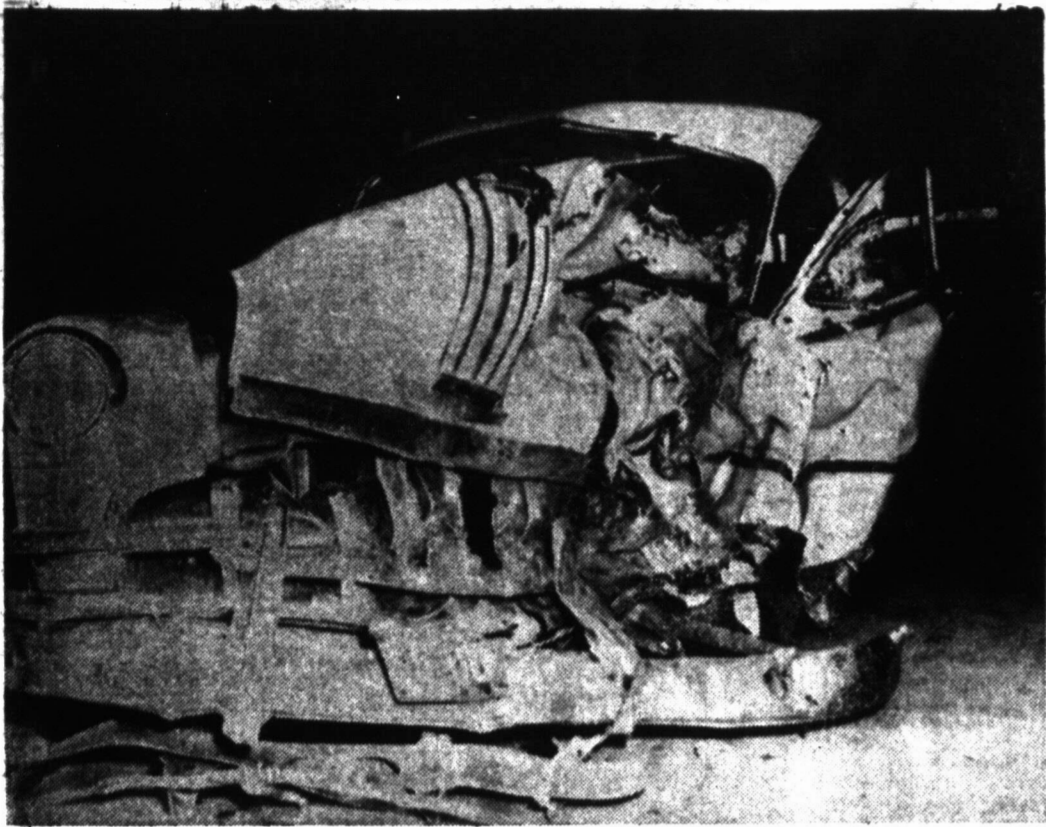

Tank-Led Korean Reds Crack Lines

Red Advance Is Greatest Gain in Weeks

TOKYO — (AP) — Two tank-led Red Korean columns cracked allied lines on the northeast war front today and forged down main highways in a power drive that threatened to outflank strategic Taegu.

The Reds broke through defenses south of Kigye in the Pohang sector. Advance spearheads rolled south 12 1/2 miles for the greatest Red gain in weeks.

Elsewhere on the 120-mile front, allied forces beat back fresh Communist attacks. An American counterthrust by Marines and doughboys ground out gains in the Reds' Nakdong River bulge west of Yongju.

Associated Press Correspondent Ben Price reported that Communist drive in the north-east smashed to the outskirts of Kyongju. This is a main highway center 16 miles southwest of the east coast port of Pohang.

Another Red column rammed nearly five miles into South Korean defenses on a wide southwestern drive toward Yongch'on. This town lies on a main road network midway between Kyongju and Taegu.

The breakthrough toward Kyongju represented the deepest penetration the Reds have made in the U. N. beachhead since it was erected in early August.

Heavy fighting raged all along the battlefield, a U. S. Eighth Army communique reported late Monday night.

