

Council of Europe Adopts Work Plan

STRASBOURG, FRANCE (AP) — The Council of Europe adopted Saturday a nine-point work program for its drive to pull the war-battered countries of the old world closer together. At the same time it ruled out any specific discussion of Irish partition.

The council's Committee of Ministers approved an agenda which was drawn up earlier by the consultative assembly's 101 delegates, and which will keep them busy for at least several weeks.

The nine-point agenda provides for debate on such items as political changes necessary in Europe to bring about greater unity of member nations, and human rights and fundamental freedoms.

The addition of the six points was a victory for Winston Churchill and the majority in the assembly. None of the points covers military subjects, since the committee and the assembly agreed this was not within the competence of the Council of Europe.

The touchy nationalistic issue over Ireland was ruled out as a problem for debate during the talk on possible agenda items.

Eamon De Valera, former prime minister of Ireland, made two determined efforts to put the dispute with Britain over Northern Ireland on the program.

Strong opposition to the Irish man's proposal came from most of the British delegates.

A notable omission from the agenda was the question of Germany.

Colleagues of Winston Churchill, who sits as one of the British delegates, say he intends to bring up the German issue next week after today's German election.

Associates of Britain's wartime prime minister claim he wants the assembly to invite the new West German state to become a council member, presumably an associate member.

Here are the agenda topics:

1. The council's role in economic matters taking into account the Marshall Plan organization already set up.
2. The council's role in social security.
3. Cultural cooperation among the 12 member nations. (These first three points were proposed by the Ministerial Committee.)
4. Political changes necessary to greater unity among council members.
5. Measures to maintain human rights and fundamental freedoms.
6. Proposals to create a common European nationality and a European passport.
7. A common patent office.
8. A joint public works program (which might include a tunnel under the English Channel).
9. Measures to pool material resources and technical manpower in scientific research.

The assembly adjourned until Tuesday to allow time for appointing and organizing various committees.

Legislator Sees Hospitals Without Additional Taxes

AUSTIN — (AP) — Rep. Frank Svadlenak of Thrall believes new state hospital buildings could be built without a dime of new taxes if Texas would sell off some of its spare real estate.

The eleemosynary system could be largely rebuilt, Svadlenak says, with proceeds from such sales. In the Austin area alone, the law-maker figures a cash sale would bring about 18 million dollars.

Svadlenak, a former chairman of the House committee on revenue and taxation, first advanced the idea in a speech near the end of the last Legislature's regular session. He enlarged upon it recently in a statement to the Associated Press.

He was referring specifically to the large acreage around the Austin State Hospital, familiar to traveling Texans in its location on Guadalupe Street (the Dallas-Fort Worth highway) in north Austin. It is a gloomy group of buildings surrounded by vegetable gardens.

Svadlenak, a merchant who commutes between his home and traveling sessions of the Legislature, passes the state hospital grounds frequently.

"For the life of me I cannot see the wisdom of raising a head of cabbage, a couple of stalks of corn or one cauliflower on land worth from \$150 to \$500 per front foot. It just isn't good business," he said.

Svadlenak's idea is that the land should be sold and the hospital and similar in-town eleemosynary institutions be moved out into the country whenever possible.

When the institution here was first located on Guadalupe, it was on the far outskirts of town. Now it is surrounded by home and business property. Svadlenak gave this outline of his argument:

1. The buildings are old and beyond modern repair and the cost of modernizing these old structures would be as much or more than the cost of new modern construction.
2. The land area occupied by the Austin hospital is too valuable for this purpose.
3. The inhabitants of this institution should be moved into structures at least ten or twelve miles outside the corporate limits of any city, where they can enjoy the quiet of life and nature.
4. Cash received for the sale of business and residential lots would finance a modern utopia for the insane. It would forego the passage of any new taxes upon the people, now overburdened by local, city, school, county, state and federal levies.
5. The 478 acres in Austin would become private property and would belong to the city.

