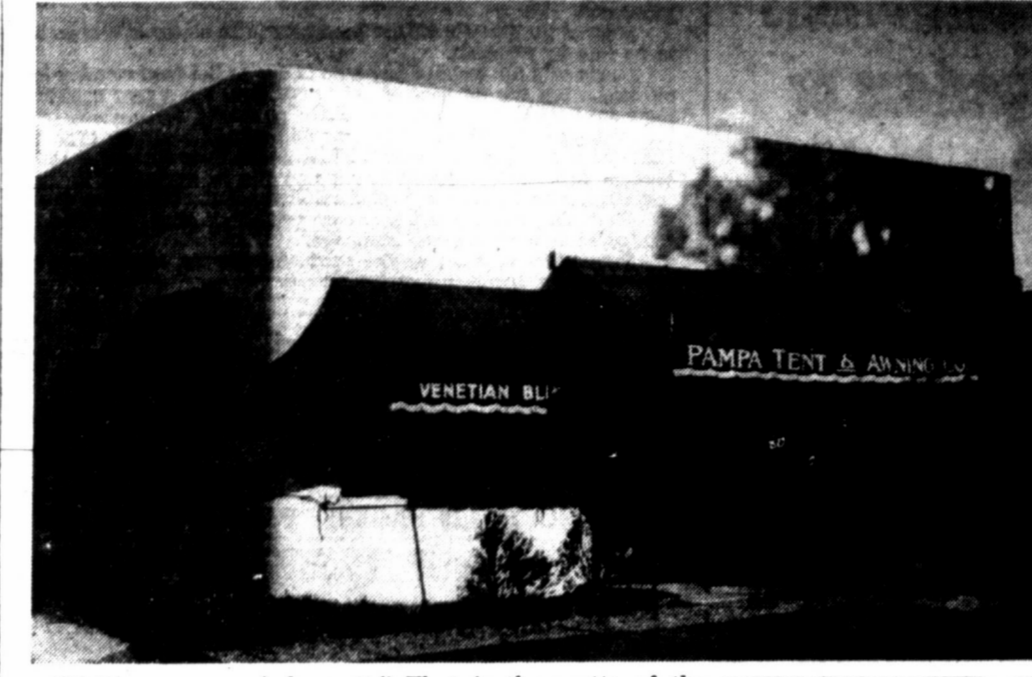

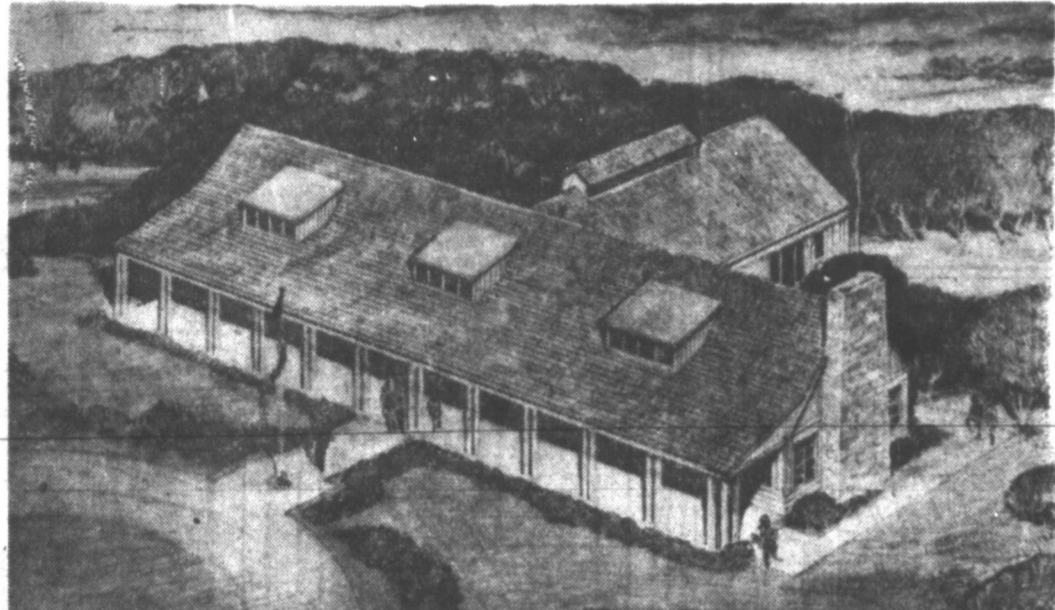

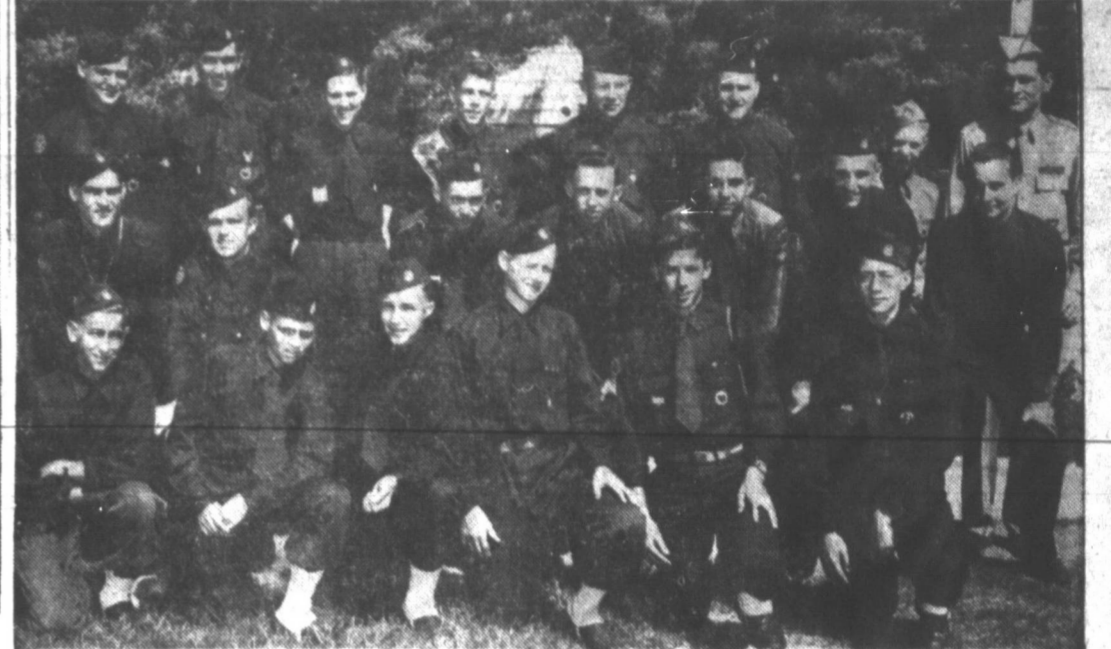

LOWER DOLLAR PRICES NEW YORK — (AP) — Lower dollar prices around the world are looked for today as an early major result of the weekend devaluation of foreign currencies.

Still more countries may have to follow the devaluation parade which began last night.

The devaluation means the dollar prices of goods produced in these countries could fall a maximum of 30 to 40 percent if the reduction is caused solely by devaluation.

Further Action WASHINGTON — (AP) — The reaction of British pound devaluation—which cheapened 11 other currencies overnight—today was expected to sweep rapidly over Europe.

There was every sign that the International Monetary Fund, with which 48 nations must clear any currency change, will have heavy work in coming days and weeks.

For Britain and other Washington officials felt that further measures are necessary.

They hinted that, as an early step, Britain must make some agreement on the so-called "sterling balances" actually, war bonds held by India, Egypt and others.

Payment on these last year cost Britain \$400 million dollars with no goods received in return. Some officials felt this drain should be cut to one-fourth that amount, if possible, while Britain concentrates on selling to the areas which pay in dollars.

The U. S. Steel delegation was led by Benjamin F. Fairless. As he hustled in to the conference room Fairless waved off questions from reporters, saying "I'm here, that's all I want to say."

China asked the industry and union leaders to come in for a talk as a result of their deadlocked attitudes toward a presidential fact-finding board's recommendations in the steel labor dispute.

Murray accepted the board's proposals even though there was no wage increase for steelworkers. U. S. Steel agreed only to meet with the union and talk about the board's proposals.

In advance of the board's report, there was an understanding that its recommendations would not be binding on management or the union.

"To tie a police force onto this bill," Connally said, "would seriously interfere with the procedures of the Council and the committee—and in my opinion it would wreck the program."

