Reactivation Group Gets No Committals

WASHINGTON — (Special) — The three-man Pampa delegation, here to obtain reactivation of Pampa Air Force Base, received no definite committals from government agencies, but secured a healthy recommendation from a former PAAF commander.

The group, comprised of City Manager Dick Pepin, Chamber of Commerce president, G. S. Vineyard and chamber manager, E. O. Wedgeworth, accidentally ran into Col. Daniel S. "Danny" Campbell of the Air Force's training command at the Pentagon Building, Campbell, who was first project officer and later first commanding officer of the old Pampa Army Air Field (now Pampa Air Force Base) gave the group a letter of recommendation.

While here the group also conferred with Gen. McNaughton who apparently highly pleased with their efforts.

Today the trio are at Scott Field speaking to General Hayes in an interview arranged by Sen. Lyndon Johnson, whom they spoke to earlier this week.

Grim Ordered To Face Trial

NORMAN, Okla. — (AP) — State Senator Orval Grim and two other Oklahoma men were ordered yesterday to face forgery charges in Texas in connection with a will forgery.

The three — Grim, L. B. Thomas, and L. L. Padgett, both of Ellis County — immediately petitioned the district court here for a writ of habeas corpus.

Leon Shipp, attorney for Gov. Roy J. Turner, ruled earlier yesterday after a hearing that the three must stand trial in Texas.

Grim, Padgett and Thomas were among eight persons charged with forgery in the finding of a second will by the late Mrs. Mattie A. Sebitt, pioneer Lipscomb County, Texas, woman here.

Mrs. Sebitt died in September, 1940. A will filed for probate left her estate to her husband, M. L. Sebitt, with the exception of \$5 grants to two brothers.

The second will left the entire estate, with the exception of the two \$5 grants, to a nephew, Vivian Guinrie, Edgewood, Ill.

Phone Rate Up 20 Percent If Dials Promised

A citizens committee subcommittee Wednesday provisionally recommended a 20 percent phone rate increase for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. here.

The subcommittee agreed to recommend a 20 percent rate increase to the general citizen committee. However, the increase was recommended contingent upon the company's going ahead with installation of a dial system here.

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas Rangers arrested and questioned Mickey Cohen on reports he was coming here to set up a "gambling and racketeering empire."

"After the questioning, he apparently decided the Texas atmosphere was not good for him," Garrison said.

"There is no question of his rights as a private citizen being violated. We were acting on definite information that he was planning to come to Texas and set up a gambling and racketeering empire. We didn't want that," Garrison said today.

49 Feared Dead in Cairo Plane Crash

CAIRO — (AP) — A Trans-World Airlines Constellation plane carrying 55 persons, including 23 Americans, crashed and burned today north of Cairo, and local Egyptian officials said at least 49 persons died.

A spokesman for the governor general of Behara province, where the crash occurred, said he knew of no survivors, however.

Five of the crew of seven aboard the plane, bound from Bombay, India, to Rome, were French. Eighteen of the 48 passengers were Americans, and the remainder represented 11 other nationalities.

Another passenger was the Egyptian movie star Lilliane Cohen, whose screen name is Camelia. She is known as "The L.A. Turner of the Middle East."

The Americans listed aboard included Aubrey William Schofield, 52, a native of San Antonio, who has been living in New York; he has been manager of the Eastern hemisphere foreign production division of the Gulf Oil Co. Recently he has been filling in as manager of the Kuwait Oil Co.

Another American was listed as William C. Gist, son of Justice Evrin Gist of Lake City, Iowa. The senior Gist is administration services and transportation officer at the U. S. Embassy in Cairo.

Hereford Breeders Complete First Leg of Panhandle Tour

An estimated 160 persons, including Hereford breeders, men, newspaper and magazine representatives, attended the first half of the Top of Texas Hereford Breeders tour Wednesday.

The tour began at the Combes Worley Ranch, southeast of Pampa at 8 a. m. and covered about 200 miles over Panhandle highways. Seven stops were made, including those at the Combes Worley Ranch, C. M. Carpenter north of Hereford, H. S. Roush 18 miles southeast of McLean, Tommie Potts one mile south of Hedley in Donley County where barbecue was served to the visitors.

At each stop J. P. Smith, of Panhandle, gave a brief explanation concerning the breeders, the giving names of sires and the number of calves sired by them.

Red Forces Throwing Prongs Into South

Two Divisions Driving as New Offensive Is Opened

TOKYO — (AP) — The Korean Reds threw a major two-division assault against the U. S. 25th Division in extreme South Korea today.

There were fragmentary reports that the Reds also were heavily attacking the U. S. Second Division farther north along the Nakdong River.

AP Correspondent Stan Swinton reported from the southern front west of Masan that the North Korean invaders struck before dawn at 15 points after a heavy preparatory barrage.

Fighting was raging today all along that front in what might be the start of a new general Red offensive, Swinton reported.

The new Communist onslaught, which had been long expected but had been delayed, followed stalling of Red efforts to crack the United Nations defense lines on the northern and eastern fronts.

The enemy had tried for two days to crack through to Pohang along the east coast road but General MacArthur's post-midnight summary said they had been driven back within 500 yards of their starting point, about four miles north of Pohang.

They moved from the three to four miles north of the city beyond the spot where an enemy road block Thursday had made it impassable.

The Reds had missed their target deadline last night in driving the United Nations forces out of Korea. It was set by Red Premier Kim Il Sung, Deep on the south coast at the other end of the 120-mile long battle line, South Korean marines reported the capture of large amounts of enemy material and the killing of 800 Reds in two weeks.

