

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

The Finesse Guess Can Be a Real Mental Workout

When this hand was played in a rubber bridge game at the club recently, writes a Richmond, Va., "declarer took a long time out for thought at one point. This puzzled me, as I shall soon explain."
West opened the King of spades, and South won with the ace. South then drew two rounds of trumps. West discarded a low spade. South, continued with a matter of third round of trumps, and West discarded the deuce of diamonds.

Declarer cashed the top clubs and led his remaining spade. West won with the jack of spades, and led back the queen of spades. East discarded a club on the third round of spades.
"After South had ruffed the third round of spades, he led the rest of his trumps. Both defenders discarded their clubs on these tricks. At this point it was clear that each hand held three diamonds and South had to guess which defender had the queen in order to make his slam.
This particular player does not put on an act when he plays bridge. Out on this occasion he sat and thought for three and a half minutes before making a play. It seemed like a year!
"What can a player find to think about in all that time?"
If East is a good player, he is no problem. His discard of the deuce of diamonds should indicate that he does not hold the queen of that suit.
If East is a poor player, he might discard the deuce of diamonds if he thinks that South considers him a poor player.
If South and East know each other, South then drew two rounds of trumps. West discarded a low spade. South, continued with a matter of third round of trumps, and West discarded the deuce of diamonds.

If East happened to be a really great bridge player, he might discard a diamond from a worthless holding. The idea would be to persuade South that East was trying to disguise a strong diamond holding.
If you think that this is now becoming very complicated, I will agree with you. I think you will have to agree with me, however, that South has plenty to think about. He must decide how good East is, as a starter. From there he must go on to such delicate matters as East's opinion of South's opinion of East.
See what I mean? My own practice, however, is to make such decisions very quickly. If I think too long, I tend to out-guess myself.

Hens Help Secretary Brannan On Price Support Arguments

WASHINGTON (AP) — The hens seem to be giving Secretary of Agriculture Brannan some ammunition in his argument with President Truman's side of the argument.
Kline, an Iowa hog farmer, says a good way to control farm production — that is, prevent overproduction — is to reduce government price guarantees when supplies are too big and to raise them when shortages threaten.
Reduced price supports, he says, would cause many farmers to stop producing affected commodities until surpluses are used up. If shortages threatened, Kline would increase government price promises. Farmers would produce more, he says, and shortages would soon disappear.
The Kline theory is the basis of present farm price support legislation.
Secretary Brannan says this principle will not work. He contends that falling prices simply lead most farmers to produce more on the theory they can keep their incomes up by selling more.
Right now the heavy rate of egg production lends support to Brannan's side of the argument.
Egg production was greater last year than consumer demands. As a consequence, the government bought \$8,808,000 pounds of dried eggs — equal to about 205,000,000 dozen shell eggs — to support prices at an average of 45 cents a dozen.
This year, the government cut the egg support price to 35 cents a dozen — a reduction of more than 20 percent.
What about production? Has it gone down?
Latest Agriculture Department figures show that egg production is running seven percent higher this year than a year ago. Yet in May producer prices averaged 29.6 cents a dozen compared with 43.4 cents in May last year.

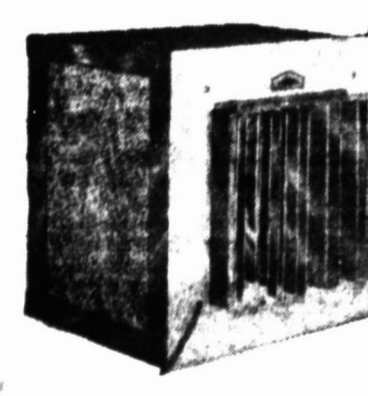

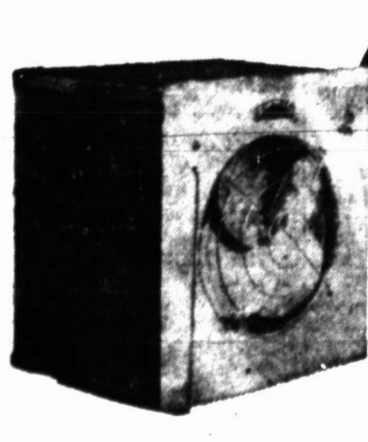
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Practice of Insuring Lives Of Debtors Growing Rapidly

NEW YORK — (AP) — Buying on time has been growing like a weed since the war. Growing even faster is the practice of insuring the lives of those who buy on the cuff.

That prevents loss to the credit company, bank or merchant, if the man who "owns" a car, washing machine, or television set should die before he finally gets it paid for.

Installation credit has about doubled since 1941, but insuring the lives of debtors has increased to eight times its 1941 size. Growing also is the total of personal income, now about 2 1/4 times as high as in 1941.

Now at the record high of \$11.3 billion, installment credit has gained by 31 percent in a year. Some observers fear it is accounting for too much of this year's prosperity, especially in the auto and home building fields.

In Minneapolis, William A. Rickman, president of the Western Bank & Trust Co. of Cincinnati, told the American Institute of Banking: "It would be well to plan now for a period ahead when the ability of the borrower to make repayments as and when due may be strained, if not impossible."

Supporting this, perhaps, is the Federal Reserve Board's report that more than three in each ten family spending units spent more than they earned last year.

But others point to the record heights to which personal income has climbed, nearly \$213 billion a year now. Installation credit is only one-nineteenth of that, and these observers point out that the ratio of debt to income was much higher in other periods.

A big landlord told me so himself. "The renting honeymoon is over for the landlord," said Fred Trump, one of the nation's top ten private housing builders.

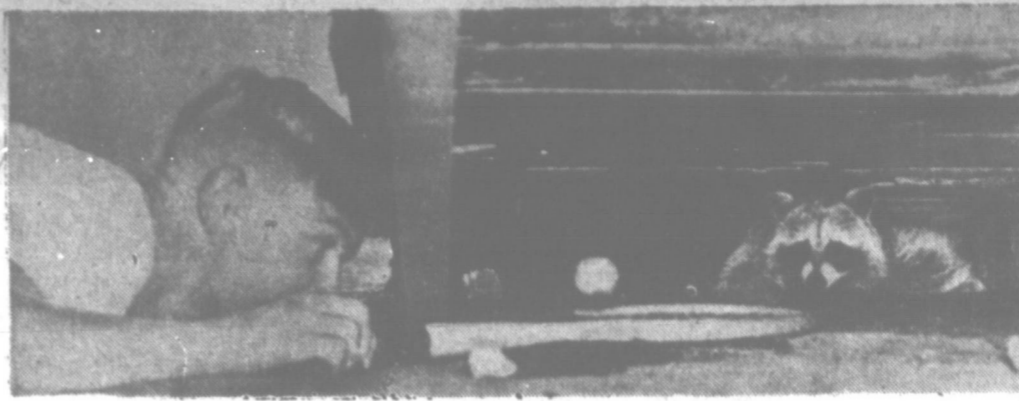
"We've been on a honeymoon since 1942. But we don't have to call the cops anymore to keep order in lines of people waiting to sign leases."

projects in Brooklyn — Shore Haven and Beach Haven — which cost \$30,000,000 and will hold 3,200 families. The six-story apartment buildings occupy only 20 percent of the area. The rest is given over to parks and play areas.

