Don't Let Firebug Get Your Home; Follow Rules or Build With Stone

Because a large percentage of the fires in the United States occur in the home, housewives are showing a greater interest in fire-safety than ever before, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters. In addition, women's organizations increasing are putting fire prevention on their agendas for discussion and action.

A survey of U. S. cities last year revealed that 70 percent of all building fires broke out in the home. These home fires totaled 274,682 in cities alone, an increase of nearly 9 percent above the number of urban residential fires for the year before.

Careful! That Gun Might Fire

That's a nice-looking Luger you have in your duffel bag. One just like it took the lives of 13 people in Camden, N. J., recently, when Howard Unruh ran amok.

You say you're no Unruh—and besides, your souvenir Luger doesn't work? It's all rusted and it isn't loaded. John and Jane Porter thought the same thing about a much older souvenir—a cumbersome old Civil War rifle. But one day not so long ago they heard a loud, explosive report, smoke filled the room and their 12-year-old son lay wounded.

"We didn't dream that gun could still go off," Johnny's parents wept. "It was so old."

Cases like this and the Unruh tragedy aren't isolated. Even though the veterans who brought them home knew all about weapons, souvenirs collected in the World War I alone were responsible for the deaths of 70,000 people before Pearl Harbor was bombed — 80 percent of them children.

Since V-J Day that toll has skyrocketed.

As a result, and especially because of reaction to the New Jersey tragedy, government agencies throughout the nation again are stepping up their campaign to do away with this menace of weapons like the Luger you brought back from Europe.

In the week following the Unruh incident local and federal police units had a case that dramatized their appeal. From coast to coast thousands of families phoned to turn in their souvenir guns and swords, grenades and other explosive trifles.

The investigator in charge of the Alcohol Tax Unit of the Internal Revenue Bureau for New York, Walter F. Carroll, estimated 50,000 guns would be turned in to his office alone. Switchboards were lighted up for days by citizens anxious to accept his invitation to have their souvenirs "deactivated."

But these officers are still worried — afraid they'll only scratch the surface before this latest outburst of public cooperation dies down. Carroll, for example, thinks there are more than 200,000 potentially dangerous souvenirs remaining within the narrow confines of New York alone.

He knows what tragedy they

may bring, remembering the young housewife who was pleased when her husband unpacked a 20 mm. shell. She took it to a neighborhood craft shop, had it mounted and placed it on her knickknack shelf.

This housewife never touched that souvenir except to dust—but one day it exploded.

That shell probably was brought home legally. Special Regulation 550-25-1 permitted such souvenirs, when properly certified, just as you may be within your rights in hanging on to that Luger or potato-masher grenade or Sumara sword.

But legal or not, wherever that weapon lies today, there danger lurks. Servicemen with such weapons are being urged again, as they have been before, to have them checked carefully for safety by authorities at their installations.

Better still, as Investigator Carroll advises: "If you must keep a gun of your own, keep an American gun. Mausers, Lugers and what have you may be all right, or then again they may not. An American gun is best every time."

1. Keep matches out of the reach of small children. Distribute enough ashtrays about the house. Don't permit any smoking in bed.
2. Don't play home handyman with electric wiring. Have faulty wiring repaired by a qualified electrician.
3. All electrical appliances should bear the label of Underwriters' Laboratories Inc. for your safety.
4. Have furnace and chimney cleaned at least once a year. Check for cracks, loose bricks. Use metal container for ashes.
5. Don't allow rubbish, papers, magazines, or other combustibles to collect in alleys, closets, or cellars.
6. Keep portable heaters clean and place them so they can't be tipped over.
7. Put a metal screen in front of the fireplace.
8. Never use gasoline for cleaning. If you must dry-clean at home, use cleaning fluids bearing the U. L. label.

Woman Gets Two Husbands in War

HAMBURG, Germany — (AP) — Two German officers met in a Russian prison camp. They soon discovered that they lived in the same German town, in the same street, at the same number—and had the same wife.

