

JACOBY ON CANASTA

Written for NEA Service "Please settle an argument for me," pleads a Cleveland reader. "A friend of ours tried a new one the other night, and she got very angry when we stopped her. She needed 60 points for her first meld. The card at the top of the discard pile was a nine. This player did not draw, but she put down three aces and then tried to take the discard pile with a nine and a joker.

"Fine thing! Anybody has a right to get violent when she needs 120 points, but this business of raising Cain when you need only 60 points is carrying matters too far. Tut, tut, young lady.

My Cleveland correspondent was, of course, quite correct. The girl did not have the right to take the discard pile.

The rule is that you are allowed to take the discard pile with one matching card and a wild card only if your side has made the initial meld at a previous turn of play.

For example, if your partner makes an initial meld, you may take the discard pile with a matching card and a wild card. If you make the initial meld yourself, you must wait until your next turn before you can use a wild card to take the discard pile.

Q—Is it permissible to meld two aces with three deuces as a single meld?
A—Yes. This is a perfectly legal meld. You may combine a natural pair with three wild cards.

Q—How long does the discard pile stay frozen?
A—Until it is picked up legally by one of the players. It then becomes a normal, or unfrozen, pile.

Q—Can you make a canasta of black threes?
A—No. You may meld four black threes, or three black threes, or two black threes with a wild card. Those are the only melds possible with black threes.

Q—In the middle of a hand we discovered that the pack contained nine deuces. What should we do?
A—Examine the deck carefully to make sure that it is otherwise all right. Take out the ninth deuce and begin the hand over. Any previous hands played with that deck are not affected. The previous scores stand.

Kilgore Has Oil Derricks in Front, Back, Church Yards

Strangers are startled at the amazing array of oil derricks in Kilgore.

Sure, you've heard the town is full of derricks. But that hardly prepares you for the fantastic sight of derricks in front yards, back yards and side yards and derricks downtown, crowded together and towering over buildings.

There are about 1,150 derricks in the city limits, and when you see a derrick in Kilgore, it's over an oil well in the great East Texas field.

In one business block downtown, we counted 17 derricks. There's a lot more steel in derricks adjoining the railroad through Kilgore than in the rails.

In many cases, derricks are right up against each other. One engine commonly pumps two wells.

When wells are completed in Kilgore, derricks generally are left up in order to swab out the well when it needs swabbing.

F. C. Chemoke, an auto parts dealer, is one resident who considers the derricks a hazard.

"A tornado or even a real bad wind could knock 'em down," said he. "Those derricks start falling here in Kilgore and you wouldn't have any place to run."

But there are other opinions. "You get so used to 'em you don't pay 'em any more attention than you would your thumb," said Allen May, service station attendant, holding up a thumb for emphasis.

"We think they're real pretty," Charles K. Devall, publisher of the Kilgore News Herald, said.

"After all, oil was largely responsible for building Kilgore from an unincorporated town of 500 in 1930 to a thriving city of about 14,500 in 1950."

Many homes have oil wells in both front and back yards.

"Where do the children play, Mr. Devall?"

"Around the derricks — they like it."

Many home owners do their best to beautify their derricks by planting flowers around them. No derricks are ivy-covered. Such things would be a hazard to workmen who climb the towers. At Christmas time, hundreds of illuminated stars glow from the tops of Kilgore's derricks.

When oil was found in the Church of the First Presbyterian, the members built a church at a new location. The new building even has a \$10,000 air-conditioning system, courtesy of the church's "oil fund."

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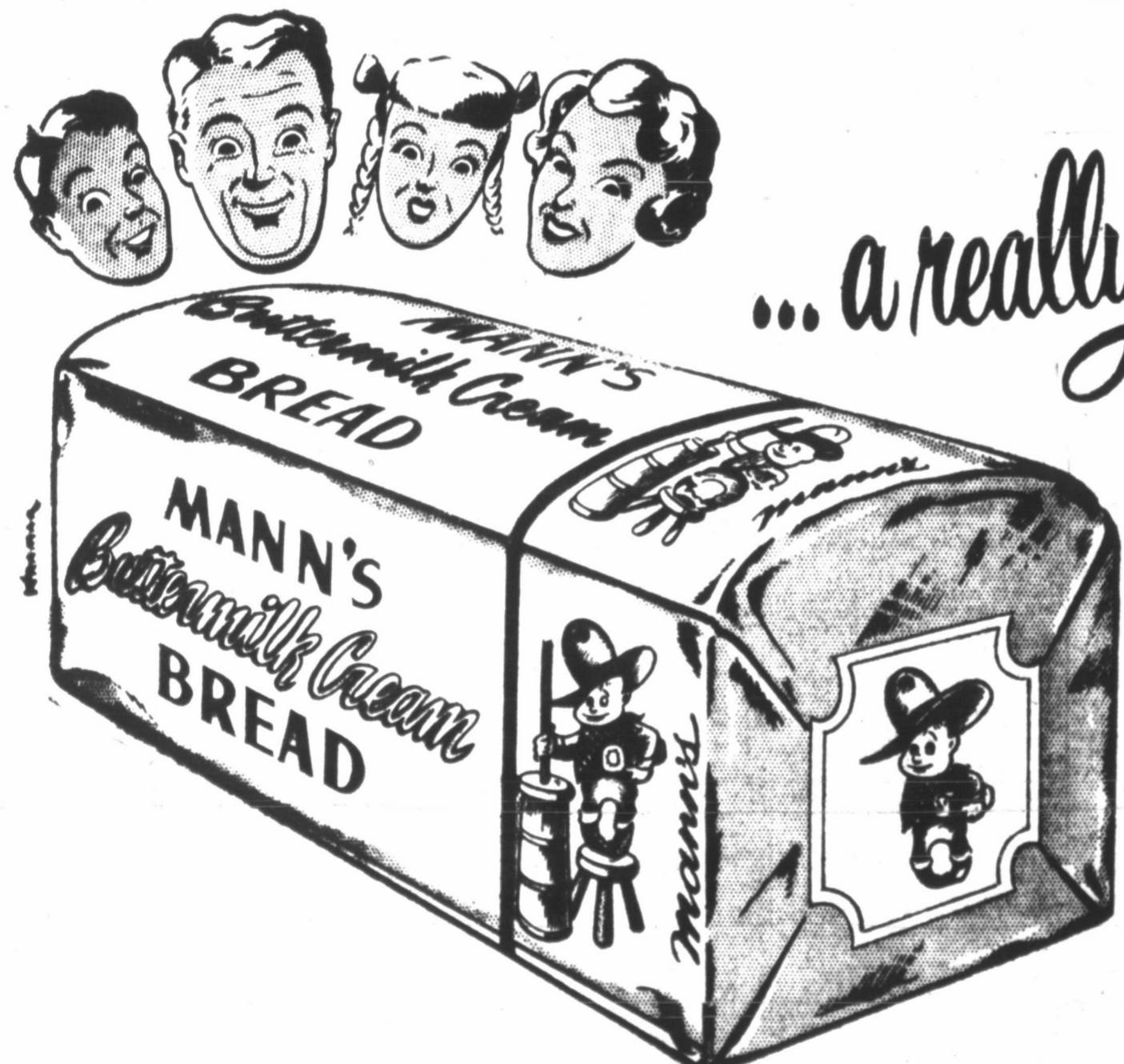

Doctor urges TB Vaccine Usage in U.S.

