



Fort Hood Getting New Parking Area, Tank-Washing Rack

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Developments of larger armored tanks has necessitated a \$500,000 improvement job to the parking area and washing racks at Fort Hood, Texas.

This was brought out in testimony made public today by the House Appropriations Committee, which is working on President Truman's request for more than \$10,000,000 for the armed services.

Brig. Gen. G. J. Nold of the Army engineers construction branch said the World War II Central Texas training center battalion motor park was built to accommodate 30-ton tanks instead of those of approximately 47 tons now in use.

"With regard to water pressure," he added, "we take these tanks out and you know they are all churned up with mud and debris and gravel and so on.

"In order to preserve that tank you have to wash it under pressure every day. These heavy tanks are going in and you need heavier hard standing for them, and water pressure to clean them."

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — The county board of supervisors wants to fly the United Nations flag in the Plaza Court of Flags here. It found it first must:

1. Obtain a purchase permit for the flag from Trygve Lie, U. N. secretary.
2. Send an official order to a New York manufacturer who holds exclusive sales rights to the flag.
3. Wait for the manufacturer to send a price list showing costs on various sizes.

The man was identified as Bok Ki Man, 43. Police did not say whether the cable-cutting was thievery or sabotage.

The damaged cable was repaired Sunday.

(Continued from Page 1) emphasis would be put on tank production.

Navy officials said the expansion program for the fleet and its aviation was like this: combatant ships will be increased from 243 under the present budget to 282; amphibious-type and auxiliary craft will be increased from 386 to 629, bringing the total number of operating ships to 911.

In the air, there will be three more attack carrier groups, three anti-submarine carrier groups, seven more patrol squadrons. The new total of planes operated by the Navy and Marines will rise from 6,233 to 7,335.

The carrier program as proposed under the supplemental request would make the operating force consist of: nine large carriers; 10 small carriers, plus one for training and three transport carriers (apparently for ferrying planes as has been done in emergency shipments to Korea.)

Marine Corps officials said that to meet the expansion requirements and the Korean war needs, 2,997 officers and 60,579 men would be required and that the new figure for the current fiscal year then would be 10,314 officers and 127,569 men.

Most of them will come from the reserves, said Gen. Clinton B. Cates, Marine commandant.

Cates told the committee that 80 percent of the increased strength would go into combat units.

AP Correspondent Stan Swinton reported from the southern front that the 25th division regained all the ground lost previously to attacking troops of the Red Korean sixth division.

Swinton's dispatch was timed after the U.S. 8th Army communique released at 4:10 p.m. Tuesday (4:10 a.m. CST), which said the 8th regiment was attacking a hill lost to the Reds Monday.

In the north above Taegu, 45-ton Pershing tanks drove back a Red assault led by nine tanks in the fourth day of continual thrusts at the central front allied supply base.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — (AP) — Portable radios will be banned from the new Florida State University stadium which now is under construction.

School president Donk S. Camp bell made the announcement here declaring he has received "many complaints from patrons who were annoyed by loudly playing radios in the stands near them during our games last fall."

President Campbell said that in having radios from its new stadium, Florida State is following a policy being carried out in many other athletic fields throughout the nation.

The Florida State University Roughnecks, who were Dixie Conference and Tampa Shrine Cigar Bowl Champions last season, will open their 1950 grid state against Randolph-Macon College here Oct. 7. This contest will be the first played in the new arena, which will seat 18,000 fans.

San Quentin Riots Quelled

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. — (AP) — The eleven ring-leaders of three weekend riots in San Quentin prison were held in solitary confinement today.

All outbreaks were in the mess hall.

Eleven men were injured by flying trays, cups and other utensils hurled around during one of the melees.

Warden Clinton Duffy said the riots were "outbreaks of hoodlumism"—not protests against the food. He said they were not planned in advance.

Duffy returned from vacation to personally supervise the mess hall last night. He ordered extra guards to duty today.

The first outbreak, Duffy said, came Friday when Irving Cornell, 37-year-old convicted Los Angeles sex offender, attacked an inmate mess hall attendant. Guards broke up the fight. More than 240 men surged toward the guards. The guards quieted them down by firing shots over their heads.

