Passes Meat Import Bill

T. A. Cumningham, president of the Independent Cattlemen's Association, said today that cattlemen across the nation should be encouraged by the Senate's passage of Sen. Lloyd Bentsen's meat import revision legislation.

Bentsen's bill passed the

Senate Friday, May 5, by voice vote.

Bentsen's bill revised the 1964 law by using a countercyclical approach. The proposed legislation would reduce imports when domestic production is high and increase imported meat when domestic suppliers report low production

School Board Meeting

New Girls Coach Hired

The Board of Trustees of The Borden County Independent School District met in regular session on Monday, May 15 at 8:00 P.M. After routine business of minutes and bills, The Board approved a film contract with the Education Service Center in Lubbock for the 1978-1979 school year. The Superintendent presented The Board with the financial report. The attendance was reported as 70 in high school and 156 in elementary.

Superintendent McLeroy reported that the problem with the gym floor had been resolved. A new gym floor will be constructed by the contractor. It was reported to the

Board that the school district had the full co-operation of the architects and also Monterey Construction Company. In other business, the purchase of an ice machine for the school cafeteria was approved.

The Board approved the contract of Mr. Larry Steele of McCamey as girls basketball coach for the 1978-79 school year. The Superintendent reported that the head football position had been narrowed to two people, but that he hwas not ready to make a recommendation at this time.

The Board appointed Rich Anderson to the Board of Equalization to replace Brent Murphy who was elected to the Board Of Trustees.

U. I. L. Changes

Six-player girls' high school basketball in Texas is going by the way side.

By a vote of 549-369, superintendents of schools participating in girls' basketball have decreed that the half-court, three-on-three game played statewide by Texas girls since 1942 be changed to full-court, five-on-five beginning next se ason.

The controversial issue was one of eight propositions voted on by UIL-member schools in a referendum. The results were released to coaches at a Saturday morning meeting held in conjunction with the girls' state track meet in Austin.

With Texas' vote to go the full-court basketball game as played by the boys, only four states - Iowa, Tennessee, Arkansas and Oklahoma - remain with the six-player style for girls.

Out of Texas' five classifications of schools, only Class A voted against the five-player style, 106-74. Class B schools voted 127-122 for the change, AA 119-76, AAA 68-41 and AAAA 161-24. Although A voted to retain the old style, its schools will have to go along with the majority.

Ballot No. 1 passed by a vote of 775 to 114 allowing these additions to the football plans. In schools where junior high consists of the 9th grade, football practice will begin no earlier than the second Monday prior to the first Thursday in September. Practice is to be conducted without contact equipment. Equipment allowed is shoes, socks and shorts. Jr. High cannot work out prior to the first day of school and cannot play a scrimmage or a game until the second Thursday in September."

Ballot No. 4 passed 835 to 156 pretaining to eligibility in League contests. He/she must have been in attendance at the school to which he/she changes for one year if: (1) his/her parents reside outside the school district; or (2) his/her parents reside outside the school attendance zone in




Coach Van Kountz sponsored Martha Anderson at Southwest University last weekend as she auditioned for a basketball scholarship.

You are fortunate to have been in a system free to have rules with the freedom to enforce them.

For the little kids, the end of school is a happy-sad time too. Happy, happy that the summer days will be less structured. They'll play house and in a week, will be playing school. They'll swim, go barefoot and eat watermelon. Sad too-they'll miss their home room teacher and think they'll never love another as well. They'll miss the daily companionship of friends-some they won't see til school starts again. Sad too cause they may never see the big kids againthey'll stand around and look sideways at the seniors, learning all they can of their mannerisms. This summer they'll "pretend" to be big kids-wishing to be a senior too soon.

Graduation day for the teachers is happy-sad too. Happy to see the accomplishments of the students which they have facilitated. Happy that they are free to teach in a small, rural system without the fetters of bureaucratic bigness. Sad that some will not return to Gail School for reasons not fully

Your County Agent Says by Randy Upshaw, CEA

Vernon, Texas -- It is almost time for Rolling Plains and High Plains ranchers to be thinking about mesquite brush control with aeriallysprayed herbicides.

To determine if the right conditions exist to provide a good kill, it is necessary to take a look at weather conditions beginning last fall. Herbicides used to control mesquite are growth-regulating chemicals that must be translocated from the leaves to the stems and roots to be most effective. Translocation of the herbicide is strongly influenced by growing conditions at the time of the herbicide application. These conditions vary from year to year. Mesquite growth appears to be closely related to climatic conditions which precede the spraying

date.
Charlie Fisher, Cecil Meadors and Dr. Pete Jacoby, brush control researchers with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station have recently compared research results from tests on herbicide control of mesquite conducted since 1929 with rainfall records prior to spraying.

They found that highest kills of mesquite occurred when monthly rainfall exceeded the long term average on each of the six months prior to spray-

Mesquite sprayed with 2, 4,5,-T at the one-half pound per acre rate averaged 77 percent root kill on six ranch locations when rainfall exceeded the long term average on each of the six months prior to

With a decrease in the number of months when rainfall exceeded the average there was a corresponding decrease in mesquite control. When only 4 months of rainfall that was above average, mesquite kill averaged 42 percent root kill on 12 ranch tests.

The researchers reported that only three months of above average rainfall lowered kills to an average of 34 %. However, when average amount of rainfall is received, mesquite root kill averaged 25 percent. This would be the average control of mesquite from 2,4,5-T if average rainfall was received in each of the six months prior to spraying.

Thus, the study shows that average results in mesquite control by aerial spraying of herbicide occurred when monthly rainfall is average or slightly above average for at least three months preceding application of herbicide. Highest plant kills occurred when monthly rainfall exceeded the average for six months prior spraying, while poorest results occurred following conditions when only two or less months exceeded thelong term average prior to spraying.

Time of application of the herbicide is important to o. tain the maximum kill that current growth conditions will allow. Mesquite should not be sprayed until the leaves have fully extended and have turned from the light green to the dark

green color. Another factor that should be checked is soil temperature. Best kill of mesquite is usually obtained when the soil temperature at eighteen inches of depth at time of spraying is 75 degreesF. or above. If possible, spraying should be delayed for ten to twenty-one days after a significant rainfall to allow new growth to mature. To obtain maximum root kill

of mesquite, check growth conditions of the mesquite and soil

temperature before spraying.
The three registered and effective herbicides for control of mesquite in Texas using aerial broadcast spray are 2,4,5-T, picloram and 2,4,5-T mixture (Tordon 225); and dicamba and 2,4,5-T mixture (Banvel 2 plus 2).