DENVER — (AP) — The vaccine, BCG, will whip tuberculosis, says Dr. Edward J. O'Brien of Detroit, "and somebody has got to raise Hell until this country wakes up to that fact."

"I guess," he added in an interview, "that I'm just the guy to do it."

The white-haired Dr. O'Brien, one of the nation's top TB surgeons, launched a crusade for BCG in a speech here before the American Association for

He told the surgeons their present methods of combatting TB—some of which he developed himself—"won't solve the problem in a thousand years."

BCG is the only answer, he declared, "and it's amazing that the U. S. Public Health Service can't see it."

Dissenting opinions came from Dr. Robert J. Anderson of the public health service in Washington and from Dr. Harry J. Corper, research director of the National Jewish Hospital here.

Dr. Anderson said evidence is still incomplete as to the effectiveness of BCG.

Dr. Corper, while admitting that BCG is a preventive, said he didn't think mass vaccinations were justified except in countries like India, or in slum areas of cities like New York and Chicago.

Inter-Planetary Travel Controls Shunned in India

NEW DELHI, India — (AP) — A suggestion that the Indian constitution provide the government with powers to regulate inter-planetary travel died like a damp rocket in the Constituent Assembly here.

Most members kept their feet on the ground as H. V. Kamath argued that inter-planetary travel was a scientific possibility. He was supported only by Naziruddin Ahmed, who thought the government ought to have powers over travel between planets and their satellites as well.

Law Minister B. R. Ambedkar, who drafted the constitution now under discussion ended the debate by remarking that if the proposal related to matters unknown, the assembly was wasting

its time in discussing it. None of the members was prepared to explain how inter-planetary travel might be achieved.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Do American women today really look like a row of acorns?

This question has the clothing industry in a mild tizzy.

The accusation that women, by aping the body lines of movie stars, have become as much alike as so many unborn oak trees in their nutshells was made by Raymond Marinelli, a well known designer.

Marinelli said this sameness resulted because too many women had adopted "the universal, up-lift bustline," whether or not it corresponded with their own contours.

But his charge drew an immediate and heated denial from a lady clothing designer — Cynthia.

But Cynthia, how about Mr. Marinelli's statement that women would be 1,000 times more feminine without these undergown fashion aids?

"Don't you believe it!" said Cynthia, a tall, slender blonde with blue eyes.

"A girl just doesn't look attractive if she doesn't wear her foundation garments. She is like a bowl full of quaking jelly. A girl should wear her girdle and bra everywhere except at the beach or in her own boudoir."

"I'd certainly hate to see a girl wear a fashionable strapless evening gown with nothing underneath."

Firms to Build Chemical Plant In Kentucky

HOUSTON — (AP) — Tennessee Gas Transmission Company and Mathieson Hydrocarbon Chemical Corp. will build chemical plants costing \$39,000,000 in Kentucky.

Gardiner Symonds of Houston, president of Tennessee Gas, and Thomas S. Nichols of Baltimore, president of Mathieson Chemical Corporation, announced this.

Mathieson Hydrocarbon is a new company formed by Mathieson Chemical and stockholders of Tennessee Gas.

It will build a \$17,000,000 chemical plant on a 2,000-acre site near Brandenburg, Ky., on the Ohio River; a \$8,000,000 plant for the production of raw material components at another location, not named, and some \$4,000,000 other work.

Tennessee Gas will build a \$12,000,000 stripping plant near Greensburg, Ky., to separate the hydrocarbon from the natural gas stream and pipe it to the hydrocarbon plant.

Two Trains Discontinued

AUSTIN — (AP) — Discontinuance of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company's two passenger trains between San Angelo and Fort Stockton was authorized by the railroad commission yesterday.

The commission order specified that the company must establish mixed train service between the two points to replace the passenger train service.

The company had asked permission to discontinue the trains on grounds that they were losing money. Public hearings were held at Big Lake and San Angelo. In oral arguments before the commission Monday, company attorneys said the loss amounted to \$132.32 per day during the past 15 months. Protestants argued that the trains were necessary in the public service and that the company had never submitted its books to the commission to back up the loss claims. The commission noted that when an out-of-pocket loss is shown in such an operation, law requires that permission be granted for discontinuance.

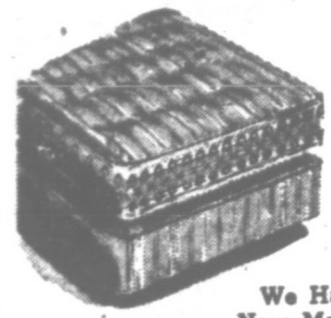

British War Minister Says Smear Campaign Underway

DUNDEE, Scotland — (AP) — Britain's War Minister John Strachey says he is the victim of an international smear campaign directed by "rich, powerful and influential individuals" trying to discredit the Labor government.

Speaking to a gathering celebrating his recent election to Parliament, Strachey said the campaign against him is going on in both Britain and "on the other side of the Atlantic."

Strachey has been charged by Lord Beaverbrook's right-wing press of never having renounced a sympathy for Communist principles. More recently there have been reports that Atlantic Pact defense officials would bypass Strachey in their exchange of military secrets.

Strachey has said he has renounced his former Communist sympathies, and he has been defended by Prime Minister Clement Attlee. Defense Minister Emanuel Shinwell has denied the report that Strachey is to be bypassed on the secrets.

Canyon Indians Using Old Bell

PHOENIX, Ariz. — (AP) — A historic church bell that made its way into Arizona in 1860 by way of an overland freight now echoes in Supaiiland at the bottom of Arizona's Grand Canyon. The bell, which once served as the fire alarm at the little community of Chloride in Mohave County, hangs in St. Andrew's Episcopal chapel in the Indian settlement. It was taken down the trail into the canyon by pack train.

