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Union Joins Industry in Truman's Plan

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — Philip Murray's CIO United Steelworkers today put off for another week the nationwide steel strike set for Saturday midnight. The million-member union's Policy Making Committee joined industry in accepting President Truman's plea for extension of the strike truce until 12:01 a. m. Saturday, Oct. 1, to permit renewed contract talks. The action came as wildcat walkouts shut down two Pittsburgh steel plants and idled 2,400 workers. Pickets carried signs demanding "strike—not more extension," and "strike—free pensions."

Damage Nears Million Dollars In Gas Plant Blast at Borger

Contrary to earlier reports, only one unit of the Phillips plant is damaged to any considerable extent, according to official reports. George Bunn, manager of the Phillips gasoline department, said in a call to The News from Bartlesville immediately before press time, an official survey had been made this morning and that all basic operations would be resumed today. Repair work on the damaged unit is to get underway immediately.

Storm Threat On Coast May Be Weakening

HOUSTON — (AP) — Storm warnings were reduced today to an 80-mile area as the season's first tropical storm threat to the Texas Gulf Coast appeared to be losing intensity. The U. S. Weather Bureau ordered that storm warnings be brought down from Port O'Connor to Brownsville and that previous hurricane warnings from Port O'Connor to Freeport be changed to northeast storm warnings.

China Asks U.N. Action Against Reds

NEW YORK — (AP) — China called on the United Nations Assembly today to act quickly to prevent communism from engulfing China and the entire Far East. For the first time, China also charged that Russia was directing the Chinese Communists.

NEW THREE-JET BOMBER IS UNVEILED—One of the most closely-guarded aircraft projects underway for the U. S. Air Force has been the new jet bomber above, so far identified only as the Martin XB-51. The XB-51 is the Air Force's first three-jet airplane, and the first postwar plane specifically designed to give high-speed support to ground troops in combat. Type-boxes above point out unusual characteristics of the bomber, outstanding of which is the third turbo-jet engine mounted in the rear of the fuselage. Ultimate speed of the XB-51 is still a secret. The plane is undergoing final checks and ground tests at Baltimore, Md., and will make its first flight soon.

Nations Seen Toying With World Trade

NEW YORK — Diplomats of London and Washington who attended the recent Washington meetings sidestepped primary issues "because they are political dynamite," James H. McGraw, Jr., president of McGraw-Hill Publishing Company, writes in his most recent editorial appearing in current issues of his publications.

The basic questions which the publisher says were evaded by the conferees are:

Does Britain really want expanding world trade or a high-cost welfare state?

Does the United States really want expanding world trade or a high-cost welfare state?

"If we really want free, competitive trading between the people of the world, these issues must be met and resolved by leaders on both sides of the Atlantic," said McGraw. "If we do not want to face these issues, then let us resign ourselves to a world walled off into three trading areas: the Communist bloc, the sterling area, and the dollar area. So far, Washington and London have muddled along, not facing these alternatives. Clarity and courage are long overdue."

The publisher says it is time for men in Washington and London to stop "toying" with the problem of international trade.

"We of the democratic West are at a turning point in our economic affairs," McGraw continues. "A false step by either the United States or Britain could lead quickly to disintegration of trading between the people of the world, as we have known it for the past hundred years. Recent meetings of diplomats in London and Washington have not lifted us out of this danger."

McGraw lists four objectives which he says men in London should set for themselves if people of Britain decide they want to

1. Lower government costs. The British treasury has asked for cuts of 5 percent in 1950. But a cut nearer 15 percent will be necessary, even if that means fewer government subsidies and health services.

2. Fewer government controls.

3. Stronger anti-monopoly legislation for both business and labor.

4. Less restrictive trading practices.

locked on acceptance of a presidential board's peace recommendations that the steelworkers get company financed insurance and pensions. The union accepted. Industry objected to footing the bill and refused to be bound by the report without bargaining. They've been feuding since.

Mr. Truman intervened to stave off the weekend strike. In addition to truce extension, he called for direct bargaining and early settlement.

Murray announced the policy committee approval of the extension. He said:

"The only thing I have to add is that we are contacting the various companies and we hope to meet with the (U.S. Steel) Corporation tomorrow."

The action was taken in a resolution unanimously adopted by the committee. The resolution stated:

"The public interest requires and the American people have a right to expect an early settlement on the part of the steel companies on the basis of the board recommendation."

The two and a half hour session of the policy committee broke up with the 170 members standing on their feet to cheer Murray.

were shut off to block any new fuel being added.

Employees of the plant reported there were two explosions. The second, believed to have been the one that rocked the area, was the explosion of the catalytic tank. Latest reports indicate the fire to have damaged two catalytic units and two propane gas tanks.

Compled with the intense heat, firemen encountered additional trouble in fighting the blaze. The nature of the fire forced the use of chemicals throughout.

Although they were called to the fire, Pampa firemen were not needed. They said the Phillips freighters, probably used high pressure foam or one or both of two firefighting chemicals, "Water" and "Dry-gas." Water could not be used since gas, being lighter, would have floated, carrying and spreading the flames with it.

The fire was brought under control late last night.

Motion Picture Industry Stands At Crossroads, Says Producer

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Ellis Arnall, president of the Society of Independent Motion Picture Producers, is a political liberal, who, as attorney general and governor of Georgia, established a spectacular reputation for trust busting—a record he seeks to perpetuate in the motion picture industry.)

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — The American motion picture industry stands today at the crossroads. It finds itself confronted by many troublesome and baffling problems; but they can and they will be solved and overcome.

The producer is the key man in the industry. When he makes profits from the production of pictures he employs actors, writers, directors, artists, composers, technicians and all those essential workers so necessary to motion picture production. The distributors and exhibitors are dependent upon the producer for finished product.

Today many producers are losing money and are finding it increasingly difficult to obtain financing.

Unfair, discriminatory and unreasonable quotas and restrictions against the foreign exhibition of American-produced motion pictures have steadily mushroomed throughout the world until the important income from the foreign market has been drastically curtailed.

The foreign situation calls for aggressive and determined action on the part of our government.

All negotiations with the foreign motion picture industry should be handled at government level. The U. S. government should see to it that unreasonable quotas on playing time and all unjust currency restrictions imposed on the American motion picture industry by foreign governments are eliminated. The American producers badly need this foreign income.