The Pohang action highlighted the Thursday activities on the war front.

Allied planes continued to hammer targets with a fury that gradually was eliminating Communist rolling stock, industrial plants, ammunition dumps and material stockpiles.

The North Koreans were reported losing 1,000 men a day in the drive on Pohang mounted by 25,000 men.

The Air Force estimated it killed 1,200 North Koreans in strafing and bombing attacks on the frontlines at Pohang. Seven hundred Red dead were counted in one sector and 500 more in another.

Warships and tank guns added heavily to the enemy losses during Thursday, when the North Korean drive gained only about four blocks on the outskirts of the city, southeast Korea port.

Along other fronts of the box-shaped defense perimeter, there were these developments: At Changnyong, 23 miles south-west of Taegu, the U. S. 2nd infantry division repulsed enemy attempts to cross the Nakdong River.

Military Aid Bill Expected To Be Okayed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A \$4,000,000,000 foreign military aid program, mainly for Western Europe, appears ticketed for early Senate appropriations committee approval.

That was indicated after Secretary of State Acheson and Secretary of Defense Johnson told the committee yesterday that a "forced-draft effort" is needed to rearm U. S. allies against the threat of Communist aggression.

The hearing concerned the foreign aid portion of the now nearly \$16,500,000,000 supplemental defense-military aid bill asked by President Truman.

Johnson told the committee in a statement made publicly after the session that the \$4,000,000,000 of Mr. Truman will be used for "tanks, artillery and modern aircraft to withstand a mechanized assault." Just how the weapons are to be distributed was not disclosed.

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WASHINGTON — (AP) — American officials said today there is some evidence that the Russian zone of Germany is planning an air paratrooper assault.

The East zone Communist government, with Russian help, already has established a force of about 50,000 trained infantry troops and a growing naval police.

The aerial "Luftpolizei" reportedly is still only on the drawing board. Whether any German have been flying yet is something U. S. intelligence officers have not been able to confirm.

The American officers said they have been expecting the Russian zone government to begin its "Luftpolizei" almost any day.

Some of the reports are reported to be coming from a Soviet zone field news, which in blind faith require aerial spotters to give them direction.

East German Air Arm Seen

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WASHINGTON — (AP) — Louis Johnson says that from now on anyone who wants him to resign as secretary of defense should take his complaints to President Truman.

And that goes for critics of Secretary of State Acheson as well, Johnson told a congressman who had urged him to step out.

Johnson, who has been expected to resign, told a group of reporters in the Capitol that he had received a letter from a group of writers and editors who urged him to resign.

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Shivers Says Rogers Victor

AUSTIN — (AP) — Gov. Allan Shivers thinks Democrat Walter Rogers will defeat Rep. Ben Guill, Republican, with ease in the November general election.

Shivers says that Guill won in a special election which saw the Democratic vote split among nine candidates. Both men are from Pampa.

"I don't know of any part of Texas where a Democratic nominee will face a tough Republican opponent," Shivers said at his press conference.

He thought Rogers would win by "a very comfortable vote," and described the Democratic nominee as "a very able man."

Two Rail Accidents Hit Central Texas; No Deaths Involved

LAMPASAS — (AP) — At least 15 persons were injured in two train wrecks about 100 miles apart in central Texas early today.

A Santa Fe passenger train left the rails in pre-dawn darkness near here. At least 11 were hurt, none seriously.

Near Teague, about 100 miles northeast of Lampasas, four men were injured as 47 cars of a fast Rock Island freight derailed.

About 40 persons were aboard passenger train. A Santa Fe spokesman said "we were awfully lucky no one was killed or critically hurt."

The injured in the freight train wreck were reported to be an engineer, fireman and brakeman, and a porter.

The wreck of the Santa Fe passenger train tore up a long stretch of track.

The disassembled train, making its way from Houston, derailed in rolling country about 12 miles west of this central Texas town about 3 a. m. (CST).

Eleven injured were hospitalized. Several received only first aid treatment.

A Santa Fe spokesman said the train No. 76 due in Houston at 7:14 a. m. (CST), was "making a reasonable rate of speed" at the time of derailment.

Gen. Wainwright Given Big Check

SAN ANTONIO — (AP) — General Jonathan Wainwright, a World War II hero, was today given a \$100,000 check for his services during the war.

The check is the highest honor given to a living general. It is given to him by the War Department as a recognition of his services during the war.

Wainwright was a member of the Congressional Medal of Honor.

DETROIT — (AP) — The auto industry's factory sales from Jan. 1 through July 31 this year totaled 4,156,985 new units.

to 629 new phones per year to the 182 annual installations prior to World War II. This expansion was cost the company \$705,411 during the post-war years, he said. Thomas added that 400 families are now on the waiting list for phone service.

"To meet Pampa's needs fully and at the same time provide for future growth and expansion of the telephone company, progress a new \$2,122,500 dial telephone system for Pampa," Thomas declared.

"To bring the system here, the company would have to install a 'tailor-made system' just for Pampa, the district manager said. The telephone company would call for construction of a new building, manufacture and installation of a completely new dial system, 'tailor-made' to meet present needs and allow for future growth; equip all telephones in Pampa with the new system.

The phone company's original proposal for a hike in rates was rejected by the company's claim of \$400,000 cost against an income of \$224,867 — a loss of \$175,133.