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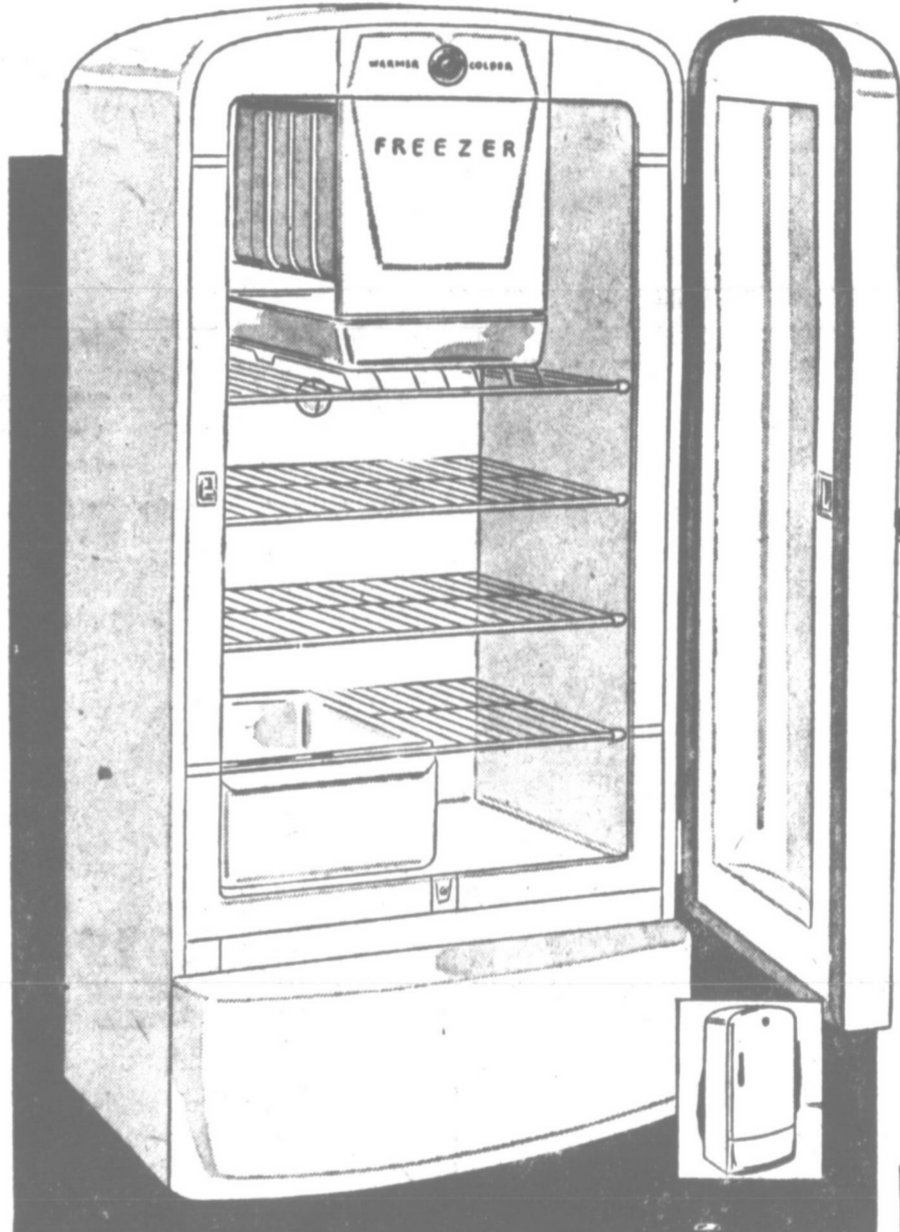


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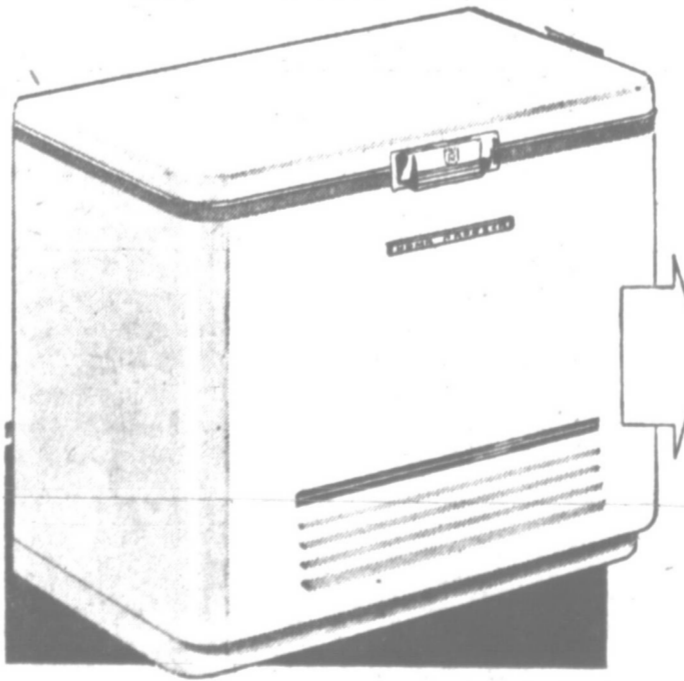

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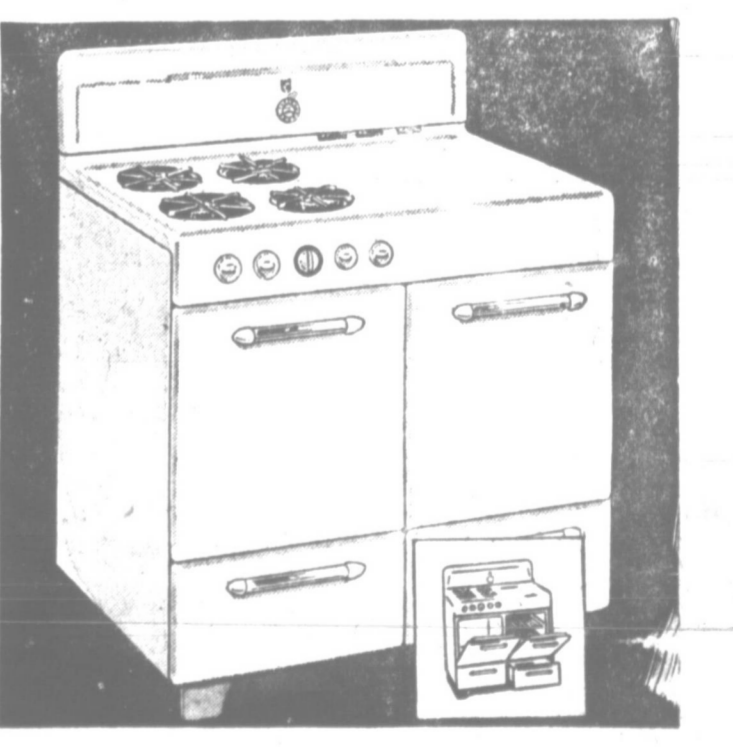

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Swimming, the Right Way, Is Healthy Fun For Those Who Use Common Precautions

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of four articles on water safety by Henry S. Gordon of The News' staff, who served for 10 years as a life guard, swimming, boating and canoeing instructor at Kiwanis Beach, three miles from his native Lebanon, Pa. The writer dropped his water activities shortly before entering the newspaper business during World War II. He also saw active rescue duty in two of Pennsylvania's major floods during the 1930s.)