In and Out; Pups In Sewer; Owner Loses Basement

CHICAGO (AP) — James Liguori lost part of his basement yesterday. But one of his two puppies was alive, thanks to 12 hours of hard work by police firemen, the Animal Welfare League and the city's sewer department.

Liguori went down to the basement last night when his mongrel dog, Queenie, began barking. He found her trying frantically to get into a sewer hole.

Peering down, Liguori could see nothing. But he heard Queenie's two puppies whining. They had fallen 12 feet into the sewer.

Liguori called for help. The city responded. As a dozen rescue workers dug one hole in the basement and another outside, hundreds of persons attending a nearby carnival gathered to watch.

The men worked all night. They blasted the concrete and dug down seven feet. Then they carved a tunnel to the sewer.

One was dead. The other was taken to the welfare league for observation.

Baby Sees His Daddy, Mother For First Time

WILMINGTON, Ohio — (AP) — Judge little "Jay" Dabey, seized at the world around him with a great deal of wonder today.

His mother, Mrs. Janet Dabey, III, didn't know his own parents by sight, although he was a sturdy 15-month-old.

"I was born blind," Mrs. Dabey said. "My eyes were born with cataracts over both eyes. An operation to cut away the cataracts wasn't successful. The eye of sight also hampered the baby's ability to stand and to walk. Last month a cataract operation concluded a nine-month operation on 'Jay'. He cut new pupils, and windows in the baby's eyes so he could look through the cataracts. Last week 'Jay' saw for the first time. Now he can even stand alone."

Feed Supply Is Abundant

AUSTIN — (AP) — An abundant fall and winter feed supply in most areas of the state was in prospect as of Aug. 1.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture reported that ranges and pastures were supplying adequate feed over the entire state.

In other reports, the USDA's Bureau of Agricultural Economics said:

The Texas 1949 lamb crop, estimated at 3,296,000 head, was seven percent above last year's short crop of 2,992,000 head, but 27 percent below the 10-year (1938-47) average of 4,413,000.

Commercial meat production in Texas during June totaled 65,703,000 pounds. That was up 13 percent from the amount produced during May, but one-fourth less than production for June, 1948.

