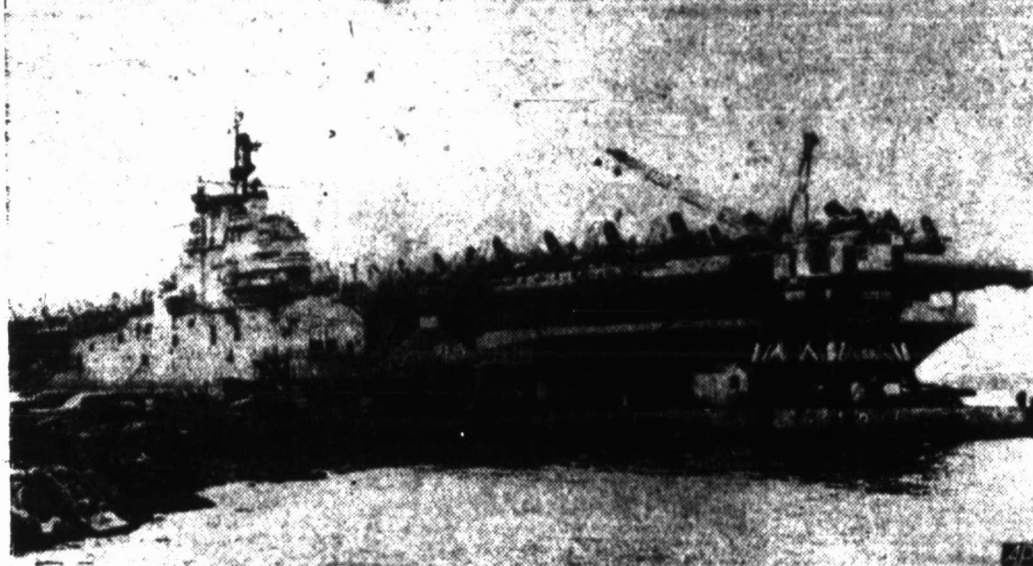

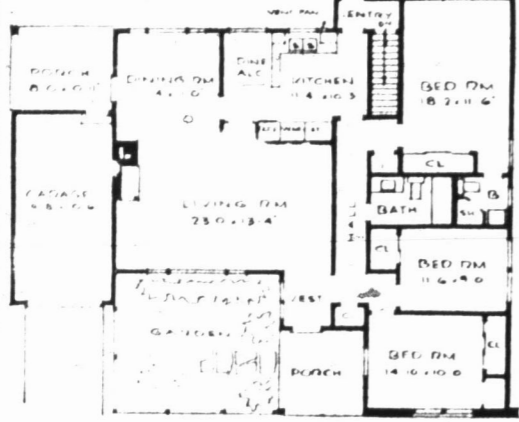

The other night I writes a you respondent in "Pampa News," Alabama, has side needed 10 points for the initial deal. Among the cards in my hand were: Two points, two tens and two sevens. Keep your eye on those sevens because they are what started the trouble.

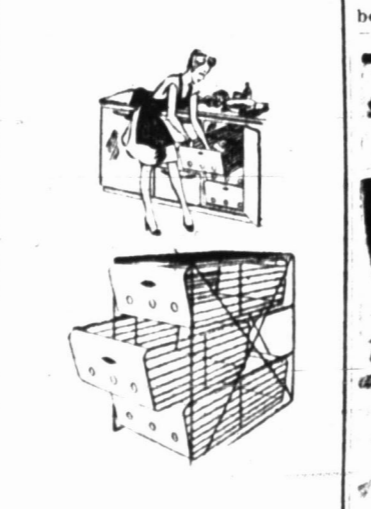
August is the open season for channel swimming, but this is a three times their normal strength guarded buildings, police service.

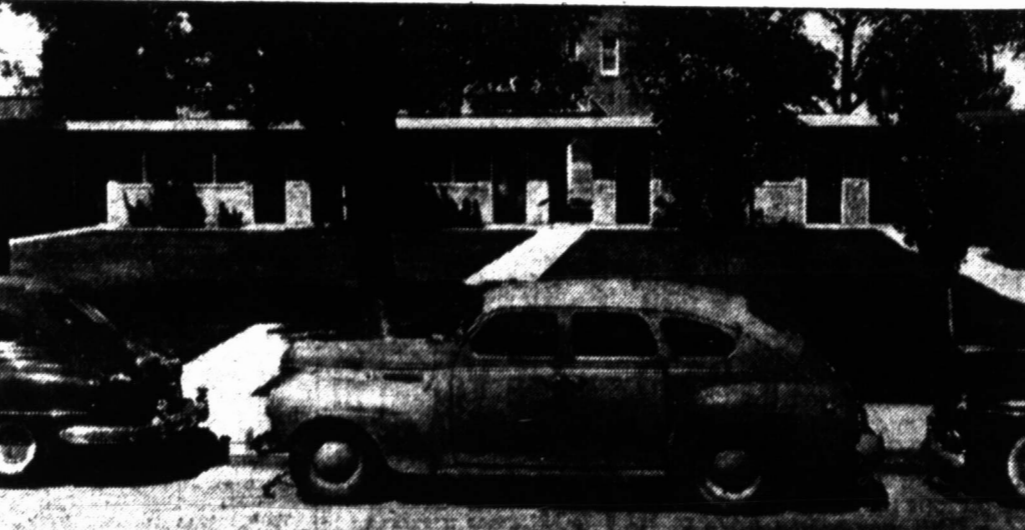

Channel is in for a terrific thrashing this season! The four-year-old, Russell Tongay, Jr., of Miami, Fla., swam a 22-mile stretch down the Mississippi on June 23, and his father, Tongay senior, says the lad will leave Miami around the first of August for France to attempt the channel swim.

