Crash of B-25 **Proves Fatal**

CIRCLEVILLE, W.Va. -A fire-blackened area near top of Spruce Knob - highest mountain in West Virginia marked the spot today where nine airmen were killed in the crash of an Air Force bomber. The Utah-bound B-25 smashed into the mountain at dawn yesterday. Its two engines were found 1,500 feet from the point of impact. The wings sheared off, The fuselage was reduced twisted pieces.

Two bodies were thrown into trees. Fire burned over a quarter-mile of the 4,860-foot high mountain, about 25 miles from the West Virginia - Virginia bor-

The nine bodies were removed to an Elkins, W.Va., funeral home.

The plane was bound from Olmstead Air Base at Middle-town, Pa., for a stopover at Offutt Base in Nebraska. From there it was going to its home field near Ogden, Utah.