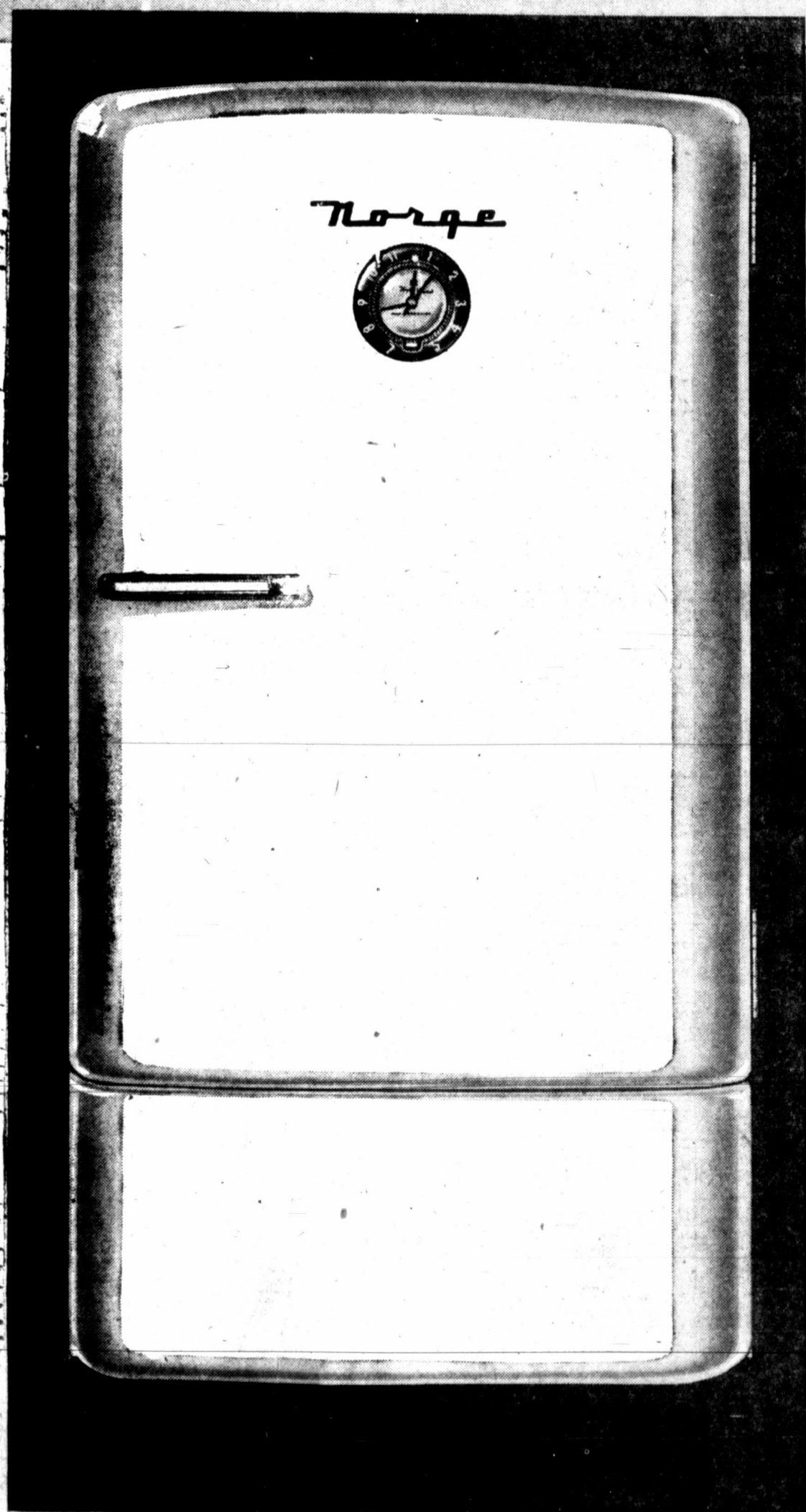

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'Dimes' Gives Millions for Polio Aid

NEW YORK — (AP) — The March of Dimes has supplied millions of dollars this year to aid new victims of polio.

No exact figure is available. Some local chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which collects the money, already have exhausted their funds.

To them the national headquarters has advanced \$3,500,000 from its epidemic aid fund. How much the local chapters have spent besides isn't known.

Polio is one of the costliest of diseases. Patients may have to spend months or years in hospi-

tals. They need special equipment, special nursing, special training of muscles. Cost of the average case runs between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

Here is how the March of Dimes helps to lift this burden: Local chapters keep half of the Dimes money. Most of it goes to pay expenses of patients in their areas.

The foundation's policy is that local chapters pay for expenses which the family cannot meet. It may pay the entire cost or part of it.

"Each case is judged on its merits," said Dr. Hart E. Van Riper, foundation medical director. "There is no set income that a family must have to get help. If help is needed, the foundation gives it."

If there are relatively few cases in one state, the local chapter may be able to pay all the costs for everyone. But a severe outbreak soon drains its funds.

The national headquarters administers the other half of the Dimes money. Part of it goes into the epidemic aid fund, and money is sent to the chapters whose own funds run out.

Last year the foundation and its chapters spent \$17,000,000 on care of polio victims. Of this, \$6,700,000 came from the National Epidemic Aid fund.

Since 1938, the March of Dimes has taken in \$98,000,000. Fifty-eight millions have been spent on care for patients. Another \$23,500,000 has gone for research seeking the answers to polio and for professional training of doctors and nurses. The rest has been spent on educational work, administration and other expenses.