A few minutes later the second riot broke out. It was then that the utensils were thrown. Guards finally quelled this. The third riot came at the Saturday evening meal. As soon as the men sat down they began hooting and hooting. Again it took rifle shots in the air to restore order.

U.N. Hailed in Japs' Program

TOKYO — (AP) — A movement "to express gratitude to the United Nations forces" fighting the Red Koreans has emerged from Japan.

The sponsoring group is headed by Yasuo Kikuoka, president of the newspaper Nippon Seikai in Tokyo.

The prospectus said the U. N. action in Korea had wiped out the uneasiness of the Japanese over the eastward advance of the Red tide.

Kikuoka said sponsors plan to get 10,000,000 signatures.

The movement calls for sending missions to thank and comfort soldiers at the front and publication of pamphlets, lectures and motion pictures on work of the U. N.

The work will be financed by public donations.

Fires Subside In California

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Some 35 Northern Californians are homeless today, their houses destroyed by fire that blackened nearly 3,000 acres of rich redwood timber in Humboldt County.

Elsewhere in the state, flames that had charred more than 100,000 acres of tinder-dry brush and forest land seemed to be slackening.

Red Cross aid was sent to 22 homeless families about 55 miles south of Eureka. They are being housed at the tiny Eel Rock church.

More than 200 state fire fighters are battling the blaze, most of which is on private lumbering land.

Another uncontrolled fire a few miles to the south burned almost 4,000 acres of scattered brush and timber.

Flames that blackened 60,000 acres of lush woods in the Clearland National Forest and in Clear Lake State Park near San Diego appeared to be nearing control.