Johnson Is Called Forrester Heckler

James Harrah, 22, Son of Prominent Residents, Dies

James Wesley Harrah, 22-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee M. Harrah, 605 N. Frost, died of polio at 3:5 a.m. today in Parkland Hospital, Dallas. He entered the hospital Thursday suffering from bulbar type polio.

The youth was born in Pampa, May 24, 1928, and attended Pampa schools. He was graduated from Pampa High School in 1946 and entered Southern Methodist University, Dallas, that same year. He completed his requirements for a degree in business and accounting in June of this year.

He had been employed by a Dallas accounting firm since his graduation.

Survivors include his parents; one sister, Joyce, Pampa; three uncles, Raymond Harrah and Malcolm Denson, Pampa, and Cecil Denson, Wheeler; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Denson, Amarillo.

Funeral arrangements by Duengel-Carmichael are pending the arrival of his family from Dallas.

Ship Carrying 300 Is Towed to Safety

SEATTLE — (AP) — A stricken excursion vessel and its 300 passengers were towed to safety today after breaking down in Puget Sound, 10 miles north of Seattle.

The vessel, the 120-ton Virginia V, was brought into Shilshole Bay at the entrance to the government locks approximately 12 hours after it issued its first call for aid.

Early reports had the veteran Puget Sound ship drifting and listing heavily. But Capt. James Henshaw, skipper of the Coast Guard cutter and tugboat Co. Tug 18, said only a slight list was apparent when his crew put a line aboard. The Virginia V's engines were not operating.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Criticism of Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson reached a new note of bitterness today with a congressman saying he understands Johnson helped heckle James Forrestal out of office.

Forrester, Johnson's predecessor as defense secretary, resigned in March, 1949, due to illness and an extreme nervous condition. Two months later Forrestal committed suicide.

Rep. Tauriello (D-N.Y.) made the assertions about responsibility for Forrestal's resignation in another letter to Johnson urging him to quit. There was no immediate comment from Johnson.

Tauriello's first bid a week ago for Johnson to step out brought a retort from Johnson that he had no intention of doing so.

The Buffalo congressman wrote in his latest letter that he had hoped Johnson would have the "humility and patriotism to strengthen your country by resigning" and said further:

"I am informed by reliable officials and newspaper correspondents that you contributed in no small way to the persecution of Mr. Forrestal. I understand you gathered and relayed gossip and information critical of Mr. Forrestal, and, in effect, forced his resignation."

Congressional critics of Johnson had previously censured their fire on his economy cutbacks and the condition of the armed forces at the outbreak of the Korean war.

But the claim that Johnson aided "persecution" of Forrestal and forced his resignation was without precedent.

Tauriello's letter also implied that only patriotism kept Gen. Omar Bradley from stepping out as chairman of the joint chiefs of staff due to attempts by Johnson "to dominate and dictate" to the military strategy planners.

Tauriello also charged Johnson with intrigue against the State department, causing confusion of hours and abroad. He said the stocking of critical war materials was hampered because of conflicts between Johnson and the national security resources board.

Before taking his present post Johnson was a national commander of the American Legion and an assistant secretary of war. When World War II began, Henry L. Stimson, a Republican, was named as new secretary of war instead of Johnson getting the job. Johnson then resumed private law practice but remained active in Democratic national politics.

Guill Opens Drive Tonight

Republican Congressman Ben Guill officially opens his campaign for re-election to the 18th District seat in Washington with a radio talk at 7 p.m. today over Radio Station KPND.

The talk will originate over KPND at 6:30, but will be fed direct to KGNC. At the same time it will be recorded and played back over KPND at 7 p.m.

Guill implied this morning his talk tonight would be political. He laughed and said: "I'm paying for this, so I guess I can get a little partisan, can't I?"

Sunday afternoon he made his last recorded talk from Washington — he recorded the talk in the nation's capitol several days before he was certain of coming home for 10 days.

Sunday afternoon's talk was a discussion of 13 points Guill said he considered important and should be adopted now.