Our own government needs the invaluable assistance of American energy

Bubble, Bubble, Toil and Trouble, Says Engineer

NEW YORK — (AP) — A Brooklyn chemical engineer has a job any kid in America might envy — he tests bubble gum all day long.

“It took me two months to blow my first bubble,” said Dr. Morris Nafash, research director for the Bazooka Bubble Gum Company. “Now I blow about a hundred bubbles a day.”

But he has a 12-year-old son who can beat him.

It is his duty to test the texture and elasticity of the gum and to develop new flavors. He is a research associate of Columbia University's Department of Chemical Engineering.

“At first, I didn't see how I could keep busy,” said Dr. Nafash, a small, dark-farrest man of 43. “But I have found bubble gum a real challenge. It takes all the scientific knowledge I have. You'd be amazed at the research going into this penny product.”

Bubble gum is a 10-to-15-million-dollar-a-year industry and intensely competitive. There are about 25 companies that turn it out.

“Quite a few adults are turning to bubble gum, because they get more for their money,” said Dr. Nafash. “It has about three times as much sugar as ordinary gum.”

The gum base itself is either synthetic or natural rubber plasticized with resins, waxes and oils. And of the gum doesn't snap back into shape the children soon find it out — and boycott the brand. They spread the word quickly to their pals.

To make bubble gum more acceptable in the home, the industry has developed a quick-drying type that won't become emeshed in rugs — that is, if it isn't stepped on while still wet.

There has been concern voiced over the increasing size of the bubbles. Some parents have feared a junior might blow a bubble so large he'd be wafted aloft by a strong wind.

Dr. Nafash says this is unlikely. “The largest bubble I ever

Suspension Bridges Out From Under Cloud

NEW YORK — The next few decades will see the erection of many long-span suspension bridges. F. H. Frankland, New York consulting engineer, writes in the special 75th anniversary edition of Engineering News-Record, McGraw-Hill publication.

Noting that “suspension bridges are safe again,” Frankland says that no future suspension bridges will be threatened by aerodynamic instability which caused the collapse of the Tacoma Narrows Bridge ten years ago.

“As a result of one of the greatest ‘trouble hunts’ in structural engineering history, the suspension bridge is safe again,” Frankland writes. “It is possible to list the criteria for such safety, and there are four large bridges now under construction or in the design stage that utilize these criteria.”

A-Bombs Also In Crisis Talks

NEW YORK — Atom bombs as well as dollars — will be on the agenda of this month's British-U.S. talks, according to Business Week.

“The Snyder-Cripps financial meetings are getting the headlines,” says the publication. “But what Bevin and Acheson say to each other about the bomb may well prove equally far-reaching.”

The magazine says that out of their conversations might come one of these:

1. A proposal for stockpiling atom bombs in Europe as part of the mutual-defense pact under the Atlantic Pact; or
2. A new attempt to put the atom under international sovereignty — along the lines of the Baruch Plan, but for nations of the West alone.

“Neither of these, of course, would require Congressional sanction,” says the magazine, “and any suggestion of sharing the U.S. bomb monopoly would be sure to touch off a long and bitter debate.”

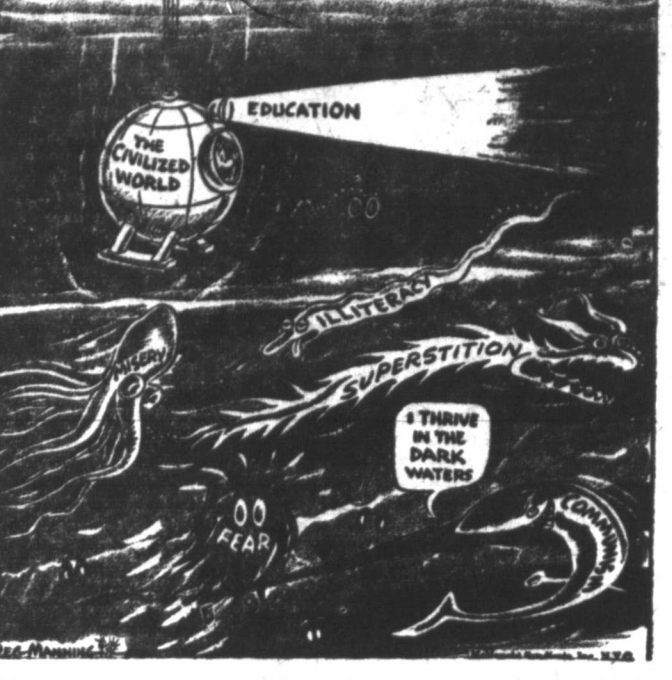

Rotary Club Scholarships Explained

From 19 different countries, the U. S. included, 111 students have spent a year's study in a foreign land through the Rotary Foundation Fellowship. The Rev. Henry Tyler told Rotarians yesterday.

The foundation, founded three years ago, has grown to over \$2,300,000 through contributions from club members, the Pampa Rotary Club being one of the first to register as a 100 percent contributor.

During the first year, 1947, Rev. Tyler said, 18 students from 10 countries went abroad to a recognized university where they studied. In 1948 the foundation sent 27 students and this year 92 men and four women students won the scholarships.

Each student named to a scholarship has his travel, tuition, books, lodging and other necessary costs paid by the foundation. To be eligible, Rev. Tyler said, a student must be in his senior college year working towards a Bachelor's Degree or be a graduate with a Bachelor's Degree.

Lawyer Whose Memory Was Restored to Stay in Texas

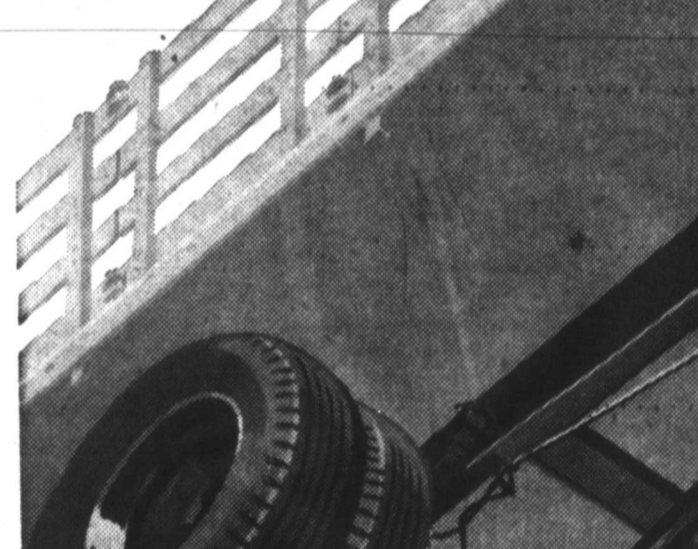
ORANGE — (AP) — Yancy Quitman Caldwell, 50, whose memory was restored here last week following a lapse of more than one month, said he will make Orange his home.