Thomas told the non-committee in an amendment of two million to the original plan, but was not justifiably without rates that would permit a fair return and profit to the company.

Cairo and Alexandria, the line reported.

Investigators were dispatched to the scene at once, by the airline and the civil aviation department. The Civil Aeronautics Bureau in Washington also dispatched two investigators to the scene.

The loss of 55 lives would make the crash one of the most disastrous in world commercial aviation history. The heaviest death toll in American commercial aviation was exacted last June 21, when 58 persons died in a Northwest Airlines plane crash in Lake Michigan. The heaviest toll in commercial airline history was March 12 of this year, when 80 persons died in the crash of a British transport near Cardiff, Wales.

changed hands eight times in two weeks, was quiet.

North of Taegu 20,000 North Koreans were stalled in a drive on that central front railroad. South Korean troops held firm before concerted enemy thrusts.

On the other hand the building of United Nations manpower increased slowly. A small Australian infantry contingent was flown into Japan on its way to Korea Thursday. British troops, who arrived Tuesday, moved toward the frontlines.

Units from Thailand and the Philippines were expected in Korea shortly and others from France and Belgium were promised soon.

General MacArthur's headquarters officers were frankly puzzled by the sudden lull in the fighting around bloody Pohang and other points.

A companion drive from the north was bogged at Kigye, nine miles away from Pohang. In hours of bitter fighting the Communists had not gained at Kigye.

The South Korean capital division weathered a smashing artillery attack to stave off a northwestern approach. They still held the hills outside of Kigye, which control the roads to Taegu, prize city to the west along the 120-mile-long battlefront.

The battle was so close and so bitter that an advance of a few yards, gained behind constant strafing planes, was a margin in favor of the advancing infantrymen.

The magnificent stand of the South Koreans was particularly gallant to the Reds.

Fighting flared at three other points along the nearly squared perimeter in southeastern Korea. American troops swept forward from defense positions at Waegwan and Changnyong, northwest and southwest of Taegu, in the heart of the fighting country.

On the southern coast ridges they smashed ahead.

Only in the Waegwan fighting did the Americans falter. There, AF correspondent Don Huth reported, they stalled after smashing up a steep hill.

The U. S. 8th army assessed the whole war situation as sound. But it did express concern over the Pohang battle, which could loose heavy Red forces against Taegu or Pusan, the principal southeastern seaport 65 miles below the east coast city.

the expanded forces to employ this equipment."

Acheson told the committee in a separate statement: "The great hope of peace in the present situation lies in the creation of a position of strength in these nations sufficient to deter Communist aggression."

"The capabilities of the Communist movement for further acts of aggression must be measured not by which we judge the adequacy of our defense strength. By this measure, it is evident that a forced-draft effort on a very large scale is required."

While the battlefields roared, the Peiping Communist radio once more accused America of sending planes on bombing raids into Manchuria. The charge was denied emphatically by the U. S. Air Force.

AP correspondent Tom Lambert reported a new concentration of North Koreans had been sighted in the Kigye area. This may be the Red 15th division which was sulking around the battle area Tuesday.

The Reds are supposed to have 40,000 men massed in the Uihung area.

MasArthur's late Wednesday war summary said the South Korean 8th division weathered a heavy attack from these Red troops. The summary said the South Koreans pulled back a mile before the Red assault.

Five Red divisions were reported massed between Waegwan and Uihung. Both cities are north and west of Taegu a short distance.

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**German Youth Has Place in U.S. Now**

NEWARK, N. J. — (AP) — A youth who soldiered for Hitler in World War II has realized his "two wildest hopes" — to be an American citizen and to serve Uncle Sam's Air Force. Karlhenz Waldman, 23, was rushed from a German officer candidate school to the front lines on the Rhine when he was just 18 years old. But during seven weeks as a prisoner of war in the United States he became impressed with the American way of life.

Back in Germany, he wrote to an uncle, Joseph Mohler of Belleville, N. J., and asked to live with him. His final citizenship papers were granted July 7. And finally he was sworn into the Air Force "with the opportunity to become a pilot — my boyhood dream."

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# Chinese Reds Say U. S. Raid Crosses Line

LONDON — (AP) — The Chinese Communists accused the U. S. of violating China's borders.

A broadcast by the New China news agency, the Peiping government's official organ, charged that American fighter planes killed five persons and wounded five others on Chinese territory, near the China-Korea border.