As he called for universal military training; completion of a projected radar system; round-the-clock industrial mobilization; activation of a comprehensive civilian defense program; geared to atomic warfare; halt all "pork barrel" and handout legislation; passage of the Mundt-Nixon bill; resignation of Dean Acheson as secretary of state; resignation of Louis Johnson as secretary of defense; improve and bolster the intelligence organizations; mobilize all anti-Communists abroad; stop all trade — direct or indirect — with Russia and her satellites; give no more aid to countries that continue to coddle Communists; and stop coddling them here; and cessation of aid to countries contributing only "lip service" to the war effort "no troops, no aid."

Guill told his radio audience that the 13 points were not solely his "brainchild" but were a combination of thoughts of "well informed men" on both sides in the Senate and House.

Following his radio talk tonight he goes on an intensive four day trek over the Panhandle speaking and holding question and answer periods after each speech.

Guill is still in the dark as to whether he will be able to put on a full-time campaign for re-election in November until Congress definitely makes up its mind to adjourn. He declares he opposes adjournment because of the international situation.

U.S. Envoy Gets Marine Guard After Threats

SAIGON, Indochina — (AP) — Twelve American Marines today guarded U. S. Minister to Indochina Donald R. Heath following police reports that he is marked for assassination by Communists.

French authorities said the Vietnamese police had arrested a number of terrorists who had been ordered to prepare the plot against Heath's life. They were members of Moscow-trained Ho Chi Minh's Viet Minh guerrillas, the French said.

Minh's 55-year-old health minister to Bulgaria until that country's Communist regime ordered him out for alleged spying, has had two bodyguards from the French and Vietnamese police. The Marines arrived here last week.

Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery beside his wife, who died in January, 1936.

Palbearers will be Leonard H. Simpson, Dale Pinson, Clyde Jones, W. M. Voytes, W. E. Tove and G. G. Sheppard.

Pampan Participating in Gas Pipeline in Western Colorado

A Pampa man, J. W. Garman, is one of a group having plans to build a two 12 million dollar gas pipeline in western Colorado.

This was brought out today in the announcement that incorporation had been completed by General Petroleum of California, Public Service Co. of Colorado and M. B. and J. W. Garman. The new company is the Grand Valley Pipeline Co.

Grand Valley is planning a line from the Pinnacle gas fields in the northwest corner of Colorado to outlet 90 miles south in Grand Junction, Colo., and also to a proposed \$2,000,000 pulp mill in Rifle, Colo.

This is the first natural gas service in the western Colorado area in which Grand Junction is the principal city.

Contracts have been signed providing for sale of General Petroleum's natural gas in the Pinnacle Creek field to the new company and for sale of gas by Grand Valley to Public Service for retail distribution in Grand Junction and communities along the Colorado River.

The pipeline, according to present plans, will be approximately 97 miles of eight and ten-inch line. Construction is scheduled to begin next spring after Colorado snow melt and will be completed in the fall. Call for bids will not be issued until sometime early in 1951.

Geologists estimate present reserves of the Pinnacle field at 70 billion cubic feet.

Democrat Gridiron Plans Are Balked

NORMAN, Okla. — (AP) — The University of Oklahoma board of regents has chilled state Democrats' plans to peddle politics on radio broadcasts of university football games this fall.

The regents held a telephone conference yesterday, and Dr. George L. Cross, University president, said afterwards that "broadcasts of university activities under political sponsorship will not be permitted." The university must approve the sponsor.

Strike Outlook Muddled in GE Union Fuss

NEW YORK — (AP) — CIO workers neared tomorrow's strike deadline against the huge General Electric Company with nearly half their members holding back.

A series of last-minute balks in local unions yesterday threw an already confused situation into still greater turmoil.

Nearly 23,000 members of the CIO International Union of Electrical Workers struck last week against GE in New York and Massachusetts, showing some work on inflating jet engines and other war supplies.

Tomorrow's strike call, set last Friday by the union's GE conference board, was to pull out the remaining 47,000 IUE members to back up the fight for higher pay and pensions. Additional war production would be involved.

