### Bathers, Boaters At Orange Feuding

**ORANGE**—(AP)—Cow Bayou's boy bathers substituted their bodies for mud and watermelon rinds Sunday in their running feud with motorboaters.

Score for the day: one hit, which resulted in the only casualty, and many near misses, which piled up a big total of wet and angry boat operators.

The casualty was a tattooed unidentified youth about 21, who received multiple shallow cuts of the right leg when he jumped from the Highway 87 bridge into the water en masse from both sides as boats passed through the narrow channel.

Most of the boaters got thoroughly wet.

The Coast Guard had dispatched the boat to the scene at the request of County Judge Sid J. Caillavet after repeated reports of violations by boaters and swimmers.

The previous Sunday afternoon a deputy sheriff went to the bridge after youths started throwing mud and watermelon rinds at the boaters. A 70-year-old woman standing on the bank was hit during that incident.

Jewel Elbert Howard, 18, received from Fannin, Bell, Red River and Lamar Counties, eight cases of burglary and three cases of theft, 10 years.

Tens-of-thousands-of servicemen and women, representing every state, and every conflict in which the United States has engaged, are already enrolled. Stones being used in the construction have been given in memory of servicemen and women.

### U.S. Economy Bounces Back

**NEW YORK**—(AP)—There's still a lot of bounce in our economy. The recent news shows a number of things that have dropped, in price and output, and are now on the rebound. It's only a little bounce back so far, but it's pleasant reading.

Demand has picked up for copper and lead, two items that dropped fast and far since March. And prices are firming on the two important metals.

Wheat prices are firmer—pleasant news for farmers, unless they happen to be the ones whose crops were injured by disease and bad weather in June. It was this cut in the expected supply that strengthened prices.

Rayon suits have been selling well this summer and some manufacturers report they have sold out their considerably large supply. Rayon prices have firmed.

American Radiator & Standard Sanitary Corp. says it has reached the low point in sales and earnings, and looks for improvement from now on, and expects to reopen some of its idle plants before Christmas.

Some woolen mills found demand for certain types of fabrics used by the women's wear trade so good that mills are booked solid into September and prices have gone up a little.

The New England Purchasing Agents Association says 18 percent of its 106 reporting firms found business better in June than in May.

These may be little things, but they show how things that go down can go back up as conditions straighten out.

**Longhorn Attendance Up Over Last Season**

**ABILENE** — (AP) — Attendance in the Class D Longhorn Baseball League is up 58,204 over last year's total at the half mark in the 1949 season.

President Hal Sayles announced today that the official paid attendance for the first half of play this year is 217,916 against 159,712 for last year.

San Angelo has shown the biggest increase with 40,880 customers.

Seven of the eight league cities show an increase in attendance. The comparative figures (1948 in parentheses): Ballinger 21,070 (15,524); Big Spring 29,762 (28,149); Midland 30,803 (24,203); Odessa 32,833 (27,647); Roswell 19,817 (did not compete last year); San Angelo 40,880 (14,382); Sweetwater 18,851 (17,947); Vernon 24,100 (24,992).

Roswell replaced Del Rio in the league this year. Del Rio last year drew only 6,868 for the first 28 games.

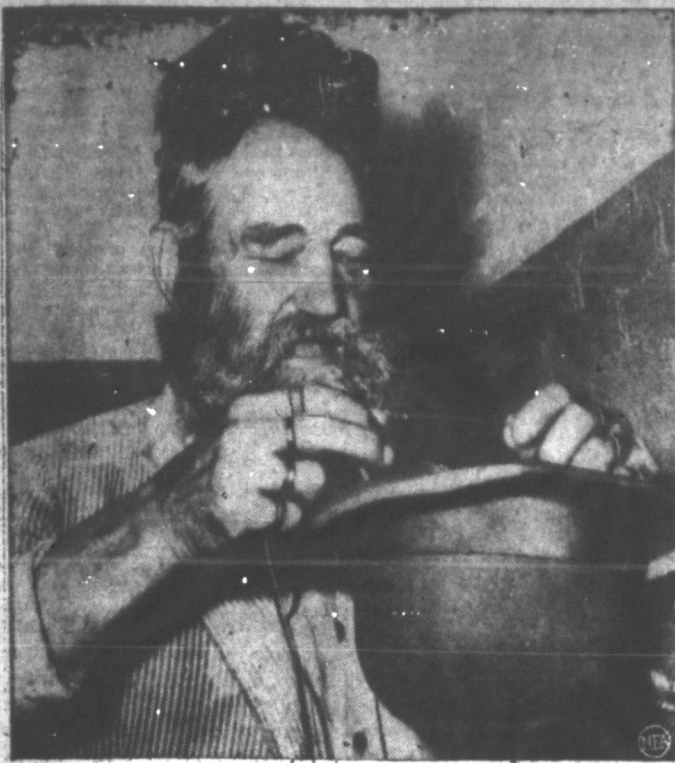

**Committee Cuts Appropriation**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Funds set up for the Southwestern Power Administration by the House were trimmed more than half by the Senate Appropriations Committee. The SPA's operations include Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Missouri.

Reporting the Interior Department appropriations bill for the current fiscal year, the committee recommended only \$1,616,115 in cash and \$2,237,905 in contract authority for SPA.

The House in passing the interior bill had allowed four million dollars cash and five million in contract authority for expansion of SPA's power distribution system.

In its report, the committee said that private utility companies operating in the area of the Southwestern Power Administration had agreed to make their transmission systems available to the government for carrying power from government owned transmission lines to preferred customers of the government.

**Jester Did All Right, Too, Teaching Sunday School**

CORSICANA — (AP) — "I remember Beauford Jester when he went to bat to get Corsicana declared first half champion of the old Texas Baseball Association.

"And that Sunday School class he used to teach.

"And when he practiced law, one flight up.