"The people and the police of Orange have been very kind to me," Caldwell told a reporter, "and I hope to be able to find some sort of a job here as soon as I am physically able and later take out a license to practice law in this state."

Caldwell told the reporter he received a Bachelor of Law Degree from Vanderbilt University in 1921 and a Doctor of Law Degree from Columbia University in 1923. He said he practiced law in his home town of Paris, Tenn., and served as city attorney (1926-30), state representative (1931-33) and state senator (1933-35).

Caldwell said he moved to New Orleans in March, 1948, and worked there and at Alexandria for an insurance adjustment firm until he lost his memory the latter part of July.

He refused to disclose any details of the accumulation of "personal difficulties" on which he blamed his condition. Caldwell was identified through fingerprints sent to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington.

 Vincent Price—"American women don't make good wives. A home is a man's haven. The wife should know something about keeping a home. American women have the soap opera conception of marriage."
 Dan Duryea—"I've been married 18 years. Look at Jean Harlow, Irene Dunne, Harold Lloyd, and others. How can you say there is so much divorce with so many long-range marriages like that?"
 Celeste Holm—"When a star and her husband have the slightest rift, it is publicized. It's much harder for them to make up than it is for couples whose family troubles aren't printed in the papers."
 Maureen O'Hara—"I contend there are no more divorces here than anywhere else. It is merely the prominence of the names involved that attracts attention. I know there is some pretty wonderful home life in Hollywood, but nobody is interested news-wise."
 Barbara Britton—"My husband, who is a psychologist, says those film people who are constantly remarrying aren't emotionally mature. They get a star complex, and when everything doesn't go smoothly, they want a divorce."
 Edmond O'Brien—"They go into marriage too lightly, knowing they can always get a divorce if it doesn't work out. And some couples don't really like each other. I know some who are madly in love yet hate each other. How to have a happy marriage: marry Olga San Juan." (He did.)

Experience gained in the operation of the Organized Reserve Corps logistical training division will be used as a guide in preparing plans for the new headquarters units.

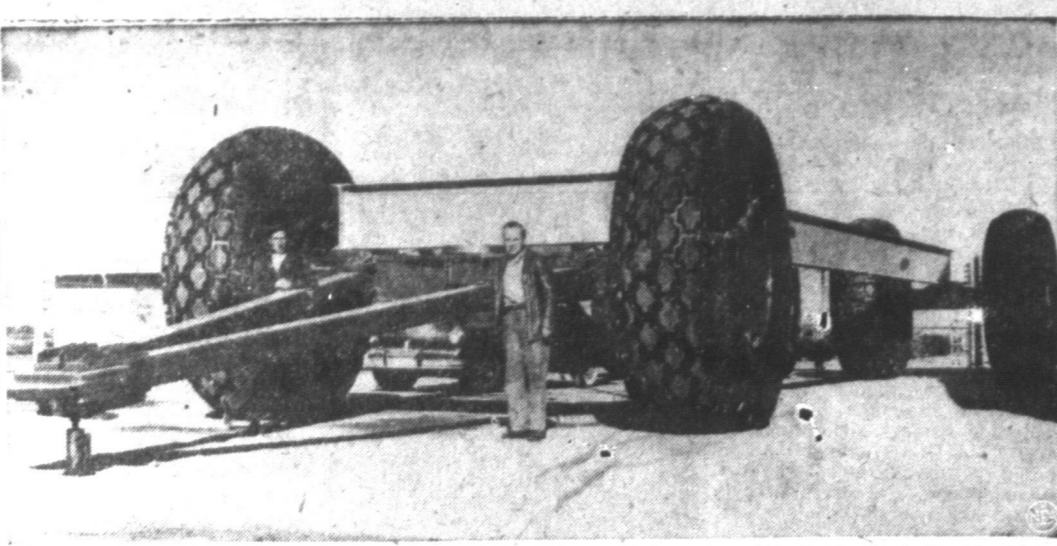

Analyst Has Praise for Job Done by Economists

That seems to be a business-like and practical job the American-British-Canadian conference at Washington has done by way of giving emergency aid in John Bull's economic remedy. It gives a real lift to the morale of a very hard-pressed England and to the numerous other countries whose welfares are interlocked with hers.

The agreements were worked out with due regard to the dignity of Britain, and to the bonds of friendship. The conferees tackled the problem in the same spirit of unity and cooperation shown during the dark days of the world war.

The task of the conferees in this initial meeting related to Britain's shortage of dollars. She is earning far less dollars than she has to spend for essential imports. This shortage had to be made up, and the conference devised a ten point program to meet requirements. The agreements include these:

The United States and Canada are expected to buy more tin and rubber from Britain for stock piling. Britain will be permitted to spend Marshall Plan dollars in countries other than the United States, such as the purchase of wheat in Canada although America has an exportable surplus. Britain will be free to discriminate against U. S. and Canadian goods to build up her non-dollar imports, and so conserve dollars.

On the face of it, of course, England will be benefiting in some cases at the expense of America. The answer to this is that Uncle Sam's contribution is an investment for insurance against a greater calamity.

Sir Stafford Cripps, British chancellor of the exchequer, says he is convinced the agreement will block any further dangerous drains on Britain's gold reserve. This optimism appeared to be reflected in the fact that Secretary of State Acheson and British Foreign Secretary Bevin immediately set to work to devise new moves by the Western powers in the cold war with the Russian bloc.

However, I don't believe we should take this as indicating that Britain's economic problem has a been solved. It is first aid. Her trouble is far more deep-seated.

England's economic strength has rested in large degree in her industrial greatness and world trade. She achieved this by the simple expedient of importing raw

materials (which she herself lacked) from non-industrial countries, manufacturing the raw materials, and then selling and finished product back to those countries.

The vast industrial development of other countries during the past generation — greatly speeded by two world wars — has upset Britain's economic apple-cart. She must devise new ways and means to meet this situation. She may achieve this by carrying out her plan of developing her potential rich colonies.