But local decisions yesterday will apparently keep about 25,000 of these still on their jobs pending local strike votes later in the week.

The 6,000-man local at Bridgeport, Conn., overruled its leaders and voted outright defiance of the international's strike call.

The muddled situation was further confused by the fact that the IUE represents only about one-third of General Electric's 180,000 employees. Of the rest, about 46,000 belong to the IUE's bitter rival, the left-wing independent United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America, and the remainder are either non-union or belong to smaller labor groups.

The IUE is demanding a 10-cent hourly wage boost and that the company pay all pension contributions in full, as well as grant improved holiday, vacation and other working benefits.

They were moved down in the tent where they were captured and bound behind them.

According to an Associated Press report, a Fort Worth man and two Taylor residents were injured in the accident, however, no further details are available.

The Panhandle women were enroute to Tennessee and Mississippi in a 1949 model Mercury. The party had detoured to Waco to visit a friend.

ALBANY, N.Y. — (AP) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey was expected to announce late today that he would accept the Republican nomination for a third four-year term as New York's chief executive.

The GOP ticket is to be named Thursday at the party's convention in Saratoga Springs.

Rearmament Plan Boosted

WASHINGTON (AP)—A long-range rearmament program to give the United States and her allies equal military strength with Russia drew mounting support among lawmakers today.

Several senators said in separate interviews they believe President Truman's call last week for an increase in the uniformed forces to a 3,900,000-man level is only the first step in a long effort to approach par with Russia in conventional arms.

Most of the lawmakers agreed that American superiority in atomic bombs may permit this nation to have fewer ground divisions than the Soviets, but the Korean fighting has demonstrated to them that the infantry still plays a major role in war.

Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the Senate foreign relations committee apparently summed up the views of many of his colleagues when he told a reporter: "I'm afraid we're going to have to stay armed for the rest of our lives."

Senator Hill (D-Ala.) said he regards the president's goal of 3,900,000 men under arms as only "the first step toward an overall objective."

"With our friends in Europe and elsewhere, we have got to build up military strength that is equal to that of Russia," Hill said. "I don't know how many divisions we have to have, but we must get and maintain superiority in firepower."

Senator Millikin of Colorado, chairman of the conference of all Republican senators, told a reporter it seems obvious the process of strengthening the American military position has only just begun.

"The Korean fighting has demonstrated that we didn't have the equipment or men necessary," he said. "I don't know how many divisions we need, but I think that we need more than we have and that we need more planes, tanks and guns."

Millikin said this build-up isn't going to be accomplished without some sacrifices on the part of Americans. He said sizeable additions to military appropriations, expected later in the year, are going to call for stiff tax boosts.

The Colorado senator said he thinks an estimate by Senator George (D-Ga.) that Congress will be asked to boost taxes by \$7,

On a port city 350 miles southwest of Tokyo, and nine neighboring prefectures bore the brunt of the storm. It struck with winds up to 123 miles an hour.

north of Taegu. They drove within 100 feet of the summit.

To the west, first cavalry foot troopers hammered back several Communist attacks including an attempt to cross the Nakdong River north of Waegwan.

First cavalry division officers told AP Correspondent Jack MacBeth they were confident of holding back the Reds in this vital sector, where the North Koreans have massed five divisions—nearly 50,000 troops.

In the southwest, American forces held their original positions after smashing back new Red attacks Monday morning west of Masan. The Reds are reported to have lost 12,000 troops in this sector in three days. American forces mopped up scattered bands of Communists far behind the front line.

"Teasing isn't going to do a bit of good." That's what parents say just before giving in. If teasing wouldn't do a bit of good, kids wouldn't ease so much.

"Well, we'll see about it!" actually means: "Run on and leave me alone." It usually works for a little while because it is one of the hardest adult answers a child ever comes up against. And he comes up against it constantly in his dealings with grown-ups.