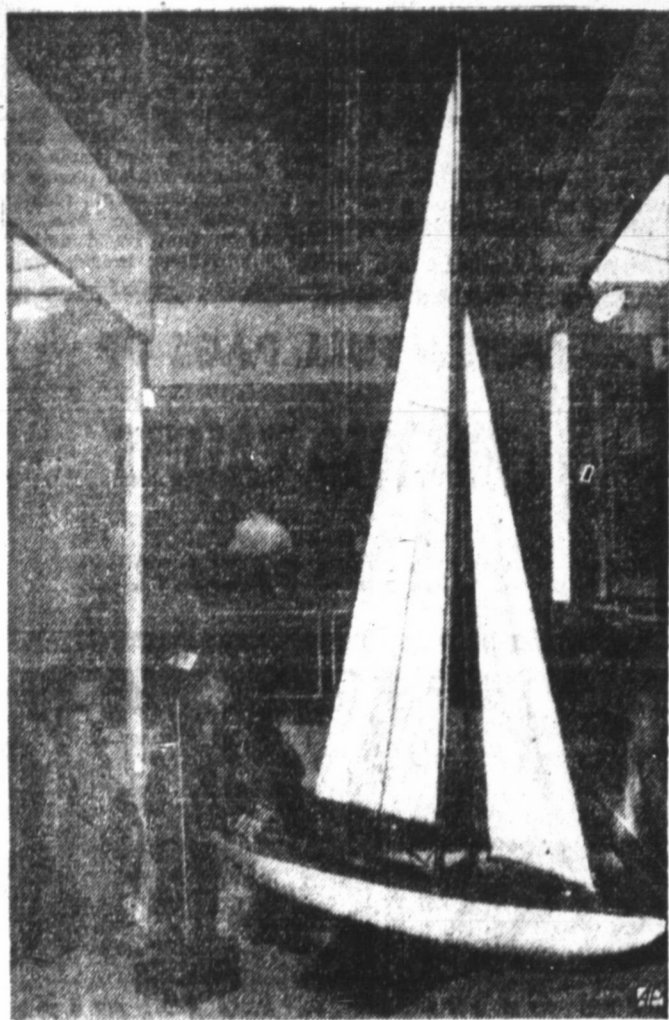

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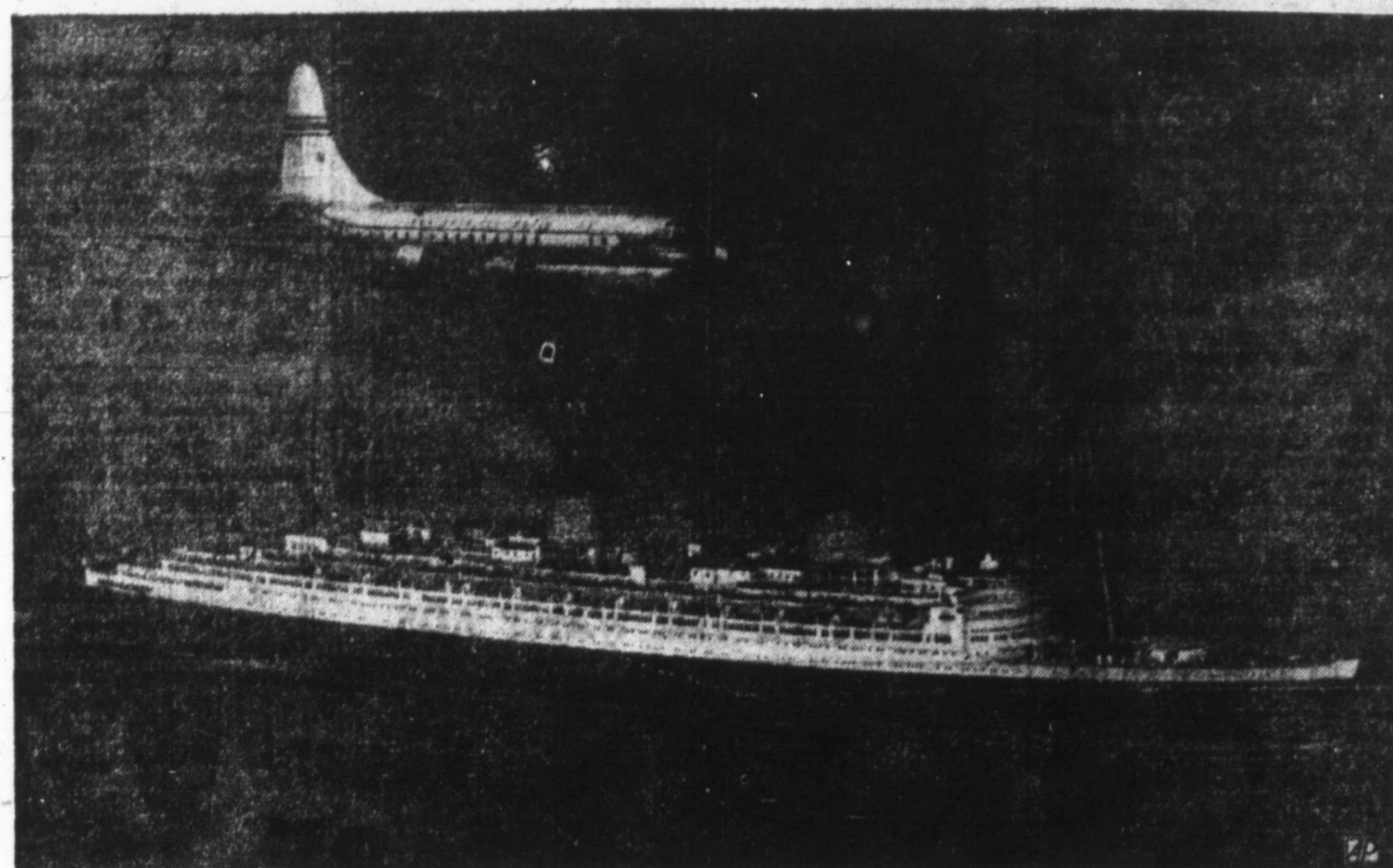

