60,000 Reds Await Signal for Drive

Economy Bloc In Tight Spot On Mail Fight

WASHINGTON — (AP) — House members who have been clamoring for government economic face a tough election-year decision today.

They must decide whether to try to reverse a Post Office Department order curtailing home mail delivery and other postal services.

For 218 members, a majority, the decision was made last month when they signed a petition forcing a House vote on a bill that would set aside the department's order and restore postal service to its previous level.

But some of the 218 aren't so sure now that their original decision was wise. They may not vote that way when the chips are down.

"Some of the people who were complaining against the reduced mail service now are demanding cuts in spending," one of the petition signers told newsmen.

"Because of the added spending caused by the Korean crisis, the people are insisting that domestic spending be cut to the bone. It's a question of whether they want economy more than they want two mail deliveries a day."

Unless there's a change in plans, the House will vote today on the bill cancelling the post office order. The 218 signatures to the petition assured that the Senate has not acted.

Since the Post Office Department said it ordered the curtailment of service in an attempt to reduce its annual deficit of hundreds of millions of dollars, a vote to cancel the order might be construed as a vote to run up the postal deficit.

Estimates of how much money the department will save this year are in the billions.

Connally Assails Panel Co-Workers

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Chairman Connally (D-Texas) accused Republican members of his Senate foreign relations committee today of "political pettifoggery" in contending that administration policies invited the Communist attack on South Korea.

"A palpable political statement intended to influence the coming elections," Connally said of a charge by four Republican members yesterday that the Truman administration virtually had invited Russia "to grab whatever it could in China, Korea and Formosa."

The statement was signed by Senators Wiley of Wisconsin, H. Alexander Smith of New Jersey, Hickenlooper of Iowa and Lodge of Massachusetts. It had the endorsement in principle of Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, the other Republican member of the committee. Vandenberg, long the chief GOP advocate of bipartisan foreign policy, said he did not sign the statement.

Its issuance split wide open the committee which, in recent years, had frequently agreed unanimously on major foreign policy issues.

The Republicans asserted that administration far eastern policy "constantly temporized with and capitulated to the ruthless demands of the Communists, dominated by Moscow." It added: "Under the Kremlin was, in effect, given a green light to grab whatever it could in China, Korea and Formosa. This was never a bipartisan policy. It was solely an administration policy."

Connally retorted in a statement dictated to reporters that the Republican committee members had "issued a plain and palpable political statement on foreign policy — it is a document plainly intended to influence the coming elections."

"The best way to get international peace is to have unity at home instead of quarrelsome pettifoggery attacks on the administration by Republicans," he declared.

The Republicans have made no secret of the fact that they intend to discuss far eastern policy in the congressional campaign. Their national committee will issue a documentary "white paper" on the subject within a few days.

Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the GOP floor leader, told a reporter he thinks most Senate Republicans subscribe to the statement issued by the foreign relations members.

"For myself, I would have gone farther," Wherry said. "I think that what has happened in Asia also has happened in Europe."

Senator Pepper (D-Fla.), another Democratic member of the foreign relations group, joined Connally in condemning the Republican statement.

In their 1300-word statement the Republicans demanded that the United States take immediate steps to "regain the initiative and the power for the organization."

Ford Studies Union Demand

DETROIT — (AP) — Under threat of future strike action, the Ford Motor Company today studied a request from the CIO United Auto Workers that the present contract be reopened and wages hiked immediately.

The UAW represents 115,000 Ford production workers across the nation.

Unless the demands are met, the general council of Ford's 60,000-member UAW Local 600 of Detroit approved strike action for Jan. 2, 1951. The present contract expires Jan. 1.

The contract now in force bars any review of wages before the expiration date. But Ken Hamon, UAW Ford director, declared the contract provides for a reopening on wages if both parties agree.

The union contends that "the spiraling cost of living" justifies a wage increase at this time.

Bannon said wage increases this year by competitors General Motors and Chrysler "have resulted in inequities in the rates paid to Ford workers and workers in other plants on comparable classifications of work."

Local 600 first demanded a wage review 10 days ago. The company rejected the request, pointing out that the contract did not permit a reopening and that the contract was on a nationwide basis for its production workers.