By HENRY S. GORDON It's time to go swimming. If you can't swim, then it's time you started learning. Even to the landlocked Pennsylvania resident the art of staying afloat is more than a luxury. It may someday, be a necessity. With such bodies of water as Lake McClellan, Lake Marvin, and others, so near because of the automobile, it becomes imperative that a person learn how to intelligently handle himself in water over his head. Water gives life. It can also

take it. That depends mostly on a person's individual ability to apply practical common sense to his recreation and sport. Proper application of common sense and courtesy by enthusiasts of water sports can save many a person from an untimely death in a watery grave. This, of course, automatically throws out the so-called sport of ducking, tossing a person overboard from a boat, or shoving him from a pier, yelling "sink or swim!" Unfortunately, for water sports, it is always the "good swimmer" who drowns. Seldom do non-swimmers go under, and come up dead.

Following a few simple rules will prevent many a funeral. Here are some: Learn to swim under qualified instructors; the younger you learn the better.

When the art is mastered for all practical purposes, then the side dishes such as high and fancy diving, and related water sports can safely be taken up. Waiting two hours after eating

before going swimming is not superstitious. It is good common sense. It really can—and has—caused crippling stomach cramps that will jackknife the swimmer's body, shooting him straight to the bottom.

Following a meal the heart and stomach muscles begin to function on the digestive process. The exertion caused by swimming increases the load of both organs resulting in the stomach cramping, and down you go. Too many times help is not immediately available. Then it's too bad.

When going into the water never take a run and plunge, either from a diving board or from the beach. The shock of the water is hard on the heart even though it is not noticed every time. But the continual habit takes its minute toll each time. Sometimes, it is immediately fatal.

The best, surest and safest way is to first wade into the water up to your knees. Stoop over and splash water over your body, starting with the legs, working toward the torso, arms, shoulders and then face and head. Your body is accustomed to the temperature of the water by that time and you can strike out from there.

Never dive into a lake, or even a clear pool, without first exploring the bottom, determining the depth, temperature, and looking for dangerous submerged objects such as sharp rocks, old tin cans, water-logged boards with spikes sticking upward, broken pieces of glass, and various other pieces of trash. Test the depth so that you can determine the force and angle of your dive. If you find a dangerous object on the bottom remove it and place it safely on shore, if possible. While this is not necessary in places like the municipal swimming pool, it is best to keep in the habit; laxity sometime might lead you to do the same thing in strange water.

Swimming cannot be learned from a book or from articles such as these, but following the directions of qualified swimming instructors is the biggest help in the world.

Now that you have some semblance of an idea about the preliminaries, give water sports some serious thought and tomorrow we will discuss water courtesy and how to teach Junior to swim.

Variety of Weather Forecast for U.S.

WASHINGTON — (AP)—The nation appears in for a variety of weather in the coming month, with warmer than normal temperatures in some areas, cooler than normal in others, and just plain normal temperatures for the rest of the country.

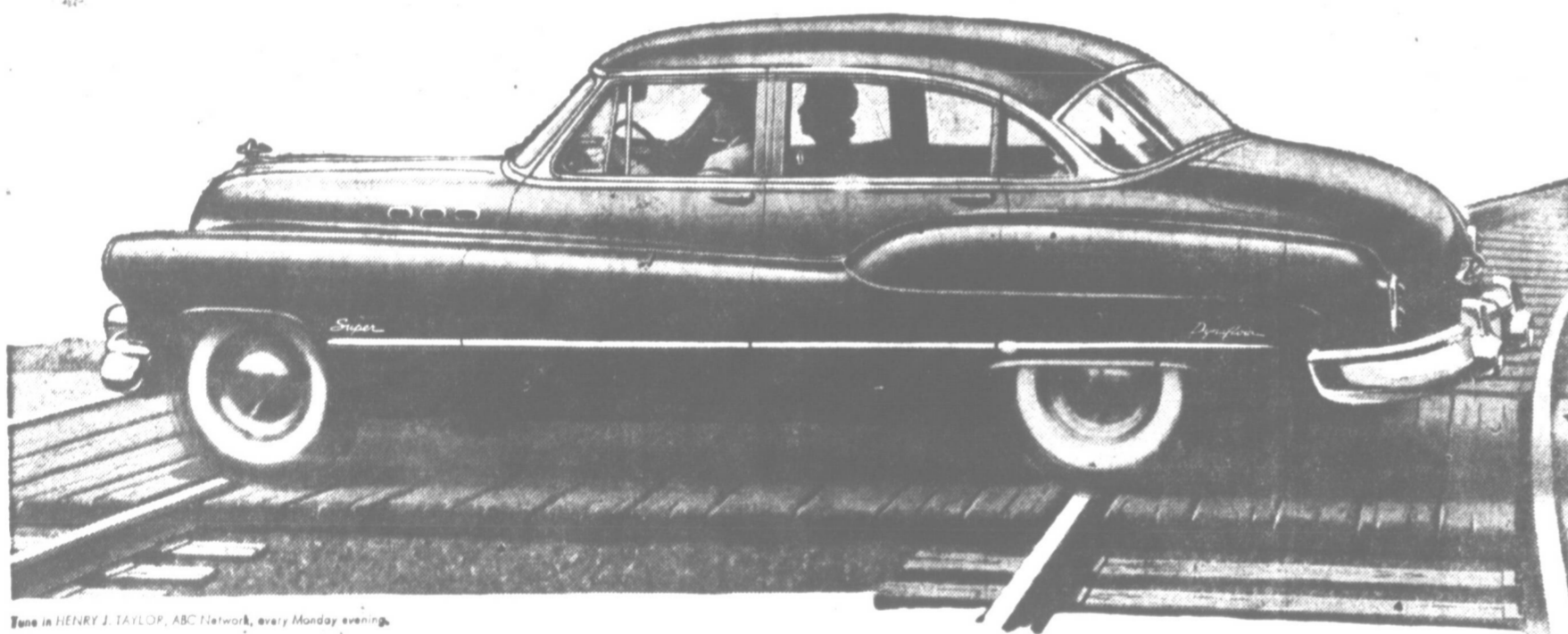
The weather bureau said in a 30-day prediction that it expects "temperatures averaging warmer than the seasonal normal from the great divide eastward to the Mississippi, with greatest departures over the southern half of this area."

"Cooler than normal temperatures," it said, "are expected in the Middle Atlantic states and also in the extreme Southwest. Elsewhere temperatures not far from seasonal normals are indicated."