It was the little things about Beauford Halbert Jester his home town remembered. Almost everyone knew him. He was born here, reared here and this was truly his home.

Jester was governor of Texas when he died in a Pullman berth, some time Monday morning on his way from Austin to Houston. He was going to Galveston for a physical checkup.

But to his home town he was just a nice guy who made a childish wish come true.

"I want to be governor," he said when his mother told him his father was lieutenant governor, an office "right next" to governor.

Corsicana liked Beauford Jester. At 56, he was a big, genial fellow whom hundreds called by name.

It was in 1925 that Jester carried the case of Corsicana's team to the highest officials of minor league baseball. He was attorney for the club and later served as its vice president.

In those days, the Texas League played a split schedule. Corsicana was ahead at the end of the first half, but play was extended. Temple was on top then, Jester won his fight to have Corsicana declared first half champion.

His Sunday School class at the First Methodist Church was for young men. Their sins were always called "our little mistakes."

He never lost a political race, but he worried about losing friends.

"I don't want to enter politics," he once said. "You lose too many friends that way."

But he did enter politics. And he didn't lose many friends.

The death of Jester was a shock to his home town. A lot of people wondered how his 88-year-old mother would receive the news.

"By the grace of God, I'll bear it," she said.

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**Cold War Moving in on U.S. Occupation of Japan**

As the cold war moves in on the American occupation of Japan, one of the first big problems is this:

Are the Japanese police going to indulge in some good old-fashioned terror before Communist agitation is dealt with?

One root of the problem is that fact that there are too many people in Japan. This means too many workers than jobs. It means too many people working for the government. It means a government afraid to fire them.

This government has a lot of pre-war politicians in it. Like Premier Yoshida. His cabinet, and those of earlier post-war premiers, have been told many times to cut expenses.

Last winter occupation officials got specific. They said "balance the budget."

The government stalled. Finally it was told to weed out some of the deadheads among its own employes.

It turned to the bloc of government workers who are most highly organized and under strong leftist influence—the railway and communications workers. If it was looking for trouble, it found it.

Naturally, there was trouble with the workers, with the Communists egging them on. Right in the middle, Russia suddenly decided to return thousands of Japanese prisoners of war held since V-J Day. By now they were thoroughly indoctrinated and many joined in the riots and strikes. They decried the police, among other things.

Keeping law and order is harder now. The Japanese government began, talking about reorganizing the police along lines which would restore some of their pre-war power, which was plenty.

Premier Yoshida is thinking about declaring a national state of emergency, under which the police could act with more force.

Meanwhile, after Gen. MacArthur wondered aloud in public on July 4 whether Communists are entitled to legal standing, there is talk of outlawing the party.

**Two Airlift Fliers Dead**

FRANKFURT — (AP) — Two U. S. Air Force fliers were found dead Tuesday beside a C-54 which crashed in the Russian Zone of Germany while flying the airlift to Berlin.

Air Force headquarters said the third member of the crew was believed dead in the plane's still smoldering wreckage.

Ground rescue crews reached the plane after a day long ground and air search.

Death of all three crew members would raise the airlift death toll to 54 since the British and American Air Forces began supplying blockaded Berlin by air in June of 1948.

Since the lifting of the blockade last May the airlift has continued to supplement the slowly reviving road and rail transport.

The Army withholds names of victims pending notification of next of kin.

**Action Postponed On Seating Dispute**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate Rules Committee has postponed action on election contests involving four senators.

Chairman Hayden (D-Ariz.) said reports on the four disputes, involving Senators Ferguson (R-Mich), Kilgore (D-W.Va), Johnson (D-Tex) and Kerr (D-Okla) were considered too long.

The subcommittee was asked to "hold" these down before presenting them at another closed session.

Neither Hayden nor Chairman Myers (D-Pa) of the subcommittee would say what conclusions may have been reached.

Hayden said the subcommittee did not announce any decisions.

Myers said his group had reached "tentative conclusions."

He added that the subcommittee is not presently contemplating any further gathering of information by investigators.

**Ford Says Wage Hikes 'Mistake'**

NEW YORK — (AP) — Henry Ford II said on arriving from Europe it would be "a great mistake to grant at this time demands of the CIO United Automobile Workers for a fourth round wage boost.

"We're going to be in a buyers' market this fall and we can't keep prices down if wages go up," said the youthful president of the Ford Motor Co.

PRAGUE — (AP) — The official Communist party newspaper, Rude Pravo, charged that the nation's Roman Catholic bishops were attempting to break up the Czechoslovak state and bring it into "a Vatican confederation of Central European nations."

### Economists View With Some Alarm

WASHINGTON — (AP) — "It" is the big word in where we are heading, up or down. The American economy is still at high speed, but it's sliding down hill. Compare today with a year ago: Unemployment — almost 4,000,000, about double what it was a year ago; production — running 18 percent less; corporation profits — around 13 percent less; farm income — down 8 percent. Will it get better? Worse? Will we tumble into a depression? Some of the top economists can't give a flat "yes" or "no" answer. When you cut through all their big words, the main point is "if." They think things will get better—after a little more sliding down—if business, labor, consumers and the government do certain things. They suggest some remedies and—if the country follows the prescription, then things ought to level off and be all right again. This was made clear in two big and important reports by four outstanding economists this week. One was by President Truman's three-man Council of Economic Advisors. They work for the government. The other was by Robert Nathan, hired by the CIO to make a special report on what's happening. When he worked for the government a few years ago, he was one of its most important economists. The President's council took 125 long-winded pages to state their case. In much tighter prose, Nathan took 90 pages. But when economists handle the language, you have to use tweezers to take it apart. The President's three-man council said in essence: Things will get worse before they get better, if they get better. In fact, things may not get better at all, but get much worse. Nathan says that "business will get worse before it gets better seems beyond dispute." How much worse? That, Nathan says, is a "moot question." But he adds: "There are no firm indications that a major depression is imminent nor that a definite upturn is in prospect within the next few months."