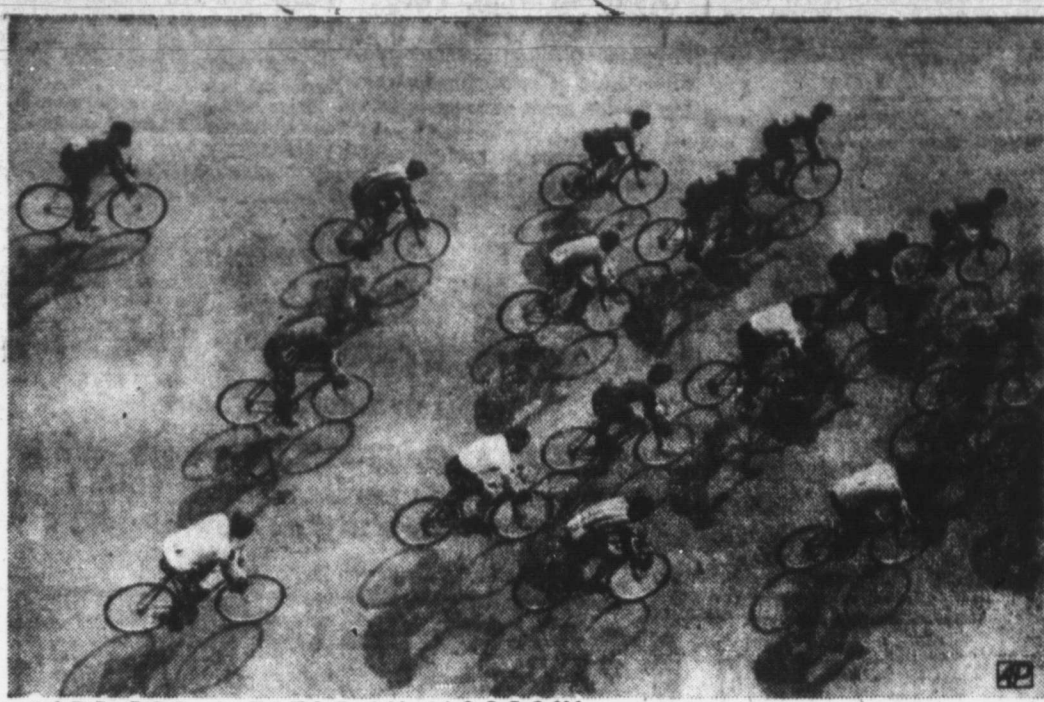
The broadcast said Red China's Foreign Minister Chou En-Lai had telegraphed his complaint to Jakob Malik, Russia's United Nations delegate and this month's president of the security council.

Chou, the agency said, demanded that the council "take effective measures immediately in checking American aggressive forces in Korea from extending their aggression and to effect the immediate withdrawal of U. S. forces invading Korea."

The Chinese Communists on Sunday registered their first complaint that U. S. planes had bombed Manchuria. The U. S. vigorously denied that charge.

In Tokyo a U. S. Air Force spokesman said no American planes have gone north of Korea's boundaries.

"We do not plan to comment on each such report," the spokesman added.

Pierce radioed the Philadelphia airfield and fire engines, police cars and a rescue squad were on hand for his arrival.

Pierce brought the plane in smoothly, throwing the propellers into reverse to bring the airliner to a stop.

# Many Soldiers Facing Test That Should Happen but Once

WITH U.S. 27th REGIMENT, KOREA — (AP) — Combat is a cruel test of endurance, courage, and sanity which no man should be called on to endure more than once in his lifetime — and even that is too much. But many veterans of World War II are facing the test again in Korea.

Most of them went into the last war as youths. Somewhere between Pearl Harbor and the end of the war they lost that youth. They were young-old men.

When peace came they found they had learned a trade that had no market at home. And so they stayed in the Army.

These are the men who form the real backbone of the American army fighting to hold off the North Korean Reds.

As examples there are Capt. Earl W. Buchanan of Newport, Vt. and Maj. Harry K. Hauge of Lexington, Ky.

Buchanan is a lean, thin-faced man. He fought with the 45th infantry division in Sicily, through the mountains of Italy and across Southern France.

Then one day at Strasbourg a piece of shrapnel slapped him on the head. He woke up to find himself a prisoner.

The Germans took Buchanan into Russia to a prison camp and then into Poland. He escaped from prison just before storm troopers forced one group of Americans to make a winter march. It was a march of death for many of them.

Harry Hauge is more ruggedly built. But in his face there is the same taut, drawn look of the fighting man. Hauge was known throughout as a half-back for the University of Kentucky football team.

In '41 he joined the Army and it sent him to Europe to the 78th Division. After the war, Hauge believed that he had done all the fighting that was needed. He looked forward to a comfortable peacetime life with the Army.

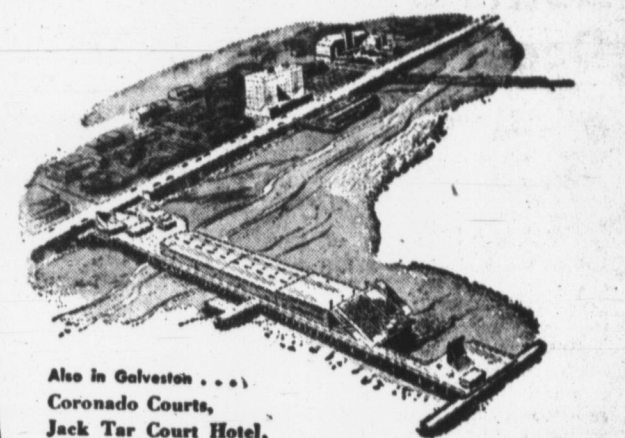

### Battle Divides Living and Dead; Crosses Honor Fallen

AN AMERICAN CEMETERY IN KOREA — (AP) — Battle divides the quick and the dead. It divides the living — into two classes, those whose flesh or mind remain intact under the hammer of combat and those whose mentality or muscles are so interrupted by fear, fatigue or metal objects they can no longer function as a whole person.

Those who remain alive are hampered by the fact that if they are too afraid, too tired or too wounded they must summarily be removed because they have lost self confidence or the men who follow or accompany them into danger no longer have confidence in them. This situation is a terrible ordeal to combat-minded men who in their hearts would choose to die rather than forsake their buddies — or have the mistaken feeling that they did forsake them.

Their emotion is the tragedy that men taken from the battlefront often feel — the feeling they had more to give and didn't give it or weren't allowed to give it.

The dead have no such feeling as far as we know. They have gone all the way, made all the sacrifices they could. And none has come back to complain or say what he did wasn't worthwhile.