"Generally abundant showery rainfall is expected over the North Plains, lake region, and Atlantic seaboard, but abnormal rainfall is indicated in the West Gulf states and South Central plains. Elsewhere about normal rainfall is predicted."

John Service's Reports Called 'Red' Slanted

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Emmanuel S. Larsen, a defendant in the 1945 Amerasia case, has told Senate investigators that in his opinion diplomatic John S. Service's wartime reports from China "had a Communist slant."

Larsen, a former State Department employee, was before the Senate inquiry group at closed sessions on June 5 and 6.

My Grandson's College Economic Textbook Propagandizes For Collectivism

In the last issue I was quoting from a textbook used in a course in economics at the University of Southern California. It was written by a couple of professors employed in tax-supported colleges. I was commenting on their statement that: "the doctrine of natural and inalienable rights, however, has long been discarded by well-informed thinkers..."

What these day-dreamers fail to realize is that if men are not permitted to give their wealth to those they love and if they know that they will be taken by those who regard as robbers that they will not create wealth. Would a man who loved freedom continue to produce wealth if he believed that when he died his wealth would be taken over by such men as Hitler or men like Stalin?

Adolph Thiers, the president of the Third Republic of France, in his book "A Refutation of Communism and Socialism, or a Defense of Private Property" pointed out how wealth would not be created if the owner believed he couldn't give it to anyone of his choosing. Yet these self-professed economists on the government payroll who probably never created any wealth themselves, but only received what they obtained on an involuntary basis, know so little about the motives back of creating wealth...

The real individualist, the real economist, the real creator of wealth knows that the love of power and prestige is not the highest motive that causes men to continue to create wealth. They know that the highest motive is the belief that their creating wealth make it possible for every other human being to enjoy a little more of the blessings of wealth. And if they believed that what they created was to be used by government bureaucrats to reduce the liberty of the great masses of people, they certainly would not continue to create wealth. It is doubtful whether a real philosopher or a real economist would turn his hand over to create a billion dollars' worth of wealth if he believed the bureaucrats would get it to keep themselves in power and make it more difficult for the great masses to improve their material well-being.

The course one needs to go to the University of Southern California if he doesn't want to. However, when most people believe that college is the place to get an education, many young people are fooled and actually believe they can get an education at a college. They can of course get a training, but certainly they never can get an education at a college that is so lax in screening out collectivist textbooks as is the University of Southern California.

It is the crime of crimes that young people attend colleges that not only waste their time but also cripple their ability to reason, and tend to deaden their love for liberty and freedom. (to be continued)

Editor's Notebook

July 18, 1950 Today is Father's Day, and for 24 solid hours he'll be allowed to enjoy the illusion that he's still the Grand Nabob of the family. Pop will be showered with neon neckties and new slippers for his bunions. And he'll be allowed to enjoy them for two solid weeks — until the first-of-the-month bills start arriving. Anyhow, Dad's prestige today is higher than it was in 1907, when Mother's Day was founded. "Poor father has been left out in the cold," mourned Jane Addams, famous social worker. Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Wash., proposed Father's Day in 1909. She was one of six brothers and sisters reared by their father, William Smart, a Civil War veteran, after their mother died. The Spokane Ministers Association sponsored the first city-wide Father's Day in 1910. President Calvin Coolidge recommended its nationwide observance in 1924.

Looking over history, Dad might conclude he's lucky to rate one special day a year. But in ancient Greece an annual festival honored Zeus, father of the gods. His sacred statues were crowned with new laurel wreaths. But Zeus was also patron of human fathers. So dutiful sons anted up the traditional gift for Dad — a cluster of ripe grapes. Pharaoh Rameses II was Egyptian champion father — 103 sons and 59 daughters. They battled so savagely over the throne that no succeeding Pharaoh dared have a large family. Champion father of all time was Emperor Mulai Ismail of Morocco, who died in 1727 at the age of 81, leaving 548 sons and 709 concubines. The Bible records that King Solomon had 700 wives and 300 concubines, but doesn't say how many youngsters called him the equivalent of "Hiya, Pop, you'd rag mom!" Only man to ever have 1,000 wives, apparently, was Rama V, or King Chulalong Korn of Siam. When he died in 1910, he left 124 sons and 236 daughters — 349 heirs. He had many budding princes and princesses that the present generation has been rocked by civil war ever since. In our present day, Dad's authority hits bottom in West Africa. There men negotiate for a son's permission to marry, he asks his mother's eldest brother.

American Dad's needn't feel too superior. Last year employees of the weekly magazine National Guardian negotiated for a one-week "paternity-leave" to play nursemaid to new mothers returning home from hospitals. But whether Dad rules his young'uns with a ruler stick, or bribes 'em with ice cream cones, he's the most lovable guy around the family homestead. 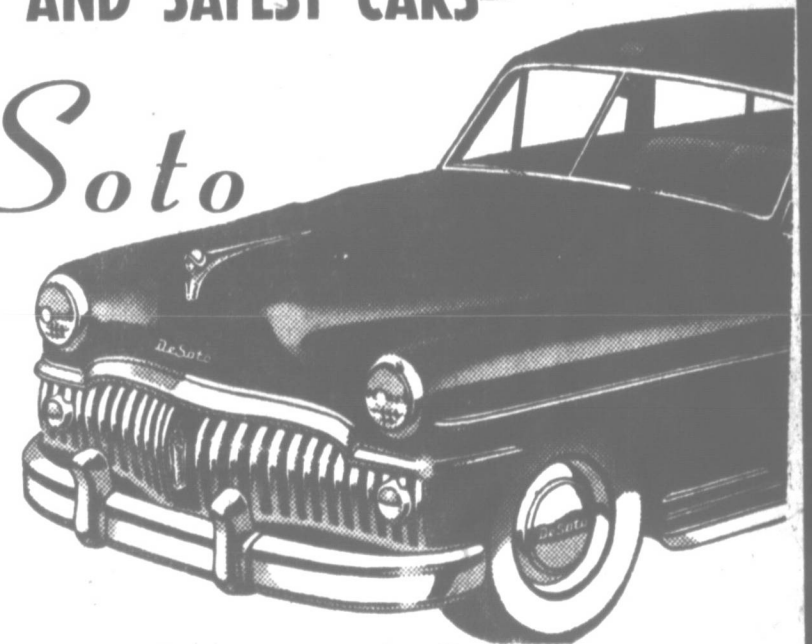