The second UAW demand, in behalf of all of Ford's production workers, followed.

The local apparently set the issue of a strike to avoid possible federal unfair labor practices charged for breaking the contract.

Huge Force Poised 12 Miles From Taegu; River Spanned

TOKYO, Tuesday — (AP) — Thrusting underwater bridges across the Nakdong River, the North Korean Reds probed today for an imminent drive on Taegu by an estimated 60,000 men on this fifth anniversary of Korea's liberation from Japan.

A summary issued early today by General MacArthur's Tokyo headquarters placed the threat near Waegwan, 12 miles north-west of Taegu, main forward American base on the central front of South Korea.

There, it said, the Reds were believed to have completed a second underwater bridge. Such stone and log crossings are sunk about a foot below the surface to escape detection from the air.

Twenty-three miles south of Taegu, the American 24th infantry division counterattacked and shoved the Red fourth division back 1,000 yards to a mile.

MacArthur's summary, however, said the enemy still was moving reinforcements to the river's east bank in that sector south of Changnyong.

The greatest threat, however, was around Waegwan, where the Reds were assembling their largest force.

It is believed to be the most effective mass drawn from 15 divisions of 150,000 men. The Reds had shoved up to the long, curling battline. And it greatly outnumbered anything the allies have to oppose them.

A Red attack down the Taegon-Taegu mountain valley corridor was expected momentarily. Tuesday is the fifth anniversary of the liberation of Korea from Japan. Such anniversaries are likely occasions in Oriental reckoning for demonstrations of strength.

As the Red thousands assembled west of the Nakdong River, American troops recaptured muddy slopes on the allied eastern side of the stream from some of the 12,000 Reds who crossed the river at Changnyong.

The Communists have been trying to break out from their Nakdong River-crossing bulge for eight days. Their objective is Pusan, No. 1 Korean port in the southeast 35 miles from Taegu.

The U. S. 24th division, moving up behind 45-ton Pershing tanks, attacked the river-crossers at dawn Monday. They shoved the North Koreans back from 1,000 yards to a mile along a flanking six-mile-long sector on the allied eastern bank of the river.

Point blank, high velocity fire met the attacking Americans. Intelligence officers said the Communist force numbered 12,000. (See HUGE FORCE, Page 10)

Political Truce Is Demand

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo) today demanded "a truce on partisan politics" in dealing with home front mobilization. He did so after two Republican lawmakers assailed the Truman administration's handling of the program.

"I think this is a very poor time for anyone — Democrats or Republicans — to challenge the motives of those who are called upon to make the extremely difficult decisions required," O'Mahoney declared.

"This of all times is a time for a truce on partisan politics, for partisan attacks are wholly uncalled for and only serve to weaken us."

O'Mahoney was replying to weekend attacks on the administration by Senators Aiken (R-Vt.) and Martin (R-Pa.).

Aiken predicted easy Senate passage late this week of a House-approved bill which would set up authority for wage-price rationing cuts, but he said President Truman declined "for political reasons" to ask Congress for those controls.

Mr. Truman did ask for immediate power to allocate materials, set up priorities and curtail credit. The bill which the House passed and which appears to face smooth sailing in the Senate would also give him authority for use when he saw fit, to control prices and wages and impose rationing.

Aiken contended that Mr. Truman has his eye on the November elections and has been "negotiating" leaving the American people in the dark about oil operations on land under the marginal seas.

Chairman O'Mahoney (D-Wyo) called up his proposal to give the Interior Department authority to take over development activities in offshore lands, frequently called the tidelands, pending settlement of the federal-state dispute over their ownership.

His proposal has run into stiff opposition of the two states: mostly concerned — Louisiana and Texas.

O'Mahoney said he wanted to learn what chances are for quick enactment.

The thing is tied up in the rather complicated federal-state dispute over ownership of the oil-rich lands and the right to the natural oil royalties.

Until recent years, Louisiana, California and other states assumed ownership of the offshore lands and leased out areas for oil exploration and development. In 1947 the Supreme Court upheld a federal government contention that it and not California had paramount rights over the submerged lands off the California shore.

Last June the court made a similar ruling as to Texas and Louisiana.

