WASHINGTON - (P) - The House Judiciary Committee today approved legislation giving the states clear title to the oil-rich

Under the terms of the bill the states would own submerged coastal lands three miles out from their shorelines. In the case of Texas, the limit is 10 1-2, because of conditions under which it entered the union.

The bill provides that states shall receive 37 1-2 per cent of all revenues from oil and gas leases between the three mile limit, (Texas, 10 1-2 miles) to the edge of the continents shelf.

The federal government would receive the remainder. Author of the pending measure is Rep. Walter (D-Pa).

Rep. Gossett (D-Texas), a judiciary committee member and a Envoys Agree strong supporter of the state own-ership bill, said the group voted 16 to 10 for the measure.



WRITTEN FOR NEA Few things cause so much worry and distress to growing youngsters as adolescent pimples or acne.

This skin disease, comes at a time when boys and girls are terribly sensitive about their personal appearance. Friends, particularly those of the opposite sex, are becoming more and more important and the presence of pimples adds to the difficulty of grow-

ing from childhood into adult life. Only a small proportion of those afflicted with acne develop permonent scarring but the fear is always present. Not only is there the usually unnecessary fear of permanent scarring of the face, but the pimples themselves produce an excessive shyness and self consciousness. Some develop a permanent inferiority complex as a result of acne. Acne prefers the face, neck, up-

per part of the chest and shoulders. The pimple usually starts as a reddish lump which is slightly tender to touch. It often develops into a "white head", which actually consists of a mixture of pus, germs, skin oil, and destroyed tissue cells. The pimple may be near the surface of the skin or quite deep.

"It took me ten years to find what was wrong with me," he said, "In popular language, I let success go to my head. My quick successes gave me the idea that I myself had something to be personally proud of. It never occured to me that I didn't make my own brain, and had little to do with the influences that shaped my ideas. I became arrogant. A thing had to be so if I said it was so I knew better than editors did what they wanted. It's a funny thing that success

oftentimes makes a man arrogant, warps his judgment, and failure, while repeated failures may rob him of self-confidence, convince him he cannot win, and also cause fai'ure. A man needs to think well of himself to succeed, He needs self confidence. And he also needs humility. It was a quotation from John Ruskin that opened the eyes of this writer as to how all this might be achieved. Here are the words of Ruskin, which turned this man toward success once more-

"I believe that the first test of a truly great man is his humility. I do not mean by humility doubt of his own power. But really great men have a curious feeling that the greatness is not in them but through them. And they see something divine in every other man, and are endlessly, foolishly, incredibly merciful."



Stratojet Put First on List By Air Force

Air Force has put a 600-mile-an-hour jet bomber at the top of its buying list and intends to keep it there next year.

The favored plane is a B-47 Stratojet, which has just begun to come off the Boeing Aircraft Company's production line at Wichita, Kans.

Its speed, far above that of the B-36 intercontinental bomber, is counted upon to provide in-creased protection against interception by fighter planes.

The jet bomber's range, however, is only a fraction of that achieved by the B-36 with its piston engines.

While the combat radius of the B-36 is listed officially at 5,000 miles, that of the Stratojet is placed only at "more than 1.000 miles.

But the Air Force is busily trying to increase the range of the faster plane. Besides adopting more efficient engines for the craft, it recently ordered an experimental B-47 equipped with four engines of greater power than the six used on the type now in production.

When the jet bomber joins the it will replace B-29 Superfortresses of World War 11, its range will be increased further by B-29 tanker planes in those groups. The tanker can be sent ahead of the jet bombers to refuel them on their way to targets.
