Solons Believe UMT Shelved Until January

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Most lawmakers agreed today that President Truman had put universal military training (UMT) in cold storage at least until January by saying again he sees no need for immediate action.

Chairman Tydings (D-Md.) called his Senate armed services committee back into closed session (9:15 a.m. EST) to decide what to do with UMT legislation it had planned to approve this week.

A new drive to get Congress out of Washington by Sept. 9 contributed to the general disposition to spike UMT for the time being.

The president called Tydings and Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the House armed services committee to the White House for a general discussion of defense legislation yesterday.

Later the White House made public identical letters to the congressional chairmen. These repeated President Truman's past support of UMT but listed the difficulties of trying to start a vast military training system now.

"Legislation of this character should be placed on the statute books at an early date so that we can put it into operation as soon as the circumstances permit," the president said.

Senator Byrd (D-Va.), a member of the armed services committee, told a reporter that in view of the president's letter he ought to defer it until January.

Senator Saltonstall (R-Mass.), another committee member, favored a delay because there appeared little chance for House action.

Senator Gurney (R-S.D.), former committee chairman, favored UMT shelving.

Family of Five Is Slain by Lodger In Paternity Row

EAST GREENWICH, R. I. — A young lodger told today police charged, how he slaughtered one by one a family of five — three children, the husband and the young wife who he said was going to have his baby.

The family, Fred J. Dusza, 39, his wife, Beatrice, 31, and their children, were found yesterday in the ruins of their burned house.

Held as their slayer was Edwin H. Reynolds, 27, a young blond young man who had lodged with the Duszas since he and his wife separated last Christmas.

Police Chief Charles R. Johnson said Reynolds told him he fought with Dusza and beat him to death after an argument Monday night in which Reynolds said he was the father of a baby expected by Mrs. Dusza in October.

Reynolds was captured late last night by troopers who surprised him in the home of his estranged wife where he was alone.

Johnson said Reynolds was a "cool and not nervous" as he gave him an account of the night of terror in the seven-room frame house in a lonely farming area.

The chief declined to reveal Reynolds' statement in detail. But he gave this account of the night:

Philippines Readied For U.N. Korea Aid

TOKYO — (AP) — An advance party has arrived from Manila to prepare for the assignment of 1,200 Philippine combat troops to the United Nations forces in Korea.

Headed by Lucas Madamba, political counselor in the Philippines department of foreign affairs, the group conferred with General MacArthur and his chief of staff, Maj. Gen. E. M. Almond.

With Madamba were Lt. Col. Florentino Cardenas, Marcos Boliman and Luis Villareal.

No Increase Seen In Pampa Tax Rate

The city commission Tuesday afternoon finished work on its overhaul of the 1950-51 budget and set the public hearing date for Sept. 26.

Although no definite figures were available yesterday on the budget's tentative acceptance, the commission indicated, strongly, the tax rate would be set the same as last year. This indication has been apparent for some time since City Manager Dick Papp and the commission have been working overtime with the prime purpose of trimming it by at least \$15,000.

Mayor C. A. Huff said, "we have only tentatively approved the budget, and will probably make some changes again before it is brought before a public hearing on Sept. 26."

The commission spent several hours attempting to iron out a sewer line problem for residents on Sunset Drive. One resident reported a four-inch sewer line has been clogging at intervals and asked the city to take over maintenance of the line. They claimed, City Engineer Ray Evans said, a contract was made with the city years ago, but the contract turned out to be an easement to cross property lines, in 1928, for laying a sewer line. Evans said the line appeared to be several private lines tied together.

Pampa's Milk Up One Cent

Pampa's milk price jumped up one cent a quart on Monday and Tuesday.

The Borden Co. raised prices one cent on Monday and the raise was followed by Plains Creamery on Tuesday. Sunshine Dairy Foods spokesman was unavailable, but it was stated that Sunshine either has, or would, follow the trend which began in the Houston area and gradually spread to the Panhandle.

The raise in the price of milk still doesn't bring it to the maximum price hit in 1948. Since that time the dairies were able to drop it two cents, so it is still one cent below the maximum. In addition, the paying price to the producer has been greatly raised over 1948, say spokesmen.

The raise in prices affects homogenized, pasteurized and buttermilk.

Hurricane Roars to New Orleans Areas

NEW ORLEANS — (AP) — The Gulf hurricane roared toward New Orleans today and was expected to strike the Louisiana coast this afternoon and reach the Mississippi and Alabama coasts early tonight.