Representatives from neighboring towns met with the association's Board of Directors yesterday, requesting admittance in the association. Also at yesterday's meeting the 1950 Girl Scout calendars were ordered. Scouts of each troop of the association will begin selling the calendars Oct. 30, the beginning of Girl Scout Week.

### 'Southern' Buses May Be Designed

DALLAS — (AP) — Southerners who look on their city buses as rolling sweat boxes got good news. The people who run the buses are going to do something about it. They want buses designed for the heat in the South. Tom Owens, vice president of Dallas' bus and street car company, said the issue will be fought out Oct. 3 at Atlantic City when the American Transit Association holds its annual convention. Southern firms will present their problems to bus makers at the convention, Owens said. He said the move for specially designed buses for the South was launched in Houston by L. M. Coates, vice president of the Houston Transit Company. Most of all, said Owens, buses should have better ventilation. Air conditioning is excluded from the order. U. S. funds now pay for gasoline and petroleum imports.

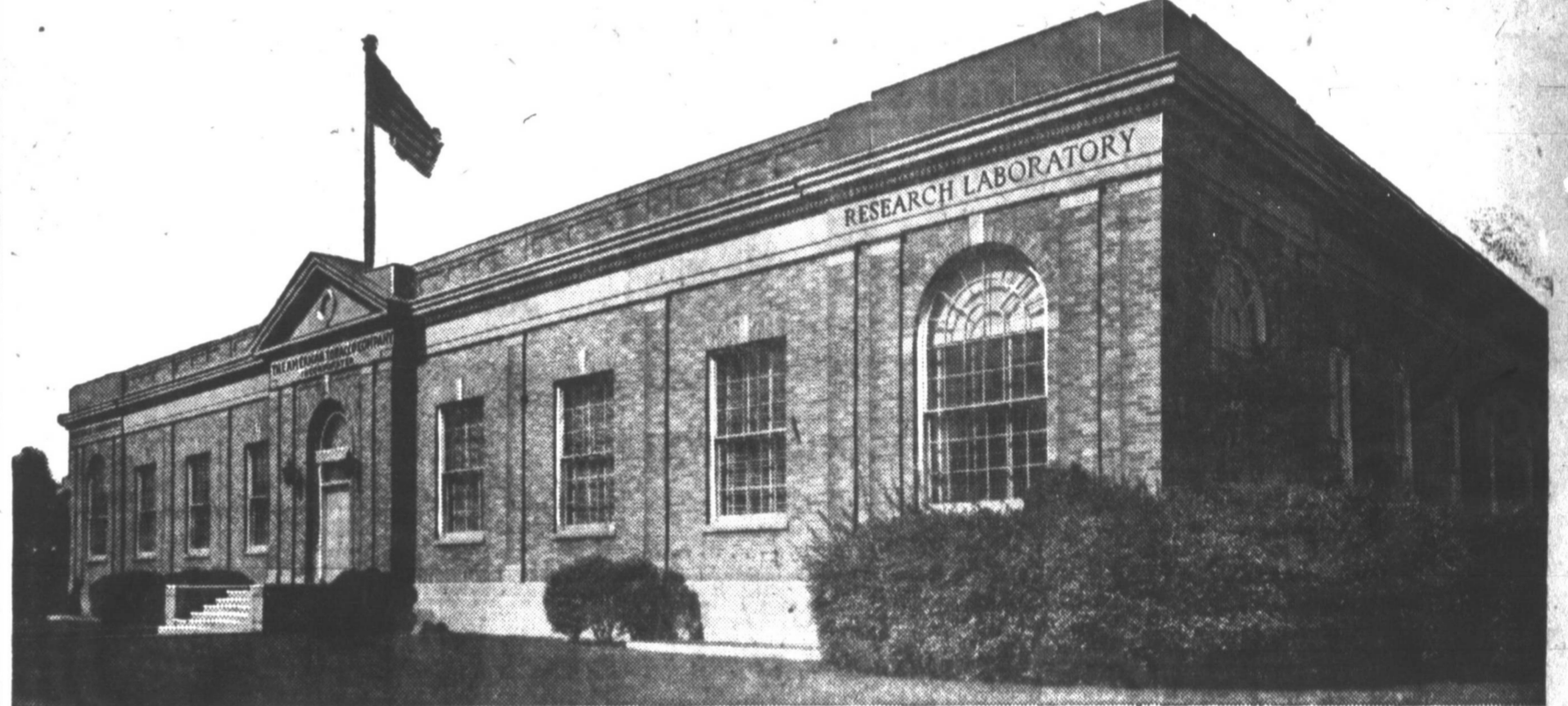

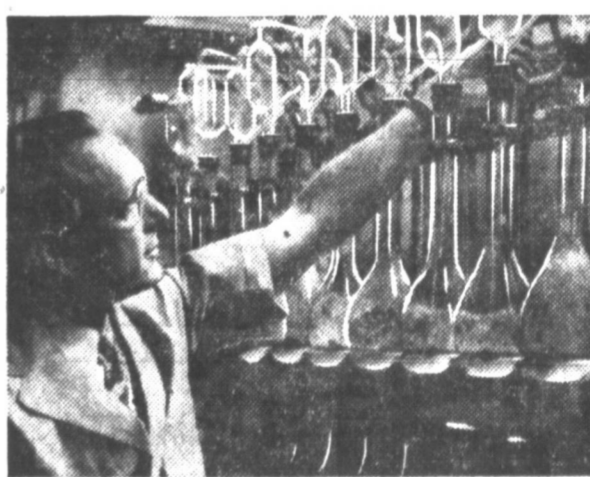

### Sports Help Teach Italian Youth Democratic Ideals

DOUBLE CROSS to fascism is sports, Prof. Guido Graziani of the Rome YMCA feels. Like these small boxers who go in for athletics, learn team play and the essentials of democracy.