Fourteen-year-old Marvin Baer, Pampa's Soap Box Derby champion, had his year's work climaxed with a first heat defeat Sunday afternoon at the national derby in Akron, O. But Marvin was among 37 others who failed to win their first race. Among that group of losers was every entrant from Texas.

Marvin raced in the twelfth heat with boys from Durham, N. C. and Danbury, Conn. His time over the course was 28.18 seconds, considerably faster than the second average for the equally long Pampa course.

A lanky 15-year-old youngster from Charleston, W. Va., who carried a Sunday school testament as a good luck charm, is the nation's new Soap Box Derby champion.

Harold D. Williamson calmly steered his streamlined black racer to victory to win the 13th derby race before a crowd of some 50,000.

A straight "A" student, the freckled youth will receive a \$5,000 four-year scholarship for taking the All-American event sponsored by Chevrolet and a host of newspapers. Williamson represented the Charleston, W. Va., Gazette.

Second place went to Donald Alter, 16, of Danville, Pa., who was sponsored by the Williamsport, Pa., Sun-Gazette. He finished a scant length behind Williamson on the 975.4 foot track and won a new Chevrolet automobile.

Richard Dougan, 13, of Muncie, Ind., representing the Muncie Star, came in third. His prize was a motion picture camera and projector.

Williamson had to win five heats and conquer a field of 146 opponents in his storybook victory. Six years ago, he was laid up with rheumatic fever. He emerged with strong, uncrimped limbs after a two-year struggle, but with a weak heart.

Mountain Climbers Scale Whitney in Hunt for Youth, 17

LONE PINE, Calif. — (AP) — Four veteran mountain climbers lowered themselves over the east face of Mt. Whitney today in a last-hope search for Christopher Smith Reynolds, tobacco heir son of singer Lenny Holman.

The climbers plan to search remote ledges and crevasses and if unsuccessful, will remain on the nation's highest peak overnight and start anew tomorrow.

The other phase of today's rescue operations will see the removal by basket and ropes of the body of Reynolds' companion, the frozen body of his companion, Stephen Rice Wasserman, was found in a snowy crevasse at the 11,500-foot level yesterday, a week after the two 17-year-old eastern sons had set out to conquer Whitney's toughest climb.

Scant hope was held by veteran searchers that young Reynolds is still alive, unless he wandered off for aid for Wasserman.

After 15 minutes with the little prince, who is 21 months old today, the princess retired into her four-story home.

King George VI arrived at Balmoral, Scotland, for his annual grouse hunting trip. Arrangements were made to telephone him of the new baby's arrival. Queen Elizabeth remained in London.

Yesterday Princess Elizabeth left home to lunch with King George and Queen Elizabeth. This surprised the crowds who had been waiting outside for word on the new baby.

'Tiny Tim' in Combat Debut

TOKYO — (AP) — The "Tiny Tim" a big new American 11.75-inch rocket, was used yesterday for the first time in real combat. Results were reported good.

Fired from a carrier-based U.S. Navy Corsair fighter plane, one of the armor-piercing rockets knocked out a bridge at Chungju, 90 miles northwest of Taegu, in its first war test, an official announcement from General MacArthur's headquarters said.

Other Corsairs using the Tiny Tim destroyed 13 enemy locomotives, damaged 23 more, blasted eight cars of ammunition, set two fuel-oil trains afire and strafed seven cars loaded with Communist soldiers.

The Tiny Tim is the second new rocket-launcher introduced in the Korean war. The first was the 3.5-inch, fired by a two-man team — a loader and a holder-aimer. It is fired only from the ground.

Both new ones are outgrowths of the original 2.36 bazooka developed during World War II.

The 2.36 and 3.5 are fired without recoil from a shouldered tube that looks like a kid's bazooka training instrument.

Despite its name, said a Navy spokesman, the rocket is "neither tiny nor timid." It has high explosive quality, he said. Apparently it is the most powerful rocket-type weapon carried by plane in combat.

European Force Formally Proposed

STRASBOURG, France — (AP) — Constantin Tsaldaris formally proposed today that Western European governments begin immediate negotiations for a unified army.

He asked the European council's consultative assembly to entrust its president, Paul-Henri Spaak of Belgium, with carrying out the first preliminary talks.