The glamor glang among the candidates is Shirley May France, 17-year-old Somerset, Mass., school-girl, who last year failed by six miles in her attempt to span the channel. Sept. 6, the shapely damsel spent 57 days in rigorous training for the ordeal, and while bitterly disappointed, was not disheartened, but vowed she'd try again this year. She's now in Europe doing her training right in the channel, and under the sponsorship of NEA Service.

Gertrude Ederle was the first woman to swim across the English Channel, and the sixth person to accomplish the feat, first accomplished by Capt. Matthew Webb in 1875. Miss Ederle did the stunt in 1926, and there was tremendous hurrah and welcome for her when she returned to New York from her triumph.

But few remember that like Shirley May France, Gertrude Ederle also failed in her first attempt to conquer the treacherous channel. And Trudy herself believes the Somerset beauty will "win out" this time.

"Her previous experience will stand her in good stead," says Miss Ederle.

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Birmingham Reds Being Held on Vagrancy Charges

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Birmingham is making it tough on known Communists without visible means of support.

The chairman of the party in Alabama, Sam Hall, Jr., was arrested Saturday on charges of vagrancy and other arrests will follow, said Public Safety Commissioner E. C. Connor.

He estimated there are about 100 Communists in the Birmingham area.

Arrests will be confined to those against whom vagrancy charges can be pressed, he said. "Unfortunately," he added, "I won't be able to arrest those who have a visible means of support."

Hall was taken at his home. He told officers he was southern editor of the Daily Worker, Communist Party organ.

Police also arrested Paul Thomas Rose, alias Rosenbloom, 23, on charges of vagrancy and of changing his name to conceal his identity. He was listed as a native of Lakeland, N. J.

Both men were later freed on bond for trial tonight.

Rose was arrested while passing out circulars protesting U. S. intervention in Korea. Detective Captain C. L. Pierce reported. He said Rose admitted being a member of the Communist Party.

Arresting officers said Hall's home was a "regular warehouse of Communist propaganda."

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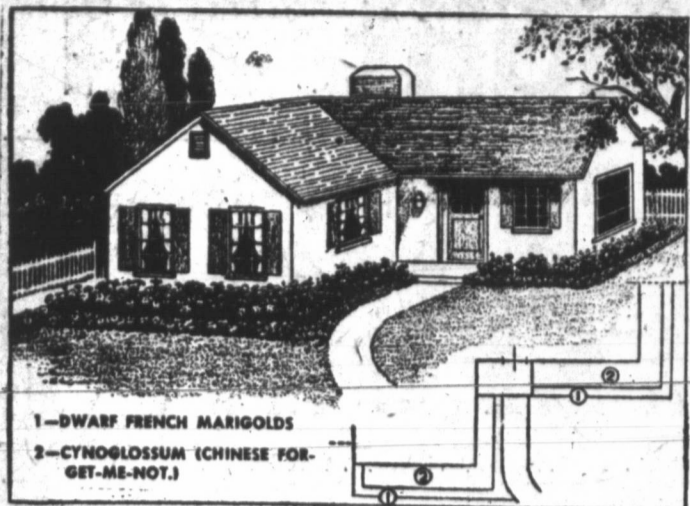
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Gay Flower Beds Replace Outmoded Landscape Style

By emphasizing the horizontal line, lower borders make small houses appear larger.

"Foundation planting," long considered a first step in landscaping American homes, is being rapidly outmoded by the disappearance of the foundations which were formerly planted to conceal.

When most homes stood upon a belt of brick or stone, out of harmony with the superstructure, the landscape architects advised that this belt be hidden by green plants, to "tie the house to the ground."

Since high building costs, and modern heating plants, have caused basements to be omitted from most new homes, the visible foundation line has disappeared, and the houses sit close to the surface with nothing to conceal.

In front of modern houses, shrubs and evergreens planted in the older fashion, quickly grow so tall as to screen the house from view, and shut off the outlook for the picture windows.

Landscape planting about a house should be a decoration, carefully planned to enhance the beauty of the building, completing an attractive picture as it is viewed from the street.

When tall trees dwarf the house, and ever-larger shrubs and evergreens hide it, and prevent the oc-

cupants from seeing out of the windows, the planting has not achieved its purpose.

Only low growing plants should be planted in front of low homes; and the brightly colored annuals of dwarf habit are becoming popular as the most suitable plants for this purpose. Their color gives a welcome touch, and they leave the view from windows unobstructed. Seed may be started early in seed-boxes indoors, and grown to a size suitable for transplanting by the time the soil can be prepared. There are many varieties which will grow quickly from seed sown directly in the border where the plants are to grow, and they will bloom until freezing weather comes in the fall.

Besides providing a decoration for the house, many annuals are suitable for cutting, to be used in the house.

Dwarf single and double French marigolds, as shown in the illustration, come in tones of orange, yellow and maroon, with several two-tone blends of these colors. Cymbalossium, or Chinese forget-me-not, used as a ribbon planting in the background, blooms freely all summer, retaining its lovely blue coloring in hot weather.

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Clogged Pipes Can Result in Costly Trouble

Few troubles cause greater inconvenience to the entire family than clogged drains and sewers. However, in most cases, clogged drains and traps are comparatively easy to clean.

