WASHINGTON - (A) A crucial decision on a billiondollar-plus excise tax slashing oill which may determine whether it is "veto-proof" has been set for Monday.

The House Ways and Means Committee will vote then on proposals for a \$500,000,000 yearly poost in taxes on big corporation o offset the prospective revenue loss in excises. President Truman has demanded such offsetting in-creases, if the bill is to get his

1. Slash excise imposts by over \$1,000,000,000 on jewelry, furs, luggage, cosmetics, telephones, movie ickets, travel tickets, baby bottle warmers and scores of other items. 2. Increase the corporation inome tax rate from the present 38 percent to perhaps 41 percent with other revisions which would mean larger taxes for only the 10 percent of corporations with annual earnings of \$120,000 or more — and perhaps tax relief for some corporation in the smaller income brackets.

A. A 10 percent withholding tax on corporation dividends, calculated to bring in \$170,000,000 additionally annually from persons who dodge their taxes on such income or just forget to report them.



Was there any such thing as "fine American china"? There was! The great beauty and amazing durability of the Lenox service was proof. In fact, only four pieces of this 1,700 piece set were broken in an eight-year period!

The Spanish Minister dines from one of the richest of heavy etched gold and subtle leaf green bordering the Spanish crest.






oyalty too, has recognized Lenox. In 1947, King Faisal of Saudi Arabia requested the finest of services to be used among the regal furnishings of the Arabian palace. A magnificent service was created of embossed 24-k gold bordered by rich maroon—a royal dinner set that cost more than \$30,000! One of the most famous "command performance" services was made for special exhibit in the world-renowned Metropolitan Museum of Art. They wished the finest example of the potter's art, and the service plates created for them are breath-taking in their beauty. Rich, hand-applied 24-k. gold adds great drama to the magnificent glowing blue of the border panels. These famous \$18,000-a-dozen service plates have been exhibited in many museums. Still other Lenox china has made museum history. The first American china exhibited at the famed Ceramic Museum in Sevres, France was a lovely coffee set by Lenox. It is still on exhibit, still the only American china so honored.





If a Lenox plate could tell a story, many "command performance" services could spin fascinating yarns. One of the most interesting might come from the Lenox china that survived the San Francisco earthquake and fire. The plates were blackened from the tremendous heat, but the shape is the same and the body of the ware is as good as the day it was made! To return to present times, in 1939 it was imperative that a special fine china service be created for the use of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth of England during their visit to the United States, Lenox was again called in, and designed the famous service of 48 golden stars on a lustrous ivory background. This beautiful service was kept thereafter in the Federal Building at the World's Fair for the exclusive use of visiting dignitaries.




LENOX CHINA

he plate pictured above is the dinner plate of the President Wilson service. Since Woodrow Wilson's administration, Lenox has been the official White House china. Lenox was re-ordered by Franklin Roosevelt in 1932 for the Presidential service. The center circle and border are 24-k, etched gold, the latter having 48 stars. The President's seal has been done in raised gold on an ivory border. The strict formality of the pattern was typical of the services of that period.





While freezing foods is a very occular method of preserving in this community, preservation by canning has an exciting future. Canning vegetables and other oods with tiny amounts of the antibiotic subtilin, plus a milder heat treatment than is ordinarily used has proved successful preliminary trials by U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists at the Bureau of Agricultural and Industrial Chemistry's Western Research Laboratory in Albany,

Adding a very small amount f subtilin makes it possible to sterilize foods with milder heat (212 degrees F, or lower) in 5 to 0 minutes, scientists report. Caning with subtilin or other antihiotics may eventually help comcosts and give canned foods of resher quality - possible adaptation of the process to home canning appears to be rather far in future. This being the case, canning vegetables and meat in a ressure canner and fruits in a vater bath will be the accepted ractice. 



Early Freeze Can Pay Off

That information may be very Mrs the pack during the early stages of a hand. Such a freeze is often just an out and out gamble. There are times, however, when an early freeze is the correct play. For example, suppose one oppo-nent melds five or six cards from his hand, whereupon the other opponent also melds a few cards from his hand. instead of just a small hand. If the opponents fail to meld out in a hurry, you or your part-ner should be able to take the pile in a short time. Then, by reasonably careful discarding, you can probably keep picking up the nile until the hand ends. With average luck, you can run up a

This, of course, is a situation that you should be able to bring about only against poor players. Good players will avoid depleting their hands during the early rounds unless they expect to

meld out very quickly.

Even when only one opponent depletes his hand you may still have a sound early freeze. For example, suppose both sides need 90 points for the initial meld, and that the opponent at your right melds three aces and jackjack-deuce from his hand. After his discard, he holds only five cards. You hold a miserable hand, containing practically no pairs and only one deuce. You have two black threes and one other discard that you believe to be safe. Should you freeze?

This is not a bad freeze. You are completely safe for three rounds, with your deuce and your two black threes. After that you still have the other discard that you believe to be safe. By the time you have made four plays, the discards will tell you what else is safe.

In the meantime, your partner should have no trouble. He is discarding to a five card hand, which should be easy enough. There is an excellent chance that he can build up the minimum count and get the pack. If he doesn't, you may be lucky enough to draw a joker and build up the count yourself.

You might ask: "Why freeze the pack? Why not just discard a black three? Then discard your other black three at the next turn. Later on, you can decide whether or not to freeze."