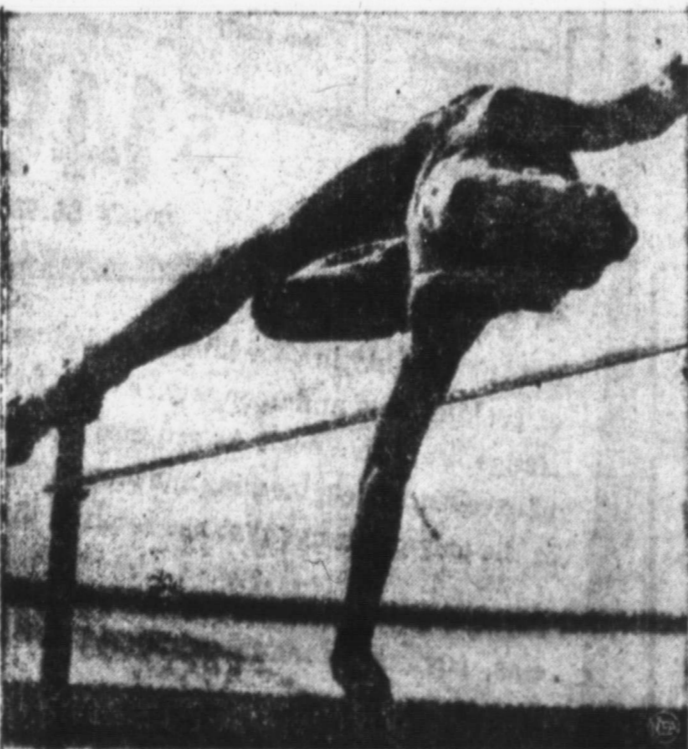

KOREA — (AP) — This is how it feels to be a war correspondent grandpappy... and to meet the most frustrated soldier in the world... and to stare a white rabbit in the eyes.
Becoming a grandpappy comes first. A cable from home told me that my daughter Ruth had given birth to a fine son — and at 42 I was now the only grandpappy among the correspondents on the Korean front.
I was in the mood to be sentimental.
But the same day the Marines arrived in Korea and I was among the group of correspondents who met their transports.

Our pilot boat swung alongside a transport with the deck high above us.
Now, a grandfather should be permitted to board a ship with proper dignity and decorum. But my colleagues below me were shouting for me to hurry up. Topsiside a tough lieutenant was screaming that correspondents would not be allowed to board the ship.
I don't know the rules on what a grandpappy should do in such a case so I ignored the lieutenant and kept going up the ladder to get the interviews we were after.
The frustrated soldier was next. I stopped at an air strip and a corporal was moaning about a radio rebroadcast of a tight game between the Phillies and the Brooklyn Dodgers. This corporal was a Phillies man himself.
"There it was," he said. "The Phils leading six to five in the last of the ninth at Ebbets Field. The Bums were at bat. There were two out and two Brooklyn runners on base. And then that damned radio quits. I'm going nuts if I don't find out how that game ended."
Then there was the white rabbit.
I woke up one morning and opened one eye. Then I closed my eyes and opened them again only to find myself staring at a white rabbit.

City Explains Atchison-Tyng Traffic Plan

Pedestrians crossing S. Cuyler at Tyng, or Atchison were warned today by the city engineer's office to watch the traffic lights in front of them and not beside them.

The confusion has caused some pedestrians to have uncomfortably close shaves with vehicles coming out of the underpass.

This is caused by a 10 second delay in light changing to clear the underpass of all traffic.
Here is what happens:
A pedestrian walks east on Atchison and comes up to the northwest corner of S. Cuyler and Atchison. The pedestrian looks over his right shoulder and sees the traffic light on the southwest corner flash to red for south bound Cuyler traffic. The pedestrian immediately starts across the street and becomes tangled in north bound Cuyler traffic.

Had the pedestrian looked over on the southeast corner he would have noticed the light there was still red for east bound Atchison traffic. After 10 seconds the light will change to green for that east bound traffic and it will be safe to cross.
The same time interval works for east and west bound Tyng traffic and, of course, west bound Atchison traffic.

So, says the engineering department, "look ahead and not sideways when crossing at these two intersections."
The 10-second delay was synchronized that way to alleviate traffic jams under the underpass.

Bogart has an opinion about everything, including his employers, national affairs and the weather. This time he was proclaiming the demise of the movie gangster. And this from a guy who made a mint by starting as a hard-as-nails mobster.
"You can't do a gangster in the movies any more," the actor claimed. "People would laugh you off the screen if you tried to play one of those tough guys in pictures of 10 and 15 years ago."

Bogart himself hasn't played a gangster since "High Sierra" in 1941. "I don't think I could go back to the old tricks—the narrowed eyes, the drawn cheeks, the tight lips," he said.
"It was that way with Eddie Robinson when we played in 'Key Largo.' He said he had played so many good guys that he had forgotten how to be a mug again. And when he did some of the tough things that the script called for, he broke himself up with laughter."
Bogart, who is now on the side of the law in "The Enforcer," agreed that the tough movie gangster belongs to another era.
"You don't find gangsters like those guys anymore," he said. "Today they are big businessmen engaged in seemingly respectable businesses and paying income tax. Not many of them even get shot at."