This was how it came about, according to the Hamburg newspaper "Abendblatt": A German major, returning to the front from home leave in 1942, told his wife to marry again if he were killed. Soon she was officially told of his death in action.

Eighteen months later she married another officer. In due course he was captured. But husband number one had not been killed. He was picked up on the battlefield by the Russians.

Finally through the painfully slow communications from Russian prison camps the wife learned of her difficult position. She asked the two men to wait until they are back from Russia. Then, she says, she will decide which one to keep as her husband.

Three-Fourths of Home Fires Are Avoidable

Three-quarters of the nation's home fires may be averted during the next twelve months if citizens follow a few simple fire prevention rules, safety officials assert. Otherwise, flames are expected to consume 10,000 American lives and damage property worth \$700,000,000.

Safe habits in the home are recognized as being the most effective preventers of conflagrations, because studies by the National Board of Fire Underwriters have proved that three out of four of all home fires start as a result of carelessness.

Children playing with matches and adults who toss away lighted smoking materials provide the sparks which start approximately thirty percent of home fires. Thus, these fires may be eliminated if matches are kept away from youthful hands and if grownups remember to extinguish cigars and cigarettes before discarding them.

As added insurance against this most common fire cause, authorities say the grounds around a home should be kept spotlessly clean at all times. They recommend galvanized steel ash and garbage cans for storing waste materials which flare up whenever a match or lighted tobacco is thrown into them. Galvanized steel ash and garbage cans have close-fitting covers and fire proof bodies to protect refuse.

Defective heating equipment is the second most common cause of home fires. The suggested precaution is to have chimneys, stoves and furnaces inspected at regular intervals. Special attention is advised for soot-filled or cracked chimneys, which let excess heat collect in walls of buildings, often resulting in fires.

Next in importance as a home fire hazard is the misuse of gasoline and other flammable liquids. Such fluids never are recommended for home dry cleaning, since their fumes may be ignited by any spark within a radius of two hundred feet. Carbon tetrachloride is regarded as the only safe liquid for home dry cleaning. Because of the low ignition

point of most liquid fuels and cleaners, safety officials recommend storing them in underground tanks away from buildings. Small amounts, however, may be stored in galvanized steel gasoline or oil cans. These containers are of fireproof construction.

Misuse of electricity and carelessness with electrical appliances are the final leading cause of home fires. Amateur electricians and forgetful housewives are the culprits. The recommended practice is to let skilled electricians handle all household wiring jobs and to disconnect irons and toasters before leaving rooms to answer telephones.

Convert Given No Chance to Backslide

NEW YORK (AP)—In a roundup of Communists in a Nationalist section of China recently, General Li Chi Pin discovered among the Communists some who had learned about doctrines of the Catholic Church and wanted to be baptized.

One day, reports the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, the military chief told a local priest one of the Communists wanted to be baptized. "You should not come, Father," he warned. "We will baptize him ourselves."

The next morning at sunrise the Communists were executed. In the afternoon the military chief returned with a smile on his face. "Well, how did everything go?" asked the priest. "Very well, Father. I stood next to him and when the music stopped immediately before the execution I baptized him. Before the water was dry on his head, he was already in the other world. He never had a chance to damn his soul!"

Expensive Malay Weddings Deplored

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP)—The Malay mothers-in-law are to blame. Son insists modern-thinking Malays who are trying to break down the conservative tradition that brings bankruptcy to a family when one of the children gets married.

The Malay wedding, even in the most impoverished kampongs (settlements) of Malaysia, cost upwards of \$2,750. And it's the hidebound mother-in-law who demands that tradition be upheld even if it cripples family finances to the extent that houses have to be mortgaged, says the Penang branch of the United Malay National Organization.

The unofficial 1949 West Texas New Mexico League batting and pitching records have been released by Troy Kegans, official league statistician. Chinese steamship companies cancelled scheduled runs from Hong Kong to Canton. The Hong Kong government ordered suspension of air traffic between Canton and the British crown colony's airfield. Practically all foreign diplomats already had quit Canton. Most of them came to Hong Kong. They will proceed to Chungking under their own steam rather than avail themselves of transportation offered by the Nationalists.