Over a period of time, accumulations of grease, dirt, or other waste may tend to clog the traps under a sink, tub or lavatory. A suction plunger or plumber's friend can be used to break this sediment free and open the drain.

It is used by partly filling the bowl with water, placing the rubber cup over the drain, and working the handle up and down. This creates alternate suction and pressure that clears the obstruction.

When the trap is cleared so water runs freely, it is a good idea to use a strong drain-cleaning chemical. Use it with care as it burns badly if it gets on the skin.

Periodic use of these chemicals will prevent excessive accumulations of sediment. Also pouring a kettleful of boiling water into the kitchen sink drain every few days will go far toward preventing accumulations of grease.

Of course, avoid pouring grease or dumping coffee grounds into the sink drain, since these will tend to encrust in the pipes and trap.

Traps under a sink or lavatory can be cleaned either by removing the cleanout plug or where there is no plug, by unscrewing the two nuts that hold the trap.

Have a bucket under the trap when taking it off so the water won't spill on the floor. Brush the trap clean with a bottle brush or fasten a piece of cloth to the end of a piece of soft wire and pull the cloth through the trap.

Usually the matter clogging the trap will come out easily and little trouble will be encountered in doing the cleaning out job in this manner.

If the toilet-trap becomes clogged, a drain auger can be run down through the trap to clean it out.

Waste water backing up through the basement overflow drain indicates a clogged soil line from the house to the street sewer or to the septic tank in the case of an individual disposal system.

In unclogging a soil line, it is usually necessary to introduce a flexible steel strip auger and push it through the line until it meets and dislodges the obstruction.

The majority of stoppages in vitrified clay tile soil line are caused by tree roots. Such root growths can be cut out or loosened with a special auger that has a cutting tool on the end. Many plumbers have these devices and will perform this job for a reasonable fee.

Tree roots can be discouraged by occasionally flushing a pound of copper sulphate down the toilet. Repeated applications of caustic drain-cleaning chemicals are also effective in burning and eating away tree roots.

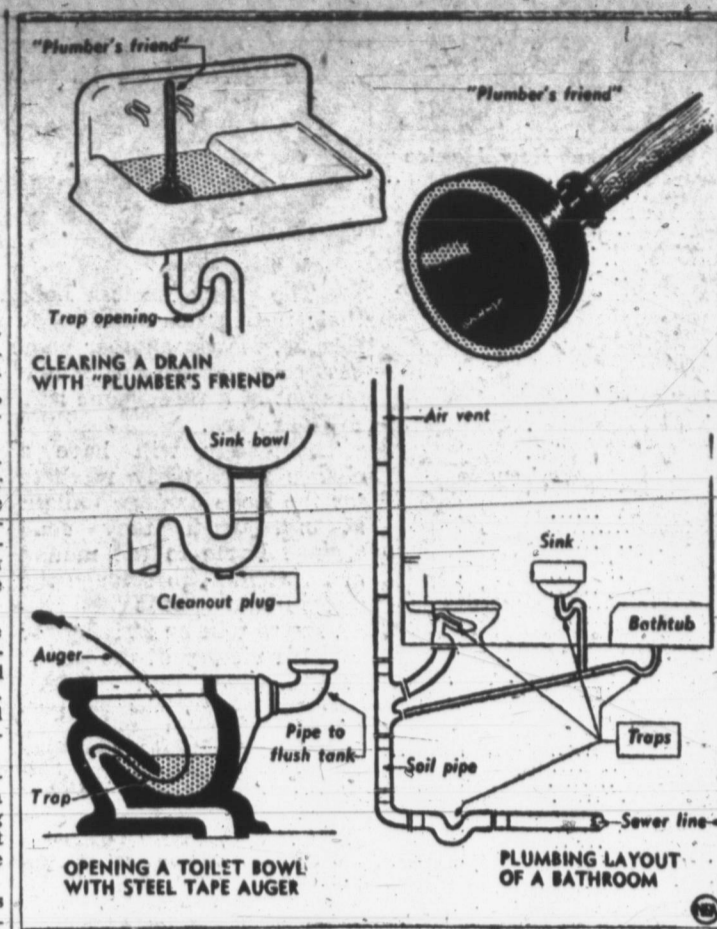
Three Killed in Bus Wreck

GREENVILLE, Ill. (AP)—Three persons were killed and 32 were injured in a collision yesterday of an automobile and a Greyhound bus which overturned and scattered all but one of its 40 passengers in a cornfield.

The bus was split open and its top sheared off as it rolled over. Driver John L. Burk of Indianapolis said he was traveling "at about usual speed" when he approached an intersection a mile south of here and saw the car crossing the highway "a split second before the crash."

The dead are Mrs. Beasie Arrp, 65, of St. Louis, and Mrs. Ellen J. Hobbs, about 25, of Mt. Vernon, Ohio, bus passengers, and Victor H. Bilyeu, of Sorento, Ill., driver of the car.

William Brown, 79, of Albuquerque, N. M., suffered critical internal injuries. All the injured were taken to hospitals at nearby Highland and Vandalia.

Jessup Sees No Question on Who Began Korean Invasion

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP)—Ambassador-at-Large Philip C. Jessup declared today there can never be any serious question about who started the Korean war.

Despite the "flood of lies" which has poured from the Communists, he said, the record proves that they were the aggressors.