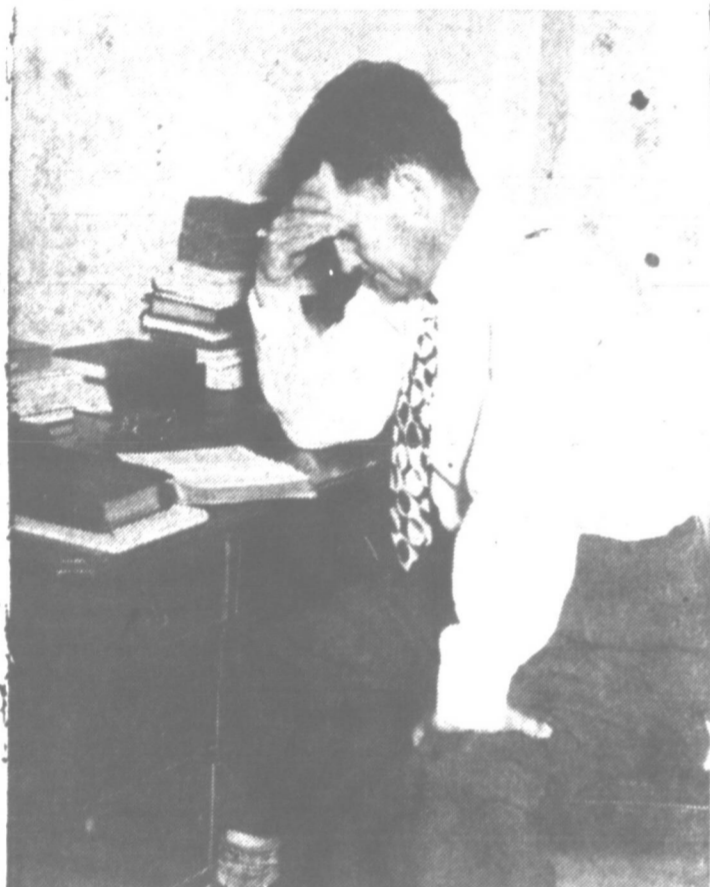

Today, however, he's King. Let's give him every reason to enjoy his moment in the limelight - not just today, but every day in the year.