Flare-Up Over 'Negro' Quieted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Speaker Rayburn (D-Texas) used there's nothing wrong in using the word "Negro" in the House—although one member was accused of pronouncing it "nigger."

The speaker refused to recognize a point of order by Rep. Marcantonio (ALP-NY), charging that Rep. Rankin (D-Miss) cast reflections on two Negro congressmen by calling singer Paul Robeson a "nigger Communist."

"There is a Negro race and many of its members are proud of it," Rayburn said.

The speaker said he understood Rankin to say "Negro."

Marcantonio contended it was "nigger."

Rankin said he always says "Negro" — although the way he said it sounded like "nigger."

That's the way it's said in the South, he told reporters later, although he always spells it N-E-G-R-O.

SMU Recognized By Honor Society

DALLAS — Recognition of high academic standards at Southern Methodist University has been granted by the nation's highest scholarship society, Phi Beta Kappa, Dr. H. M. Hosford, academic vice president of SMU, announced.

Meeting recently in Madison, Wis., the national organization granted a charter to SMU for organization of a chapter of the honorary fraternity on its campus,

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Increase Noted in Amount Money Paid On Disease Deaths

NEW YORK—About 138 million dollars was paid out last year in death claims for the chronic diseases of the heart, lungs and kidneys, by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, the company's statisticians report. This is approximately 52 percent of the 265 million dollar total of all death claim disbursements by the company in 1948.

Ten years ago these causes of death were responsible for only 42 percent of the total amount paid out.

Next high in amount paid by the company last year were on cancer death claims, which came to \$43,400,000 or about 16 percent of the total, as compared with somewhat more than 13 percent in 1938.

Counterbalancing a sharp rise in the proportion of death claims paid on account of the diseases common to middle and later life was a marked decrease in the proportion for deaths from the acute diseases. More and more people, the statisticians note, are surviving to the higher ages at which the chronic diseases are most prevalent.

"In spite of the fact that our total of death claim payments has increased by nearly 90 percent in the past 10 years, due to more insurance in force and more persons insured, the amount paid on account of the acute and infectious diseases has declined steadily," the statisticians point out. "Claim payments for tuberculosis were 17 percent lower than in 1938, and payments for typhoid fever, the communicable diseases of childhood and appendicitis fell off by 65 percent."

Despite the high incidence of polio in 1948, claim payments on account of the disease accounted for only about one-tenth of one percent of the total amount disbursed.

Somewhat more than one dollar out of every ten paid last year was on deaths from external causes — accidents, suicides, and homicides. Motor vehicle fatalities were responsible for more than two-fifths of the sum paid out for accidents.

Kirby McRill first attracted attention by walking into Leavenworth from his farm every time he had business in the city. It was a trip of about 30 miles. Later, he walked all over the country, because he liked to and because he thought it was good exercise. About 27 years ago, he went to Kansas City, dyed his long hair and beard a flaming red, and carried sandwich signs on the streets. He'd wear bright red socks to match his beard, and baseball pants and jacket. Lately, he's been in the box business. He collects boxes from downtown stores, puts the little ones inside the big ones, ties a rope to the biggest, and hauls them to his "market." Kirby used to be called "Kirby the Unkissed," because of his

New Rules on GI Training Set Up

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Veterans Administration has set up a new barrier against aimless use of GI Bill education benefits. Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray, Jr., ruled that veterans who have completed or discontinued courses of training, and now wish to resume it, must prove that the new course is not avocational or recreational, and is essential to the employment objective they're not getting along too well these days, and he's figuring out a way to win her back. Case Given To Three Mock Juries

ORANGE, Texas — (AP) — A murder case was heard by three mock juries here. It was a real murder case—lifted bodily from court records of some time ago. But they were mock juries. One was all women, the second half women and half men, and the third all men. The triple-juried mock trial was staged by the Orange Business and Professional Women's Club. Its announced purpose was to help voters decide how they should vote on Nov. 8 on a proposed Constitutional amendment to allow women to serve on Texas juries. The all-female and mixed mock juries returned a verdict which agreed with that brought by the real jury which tried the case lifted from the record. They voted guilty. The all-male mock jury returned a verdict of innocent. The case taken out of the records was that of a man accused of murder without malice in the saloon slaying of a companion. Testimony—which was read verbatim to the three juries—was highly contradictory. Two witnesses said it was a cold-blooded murder committed in a moment of passion. Two defense witnesses called it self defense. County Judge Sid J. Callavet, who presided, had this comment for the audience of about 300 persons attending the trial: "I believe the women have proved their point. In view of the conflicting testimony in this case and the absence of a clear-cut basis for arriving at a verdict, no criticism of either of these

three juries is due for the manner in which it evaluated the testimony." Mrs. J. 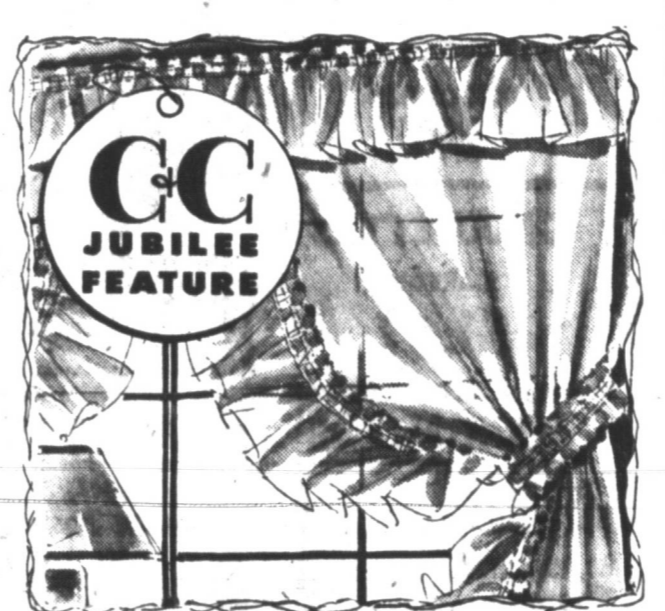