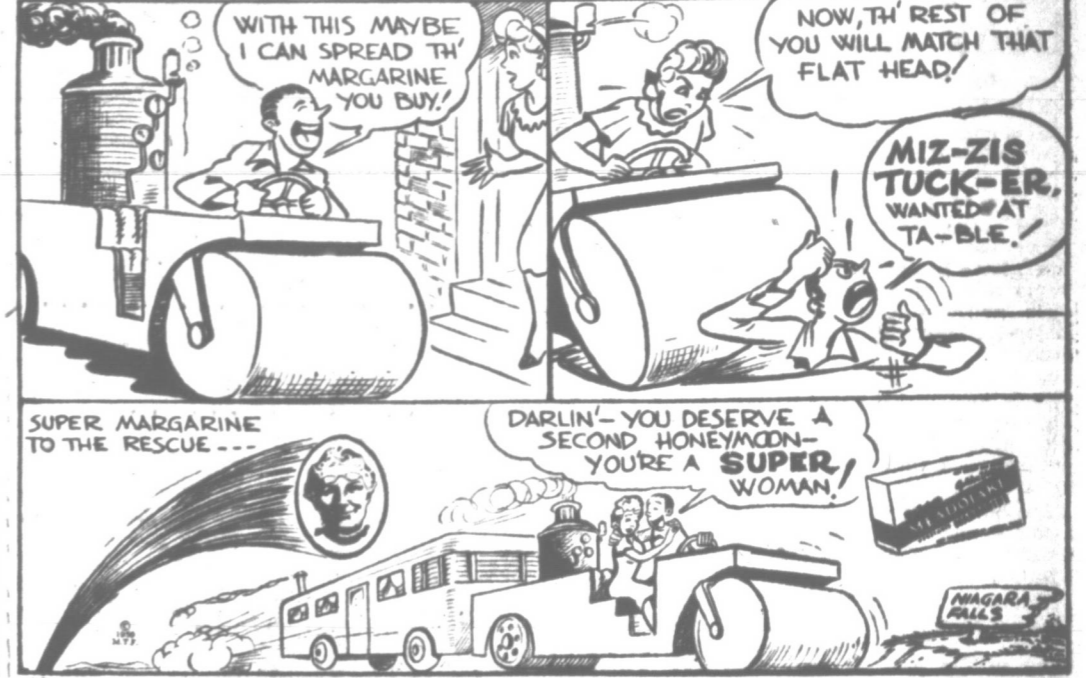
Soviets Planting Trees in 'Nests'

MOSCOW — (AP) — Russians in putting into effect their large forestation program are relying heavily on the "nest method" of tree planting.

This method was proposed by Academician Trofim Lysenko, Russia's leading agronomist, who declares that it is based on the principles of Michurinist biology. The nest method of tree planting involves the planting in a small circle of a number of seedlings. It is claimed that within this group of seedlings there is no conflict and that they assist each other in mutual defense against their enemies — weeds and grass. Experiments have shown, papers declare here, that the survival of tree seedlings is much higher in "nest planting" than is the case with individual planting.

Sally Eilers Returns, Says Hollywood Changed Little

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — The movie town has changed little over the years, says Sally Eilers, film "bad girl" of the '30s, who is returning to the screen after a lengthy absence. Her case, Senator Johnson is listening in, she added that Hollywood appears to be less immoral than some segments of Washington.
 "I started in pictures back in 1927," said the actress. "Even then the Hollywood wild life seemed to be over. I used to hear stories about the gay parties, but that sort of thing was in the past."
 "Social life appears to be even more settled now than ever. I think that's because everyone has become society-conscious. That

trend started when Eliza Maxwell came out here to give parties and when people like Darryl Zanuck and Jack Warner hobnobbed with international society on the Riviera.
 In her 22 years of Hollywood life, Miss Eilers boasted, she has never been involved in a scandal. She admits to having married four times, "but that can happen to anyone in any town."

Texas Railroad Revenues Top 17-Year Mark

GALVESTON — (AP) — Railroad passenger revenues in Texas total \$22,706,546 in 1949 and were greater than the 17-year pre-war average, Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson said yesterday.
 Thompson offered a 25-year comparison of railroad business in a speech at a noon luncheon of the Galveston Rotary club.
 "Gross operating revenues of railroads within Texas during 1929 were \$38,874,972, a decrease of 10.8 percent from 1948, according to statistics compiled by the Railroad Commission of Texas, but about \$3,000,000 greater than the average of the last seven years, which includes the abnormal war period," Thompson reported.
 His breakdown of the 1949 gross showed \$334,023,011 in freight revenue, \$22,706,546 in passenger revenue, and \$32,148,415 from incidentals and other operations.
 "After subtracting taxes and per diem rents, the net railway operating income in 1949 was \$38,854,920, which represented a 4.37 percent rate of return of the \$888,666,861 depreciated investment and working capital utilized by Texas railroads in their transportation business," said Thompson.
 He said the railroads' highest rate of return in the last 25 years was 6.89 percent in 1942 and the lowest was 81 one-hundredths of one percent in 1932. Thompson said the 1949 railroad passenger revenue of 22,706,546 compared with a 1928-1941 average of about \$17,000,000 per year.