Child Greeted 'Mom' After 12-Year Silence

CANTON, OHIO — (AP) — "Hey, Mom!"

In a high, weak voice, that was the way 14-year-old Jo-Ann Bates broke a silence of 12 years this week.

An operation closed a small hole in her throat and allowed her first spoken words since an obstruction blocked the passageway when she was two. The hole was made for a breathing tube.

Since birth the going has been tough for Jo-Ann. Born prematurely without a fully developed throat, she spent six months in an incubator.

Then at two, a growth formed, cutting off her speech and forcing doctors to insert a tube in her throat. While she slept, her parents had to watch, lest mucous clog the tube.

Two years ago, radium treatments overcame the growth and the tube was removed. But except for a few whispered words, the child couldn't talk.

Jo-Ann now is practicing by repeating the names of her two sisters and three brothers. Physicians are hopeful she ultimately will be able to talk normally.

Her mother, Mrs. E. E. Bates, said she believed the child's first words were the last she uttered after being stricken at two.

Filipinos Told Their Country Needs Them

NEW YORK — (AP) — Philippine President Elpidio Quirino wants Filipinos in this country to return to their island homeland.

He told 700 Filipino-Americans at a reception in his honor that their talents are needed for reconstruction of the war-ravaged islands.

"You are needed more at home than here in the United States," he said.

Quirino, welcomed here Thursday in a confetti-strewn parade up Broadway, continued his crusade for a Pacific defense pact.

The Constitution of the United States makes no mention of a President's Cabinet.

Certificate Needed to See Mexico

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — The Federal Health Department ordered that all Texas tourists to Mexico have a certificate saying they have not been exposed to polio in this summer's infantile paralysis season.

Texas supplies about half the Mexican tourist trade. The season is at its height. Tourists now fill every room in Mexico City hotels and net this country about \$5,000,000 a month.

The Tourist Office of the Interior Department said the new order applies only to tourists living in Texas. The office said traffic was normal, despite the order.

The order requires tourists to have a doctor's certificate saying they have not been exposed to polio for three years. The foreign office sent the order to Mexican consulates in the United States.

The order said that the certificate should be exhibited when the passenger boards his plane in Texas for the flight to Mexico, or when his train crossed the border.

Mental Hygiene Is Seen as The Only Tonic for Old Age

CALVERTON — Mental hygiene is still the most satisfactory guard against the disturbances of old age, claims the vice president and dean of the University of Texas Medical Branch here.

The outlook is dim for improved drugs for use in geriatrics — the branch of medicine concerned with old age and its diseases — says Dr. Chauncey D. Leake. But that should only be considered part of the challenge to develop principles of drug action which will be most useful in promoting the welfare of the aged, he adds.

"We must keep in mind one prime proposition," Dr. Leake writes in Texas Reports on Biology and Medicine, published by the University Medical Branch. "Drugs can only make living cells

do more or less what they are already capable of doing."

Modern medicine's success in increasing life expectancy raises a shift from the "eager vigorous many serious problems. Dr. Leake

says. Involved are major adjustments in our cultural and social structure and considerable reorientation in individual objectives and ways of living.

"In our Western civilization we now have among us for the first time in our history more people over 35 than under," he points out. This means, he adds, that the character of our culture may shift from the "eager vigorous many serious problems. Dr. Leake

"more sober, wiser realization of our limitations" typical of old people.

"The reverberations of this situation in economics, politics, family life, cultural institutions, indeed in all society, are soon to become overwhelming," Dr. Leake declares. "The point is simply that our increasing number of old people are unprepared to take care of themselves."

Dr. Leake offers a four-point program, suggested by success of

the nationwide promotion of child health, with the objective of helping persons grow old with "dignity, equanimity and ability to take care of themselves till death."