Every plane, ship and train to the British crown colony to the south was loaded to capacity. Planes carrying government officials took off at frequent intervals for Chungking. The poor, the hundreds of thousands of Canton's ordinary people, were stuck. They could do nothing but wait for the Reds to take over. Most didn't seem to care. Their attitude: how much worse could it be, anyway?

He said the steel industry had forced 454,000 CIO steelworkers to strike in their fight for free pensions and insurance. The steel strike, and the 24-day-old strike of 380,000 United Mine Workers — who also seek welfare and pension concessions — are growing more intense daily in their effect on American economy. Iron Age said that unless there is real bargaining soon the nation can expect "one of the worst tie-ups in its history." Steel fabricators, employing half a million steelworkers, are threatened by strikes set to start Saturday, when some contracts expire. In Chicago, International Harvester Company said it will lay off 3,500 more workers Friday in a parts tie-up, resulting from a strike by 4,600 CIO farm equipment workers. About 17,000 Harvester employees at other plants already are idle as a result of the tieup.

Girl Shot at Father to Kill

DALLAS — (AP) — Her father put a bullet in her mother's hip and she shot at him to kill. But Barbara Ann Mathews testified she missed. "I never had fired a gun before," the 13-year-old girl testified. "But when he came through the door and shot my mother, I shot back at him." Her father, Albert Andrew Mathews, went on trial yesterday for assault to murder in Judge Robert A. Hall's court. Mathews, 43, was charged with shooting his divorced wife Aug. 12, 1948, after calling her and saying he was coming out to her house to kill her.

(Continued From Page 1) the Security Council took on added interest because it was the first Russian statement of atomic policy since Mr. Truman's disclosure. Malik returned to the United States from Moscow after the news broke. His resolution demanding the over-all tally was the first time that Russia has put its demand into a formal resolution. But the Russians have always opposed moves for an arms census unless it includes atomic weapons and have always said they should be outlawed.

A few minutes before Malik made his proposal, he cast Russia's 39th veto in the Security Council to kill a French proposal for conventional arms-counting—excluding the A-bomb—and the establishment of confidence among the nations. It did not include atomic weapons. Malik complained.

Up-to-Date Seating Has Become Vogue in West



Seating pieces have become much more versatile for home-makers in recent years.

The growing popularity of sectional chairs and sofas is one of the big reason homeowners can find more selectivity today. This has been particularly true in the West where ideas have not been fixed by tradition and designers have tended to create up-to-date furniture to fit contemporary housing improvements.

Sectional seating pieces and other innovations are seen in all shapes and sizes to fit any desired room requirement during this period when furniture stores here are showing the very latest in home furnishing fashions.

The contemporary trend is toward sectionals with or without arms, or with just a right or left arm, that seat either one, two or three persons, and form either a curved or straight line. These basic pieces make it possible for a home-maker to select sectional seating units that fit a corner, fill in a straight section along a wall, form a horseshoe shape, or that can be rearranged to allow the sections to stand individually.

Undoubtedly, the most important seating material occurrence since the war has been the acceptance of foam rubber for cushioning. This phenomenon has taken place as the result of greater demand and standardization leading to reduced prices. The use of rubber marks the first time in the 100-year-old history of the spring cushioning industry that an outsider has invaded the field.

Two methods of using rubber in seating pieces are employed. One group of manufacturers uses the rubber alone without benefit of springs, needing up to four inches of solid rubber on some seating platforms. Another group uses one to two inches of rubber on springs, giving a soft surface with deep spring action.

Rubber also has had the added advantage of giving designers more latitude to work on contemporary design. Springing always has had the tendency to govern the shape of seating units, particularly the cushions, because of the rigidity of springs. Rubber can be cut or molded into any shape and still retain its uniform bounce. This has shown up in

number of outstanding cases, indicating that design ingenuity has employed rubber where no other material to date would be satisfactory.