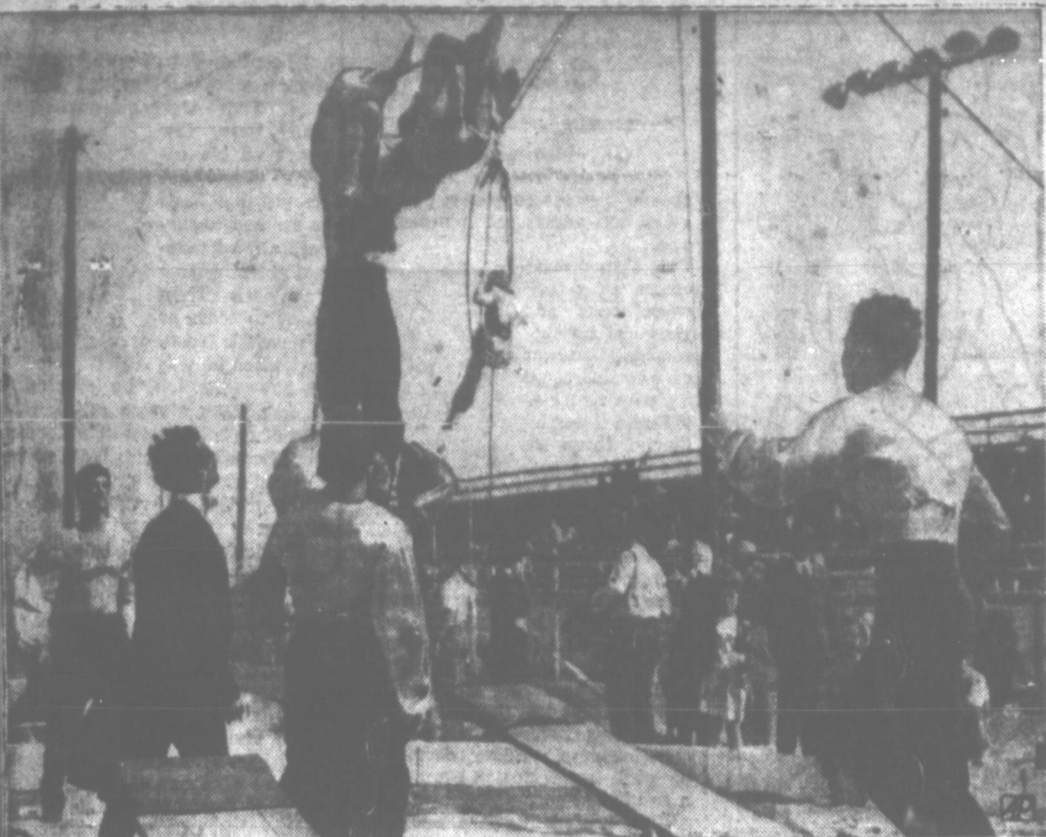

Cotton Export Rise Forecast

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Agriculture Department has predicted that exports of cotton this season may reach 8,250,000 bales — which would be the largest volume since the 1939-40 season of foreign stockpiling for war.

Foreign shipments during the August, 1949, February, 1950, period totaled 3,068,000 bales compared with 2,882,000 during the comparable period of the previous season.

Significant increases in sales to France, Japan, the United Kingdom, Germany and The Netherlands have been largely responsible for exports during the current season.

Direct financing by the U. S. government has accounted for a large portion of all exports of cotton.

Virus Theory Of Cold Given No Credence

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE

BOSTON — (AP) — The common cold is probably not caused by a virus as you have been told for many years, nor by germs of any sort.

Instead grandfather was right when he said it was caused by the weather.

This surprising view of colds was given to the American College of Physicians by Dr. William J. Kerr, of San Francisco, and of the University of California School of Medicine. Dr. Kerr is eminent. His opinions, he explained, are backed by a lot of laboratory experiments.

He said he doesn't believe that colds are caused by any living organism, except that flu, gripe and some other diseases can damage the nose and so start a cold.

The usual causes, he said, are dusts, gases, emotions and especially those changes in the nose which come with changes in weather.

After an even temperature all summer, he said, you get cold fall weather. Your nasal passages get over-cooled. The same over-cooling happened in early days of air-conditioning when buildings and train temperatures were kept down to 60 in summer.

All these changes damage the nasal passage. And that damage starts a cold. Germs multiply and make it worse. The cold lasts until the nasal damage is repaired.

Dr. Kerr said lots of things happen with weather changes which go unnoticed as possible causes of colds.

An example is when a whole neighborhood starts furnaces on the same day in the fall. The nasal passages get a lot of unaccustomed dust and gas.

Dr. Kerr said you don't have to believe a virus causes colds just because there are epidemics. The epidemic does not spread from person to person, he said, but is something that a lot of

people have because they are all exposed at the same time to nose damage.

A person living a hundred miles from anyone, who cannot possibly get an infection from another human, still shows up with a common cold when the weather is bad, he said.

The "Physical"

Few things cause so much worry and distress to growing youngsters as adolescent pimples or acne. This skin disease comes at a time when boys and girls are terribly sensitive about their personal appearance.

Acne prefers the face, neck, upper part of the chest and shoulders. The pimple usually starts as a reddish lump which is slightly tender to touch. It often develops into a "white head," which actually consists of a mixture of pus, germs, skin oil, and destroyed tissue cells. The pimple may be near the surface of the skin or quite deep.

In the milder cases, the pimples are spaced rather widely apart and are near the surface. In more severe cases they are closer together, break out more frequently and burrow deeper into the skin. When a white head forms the top of the pustule finally breaks open, the pus escapes, a crust forms and healing takes place. If the pustule has been large and deep a permanent scar may be left, though this is fortunately the exception.

In addition to seeking proper advice and following it, the condition should be ignored so far as going to, or staying away from, social events is concerned. Dr. Jordan will answer questions from his readers in a special column once a week. Watch for it.

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Price Support On Perishable Food Assailed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Chairman Cooley (D-N.C.) of the House Agriculture Committee yesterday proposed that price supports of potatoes,

eggs and many other perishable crops be abandoned as too costly and unworkable.

It was learned that at a White House conference Cooley also told the president his administration should try to work out for these crops "something different from the Brannan Plan that has been repudiated by the Democratic Congress."

Mr. Truman had House Democratic leaders and Secretary of Agriculture Brannan in for an hour's discussion of farm problems, particularly what to do about perishable surplus commodities.

Cooley told reporters he felt the present price support program had worked well for commodities that can be stored indefinitely, such as cotton, grains, tobacco and peanuts, but not for perishable commodities.

"We should not destroy the farm program by trying to support prices in crops where such supports are unworkable," he said.

Those who attended the White House conference indicated a major aim was to unify administration forces on a farm program. Many Democrats are now opposed to the so-called Brannan Plan backed by Mr. Truman.

This plan, advanced by the agriculture secretary, would drop government price supports for perishable farm products. In place of the supports, the government would make direct payments to farmers if market prices of their produce dropped below what was held by the Agriculture Department to be a fair level under farm laws.

The White House meeting was suggested by Speaker Rayburn (Tex.) and House Democratic Leader McCormack (Mass). Other House members attending were Cooley and Rep. Face (D-Ga.).

Cooley, who acted as spokesman, said they discussed the whole problem of "perishable surplus agricultural commodities."

He said that his committee soon will resume hearings on various proposed changes in farm laws, and will hear officials of the Agriculture Department, the Commodity Credit Corporation, farm organizations and members of Congress as to their views on needed legislation.

McCormack said that the conference was "exploratory" in nature and that no definite program was decided upon.

HORSE-LOVER LIVES 'ON THE HOOF'

Mrs. Sammy J. Watley, who lives with her husband and five children at 1101 S. Clark, is what you might call, "a Jill of all trades."

Mrs. Watley, or Ada, as she is better known, is one of the three women horseshoers in the United States. The other two are to be found in Kentucky and Wyoming — at least, that is the report.

The Watley place looks like a miniature ranch yard, complete with barns, chicken yards, and a big haystack. Inside the barn is a multitude of equipment, making it possible for Ada and her husband, Sammy, to do anything from shoeing horses to roaching their manes. Roaching, simply means, in the language of the layman, "giving the horse a haircut."

Ada is a Gray County girl, having been born in Jericho in 1918, the daughter of Dick and Bessie E. Schaffer. She attended school at Schaffer school in Jericho, and in Pampa schools.

On March 9, 1938, Ada was married to Sammy Watley. "My father was a blacksmith before me," she says, "and from the time I was ten years old, I helped him shoe horses. After he died in 1942, Sammy and I moved to Pampa and started a horseshoe

shop."