"The North Korean Communist forces attacked the Republic of Korea without warning, without provocation, without any justification whatsoever," Jessup declared. "It has never been more true than in this case that actions speak louder than words."

"Communist peace propaganda has sought to lull the peoples of the free world at the very moment when Communist imperialism was preparing and launching this war of aggression."

Jessup discussed the Korean situation in a talk for the 17th session of the Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Virginia.

He called the attack on Korea "the most bare-faced attack on the United Nations itself," recalling that the U. N. had helped to set up the South Korean government.

"An assault upon the United Nations headquarters at Lake Success could hardly have been more direct or more revealing," Jessup said.

On another aspect of Communist propaganda, he declared it is common practice for the Reds to accuse others "of the sins which they themselves have committed."

"It is therefore not surprising," he added, "that they accuse the United States of imperialism in Asia, because the Russian imperialistic design is the same in Asia as it was under the czars."

"The Soviet encroachments upon Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria, Mongolia, Sinkiang and elsewhere have frequently been pointed out."

"The experience of so-called Communist 'liberation' of strongly nationalist states like Poland, Czechoslovakia, Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia holds out the gloomiest prospects for the peoples of Asia."

"The Philippines, India, Pakistan, Ceylon, Burma and Indonesia have all emerged into full separate statehood."

"Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam have become independent members of the French union. Once again the record is the proof to which we turn. The Communist propaganda cannot wipe out the facts."

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William C. Posey Dies at Home Here

New Dam Creates 200 DP's As Old Settlement Flooded

WALLULA, Wash. —(NEA)— "I don't know where to go."

Like displaced persons the world over, the 200 inhabitants of Wallula must find new homes next year.

Water, not bombs, is responsible for the evacuation of one of the state's oldest settlements.

To satisfy the Northwest's growing need for power and navigation facilities, the corps of engineers is constructing McNary Dam on the Columbia River near Umatilla, Ore. Plans call for the dam to be in operation by 1953. Water backed up by the dam will flood the small railroad village.

Located near Old Fort Walla Walla which was founded in 1817, the town has always been a rough and ready place.

"Years ago," one old-timer boasts, "this town had the longest bar in the state and one of the smallest jails in the world. But that jail was mighty."

Chief income for the town was derived from the freight and transportation companies who used the town as a transfer point.

At first a landing site where river boats transferred their cargoes to freight wagons, the town later became a rail center.

"Mules and horse teams would line up for a mile waiting to be loaded with cargo from the boats," F. Lindley, a native, remembers.

"Wagon teams carried freight as far north as Montana."

When the railroads reached Wallula, the town's population dropped almost 100 percent.

"The first railroad didn't have too much success," a former agent recalls. "It was a 'rawhide' line built by the Baker Railroad Co. in 1875. One bitter winter in the '70's, hungry coyotes ate the rawhide off the tracks and put the company out of operation."

At present the Union Pacific and Northern Pacific railroads use the town as an icing and freight transfer point. No one has reported any trouble with coyotes in recent years.

Edward K. Ross, the town's justice of the peace and an early

settler, is waiting to see what the two railroads do. "They have to relocate their tracks. Most of us hope they'll keep some kind of installation nearby."

An elementary school built at a cost of \$30,000 will be destroyed. "It's too bad we didn't know about the dam before we built the school," Mrs. Anna Cherry laments.

Most of the residents are resigned to the upheaval. Some are resentful. All of them agree, "You can't stop progress."

The government has appraised the land, and settlements will be made with the landowners.

"The payments are fair," the justice of the peace said, "but there are some things that can't be appraised by government agents."

"Who can pay for the memories and associations that will be drowned? No one can buy a sunset with the sun's rays coloring the rocks on the bluff across the river."

"I'm old—past 85. The town is old—more than 100 years. Maybe it's time we both quit."

A few old-timers who speak Indian shake their heads guiltily. "We should have, known better," they say.

Wallula is Indian for "abundance of water."

McCormick is president of the Knox County Farm Bureau and is a member of the board of directors of the Indiana Farm Bureau.

The National Farm Bureau Federation has been a sharp critic of the controversial farm plan advocated by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan. McCormick's attitude toward the Brannan Plan was not known to sources immediately reachable here.

It was believed that the fire smothered itself due to a lack of air.

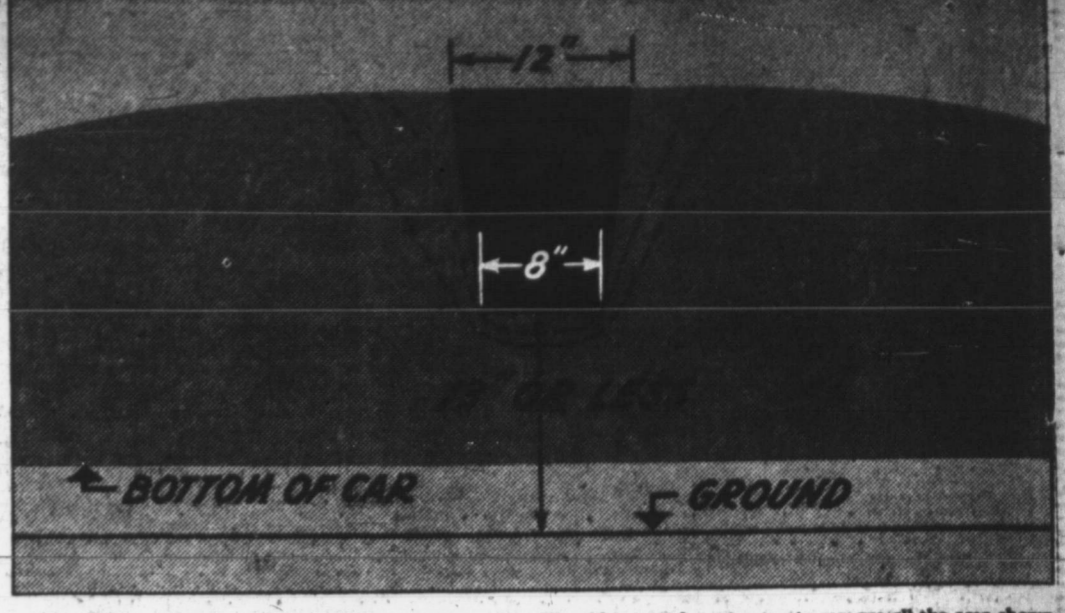
Firemen reported that a fire of this nature will ordinarily cause an explosion due to the lack of oxygen consumed by the intense heat caused by the fire.

