

nery Company. Few people know it, but most of their individual trouble comes from wasting a part of their life energy get even with somebody vengeance in short. The effect on the individual is just as bad done individually or whether done by a nation collectively using vengeance against another nation or another people. For this reason "The High Cost of Vengeance" should be read by every man who wants to develop his own character and his own well-being, and the well-being of his fellowman.

The book points out the strong resistance on the part of some of the people in Berlin to withstand the tyranny of the Russians and former allies. It shows that some of them have a pretty rationphilosophy of living. The author of the book says that Otto Stolz, writing on the anniversary, of the German Revolution of 1848 which to the socialist party reminded his

"That the struggle then and now is not for 'an economic theory of production and distribution', for the rights of man: equality before the law, individual responsibility and freedom, security of peronal rights, government by consent, freedom of speech and opinion, freedom from arbitrary arrest and imprisonment without trial by due process of law."

Note the kind of security that this man is asking for. He is not asking for security in general. He is only asking for security in personal rights. That is all any government should attempt to givenot to give a man economic security, but to give him security of per sonal rights. This was expressed in the Declaration of Independence as the rights of "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness". It does not guanantee happiness or success. It loes not guarantee life. It only contended that a man has a right to try to earn a living and try to find happiness.