In addition to shoeing horses, Ada does her own housework, cooking, sewing, washing and ironing, and carpentering. She is still putting the finishing touch on an extra room she built on the back of her house. She can cut out, fit, and sew a dress for one of her girls in an hour and a half with little trouble. "That's a lot of sewing when you have four girls in the family."

Ada and Sammy don't spend all their time in Pampa, though. They have portable shoeing equipment, and with it loaded in their pickup truck, can cover Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, and Colorado. Nearly every time they go to a rodeo or horse race out-of-state, they spend at least part of their time shoeing horses. As a matter of fact, they will probably have to shoe some during the rodeo down at McLean this weekend.

The lady blacksmith says she can shoe a gentle horse with a good disposition in about an hour and fifteen minutes. A horse with a bad disposition takes longer. She says Sammy can and will shoe nearly any horse, but she shies away from the wilder ones. "To do it together," she remarks, "we'll shoe anything."

They shod Frank Lard's Daffodil,

that won grand champion at the Quarter Horse Show in Amarillo this year. On occasion, Ada and Sammy have shod horses for the roping clubs in Pampa, Amarillo, and Dumas.

Ada says the reason she likes to shoe horses is "because I meet so many people. All the ranchers I shoe for are so nice. There seems to be a relationship between horses and the men who own them. I love horses and all men who own them are nice guys."

"You have to have a regular horseshoeing license to shoe horses out of state. The license is good as long as you belong to the National Horseshoers Association," Ada explains.

During the many hours when Ada and Sammy are going about their many jobs, Ada's mother, who lives next door, cares for the Watley children, De Ann, 11, Doris, 10, Davie, Marie, 8, Donna, 7, and Sammy J., 5.

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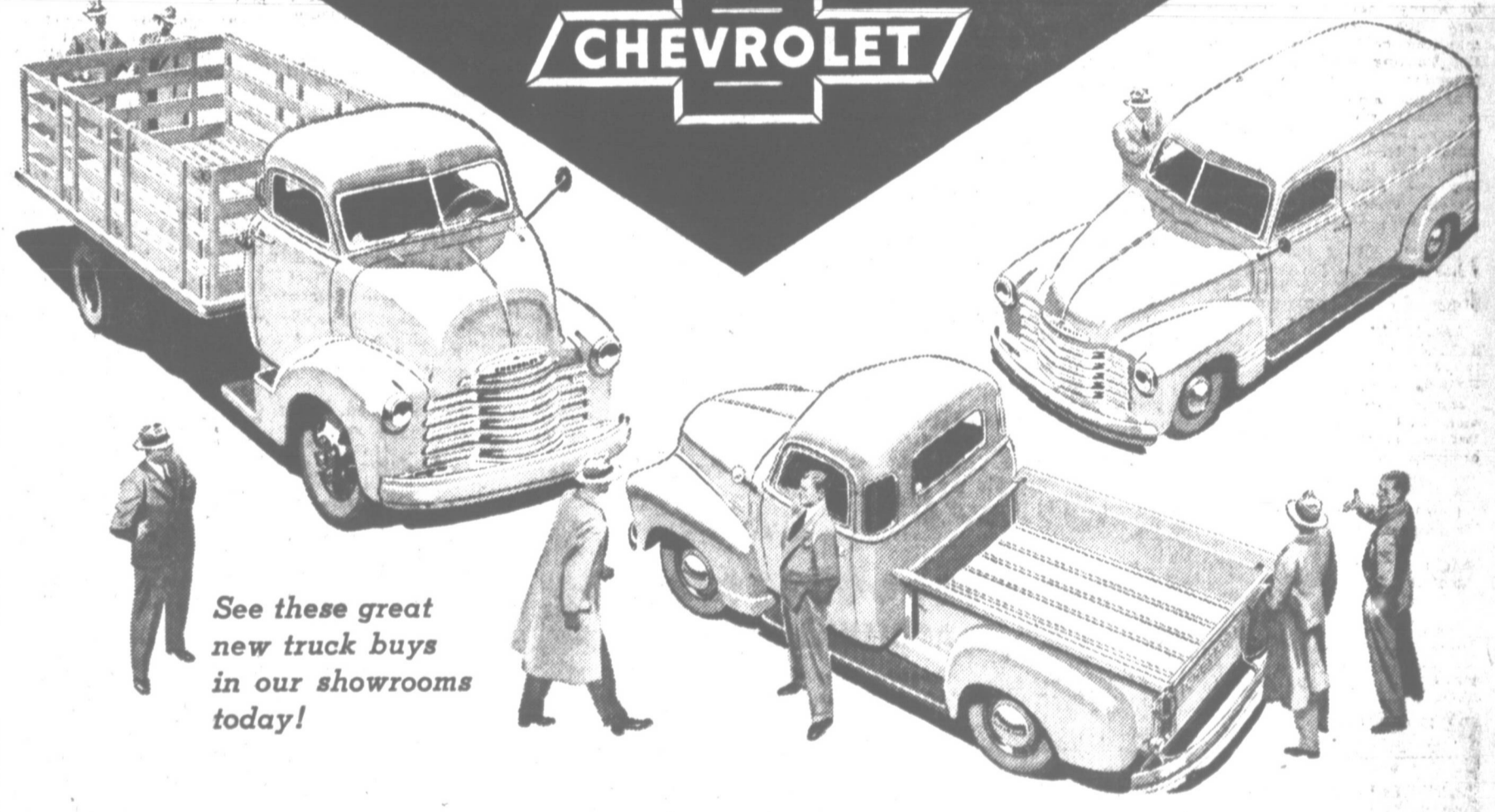

Stratojet Put First on List By Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force has put a 600-mile-an-hour jet bomber at the top of its buying list and intends to keep it there next year.

The favored plane is a B-47 Stratojet, which has just begun to come off the Boeing Aircraft Company's production line at Wichita, Kans.

Its speed, far above that of the B-36 intercontinental bomber, is counted upon to provide increased protection against interception by fighter planes.

The jet bomber's range, however, is only a fraction of that achieved by the B-36 with its piston engines.

While the combat radius of the B-36 is listed officially at 5,000 miles, that of the Stratojet is placed only at "more than 1,600 miles."

But the Air Force is busily trying to increase the range of the faster plane. Besides adopting more efficient engines for the craft, it recently ordered an experimental B-47 equipped with four engines of greater power than the six used on the type now in production.

When the jet bomber joins the medium bomber groups in which it will replace B-29 Superfortresses of World War II, its range will be increased further by B-29 tanker planes in those groups.

The tanker can be sent ahead of the jet bombers to refuel them on their way to targets.

Even with such refueling, the Stratojet is expected to require outlying bases for attacks on targets far from the United States.