Talardis, former Greek premier, urged the assembly to "start the machinery in motion" for creation of the army proposed by Winston Churchill before the assembly last Friday.

Government Asks Revocation Of Communist Leaders' Bail

NEW YORK — (AP) — The government has asked a federal court to revoke the bail of the 11 convicted top U.S. Communist leaders and send them to jail as menaces to the nation's security.

The defendants must show cause here next Thursday why the government's motion should not be granted.

Attorney General J. Howard McGrath announced yesterday that the request was based on a Department of Justice affidavit which alleged that:

"There does not exist any substantial question as to the guilt of conviction, and the defendants have pursued and will continue to pursue a course of conduct and activity dangerous to the public welfare, safety and national security of the United States."

The Communist leaders have been sentenced to prison terms and fines for conspiring to advocate forcible overthrow of the government. All are free in bail except Eugene Dennis, general secretary of the American Communist party, who since his conviction to jail for a year in Washington, D.C., for contempt of Congress.

11 Apartments Being Built in Old Hospital

In a matter of weeks Pampa can boast another apartment building — an 11-unit building on the edge of the mid-town area.

The building — known for many years as Pampa Hospital — has not yet been named, but will include features other than apartments.

The apartment building is owned by a brother and two sisters, George Cass, Mrs. Carrie Sharp and Mrs. Pauline McGee, and will be operated by Mrs. Mildred Hill Clauder, executive secretary of the Pampa Chapter, American Red Cross.

According to present plans, the building will house 11 dwelling units, ranging from one-room apartments to four-room units.

On the second floor will be two four-room units, one three-room apartment, and two two-room apartments. On the first, or ground floor, will be two single room apartments, one three-room apartment and three two-room units.

The basement, tentatively, is to be fitted out as a large dining room to serve family style meals, a laundry for the tenants, and a beauty parlor. Mrs. Clauder will also have her personal apartment in the basement.

Mr. Cass, a Long Beach, Calif. interior decorator, is directing the renovation work that was contracted to T. J. Owens, Pampa contractor.

Mrs. Clauder said the building should be completed and ready for occupancy by Sept. 1. All flooring will be of asphalt tile except the hallways and the former operating room that are terrazzo floored. Renovation started on July 17 and installation of kitchen cabinets and other fixtures in the larger apartments has started.

Only the single unit and two-room apartments will be furnished Mrs. Clauder said this morning. The others will be unfurnished.

The Cass family was originally from Canyon but have moved to different states since then. Mr. Cass, at Long Beach; Mrs. McGee at San Bernardino and Mrs. Sharp at Denver, Colo.

The renovations, according to city engineering records, will cost approximately \$8,000.

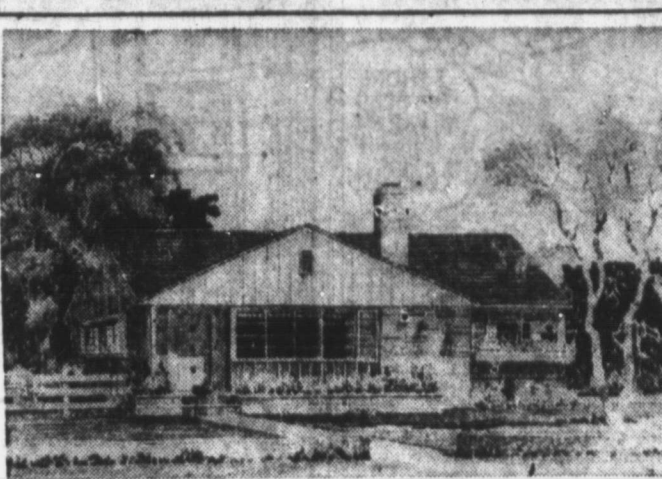
Yarbrough is a former member of the band and now plays flute for the Dallas Symphony Orchestra.

Ranch House With 2-Purpose Rooms

Special features in this attractive house include a stone planting box which extends the full length of the picture porch for weather protection. Exterior is a combination of stone, wood shingles, vertical boards and battens. The interior has 3-coat plaster walls, hardwood floors throughout and a handsome brick fireplace in the living-room. Walls and ceilings are fully insulated with mineral wool so that a smaller heating unit can be installed at a lower initial and operating cost.