PARENTS SAY ONE THING, MEAN ANOTHER

"Run along and play now" means "Get out of my way." Mama doesn't really care if Johnny plays or not, just so he gets out of sight and out of earshot.

"I'm surprised at you" always means that Johnny has been doing something he shouldn't. No parent ever admits being surprised by a child's being exceptionally good about anything.

"Please don't, darling" is a company manners substitution for "Stop that this instant or I'll..." but it's rarely as effective as the latter.

"All right — but be careful" is the way parents have of sniffling their responsibility for a child's safety into the laps of the gods. This is used when they give him permission to do something they know is dangerous.

Texas Yellow Pine Production Goes Up

HOUSTON — Actual production of Texas yellow pine showed a gain of 9.6 percent during the week of August 23 over the corresponding period in 1949 and shipments for the week showed an increase of 8.3 percent over the shipments during the week of August 12, 1950, according to a report of comparative samplings from twenty-three identical Texas mills.

"This increase in production represents the fourth consecutive week in which production of Texas yellow pine exceeded production of a year ago. Orders on hand at the end of the week

were down 2.8 percent from the previous week, but were 54.9 percent above the corresponding week in 1949," said Jim Ben Edens, president of the Texas Lumber Manufacturers Association.

Stocks on hand were 1.3 percent below the preceding week and 38.8 percent under the same period in 1949.

Horses pulled wagons of shocked oats to the thresher. However, the thresher, instead of being powered by a steam engine, was operated by a tractor.

Catholics Urged To Wage War On Communism

PASSAU, Germany — (AP) — Pope Pius XII called on the world's Roman Catholics yesterday to fight Communist doctrine in the same way the early Christians battled heathenism. In a message to German Catholics at their 74th annual congress, the pontiff called on the faithful everywhere to "build a dam" against the Red-propagated doctrine of dialectical materialism. Dialectical materialism is the critical examination of the logical consequences of the belief that life holds only material values. The papal message was read on the last day of the three-day congress attended by an estimated 120,000 German and Austrian Catholics. It was apparent that the pope's call to combat materialism was directed chiefly to the 4,000,000 Catholics in East Germany, as well as the many millions in the Iron curtain countries. In East Germany the church is involved in open controversy with the Communist-controlled government, which promotes materialism in the schools and youth organizations.

Six of 10 in Texas Pass Draft Exams

AUSTIN — (AP) — Six of every ten men are passing their draft examinations in Texas, while the national average shows six of every ten are failing them. The high rate of acceptance at Texas examining stations was reported by Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state selective service director. More than 5,500 of the more than 11,000 men examined since Aug. 7 have received certificates of acceptability, Wakefield said. Current examinations will continue through Sept. 15. "Our rejection rate has been declining gradually. Each day's reports have been pushing up our acceptable percentage point or two a day during the past week," Wakefield observed. He credited Texas local boards for "this good showing." One of the big jobs of a local board is to "screen out at home, insofar as possible, men who are unacceptable," the selective service director commented.

LA BAULE, France — (AP) — King Farouk's new female companion, a tall and slender American girl, doesn't want her name in the papers. "No, I would rather not say," she told newsmen asking her identity. They intercepted her last night on her way to join the king in the lobby of her hotel. Miss "X" showed up at this Breton coast resort from Paris three days ago, within a few hours of Farouk's arrival. Since then she has been almost constantly with the king. Though the king's retinue has kept her identity a secret, a member of the party said she definitely was not Mimi Medart, 17-year-old St. Louis girl whose name was coupled with Farouk's in Paris press reports. At Deauville, Mimi's mother, Mrs. William Medart, said earlier that none of her family had even met the king.

PASCAGOULA, Miss. — (AP) — The government plans another fish hunt in the Gulf of Mexico. Stewart Springer, engineer in charge of the U. S. fish and wildlife craft, the Oregon, said the vessel would put out from here Monday on the hunt. Purpose of the cruise will be to check for temperature changes that the hurricane might have caused in Gulf waters. The Oregon pulled ashore, during the storm, from its last trip where shrimp were scooped up at the rate of 125 pounds an hour from water 36 to 45 fathoms (215 to 170 feet) deep.