At 9:30 a.m. (EST) it was centered about 165 miles south-southeast of New Orleans, the weather bureau said.

Winds up to 95 miles an hour extended outward about 100 miles to the northeast and east of the center. Gale force winds extended out some 250 miles in the northeast quadrant.

W. R. Stevens, chief forecaster of the New Orleans weather bureau, said hurricane center is expected to pass a little east of Burwood, La., this afternoon. Burwood is located in southwest pass at the mouth of the Mississippi River, some 50 airline miles south of New Orleans.

Stevens said the hurricane's center would reach the Mississippi and Louisiana coasts early tonight.

He said winds will increase today, reaching hurricane force from New Orleans to Panama City, Fla., this afternoon or tonight.

Stevens warned that tides will be dangerously high from the east Louisiana coast to Apalachicola, Fla., and warned that persons in low places in that area should move to higher ground immediately.

Red Assault on Pohang Repulsed by Americans

North Koreans Pay Greatly In Double Counter-Attack

TOKYO — (AP) — Red Koreans stormed at the wrecked gates of Pohang Wednesday night but allied troops clung to that eastern anchor of the Korean waterfront.

The Reds paid greatly in dead men for a few yards of ground. Both sides counter-attacked at once.

The death struggle for the No. 2 South Korean port on the sea of Japan coast committed about 20,000 men to the side.

Another 20,000 Reds rolled down from the mountains on Taegu from 18 miles to the north of the central front city.

More Communists — possibly up to three divisions — rushed to join the battle.

By order of North Korean Premier Kim Il Sung the Reds have until midnight to wipe out United Nations forces by the end of August. They were far behind schedule.

Allied arms triumphed over the North Koreans in two smaller but furious battles.

U. S. Negro and South Korean troops threw the Reds from a bloody Battle Mountain near Haman, 10 miles northwest of Masan port on the southern coast.

American first cavalrymen stormed up the highest hill near Waegwan in a attack that jumped off Wednesday night.

It was the eighth time in two weeks Battle Mountain changed hands. It was swamped twice Wednesday.

The Waegwan attack was the first by the American cavalrymen in days.

The whole Korean warfront, which winds 120 miles through the mountains westward from Pohang to Waegwan and then southward to the coast, seemed to have come to life.

Red probes tried to cross the Nakdong river between Waegwan and battle mountain. They were knocked back by U. S. artillery and riflemen on the U. S. 24th Infantry and First Cavalry divisions.

They have 110,000 to 120,000 on the line. Another 20,000, mostly law recruits, may join this force soon.

The roaring, close-quarter battle for Pohang seemed to be the main Communist objective.

But the ominous threat to Taegu from the north was alarming. Around 20,000 Reds were in the force fighting toward the central front rail hub.

A break-through at either point could force the Communists on Taegu or Pusan, the principal southeastern seaport.

Twenty thousand North Koreans were engaged in the Pohang battle.

Twin Communist drives from the northwest and southwest were named at the port city.

While the decision hung in the balance American intelligence reported the Red commander apparently is throwing another division into the battle.

General MacArthur's headquarters partly blamed the advance that the North Korean 15th Infantry division is side-slipping across the northern face of the perimeter moving outward.

The MacArthur spokesman said allied forces still hold the initiative on the east coast. The South Korean assault started Monday. It was halted and pushed back. (See RED ASSAULT, Page 2)

Leaflets to Reds Hint U.N. Will Wipe Out 38th Parallel

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The question of whether the United States intends to carry the war on into Communist North Korea developed a new and interesting fact today.

For an American agency, the psychological warfare branch of the Far East command, came a broad hint to the citizens of North Korea that their Communist rulers will be ousted and the 38th parallel diving line raised.

The suggestion is conveyed in an air raid warning leaflet being dropped in North Korea. It advises civilians to move away from the cities which have been converted into military targets by "your Communist leaders."

And it tells them they should join others who have left the cities so that "you can help build a strong, free Korea after the Communists have been driven out."

Conceding that this is a psychological maneuver, it still is noteworthy that a United States agency has suggested to a Russian satellite that its Communist government will be tossed out by a "free" Korea would mean that the artificial boundary between north and south would be wiped out.

This would be strong medicine for Moscow to take.