The program would include early consideration of the objectives in high school, college and young adult life; developing every possible opportunity for the cultivation of individual hobbies, crafts, intellectual curiosities and artistic satisfaction; promoting

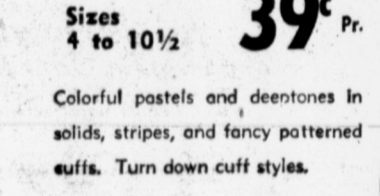

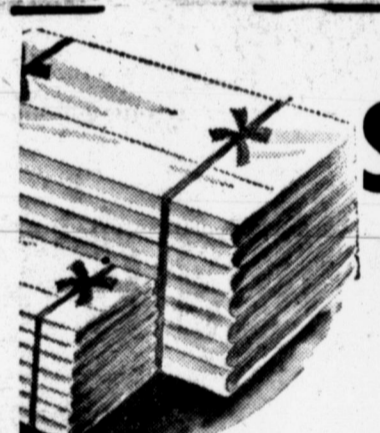

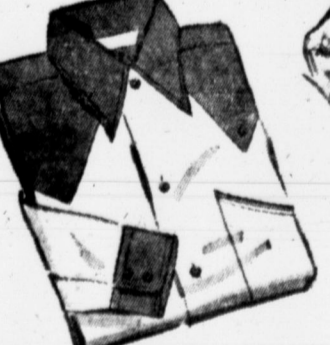

French Won't Stay to Meet Communists in Indo-China

Friday the French pulled one of their small garrisons back from a point in Indo-China near the Chinese border.

If and when the Chinese Communists arrive, the French will not be there to stop them.

Possibly for the benefit of American officials planning a new policy to combat communism in East Asia, this underlines the fact that Indo-China lies squarely in the path of any communism that spills over from China.

Yet earlier last week, just after Gen. Omar N. Bradley announced that France would get the bulk of American arms sent to Europe to contain communism there, France's President Auriol assured the Indo-Chinese that France would defend them from any outside aggressor.

France would need help for this job, because for three years she has failed to beat down the native Nationalist movement led by Ho Chi-minh.

Ho is a Communist who heads the unrecognized republic of Viet-

nam. His leadership is popular enough among 25,000,000 Indo-Chinese that when the French set up Bao Dai as emperor of a rival state last June, they also called it Vietnam.

To fight Ho, the French still use more than 100,000 foreign legionnaires. Away from the main roads and cities, outposts are maintained by airlifts. The rebels control the rest of the country.

It has been a costly stalemate, with the French unable to defeat the rebels and the rebels unable to drive out the French.

Through Bao Dai, the French are trying now to lure the Indo-Chinese away from Ho Chi-minh. At this writing Bao Dai and what he stands for are not popular. France has granted him only nominal internal autonomy. Rebel grenades go off within a few miles of his capital at Saigon.

Ho Chi-minh has declared he will go on fighting.

There are two current opinions about Ho. One is that his political bureau is a typically high-handed Red powerhouse, liquidating its allies in the Republican front as well as bumping off Indo-Chinese like Bao Dai who work with the French.

The other version is that Ho's Communists by no means have attained the domination of the Nationalist front that Mao Tze-tung has in China. The idea is that Ho still leads the popular front because he has subordinated his communism to the other elements in the Nationalist coalition that fights the French.

The truth is hard to get at, for one reason, because the French center in Saigon is very efficient and no correspondent gets in unless the French approve of him beforehand.

Manager Advises Workers to Check Old-Age Records

Checking on your old-age and survivors insurance account is like having your bank account balanced and is just as good business. This is the advice of John R. Sanderson manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration, in reminding workers of this free service.

"We urge all workers to check at intervals on their accounts," Sanderson explained, "so that they may be sure of receiving credit for all wages they earn. We take every precaution to insure the accuracy of our records, but some wages are reported that cannot be posted. Most errors on reports are due to mistakes in the worker's name or account number or the failure to show any number. Sometimes the wrong amount of wages is reported and occasionally no report at all is made."