A good example is a new metal base chair with a slab of rubber attached covered by a terry cloth fabric that slips off for washing purposes. The chair is necessarily light in scale and the rubber carries out this feeling.

Another trend noticed among chair designers at recent summer furniture shows was the appearance of more exposed wood frames, also giving the feeling of lighter, airier pieces. This gives the manufacturer an opportunity to feature distinctive fabrics, and also highlight the grains of woods; and the combination of wood and fabric invariably turns out to be pleasant to the eye.

Falling leaves are a menace unless collected regularly and burned in a safe container, fire prevention officials assert. Recommended containers include galvanized steel rubbish burners. They have perforated metal sides and tops to permit refuse to burn rapidly without any danger of the wind scattering it to flammable rooftops.

Galvanized steel rubbish burners are regarded as being especially useful in communities having no organized systems of garbage collection. Garbage which is stored in the regular galvanized steel garbage cans may be disposed of in the sturdy burners.

When not in use for burning, the containers may be used for storing waste paper and scraps of wood. Made of rust-resistant steel, galvanized burners are not affected by inclement weather.

Houston Holds Oil Interest With Two Meets Scheduled

HOUSTON — Two gatherings of Texas oil and gas operators representing the leadership in the state's petroleum industry have been scheduled for Houston this week.

The Texas Railroad Commission will hold its monthly hearing here today.

The Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association begins its two-day session tomorrow, marking the group's thirtieth year of operation.

Gov. Allan Shivers will introduce a key opening-session speaker, Gov. Frank Carlson of Kansas, who is chairman of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission and chairman of the Conference of State Governors.

Both the Commission hearing and the Association's sessions will be held in the Crystal Ballroom, Rice Hotel.

At the end of tomorrow's sessions, two Texas oil men, an independent and a major company representative will be presented the Association's Distinguished Service Awards.

"We have everything ready for one of the best meetings in our thirty year's history," said George Sawtelle, president, Kirby Petroleum Co., who is chairman of the General Arrangements Committee.

Also included on tomorrow's agenda are addresses by a scientist-business man, Dr. Robert E. Wilson, chairman of the Board, Standard Oil Co. (Ind.), and one of the nation's leading economists, Dr. Harold G. Moulton, president of The Brookings Institution.

A featured address for the Friday morning business session will be that of Lieutenant General LeRoy Lutes, newly appointed Commanding General of the Fourth Army, San Antonio. Gen. Lutes directed logistical operations which supplied the Army throughout the world during World War II. He participated in high staff planning of several invasions. He goes to his new post at San Antonio from an assignment as military director of the Munitions Board under the Secretary of Defense. Gen. Lutes is expected to discuss petroleum phases of the industrial mobilization and supply plans which have been readied for future military emergencies.

The first report ever made to the Association on the petroleum industry's national public relations program will be given by John M. Lovejoy, New York, president of the Seaboard Oil Co. of Delaware Friday morning.

Increase in Allowables Seen In November for Operators

AUSTIN — Advance signs this week indicated another increase is coming in Texas crude oil production.

The Railroad Commission announced upward demand signs both from the U.S. Bureau of Mines and from crude oil purchasers.

The Bureau of Mines forecast a demand of \$2,230,000 barrels daily for Texas crude. Nominations by purchasers called for 2,494,562 barrels daily.

Permissive production of 2,135,238 barrels daily was set by

the commission for October. New production boosted this to 2,148,999 barrels daily last week.

Nominations by oil operators called for an increase of 75,046 barrels a day. The October increase in permitted production was 32,944 barrels a day over September.

The Railroad Commission announced the nomination figures in advance of the statewide oil production hearing tomorrow at Houston. The commission will set allowable production for November at the Houston session.

Nominations for November totaled 2,494,562 barrels daily compared with 2,419,516 for October.

Increased demand was indicated for all districts but 1 and 4 in southwest Texas. Southwest District 1 showed a decrease of 91 barrels daily and southwest District 2, 1,195 barrels daily in firm demand for November compared with October.