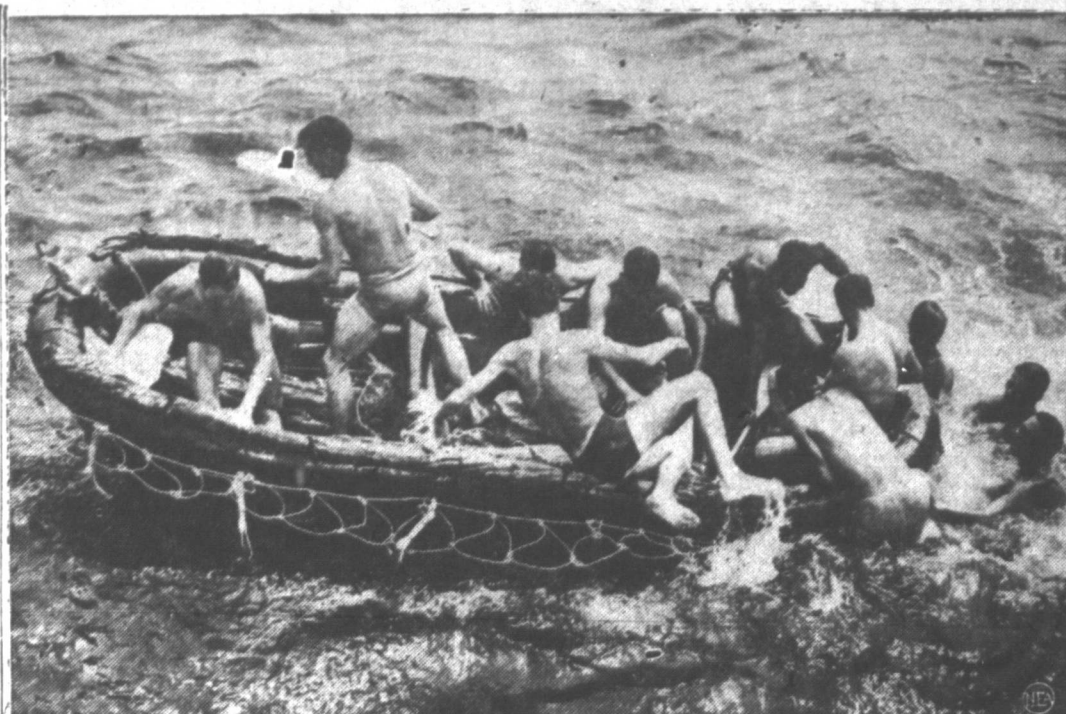
Laycock Back From Eight-Day Meeting

Cyclops With Two Spines Sets Zoologists Agog

WOOSTER, Ohio — (NEA) — The cyclops experts are as agog over what Andy Weaver found in a pond in Ohio.

A cyclops is a water flea, a microscopic animal that flips through the water on its antennae trying to get away from the fish that eat it.

That is what Weaver found, and the reason water-fleaologists are so excited is because the one he discovered is a species that nobody thought existed before outside of North Carolina.

What is more, it is a new form of the species, a matter of little interest to a hungry fish but of great importance to zoologists.

Weaver, who is 22 and a senior at the College of Wooster, began dabbling in zoology nine years ago when his uncle gave him an old microscope. His discovery has convinced him he is in the proper field, and he'll begin graduate work in entomology next summer.

When he took his cyclops apart under the microscope, it didn't resemble any of the species he'd read about. He sent it to Dr. F. E. Coker, a cyclops specialist at the University of North Carolina. It was just like a species Dr. Coker previously believed was confined to his state, except that Weaver's water-flea had two spines on its foot, instead of one.

Very soon now, Weaver will publish his report on his cyclops, which he calls bispinosus, for the world of invertebrate zoology. Meantime, he is breeding the animals to see if it's just the warm weather that makes them add the second spine.

Nature's Children Warn Texas Man of Bad Winter Ahead

WACO — (AP) — It's going to be an early, long and frigid winter, the man says.

The prediction comes from W. C. (Doggie) Watson, sage of the Brazos.

Doggie doesn't need any of these new-fangled instruments or charts. He bases his prediction on observation of nature and nature's children—the animals, fish, insects, birds and plants.

He says he has seen a cicada grow around his home on the Brazos.

That is his annual prediction: "The fish have stayed in deep water all summer, the birds have built thicker nests and the trees have thicker bark this year than in any other year."

"The turtle is the best weather prophet. You watch where they build their nests and you can pretty near determine the weather. This year they have scooped out their nests in deep water. As a usual thing they will build close to the bank in shallow water but they know it is going to freeze in this shallow water, so to deep water they have gone."

Doggie, who got his nickname training coon and possum dogs, says the animals and fish and plants are notified ahead of time what kind of winter to prepare for.

Navy Putting Warships On the Shelf

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Navy, with an ear to predictions of broadscale reductions in military spending in the next fiscal year, already is getting ready to put more warships on the shelf.

Starting later this month, the Navy will begin to take ships out of the active fleet and tie them up.

The program will continue throughout the rest of this year and in the first half of next. The idea is that by the time the Navy starts operating with funds for the 1951 fiscal year (starting next July 1) it will be pared down to fit the present guess of Navy officials about the budget's size.

The laid-up fleet, along with several carriers, will go other ships that support modern day carrier task forces, including destroyers and probably some cruisers.

The defense department is scheduled to send the preliminary estimate of fiscal 1951's money needs to the Budget Bureau on Sept. 15.

Most talk is that the overall budget for the Army, Navy and Air Force will be between \$13,400,000,000 and \$13,700,000,000.

This would be at least one and a half billion dollars less for the fiscal year of 1949 which ended June 30.