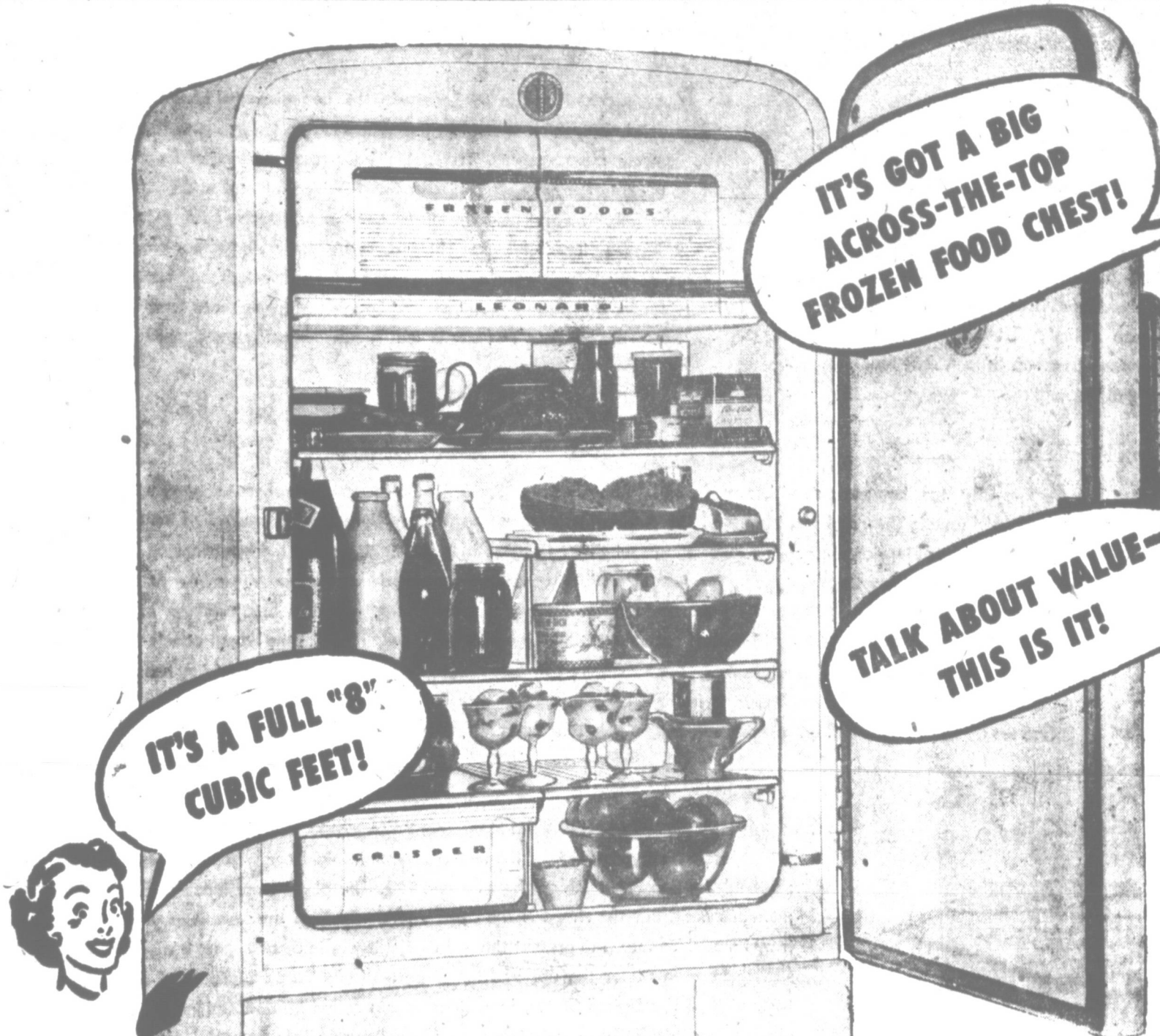

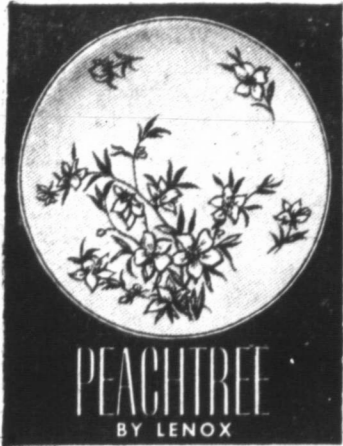

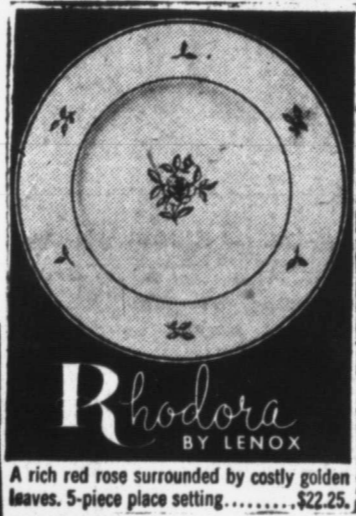

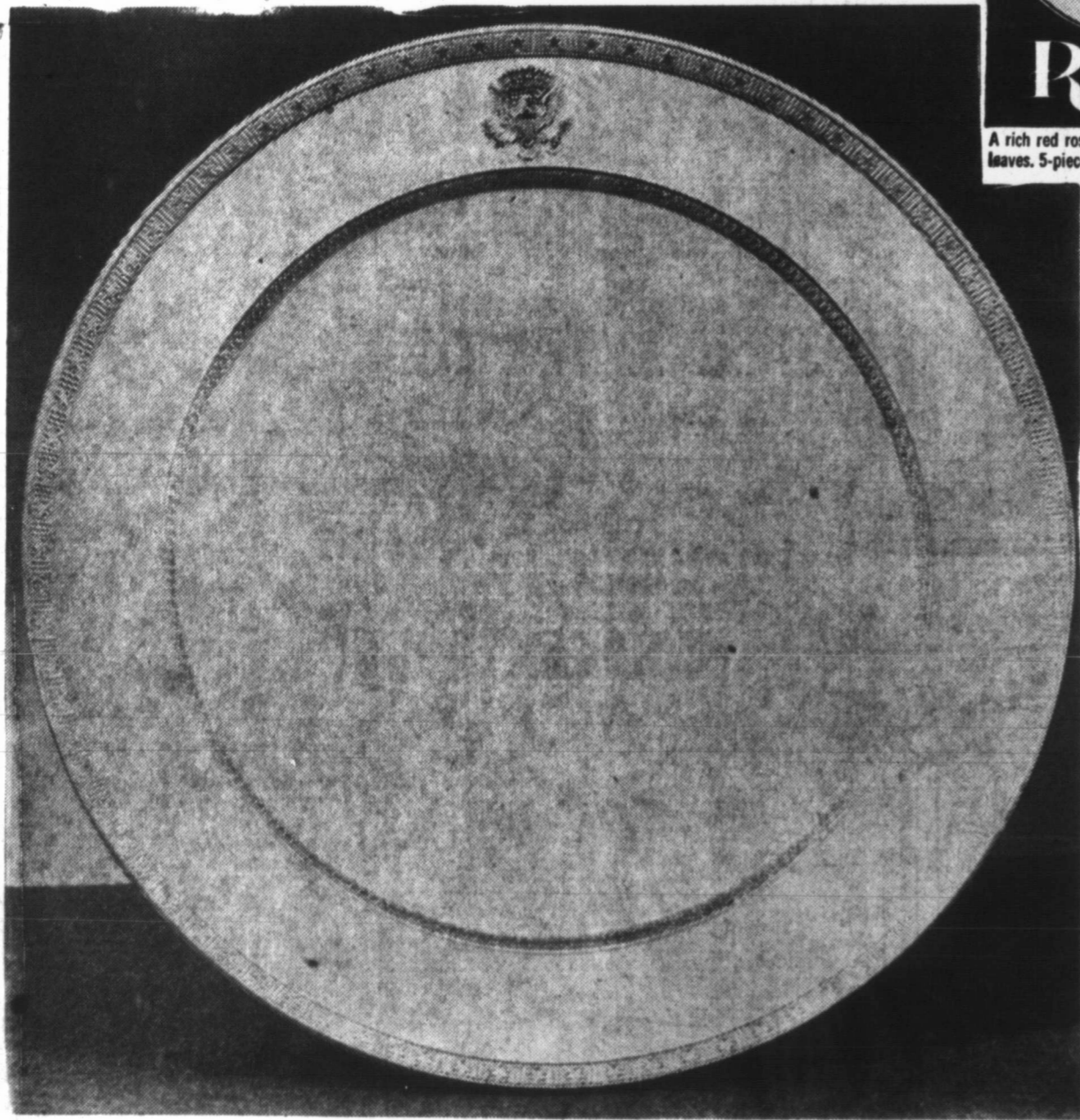

One of the most famous "command performance" services was made for special exhibit in the world-renowned Metropolitan Museum of Art. They wished the finest example of the potter's art, and the service plates created for them are breath-taking in their beauty. Rich, hand-applied 24-k. gold adds great drama to the magnificent glowing blue of the border panels. These famous \$18,000-a-dozen service plates have been exhibited in many museums. Still other Lenox china has made museum history. The first American china exhibited at the famed Ceramic Museum in Sevres, France was a lovely coffee set by Lenox. It is still on exhibit, still the only American china so honored.

If a Lenox plate could tell a story, many "command performance" services could spin fascinating yarns. One of the most interesting might come from the Lenox china that survived the San Francisco earthquake and fire. The plates were blackened from the tremendous heat, but the shape is the same and the body of the ware is as good as the day it was made! To return to present times, in 1939 it was imperative that a special fine china service be created for the use of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth of England during their visit to the United States, Lenox was again called in, and designed the famous service of 48 golden stars on a lustrous ivory background. This beautiful service was kept thereafter in the Federal Building at the World's Fair for the exclusive use of visiting dignitaries.

State Governors have been one of the largest groups requesting special services of Lenox China. U.S. Planning to Crack Down On Any Oleo-Butter Fraud

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Fed-will be widespread substitutions of colored margarine for butter by "unscrupulous people" seeking a quick profit.

The Food and Drug Administration, it was learned, has asked Congress for nearly a million dollars to enlarge its present enforcement staff in preparation for the drive against "butterleggers."

The request was prompted by fears that when federal taxes on oleomargarine end June 30 there

product for butter is very difficult to detect.

They added that past checks by federal and state inspectors indicate that at least 10,000 public eating places will try to sell oleomargarine as butter "in violation of the law."

The officials testified that they expect to uncover in the next year "at least one bootleg ring operating on a large scale and smaller rings delivering colored oleomargarine to the butter market."

When Congress voted to end taxes on margarine this year, it set up a rigid set of regulations intended to make sure that housewives, consumers and patrons of public eating places will

know when they are buying colored oleomargarine.

Eating places which use this product must post signs saying so, and each serving must be triangular in shape or labeled as margarine.

Similarly all manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers must identify colored margarine and package it so that it cannot be confused with butter.

Officials said the "expected bootlegging" will be tough to detect and prosecute successfully.

They said they hope to make use of experience gained in breaking up of a fake olive oil ring near New York City in 1946. This ring was selling as olive oil a mixture of inexpensive vegetable oil, some olive oil and a chemical.

"It is carried on surreptitiously in attics, garages, basements of private homes, warehouses apparently abandoned and other unlikely spots for food manufacture."

"Manufacturing may be performed at night. Distribution often is not by common carrier, but in private automobiles driven by members of the bootlegging ring."

The Food and Drug Administration said it planned these checks:

1. A visit twice a year to all manufacturers of oleomargarine. There were 60 of them, but the number is expected to expand greatly with the license and taxes ended.
2. A check on 4,000 wholesalers and distributors, or about one in five of the estimated 20,000 throughout the country who will handle the product.
3. A check on 100,000 public eating places, or about one in five among the more than 500,000 that offer butter or oleomargarine to customers.

Early Freeze Can Pay Off

We have already pointed out some of the dangers of freezing the pack during the early stages of a hand. Such a freeze is often just an out-and-cut gamble.

There are times, however, when an early freeze is the correct play. For example, suppose one opponent melds five or six cards from his hand, whereupon the other opponent also melds a few cards from his hand. You are now playing against two small hands, while you and your partner still hold your full eleven cards. This is a very good time to freeze.

The opponents may meld out before you or your partner can pick up the pile, but there is nothing you can do about that. You are certainly not worse off for having frozen the pack. If you had let the opponents take a worthwhile discard pile, they would have scored even more and you would have lost a big hand instead of just a small hand.