ROME — (NEA) — A Roman-born graduate of a New England college is using team athletics to teach the principles of democracy to Italian youth.

Most recently he has introduced softball and basketball, and they have proven unexpectedly popular. It is only two years since the YMCA was able to resume activity after the war. There are

that team spirit is an excellent antidote for the ideas that fascism and war planted in the minds of this country's youngsters.

Professor Guido Graziani, who studied at Springfield (Mass.) College, and then spent 15 years as director of the Bronx (N. Y.) branch of the YMCA, believes

20 Y's active, and 20 more groups organized but as yet without leadership or financial support. But softball and basketball, already are being played in 80 centers.

In 1945 there were only three teams. Now there are 80 in Rome alone. A game here will draw anywhere from 2,000 to 3,000 spectators.

"I find young Italians respond eagerly to the games," says Prof. Graziani. "Before the war there was practically no outlet for the excessive energy of the boys. That explained the success of m.a.s.a. demonstrations. If such energy is diverted into healthier channels, it makes for better citizens."

Before the war, a few in the favored classes played tennis, boxed, or fenced. For the rest there was bowling, with soccer a poor second. The state schools offered physical culture, but no games.

Graziani returned here after World War I and organized what was considered the most progressive YMCA on the continent. When World War II started, the building was taken over by the Red Cross. Graziani was regarded with some suspicion by the

Fascist government, but was permitted to work in internment and prison camps under auspices of the World Committee.

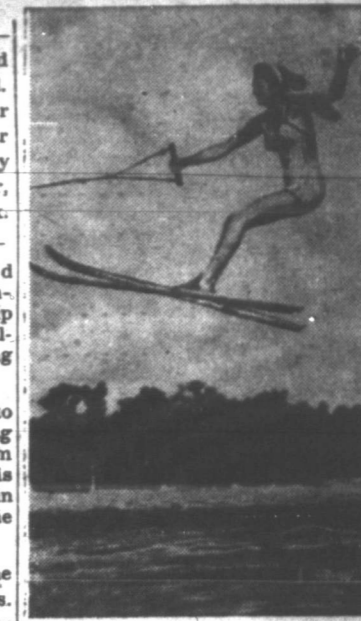
Because he had an international reputation in the sports field, the postwar government in 1945 asked him to organize a national program of physical education and sports in all schools. He found time also to publish a booklet on softball and basketball rules, and helped to organize recreational activities in the various boys towns.

The Rome YMCA has 800 adult members and 300 boys, ranging from nine to 17 years. Theoretically, children are required to attend school until they are 14, but it is an open secret that thousands are taken from school by their parents at the age of ten, and put to work. Graziani feels that the Y can do much good with these.

The Y occupies a one-time palace which has a large gym; boxing rings; a basketball court and softball field; several table tennis tables; comfortable reading rooms; a well-stocked library with books in English, French and German; and a snack bar.

## Boys Towns Lead Orphans Back to Self-Respect

**SANTA MARINELLA**, Italy — There are seven Boys Towns in Italy now, and 50 smaller centers, which together are caring for 20,000 boys salvaged from lives of destitution, misery and petty crime. Of them all, Santa Marinella is the paradise. Its center is an old villa standing in a palm-dotted garden on the Mediterranean 45 miles outside Rome, near the historic Civitavecchia. Its alleys are gay with flowers. Its dining hall, assembly room and dormitories are bright and cheery, with ceiling and walls decorated in approved Italian style.

The general impression is that of an expensive summer camp. It is far from the bombed-out old home for working criminals that Monsignor John Patrick Carroll-Abbing and Father Antonio Rovolta were handed early in 1945. Monsignor Carroll-Abbing, an Irishman who has been in Italy since 1930, is best known as "the Monsignor of the Shoe Shine Boys." It is to him that a newcomer, disturbed by finding a pathetic wail asleep in a doorway a few feet from a luxury hotel, will be sent.

When the war passed over Southern and Central Italy it left thousands of orphaned, maimed, homeless children. The smaller ones were taken in by charitable institutions. The older drifted to the larger cities, or followed the Allied armies in their slow drive up the coast. By day they indulged in thieving or even more unfortunate activities, earning three times as much as the average honest worker. At night they

## Anti-Commie Forces Try Hard to Win

As the cold war grips East Asia, it is only natural that political leaders there should get together on how to stop the spread of communism.

This is one reason, but by no means the only reason, that the "retired" Generalissimo of China, Chiang Kai-shek, and President Elpidio Quirino of the Philippines have met and agreed to form an anti-Communist union of countries in the Western Pacific. It could serve a variety of other purposes.

Before we go into these, here are the salient facts about the proposed union:  
 It is far short of the Pacific Pact Quirino and others called for last winter when the Atlantic Pact was announced. It does not mention the military aid necessary to give it teeth, but could set up an organization capable of being converted to handle such aid if and when the United States gets around to it.

President Syngman Rhee of Southern Korea already has said "Korea stands ready to join." While he was saying this, his envoy to the United Nations was asking permission to raise the Southern Korean armed force from 100,000 to 400,000 men.

In Washington, the State Department says it views such movements as the proposed anti-Communist union "with sympathy," but stands on Secretary Acheson's earlier statement that a Pacific Pact at this time would be premature.

Getting the United States as a member is a prime objective of boys respond to the new environment," says Father Rovolta. "Many had grown up in conditions of indescribable squalor and filth. When both are completed at a cost of some \$80,000, they and the industrial village together will constitute the first Italian Boys Republic.

the union. Australia, New Zealand, Siam, Indonesia, and Burma also will be sought as members. Japan is not considered eligible now, being technically at war with all the proposed members. Gen. MacArthur has said nothing publicly either to encourage or discourage the union.