U.S. Average Shows Gain; Texas High

TULSA — (AP) — The nation's daily average crude oil production gained 74,670 barrels during the week ended Oct. 8 to total 4,967,500 barrels, the Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

More than half the increase was the result of a boost in Texas production, which jumped by 37,800 barrels to reach 2,026,200. That was the first time the state's output had been over the 2,000,000-barrel mark since the week ended April 2.

Next biggest increase was Louisiana's 36,525 barrel spurt to 528,425 barrels. Oklahoma had the third best gain, 12,800 barrels to 413,800.

Other sizeable increases were Illinois, up 5,800 barrels to 185,400; New Mexico, 2,700 to 126,900; Arkansas, 1,400 to 72,200; Utah, 700 to 2,900, and Wyoming, 600 to 128,100.

California increased 300 barrels to 892,100. Kentucky was up 200 to 23,600, the Eastern Area gained 400 to 62,300 and Nebraska added 250 to 800.

The week's greatest drop was in Kansas, off 13,050 barrels to 249,600. Other losses included Mississippi, down 7,800 barrels to 91,150; Michigan, 1,750 to 43,150, and Indiana, 700 to 27,500.

Colorado declined 100 barrels to 64,000, Montana was down 300 to 26,700 and Florida fell 5 to 975.

Canada's production was down 2,465 barrels for the week to 70,635 barrels, of which 66,835 were reported for Alberta Province.

Gray has been serving as president of Lamar Junior College, which was turned into a state college by an act of the last Legislature.

"Few people are aware of the seriousness or extent of fires throughout the nation," Wedgeworth said.

In the last decade fire has killed more than 100,000 people and burned or disfigured many hundreds of thousands more.

Each year about 11,000 Americans die needlessly in fire and more than twice that many are severely burned or disfigured for life. More than 3,500 of the casualties occur on farms.

Every day there are 700 home fires—28 deaths by fire—130 store fires—100 factory fires—seven church fires—seven school fires and three hospital fires.

The farmer's annual loss from fire would build about 50,000 outbuildings at \$2,000 each. If these structures stood end to end, they would form an unbroken wall 500 miles long. The replacement of farm buildings destroyed by fire alone requires the cutting of 5,000 acres of U. S. forests each year.

There are 630,000,000 acres of forest land in the U. S., yet fire lays waste to 30,000,000 acres annually.

Deaths and property losses from fire are increasing mainly because of careless smokers. Out of the approximately 650,000 fires which attack U. S. buildings annually, about 87,000 are caused from careless smoking. Smoking in bed accounts for the largest loss of life.

Nearly every minute of the day and night two fires break out in this country—and in some body's home. That adds up to

Higher Gas Tax For Roads Seen

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

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

Dining Room Shows Radical Changes in a Generation


Architecturally, the American dining room has undergone the most radical change of all rooms during the present generation. Our mothers and grandmothers generally were familiar with plenty of floor space, including an ample dining room that could hold ten people quite comfortably, and more if necessary. The furnishings invariably called for an extension dining table with matching chairs, a buffet, and a china cabinet, usually of 18th Century or Early American design. Living habits and the high cost

of building homes have had a great influence in causing the passing of the dining room as we knew it earlier in the century. Just how the demise of the conventional early-century dining area has affected the design, size and number of pieces of furniture is made more clear every day. Today's more informal manner of living and the emphasis on less work has made the dining alcove or kitchen nook the locale of most meals in the average

