

Heart Drive Exceeds Goal

"The Borden County Heart Association has set a goal of \$1,000" announced Rich Anderson as he kicked off the 1978 Heart Fund Drive.

The High School Auditorium was the scene of the Annual "Talent Show" sponsored by the Borden County Heart Association Saturday, April 29. Acting as Master of Cere-

Ginger was born with a congenital heart defect which was corrected by surgery when she was only 5 1/2 months old. 





BATF asserts that they have the legal right to make the proposed changes without the consent of Congress. They intend to collect in a computer, for instant retrieval, all information needed to identify, locate, and seize all firearms registered. They intend to force gun dealers, manufacturers, gunsmiths, importers, and owners to report the purchase, sale, theft, loss, or other change of possession of any gun. They propose to stamp each gun with a 14 digit serial number, unique to that gun.

Why do all this, unless they intend to deprive us of our firearms? Without a willing seller, a willing, buyer, and an agreed price, they will be stealing

What a frustrating week to have been in Washington. It was my privilege to again attend the Daughters of the American Revolution Continental Congress. I continue to be impressed with the integrity of the Daughters. The frustration lay in the realization that the opinion of those women was single minded. And they in part made up the 80% of US who opposed the surrender of our Canal in Panama. Yet the treaty passed by the same narrowness (two votes) as did the neutrality pact. Tuesday, April 18, 1978 should be remembered as a day of infamy-that being the day that 68 arrogant Senators defied their constituents and succumbed to the pressure of a peanut farmer from Georgia and a communist dictator from Panama.

A group of Texans called upon the junior senator from their state on the day before the vote was cast. Few of us had much hope of swaying Mr. Bentsen, but we were aghast at the reception received. It seems he had promised some of those in the delegation an audience on that day. But we were told the good man was out of the office-unavailablebusy-tied up. Well, we quietly stood in his office-25 or so of us. At last we were ushered into his private sanctuary. Lloyd Bentsen was hostile, disdainful and nearly rude.

When asked how he justified casting a vote which reflected maybe twenty percent of his constituents, he informed us that if we expected him to vote on every issue according to opinion of his constituents, then we didn't need him or any other elected official in Washington. That we should simply register our opinion

When pinned down as to why he wanted to give up the Canal, he said that his ANTI-communist friends had convinced him that it would please the com-munist for US to reject the treaty. The only anti-communist (so he claims) I know who wanted the treaty was Bill Buckley. Even he never gave THAT reason, however. But let's examine that statement, Yes, I can understand how anticommunists could come to that conclusion. After 12 or more vears of negotiating secretlyafter Vietnam-after being made to feel guilty of our "colonialism", it isn't hard to understand that having gone this far, a rejection would be an invitation to war. The sad fact is that the United States need never have gotten to this point. At the first mention of colonialism or negotiation, we should have calmly said, "This is our Canal, if you want it, you'll have to come get it-if you think you're big enough".

"So, Mr. Bentsen, would you vote to go to war should Panam a not abide by the treaties?" "Yes, I would." The next day Torrijos flexed his muscles and virtually tore the neutrality pact to shreds. But you see, Mr. Bentsen isn't likely to be voting in the Senate by 2000AD-at which time the treaty goes into effect. It is easy for him to talk big knowing it won't be his responsibility to put US in a war. But it was his responsibility to see that the United States never have up anything which was hers-and which we might have to take back at a future

There was a pall over the DAR Congress that night of April 18th. Senator Jesse Helms and Representative Philip Crane were there to commiserate. They reminded us that this is an election year. And even tho the Honorable Lloyd Bentsen is not up for re-election this year, DARs don't easily forget-nor should you.





SIGN-UP PERIOD EXTENDED

Many producers either have not signed up or may wish to change intentions due to recent administrative changes initiated by USDA for the 1978 program. The period for filing an intention to participate on farms with a crop subject to set-aside or voluntary diversion is extended to May 15. The final certification date for wheat and all other small grains has also been extended to May 15.

EMERGENCY LIVESTOCK FEED PROGRAM

All Emergency Feed Applications expired April 30, 1978. Producers with receipts on feed eligible for payment under the program should come by the County Olfice as soon as possible to complete transactions for the feeding period ending April 30th.

A new crop year began May 1 and producers filing an application (approved or disapproved) under the previous feeding period are eligible to sign up under the program for a 30-day feeding period. New applications for assistance under the program will be accepted beginning May 31, 1978,