However, Japan is the scene of growing Communist activity. Its supreme commander is a personal friend of Quirino and recently took occasion, according to one correspondent, to greet Chiang just before Chiang went to the United States to confer with Quirino.

A dispatch to the Associated Press from Hong Kong indicates that Chiang may be promoting the Pacific union from his "re-

tirement" as another way of prolonging his refugee government in Canton as the recognized government of Nationalist China. This dispatch, quoting competent but otherwise unidentified observers, says the news already has given Canton a "shot in the arm."

"What the Nationalists would like, of course, would be an outbreak of war between the United States and Russia," says the dispatch. "Since this appears unlikely, the next best thing would be some sort of common anti-Communist front among Asiatic nations which would be a big moral if not a substantial boost to the Kuomintang position."

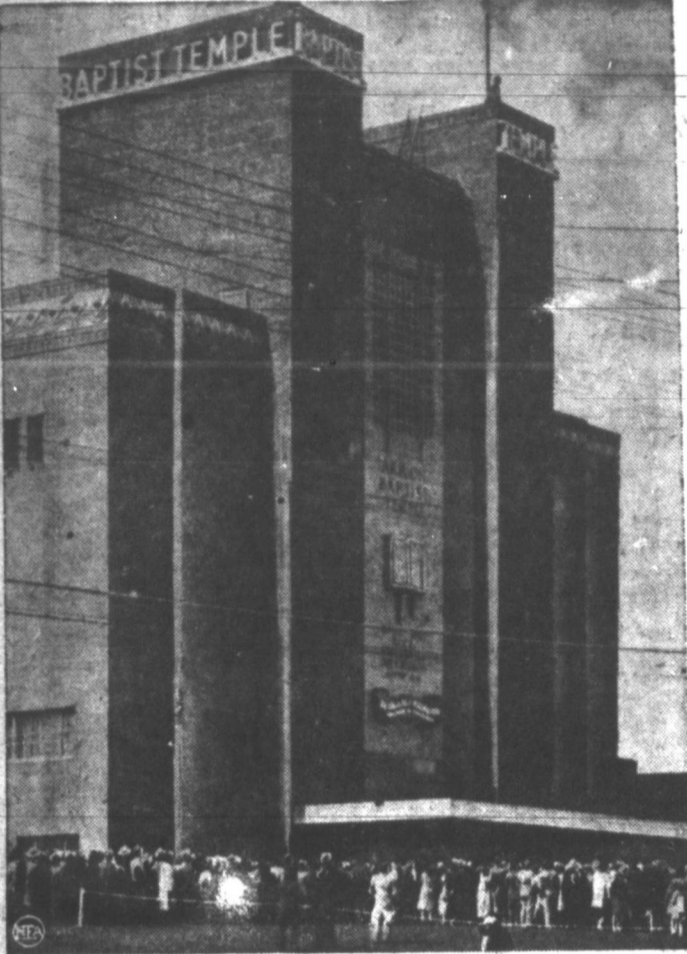

## Federal Hand In Peacetime Flying Seen

NEW YORK — The national military establishment will play a major role in determining the government's future policies toward commercial aviation, according to Aviation Week.

The publication says the three services are now making, separately, comprehensive surveys to determine "the military needs which can be met in whole or in part through the aid of civil aviation, first, in peacetime, and second, in wartime."

"Survey findings," says the article, "will be given great weight by members of the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee in blueprinting the future course for the industry."

Senator Edwin Johnson (D-Colo.) chairman of the committee, expects the surveys to be completed by late summer or early fall and plans to schedule meetings with armed services representatives at that time.

"The justification for the federal government spending hundreds of millions of dollars in promoting civil aviation, in numerous ways, has been that it is a vital adjunct of the national defense," Johnson told Aviation Week. "Before we can determine basic policies toward civil aviation development, we must know how true this is, and to what degree and in which directions the government should continue to promote civil aviation for national defense reasons."

Views of the national military establishment are expected to set the Congressional attitude on such basic civil aviation issues as:

1. Federal development of the airways, and whether commercial operators should be required to bear costs.
2. Whether contract and all-cargo operators should be encouraged.
3. Whether the government should sustain developmental costs on new-type transport and cargo aircraft.

## Doctor Says Jester Died Without Pain

By WILLIAM C. BARNARD

AUSTIN —(AP)— Gov. Beauford H. Jester died without pain without knowing he was dying. He died in his sleep. He never knew what hit him.

"That is a good way to die," Dr. H. L. Evans of Houston said today.

Dr. Evans is the physician who pronounced Governor Jester dead. "Most likely he died of coronary thrombosis," Evans added, "a blood clot probably formed in a coronary artery in the heart. The muscle was suddenly cut off. Death resulted."

The Governor died in a pullman car early Monday morning. He was bound from Austin to Galveston for a rest and a heart examination.

Called to the Southern Pacific

Station at Houston, Dr. Evans found Jester's body in the lower berth of the pullman car—lower five.

"His features were absolutely composed," said Evans. "There was no sign of any suffering or struggle. I noticed that the bed clothing had not been disturbed. He obviously died in his sleep."

Justice of the Peace Tom Maen, who returned a verdict of death due to natural causes, said: "The bedsheet was pulled up neatly over the Governor—it wasn't rumpled a bit. And his hands were folded over his chest. To me it looked like he just slept away."

What caused the blood clot to form? "Very likely the clot was preceded by some measure of coronary disease," Evans said. "I understand that the Governor had a heart condition."

Close friends of Governor Jester knew that he had some heart trouble.

At Corsicana, John C. Calhoun, state Democratic chairman, said he talked with Jester Saturday.

"He told me that his doctor had told him that his heart was 'flickering' and had ordered him to get away from Austin for a rest," Calhoun said.

Before he took the late night train to Houston Sunday, Governor Jester went on a picnic with members of his staff.

He played baseball more than 30 minutes, batting the ball some and playing various positions in the infield. He also swam in Lake Austin.