The Russians created the North Korean satellite state, using a pretext a situation which developed when the World War II allies accepted the surrender of the Japanese armies. As explained by Secretary of State Acheson, the 38th parallel was intended to be purely a military line for the purpose of accepting surrenders to do north and south would be wiped out.

A new feature makes it a crime for a Communist or a member of a Communist front organization to hold a job in the government or in a defense plant.

The bill would require the registration of the Communist party, along with its full membership and the registration of organizations designed as "fronts," along with their officers and financial dealings. The "fronts" would not be required to list their membership.

In addition, Communists and members of "fronts" would not be eligible for passports and would have to put a label on their propaganda.

Whether it is the intention of the United States to do more than rid South Korea of the invading Red armies or to keep an eventual counter-offensive rolling on across the 38th parallel and up through North Korea is not clear. Presumably a such decision would require United Nations concurrence.

Talks Initiated On Phone Raise

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. is ready to assure Pampa of a dial system in 24 months if a rate increase is granted.

This morning a citizens committee subcommittee met with A. C. Thomas, district manager and George Newberry to discuss the proposals.

Thomas said the rate would have to be boosted to \$9 a month for private business lines and \$4.25 per month for private residential lines. The current increase asked for on the manual system is \$7 for the business phone and \$3.25 for the residence phone.

Freighter Skipper Being Investigated

SAN FRANCISCO — The skipper of a freighter that rammed and sank the hospital ship Beneficence says the Navy vessel was traveling fast in dense fog.

Capt. Leonard C. Smith of the Mary Luckenbach, who was just starting his first command, testified before a Coast Guard board of inquiry yesterday.

The Friday tragedy, just off the San Francisco coast, cost 13 lives. Thirteen Beneficence passengers were missing, 102 were saved. The freighter had no casualties.

The Navy simultaneously is conducting a secret investigation. And the government, charging negligence, has sued the Luckenbach Steamship Co. for \$14,000,000 damages.

The Coast Guard probes publicly questioning Capt. Smith on two points:

1. Why did the Mary Luckenbach fail to give Beneficence any aid for an hour and a half after the collision? The freighter anchored soon after the wreck.

2. Why wasn't the Luckenbach's radar working? To the first question, Capt. Smith replied, "I see heard no distress signal, so concluded she was proceeding onto port."

Truman Prods Tax Increase

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman prodded Congress today for quick action on a bill to increase taxes by \$5,000,000,000.

He called acting Senate Democratic Leader Myers of Pennsylvania and House Democratic Leader McCormack of Massachusetts to the White House to urge speed on the measure.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder, who sat in on the conference, emphasized the terrific cost of forcing the treasury if the increases are to become effective Oct. 1.

"The president emphasized to us the importance of speed in order to assure that the treasury can go forward with the new collections on the scheduled date," Myers said.

Myers said that what with the amendments to be debated, he doesn't think the bill can pass the Senate before Tuesday.

He and McCormack agreed that once the Senate acts a little time will be required to iron out differences in the Senate measure and the one previously passed by the House.

Meanwhile there was talk of compromise on the bitterly contested excess profits tax amendment.

Off-stage maneuvering was reported aimed at a settlement about like this:

1. Delay of action on an excess profit levy to take the profits out of war until early next year, but —

2. With a rigid agreement that the profits levy, when enacted, would apply as of July 1, 1950 or Oct. 1, 1950.

Medical Draft Appears Likely

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Legislation to permit the draft of male doctors, dentists and other medical specialists came up for virtually certain House passage today. A companion measure was unanimously approved by the Senate yesterday.

The two proposals differ in a few particulars.

The Senate bill would draft doctors through 55 and dentists through 45 years of age. The House bill sets the top age for both at 45.

The bills exempt from the draft those who are in the reserve.

The objective of both bills is to put into uniform first of some 10,000 men who received wartime medical training at government expense, who saw little or no military service and who are not now reservists.