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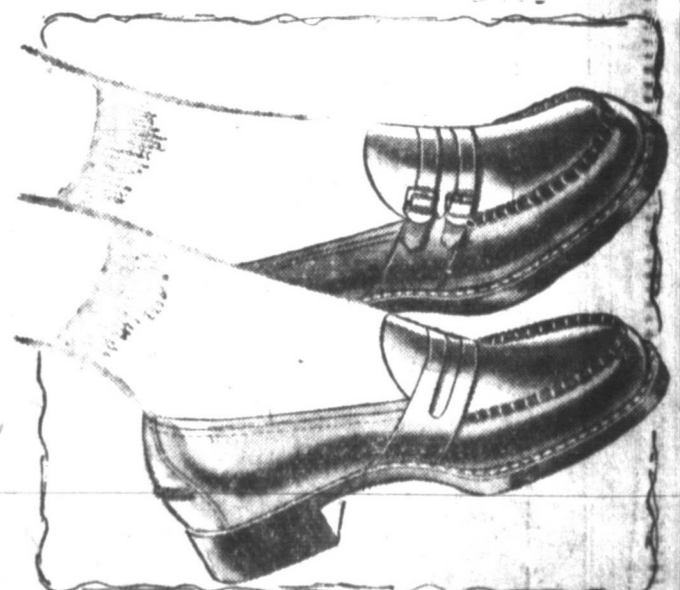

Ex-Politician Still Runs; He's Messenger 'Boy' at 70

 CHICAGO — (NEA) — Albert Lagerstedt, a messenger "boy" at Chicago's swank Ambassador East Hotel, believes that you're never too old to have a future. Spry and pushing 70, Al holds two college degrees, has served four successive terms in the Minnesota State legislature, ran for Governor of that state in 1939, and is one political columnist who predicted Harry Truman's election.

And he's still studying. Lagerstedt attends three evening courses weekly at the Lawson YMCA and, on a fourth night, conducts a Christian Forum, composed of 18 members who meet for discussion.

For years, Al has conducted a political column for his hometown paper, the Gibbon (Minn.) Gazette. Ten months before the presidential election he made his Truman prediction.

During his first campaign for election to the Minnesota State legislature, Lagerstedt toured every voting precinct in Sibley County in an ancient Model T Ford. County campaigning was no snap in those days. Motorists spent as much time cutting through corn fields and pastures as they did banging along casual excuses for highways.

In 1930, he ran for Governor of Minnesota on a Farm-Labor ticket and thought, "I didn't come out last in the race, I didn't come out first, either." Although he still had part of his legislative term to serve, he "retired."

from politics following his defeat. As with all politicians, retirement for Lagerstedt was an off-again-on-again condition. He ran for U.S. Senator from Illinois in 1938 and as alternate delegate to the Democratic Convention last year, losing out in both races.

Since coming to Chicago in 1938, Lagerstedt has held positions with various real estate firms and came to the Ambassador East Hotel two-and-one-half years ago. He delivers his e-mail, takes suits to the valet shop for pressing, and watches the flow of famous people in and out of the hotel.

The people Al works with, and many of the guests who get to know him, think he's too sharp for a messenger boy's job. They think he's writing a book—about them.

U.N. May Get China's Civil War

NEW YORK — (AP) — The Chinese war appeared headed for the United Nations in the near future. The Chinese delegation to the U. N. maintained silence on reports from Canton that the Nationalist government is considering putting its struggle against communism up to the U. N., either the General Assembly which meets today or the Security Council.

But key U. N. delegates speculated privately that it is only a question of time before the Chinese war will bob up in the U. N. If the Canton government does lodge charges, these sources speculated, they may involve Russia.

This would receive the quick and personal attention of Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky, fiery Soviet diplomat leading the Russian delegation again.

The United States delegation also kept silence on the Chinese situation. But U. N. circles pointed directly to a speech yesterday by Ambassador Philip C. Jessup as an indication of the U. S. course if a case is made by China.

Jessup spoke at a meeting of the American Association for the United Nations starting the annual observance of the founding of the U. N. situation, pledged American support through the U. N. to free peoples fighting communism in Asia and Europe.

Just Three Flies Found In All Moscow-Idaho

MOSCOW, Idaho — (NEA) — It is not exactly accurate to say there are no flies in Moscow, Idaho.

Dr. W. Earl Shull, an entomologist who has gained fame in these parts, has been diligently searching for houseflies all summer in the Moscow area, which covers a radius of 200 miles.

Nevertheless, it is just as hard to sell fly-swatters here after Dr. Shull's search as it has been for the past three years, when this town of 8500 got into the limelight by making the housefly as rare in Moscow, Idaho, as

an American in Moscow, Russia. Back in 1946, Dr. Shull, then head of the department of entomology at the University of Idaho, became convinced that the house fly could be eliminated, or almost so, from the earth.

Shull's formula was simple. A concentration of the new insecticide, DDT, and water.

By canvassing the town's property owners, he was able to gain sufficient backing to experiment with his plan.

able to say, with a great measure of accuracy: "There are no flies in Moscow."

That statement became the byword of numerous stories about the scientific experiment. Queries concerning the "No Flies" campaign piled up so high that Dr. Shull resigned his university position and went into the business of shooting flies for good in his home town of Moscow, in Idaho and throughout the nation.

His methods are being practiced even in foreign nations now, although there has been no report on the flies in Moscow, Russia.

Originator of Giveaways Thinks Situation Is Quite Out of Hand

We outfitted a girl like Cinderella on one program—a kind of feminine Horatio Alger touch. That was just one stunt. But the giveaway started from that."

Other programs picked up the technique and started giving gifts. "Our giveaways were for charitable purposes. But others took the guts of our idea—without its heart. It turned out to be a greedy thing without any charity aspects. And now the whole business is on its knees. They are killing themselves."

And Edwards said, unless the giveaways returned to their original pattern, he would just as soon see the FCC ruling banning them upheld by the federal courts. The red-haired 36-year-old producer feels the ruling doesn't affect his own two NBC network shows—"Truth or Consequences," and "This Is Your Life."

The first program, a variation of an old-fashioned parlor game, won him the nickname of "The Barnum of the Airways" for its zany stunts. Edwards guessed rightly that—for a prize—America was full of people willing to try to fulfill any screwball assignment.

Ten months ago he thought up his second show, a half-hour program which capsules the life story of some unknown or famous American. Among those dramatized have been sportswriter Grantland Rice, ex-boxer Barney Ross, war hero Audie Murphy.

The producer got the scare of his life when Murphy, surprised to be confronted by his old sergeant in the midst of the program, stammered: "happy."