If the opponents fail to meld out in a hurry, you or your partner should be able to take the pile in a short time. Then, by reasonably careful discarding, you can probably keep picking up the pile until the hand ends. With average luck, you can run up a big score.

This, of course, is a situation that you should be able to bring about only against poor players. Good players will avoid depleting their hands during the early rounds unless they expect to meld out very quickly.

Even when only one opponent depletes his hand you may still have a sound early freeze. For example, suppose both sides need 90 points for the initial meld, and that the opponent at your right melds three aces and jack-deuce from his hand. After his discard, he holds only five cards. You hold a miserable hand, containing practically no pairs and only one deuce. You have two black threes and one other discard that you believe to be safe. Should you freeze?

This is not a bad freeze. You are completely safe for three rounds, with your deuce and your two black threes. After that you still have the other discard that you believe to be safe. By the time you have made four plays, the discards will tell you what else is safe.

In the meantime, your partner should have no trouble. He is discarding to a five-card hand, which should be easy enough. There is an excellent chance that he can build up the minimum count and get the pack. If he doesn't, you may be lucky enough to draw a joker and build up the count yourself.

You might ask: "Why freeze the pack? Why not just discard a black three? Then discard your other black three at the next turn. Later on, you can decide whether or not to freeze."

That wouldn't be a bad line of play, but there are definite advantages to the immediate freeze. You make it easier for your partner to stay out of trouble. Without the freeze, the player who follows your partner might take the pack with one matching card and a wild card; after your freeze, he needs a matching pair.

Moreover, you notify your partner that you have several safe discards, since otherwise you wouldn't dare freeze the pack. That information may be very important to him.

Q— My partner had melded a canasta all by herself. I had not yet melded. I then melded my entire hand, with two melds of four cards and one meld of three cards. I did not have a canasta of my own. Am I entitled to the bonus for going out "concealed?"
A— No. When you meld out "concealed" you must meld your own canasta.

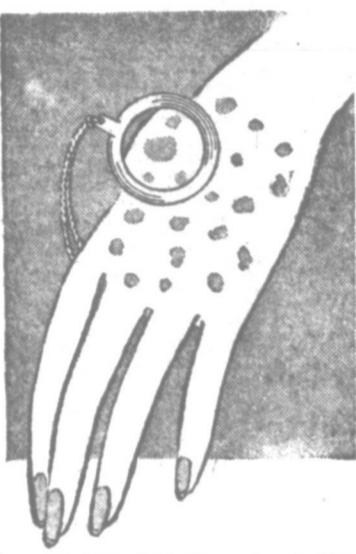

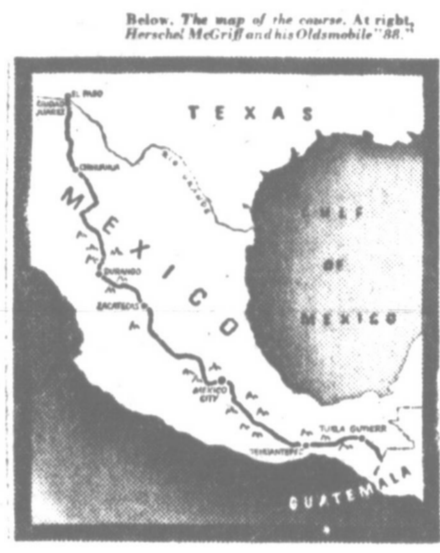

Business Started With 5 Bicycles, Borrowed \$16 Completes Purpose

It was nine years ago when Roy Cone and Bob Reynolds first began the bicycle repair business that has grown to a large and profitable business anyone could be proud of.

Roy and Bob were just kids then and all they had to start out with was five bicycles between them and \$16 they borrowed to buy parts. They pooled their efforts and knowledge and started repairing bikes for friends, neighbors and fellow citizens. "I doubt if we knew much more than our customers did in those first days," Roy says, "but we kept on working and the more bikes we repaired, the more we learned."

All through high school, the boys worked part time and built up a good and profitable business. So profitable was the bicycle repair business that in 1944 Roy went to college on the money he had saved from his earnings in the shop. In March, 1945, he entered the Navy, and on his discharge, in August, 1946, entered school again. He was graduated this spring with a degree in mechanical engineering.

Roy and Bob stayed in the business together until about 1941, when Bob decided to sell out. Roy bought his partner's half of the business and continued under the old name because it was well known and had a good reputation.

Bob is now a student at the University of Texas and will take his degree in electrical engineering. He is married, and he and his wife are expecting another addition to the family soon. Bob's father lives at 434 N. Stark- weather.

As it takes four years' experience to qualify for a professional engineer's license, Roy is selling out his stock in preparation for taking a position on the staff of the Beaumont Forging School. He doesn't know what he'll do after he gets that four years of experience, but Roy says "There's nothing in the world like owning your own business, and working for the other man, no matter how good the job is, is never so satisfying as working for yourself."

Two or three years ago, Roy got in the lawnmower business. He learned how to repair them while going to school at Texas Tech, and on his return home started fixing a few of them around Pampa. One day he went off and left his mower sharpening machine going and it struck and ground all the way through the blade on his neighbor's mower.

In addition to bike and lawnmower repairing, Roy tried his hand at welding aluminum on automobiles during the war. A couple of times, he says, the slag got too hot and ran down on him.

Injured Wife Comes Out First in Deal

CLEVELAND — (AP) — Roy Booth, 38, started for a drug store for a remedy for his wife who had tipped a pot of scalding water on herself.

En route, his car collided with another automobile. Booth offered to square the damages for \$2. As he stepped back toward his car after all that a street car struck him, sending him to the hospital for cuts and bruises. When he finally got home he found his wife had fixed herself up with home remedies.

He has also done spray painting and acetylene welding. For a while he was in the ice box painting business. Before long, however, Bob decided that didn't pay, for the boxes were too heavy to move in and out, although they weren't hard to paint.

For quite some time, Roy has had the agency for Whizzer Motor Bikes. The agency was formerly owned by another firm in Pampa, but, like Roy's says, "If you have the agency and can't or won't work on them, then you're out of luck." Apparently the other place didn't or couldn't work on them, and they had to give up the agency. Roy does all his own work and manages to keep his customer's bike motors in good condition.

Once, during the war, Roy bid on a bunch of Army bikes, sight unseen, and when they came, he said they were the most beat-up looking two-wheeled vehicles he ever laid eyes on. "They looked to me like someone had run over them with a tank."

"Another time, I contracted for some of those small Army shovels. I thought, I'd never get rid of them, but I painted them up

Florida Citrus Plant Burned In Costly Fire

WINTER HAVEN, Fla. — (AP) — A multi-million dollar fire that raged out of control for hours destroyed one of the Florida's largest citrus plants yesterday.

Police officials estimated that damage to the sprawling Polk Packing Association plant would exceed \$2,000,000.

The fire was discovered about 11 p.m. Friday night in a second-floor office in a building adjoining the main packing plant. It spread quickly to other structures on the 10-acre installation, and fire fighting apparatus from seven nearby towns were summoned to aid in fighting the blaze.