Air Force Solves Bombing Problem

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — One of the bugaboo of aerial warfare — how to drop a bomb accurately at jet-plane speeds — has been solved by the Air Force. North American Aviation Inc. disclosed that bombs weighing from 500 to 4,000 pounds were dropped successfully at altitudes up to 20,000 feet in tests with the four-jet B-45 bomber at Edwards Air Base, Murco, Calif. In World War II the peak bomb-run speed was 350 to 400 miles an hour. Wind turbulence around outward-opening bomb bay doors caused the bombs to tumble erratically when released at higher speeds. The B-45 overcomes the problem by sliding the doors upward inside the plane.

Fair Catch Rule To Put Kick Into Game, Coach Says

NORMAN — (AP) — Football's "fair catch" rule is out this year, and it's likely to put more of a kick into the game.

Bud Wilkinson, University of Oklahoma football coach, believes elimination of the rule will cause teams to use the punt as an offensive weapon.

"I know a lot of coaches are studying the change," the youthful coach of the year, said. "Maybe just one out of 10 will try to use it to their advantage. The others will be watching."

The fair catch rule allows a player to receive a punt without being tackled if he signals, but he cannot run with the ball.

"The possibility exists that a team will punt high, send men down to cover the receiver, and dare him to handle the ball," Wilkinson explained.

"There's every chance for a fumble. It's pretty rough on a receiver to handle the ball properly when he has four or five big linemen waiting for him to catch it."

Wilkinson feels a team which had been putting out of bounds may change its tactics because of the elimination of the rule.

Dawson fanned and Woldt was passed, then stole second. Jeandron singled, scoring Hyde and Woldt. Roy Parker drew a base on balls. Joe Fortin's single plated Jeandron and Parker came home when Barta, backing up home, overthrew in an attempt to catch Fortin at second.

Pampa pushed across two more in the sixth as Matney opened the frame with a golf single to left-center. Martin then singled through the infield and Matney went to second. Hyde's attempted sacrifice batted, Matney being tossed out at third. Dawson strolled to load the bases and Woldt singled home Matney.

Jeandron's fly to left scored Martin and Parker popped to short to end the inning.

Jeandron, with a home run and three singles, paced the Oiler stick department. Manager Howard banged three doubles for Amarillo.

Chips Were Down For Ram Coach, Football Players

SAN ANTONIO — (AP) — Now it can be told why the Los Angeles Rams poured it on the Baltimore Colts so viciously in their National Football League exhibition game here.

The score was 70-21 and it would have been 75-21 if a touchdown on the last play of the game hadn't been nullified by a penalty.

Coach Joe Stydahar of the Rams, in discussing a possible return to San Antonio next year, revealed that his job hung in the balance Saturday night as he sent his Rams out to play the Colts.

"One of the Rams owners, Edwin Pauley, flew into San Antonio Friday night and informed me that myself and the whole coaching staff would have to pay if we didn't win. It was win or else."

So Stydahar shook up the team that had lost two of three exhibitions, including an unmerciful 49-14 beating by the Philadelphia Eagles, defending National Football League champions. He had eight new faces in the starting lineup.

The Colts scored early in the first period but that was all the glory they got. The rest of the night the Rams were running over them like a combine in a field of wheat.

Coach Joe had imparted an ultimatum to his players. He said if they didn't produce "there wouldn't necessarily be another shake-up but that a bunch of them would be departing for other fields of endeavor. He apparently also got the idea over that he would be with the departees.

So the Rams, who were Western Division champions last year, losing to Philadelphia 14-0 in the play-off, did everything except eat the football. They roared in 614 yards rushing and passing and scored more touchdowns than they did in their entire first season in the league.

Bill Bellamy, director of the Express-News athletic association which sponsored the game, said officials of the Rams were eager to return to San Antonio even when he told them they would insist on a much stronger opponent.