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Q. I've been working in my job for five years and have built up good seniority. If I'm drafted do I lose this?  
A. No. The re-employment rights of men-inducted are substantially the same as they were under the Selective Service Act of World War II. Inductees who are discharged under honorable conditions may have their old jobs back, with seniority, provided they make application within 90 days and meet other specified conditions.  
Q. I was an enlisted man in the Air Force with a good rating when I got out. What about my getting called back?  
A. The enlisted airmen most needed by the Air Force are in the fields of airplanes and engine mechanics, radar and radio specialists, armament specialists, and medical personnel.  
Q. Are any women reserves from the Air Force being called up for active duty?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Are selective service medical standards higher than they were at the end of World War II?  
A. The armed services set the medical standards and they are higher than they were during the last war.  
Q. I'm told that if I'm drafted I'll get my job back when I get out. Do I get my job back if I enlist?  
A. Yes. The law provides that re-employment rights apply to any man who enlists or is inducted after June 24, 1948, pro-

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Internal revenue collections in July surpassed those of July a year ago by a small margin.  
The Internal Revenue Bureau announced the figures as follows: July 1950 — 2 billion 263 million dollars.  
July 1949 — 2 billion 253 million dollars.  
As between the two months, individual income tax collections dropped about 79 million dollars and corporation income taxes dropped about 84 million. But most other taxes increased. For example, employment taxes increased 43 million, alcohol taxes 48 million, tobacco taxes 7 million, auto and motorcycle taxes 22 million, and gasoline taxes 9 million.

Her parents think she hasn't any business marrying him until he can support her. But he and she both think it's silly for them to wait when they could be married now if she got a job, too.

Who is right? Well, you can't blame parents for wanting to know that a man is able to support their daughter without any help. For parents are old enough to know that the unforeseen can come along to spoil the best laid plans.

Suppose she should have a baby and have to quit her job? Suppose she should find out that combining a job and housekeeping puts too great a strain on

her — as many women have found? Suppose this man she is about to marry gets so used to having his wife help earn the living that he comes to expect it as a permanent arrangement?

Those are the questions that pop into parents' minds — and you can't blame them for being concerned.

But thousands of young couples have proved that it is often better to marry young, even though it means that both husband and wife will have to work, than to wait until the young man is able to support a wife.

It seems to me any young couple today has a perfect right to try the experiment.

**A WORD OF WARNING**

One word of warning, though. They should set a definite time limit on how long the wife is to continue working. Whether it is for one year, or for two or three — that should be understood and agreed upon when they marry.

Otherwise they are likely to set a pattern of living that is dependent on both holding jobs. And while that is all right, so long as it is understood that it is temporary, it isn't good over a long term period.

Why? Because a couple keeps putting off starting a family. A man gets used to the idea of having help with the job of earning a living. A woman gets worn out trying to hold down two jobs. And a couple geared to living on two salaries acquire a

Debts wreck many a marriage and the quicker you are cleared up the better chance you will have of solving your difficulties. Perhaps someone can help you work out a new budget.

## American League Pennant Battle Is Hot Contest

Are the Detroit Tigers finally cracking under the persistent pressure of one of the most grueling pennant battles ever waged?

The answer may come within the next few days. The Detroit picture was never darker than it is today. At least, not since the Tigers took over the American League lead 82 days ago.

True, they are still clinging to the top, but by the slimmest margin. Following last night's 5-4 loss to the Senators in Washington, the Tigers' once-comfortable four and a half game bulge was whittled to two percentage points.

The hard-driving New York Yankees picked up a full game on the tying Tigers by clipping the Cleveland Indians, 6-5, in 10 innings of the first game of a scheduled doubleheader. The second game was postponed after two and a half innings because of rain.

Boston's Red Hot Red Sox soared to a third place tie with the Indians, overpowering the Chicago White Sox, 13-8. The victory moved them within two games of the top.

It was a dreary looking Detroit squad that braced itself for a doubleheader today with the Senators. The team is in its worst losing slump of the campaign — six defeats in the last nine games.

Pitcher Virgil Trucks and Ted Gray are on the shelf. Right-hander Art Houtteman still is bothered by a side injury. Shortstop Johnny Ligon is playing with a protective pad that covers a 10-stitch spike wound on his right leg. Outfielder Vic Wertz bats with a catcher's shin guard to protect a foot injury.

Added to that the Tigers were faced today with the possible loss of slugger Hoot Evelt. The outfielder sprained his right wrist last night and is awaiting the result of X-rays.

As if that isn't enough, the club's hitting has fallen off. The Tigers managed only six hits off Sid Hudson last night in dropping their third straight one-run decision.

Dizzy Trout was the loser. He blew a 2-0 lead in the third inning when four consecutive hits gave Washington three runs.

Rain and wet grounds possibly cost the Yankees a chance to sweep a pair from the Indians. They were out in front, 4-0, when Umpire Bill Summers ordered the postponement.