New Home Costs Drop as Ability to Pay Goes Up

The average one-family house which sold for \$4,075 in 1940 costs the home-buyer \$8,950 today but he actually pays less for it, on the basis of his 1950 earnings, than he would have a decade ago, it is shown by a nation-wide study by the Construction Research Bureau national clearinghouse for building information.

In addition, his family will live in a home that is better designed, more fully protected from the elements and which contains considerably more "extras" in the form of work-saving electrical equipment than the same type of house had 10 years ago.

While building costs have risen on the average of 120 percent in the decade from 1940 to 1950, according to the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, wages have gone up 128 percent. Thus the man who had a weekly wage of \$25.20 in 1940 and now earns \$63.80, has a clear gain of 9 percent.

Moreover, with the aid of the Federal Housing Administration plan, he has twenty-five to thirty years to pay off the mortgage on his home, as against 1940's limit of twenty years.

When he makes his purchase in 1950, the home-owner will acquire a house which has picture

windows, landscaped grounds, mineral wool insulation to cut down heating bills, and usually a rumpus room and laundry. In addition to the stove and electric refrigerator she would have had in 1940, the home-maker will also enjoy an automatic dish-washer, an electric washing machine and dryer, and often even a television set, all included by the builder in the original sales price.

The prospective purchaser today has several extra sources of income besides his higher post-war weekly earnings, the survey discloses. Funds in savings and loan banks rose from six billions in 1940 to 14 1/2 billions this year. More than ten million persons also benefited by the \$148,625,000 semi-annual dividends distributed by saving associations in 1950.

To take care of government-required down payments, veterans who purchase homes this year can dip into the refunds they have received from National Service Life Insurance policies, which amount to \$2,800,000,000. To this sum, a number of states have also added bonuses.

Housing experts and economists believe that a good portion of the \$1,002,000,000 outstanding in Government D saving bonds which mature in 1950 will be redeemed by men and women who will buy homes this year.

Replacing Pane of Glass Is Simple 5-Step Procedure

The commonest of all window troubles is a broken pane of glass. But with care and attention to directions, it isn't too difficult a job to replace it.

Before replacing a broken pane, the old putty and glass must be thoroughly cleaned out of the recess. This can be done with a knife or, if the putty is very hard, with a chisel. Work from top to bottom of the opening, to avoid flying glass splinters and be careful not to mar the sash.

Smooth the wood off with sandpaper if there are lumps on it. Then, paint the exposed wood surfaces with linseed oil or primer. This helps the putty to stick to the bare wood.

The new glass should be one-eighth inch smaller each way than the opening into which it is to fit. Glass that is wedged in place cannot absorb shock and will crack if the window is closed with a bang.

Most glass sizes can be purchased from your local hardware store. However, if necessary to cut, paint the glass on a flat surface which has been covered with newspaper. Dip the glass cutter in kerosene so the cutting wheel will rotate and bite easily.

With a ruler as a guide, place the tip of your thumbnail at the exact dimension to be cut and hold this point at one corner of the glass. Take the glass cutter in other hand and place firmly against the edge of the ruler.

Moving both hands in unison bring the ruler and cutter toward you, exerting just enough pressure on the cutter to scratch the surface of the glass. If the cutter should slip, do not attempt to re-scratch the glass. Turn it over and make a new line on the other side.

To break the glass along the line, slip the notched shank of the cutter over the edge of the glass and apply a little pressure. If it does not readily break, tap it gently with the head of a screw driver until it does.

To break the glass in finally placed in position, apply a bed of putty all around the opening, about one-eighth inch thick.

The glass is placed on top of this back puttying and gently pressed in.

Next lay glazier's points (small zinc triangles) on the glass at the edges and tap them into the sash with the end of a screw driver or similar tool, sliding the tool over the surface of the glass to do so. There should be from two to five points in each side, the glass, depending upon its size.

Now take a wad of putty and roll it out into a rope about one-half inch in diameter. Lay the rope along the edge of the glass and press it firmly into place with a putty knife. Make a neat, triangular beading of the putty and be sure it adheres to the wood and metal. Putty marks can be cleaned from the glass with a cloth dampened with turpentine or gasoline.