Could this have been a contributing cause of death? "That is very difficult to say," an Austin physician said. "Unusual exercise is considered a strain on the heart. Yet, the Governor died hours after this exercise. You have to keep in mind that he was at rest when he died."

The physician added: "When the blood clot cut off the supply of blood to the Governor's heart muscle, the muscle ceased to beat rhythmically and went into a spasm. Then it quit and he was dead. It must have been an overwhelming thing. Generally in such cases there is

## South Texas Seeks Routes

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Establishment of local air service between Houston and small cities in South Texas was urged Tuesday before the Civil Aeronautics Board.

Col. Walter H. Reid of the Houston Chamber of Commerce, testifying at a hearing on applications of Trans-Texas and Val-Air Lines, said there is a steadily increasing demand for such service.

Val-Air is seeking permanent authority to operate over a route it now serves on a temporary basis. This is between Harlingen and Houston, and Harlingen and San Antonio. It proposes to make a regular stop at Alice if the

application is approved. Trans-Texas, now serving cities along the Rio Grande, wants a route from McAllen through Alice to Houston and San Antonio, with stops at smaller cities enroute. Reid said oil and farm interests in the entire southern part of the state do a large volume of business through Houston. "It is certain the area needs air transportation due to the fact that the ground services are not

adequate," he told the CAB Examiner R. V. Radcliffe. "We're not endorsing any particular application. What we're worried about is, do we get the service?" Representatives of various cities in the Rio Grande Valley and other parts of South Texas were on hand to add their testimony.