Austin's Korean Unity Call Sets Off Worried Thinking

By DEWITT MACKENZIE, AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

A good deal of worried thinking has been inspired by Warren R. Austin, U. S. representative to the United Nations, through his call for a unified North and South Korea under a republic at war's end.

This proposal of course immediately poses the problem that it would involve invasion of Northern Korea by the United Nations forces under General MacArthur. The general's present instructions are to halt at the 38th parallel, which is the southern boundary of North Korea.

Mr. Austin was silent on this point, and one suspects that in making his statement he was on a fishing expedition for the views of members. Presumably he filed his creed, for observers have noted these positive reactions:

Among the non-Communist countries there is general acceptance of the thesis that a unified Democratic republic is the ideal solution. There is general anti strong opposition to pursuing any course which might result in another world war, though with this qualification invasion would be approved.

And what circumstances would create the danger of world war? That would be the intervention of Russia to prevent occupation of North Korea by United Nations troops.

On this score my colleague, John M. Hightower, AP diplomatic expert in Washington, reports that many of the best informed American officials believe the Soviet Union will openly grab off North Korea rather than let a victorious U. N. restore peace and unity. That would put up to the United Nations the tough problem of whether to accept this situation or whether to evict the Muscovites. The latter would mean world war, and this course is unlikely.

Many of the smaller countries of the U. N. are particularly anxious to avoid another world war. Those which already have offered to send troops to join General MacArthur's U. N. forces in South Korea feel they would be on a tough spot in event of a general war. They would be automatically committed to participation in the general upheaval because they already were fighting in the south.

Naturally an open sore will be created if the war ends with South Korea freed by North Korea retaining its old status. This would mean that the U. N. must keep an army in South Korea permanently to prevent the northerners from invading again.

When the United Nations forces have evicted the invaders and have reached the 38th parallel, it may be that the matter will come before the U. N. Security Council. Then the small nations which have no membership on the council will again be on pins and needles until the major powers have made a decision.

From the standpoint of the interests of the United Nations, it would be a great thing if a unified and Democratic Korea emerged as the protoge of the peace organization. The U. N. has already justified its existence by courageously applying military sanctions against aggression. It has dared where the League of Nations failed.

A successful conclusion of this historic stand for justice would immeasurably strengthen the U. N. and lessen the chances of further aggression of this sort.