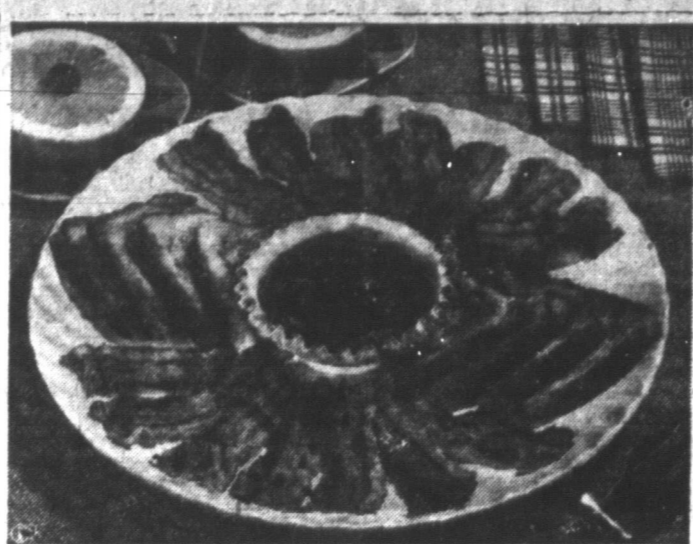

A Real Breakfast Gives Zip Needed To Turn Out Work During Morning

To feel at your tip-top best in the morning, you need to eat a real breakfast! Whether you're a homemaker, an office executive, or a day laborer, your most productive working hours probably are in the morning. A real breakfast gives you energy for those jobs which seem to go so smoothly in the morning and often are such a grind in the afternoon.

First of all, it's not a skimpy meal. Did you ever stop to think that skipping breakfast, besides cutting down on pep and efficiency, often results in overeating at noon which causes an over-stuffed feeling and sleepiness in the afternoon.

In addition, a real breakfast is one which includes foods that "stay with you" — sustaining foods such as ham, bacon, sausage and eggs. Because the body has been without food for many hours, breakfast probably is the most important meal of the day. One-fourth to one-third of the daily food needs should be provided by breakfast, and this means not only caloric needs, but protein requirements as well.

Of course, no one really needs to be "talked into" a good breakfast. Crisp bacon, juicy sausage, golden brown ham, and eggs, prepared in a variety of ways, speak for themselves. The important thing is to get into the habit of arising early enough to sit down to a real breakfast, a breakfast which pays dividends throughout the whole day.

The breakfast menu should have a wide variety as other meals of the day. Different fruits, cereals, breads, and meat and egg combinations should make their appearance on the breakfast table every day.

Bacon in the Breakfast Menu
A favorite American breakfast is French toast with bacon. A good way to prepare bacon, when you have the double job of turning out French toast, is to bake it. Baked bacon is delicious and justifies turning on the oven, as it requires no watching or turning. The fat drips off while it cooks, leaving the strips crisp or medium crisp according to your preference. You'll have your bacon crinkly crisp as they serve it in restaurants, follow this procedure: Lay bacon strips on a rack in a shallow pan. With a knife or fork handle, push down

the bacon slightly between the grooves of the rack to make it ripple. Then bake at 400 degrees F. 12 to 15 minutes.

Don't forget bacon for breakfast with pancakes, waffles, fried mush, and eggs in any of their leftover pieces. These are delicious when there's extra time, eggs baked in bacon rings (in muffin tins) are delightful — the kids really go for them! Since everyone likes bacon cook plenty of it and don't worry about any leftover pieces. These are delicious when crumbled into potato or vegetable salad, cooked greens, scrambled eggs, creamed dishes or used in sandwiches. Keep bacon drippings in a small covered jar in the refrigerator.

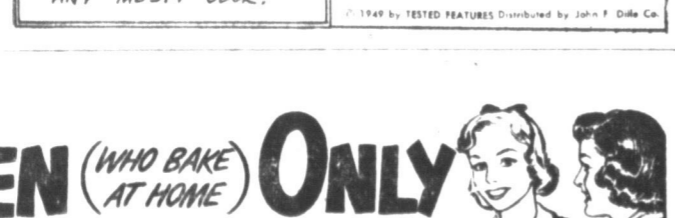

South then leads the queen of diamonds which is won in dummy with the ace. The hand now looks rather hopeless and it is unless declarer starts to think. If declarer leads a trump at this point, South will win and lead a small diamond. North will win and return a club, which South will ruff.

Declarer knows from the bidding that South in all probability has both the ace of spades and the ace of hearts. Therefore, declarer should lead the king of hearts from dummy, and discard the losing seven of diamonds. In this way he breaks up the communication between the North and South hands. South will win the trick, but now when he leads a diamond, declarer can trump. He can lead a trump which South will win and thus East and West can make four spades doubled.

So once more let me remind you how important it is to keep your bidding in mind when you are playing the hand. The bidding in today's hand marks all of the high cards in the South hand.

Britain Says Overpopulation Not Cause of Economic Ills

 Coincident with the Anglo-American conference in Washington comes the Population Reference Bureau, a private research agency in the capital, and tosses this bombshell:
 Britain has 15 million too many people to support. No other country in the world is so crowded as the United Kingdom, with the exception of Japan. John Bull's crisis will continue so long as he tries to support so many folk on so few acres. Bureau experts advocate spreading this excess population over the Commonwealth.
 And what's the answer to this startling estimate of the situation? Well, it's true that the United Kingdom has an area of only 94,279 square miles on which to support a population of 50 million. Nine of America's 48 states are bigger than the United Kingdom.

emigration of Britons to the Dominions right after the late war. During 1944-7 there was a total of 291,000 British emigrants who sought new homes. From January to September of 1948 (the latest figure available) there were 118,000 more.
 Now that's a lot of people to leave a small country, and it impelled Winston Churchill on Aug. 16, 1947, to appeal to his countrymen in a broadcast not to go away.
 The British government has studied this question of emigration, and while it isn't blocking departure from the home land, all the indications are that it doesn't believe heavy emigration is for the good of the country.
 The government takes the position that Britain's economic trouble can't be solved by heavy migration. It holds that there is no unemployment but that there is useful work for all.