American home. Consequently, when the dining room area became less used, the immediate question was why not convert that space into something that adds up to more utility. That is exactly what happened — the combination living-dining room coming into popularity, particularly so since the war when a square foot of floor space became relatively expensive. All this meant special study by the furniture designer to be sure that the furnishings for the modern dining room were as up to date as the living habits of the occupant. Smaller dining areas called for smaller scaled dining groups, a necessity that logically led to the junior ensemble. These often are extension type tables, however, so that additional persons can be seated at the table. By the same token, smaller buffets and china cabinets also were designed and, in most cases, home-makers chose either the buffet or the china cabinet, surveys showing that very few families in post-war homes have sufficient dining space to accommodate both pieces. An interesting decorative note is the fact that many manufacturers use mirrors in the backs of their china cabinets to give the feeling of more space in the room. The comeback of the drop-leaf table is another furnishing factor influenced by the small dining areas being provided today. The most popular seems to be the type that, when both leaves are dropped, has sufficient room for two to eat at both ends without having to open the leaves, therefore serving a couple without causing any extra effort. The average drop-leaf table that is made today, both in traditional and contemporary design, can serve eight people when fully open. Another trend in dining tables is to make them lower in height so, in keeping with the idea of making the dining area more versatile, the table can be used for games, study and other diversions. Which is just another aspect of the American trend to make homes and furnishings more informal and liveable.





every-room age and the habit of desiring books, magazines and other objects in all parts of the house dictated the design of the contemporary type of headboard.

Headboards today range in design from a single panel of highly-polished wood to elaborate storage-type units suitable for storing a radio, books, magazines, built-in or separate lamps, a telephone, ashtrays and what-have-you. As a matter of fact, the headboard is a very natural outgrowth that developed when our generation discovered that the conventional nightstand was far too small to accommodate all the paraphernalia needed for contemporary comfort.

The footboard has dropped out of the bedroom furnishing picture in many homes today because the home-maker has found bed-making much less cumbersome where no obstruction is present to hinder tucking in covers.

There are a number of standard ways of attaching the box springs and mattress to the headboard. One method is simply to fasten the two together with angle irons. Another way is the use of a metal or wood frame on casters legs that bolts directly to the headboard. Standard-sized springs and mattresses fit snugly into the frame.

The so-called Hollywood bed offers still another means of construction. To the trade, the Hollywood variety means the placing of two conventional sized twin beds side-by-side. They then are hinged to the large headboard in a manner that permits them to swing apart to be made up.

As might be expected, headboards can be had at a great range of prices depending on the degree of elaborateness one wants. One of the least expensive types, and one that is very popular with students and the younger set, is the headboard covered in plastic fabrics such as Duran and other well-known brands that are very durable, colorful and washable.

Other headboards can be had covered in conventional upholstering fabric. There also are all types of headboards made of domestic and imported woods. Others come with panels that tilt out for the support of readers-in-bed and there are some with built-in radios and other luxuries that fall into the custom-made class.

If a decorator at the turn of the century had done a Rip Van Winkle and slept, not 20, but closer to 50 years, he undoubtedly would awaken to a lot of surprises if he suddenly found himself in the midst of a contemporary bedroom.

Instead of the poster bed that lulled him to dreamland, he would find perhaps a storage type headboard with a highly efficient reading lamp, book, the latest Police Gazette, and, of course, one of the latest roller-bearing doors in front of new up-to-date bin-tray drawers. Those bin-tray drawers would be shallow and have cut-away fronts for accessibility to shirts, lingerie and other flat-lying garments, preventing muzzing up the entire contents of the drawer while finding the desired item.

In place of the old-style dresser with the conventional four large drawers below and the two smaller drawers at the top, would stand a double dresser with roller-bearing doors in front of new up-to-date bin-tray drawers. Those bin-tray drawers would be shallow and have cut-away fronts for accessibility to shirts, lingerie and other flat-lying garments, preventing muzzing up the entire contents of the drawer while finding the desired item.

In place of the vanity, there would be a void, because the size of today's bedrooms have shrunk considerably since the turn of the century, or, if there were sufficient space, the latest type of utilitarian make-up chest would appear. Straight lines and smooth surfaces would predominate on the headboard, the double dresser and the make-up chest, leading to dusting and cleaning assistance. And the fact that this particular room was furnished with furniture with a natural finish also indicates that dust would not stand out to the extent that it would on a darker finish.

Life Span Is Longer for Wage-Earner

NEW YORK — During recent decades the average length of life among America's wage-earners and their families has been increasing more rapidly than that for the country's population as a whole, according to the statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

In 1911 the expectation of life at birth in the wage-earning families was shorter by 6 1/2 years than for the general population, but by 1948 it had virtually reached the level of the population as a whole, according to the statisticians reporting.

