a flag here today—we are dedicating ourselves to an ancient dream—the dream of peace," Dr. Douglas E. Nelson, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, told the assembled crowd at the United Nations Day program on the courthouse lawn Tuesday morning. Dr. Nelson spoke on the theme "There Shall Be Peace."

For the first time in the history of civilization, the speaker said, there is a possibility of achieving peace because for the first time the people of the world are striving to achieve it.

Dr. Nelson told of seeing the birth of the movement that was engulfing the entire world in war—the Nazi regime.

He was in Munich 15 years ago, he said, when the first subscription had just gone into effect. The streets were filled with young men in shiny new uniforms beaming with their importance. Dr. Nelson said, "It took no crystal ball to show me what the outcome would be—that sooner or later the Americans would have to be sent over to kill them. I know that, because a flag of one nation could not and cannot ever rule the whole world—and that was their plan."

He told of watching a parade and of turning down a side street to avoid the alternative of saluting the Nazi flag or being beaten to a pulp, the usual treatment for those who refused to salute. Down that side street he saw an American flag hanging over the door of the American consulate. The contrast between it and the scene he had just left made a strong impression on the mind of the American. He said "That flag brought pictures to my mind of American scenes, and I will never again see an American flag without thinking what that little bit of America in a foreign country can mean."

"I cannot forget either that 10 years later most of those smiling young men were dead—and many of our own young men as well."

"And then," the speaker continued, "five years ago the nations of the earth got together to try to keep such a thing from happening again—to see that the dream of peace should become a reality."

He said people have always said universal peace will come some day, but "not in our time," that this is the first generation that has said "it can come in our time." Dr. Nelson added "but still we have no peace and that see an American flag without thinking what that little bit of America in a foreign country can mean."

"Peace is an experiment—it is worked out on Cuyler Street and on other small streets all

over the world. It will take time and it is the reason back of the United Nations. No nation is good enough or strong enough to stand alone, and unless the world is held together it will certainly blow apart."

Dr. Nelson concluded "We are dedicating ourselves to peace, and if you are ready to go forward we shall have it."

The Rev. E. Douglas Carver served as master of ceremonies at the program which was opened with presentation of the colors by the National Guard and the Explorer Scouts. R. Virgil Mott led the group in singing the national anthem, followed by one minute of silent prayer. John Teed of Boy Scout Troop 18 led the pledge to the United States flag.

Barbara Edwards gave the meaning of the UN flag as follows:

"The blue of the flag is a brave color; the olive branches of peace and the entire inhabited world symbolize peace for the entire world. The flag is a proud symbol of democratic life; it speaks its belief in the unit and goodness of a free mankind—it shouts its encouraging message of strength in the frame work of a union of nations who want to safeguard the rights of men."

Four-H club members Carolyn Anderwald, Shirley Keel, Johnnie Mae Dauer and Billie Mae De-

borne, gave the following UN pledge:

"As a loyal 4-H citizen of the United States, I pledge my full support to the United Nations, the one great hope for a peaceful world with freedom and safety for all."

Dr. Orion Carter pronounced the benediction and Mr. Mott sang "The Son of Peace" accompanied by Mrs. Frank Turpen. The Pampa High School Band played under the direction of Orland Butler. The UN Day program was

'Safety First' Is a Good Rule

The previous article discussed a specific case when a fine player was forced to choose between two courses of action, both of which were bad. His problem was to choose between freezing the pack or playing for out at a time when all players were down to a few cards but the other side had a vast majority of melds.

Problems of this type occur frequently and there is no general solution. Each one must be considered on its own merits and whatever decision you make is likely to be the wrong one.

The first point to consider before making this type of freeze is the standard point. Safety! There is no point in freezing if it looks as if you or your partner will have to give the pile away later on. Therefore, if the opponents have a lot of cards in their hands you can't afford to freeze. If you are down to a few cards, you can.

The second point to consider is your own play for out if you save your wild cards. If the rest of your hand is a mess of odd cards there is little point in saving your wild cards; you have to play for out anyway.

The third point to consider is your partner's play for out. Of course, you can't look in his hand and see what he has, but you

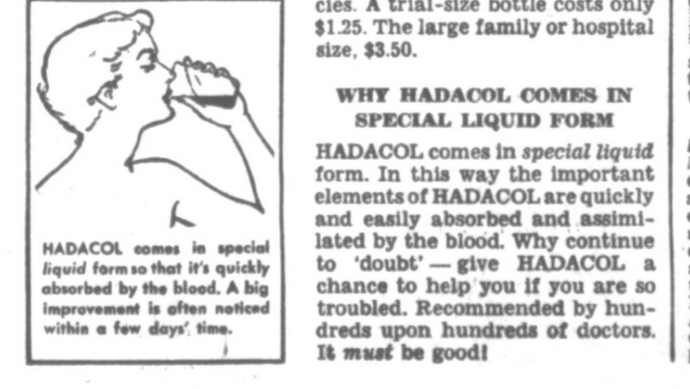

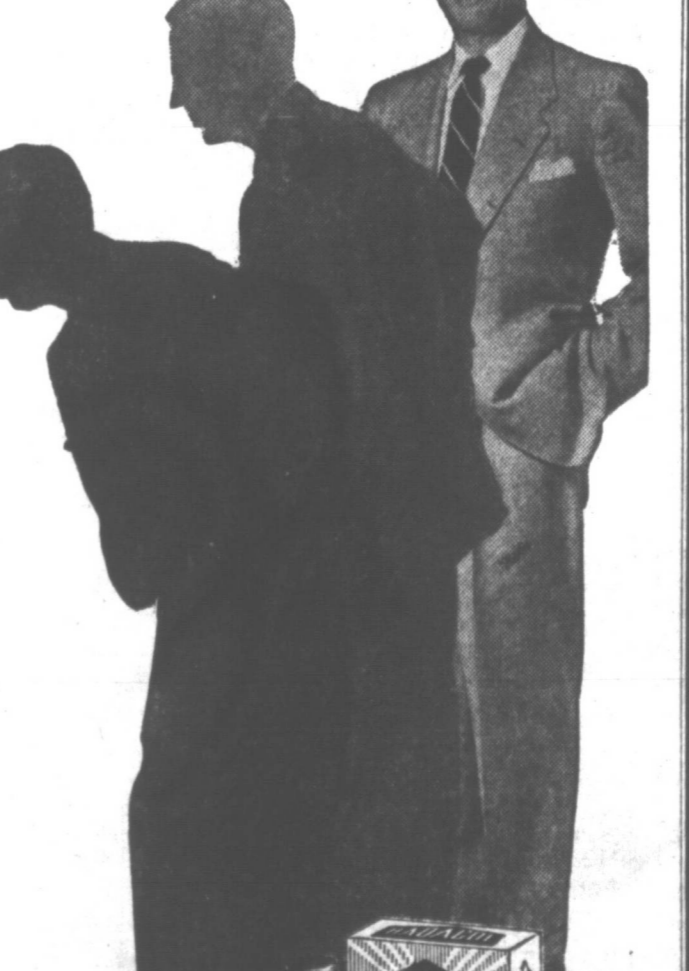