England is a sweet country with its lovely flower-gardens and green lawns and endless miles of hedges. However, the fact remains that she can't begin to provide food for her big population and has to import some 60 percent of her foodstuffs. This was harshly impressed on her in the two world wars when she ran short of rations because of enemy blockades.
 Quite likely that had something to do with causing a heavy

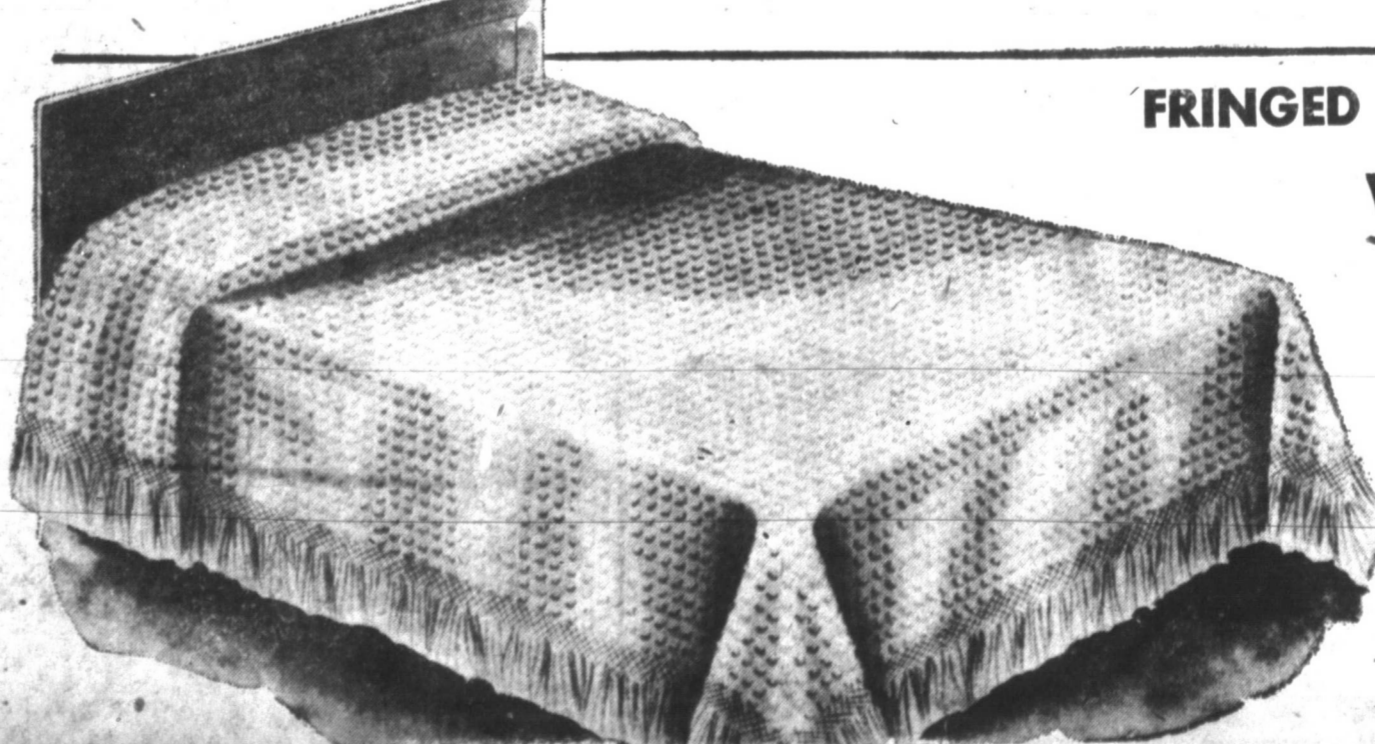

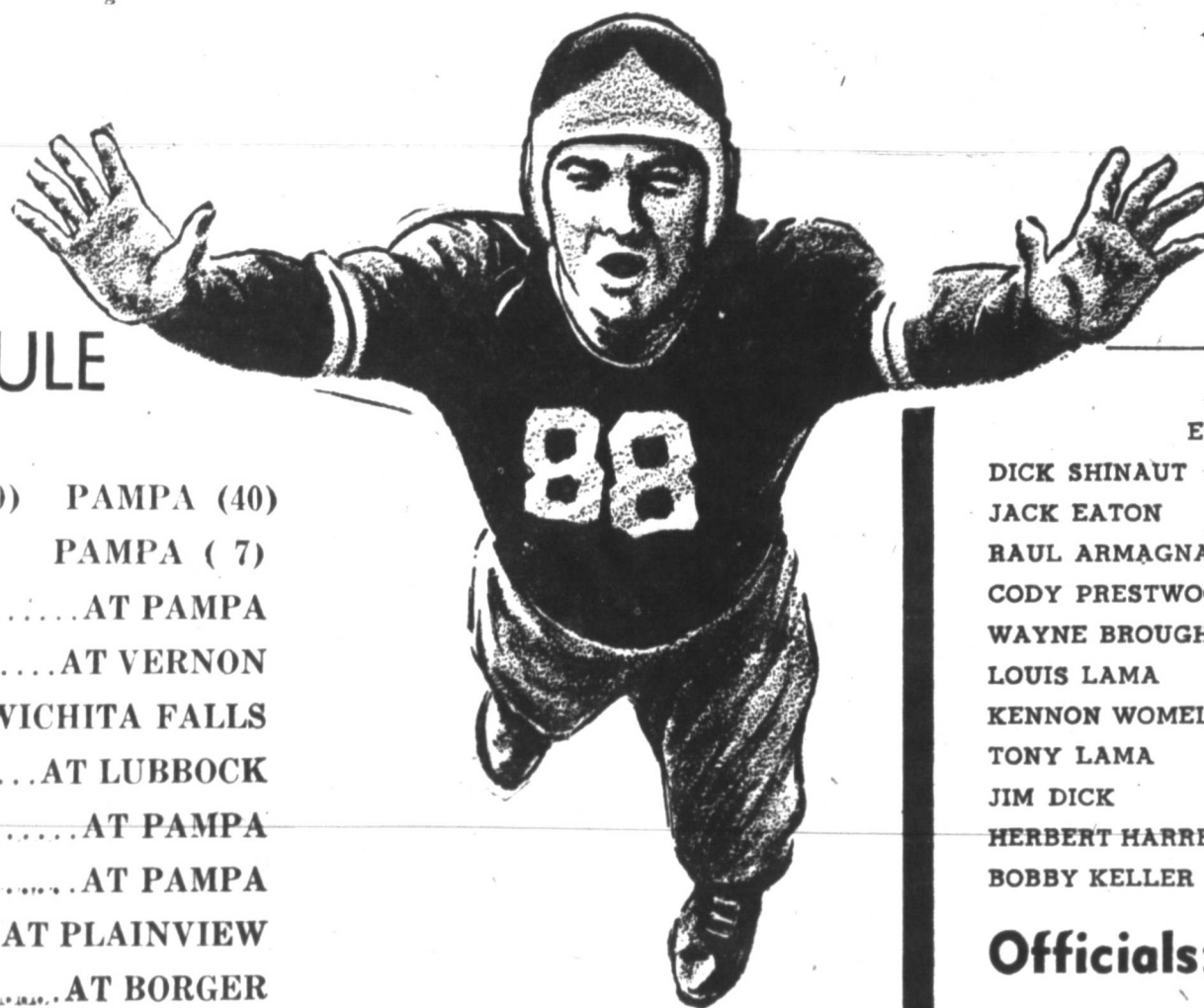

Critics hammered hard at the spending program yesterday. George and Senator Byrd (D-Va.) led the assault with other senators joining in during the day.

The George-Byrd attack centered on government spending which they said threatens to undermine the strength of the United States. If the United States is weakened, they argued, then all hope for peace will be lost.

As the bill now stands, it would authorize 500 million dollars in cash and 500 million in contract authority for the Atlantic Pact nations. The remaining \$314,010,000 would be divided among Greece, Turkey, Korea, Iran, the Philippines, and the China area.

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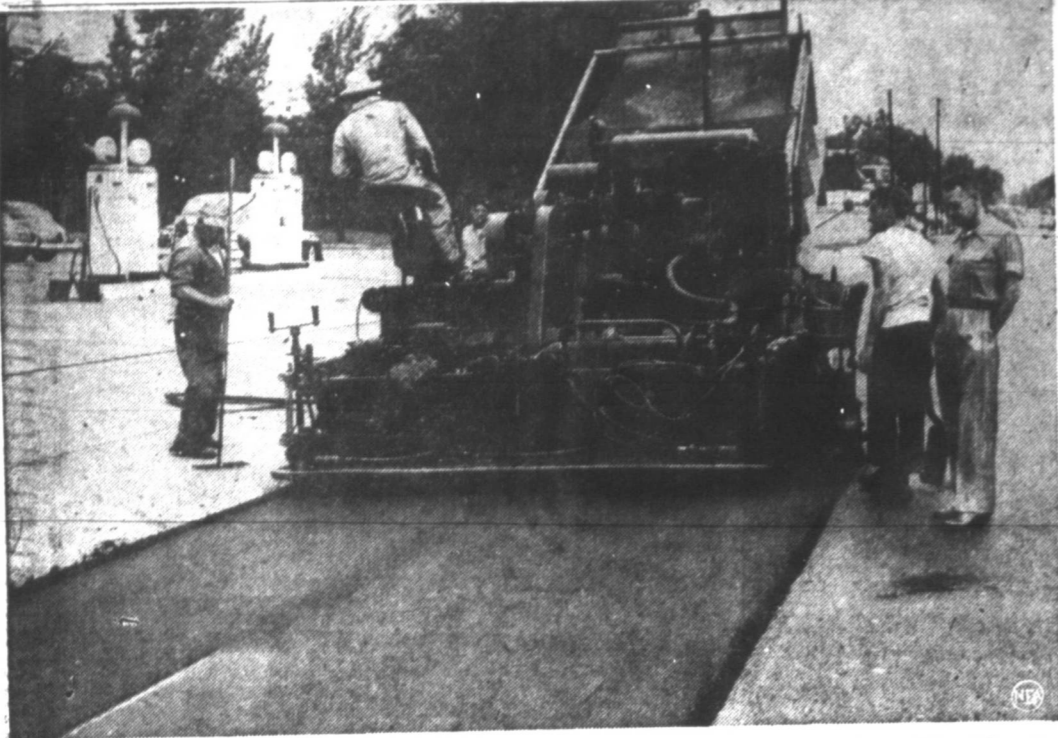

Interpretation of Union Contracts Causes Trouble

 WASHINGTON — (AP) — For 15 years a sore spot has been festering in labor relations on the railroads. It's getting worse all the time.
 It's the main reason for the present strike on the big Missouri Pacific Railroad. It's rickling labor dealings on practically every other railroad in the country.
 The railroad fuss is simply this: A growing batch of arguments between the operating unions and rail managers over the terms of their contracts.
 The unions say some contract clause means one thing. The managers say it means another. Those grievances pile up, unsettled, until one day there is a strike threat.
 This has been going on, and getting worse, ever since 1931.

Then Congress, as asked by the railroads and rail unions, set up an agency called the National Railroad Adjustment Board. It has panels composed of equal numbers of union and management men, supposed to settle such grievances.