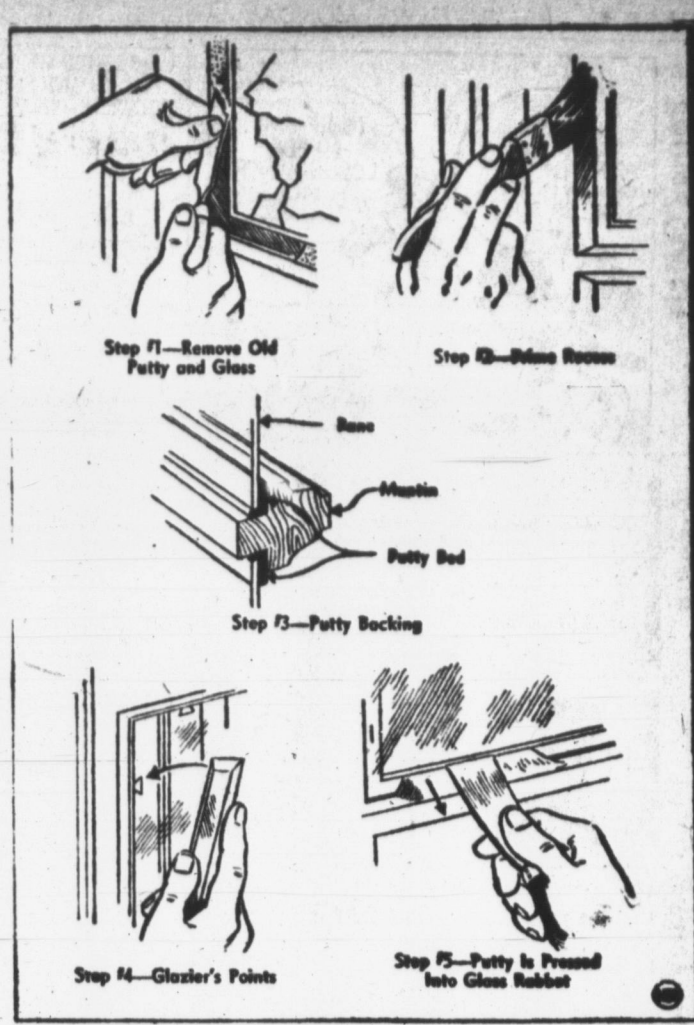
Allow the putty to dry for at least a week and then paint it to protect it from the weather. Overlap the paint about one-eighth inch onto the glass pane to form a seal between the glass and the putty.

Replacing glass in metal sash is the same procedure except spring clips or metal beads are used instead of glazier points.