The Yankees filed a protest contending the field was "playable." League President William Harridge denied the protest. The two teams were to play two games this afternoon.

A single by Hank Bauer with the bases loaded in the 10th inning decided the first game and gave the Yankees his 17th victory.

Bobby Doerr's two home runs sparked the Red Sox to their 14th victory in 15 starts. Mel Parnell registered his 13th triumph.

Jim Konstanty made his 58th relief appearance for Philadelphia as he helped the Phillies down the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-3. The triumph kept the Phils five and a half games ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers who whipped the Cubs in Chicago, 8-2.

Boston's Braves blanked the Cincinnati Reds, 4-0, and the New York Giants slugged the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-5, in other games. St. Louis and Philadelphia in the American League were rained out.

## Hubbers Outslug Gold Sox, 11-8

LUBBOCK — (AP) — Lubbock's Hubbers outslug the Amarillo Gold Sox 11 to 8 here last night in the opener of a four-game series, with Metz LaFollette, former Amarillo hurler, gaining his 14th victory of the season.

LaFollette needed help in the ninth from Royce Mills, who came on to retire three men in order after Frank Murray had tripled. Jay Difani singled and Chick Howard had cracked a home run. It was Mills' 42nd relief appearance of the season.

The Hubbers were sparked by home runs off the bats of Wilcy and Don Moore in the five-run fifth and another by Buddy Morrow in the eighth. Those three circuit clouts accounted for 10 of the Hubber runs. Fred Bates was the loser.

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## American League Pennant Battle Is Hot Contest

Are the Detroit Tigers finally cracking under the persistent pressure of one of the most grueling pennant battles ever waged?

The answer may come within the next few days. The Detroit picture was never darker than it is today. At least, not since the Tigers took over the American League lead 82 days ago.

True, they are still clinging to the top, but by the slimmest margin. Following last night's 5-4 loss to the Senators in Washington, the Tigers' once-comfortable four and a half game bulge was whittled to two percentage points.

The hard-driving New York Yankees picked up a full game on the tying Tigers by clipping the Cleveland Indians, 6-5, in 10 innings of the first game of a scheduled doubleheader. The second game was postponed after two and a half innings because of rain.

Boston's Red Hot Red Sox soared to a third place tie with the Indians, overpowering the Chicago White Sox, 13-8. The victory moved them within two games of the top.

It was a dreary looking Detroit squad that braced itself for a doubleheader today with the Senators. The team is in its worst losing slump of the campaign — six defeats in the last nine games.

Pitcher Virgil Trucks and Ted Gray are on the shelf. Right-hander Art Houtteman still is bothered by a side injury. Shortstop Johnny Ligon is playing with a protective pad that covers a 10-stitch spike wound on his right leg. Outfielder Vic Wertz bats with a catcher's shin guard to protect a foot injury.

Added to that the Tigers were faced today with the possible loss of slugger Hoot Evelt. The outfielder sprained his right wrist last night and is awaiting the result of X-rays.

As if that isn't enough, the club's hitting has fallen off. The Tigers managed only six hits off Sid Hudson last night in dropping their third straight one-run decision.

Dizzy Trout was the loser. He blew a 2-0 lead in the third inning when four consecutive hits gave Washington three runs.

Rain and wet grounds possibly cost the Yankees a chance to sweep a pair from the Indians. They were out in front, 4-0, when Umpire Bill Summers ordered the postponement.

The Yankees filed a protest contending the field was "playable." League President William Harridge denied the protest. The two teams were to play two games this afternoon.

A single by Hank Bauer with the bases loaded in the 10th inning decided the first game and gave the Yankees his 17th victory.

Bobby Doerr's two home runs sparked the Red Sox to their 14th victory in 15 starts. Mel Parnell registered his 13th triumph.

Jim Konstanty made his 58th relief appearance for Philadelphia as he helped the Phillies down the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-3. The triumph kept the Phils five and a half games ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers who whipped the Cubs in Chicago, 8-2.

Boston's Braves blanked the Cincinnati Reds, 4-0, and the New York Giants slugged the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-5, in other games. St. Louis and Philadelphia in the American League were rained out.