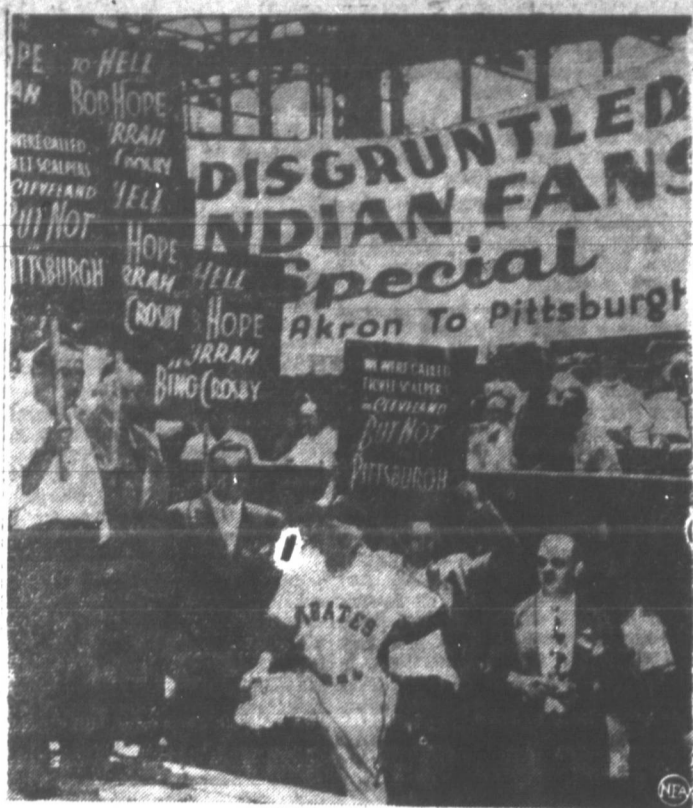

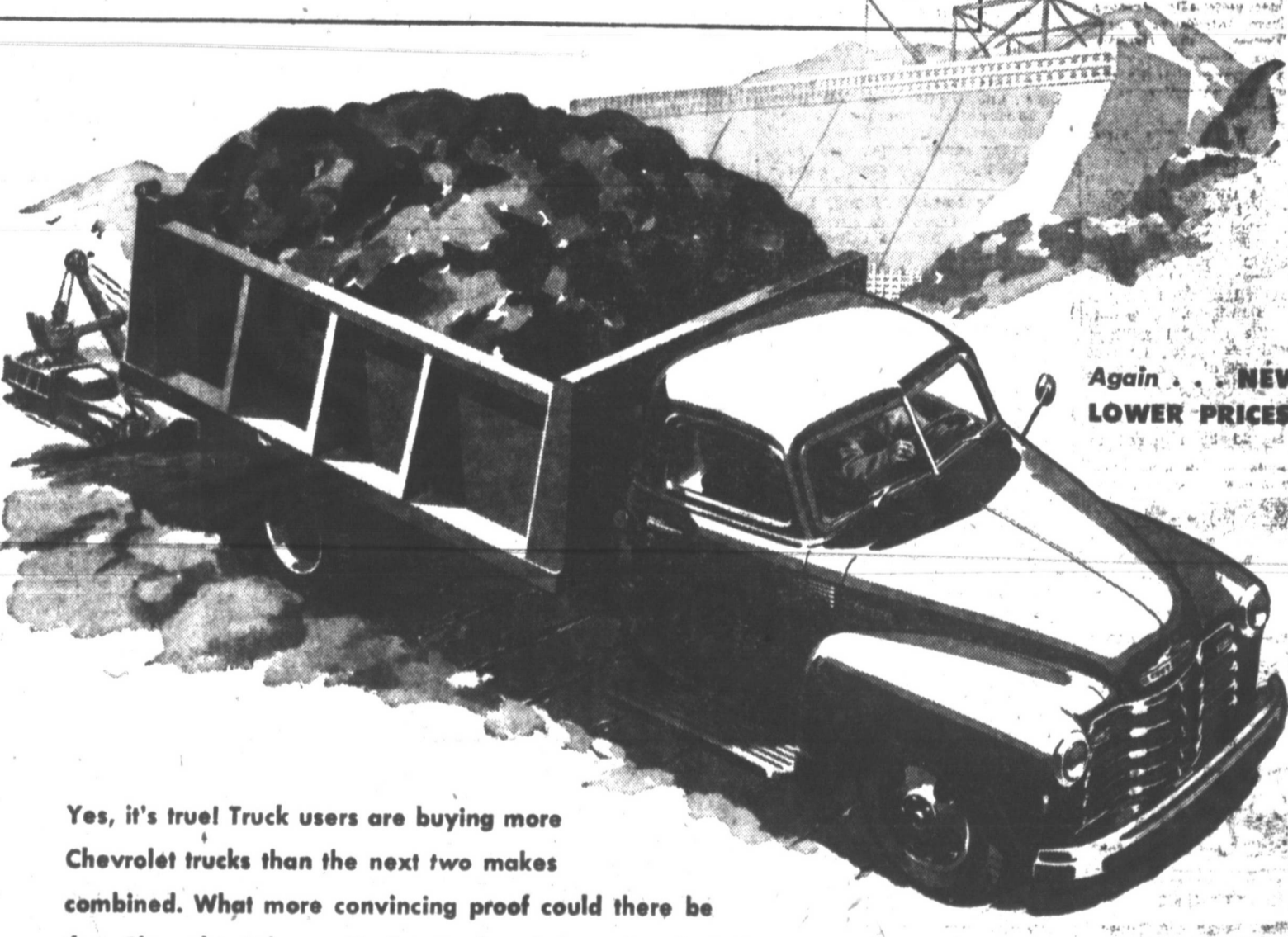

Parents who take small children into bars to watch television shows have posed a problem for Detroit's police force.

Says a spokesman of the Police-woman's Division: "There is no law under which we can prevent minors entering bars provided that they are accompanied by their parents or guardians, that they do not drink and that the parents keep them under control. However, it is obviously a bad situation. We blame the trouble on television. Parents either want to see the shows themselves or want their children to see them."

It is a bad situation. And yet it isn't much worse than a design for a family living room recently touted by a leading decorator.

"Family life in the future," said the decorator, "will be centered around a bar and television set. And he decorated a room showing how 'charmingly' that could be arranged, so that the American living room could compete with the nearest bar.

To my mind, it's no worse to take a child to a bar to see a television show than to turn a family living room into a replica of the commercial cocktail lounge. BARROOM MAY BE BETTER.

It may not even be quite as harmful, actually. For chances are, the youngster who is taken out to a bar to see a television show isn't going to spend every evening in that kind of atmosphere.

But if his own living room is built around a bar and television set, then he's going to spend evening after evening before a television set while Papa acts as bartender for any grown-up friends who happen to drop in. Police forces may worry about children being taken into bars to view television shows.

But nobody seems to be worrying about the danger of the living room being turned into a private cocktail lounge.

Just watch your decorating magazines and you'll probably notice the increasing prominence of the bar and television set in the illustrations of family living rooms.

One way or another we seem to be too willing to go crazy over new ideas that distract us from normal living.

### Educational Campaign for Control of Venereal Diseases Announced

AUSTIN — A statewide educational campaign for the control of venereal diseases, which will be carried out throughout the summer and possibly into the fall, has been announced by Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, who states that the public will be reached by means of radio news papers, movies, and lectures by health authorities.

"While it is true that great advances have been made recently in the control of these diseases, nevertheless a lack of full information on the part of the public has hindered the complete success of the program," Dr. Cox said.

"There has been a steady decline in the incidence of new cases reported, in infant and adult mortality rates, and in admissions to mental institutions due to syphilis, since 1938 when intensive measures for the control of venereal diseases were initiated. But this decline has not been

great enough," Dr. Cox added, "and this is partly attributable to a lack of accurate information and the general apathy concerning venereal diseases which followed the termination of the war."

"The spread of many completely false ideas about these diseases and their treatment has also led to a feeling of complacency, and the belief that a patient can diagnose his own case, and treat it with self medication. This is a particularly dangerous untruth; only a competent doctor can diagnose and treat venereal diseases, and it is the purpose of this educational campaign to fully inform the public of the actual dangers of venereal diseases, and what measures must be taken to control them."

Dr. Cox said that this campaign of the Texas State Department of Health will coincide with other similar educational campaigns, which will be conducted by health officials throughout the entire nation.

S. engineers came here for a meeting with Mexican engineers to discuss papers of particular interest to arid Mexico.

One new dam will be at Falcon, 75 miles southeast of Laredo, Texas, and the other will be in the Big Bend district. The Falcon dam will be about 150 feet high and nearly five miles long. The site and site of the Big Bend dam have not been fixed.

### Chinese Floods Drive 250,000 From Homes

SHANGHAI — (AP) — The mid-Yangtze flood has driven 250,000 persons from their homes, reports from missionaries and river shippers indicated today.

Floods on the Yangtze, Huang Ho and smaller rivers in West Central and Southwest China are the worst in 20 years. In some sectors they are described as the worst in history.

**ENSENADA, Mexico** — (NEA) — I've got a fiancé for U. S. movie addicts who like to gargle popcorn and wrestle with candy bars. Mexico we love you.

I asked the manager of a Mexican movie theater on the Avenue Buis here if his patrons mixed popcorn with their celluloid.

"Si, señor," he said. "Popcorn, tacos (the Mexican hamburger) and frijoles. They eat everything."

He pointed to a sign outside the theater which had escaped my attention.

"Evita Múñoz in 'Chachita La De Triana' and Hot Popcorn."

I can't win even in Mexico. But at least I'm doing better with my long forgotten high school Spanish than Ed Scofield, the Steve Hannagan of West Coast vacation resorts.

On his first visit to the swank Riviera Pacifico hotel here a desk clerk listened blankly while Ed got his high school French and Spanish mixed up in ordering a room facing the ocean.

While he dithered between "mar" and "mer," the desk clerk interrupted in clipped Ronald Colman English:

"Precisely, sir, what does that mean?"