Somewhere near Taegu the other day they had a brief ceremony to honor some of these dead American men. It was just a touch of reverence for the memory of some 217 men buried in a temporary military cemetery of the First Cavalry Division.

They just put plain white wooden crosses on their graves. The cemetery had been a democratic testament of the unification of the armed forces. In the utter hospitality of the unliving, all branches of the separate services — sea, land and air — shared adjoining final foxholes.

They were dug by 25 Korean laborers and marked only by wedge-shaped boards of wood driven into the earth.

One day Lt. Col. Leo Gilbert of San Antonio, commander of a military police battalion, drove by with Capt. Emmett W. Fox of Chicago, Ill. They thought that the graves should carry more significant markers even though the cemetery was an emergency tomb of the American dead.

Sgt. Robert Griffin of Fall River and Boston, Mass., undertook the assignment of making the crosses.

"He was proud to do it," said Gilbert. "He got the wood from Air Force boxes and he scrounged the white paint from the Lord knows where — but he found it."

Dewey B. Swords of Augusta, Ga., head of the graves registration unit, knelt and pulled out a wedge-shaped marker and hammered a gleaming white cross into the fresh softly turned mound.

Sweat beads broke out on his forehead under the fierce hot sun. The native gravediggers looked on curiously, glad for a lull in their labor, and some Korean children waited respectfully to ambush the living Americans for candy and chewing gum.

In the presence of the dead there is an urgency to justify being alive. So everyone began to mention the chores and responsibility of living.

And the smell of death hurt the noses and the consciences of everybody. They had the feeling they had to use their breath to explain their hopes and why they still had breath. It hurt them all and nobody wanted to mention what was underneath the mounds. It was unnecessary to do so.

Gilbert looked at a small American flag flying from a roughly lashed double length of bark-trimmed tree trunk and said: "We will build you a better flagpole."

"Well, it is crude but it will do," said Sergeant Swords.

I never saw anyone in my life who was more heartbroken than Sergeant Swords was the day they brought in our soldiers who had been shot to death with their hands tied behind them," said one of his men. "He cried."

And then we left and the native workmen began digging fresh nests of glory for dead soldiers who would live there only a little while — and live a longer time in distant hearts and a distant land they once knew.

### Man Joins Marines To Replace Brother

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Ernest L. Craven, 22, of Williamsport Pa., employed a technicality to enlist in the Marine Corps so that he might take the place of a brother killed in Korea.

Craven, father of two children, learned of the death of his brother, Chester, 20, in a Korean fox hole, and immediately tried to enlist in the Marines. But the Marines wouldn't take him. He was turned down because of his dependents.

So Craven enlisted in the Marine reserves and was assigned to extended active duty. Because of a recently invoked policy, married men with dependents may enlist in the Marine Corps reserve and be assigned to active duty.

Craven is the first married Marine enlistee under the new policy. He will be sent to Paris Island for boot training.

His brother, attached to the Seventh Cavalry, arrived in Korea July 22. According to a letter received by Ernest, Chester was one of six men in a foxhole when the unit was ordered to withdraw.

The letter stated that Chester failed to hear the order and stayed in the hole after the others left. They had barely evacuated the hole when a grenade dropped into it, exploded, and killed the lone occupant.

### Commiss Declares Hospital Bombed

TOKYO — (AP) — A Red Korean broadcast from Pyongyang made the unconfirmed charge that American bombers hit a field hospital. The broadcast said a note of protest has been sent to the United Nations.

The broadcast, monitored in Tokyo, said three bombers caused "numerous casualties" at a field hospital at Chungwa, south of the Red capital city of Pyongyang.

The note of protest to the United Nations was dispatched by Paik Hyun Yong, the broadcast added.

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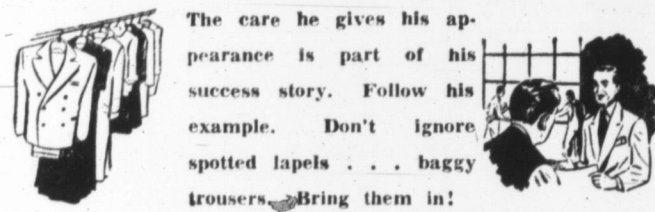

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## Value of Dollar Going Down Again As Prices See Advance

By SAM DAWSON  
NEW YORK — (AP) — The value of your dollar is going down again. Some think a floor will soon be put under it by increased production of the foods and goods you want to buy. Others think inflation is going to get much worse before it gets better.

The drop in the value of the dollar is just another way of saying that the cost of living has jumped sharply since the outbreak of the Korean war, starting on its tenth week.

Most observers see no way for prices in general to go for the rest of this year but up. However, a few government officials think the big jump has already taken place, and that while some things, like rent and house furnishings, may continue to climb, others particular-

ly meat, are due to drop. Scare buying has played the villain's role so far. The greatest damage wasn't done by the hoarders who flocked to retail stores, but by the merchants, wholesalers and manufacturers who flooded the primary sources of commodities with anticipatory orders.

The bureau of labor statistics finds the cost of living went up three percent between April and July 15. But BLS Commissioner Ewan Clague says living costs "pretty definitely are leveling off."

However, here are some of the finished products on which price hikes have been announced (not by all producers nor in all cities) during August. Each adds a little to the cost of living since the period covered by the BLS report.