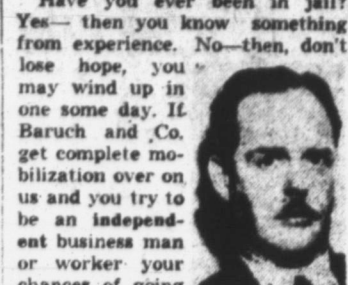

WASHINGTON — Several hard-headed and right-wing leaders of AFL and CIO unions recently returned from Western Europe with the conviction that the Marshall Plan is a failure. ECA Administrator Paul Hoffman is getting almost no benefits from the expenditure of Marshall Plan money. They are particularly upset about conditions in France, where they made a six-weeks tour of industrial centers.

Although these American funds were supposed to improve the economic and material lot of these areas, thus making them less amenable to Communist propaganda and infiltration, the labor representatives maintain that the principal beneficiaries are foreign employers and governments. The average European is living no better because of these billions, and feels no particular gratitude toward the United States, they say.

DISILLUSION — The French worker, reports William Belanger, vice president of the Textile Workers, and head of the Massachusetts CIO Council, "was filled with hope at the time of the liberation. Now, there is disillusion." John Livingston, vice president of the United Auto Workers (CIO), says: "Unless something is done soon to improve living conditions in France, Italy and Western Germany, we may soon find that the aid given to date has been used to rebuild industries which may soon be in the hands of or under the control of a dictator, who is showing, day by day, his lust for and hatred of the United States."

The Doctor Says

Millions of people are troubled with sore bones, joints, or muscles which they frequently think of as arthritis. All of today's questions come in that field. Q—My son recently told me of a woman who has arthritis and rheumatism and was cured by a grape diet. Can this really happen? Mrs. F.B. this really happens? A—There are a number of fruits and vegetables like lemons and grapes which some people claim will cure rheumatism and arthritis. I do not know of any scientific reason why this should be true, and I strongly suspect that those who report that they have been helped by a grape diet or something like it would have gotten well anyway. If taking grapes makes them think that they feel better, why not? It probably won't do any harm.

Q—For several weeks I have been bothered with soreness under the knee which is painful when I go up and down stairs. I am 65 years old. What could this be? A—There are several possibilities but the most likely is a condition within the knee joint itself which frequently comes with advancing years. If this is true the knee will grate when it is moved and an X-ray will show some changes in the bony structure of the knee. Q—Which one of the ductless glands is stimulated by anger and when stimulated is said to be of benefit in attacks of pain caused by arthritis? Mrs. F.J.R. A—This is the adrenal gland. The adrenal gland is a remarkable gland—actually there are two of them in the human body—which secretes several different kinds of hormones; one of them increases the blood pressure and is closely related with anger or alarm; another is the famous Compound E, or cortisone, which is now under such intensive study.

Q—My spine in the back of my neck has been aching for some time. Could this be arthritis of the spine? Mrs. J.M. A—It could be. It could also be something in the muscles of the neck. The only way to tell is to make a careful physical examination and take X-rays of the neck portion of the spine. Q—What causes the knuckle joints to crackle? Is this a kind of arthritis? S.J.W. A—This comes from ligaments slipping across the joint. Many people have this in the jaws, fingers, knees, and perhaps some other joints. It has no bearing on arthritis.

Q—My fingers show an inclination to deformity which is probably due to arthritis and poor blood circulation. Can anything be done for this? R.F. A—If poor circulation is at fault or partially so, there are several methods of stimulating the circulation. Perhaps these are best done by various measures of physical medicine, such as hot baths, paraffin baths, or similar methods. Your physician can doubtless recommend someone in that field who can start you off on treatments and probably give you directions for continuing them at home.

Q—Does rheumatism or arthritis often develop from shingles? T.H.W. A—Not very often. There is grave doubt that there is any connection between an ordinary form of arthritis and shingles. Q—I am 68 years old and a year ago fell down and broke a cartilage in my knee. Now the knee is getting stiff. Will it get all right of itself or would you advise surgery? G.C.H. A—From the description, it seems doubtful that the knee will recover entirely by itself. The question of an operation would certainly come up but could be decided only after an X-ray and careful study of what had to be done and the risks which might be involved.

The Nation's Press

THE PERIL IS HERE (The Wall Street Journal)

It has become rather fashionable to say that America is facing its gravest hour of peril. We doubt it. We think the peril is less now than when Communist spies were helping to set foreign policy, when Earl Browder was having secret conferences at the White House, when Harry Bridges was being hailed as a pillar of peace and democracy and to jail with anyone who intimidated anything to the contrary.