rean troops on the peninsula carried them to within 20 air miles of Taejon. MacArthur said the Reds were at Chochiwon, a rail junction.

Taejon is the temporary capital of the South Korean government. But even as these reverses were reported, Lt. Gen. George E. Stratemeyer said in a Tokyo interview that combined air, sea and ground forces of the allies had stopped the Communist drive that had rolled relentlessly for two weeks.

Cockpits in 1950 Derby Cars Are to Be Open, Rules State

Boys! You must be especially careful to conform to the official rule book when you design and build the cockpit of your 1950 racing car.

An open cockpit will be the style for '50. This gives every boy plenty of room in which to steer his car properly.

The new rules state that the cockpit must be large enough for the driver to get in or out without removing the steering wheel and without removing a section of the body. The cockpit must be open at the top, and the edge of the cockpit must be padded or covered to avoid any rough spots.

The side of the cockpit must be open and cut away so as to have an open body area at least 12 inches wide at the top and eight inches wide at the bottom. The bottom of this opening must be not more than 13 inches from the ground, measured when the car is empty.

The accompanying rule book drawing gives a good idea of the full meaning of this rule. The

cockpit opening must be at least as large as the area shown in black. This is part of the rule, and the opening may not be smaller than the black area at any point.

The opening may, however, be larger than the black area, and may be of different shape, as suggested by the dotted lines in the drawing. Any other shape is permissible.

If you follow this rule carefully, boys, you will not have any trouble passing inspection.

miles north of Fullerton in East Central Nebraska.

But York, about 40 miles southeast of Fullerton, took the brunt of the fabulous downpour. While water in the government weather observer's rain gauge climbed to 13-1/2 inches, overflow from Beaver Creek, normally about six feet wide, spread over approximately one-fourth of the city of some 6,000 persons.

About 200 residents of the south part of town were rescued by boat and truck. The National Guardsmen were called out, temporary shelter was provided in the city auditorium and the Red Cross put its disaster relief machinery in full operation.

Hard hit also was Beaver Crossing, a town of about 550 some 20 miles southeast of York. Approximately one-fourth of the town was flooded. National Guardsmen, employing "ducks" (amphibious vehicles) helped with evacuations. Beaver Crossing itself received less than two inches of rain but runoff water piled up around the town.

The water, quick to come up, was quick to subside.

al Democratic "big four"—Rayburn, Vice President Barkley, Senate Leader McNamara, and House Leader McCormack (Mass.)—of the joint chiefs of staff, was called in and gave them a general summary of the Korean situation. Lucas told reporters: "We didn't learn anything except what is in the newspapers."

He said there was no discussion of whether Congress should stay in session until the military problem in Korea is clarified.

"As far as we know," Lucas added, "we are still headed for adjournment on July 31, but with the qualification that if the Korean situation becomes critical, we will stay on."

Byrd told reporters he sees no reason why some more fat can't be trimmed off domestic activities in the \$34,700,000,000 single-package money bill the Senate starts debating tomorrow.

"Purely domestic expenditures have been increased 77 percent since 1948," Byrd said. "With a war on our hands, some of these outlays must be cut or we are going to spend ourselves into the kind of bankruptcy the Russians are counting on."

Byrd was promised help in his economy drive by a group of Republicans who backed a personnel and travel-trimming amendment rejected Saturday by the Senate appropriations committee when it approved the huge money bill. The amendment would not affect military outlays.