Cigarettes, tires, shoes, fuel

staple, bandages, paint, typewriters, washing machines, rotary irons, baking equipment, coffee brewers; Carpets, pencils, writing paper, television and radio sets, heavy underwear, cotton piece goods, woolen goods, and movie film. And here are some of the primary commodities on which prices have gone up in August: industrial alcohol, tin, rubber, steel scrap, lead, platinum, copper and brass products, cellophane, soda ash, rayon yarn, sugar and some iron and steel products.

The Associated Press index of 35 commodities reveals how much some of these price hikes, were at wholesale, comparing Aug. 25 when the Reds marched on Korea.

Hogs, highest since October, 1948, are up \$5 a hundredweight from June 25. But lambs bring less now than then. Corn is 3 cents a bushel higher, and wheat is up 10 cents. But oats brings 12 cents a bushel less and rye is off 2 1-8 cents.

It's not a defense measure. Dr. Charles R. Pierce is a spare time botanist and he worked eight years developing his cucumber. White instead of green, it is sweeter and milder than standard types.

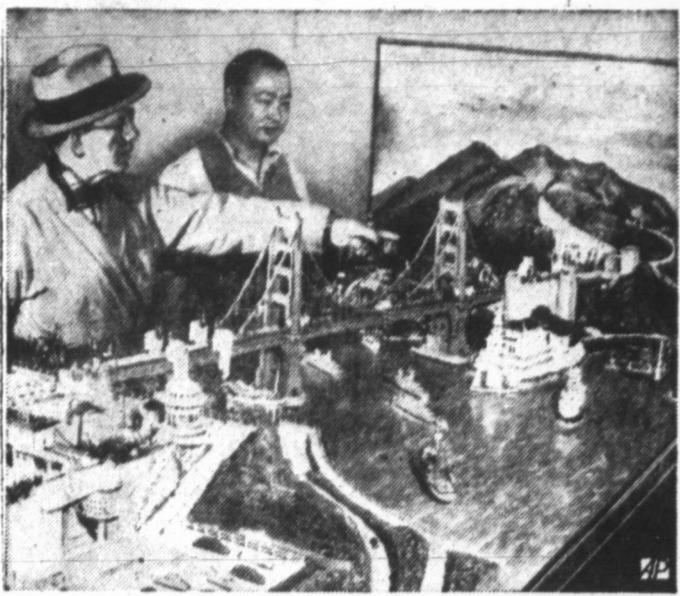

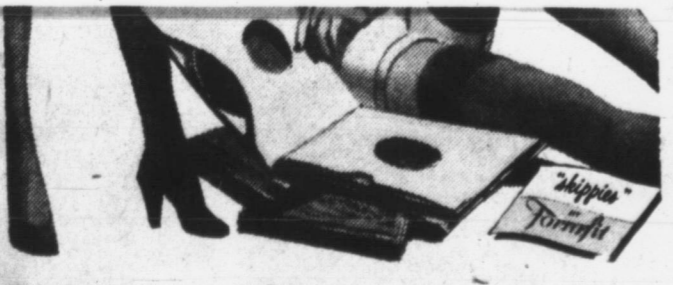

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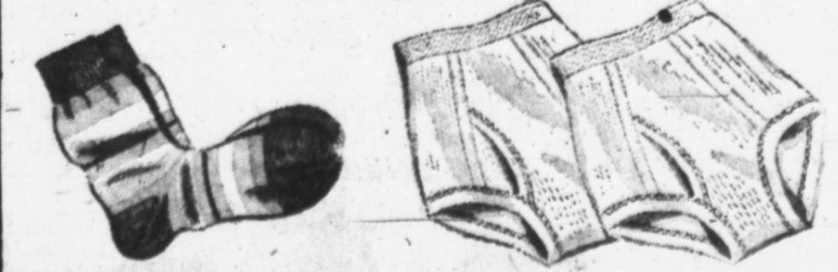

# Korean Children Capturing Hearts of American Troops

KOREA — (AP) — The American Army here is being captured — almost against its will — by a younger and more numerous force.

It is slowly becoming the prisoner of the children of Korea. In every country in which the GI has fought he usually makes fast friends of the kids first. To them he is a military Croesus with endless stores of chewing gum, chocolate bars and candy mint.

It wasn't altogether generosity on the part of the GI, although he is notoriously sothearted to children. But he learned quickly that through the kids he could win his way into favor with their families — generally families with pretty daughters.

And before long GI Joe was a one-man post exchange. He gave his girl a tin of bubble gum, a tin of bubble soap and a tin of bubble gum. And all he had left to give the pretty daughter was a chocolate bar and conversation. However, this often seemed to be a factory. The happy system of introduction was so well understood in London that when a small boy called "got any gum, chum?" the soldier "got back, got a sister, mister?"

But the formula hasn't gone so far in Korea. Few have found either temporary or permanent girl friends and most have taken no part in the life of the country.

The frank truth is that most Yanks came here to do a disagreeable duty that has taken them longer than they hoped and they want to leave as soon as it is done. There are fewer comforts in Korea than in Japan and life generally is on a lower level. The GI has shown little interest in learning just what kind of people the Koreans are,

although he has developed a great respect for their ability as soldiers.

But slowly the Korean children are winning him over. I suppose it is their plight that has touched him. At first they were as strange and furtive as their parents, peering out fearfully from their crude mud-walled huts when the troops rolled by. Then they learned to wave and salute and say "ello," and now it is a great game for them to stand in the dust saluting and yelling "ello, 'ello, 'ello," like little birds that have only two notes in their song.