Ultimately all of the medium bomber groups in the Air Force are to be re-equipped with B-47 jet bombers or B-50 Superfortresses, an improved version of the B-29.

Of 10 medium bomb groups which are scheduled to continue as such, three already have been converted to B-50s. Since B-50 production at the Boeing plant at Seattle is scheduled to end next fall, the jet bombers have a major place in future purchase plans.

All of the medium bomb groups are now stationed in the United States, except one in Guam and one in the United Kingdom.

During the fiscal year ending next June 30, the Air Force is spending \$303,600,000 to buy Stratojets. At the same time it is spending \$287,900,000 on B-36s. Additional purchases of B-36s to provide reserve planes for heavy bomb groups are expected next year.

Fast-Growing Colorado City Near Population of 1880s

If Colorado City, Texas, keeps on growing, it'll soon be a much bigger town than it was back in the 1880's.
Certainly it's a much more substantial community now and a prettier one — but perhaps not so lively as 85 years ago.
Colorado City is in Mitchell County, West Texas, 28 miles west of Sweetwater. The county was settled gradually between 1840 and 1875, chiefly by ranchers and buffalo hunters.
Then, in the early 80's, Colorado City became the western end of the Texas and Pacific Railway, a big market center. Settlers flocked to the area, set up ranches and raised tremendous

herds of beef cattle. The city, on the banks of the Colorado River, flourished. From there, cattle were driven north over the Chisholm Trail for sale in Kansas City and Chicago. "Colorado City even had mule-drawn street cars," Abe Whipkey, 85, pioneer resident told us. "The population was about 10,000."
Chief businesses were ranch supply houses and saloons.
Then came the terrific drought of 1885-1888. Streams and water holes dried up. Pastures parched in the blazing sun. Cattle died in great numbers. And there was another blow: the T&P moved on westward and Colorado City no longer was the important shipping center it had been. Popula-

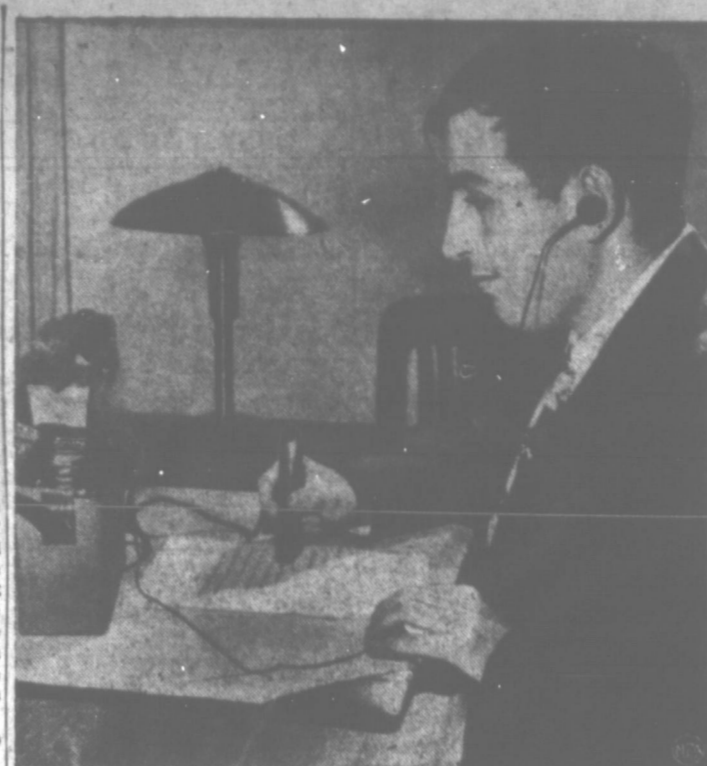
Russians Claim New Artificial Hand Best

MOSCOW — (AP) — A Russian has invented an artificial hand that a blind man could not tell wasn't real when he shook it, says "Trud."
The hand was invented by Victor Kononov who lost an arm in military service. The announcement said the Kononov hand can use a hammer, saw, chisel, wrench or axe. It can also be used in driving an automobile, writing and

pick-up anything a human hand can raise.
Hundreds of persons are said to be using the Kononov hand, including N. A. Nikitin, the famous circus horse trainer. He carries his whip in this hand.
There are about 280,000 roadside service stations in the United States.

The last census showed Colorado City with a population of 5,213. Now, its population is estimated at between 9,000 and 10,000.
The Texas Electric Service Company has dammed Morgan Creek near town, giving the city an assured water supply with a lake of 33,000 acre-feet. The electric company is building a \$3,000,000 power plant at the lake and a pipeline is being built from Colorado City to tap the lake's supply.
Oil, agriculture and ranching are contributing to the growth of Colorado City. Westbrook oil field is west of town. Sun field is south of town. Northwest of town is Sharon Ridge field and the great Snyder field is to the north. One thousand people live in Colorado City who work in crowded Snyder.

Colorado City is a friendly, informal community. We walked two blocks up the main street in the early afternoon and never saw a single man wearing a coat.
"We'll get along all right if it rains once in awhile," said L. A. Chapman, manager of the Chamber of Commerce. "People out here have a fine confidence in the country. I don't look for any boom, but I feel sure Colorado City will grow steadily. It has made a comeback."

Schools Rally To Threatened Profs' Cause

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Faculties at the University of Chicago and Iowa State College plan to give financial aid to any University of California faculty members who are fired for refusal to sign a loyalty oath.
The plan was announced here yesterday by Chancellor Robert

M. Hutchins of the University of Chicago.
Hutchins said other universities are considering the plan and that the fund will be used for a year to help professors get relocated if they are discharged. "any university would be glad to get men of the caliber of the California faculty," he said at a press conference.
He said professors joining the plan will subscribe two percent of their annual salary. "From Chicago alone, that will mean a fund of \$80,000," he said. Hutchins said he is contributing two percent and "am going to do all I can in this matter."
"This plan," he said, "reflects the general attitude of the academic world toward the University of California regents' action. It is a matter of universal concern to universities. We regard the oath as a very dangerous precedent."
The University of California board of regents is to meet at the Davis campus tomorrow. This will be the regents' last meeting before April 30, which they have set as the deadline for faculty members to sign the loyalty oath or face dismissal. The order to sign was sustained by a 10-10 tie vote of the regents at a recent meeting on a motion to rescind the requirement.