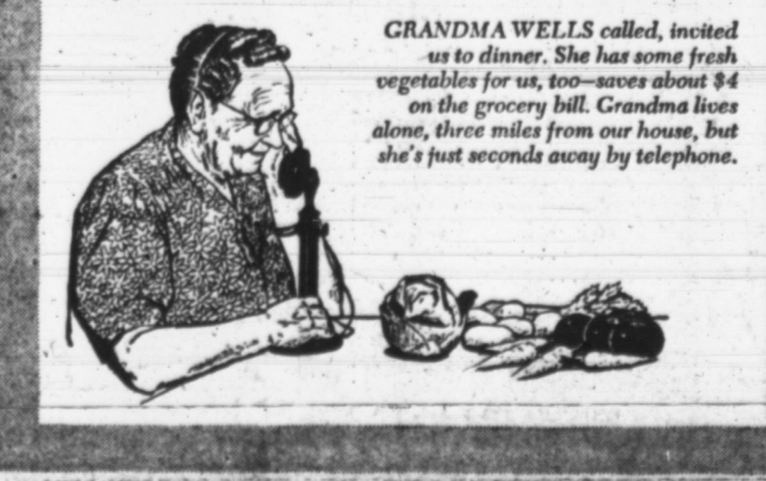

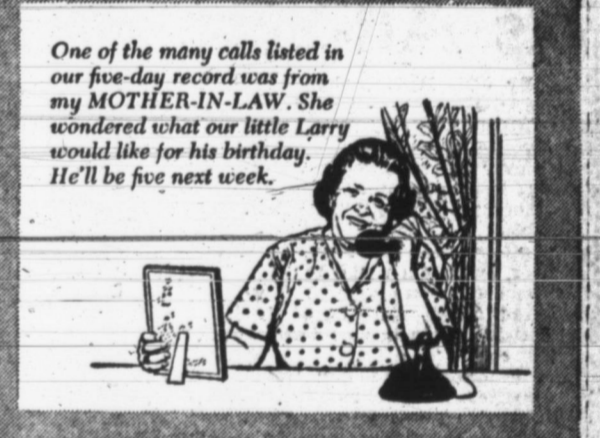

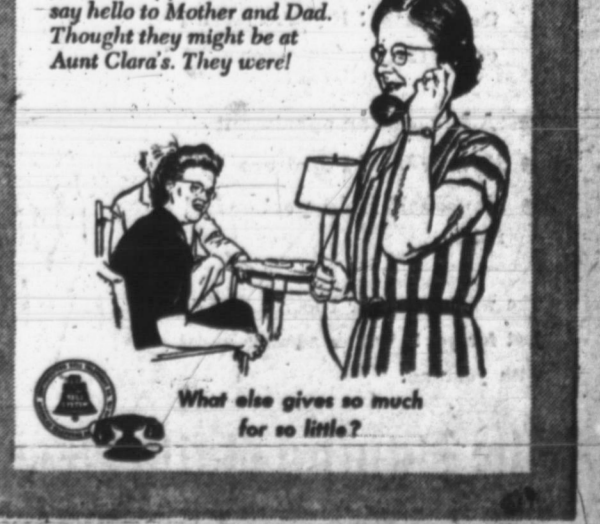

Child Needs a Time for Self

One thing that has helped parents and children perhaps more than any other is giving a child the kind of time he really needs. Time when he is the center of things. Time when you and he are alone together and when there is chance for intimate talk or play.

This is the time, says Dorothy W. Baruch, psychologist and consultant in child guidance, when many things can be done to bring out the "bad" feelings in acceptable ways.

"When this time is arranged and set aside for a child to count on, he doesn't have to grab so much time and attention during other parts of the day," she writes in "How To Discipline Your Children," a pamphlet of the Public Affairs Committee (New York, 20 cents).

As examples Dr. Baruch cited seven-year-old Nell who says: "The only time my mother ever used to pay me attention, was when she was getting me to do things. Then I'd argue and make it stretch like elastic. But now we've got real time together. Every day."

"It's arranged time, not snatched time," explains twelve-year-old Barbara. "So you get a more rested-up feeling. If you get the bad things out easy, it's rough."

Continuing her description, Dr. Baruch explains that Barbara's mother had started their time by telling her, "We're going to have time, together, every day. I'm setting aside half an hour just for you alone. No knitting. No darning. It'll be our time or secrets. You can't tell the mean things that we wouldn't want to talk about in front of grandma or the neighbors. And I'll honestly listen."

Not matter how young a child is, says Dr. Baruch, labeling the time as "your time alone" seems to carry special significance. It's like a box of candy marked especially for you. It gives him a chance to get all the "bad" things off his chest and leave less to be stored up and to pop out in misbehavior during the day.

"This special time worked both ways," says Dr. Baruch. "It's sometimes helpful for parents to share their 'bad' feelings also. I've said Peter's mother, 'I've plenty to get off my chest too.'"

"Okay, Mom, shoot," replies ten-year-old Peter.

"I'm really mad at you. You haven't fed your rabbits. It's no use keeping them. I'm going to kill them and serve them for dinner. . . and she raved on and on."

When she finally finished, Peter nodded. "There! Don't you feel better? Now I can feed my rabbits in peace."

Said fourteen-year-old Ruth's mother, "I blazes. Better stay out of my way till I get over it. It's really not that you're as bad as I've been saying."

Get 'in the Swim' and Splash Your Worries Away

Swimming's one sport that's not restricted to the experts. Even if dunking dog-paddling is the limit of your skill, your time in the water can be as healthful, happy and beautifying as that of the girl with the perfect stroke.

Not only is swimming fun, but it is a pleasant and effective way to exercise. In as short a period as a two-weeks' vacation you can, by applying yourself to swimming and water play, slim down your bulges and improve your muscle tone.

Since the water is buoyant, it supports much of the weight of your body while you devote most of your energy to the health or beauty improvement you're seeking.

The flutter kick is an old standby for melting down excess poundage on hips or thighs. It works equally well as a part of your swimming stroke or as a concentrated side-of-the-pool exercise. At the beach or in mid-pool a ball or life preserver can be used to provide support.

Although a shallow splashy flutter is fun, a submerged kick should be used for serious slimming. This is more difficult, but it is also more effective.

To provide a good workout for all your unused leg and foot muscles, vary this exercise by turning first on your stomach and then on your back.

