Solons Believe UMT Shelved **Until January**

lawmakers agreed today that President Truman had put universal military training (UMT) in cold storage at least until January by saying again he sees no need for immediate action.

Chairman Tydings (D-Md) called his Senate armed services committee back into closed - session (9:15 a.m. EST) to decide what to do with UMT legislation it had planned to approve this week. A new drive to get Congress out of Washington by Sept. 9 contributed to the general disposition to spike UMT for the time

The president called Tydings and Chairman Vinson (D-Ga) of the House armed services committee to the White House for a general discussion of defense

legislation yesterday.

Later the White House made public identical letters to the congressional chairmen These repeat ed President Truman's past support of UMT but listed the difficulties of trying to start a vast military training system now.

"Legislation of this character should be placed on the statute books at an early date so that we can put it into operation as soon as the circumstances permit," the president said. "Accordingly, I hope that your commitwill continue its active consideration of this legislation with a view to seeking final action on it in January.





You don't have to be guilty of anything to be put in jail. Any grand jury or individual can have you incarcerated merely by claiming that you broke some law. If politicians in the government want to throw you in durance vile they can do it by getting you indicted and charged with some horrible crime that will smear you properly when the newspapers publish it. They don't have to prove it. If you have no recourse, for you can't sue the government, although you can sue some individual who had you falsely imprisoned. Politicians, however, using "the government" as a front, can keep you in jail for a long time-somegetting a judge to set your bond so high you can't raise it and then holding you for trial, which trial they keep postponing indefinitely ment. The fact that you may not be guilty has nothing to do with speedy trial shall be guaranteed anyone charged with a crime. "speedy"-perhaps a month, per-

You are ordered by the President to throw everything aside-your business, possibly sick wife or children-everything and grab the first train to Washington or you will go to jail anyway for ignoring or defying his personal orders. A situation like that should be remedied promptly and some allowance made for a citizen's circumstances.

Perhaps someone has heard you say something they don't like or outfit happens to be in the saddle. You get a subpoena to appear before a Federal grand jury as a witness. The grand jury may be an impartial, fair one, or it may not. Sometimes it may be wholly under the influence of a prosecutor who uses it to blackiack the political opponents of his outfit, In Washington, where almost everyone is a government employee, this situation is more probable than possible. When I walked into a roomful of Nude-Eel grand jurymen you could have cut the air of hostility with a knife. torney-general, was given a free hand to browbeat witnesses and subject them to the vilest personal insults. I was not even permitted to have an attorney with me. If you get confused or defy the prosecutor when he asks personally insulting questions, he can then ask the grand jury to cite you for contempt and get you in jail. I just missed it by the skin of my eeth because a fair-minded judge happened to hear the contemp case. The prosecutor and grand jury wanted me found guilty of refusing to answer a question, but when the judge found that the question the prosecutor asked me was, "What insane asylum did you escape from?" he dismissed the case. Mrs. F. B. A-There are any number of fruits and vegetables like lemons and grapes which some people claim will cure rheumatism and arthritis. I do not know of any scientific reason why this should be true, and I strongly suspect that those who report that they have been helped by a grape diet or something like it would have gotten well anyway. If taking grapes makes them think that they feel better, why not? It probably won't do any harm. Q-For several weeks I have

This particular variation of twohanded Canasta was invented by John Crawford and myself although there is no doubt that other people discovered it independently. It is much faster than any other form of two-handed Canasta, and although there is plenty of room for skill in the play, the game is never one-sided Each player is dealt fifteen cards and the thirty-first card is turned up. Play proceeds as in regular Canasta, except that when a player makes his draw from the stock, he draws two cards

not one. When he draws from the stock to replace a red three, he gets only one card since that is a replacement, not a regular draw while if there is only one card left in the stock when it is your turn to draw, you only get that one card as your draw. Correct play in this game is similar to that in four-handed Canasta. You try to build your hand with the dual purpose getting the discard pile and of melding out quickly.

Even though you may never get the discard pile, you will add what you do want, you should be able to go out in from nine to fifteen plays, depending on how well your cards match up.
It does not pay to take the discard pile too quickly in this game but it will pay well to grab it any time it holds as many