They are happy, handsome children — those in good health — and as courteous and polite as the children of France. But many have legs and arms covered with sores, and heads so patched with disease the hair looks as if it had been burned out by red hot quarters held against the skull.

As the war goes on, more lost and homeless children, paying the price of a war they don't understand, drift into the cities and beg on the streets. It hurts your heart to see these tiny ragamuffins stretched sleepily all along on a filthy path.

The children know that the troops generally get their rations in the evening. They gather at dusk near the billets, patiently expectant. The boys are now bold enough to say "elo, cums?" But the little girls hang shyly back. Only five or six years old themselves, they usually clasp on their back a sleeping baby whose shock of stiffly standing unclothed hair makes it look like a king-tiger.

The children bring gifts of apples in their hands. And it is a tough GI indeed who doesn't shower down with his candy and chewing gum then. Many a soldier saves these tidbits for the appearance of a particular child he has picked out as his personal mascot and given a nickname like "Smalbare" or "Little Jug-head."

Perhaps as they get to know these children better the troops may learn the people here are not so different from him as he thinks. No land and no people can remain pretty in a civil war.

# Pacific Coast Hunters Given Larger Bag; Texas Increased

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman has signed the annual duck-hunting regulations — and given Pacific Coast sportsmen a break.

The 1950 rules lengthened the duck-hunting season in the Pacific flyway — the West Coast states and Idaho, Utah, Nevada, and Arizona — by five days, and increased the daily bag limit.

They reduced waterfowl seasons in the Mississippi flyway a like amount because of signs of a smaller supply of birds.

In the other states the seasons remained unchanged from last year, except those in the central flyway. There more waterfowls are expected, and the hunting bag limits were increased.

States of that flyway are Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

Albert M. Day, director of the fish and wildlife service, called the Pacific flyway changes "an experiment in an area that can stand it because there are more birds per hunter there than in any other."

The seasons, in summary include:

Central Flyway — 45 consecutive days, or two periods of 18 days each. Bag limit increased to five a day; possession limit from eight to 10.

Bag and possession limits of geese remain essentially the same.

In one minor change in the Texas season has been closed on the black-bellied tree duck.

The open seasons for ducks, geese and coots:

Central flyway — Continuous seasons: Oklahoma and Texas, Nov. 3-Dec. 17.

The daily shooting hours: Ducks, geese, brant and coots — same as last year, from one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

Rails, gallinules, woodcock, mourning or turtle doves, white-winged doves and band-tailed pigeons — same as last year, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The seasons on rails and gallinules, woodcock and doves:

Central flyway: Rails and gallinules — Oklahoma and Texas, Sept. 1-Oct. 30. Mourning or turtle dove—Oklahoma, Sept. 1-30; Texas, Mourning doves in Val Verde, Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Miami, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogoches, and Shelby counties and all counties north and west thereof. **Cleaners Say Women Are Tops In Forgetfulness**

NEW YORK —(NEA)— A dry cleaner's most memorable moments derive from his customers' forgetfulness, according to Richard Manoff, manager of the largest cleaning firm in the world.

Lurking behind the business front of this work-a-day establishment are pathos, humor, drama and a bit of cloak-and-dagger stuff, all growing out of the things — both precious and dangerous — that customers leave in their clothes.

Since 85 percent of the Spotless Shover customers are women, it is the fair sex that is responsible on many occasions for situations that arise.

Such was the case when an anxious feminine voice on the telephone threw some dozens of the firm's employees into a frantic search for forgotten jewelry that had been secreted in a hidden pocket in her coat.

The garment, of ordinary cut and fabric, was located before it reached the cleaning vats, but a rough going-over revealed no priceless gems. Disbelief of the cleaners was shattered only when the owner arrived to manipulate the false seams and double linings that concealed her belongings.

Mata Hari, she explained, that she had devised the pocket as a portable safe for her valuables, since she lived alone in a hotel.

On another occasion, husband and wife shared the responsibility for a slip-of-the-memory that almost cost them the hope of a fresh start in a new country.

Refugees, they had been in America only two weeks when their savings were inadvertently sent to the cleaners. Their bank was the husband's coat, into the lining of which the wife had sewed the \$300 they had struggled to earn in the old world.

Again concealment was so cunning that the money escaped discovery by the cleaners' checkers. The newcomers' plans were perilously close to disaster when the cleaning fluid when they frantically reported their loss. Recovery was made in time, however, and the couple set up a tailoring business with their restored savings.

The firm's headquarters was the scene of the comedy with overtones of tragedy as the result of a mix-up in names. It is customary, according to Manoff, to remove forgotten articles from garments and to assemble them in an envelope inscribed with the customer's name. This is carefully stored until the garment is ready for return to its owner, then the envelope is slipped into the pocket from which the property was removed.

Once the suit of a man named Johnson, containing such an envelope, was returned to Mrs. Johnson, she discovered it as she hung the coat in the closet, and opened the flap with interest. Her curiosity was replaced by surprise and anger when several pictures of a stunningly beautiful woman dropped into her palm.

The Johnson marriage hung in the balance until, with the help of the cleaners, she discovered the pictures belonged to another customer, a Miss Johnson, who had been correspondingly perturbed about losing portraits she used in her profession as a model.

In the 160 stores that comprise the chain, an estimated total of \$40,000 worth of forgotten articles is caught by checkers each year. These include such items as love letters, false teeth, wallets, empty matchfolders, silver-plated lighters, ticket stubs, gold compact or five-cent handkerchiefs.