Kiner Raps Out 2 Home Runs As Bucs Pluck Cards, 12-11

Ralph Kiner's uphill battle to equal baseball's most coveted slugging record — Babe Ruth's sensational 60-home run season — is keeping the interest of Pittsburgh fans alive.

Despite the Pirates' dismal last place standing, the turnouts are clicking away at a merry million plus pace.

The 70 home games thus far have attracted 1,113,342 cash customers, tops for any club in the National League. Very few Pittsburgh fans make their exits during any game until they are certain Kiner has made his last appearance at the plate.

Unless a miracle occurs and Kiner is beaten out of the championship, this year will mark the fifth straight time that the Pirates outfielder hit won or tied for the home run crown. Appropriately, this is the fifth straight year that Pittsburgh has drawn better than a million fans to its games.

A crowd of 12,758 got its monotonous fix on Kiner when he saw Kiner clout two homers in Pittsburgh's 12-11 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals. They were his 41st and 42nd of the season.

Kiner now is one home run behind Ruth's pace of 1927. The Babe used his 127th game as his 43rd home run. He made his 44th in his 128th game. A pair of homers by Kiner today would tie him with Ruth's pace.

Kiner already has bettered one mark. With 54 homers last year, Ralph now has hit 98 four-baggers in two successive seasons. That beats the National League

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New Car Orders Level Off After Scare Buying Drops

By DAVID J. WILLKIE
DETROIT (AP) Things change quickly in the car industry. If you question this, note what has happened in the last two months. The frenzied rush to place new car orders has subsided. Used car prices, near the year's top three weeks ago, have leveled off sharply.

Used car dealers have large stocks on hand and new car dealers no longer insist of a trade-in with each new car purchase.

All this fairly well shows how fast things can happen in the business. But it doesn't mean multi-billion dollar automobile

business. But it doesn't mean new car sales are falling off. Many thousands of the orders that were placed with the outbreak of the Korean war weren't real; how many of them were duplications can only be guessed at but they were many.

Orders remaining on the new car dealers' books still call for more vehicles than are immediately available. For most companies that situation will continue through much of the remainder of the year.

Apparently what happened to halt the deluge of new car orders was that many would-be buyers concluded a stoppage of car output wasn't likely for some months to come. Probably the realization that there would be no new models despite the war situation also had something to do with easing off.

The first of the industry's 1951 model automobiles began moving from the assembly lines in increasing volume this week. Kaiser-Frazer stepped up its output of the new units. Packard returned to production after a two-weeks' strike shutdown and Nash increased assemblies of its newest offerings.

Hudson is completing its switch-over to new models and should have them ready for public introduction early next month.

The new Studebakers will be next among the 1951 models of the so-called "independent" car makers to go into production, although no date yet has been announced. That will leave all the "big three" of General Motors, Ford and Chrysler still to swing into new model production.

Best guesses are that some of their new units will not reach the assembly lines until January.

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Unusually Warm September Is 30-Day Forecast

WASHINGTON (AP) — The weather bureau predicts warmer-than-usual temperatures for most of the nation during September. Rain is expected to be plentiful in the East, scanty in the West.

The text of the bureau's 30-day forecast:

"The weather bureau's 30-day outlook for September calls for temperatures to average above the seasonal normal west of the Continental Divide and east of the Appalachians, with greatest departures over the Southwest and in New England. In central portions of the country temperatures are expected to average not far from the seasonal normals.

"Subnormal precipitation is indicated over most of the western half of the country but abundant rainfall is forecast for the East.

"On the whole, several spells of warm humid weather are anticipated east of the Mississippi."

RANGOON, Burma (AP) — The American embassy announced Saturday the safe arrival here of two American commercial pilots who had been held prisoner by Chinese Communists for eight and a half months in Kunning.

They are Francis J. McGowan of Roselle, N. J., and Darrell D. Carden of Cleburne, Texas. The embassy said the Chinese Reds were in possession of the Kunning airfield when the pilots landed a plane — chartered for evacuation of refugees — early this year.

The embassy statement said the men will leave by plane for Bangkok Tuesday en route to Manila and reunion with their families.
