

# U.S. Is Ready To 'Lick Hell'

WASHINGTON -(P)- In some U. S. is ready to "lick hell" out of Russia on an hour's notice.







The "Water and Sewer Improvement Interest and Sinking Fund" is for servicing the 1948 Water and Sewer Improvement Bond issue in the amount of \$550,000.00, and the "General Interest and Sinking Fund" is for servicing all other Tax Bonds.

A fund termed "1945 Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds Interest and Sinking Fund" is used for the purpose of servicing the 1945 Water and Sewer Revenue Bond Issue and the income of the fund consists entirely of direct transfers from the Water and Sewer Fund.

The Bond indebtedness of the City of Pampa consists of seventeen separate issues bearing interest from 1-3/4% to 6%. Although a number of the Bond issues were issued for the Water and Sewer Department they are all payable from taxes with the exception of the one issue.

FUND BALANCES: Fund balances on September 30, 1949, amounted to \$85,198.59 cash plus \$15,000:00 bonds owned by the General Interest & Sinking Fund and \$319,-513.00 owned by the Construction Funds.



The tall, controversial figure who won seven national championships and was ranked No. 1 the country for 10 straight years from 1920 through '29, won the vote of 310 out of 391 participants in the Associated Press' mid-century sports poll.

The voters looked back beyond the recent events involving the great champion and cast almost, solid ballot for Tilden, the tennis player.

Jack Kramer, the current professional king, attracted 32 votes. Don Budge, the red headed comet of the late Thirties, was the choice of 31 experts. Mrs. Helen Wills Moody, glamorous seventime woman's champion, was voted greatest of the period by 12. The remaining six votes were divided among five players.



THE NATIONAL rent control law, which has done a good job of taking from one group society and giving to another, will expire June 30, if the lawmakers will but let it.

A vicarious gesture was made the 80th Congress when the original rent control law was modified giving states and communities the right to lift the restraints of this law. The 81st, through whose veins

WE CHECKED back in The

News - to prove our point. May 25, 1949, the City Commission here forwarded a resolution to Austin asking decontrol of rents here. Bear in mind that at that time we were still controlled. On that day there were seven apartments advertised for rent in The News, and no houses. The day before, there were five apartments for rent, no houses; May extensively controlled an economy 23, four apartments, no houses. On May 22, a Sunday, there were two apartments for rent, and one house. A total of 18 apartment ads appeared in those four days, with one house ad.

On Sunday, Jan. 29, 1950, there were 22 ads offering apartments for rent, 16 offering houses, Jan. 21 and 15 respectively; Jan. 31, 23 and 14; and Feb. 1. and 10. In those four days of the week, same days as in the 1949 survey, there was a total of 88 apartment ads, 55 house ads.

A somewhat more detailed list has been set up by Mr. Stuart Chase, Mr. Chase, who is always the honest disputant, gives an outline of the things which would either have to be established or considered:

1. There would have to be a "strong, centralized government." 2. The powers of the President would have to be enlarged at the expense of the Congress and the

3. The government would have to control banking, credit and security exchanges. 4. The government would have

to guarantee employment, if not through private industry, then through armaments and public 5. Of course there would be old-

age pensions, mothers' pensions unemployment insurance, etc. 6. The government would have to insure to all "food, housing and medical care."
7. There would have to be sup-

9. Complete control by the government over foreign trade. 10. Control of natural energy sources such as hydroelectric power, coal and gas, transportation

12. Youth camps for young men and women. At this point Mr. Chase suggests that these would be devoted to "health, discipline, community service and ideological eaching consistent with those of the authorities." Mr. Chase does not indicate that he endorses this, but this is one of the things we would have to face. 13. Heavy taxation.

14. There would not be so much "taking over all industries in the old Socialistic sense." 



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

per ton.
"At first glance," he writes, "it looks like very little, but let us perform the following calculation: "We know that one kilogram (1,000 grams) of fissionable material contains an amount nuclear energy equivalent to 20,000 tons of TNT if it is exploded (as in the atomic bomb) or about 20,000 tons of gasoline

Thus the 16 grams of uranium and thorium contained in one ton granite rock, if turned into fissionable materials, would be equivalent to 320 tons of ordinary

"That is enough to repay us for all the complicated trouble of separation - especially if we found that we were nearing the end of our supply of richer de posits of ore."