The breast stroke may be used to hold your arms into a new channel and to develop the pectoral muscles that support your bosom. This movement serves not only the girl who streaks through the water in seconds flat, but the non-swimmer as well. By wading out into chest-deep water, you can propel your arms through the same stroke and derive the same benefits, provided you put real force into the motion.

By leaping the waves as they roll up the beach, or by simply jumping up and down in the shallow end of the pool, you can strengthen the muscles in your calf. After such a tanning up you can return after vacation to your regular duties with spring in your walk and renewed confidence in your appearance.

Look upon every day as the whole of life, not merely as a section; and enjoy and improve the present without wishing, through haste, to rush on to another.

NEW YORK In Honolulu, com-

surprise attack by an enemy no
more fanatical than the Soviet
Union in the formalities of starting
war.

The constitutional or statutory
"right" of employees to bargain
collectively is actually a denial
of many legitimate rights and is
not a right itself. Under the
normal laws of the United States
the individual states, individuals
do have a right to act in
concert for legitimate purposes.
To get a raise in wages is a
legitimate aim so two or more
persons, obviously, need no spe-
cial enactment to assert that
right. The same cannot be said
for the further aims and ac-
tivities of unions. Nevertheless,
the "right" of collective bargain-
ing is now used for the ulterior
and pernicious purposes of cor-
rupting public elections by the
use of slush funds, curtailing pro-
duction, interfering with inter-
state commerce, carrying on in-
ternational espionage for or
dueling international politicians,
and other propaganda and grant-
ing financial subsidies to foreign
governments.

These are not all the ulterior
and pernicious purposes which
are served by the power of col-
lective bargaining as enacted by
Congress. They will suffice, how-
ever, to prove that this "right"
when put in constitutional or
statutory form serves no legiti-
mate purpose of the individual
citizens who comprise "labor."
It serves union bosses who are
variously thieves, brutal thugs,
political racketeers, Communist
traitors and other types of dic-
tators. Through some of the latter
do make a vast display of tes-
timony by causing laudatory
matter and many pictures of
themselves to be published in
their official journals at the ex-
pense of their subjects; they are
in actual fact despots. These
take generously are a L.I.A.L.L.

written from the subjects.

Q—Is beer harmful to someone

China's Periodicals, Readers Declining

HONG KONG — (AP) — Communist China's newspapers are becoming fewer and so, apparently, are their readers. A correspondent writing from China's great Yangtze Valley says the latest official figures put the number of periodicals at 253, including 175 daily newspapers. He estimated their combined circulation at 2,500,000. Under the Nationalists there were about 3,000 periodicals in China with a circulation of around 50,000,000. The correspondent wrote that readers got tired of a daily fare in the Communist papers of "monotonous meetings of government organs, of factory workers, of school children, etc." of celebrations of Communist anniversaries, of interviews with workers, students and the like supporting government decrees and of war against imperialist aggressors and the diabolical wickedness of American imperialism.

'Hero' of Famed Evolution Trial Leading Quiet Life

DAYTON, Tenn. — (AP) — The central figure in the famed "evolution" trial a quarter of a century ago now lives in Shreveport, La.

He is John Thomas Scopes, a 24-year-old high school biology teacher when he decided to test a new Tennessee law banning the teaching of evolution — that man descended from a lower order of animals. The trial started 25 years ago on July 10, and this sleepy little town (pop. 5,318 by the 1950 census) never saw anything like it before or since.

There was William Jennings Bryan, silver-tongued defender of fundamentalism, ex-secretary of state and three times the Democratic nominee for president. There was Clarence Darrow, scowling, brilliant, agnostic attorney who lately had made headlines in the Loeb-Leopold trial.

Side issues and technicalities occupied the first 10 days of trial. Two high school students testified Scopes had taught evolution. On the eleventh day, Circuit Judge John Raulston moved the trial out to the court house lawn so more people could watch.

A jury of 11 farmers and a clerk quickly convicted Scopes. The judge fined him \$100. Later the Tennessee Supreme Court upheld Raulston in ruling the law constitutional, but Scopes did not have to pay the \$100 fine. The court reversed the conviction on the grounds the trial judge could not assess a fine of

Fight Looming For Votes in South Carolina

COLUMBIA, S. C. — (AP) — A State's Rights champion openly snubbed by President Truman will try to unseat Sen. Olin D. Johnston in Tuesday's Democratic primary in South Carolina.

And James F. Byrnes seeks a political comeback in the governor's race. Gov. J. Strom Thurmond the 1948 State's Rights presidential candidate, vigorously denounced Johnston's record during a heated county-to-county campaign tour. Both candidates spoke from the same platform and charges of "liar" were hurled. Fists were shaken in each other's face.

Byrnes' three opponents heaped criticism upon the former secretary of state and Supreme Court justice. He ignored them and ran upon his record. The three are Thomas H. Pope of Newberry, speaker of state house of representatives; Lester L. Bates of Columbia, insurance executive; and Marcus A. Stone of Florence and Dillon, a lumberman.

Party voters in this overwhelmingly Democratic state also will nominate four U. S. representatives, four state constitutional officers, and scores of lesser office holders.

An estimated 500,000 voters are registered — about 73,000 of them Negroes. State Democratic Chairman W. F. Baskin predicts 400,000 votes will be cast.

The Johnston-Thurmond scrap was enlivened by the issues of racial segregation, loyalty to the national Democratic party, civil rights, federal aid to education and Marshall Plan aid to Europe.