Sanderson added there is no charge for furnishing wage statements and any worker can obtain one easily. Write the social security office, Amarillo, Texas, for a self-addressed postal card which you can fill out and mail to the social security Division of Accounting Operations at Baltimore, Maryland.

Consumers Used Savings in 1948 That Created Spending Boom

WASHINGTON — (AP) — It now appears that one reason why 1948 was such a boom year was that the nation's families, by and large, spent part of their nest eggs.

For all the record high marks it made in income and profits and employment, 1948 was just a long-awaited "rainy day" for half the families who had saved against its coming.

That, at least, is what they told the people who made a sample survey for the Federal Reserve Board to see how people were faring economically.

"Emergencies and sickness" were named by that many people as a cause for their having less in government bonds and bank accounts in early 1949 than they had in early 1948.

It wasn't the only reason. Nearly half—including vast numbers of those who cited sickness and emergencies—said they've blown some savings on a car, the television set, some furniture, or something of that sort.

A third of all families put down the deflation of their savings hoards to spending on non-dur-

Russia Calls Slavs 'Enemy'

MOSCOW — (AP) — Soviet Russia denounced the Yugoslav government as an enemy of the Soviet Union and charged that Premier Marshal Tito's regime more and more is throwing in its lot with the West.

This sweeping Soviet attack, made by the Moscow radio, was contained in a Russian note to Yugoslavia.

The note stated that Tito's regime as early as April, 1947, had been willing to abandon its basic claims for Austrian territory as compensation for war losses, but wished to shift the responsibility for this decision to the Soviet government.

The note was the fourth in a series of bitter diplomatic exchanges between Moscow and Belgrade over what the Yugoslavs regarded as Russia's abandonment of Yugoslav territorial claims at the recent Big Four foreign ministers conference in Paris.

(Although Tito and the Kremlin have been at odds for more than a year, the note marked the first time that Russia had used the term "enemy" in referring to the Yugoslav government.)

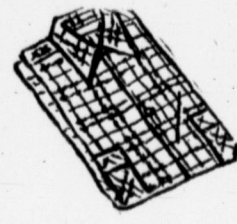

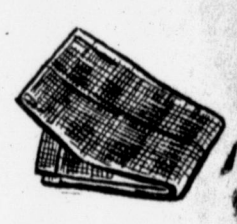

DID YOU KNOW that the style of architecture of your home reflects to a degree the type personality you are? In the July issue of the American Magazine, Dr. Ethel Waring, professor of home economics at Cornell University, has an informative article on the subject. She lists the ten most popular houses in the United States and goes into detail about the personalities of the people who choose the various types of architecture. She lists: the Georgian, Victorian, Dutch Colonial, Regency, Mediterranean, New England Colonial, Modern, Ranch Style, English Half-Timber and Cape Cod. As far as I know, all of these aren't represented in Pampa, but if you haven't already read her opinion we'll mention a few here and you can take it for what it's worth. Happy Day! Hubby Shown As an Admirable Fellow

NEW YORK — More American men are married, maintaining a home and raising a family — and what's more, apparently liking it — than ever before in the history of the country.

This is based upon a study of the American husband by the statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., who bring attention to the impressive fact that there are now about 35 1-2 million married men in the United States, and that some 94 1-3 million of them are living with their wives.

"Even the small proportion — approximately three percent — living apart includes those men who are employed away from home or are temporarily absent for reasons other than marital discord," the statisticians note.

The otherwise happy situation is clouded somewhat by the fact that, because of the housing shortage, about 2 1-2 million married couples are living with relatives or in other temporary quarters, such as transient hotels and lodging houses.

Foundation Spends \$278,330 for Polio Through Aug. 6

NEW YORK — (AP) — The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis announced yesterday it had spent \$278,330 in emergency aid during the week ended Aug. 6 to its chapters in polio-stricken areas whose March of Dimes funds were exhausted.

Missouri, where polio cases have risen sharply in the past several weeks, received the largest amount, \$85,425.