We think that the peril now is not so great as it was only a short time ago when a stupid Republican opposition was beating "bi-partisanship" and lending itself to an obviously impoverished foreign policy which it should have been exposing. The country now is learning the truth. Yes, the atmosphere has cleared considerably and if some of the "gravest peril" boys would only look over their past record and have the common decency to keep quiet, things would be better still. However the peril would be great enough so that it may, after all, be splitting hairs to argue about comparatives.

And T's greatest peril is not the foreign foe. It is not external. It is internal. What is the worst that Russia and her satellites could probably do to this country in the near future? They might drive us out of Asia and then turn and drive us out of Europe. They might drop a few bombs on this continent and do considerable damage by sabotage. It is unlikely that in the near future other nations could conquer this continent in the sense of making a landing and occupying it.

The only agency which can destroy the United States is the United States itself—perhaps we are nearer doing it than at any time since the War Between the States. We are fighting a war which will be expensive enough in itself. In fear of more wars we are undertaking a huge program of rearming ourselves and the nations of Europe. Add to that more expenditures to bolster the economies of the nations of Asia and Africa.

That may be necessary, or at least more of it. Having won World War II the United States is in the position of a defeated nation and it may have to suffer the penalties and the hardships of a defeated nation, betrayed by its own leaders. But if this country thinks that it can have future generations pay the penalty, if it believes that it is possible to finance huge undertakings by borrowing, then it has not learned a lesson and another very hard one—perhaps the last one—will be necessary. We should know what will be the results of borrowing, printing money and inflating the currency. Prices will rise. Wages will rise and then prices again. There will be controls administered by a huge bureaucracy floundering in ineptitude and damning the citizen for its own shortcomings, spying, the citizen, threatening him with jail. Production and trade will shrink. More and more of it will go into the black market. Crooks and gangsters will take over and soon form their alliances with politicians. The most profitable calling will be the fixer.

Before the Russian Communists could take over most of the countries that they have taken over, they had to create chaos in those countries. In most of them they needed the help of armed forces to accomplish that. In this country we seem to be on the way to doing the job without the Russian Communists really lifting a finger.

Other areas are moving up to the "A" list rapidly. Muskegon, Mich., one of the first cities to be hard hit by post-war unemployment in its gray iron casting industry, now reports labor shortages. A Chicago manufacturer of electrical equipment advertised for two days for laborers and engineers before he got one applicant. WHAT'S IN IT. In case you've ever wondered what went into so-called French salad dressings, here's some information: After Nov. 12, Federal Food and Drug standards will be enforced on the salad dressing industry. French dressings will have to have at least 35 percent vegetable oil. No mineral oils will be allowed. Flavoring of salt, sugar, syrup or honey is permitted, but no coloring agent which imitates egg-yolk. Tomato paste, catsup or sherry wine are optional. Citric acid must be limited to one-fourth of the acetic acid in vinegar. Lemon or lime juice used in French dressing may be emulsified (thickened) by not more than three-fourths of one percent by weight of gum arabic, guar gum, extract of Irish moss, propylene glycol ether, acid or sodium carboxymethylcellulose.

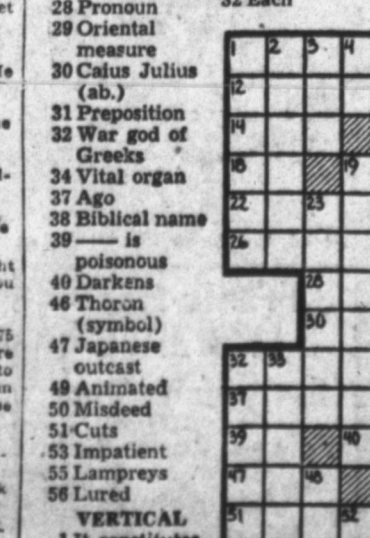

Study of Iowa farm fires from 1930 to 1947 has led Bureau of Agricultural Research to the finding that buildings protected by lightning rods have a 12-to-one chance of escaping fire by lightning, as compared to unprotected buildings. Seventy-seven percent of this year's farm crop was grown from hybrid seed, as compared to one acre in 1000 planted in hybrid seed in 1923.