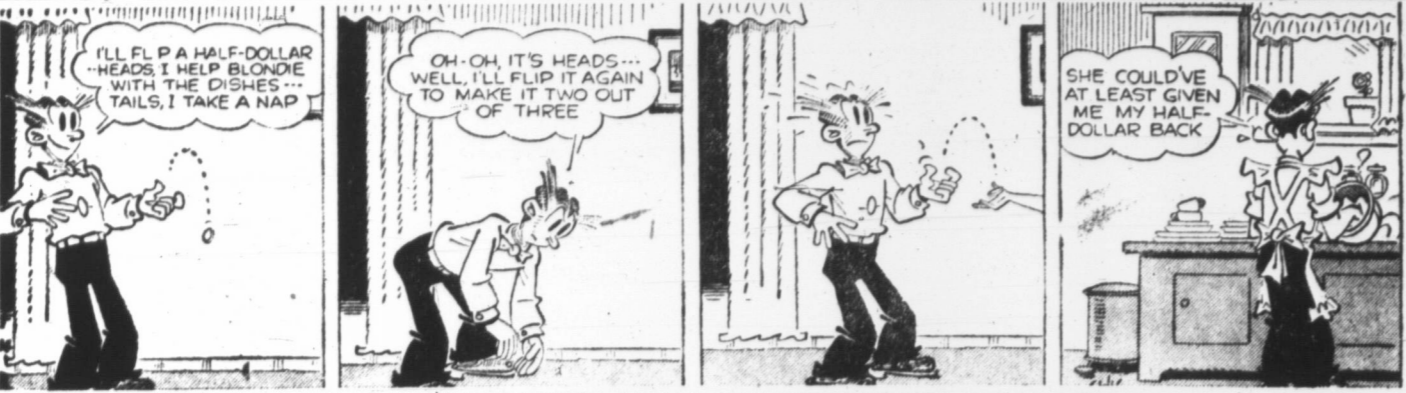

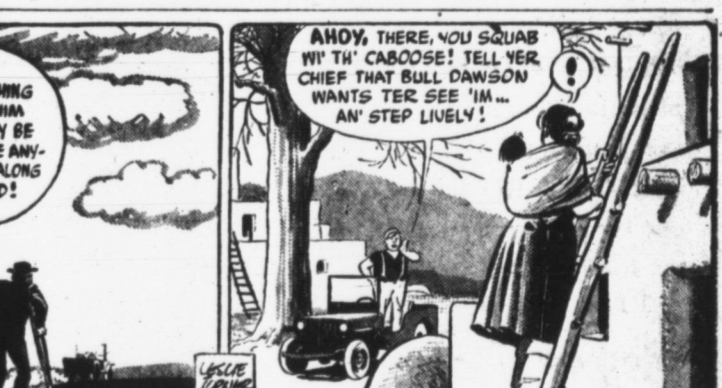

the gravity" of the world situation.

Martin accused the administration of a tendency to play politics with the nation's security, and asked:

"Can we wait until after the November elections to tell the people of America the real truth? Can we place votes first?"

Mr. Truman has said that if Congress gives him wage-price-ratting powers, he would like to have a free hand to invoke them. But he says he sees no need for those controls now.

The president also has said he did not ask for such authority because he did not want to touch off a controversy in Congress which would delay action on the other controls powers he wants quickly.

Those other powers would let the president allocate scarce industrial materials, require priority attention to defense contracts, take over privately owned plants when necessary, and control credit.

The Senate resumes debate on its bill today, with the major point at issue an amendment by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) which would require to Congress the right to say whether and when wage-price-ratting controls should go into effect. The bill would give Mr. Truman that right.

Several Republican senators already have come out against the Taft plan. Administration leaders have predicted it will be defeated and that the bill will be approved overwhelmingly with only minor amendments.

Present prospects are there will be no voting on amendments or the bill itself before Friday.

munists had managed to get artillery and possibly some tanks over the river.

As weather cleared after rain, Navy planes, firing new 11.75-inch rockets for the first time in anger, hit the Reds. They destroyed a bridge with the new weapon and blasted Communist tank and gun positions.

At the deep south anchor of the battleline, U. S. Marines took hills just outside rubbled Chinju. U. S. 25th infantry division troops poked through the hinterland looking for a battalion of Reds cut off by the smashing American offensive of last week that practically destroyed the Red sixth infantry division around Chinju.

At the other end of the 140-mile battleline, American infantry and tanks still held the U.S. airstrip six miles south of Pohang. No. 2 east coast port on the sea of Japan. Planes no longer used the field, however.

Pohang port was in the hands of a Red battalion but South Koreans were challenging them there; at Kigye, nine miles northwest, and at other points in the Pohang area.

Intelligence officers at General MacArthur's headquarters said both the Pohang onslaught and the Changnyong river crossing

Dr. Donaldson Named Head Of Chest X-Ray Drive Here

The steering committee of the coming tuberculosis chest X-ray project in Gray County has named Dr. J. M. Donaldson to head the drive to be held in Pampa in early October. Frank Wilson, last year's chairman, will be the vice-chairman.

Conducted over Texas by the state health department, the X-ray units will be in Pampa from Oct. 3 through 10. No X-rays will be made on Oct. 8, Sunday.

Officials said the main goal of the chest X-rays, given free to all persons on a voluntary basis, is to detect the early presence of tuberculosis. They emphasized that the free X-rays are not a form of charity.

The units will be set up at the American Legion Hall, it was stated at a recent meeting of the committee. Daily schedule for the chest examination will be from 9:30 a. m. to 6 p. m.

This will be the third straight year that the tuberculosis units have visited Pampa. Huelyn Laycock, secretary of the local drive, stated. He added that last year some 1,600 persons went through the chest X-ray process in one day.