Both shouted that they favor segregation and oppose the president's fair employment practices stand. Johnston claimed that issues should be settled within the party and that he always has been a loyal Democrat.

Air Guard Gets First Jet Planes

DALLAS — (AP) — The Texas Air National Guard has received its first jet fighter planes. Four of the F-84 "Thunderjets" were ferried to Hensley Field from Long Island, New York, by regular Air Force pilots. They arrived yesterday.

The new planes were assigned to the 181st fighter squadron, based in Dallas. Officials said more of the jet planes will arrive in the next few days.

Ceylon Reverses Stand on Korea

COLOMBO, Ceylon — (AP) — Ceylon's government has announced a hands-off policy toward the fighting in Korea, reversing a previous promise of support for South Korea.

Premier D. S. Senanayake told Parliament the Korean conflict was an internal affair, and Ceylon would have nothing to do with it.

Earlier a government spokesman had announced approval of United Nations military action on behalf of South Korea and said the commonwealth — which is not a U. N. member — would follow the foreign policy of the United States.

Bette Davis' Ex To Marry Soon

LAGUNA BEACH, Calif. — (AP) — August 6 is the date set by William Grant Sherry, Bette Davis' ex-husband, for his marriage to his former mistress, Marion Richards.

Miss Richards, 23, was formerly nursemaid to the three-year-old daughter of Sherry and Miss Davis. The pair's divorce, Sherry, 38, artist, in Jaurez, Mexico, July 4. The Sherry-Richards wedding will be held in St. Francis by the Sea Chapel here.

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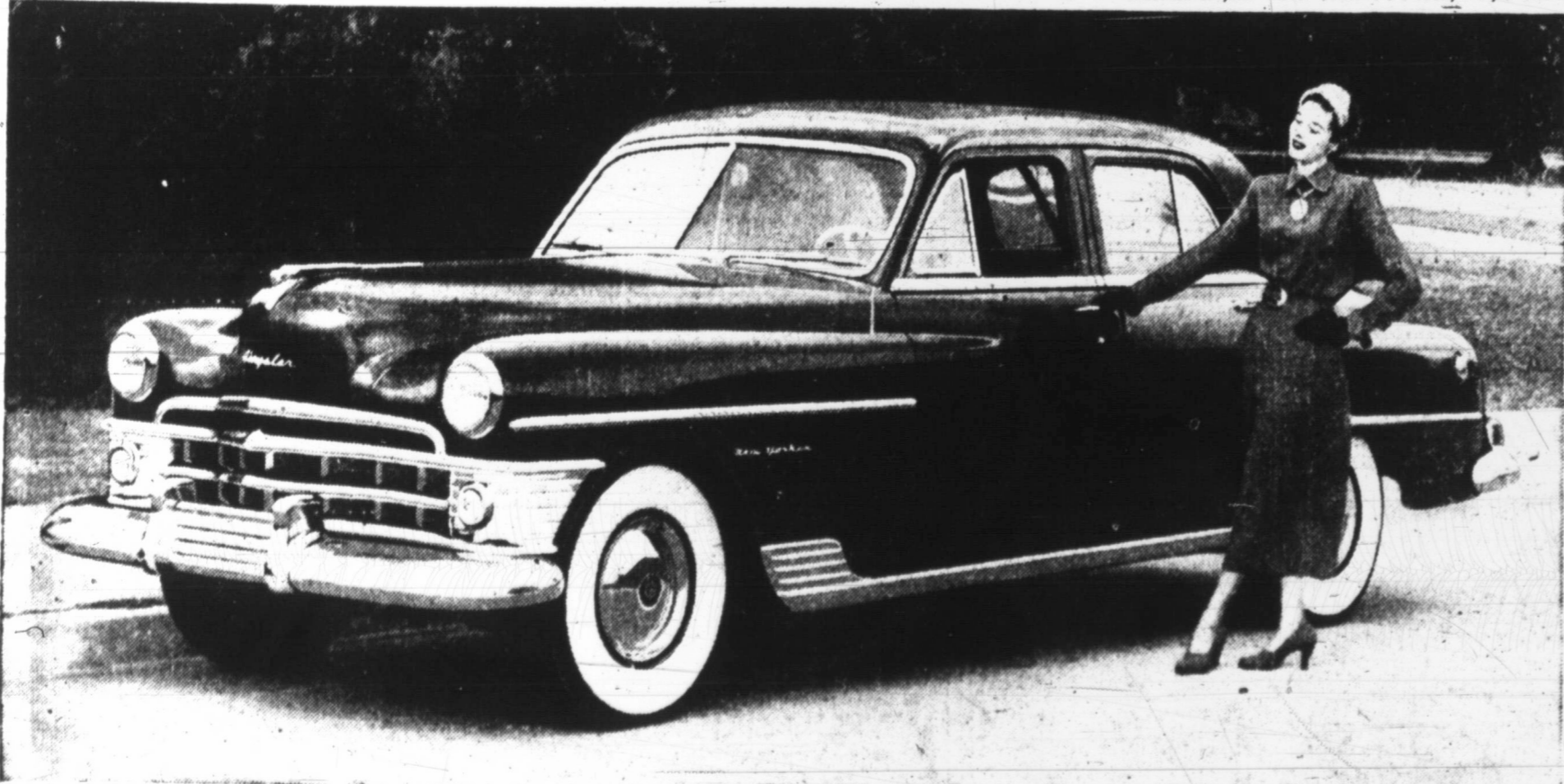