About \$2000 worth of pure scrap — largely paper — is recovered each year. A wastebasket three feet high is filled daily with junk someone failed to clear from pockets.

Checking of clothes is done not only for the benefit of the customer but for the protection of the cleaner as well.

One forgotten lipstick, dissolved in a vat of fluid, can smear as many as 200 garments. Children's crayons wreak similar damage. Chewing gum, though messy, is slightly less costly. It melts into a sticky mass rather than dissolving, ruining as a rule the only pocket in which it was left.

It would be better form to write each one an informal note.

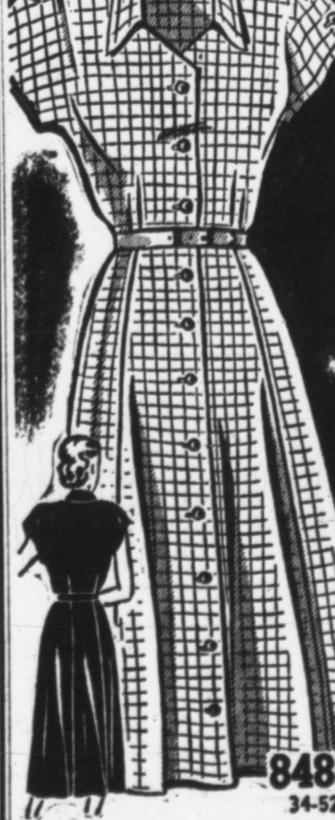

### Oilers Increase Attendance Mark

DALLAS — (AP) — The West Texas-New Mexico League shows a decrease of more than 50,000 in attendance at the three-quarter mark, president Milton Price announced today.

Last year at the same time 501,622 fans had been lured into the parks. This year there have been 450,808. The average this year per playing date is 1,174 compared to 1,330 last season.

Lamesa, Lubbock and Pampa are showing increases but the other five clubs—Abilene, Albuquerque, Amarillo, Borger and Clovis—are behind last year.

The clubs have drawn as follows: Abilene, 49,311 (down 22,199); Albuquerque, 61,595 (down 23,820); Amarillo, 51,634 (down 23,518); Borger, 54,101 (down 7,561); Clovis, 36,452 (down 4,722); Lamesa, 68,104 (up 14,465); Lubbock, 82,167 (up 10,610); Pampa, 47,444 (up 4,448).

### Parker Checks Gassers on Three Hits to Win No. 26

Lefthanders Roy Parker and Ed Hughes cut off the Gassers' hitting fuel last night as Pampa knocked over Borger in a twin bill, 3-2 and 4-2.

Parker notched his 26th league victory in the opening game, allowing only three hits. It was his single in the bottom of the eighth inning that sent home the winning run from second base. Parker tied the WT-NM record of "Wild Bill" Evans for the most number of wins for a season.

Mel Kramer is scheduled to pitch for the Oilers in tonight's game. Game time is 8 o'clock.

Borger jumped in the lead in the first inning scoring one run on one hit and two wild pitches. Lefty Bob Cluley shut the Oilers out the first four innings, giving up two hits.

In the bottom of the fifth frame, Cluley whiffed Parker, but Dick Dawson worked the lefthander for a walk. Cluley, disgusted with himself, tossed his glove into the air and Plate Umpire Roberts tossed the Gasser out of the game.

Prucha then took the hill for Borger. He got Deck Woldt to sky out and Johnny Jeandron went out third to first.

Borger added another run in the top of the sixth. Nim Free walked and Rene Vega singled to put men on first and second. Free advanced to third when Don Ricketson muffed Bob Leon's hard grounder, loading the sacks.

He missed the ball and Jim Martin picked Burnett off second. Prucha then fanned and Free bounced out pitcher to first.

The Oilers couldn't muster a run in their frame and the game went into an extra inning. Parker retired the first three Gassers to face him in the eighth. Homer Matney fanned to open the bottom frame. Martin took a free trip to first and moved on to second when Prucha cut loose with a wild pitch.

Parker ended the game when he caught a three-two pitch and drilled it past Pappy Williams to score. Martin scored.

The Gassers couldn't solve Hughes' slants in the second game. Borger got to the young lefthander for two runs in the top of the seventh. The Gassers combined one hit with a walk and the Oilers committed two errors to allow two runs to score.

Hughes struck out Carnett with the tying runs on base to retire the side.

Only returning starter from Oklahoma's 1950 Sugar Bowl champions is Leon Heath, senior fullback from Hollis, Okla. The other ten Oklahoma starters all graduated.

Heath was voted the outstanding player of the 1950 Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans, La., and no wonder! They've set their sights on a never-never land where ambrosia grows on bushes and nectar falls from Heaven.

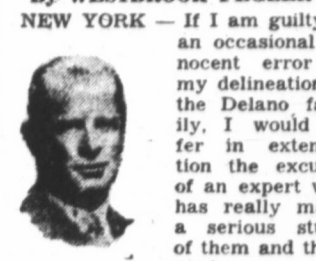

There is no doubt that Warren Delano, the father of the late Sara and grandfather of Franklin D. Roosevelt, was an adventurer and magnate who smuggled opium into Canton.

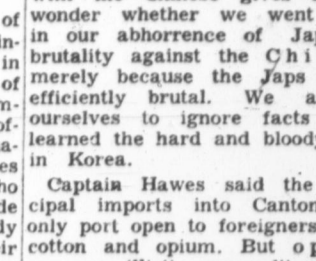