At the height of the fire, flames leaped 400 to 500 feet in the air, and persons 40 miles distant reported they could see the glow.

The huge processing and canning plant, with about four acres of building space under roof, produced both orange and grape fruit concentrates. About a quarter of a million boxes of citrus fruit were lost in the fire.

Equipment from plants at Bartow, Lake Wales, Lake Alfred, Haines City, Lakeland, Eagle Lake and Auburndale aided Winter Haven firemen in bringing the fire under control shortly before dawn.

Three firemen were casualties — none serious. Chief Allen Lewis and another member of the Lakeland Fire Department were overcome by ammonia fumes at a refrigeration unit, and a fireman from Auburndale was cut on the hand.

John Snively, owner of the plant, said he expected the loss to reach \$2,500,000.

Firemen succeeded in keeping flames from reaching several gasoline storage tanks. A switch engine drew six gasoline tank cars from the area.

Excessive Planting Of Cotton Claimed

EDINBURG, Texas — (AP) — A Production and Marketing Administration official estimates there are between 1,200 and 2,000 cotton farms in Hidalgo and Cameron counties which are over-planted.

E. E. Hirsch, secretary of the Hidalgo PMA, said these farms had been measured and found to have more cotton acreage than

quotas call for. He said the number of over-planted farms in these two counties were more than the rest of Texas put together.

"As near as I can figure," Hirsch said, "there are two reasons why. These farmers will stay over-planted and pay penalties. The first is that they are growing long-staple cotton which draws a good price. The second is that the Valley cotton farmer gets first crack at the markets. They figure they can pay their penalties, and still make money."

Two Texas Youths Killed in Air Crash

EDGEWOOD, Texas — (AP) — H. C. Thornton, 21, and Jerry Lynch, about 17, both of Grand Saline, died Friday when their light plane crashed southwest of this Van Zandt County community.

Thornton, the pilot, had rented the plane from the Grand Saline airport. The craft burst into flames on impact, and both youths were burned beyond recognition.

**Branch Offices Are Planned
To Handle Greater DP Flow**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Displaced Persons Commission is planning several additional branch offices abroad to take care of a new influx of European war refugees.

President Truman Friday signed legislation raising by 136,000 the number of DPs who may enter the United States.

Included are 18,000 World War II Polish soldiers who went to Britain rather than return to their Communist homeland, 10,000 Greeks and 2,000 refugees from former Italian territory ceded to Yugoslavia.

Commission officials said these additions will require new offices at least in Britain, Greece and probably Trieste.

There is another special new category of 4,000 refugees from Communist-held Shanghai, mostly White Russians, but the bulk of the newcomers will continue to arrive by way of occupied Germany.

Thus far, 162,542 DPs have reached this country and have been scattered to new homes in every state.

The new measure extends for one year a 1948 law expiring June 30 which authorized the entry of 205,000 persons driven from their homes by the war.

Besides boosting the total in the new bill, Congress made changes aimed at tightening administration of the program, more careful screening of the

applicants and wiping out provisions which brought charges by Mr. Truman and others that the law discriminated against Catholics and Jews.

**Pacific Haze
Analyzed as
Desert Sands**

HONOLULU — (AP) — The great Pacific haze may have come from the Southern California desert.

The U. S. Weather Bureau popped up with this new story just as meteorologists here had pretty well saddled the blame on Mauna Loa, Hawaii's erupting volcano.

The finger was put on Southern California by weathermen in Washington no the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce which was a mile put out by three days of dismal, colorless skies.

Chief Meteorologist Robert H. Simpson of Honolulu's weather bureau said the Washington report indicated the smog-like pall contained sand from Southern California's desert.

There was a desert windstorm

in Southern California June 8, Simpson said, and computation by his Washington colleagues pointed to the possibility that winds had carried the sand over the Pacific.

The haze hung over more than 1,000,000 square miles — from Wake Island eastward past Hawaii — for three days and nights. It began breaking up over Hawaii Thursday when a northeast trade wind ruffled an almost dead calm.

Before long things were looking up for the local chamber of commerce. Skies were blue again. Simpson said the haze cleared more rapidly than was expected — probably being walled out laterally by the trade wind.

Those who thought Mauna Loa was responsible still had what seemed like a good argument, however.

While the haze was clearing over most of the Hawaiian Islands, Associated Press Correspondent Roy Essoyan found it still shrouding the island of Hawaii. That's where Mauna Loa still is kicking up a bit.

She's at the tag end of a record eruption that began June 1. A lot of ashes have belched from her since then. That led to the

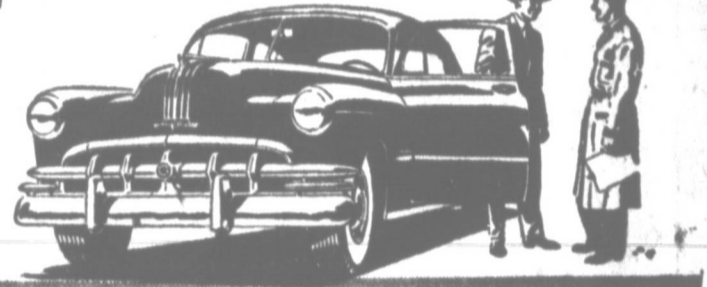

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Black Sheep Can Turn White If He's Deprived of Copper

BALTIMORE — (AP) — A black sheep usually remains black. But put him in a pasture lacking the tiny amounts of copper usually in the soil and he may become a white sheep. The exact process by which these copper traces in soil affect crops grown in it and how these traces or lack of them in plants affect animals is the main problem under discussion by 50 scientists here. The meeting is sponsored by Johns Hopkins University's McCollum-Pratt Institute. Scientists from as far away as Australia are in attendance. Dr. W. D. McElroy, director of the institute, told about the black sheep turned white sheep at the opening session. Traces of copper in the soil, he explained, act as a catalyst — the minute bits stimulate other chemical reactions, which in turn have a direct bearing on the health of plants grown in that soil. For example, he said, the slight browning where a bite has been taken out of an apple may make it less appetizing. But that is copper at work. Anyone could eliminate this browning by planting trees in copper-deficient soil. The only trouble would be that the trees would not amount to much, might not even bear an apple to bite into. There are great stretches of copper-deficient land in Australia. Sheep grazed on this land produce "steely" wool which has little elasticity and makes a poor fabric. The addition of copper corrects this condition. But it must be added to the soil and thence to the plants that feed the animal, he explained. It does not good to feed copper directly to the sheep. A new plastic cement is now on the market, that mends paper, wood, leather, fabrics or china. The cement may be used to mend torn shirts and linen, it is said, and will withstand laundering.

U. S. Bombers Test Netherlands Radar

WASHINGTON — (AP) — American bombers are taking part for the first time in the defense exercises of this country's Atlantic Pact allies. The Air Force announced yesterday that U.S. B-29 and B-50 Superfortresses based in England are testing The Netherlands radar and fighter defenses, which it said now are completed in "considerable part."