The shot requires only about two minutes, technicians stated. And, as an added convenience, they said that a person does not have to remove clothing for the X-ray. However, he should remove all objects from his breast pockets.

The X-ray units will be in LeFors on Oct. 12 and will visit McLean on Oct. 14.

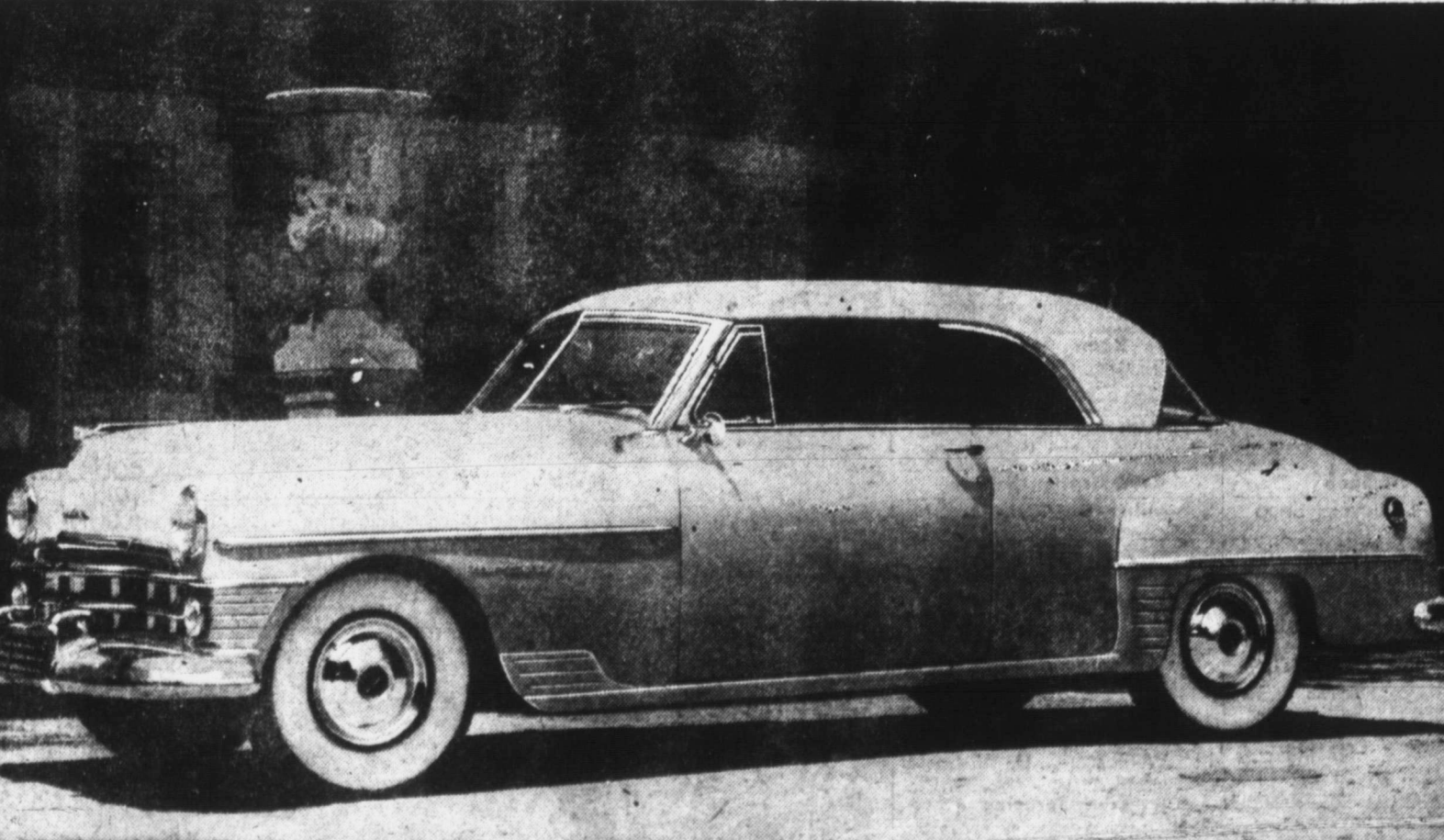