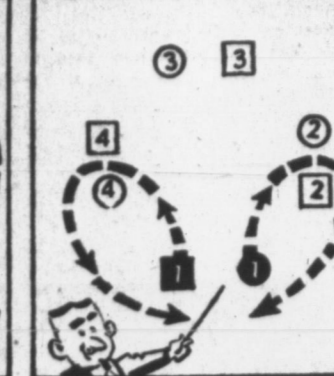

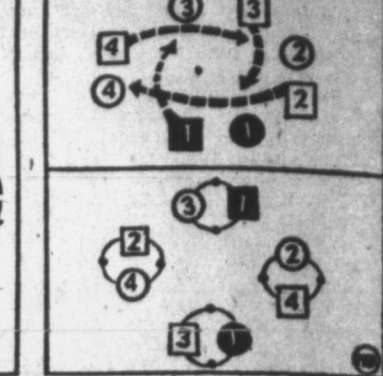

50 Varieties of Pneumonia Known by Medical Science

BOSTON — (AP) — There are probably 50 different kinds of pneumonia and the chances are that "cold with upper respiratory infection" you had this spring was one of them.

These pneumonias are not really new, Dr. Hobart A. Reimann, Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, told the American College of Physicians. They are, he said, just beginning to be recognized.

You can comfort yourself with knowing that none of the pneumonias are as fatal as formerly. Lobar, the form which gave pneumonia its dreaded killing power every winter, happens just as often now as ever. But with sulfa and penicillin it no longer kills so often.

Along with lobar pneumonia, Dr. Reimann said went strep, staphylococcus, and several other pneumonias all of them with killing rates of about 60 percent. Penicillin stopped these deaths. When doctors no longer had to face a possible battle for your life with pneumonia, they began to discover many other kinds.

All can make you very sick. For example, said Dr. Reimann, one of the most recent pneumonias comes from a fungus found on dogs and rodents. It is called histoplasmosis. It is common in the Midwest, but occurs all over the country. There are bird and animal pneumonias which you can catch. Some, like parrot fever, can be recognized. But many of them are just a mean sickness, the cause of which cannot be traced.

The virus pneumonia, about which most people talk, got its name from epidemics that swept

the country between 1941 and 1943. Since then, Dr. Reimann said, the epidemics of this pneumonia have stopped. But single cases occur frequently at this time of year. Dr. Reimann said it is possible that this epidemic will strike again.

Meanwhile doctors have identified numerous other pneumonias all presumably caused by viruses. The next step will be to hunt for the viruses, and after that for a medicine for each one.

'Other Driver' Usually Lucky, Report Shows

AUSTIN — (AP) — If you are one of those drivers who watches the other fellow to avoid accidents—that's fine. But public safety officials wish you would keep an eye on yourself, too.

Why? Because "self-watching could have made the difference between life and death" in 61 percent of the rural fatal accidents in Texas last year.

N. K. Woerner, chief statistician of the Department of Public Safety, arrives at the figure of 61 percent because there were that many fatal accidents in which only one motor vehicle was involved, therefore, only one driver. Those accidents accounted for 1,395 of the state's 1,957 traffic deaths in 1949.

This is one of many findings reported in a 48-page booklet which the Department of Public Safety is distributing to help educate Texas drivers in the art of staying alive.

The pamphlet is entitled "You Are The Other Fellow." Woerner explains it is the department's sincere desire that the information offered will "assist in keeping you from being the other fellow—the one who may die in a traffic accident in 1950."

Fire Losses Up Sharply in March

NEW YORK — (AP) — Fire losses in March rose sharply to the highest total in two years, the National Board of Fire Underwriters reported.

Last month's losses were estimated at \$72,468,000. This was one of the three highest monthly fire loss totals recorded in the last 20 years. The other two high-loss months were March, 1948, with a peak of \$74,236,000, and March, 1947, \$72,435,000.

State's Crops Still in Need Of Moisture

AUSTIN — (AP) — Weekend rains were life-saving for many crops but more rains must come to save others, the United States Department of Agriculture reported. Limited acreages of corn, grain sorghums and cotton which had been planted before the rains now have ample moisture for germination, seeding of these crops can be rushed to completion, the report said.

Small grains and pastures also benefited. Rains were reported as light and inadequate, however, in much of the northern High Plains, western counties of the southern High Plains, the Trans-Pecos area and counties along the Rio Grande.

USDA said deterioration of wheat in the important High Plains was temporarily checked but additional rains must come soon to maintain the already meager prospects for the wheat crop in that area. Considerable acreage has already been abandoned and some was plowed out during the past week.

Prospects for wheat and oats were greatly improved by the rains. Flaxseed in the important southern counties continued to show poor yield prospects, but a small acreage in central and western counties was helping by the rains.

Most fruit and pecan trees were reported in good condition. Trees in the early section were setting fruit and the late areas were in bloom.

Commercial vegetable prospects improved in most areas. The rains came too late, however, to be of much help to non-irrigated onions in South Texas. All of the late spring tomato areas from Falfurrias to the northeastern counties were still badly in need of moisture, USDA said.

Accused Slayer Of Texas Officer Is Transferred

OJINAGA, Mexico — (AP) — The case of Jose Villalobos, 24, charged with murdering a Texas sheriff, has been transferred to Chihuahua, Mexico.

The mayor of Ojinaga said he received word yesterday of the transfer from the judge at Juarez, under whose jurisdiction Villalobos has been.

Villalobos will remain in jail here, the mayor said, until the judge at Chihuahua decides on a date of transfer.

Villalobos has been held in the Ojinaga jail since March 18, four days after O. W. (Blackie) Morrow, sheriff of Presidio county, was shot to death on a lonely mountain road between Presidio and Marfa. Ojinaga is across the Rio Grande from Presidio. Villalobos was arrested in the mountains of Northern Mexico.

The hearing scheduled for Villalobos for yesterday was not held because of the order of transfer, the mayor said. The hearing originally was scheduled April 14 but was postponed then until April 18.

Delay Predicted In Crime Probe

WASHINGTON — (AP) — It may be some time before the Senate begins action on legislation aimed at launching a \$150,000 nationwide crime investigation.

Democratic Leader Lucas of Illinois said today that party leaders would not sidetrack other important legislation for a prolonged debate on the proposed inquiry.

In the meantime a Senate commerce subcommittee went ahead with plans to hear testimony Thursday and Friday from city officials supporting a bill to ban the sending of gambling information across state lines. It is aimed primarily at horse race bookmaker operations.

West German Regime Not Taken Too Seriously, Committee Is Told

WASHINGTON — Congress members received a report yesterday that the present West German government "is not taken very seriously by the German people."

The report was given to the Senate-House "watchdog" committee on foreign aid by staff members who said the observations were based on a five-month-old study.

Noting that the study was made last fall, the report said: "It is our judgment that the present German government, although elected by a majority, is not taken very seriously by the German people and has not shouldered too much responsibility for the interests of the people."

The report was submitted at a closed meeting called to consider a request by Senator Bridges (R-NA) for a full-scale investigation of Allied policy in Western Germany. Chairman McCarran (D-Nev) said in advance the group had neither time nor money for such an inquiry.