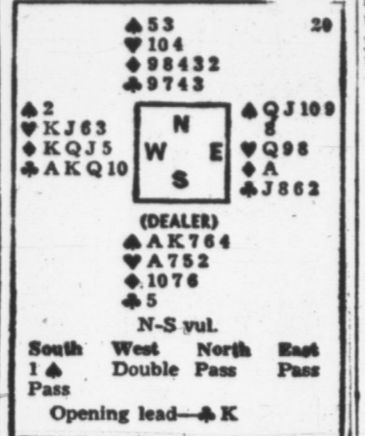

## JACOBY ON BRIDGE

### Draw Trumps When Doubling Low Bid

A St. Paul reader writes: "My wife and I like to play two-handed Canasta, and find that the most amusing game is the one in which you draw two cards when you draw from the stock."



I wonder if you would discuss this game in your column and also answer a couple of questions. "The first question is: 'Do you get two cards to replace a red three?' The second: 'What happens when there is only one card left in the stock?'"

This particular variation of two-handed Canasta was invented by John Crawford and myself although there is no doubt that other people discovered it independently. It is much faster than any other form of two-handed Canasta and although there is plenty of room for skill in the play, the game is never one-sided.

Each player is dealt fifteen cards and the thirty-first card is turned up. Play proceeds as in regular Canasta, except that when a player makes his draw from the stock, he draws two cards, not one.

When he draws from the stock to replace a red three, he gets only one card since that is a replacement, not a regular draw, while if there is only one card left in the stock when it is your turn to draw, you only get that one card as your draw.

Correct play in this game is similar to that in four-handed Canasta. You try to build your hand with the dual purpose of getting the discard pile and of melding out quickly.

Even though you may never get the discard pile, you will add one card to your hand at each draw, and if you simply throw what you don't want and keep what you do want, you should be able to go out in from nine to fifteen plays, depending on how well your cards match up.

It does not pay to take the discard pile too quickly in this game but it will pay well to grab it any time it holds as many

as ten cards. After grabbing the first discard pile, do not let yourself be lulled into any feeling of security. Your opponent will be playing for out and the chances favor his being able to go out fairly soon.

So don't hang on to a great mass of cards with the feeling that the game is going to be all yours. If you do, it is probable that he will be able to splash his

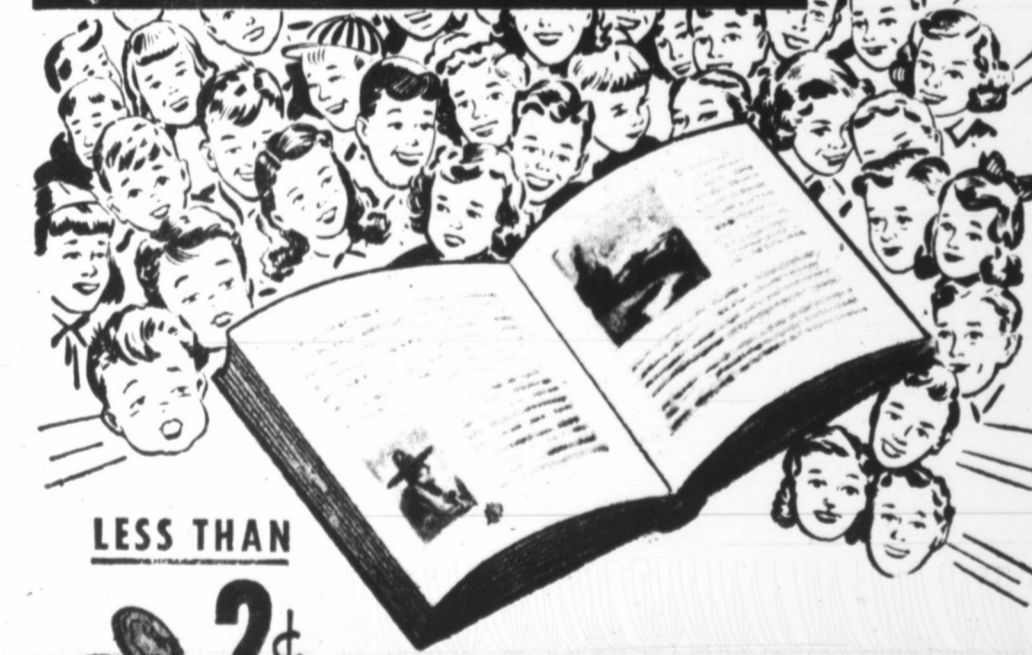