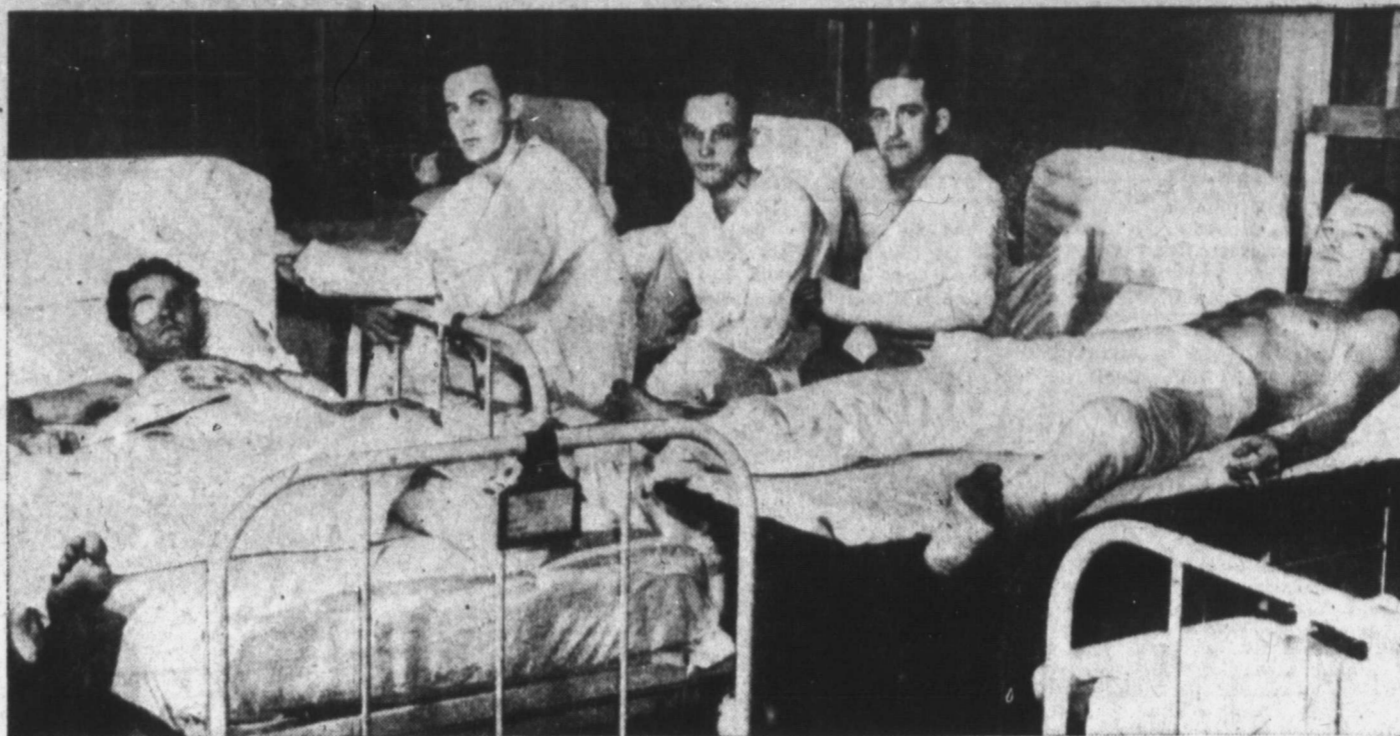

"I don't agree with you at all," said Larceny Lou. "You don't have to make complicated plays to get unusual results. Very often the simplest play in the world will get you a very startling score."

Bridge players always listen to Larceny Lou's stories. It's hard to get him to tell one, but when he breaks down, he usually tells a good one.

"For example," continued Lou, "take a hand I played in the Winter Championships of 1948. The bidding wasn't very good, perhaps, since six hearts would have been much safer. However, practically everybody played it, at six trump to cash in on the higher trick value of a no trump contract."

"I had the West cards, and I opened the king of diamonds. Dummy won with the ace, and declared then led a club to his ace. On this trick I dropped the jack of clubs."

"There wasn't anything to this play, of course. It's certainly not a complicated play—it's just a feeble attempt to deceive declarer. However, I couldn't think of anything better—and the play couldn't cost anything. For a simple play, it certainly had a remarkable effect."

"South started at me for a long time, trying to decide if my play had been honest. He finally decided to gather some additional information to help him make up his mind. He therefore laid down the ace and king of spades."

"Now I don't know about you fellows, but I myself don't expect to set a slam contract five tricks. Not when that slam has been bid by a good player. And that unusual result was brought about by a very simple play. I'm sure you'll agree that there is nothing remarkable about dropping the jack of clubs."

Larceny Lou was quite right, of course. There was nothing complicated about dropping the jack of clubs, but it is the sort of play that we often forget to make. If Lou had dropped a small club on the first trick, declarer would have had no choice. He would have made his slam contract, 28. His difference of going down five! The difference is very nearly 2000 points!

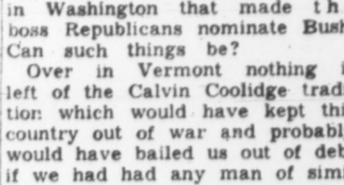

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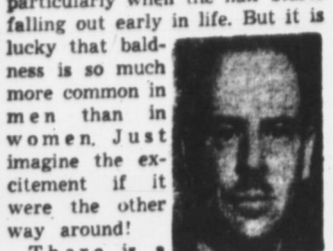
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The Doctor Says

Everyone hates to become bald, particularly when the hair starts falling out early in life. But it is lucky that baldness is so much more common in men than in women.

There is a strong family tendency to early baldness. In the most common variety the hair line recedes and the hair becomes thin at the crown.

Although claims are made for many "hair restorers," there are too many failures from any form of treatment to justify the belief that there is a good prevention or cure.

There are other conditions which cause loss of hair. The hair frequently falls out after infectious diseases such as typhoid, scarlet fever, influenza or some toxic condition.