The foundation gave \$85,000 to North Carolina. The state, which has almost escaped this year's outbreak, needs the money mostly to care for victims of last year's epidemic, worst in the state's history.

Other states receiving large grants last week included Texas, \$45,000; California, \$13,750; New Jersey, \$11,800; Iowa, \$8,322; and South Carolina, \$8,275.

The breakdown by counties for the foundation's spending in Texas: Harris, \$21,000; Navarro, \$725; Nueces, \$6,000; Edwards, \$3,000; Runnels, \$8,600; Coleman, \$4,175; Kerr, \$1,800.

AUSTIN — (AP) — F. M. McClendon will die in the electric chair at Huntsville today on conviction of a Lee County murder. McClendon was condemned to death for the slaying of I. C. Nichols, a trucker, on July 4, 1948. Several other men were involved in what the state called a murder and a robbery.

McClendon was granted the customary 30-day Constitutional stay of execution. The original execution date was July 15.

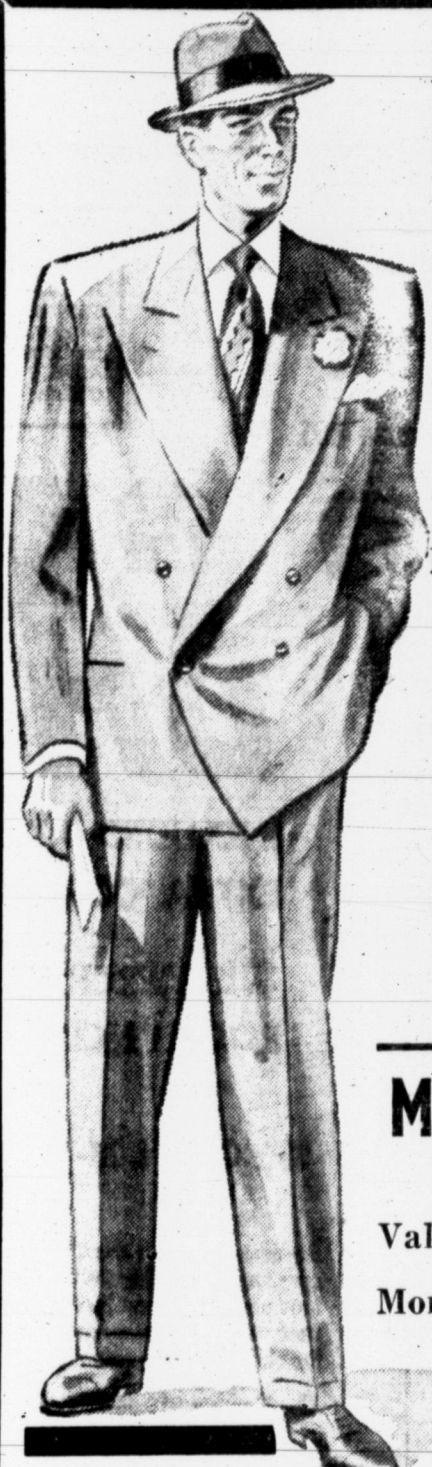

Dynamiters Blast Two Negro Homes

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — (AP) — Dynamite blasts rocked the homes of two Negro ministers early yesterday in an area zoned for whites. A group of Negroes fired several shots at the dynamiters' auto, apparently without effect. Eighteen Negroes in the two houses narrowly escaped death or injury.

Scores of Negroes in angry mood gathered in the area immediately and squads of police deployed to keep traffic moving. One Negro was arrested. The arresting officer said he refused "to move on when ordered."

The Negro, Horace Moore, 32, was taken to the City Jail, where he was booked on charges of resisting arrest and refusing to obey an officer.

Most of the windows in the houses were blown out. Neither sustained any major damage. Residents of the houses said the dynamite was hurled by an unmasked white man who leaned out of a speeding car.

