



Auto Industry May Not Meet **Big Sales Slump**

By DAVID J. WILKIE AP Automotive Editor
DETROIT — (P) — The auto lustry may get through the fall nonths without a major sales

That view is gaining increasing support as high level sales and production continue. The motor-car makers have built and sold more vehicles so far this year than in any like period in the industry's history. Even should a slump develop they appear to have a record in both production and

sales assured. Months ago car industry experts were talking about sales and output dropping off in mid-July. Instead of declining demand has continued and production still is booming. Last month the factor ies turned out close to 652,000 cars and trucks. That tops the best effort in the industry's history by more than 30,000 vehicles In April 20 years ago, the factories working at three-shift

capacity, turned out 621,910 units.

The industry capacity, of course, has been greatly expanded since 1929. The present recordbreaking production rate is being achieved with no company work ing more than two shifts. Some are on a nine-hour basis and there has been considerable Saturday overtime. But there wasn't ny five-day week in 1929. Whether the guessing is right or wrong, the car makers right now aren't thinking in terms of

This week and next a vast young army of 32 million boys and girls will start trooping into classrooms where they will be confronted by 1,200,000 teachers in about 90,000 independent school districts. 

An American returning to his nomelaud after an absence of wonder what in the world had

happened to the industrious peo ple whom he had left behind. He would be saddened at the spectacle of millions of Americans deand giving in re

turn work, less in quantity and inferior in quality.

The present situation brings back to mind a motto which I saw some years ago on the office wall of a business executive. It read:

"I am a great believer in luck; I find that the harder I work, the more i seem to have of it.' A few days after reading this brief essay on luck and work, I was the week-end guest of a friend at shooting lodge. There above the immense fireplace extending icross the end of the livingroom was another motto. It seemed to hand in hand with the one seen a few days before. It read: He who chops his own wood gets warmed twice."

Those two mottos, it seems to me, most tersely and describe the America that was: an America that we must revive to make it once again a land where men work and take pride in doing their jobs well.

It used to be the American concept that the man who worked a little harder and a little better deserved a larger reward than his less industrious and less skilful felin this country had ever thought denying to that better worker his right to a larger compensation. was the competitive spirit between Americans, whether they were workers or bosses, which was largely responsible for making Amrica the most prosperous country the world has ever known, with the highest standard of living for ridors of all classes. 