There is a condition called alopecia areata in which the hair falls out completely in roundish spots, ranging in size from that of a small coin all the way up to total loss of hair of the scalp, eyebrows and eyelashes.

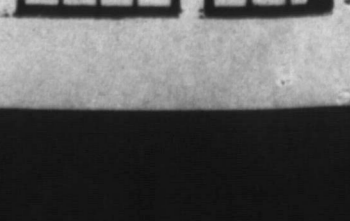

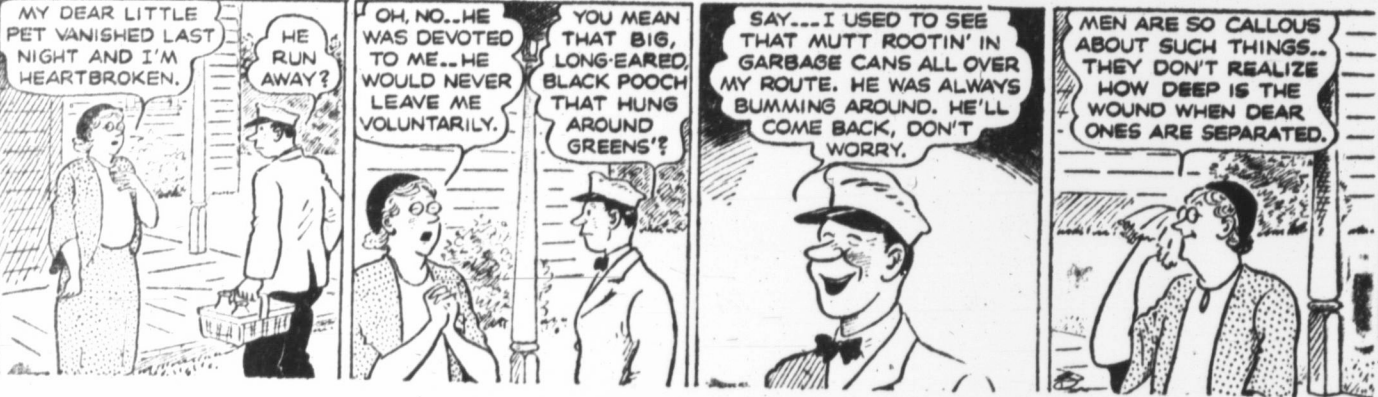
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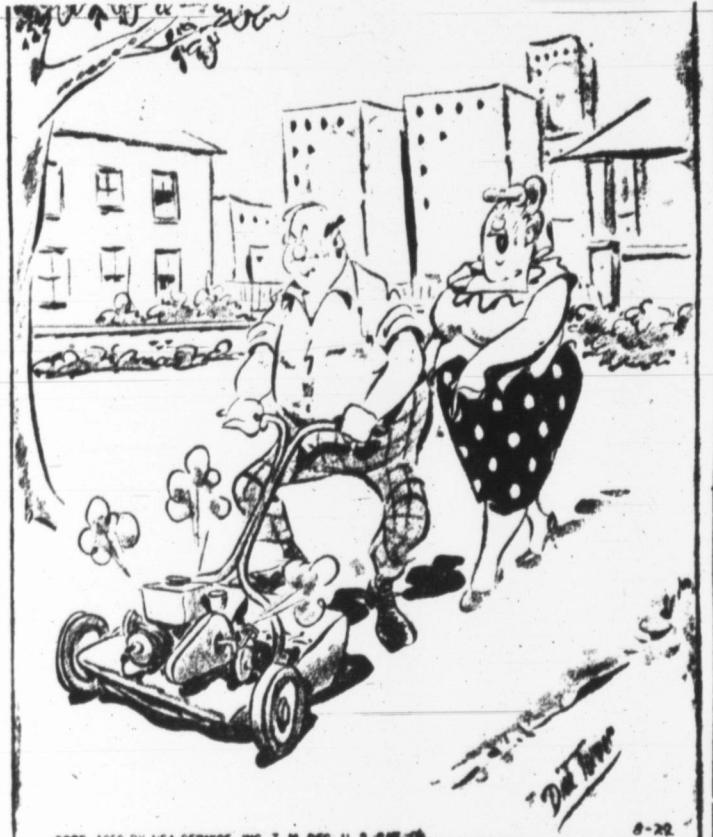