The houses are occupied by families of the Rev. Milton Curry and the Rev. E. B. Deyampert. Both had been warned in recent weeks by anonymous phone callers to move.

The Motion Picture Academy, which arranged the radio show, was trying to reach Winston Churchill for a message to his old friend.

Such a celebration befits the woman whose imposing figure and muted-foghorn voice has dominated the American theater for a half-century.

What is she like? Well, she lives with her son, Samuel Colt, in a cottage in the Palos Verdes Hills overlooking the Pacific. She has kept no pictures of herself, except a John Singer Sargent drawing which hangs over the fireplace.

She has kept no scrapbooks. "I never forget anything," she says.

Miss Barrymore is an avid sports fan, and her home is often noisy with radio or television commentary of baseball games. She once told me why she favored baseball over football: she was always doing Saturday matinees and couldn't get out to grid games. She was eager as a bobbysoxer to meet Cleveland Pitcher Gene Bearden when he was working at MGM last year.

Miss Barrymore has never seen herself on the screen. "Why should I? I never saw myself on the stage," she retorts. Her favorite screen role is the nun in the forthcoming "The Red Danube."

She chain smokes, but does not drink. She avoids all forms of exercise. Her favorite entertainment is having close friends for lunch. They include Katharine Hepburn, Fanny Brice, Lucille Watson, Director George Cukor, Writer Zoe Akins.

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New Edition Shows U.S.A. Still Growing

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Two years ago the Twentieth Century Fund published an 812-page book, "America's Needs and Resources," a valuable study of this country's growth.

The essential facts in the larger book now have been boiled down into 1011 pages in "U.S.A., Measure of A Nation" with easy-to-read text and picture charts.

It goes back a hundred years to show the growth of America and projects the American picture to 1990 to indicate where we're going.

In their foreword the authors Thomas R. Carskadon and Rudolf Modley — say: "When we . . . take a long look behind, the minor ups and downs flatten out in a rising curve of economic activity, of increasing productive power, unique in the annals of this world."

"It is deeply impressive. And when we project this curve into the future, assuming that we can continue to act as we have in the past, we begin to realize America's vast economic and social potential."

The first drawings on Page one begin to tell the story. In 1850 there were about 7-12 million workers here. Now close to 60 million.

And from 121 hours a day for 6 weeks shrank to 43 hours in 1940, days a week the average worker with the work-week expected to be shorter in the future.

Say the authors: "The measure of our whole past achievement, as well as our future prospects lie in one vital factor — productivity, or output per man-hour of work — an average hour's work in 1850 produced only one-fifth in goods and services of what it produces today."

The population here was 133 million in 1940, its about 147 million now, and should be around 155 million in 1960, the authors figure but —

Our birthrate has been going down. But so has the death rate, and that offsets to remember is this: "In the first 10 years of the present century, our population increased more from immigrants than from our own birth. Since 1930 immigration has all but ceased."

SAN ANTONIO — (AP) — A passenger in the car driven by Elmer J. Smoot, 17, caused him to crash into a telephone pole, he told traffic investigators Friday.

The passenger — a dog — preferred walking to riding. While attempting to hold the dog, Smoot lost control of his car. He was treated for severe lacerations, possible internal injuries and shock.

The car was badly damaged. The dog is gone.

Hong Kong to Be Protected

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of State Acheson said the United States has been discussing with Britain the problem of protection of the crown colony of Hong Kong against possible Chinese Communist pressure.

Acheson made the disclosure at a news conference when he was asked whether the U. S. had reached a decision to back up the British at Hong Kong.

The defense of Hong Kong has been a primary concern of the British government in development of its Far Eastern policies to deal with the new situation in China.

Acheson said the U. S. has talked with the British government about this matter. He said American actions obviously will depend on the developments so that this country will know what it is backing up.

The secretary indicated he very likely will discuss the Chinese situation with British Foreign Minister Bevin when Bevin comes here next month.