**DOUBLE TALK**

It's a murderous Mexican trail. I've discovered. Address them in English and they "no sabe." Speak to them with the best Spanish you can muster, and they come back at you in perfect English.

Working all day for the Yankee dollar isn't just a line from a song here. The town is just a fishing village but it's overrun with American tourists and 1949 model taxicabs. Wandering merchants are everywhere. Barefoot urchins sell chewing gum and old men peddle ice at two cents a chunk in burlap-sack-covered buckets.

It's the Americans, not the Mexicans, who are the lazy ones at Ensenada.

At the border town of Tijuana things are different. I've never seen so many busy Americans rushing from one curio shop to another, betting on the horses, betting on the racing greyhounds and even betting on people at jai alai.

The enormous Fronton Palace features jai alai, one of Mexico's favorite sports. It's a sort of four-wall handball with wicker rackets. Individual players, like horses, are the objects of parimutuel betting. It's billed as the "fastest game in the world" and there's no doubt about it.

It's the first time I ever saw jai-propelled Mexican.

All of the coastline south of Los Angeles, dotted with such resorts as the Hotel Laguna, the Del Mar Turf and Surf Hotel with its adjoining race track, the old and magnificent Hotel del Coronado, and the Hotel on Beach Hotel, is booming. But Ensenada is still the end of the line for Mexico's coastal sightseers.

**Government Lowers Wheat Estimate**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The government reported a sharp reduction in wheat crop prospects due to unfavorable June weather and plant disease conditions.

But it forecast the second largest corn crop on record, exceeded only by last year's all-time high of nearly 3,700,000,000 bushels.

The new wheat estimate, however, coupled with a surplus from last year, still would provide more than enough bread grain to meet prospective domestic and export needs.

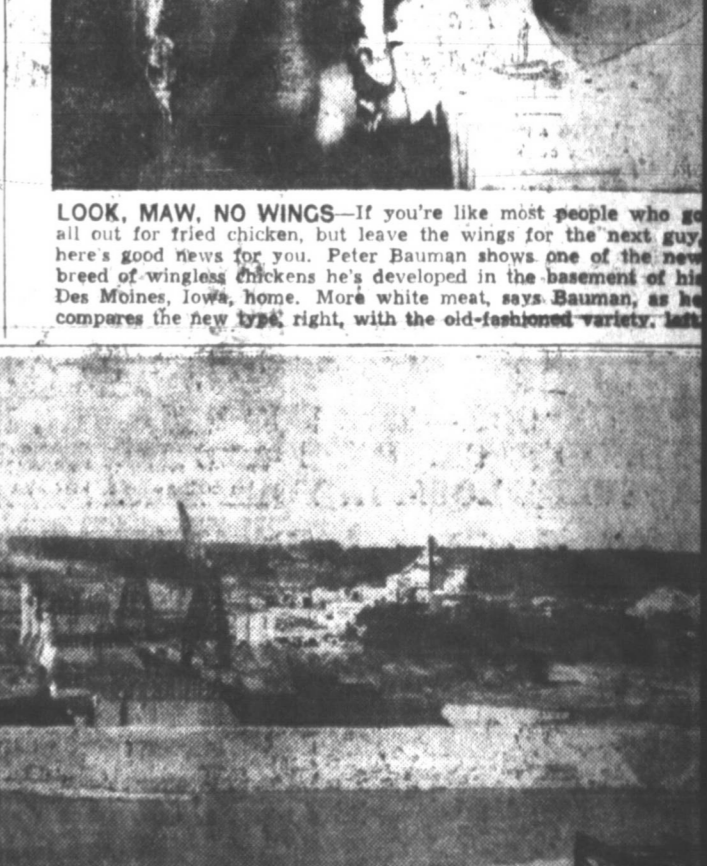

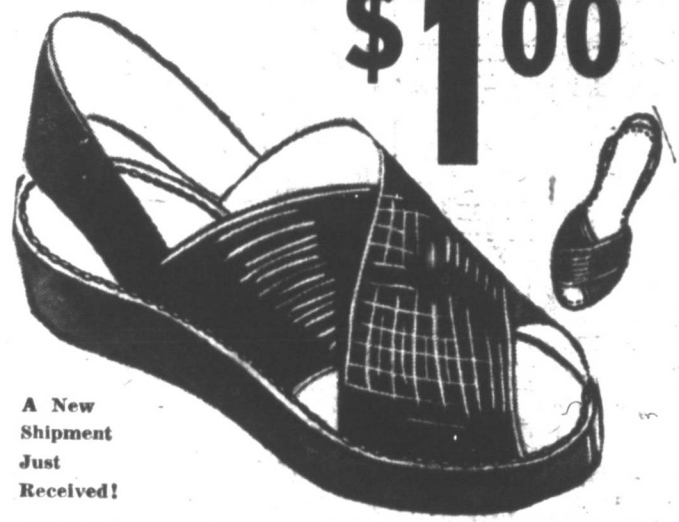

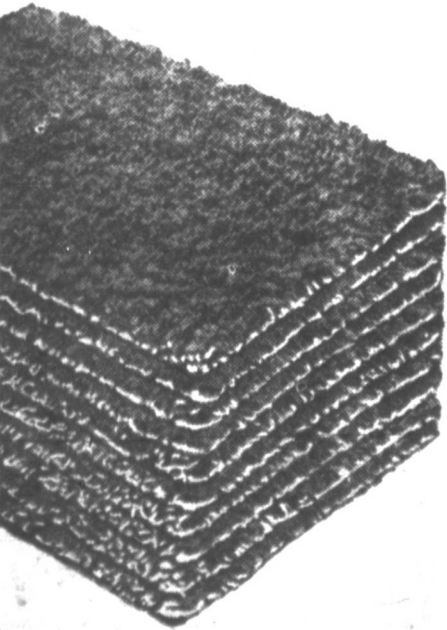