USDA Farmer Committee System Due to Die Dec. 31

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Agriculture Department's far-flung field organization for carrying out its multi-billion-dollar farm-aid program must get a new authorization from Congress or go out of business this year. Legal authority for the organization — with its 90,000 farmer committeemen — is due to expire Dec. 31.

With many lawmakers already beginning to talk about adjournment for this year's vital congressional campaigns, the administration has made its second appeal within a year for authority to continue its present administrative machinery.

The farmer-committee system is being operated under authority of the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Acts of 1934. The major function of this law is to provide financial aid to farmers for carrying out soil conservation and building programs.

Under this program, the department is distributing about \$225,000,000 a year among farmers who carry out department-approved soil use and conservation practices. To help it administer this program, the department set up the farmer committee system.

Douglas Aircraft's Profits in Decline

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — (AP) — Douglas Aircraft Co. has reported net profit in the quarter ended Feb. 28 fell to \$81,319 from \$2,061,529 in the like quarter last year. It was equal to 1.85 percent of sales, compared with 3.34 last year.

ODESSA CANDIDATE CALLS OPPONENT GOP

ODESSA — (AP) — District Judge Paul Moss, Odessa, opened his campaign for Congress from the 9th Texas District here with a program "down the middle of the road" and a blast at his opponent, incumbent Ken Regan, Midland.

Moss went on record for a strong veterans' program including a veterans general hospital at El Paso, and opposed what he called socialized medicine. He also opposes oil imports which would damage Texas oil industry.

Moss promised support to the veterans land program at Pecos and promised to fight against discriminating freight rates for West Texas.

Moss termed Regan a "Republican" and said he was serving friends and business associates

and "people with enough money to contribute to a campaign fund."

The Odessa jurist and rancher advocated a balanced budget and endorsed proper housing for the underprivileged and a stable economy for farmers, which, he said, in no way implies that we must sacrifice free enterprise and liberty.

Pied Piper of Rabid Foxes Delays Visit



ATHENS, Texas — (AP) — A Brownwood man's appearance here as a pied-piper of rabid foxes has been delayed until next week end.

A. L. Lindsey of Brownwood originally had offered to come this week end. But County Judge James Spencer said threatening rains might spoil the hunt if it is held this week.

Lindsey is an expert fox hunter and caller. He had offered the services not only of himself but also of several friends, all using specially designed fox callers. He said there would be no charge.

The Brownwood man and his fellow hunters have successfully lured and killed numbers of the animals in other parts of Texas. Rabid foxes, a threat to people as well as livestock, have been objects of extensive hunts in East Texas.

"It can't cost the county of the individuals a dime, and it might help a great deal in killing a number of foxes which we are now paying out money to have exterminated by a paid trapper," said Judge Spencer. "Also it would be a great help to us if our local hunters could learn to operate the fox calls and get interested in the sport of hunting and calling the animals as Lindsey and his friends have."

Traction Company's Workers Begin Strike

JOHNSTOWN, Pa. — (AP) — A trolley and bus service was halted in this milltown today as 300 employees of the Johnstown Traction Company went on strike.

The stoppage began a few hours after an unsuccessful last minute conference in the office of Mayor Walter E. Rose.

The transit company's trolleys and buses serve a metropolitan area of 150,000 persons, including thousands of industrial plant workers.

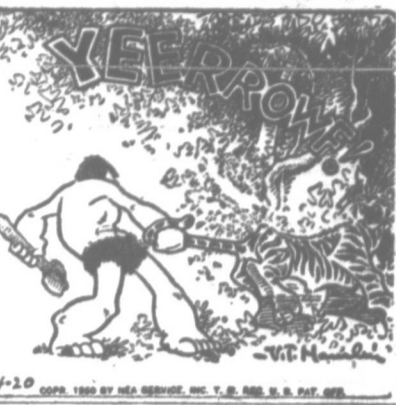

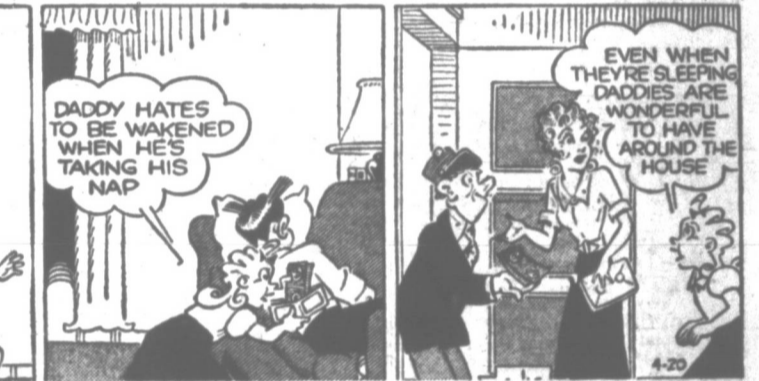

Author Writes Of 'Forgotten Men' of War

Lying in a Veterans' Administration hospital in the South is Lieutenant Corridan, who was decorated for extraordinary heroism at Anzio beachhead. After collapse from exposure he was invalided home with tuberculosis. In his six years at the hospital his fiancée has phoned him once but has never come to see him. Of three brothers and three sisters and their wives and husbands — most of them living nearby — not one has visited him. Yet he is winning his fight against tuberculosis — and neglect.

That Anzio hero is one of tens of thousands who lie today on the white coats of veterans' hospitals, shamefully neglected by their families. Holman Harvey, writer, toured the nation's VA hospitals, sat by the bedside of scores of patients and talked with doctors and nurses. He reports what he found in the Reader's Digest.

Other soldiers don't take the neglect as well as Lt. Corridan. Pvt. Joe Hansen repeatedly telephoned his absent family, without result. Recently he turned over quietly on his cot and died. Harvey got the story from Hansen's roommate: "Joe had a wife and three kids, and two brothers. They never came to see him. He lay there brooding over them for months on end."

Unruh Tells Bribe Plan

PEORIA, Ill. — (AP) — Paul Unruh, Bradley University basketball star, says he turned down a \$100 to \$500 bribe offer to throw a National Invitational Tournament game in New York last month.

He said also that no report was made to tournament officials or to the district attorney in New York. The Bradley star disclosed the bribe offer for the first time during a speech at a church dinner in Pekin, Ill., Tuesday night. He said the man offered to pay \$100 if Bradley won a game by six points and \$500 if it won by two points in any tournament game.

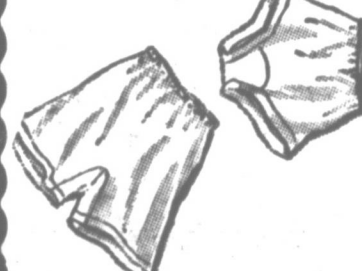