Taking the company's millions of industrial policyholders as a representative cross section, the expectation of life at birth in 1948 among the industrial population was at an all-time high of 67.16 which is a gain of 20 1/2 years since 1911, and of more than two years since 1945. For the general population the gain in average length of life since 1911 has been about 14 years.

"This remarkable progress in adding to length of life among the wage-earners and their families may be attributed largely to advances in the medical sciences, to public health measures, and to the rapid rise in the standard of living of the industrial population," the statisticians say. "Further efforts will undoubtedly add greater gains to this record of past achievement in longevity."

One particular California model has a rounded box spring and matching mattress that fits snugly against a similarly rounded edge of the corner table. By means of a pin that allows the two studio couches to pivot, the beds can be pushed together and be made up as a full-sized bed when not used for seating as studio couches with bolsters against the wall.



Q—When was the first yacht race held?
A—The first world's championship yacht racing was sailed Aug. 22, 1851, around the Isle of Wight and was won by the New York Yacht Club's entry, the America. The trophy, awarded by the Royal Yacht Squadron at Cowes has since been known as the America's Cup. It has remained in American possession since the first race.

Q—If mosquitoes live on blood, what do they do when blood is not available?
A—It is only the female mosquito that needs blood as food, which they obtain not only from human beings, but also from wild animals and birds, occasionally including even cold-blooded animals. When such blood is not immediately available they feed on plant juices to some extent.

Q—How does a duke rank in British peerage?
A—Dukedom is the highest hereditary rank in the British peerage. In England dukes take precedence over all except princes and princesses of the blood royal, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York and the Lord Chancellor.

Q—Where is the southernmost city in the world?
A—Punta Arenas at the extreme end of Patagonia on the Straits of Magellan is the farthest south.

Q—What language is the most perfect?
A—This is a matter of opinion. Many philologists claim that ancient Greek is the most perfect language that has ever existed.

Q—How are teak trees propagated?
A—To get teak trees, you plant stumps, not seeds. And you plant the stumps only just before or after the flowering of a species of bamboo known as kyathung. This bamboo flowers only once each 80 years. It is no use to broadcast seeds in the forest; they will not grow.

Q—Where is the Statue of Hermes by Praxiteles?
A—Hermes with the Infant Dionysus, the only existing original work of Praxiteles, the ancient Greek sculptor, was found in ruins in Olympia in 1877. It is preserved in the museum there.

Q—Is the American bison a true buffalo?
A—The American bison has long been popularly, though wrongly, known as the buffalo. A true buffalo has no hump over its shoulders. The American buffalo has a considerable hump, and is a bison.

Q—What branch of the federal government checks up on patent infringements?
A—The federal government makes an effort to determine whether a patent has been infringed or not. This is handled through private attorneys and through the courts.

Q—Was there ever a window tax in Great Britain?
A—In Great Britain and other parts of Europe, a tax was once imposed on all windows above a limited number, on the theory that if a man's house had windows he must be a rich man. It was abolished in England in 1851.

Q—What was Edgar Allan Poe's first published volume?
A—"Tamerlane and Other Po-

ems" was Poe's first published volume. He printed it himself, anonymously, in Boston in 1827. Only a dozen copies of this 40-page pamphlet are known and no new one has been discovered for years.

Q—How old is the woolen industry in this country?
A—The wool manufacturing industry of the United States started in Massachusetts, in 1790, when the first wool-carding machine was set up.

Q—How fast does the Gulf Stream travel?
A—When passing through the Florida Strait, the Gulf Stream has a velocity in the center of about five miles per hour. It sweeps along the American coast, growing wider and shallower and

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diminishes its velocity to about 1 1/2 miles per hour off the Newfoundland banks.

Q—When were the wings added to the White House?
A—In 1903, during the administration of President Theodore Roosevelt, wings were added to

the White House to afford enlarged executive offices on the one side, and a cloak room on the other.
