Taft-Hartley Law Attacked by Lewis

COALDALE, Pa. — (AP) — John Lewis, head of the United Mine Workers of America, says the right to strike cannot be taken away from workers in a free country without "making the individual a serf."

Lewis, who spoke yesterday before 8,000 hard coal miners at the golden jubilee celebration of unionism in the Panther Valley, also attacked the Taft-Hartley labor law.

That law, said Lewis, was conceived at the request of organizational employers in the U.S. and was designed to impede growing strength and progress which unions in this country have been making in recent years.

The Taft-Hartley law makes a second class citizen out of any man who belongs to a labor union," Lewis said.

tion had acted "to save face" for James B. Carey, administrative chairman of the CIO International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE), who had called the strike.

"Mr. Carey's strike call was apparently a total failure," said Lemuel R. Boulware, GE vice president for employee relations.

"We feel the government has been asked by Mr. Carey to interfere in this situation to save face for Mr. Carey after his making such a bad guess about getting out any large proportion of our employees."

Boulware said Carey had "continuously boasted" of having high administration officials "in his vest pocket."

One of Carey's aides called Boulware's statement "rubbish." Carey said he would not comment on it.

ical equipment so badly needed by our boys in Korea."

It gave him "great pleasure" to vote for the anti-Communist bill, Guill said. The bill is designed to throttle activities of the Communists and subversives, known as the Wood Bill — the Mundt-Nixon bill being in part, incorporated into it. He referred to President Truman's threat to veto any such bill and promised he would vote to override the president's veto if it should come up.

Guill also explained that he voted against the controls bill because it was on a selective basis and because "I hate regimentation."

Then Guill turned his attention to his opponent and said: "Ben Guill will never call any man his political boss. I have heard that a political boss in Amarillo has hopes of electing his own private congressman in November by beating Ben Guill. If he wants to become boss of the Panhandle this individual will have to beat Ben Guill."

Guill was referring to a columnist in an Amarillo paper who claimed he heard Jay Taylor say he "hoped to get Walter Rogers elected in November." That same columnist was one of Mrs. Altavene Clark's staunchest backers.

Guill said he would discuss, at a later date, some of the things he did "off the floor" since taking his seat in Washington after the special May 6 election.

Today he starts his four-day trek over the Panhandle appearing before civic groups for speeches and holding question and answer periods after the talks.

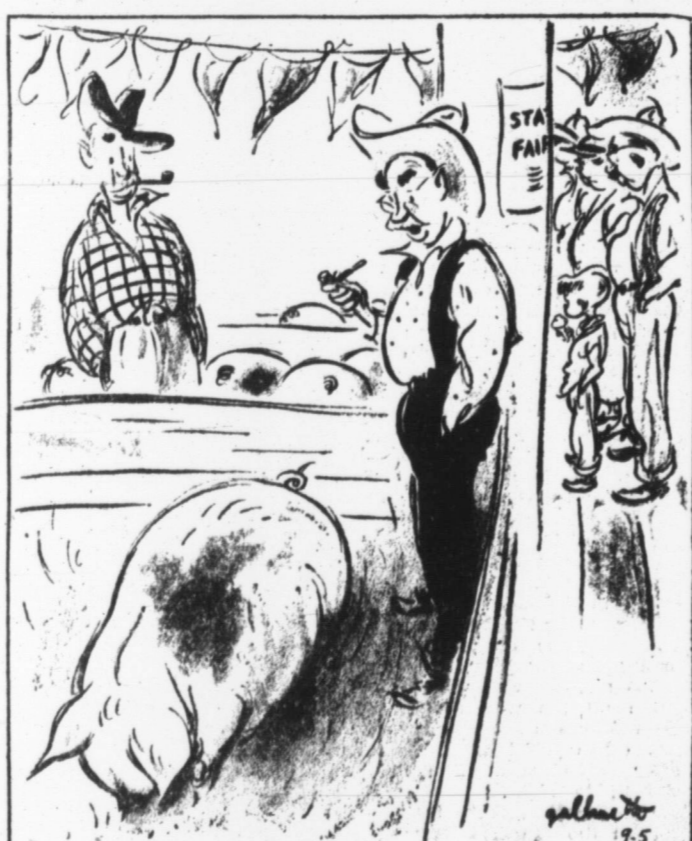