 There are four panels, all based at Chicago. All have been getting along okay except one. That one deals with grievances brought by rail operating employees such as engineers, firemen, trainmen, and conductors.
 Things went bad with the operating workers' panel from the start. Because labor contracts covering these workers are so complicated, it now has a backlog of more than 3,000 grievances. Officials estimate it will take four or five years to settle them. This doesn't leave much room for new ones.
 So the unions representing the engineers and other operating employees have just about put a boycott on the adjustment board. They won't take their cases there any more.

Singer One Of Few Who Go Back

 NEW YORK — (AP) — Everyone daydreams of going back to his old school as a famous success. Few do.
 But Eleanor Steber is going back to a happy homecoming this week to the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston.
 She went there first in the 1930's as a promising vocal student from Wheeling, W. Va. Her parents had been able to scrape together only \$600 to finance her education.
 A scholarship enabled her to remain after the \$600 was gone, and Eleanor worked as a waitress to pay her other expenses.
 Today at 33 the lyric soprano is a prima donna at the Metropolitan Opera and a concert and radio star. She has a six-figure annual income.

The reason Eleanor is going back to the conservatory is to award two scholarships she founded.
 "I want to help some young artists coming along," she said. "Just as I was helped."
 Miss Steber is an outstanding example of the younger generation of home-trained American singers. She believes it is no longer necessary for would-be opera stars to study abroad.
 "We have everything here the younger singer needs, including fine teachers," she said, adding: "Of course, we could use a few more opera houses."
 "But the American public has begun to see that its own artists are as able and well-trained as those of any other country. The old prejudice against them is dying."
